Pair facing drug charges

Herald Staff Report

Two people are in custody for drug charges after being arrested by Big Spring police and Howard County deputies Tuesday.

Jolene Quick, 30, and Tracy Monzain Jones, 38, were initially charged with possession of drug paraphernalia, but officials said they are seeking federal charges on the duo because of firearms and methamphetamine recovered at the scene of the arrest.

At approximately 1:15 p.m. Wednesday, the Big Spring Police Department/Howard County Sheriff's Office SWAT team executed a narcotics search warrant at 811 Lorilla. The search warrant was the result of an investigation by the Big Spring Police Departments Narcotics Division, BSPD Lt. Brian Gordon said in a news release.

Upon entry into the residence, Quick, Jones and an unidentified 21-year-old female were taken into

"The 21-year-old was found to be unconscious with a methamphetamine pipe in her hand," the news release stated. "Medical personnel was immediately notified to respond."

Gordon said investigators located

5th graders changing **location**

Effective for the 2015-2016 school year, fifth graders will once again walk the halls of Big Spring Intermediate (BSI) School as district officials believe the student population will continue growing slightly or remain stable.

"If the trend continues, our elementary schools are going to be bigger (in population) than they were this year," said BSISD Superintendent Chris Wigington. "We are now sitting at about capacity, so we plan to take the fifth grade level and move it to BSI where they will have plenty of room. That will then lessen the stress on the elementary schools like we did for the junior high school this year."

Obituaries

Reverend Monsignor James Alton Plagens



Reverend Monsignor James Alton Plagens, senior priest at St. Ann's Church in Midland, died Friday, April 17, 2015, following complications from lung cancer. He was 77.

A Rosary and Vigil for Msgr. Plagens was at 7 p.m., Sunday, April 19, 2015, at St. Ann's Church, 1906 W. Texas Ave., Midland. A Funeral Mass was at 1 p.m. Monday, April 20, 2015, at St. Ann's

Church. His body will be cremated and burial will be at the St. Lawrence Cemetery at 10:30 a.m., Monday, May 4, 2015.

Msgr. Plagens was born on Feb. 15, 1938, in Bryan, Texas. He was baptized at St. Joseph's Church in Bryan on March 10, 1938. After graduating from Wall High School, Msgr. Plagens earned his associates degree from San Angelo College in 1959. He attended seminary at St. Mary's in Lebanon, Ky. (1959-1962), and the North American College and Gregorian University, in Rome (1962-1966). Msgr. Plagens was in Rome at the time of the Second Vatican Council and later returned upon the 50th anniversary of the council in 2013. He was honored with the title of "Monsignor" (Chaplain to His Holiness) in February 2009.

Msgr. Plagens was ordained a priest in the Diocese of San Angelo on Dec. 18, 1965 by Bishop Francis F. Reh, at St. Peter's Basilica in Rome.

His first assignment was at St. Mary's Church in Odessa (assistant pastor, 1966-1970), during which time he also served Our Lady of Lourdes in Imperial and St. Isidore in Coyanosa. Assignments that followed were at St. Therese in Carlsbad, Texas, and St. Paschal in Sterling City (pastor, 1970-1971); Our Lady of Perpetual Help, Ozona, (pastor, 1971-1977); St. Francis of Assisi, Abilene, (pastor, 1977-1981); St. Ambrose in Wall and Holy Family in Mereta, (pastor, 1982-1992); St. Patrick in Brady and St. Francis Xavier in Melvin, (pastor, 1992-1996); Director of Parish Leadership in the diocesan office (1996-1999); Sacred Heart and St. Thomas parishes in Big Spring (pastor, 1999-2008), and Immaculate Heart of Mary, Big Spring (parochial administrator, 2000). Msgr. Plagens served St. Ann's in Midland as Senior Priest (2008-2011). His official retirement date was December 31, 2011.

Msgr. Plagens spent two years studying at Catholic University in Washington, D.C. (1980-1982),

receiving his master of arts in liturgical studies. He received two appointments as Promoter of Justice for the Diocese of San Angelo in 1991 and 1994.

Msgr. Plagens' knowledge of church liturgy ran deep. He served as chairperson for the Diocesan Liturgy Committee for many years; was a member of the board of directors on the Southwest Liturgy Conference, and a member of the National Federation of the Diocesan Liturgy Commission. He was a member of the diocesan Senate of Priests.

A once avid downhill snow skier, he was known by parishioners for his kindness, soft-spoken compassion and love of food. Msgr. Plagens provided gentle counsel to thousands of West Texas Catholics during a vocation that spanned 49 years. His hobbies included playing and watching tennis, family genealogy, cooking (and eating!), and travel.

Msgr. Plagens is preceded in death by his mother, Victoria Opersteny Plagens, and father, Edward Plagens Sr., both formerly of Bryan, Texas; brother Norman Plagens, formerly of Rankin, Texas; brother Clarence Plagens, formerly of Rockwall, Texas; Emory Lero, brother-in-law, formerly of Bryan, Texas, and Wanda Plagens, sister-in-law, formerly of Hamilton, Texas.

He is survived by seven of nine siblings: brother Milton Plagens and his wife, Albina, of San Angelo, Texas; sister Alice Lero, of Bryan, Texas; brother Edward Plagens Jr., and wife, Bernadette, of St. Lawrence, Texas; brother Frank Plagens and wife, Cathy, of Richardson, Texas; brother Donald Plagens and wife, Lynn, of Hamilton, Texas; brother Earl Plagens, and wife, Sheila, of Colorado City, Texas; brother Robert Plagens, and wife, Cathy, of Bryan, Texas; sister-in-law Georgia Plagens, of Midland; sister-in-law Leigh Plagens, of Rockwall, Texas, and 30 nieces and nephews.

When Msgr. Plagens was diagnosed with Stage 4 lung cancer, Team Plagens was formed. Four loving and caring couples from St. Ann's came forward to unite with the Plagens' family to help provide care, medical support and comfort for James. They are Ed and Terrie Martinez, Tony and Nanette Paredes, Rene and Nancy del Villar, and Torivio and Norma Duran.



students down from last month but that is district wide. We have over 4,000 students in this district."

At this time, Wigington said all rooms at the elementary campuses are being utilized for classroom instruction.

"I don't want us to be trying to find places to put kids at the elementary schools," he said. "We are not doing that

this year, but we are using every room on every elementary campus for instruction. If we are doing some remediation, we are pulling them out in the hall. Once we moved the fifth grade, it is going to open up three or four rooms on these campuses we can use for other things."

One of the oldest facilities in the district, the old Goliad building was shuttered for instructional use in 2012 after the four new elementary schools opened. During its useful life, the building has undergone several transitions.

First, the facility was used as a junior high school. It has also been used as a sixth and seventh grade center, a sixth grade center, a fifth and sixth grade center and at times a kindergarten through sixth grade primary school.

Wigington said currently district employees are preparing and upgrading the security on the campus for the additional student load.



Sledge remembered for talent

BAKER, La. (AP) Percy Sledge was remembered for phenomenal talent and extraordinary kindness during a Tuesday funeral service marked by warm reminiscences from fellow musicians, family members and friends he made during a five-decade career that launched with his first and biggest hit, "When a Man Loves a Woman."

"Heaven's choir just got a whole lot more soul," said Rev. Dane Blankenship, a Baton Rouge area pastor and hospice chaplain who spent time with Sledge during his final days.

Sledge, an Alabama native who lived much of his life with second wife Rosa in Baton Rouge, died last week at age 74 after battling liver cancer.

Upbeat spirituals from a trio of gospel singers opened and closed the three-hour service, billed as a celebration of Sledge's life, at Bethany Church in Baker, near Baton Rouge. Sledge's body lay in an open casket, adorned on the outside with musical notes and a treble clef. His name and likeness were emblazoned in black on the white interior lid.

Preachers from the Muscle Shoals, Alabama, area, where Sledge's signature song was recorded in 1966, read Bible verses. Performers included his daughter Sanricca, who sang a Whitney Houston song, and son Howell, who sang a hymn.

Testimonials from his children and from friends he made

"There's not a kinder person in the world. There's not a more giving person in the world and there's not a smile like that in the world anywhere," said Alabama record producer David Johnson, who met Sledge in 1966 and worked on a recent gospel album with him.

Longtime R&B and gospel singer Dorothy Moore sang a song about departing: "When you hear of my home-going, don't worry 'bout me ... I'm just another soldier, oh yeah, going home."

Little Rock, Arkansas, car dealer Frank Fletcher recalled a decades-old friendship with Sledge and said he asked the singer to appear every time he opened a business. "I bought 13 car dealerships I really didn't need because I got him to come every time."

Sledge's hits included "Warm and Tender Love" and "Take Time to Know Her." But "When a Man Loves a Woman" — his first hit – became a standard that sustained his long touring career in the U.S., Europe and South Africa and led to his induction into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame. It was the first No. 1 hit from Muscle Shoals.

Encore! TV does it again with 'Full House' reboot

NEW YORK — As TV networks plunder the recycling bin for old shows to revive, "Full House" must have been the final scrap at the bottom of the barrel.

Or so it would seem to those gobsmacked by news that Netflix is resuscitating the 1987-95 ABC sitcom — which, even for fans, is tenderly remembered as ephemeral fluff — for 13 new episodes revisiting the Tanners of San Francisco and re-titled "Fuller House."

As the "Full House" theme song posed jauntily, "Whatever happened to predictability — the milkman, the paperboy, evening TV?"

These days, "evening TV" is gloriously unpredictable in many quarters ("Louie," ''Game of Thrones," ''Mad Men" and Netflix's own "Orange Is the New Black," to name a bare handful).

But at the same time, television programmers are heeding the echo chamber's siren call, breathing new life (or trying) into old TV concepts refashioned as

Two years ago, Netflix revived the offbeat comedy "Arrested Development," which Fox had canceled eight years CBS is in its fifth sea-

son of the updated "Hawaii Five-O," whose original CBS version left the air in 1980. Last fall, TNT canceled

"Dallas" after three seasons — and two decades after the original "Dallas" ended a 14-season run on CBS.

Let's not forget "The Odd Couple," which premiered in February on CBS.

Starring Matthew Perry and Thomas Lennon as the mismatched flat-mates, it is based on the 1968 film, which was based on the 1965 Broadway comedy, which inspired the long-running 1970 ABC sitcom (starring Jack Klugman and Tony Randall) as well as

the 1982 ABC flop featuring an African-American odd couple (played by Demond Wilson and Ron Glass).

And now let's look

• A reboot of the 1990-91 ABC thriller "Twin Peaks," set for 2016, was announced last fall by Showtime with cocreators David Lynch and Mark Frost back on board for a new round of eeriness.

Earlier this month, Lynch said he was exiting the project, but Showtime expressed hopes of salvaging the series with both principals participating.

• NBC is game for a new round of the 1989-97 sitcom "Coach." The network has ordered 13 episodes of what it is pointedly calling a "sequel," not a revival or, um, rip-off of the ABC original, with Craig T. Nelson again starring as Hayden Fox, former head coach of a college football team and now assistant coach to his grown son, who's the new head coach at an Ivy League school.

 MTV2 announced last week that it has ordered a pilot for the resurrection of "Celebrity Death Match," the ultimate-fighting spoof that pits animated effigies of stars against each other. The series originally aired on MTV from 1998 to 2002, then returned to MTV2 in 2005 for two more seasons, with such puppet face-offs as Ice Cube against Ice-T and Hillary Rodham Clinton vs. Monica Lewinsky.

• And don't forget "The X-Files," which will bring back agents Mulder and Scully (David Duchovny and Gillian Anderson) after a dozen years' absence from the Fox airwaves for six new episodes set to air on Fox this summer. Will the truth still be out there?

It's worth remembering that "The X-Files" was a rarity when it premiered in 1993. It explored the occult, the paranormal and extraterrestrial life, as well as delving into the public's fear of science and technology, of government and themselves. It was a very long shot. But it caught on big and ran nine seasons and spawned two feature

films. Of course, by now it's an established part of TV history and pop culture, not to mention comfortably familiar. Whatever happened to predictability? No wonder it's among the TV shows poised for a comeback.



Patrick advisers: Pre-K a 'godless' choice for state

visers to Republican Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick described a major bipartisan pre-K initiative as socialist and keeping children in a 'Godless environment' in a letter sent to lawmakers Tuesday. The letter was a rebuke over

a preschool push being led by Republican Gov. Greg Abbott, whose office responded by defending its plan while not addressing the criticism. It was written by a "grassroots advisory" board of conservative activists that Patrick, a tea party leader, assembled upon taking office in January.

"We are experimenting at unsolicited and expresses the great cost to taxpayers with a program that removes our young children from homes and half-day religious preschools and mothers' out programs to a Godless environment with only evidence showing absolutely NO LONG-TERM BENEFITS beyond the 1st grade," the letter

Patrick's spokesman Alejandro Garcia said the office did not see the letter until after it had been distributed. He did not comment on the content.

"The letter in question was

individual viewpoints of Texas citizens," Garcia said.

Pre-K has emerged as what could be the latest Republican stalemate with time winding down in Abbott's first session. Patrick, who unseated a more moderate three-term incumbent last fall, controls the Senate. The chamber has yet to move on the pre-K makeover that Abbott proclaimed one of his "emergency items' this session.

Texas currently offers halfday pre-K to children from low-income households, military families or those learning English. Abbott wouldn't expand pre-K eligibility but would provide more money to make existing programs better. Education groups and some Democrats have criticized the plan as a half-mea-"This interference by the

state tramples upon our parental rights," the letter from the "grassroots" panel read. "The early removal of children from parents' care is historically promoted in socialistic countries, not free societies which respect parental rights."

In response to the letter,

lia Chasse issued a statement saying the governor's plan "is a conservative antidote to ineffective pre-K programs" by adding accountability and implementing higher standards.

Patrick's panel is one of two advisory boards he set up upon taking office. The other is a board of doz-

ens of wealthy Texas business leaders, many Republican megadonors who contributed to Patrick, assembled to advise him on broad issues like tax policy and transporta-

Study links swarm of quakes in Texas to natural gas drilling

WASHINGTON (AP) - With real-time monitors, scientists have linked a swarm of small earthquakes west of Fort Worth, Texas, to nearby natural gas wells and wastewater injection.

In 84 days from November 2013 to January 2014. the area around Azle, Texas, shook with 27 magnitude 2 or greater earthquakes, while scientists at Southern Methodist University and the U.S. Geological Survey monitored the shaking. It's an area that had no recorded quakes for 150 years on faults that "have been inactive for hundreds of millions of years," said SMU geophysicist Matthew Horn-

When the volume of injections decreased significantly, so did the shaking.

The scientists concluded that removing saltwater from the wells in the gas production process and then injecting that wastewater back underground "represent the most likely cause" for the swarm of quakes, according to a study published Tuesday in the journal Nature Communications.

The scientists determined this based on where and when the earthquakes happened; computer models that track pressure changes; and company data from nearby wells. Hornbach said the timing and location of the quakes correlates better to the drilling and injection than any other possible rea-

"There appears to be little doubt about the conclusion that the earthquakes were in fact induced," USGS seismologist Susan Hough, who wasn't part of the study team, said in an email. "There's almost an abundance of smoking guns in this case.'

This adds to other studies that linked injecting wastewater from energy wells to a tremendous jump in earthquakes in Oklahoma and southern Kansas, where there have been more than 950 magnitude 2 or higher quakes so far this year, according to the USGS.

On Tuesday, the Oklahoma Geological Society said it is "very likely" that most of the earthquakes that have shaken the state in recent years have been triggered by the subsurface injection of wastewater from oil and natural gas drilling operations. The society released a statement following an investigation into dozens of earthquakes recorded in central and north-central Oklahoma.

The sheriff's office initially said Willis shot Smith after she ignored a command to drop her firearm. It later said it couldn't confirm that Smith had any weapon. Willis was fired after being indicted on the murder charge.

A message seeking comment from Willis' attorney was left by the Austin American-Statesman.

HOUSTON (AP) — Officials say at least nine children from a Houston-area school district have been slightly hurt when their day care van was hit during a three-vehicle wreck. The Klein Independent School District says the

van carried students from Apple Grove Elementary School after classes let out Tuesday afternoon. Investigators say a car allegedly ran a stop sign, hit the van and crashed into an SUV. The injured Klein ISD students were transported

to hospitals for treatment of minor injuries. KHOU-TV reports another child, from one of the other vehicles, was also slightly hurt. KPRC-TV reports the car driver was also injured.

Jail officer arrested for trying to smuggle pot in chips bag

TEXARKANA, Texas (AP) — An East Texas correctional officer has been arrested for trying to smuggle marijuana into the facility via a bag of Cheetos Puffs.

Bowie County chief deputy Jeff Neal says the 19-year-old officer was searched after returning from a break just after midnight Tuesday. Neal says everyone and items always are searched before entering the facility.

A second officer found inside of the bag a purple object which contained the marijuana and tobac-

Neal says a sheriff's deputy was called to the cen ter and arrested the 19-year-old for prohibited substances in a correctional facility. The correctional officer only had been employed for about one month before his arrest.

Neal says an investigation is ongoing.

Ex-prosecutor Ina Minjarez (mihn-HAHR'-ehz) took 58 percent of the vote Tuesday to defeat fellow Democrat and former council member Delicia Her-

Menendez left the House in February to become a Texas senator, succeeding Leticia Van de Putte (PYOOT). She left the Senate to run for San Antonio mavor. Minjarez had been the biggest vote-getter on the

Texas State Aquarium fish kill blamed on mislabeling

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) of 389 fish at the Texas State Aquarium are being blamed on a mislabeled chemical container.

A statement posted Tuesday on the aquarium's Facebook page says what staff members thought was an anti-parasite drug was actually a poisonous chemical used in film processing, as a stabilizer in paint and motor fuels, and in cosmetics. That's based on preliminary lab results.

The aquarium said isn't yet revealing the source of the mislabeled chemical.

Some aquariums and zoos have offered to send animals to help the Texas State Aquarium rebuild its collection.

Aquarium President Tom Schmid said a fund has been established to help the aquarium recover. Orion Drilling CEO Wayne Squires has pledged to match all donations up to \$50,000.


Sheriff seeks cruelty charge for vet accused of killing cat

BELLVILLE, Texas (AP) - A Texas sheriff has asked for an animal cruelty charge against a veterinarian who bragged on social media about killing a cat with an arrow.

Renzi: EU can't leave it to Italy to stop migrant 'slavery'; calls for refugee camps in Africa

on Wednesday to devise concrete, robust steps to stop the deadly tide of migrants on smugglers' boats in the Mediterranean, including setting up refugee camps in countries bordering Libya.

ROME (AP) — Italy pressed the European Union

Italian Defense Minister Roberta Pinotti also said human traffickers must be targeted with military intervention.

"We know where the smugglers keep their boats, where they gather," Pinotti told Sky TG24 TV in an interview. "The plans for military intervention are there." She was speaking a day before EU leaders hold

an emergency summit in Brussels called in the wake of a shipwreck off Libya last weekend which authorities believe may have killed more than 800 migrants. It would be the highest known loss of migrants' lives in a single incident in the Mediterra-

In the latest arrival of migrants, an Italian naval vessel docked in the Sicilian port of Augusta with 446 people aboard who had been rescued from a smugglers' boat on Tuesday off the southern coast of the Italian mainland. The navy said 59 of the migrants are children.

After Saudi Arabia halts airstrikes, Yemenis in capital, Sanaa, have quietest night in a month

SANAA, Yemen (AP) — Yemen's capital, Sanaa, was calm overnight and into Wednesday morning after Saudi Arabia declared an end to its monthlong airstrikes targeting Yemen's Iran-backed Shiite rebels and their allies, a campaign that has claimed hundreds of lives and pushed the impoverished Arab country deeper into chaos.

For the residents, it was the quietest night in almost four weeks, with no massive explosions or new scenes of devastation to wake up to.

The rebels, known as Houthis, called for a massive rally, urging supporters over their Al-Masirah TV network to take to the streets of Sanaa later Wednesday to mark the end of the bombardment and to denounce the Saudi "aggression."

The U.S.-backed airstrikes campaign by Saudi Arabia, launched March 26, was aimed at crushing the Houthis and allied military units loyal to former autocratic President Ali Abdullah Saleh, who had taken over Sanaa and much of northern

The kingdom said its aim was also to restore to power President Abed Rabbo Mansour Hadi, who was forced to flee Yemen to Saudi Arabia last month in the face of the Houthi advance.

Police officer who shot Washington farmworker had dragged him away from fire weeks earlier

SEATTLE (AP) — One of the officers who killed an immigrant farmworker in Washington state in a shooting that helped fuel the nationwide debate over police use of force had dragged the man away from his burning rental home just weeks earlier.

Antonio Zambrano-Montes, who in another case had pleaded with police to kill him, was sitting on the ground in January in a meth-induced trance near the fire when Officer Adam Wright found him, according to documents obtained by The Associated Press under public records requests.

Weeks later, Wright and two other officers shot Zambrano-Montes after he had been throwing rocks in a busy intersection. Video footage that showed the man running away, then turning around with arms outstretched just as police unloaded, prompted months of protests. He was the third person killed by Pasco officers within six months.

The documents obtained by the AP shed new light on Zambrano-Montes' run-ins with police and his erratic, sometimes dangerous behavior.

While Pasco police say their officers generally receive more training than state standards require, records show only a half-dozen had taken an extended course on dealing with people in the throes of drug-abuse or mental health crisis — fewer than other departments in the region.

Protesters pour into Baltimore streets after death following man's

BALTIMORE (AP) — Amid tears and cries for justice, demonstrators poured into the streets of Baltimore carrying signs emblazoned with the name of a man who died from a spinal injury he suffered while in police custody. Tuesday's demonstration marked the beginning of a week of protests and rallies planned across the city. The Justice Department said earlier in the day

that it has opened a civil rights investigation into the death of Freddie Gray, a 25-year-old black man who suffered a fatal spinal-cord injury under mysterious circumstances after he was handcuffed and put in the back of a police van. At the site of Gray's arrest, more than a thousand

demonstrators gathered to remember Gray, who friends and relatives say was kind, funny and generous, and call for police reform. "I want this to be a sign to the Baltimore Police

Department that this is not an act of surrender," said Pastor Jamal Bryant of the Empowerment Temple, one of the rally's organizers, as he called on those in the crowd to raise their hands. "It's a sign of strength, of one unity and one commitment that we will not rest until we get justice for Freddie

"The world is watching," Bryant said. "The world is watching, and the world needs to see that black Baltimore is unified."

Clinton's campaign launch highlights family and upbringing, just not so much Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Hillary Rodham Clinton's granddaughter, Charlotte, is a symbol of the future. Clinton's late parents offer lessons about hard work and resiliency. Her own daughter, Chelsea, gives voters a window into her mother's life long before she was one of the world's most famous women.

In campaign kickoff events in Iowa and New Hampshire, Clinton shared stories with voters about the lesser-known members of her family: her father's work running a small textile business in Chicago, her mother's hardscrabble upbringing and what the future may hold for baby Charlotte's generation. Taken together, the biographical sketches animate her pitch to middle-class families.

"When I think about my dad, it was a lot easier in those days to have an idea, to get what you needed and to go to work," Clinton said at a Keene, New Hampshire, furniture factory this week, describing obstacles for small businesses. In Iowa, she remembered her father, Hugh Rodham Sr., as a "wastenot-want-not kind of guy" whose fabric drapery business provided for her family.

The Clintons' political history will play a big part in her new campaign, but the early emphasis has been elsewhere. The most famous man in her life, former President Bill Clinton, only comes up in passing. In New Hampshire, where her husband remains popular, Hillary Clinton said she called him to offer travel updates while in Iowa, and smiled when a community college instructor recalled the bullish economy during her husband's two terms.

"I remember!" she said.

Sunni tribesmen battle their own after breaking with Islamic State group over killings

MAKHMOUR, Iraq (AP) — When Islamic State militants swept across northern Iraq last summer, the Sunni al-Lehib tribe welcomed them as revolutionaries fighting the Shiite-led government in Baghdad. But less than a year later, the tribe is bitterly split between those who joined the extremist group and those resisting its brutal rule.

The tribe hails from a village just south of Mosul, Iraq's second largest city, which was captured by the IS last year. Like many Sunnis in northern Iraq, they initially welcomed the Islamic State group as liberators. "We were happy when Daesh came," tribal lead-

er Nazhan Sakhar said, using an acronym for the

extremist group. "We thought they were going to Baghdad to establish a government. But then they started killing our own people. It turned out they were the same as al-Qaida."

Now he leads a group of around 300 fighters who have reluctantly allied with Iraqi troops and Kurdish forces to fight the IS group — and fellow tribesmen who still support the extremists.

Boston Marathon jurors see photo of defiant Tsarnaev as prosecutors make case for death BOSTON (AP) — As jurors looked at a photograph

of Boston Marathon bomber Dzhokhar Tsarnaev giving the finger to a security camera in his jail cell, a federal prosecutor described it as a defiant act by an unrepentant man who didn't care that he had killed four people, including an 8-year-old boy and a police officer. Assistant U.S. Attorney Nadine Pellegrini began laying out the government's case for executing

Tsarnaev, and showed the jury large, vibrant pictures of the people killed in the bombing and its aftermath. Then she revealed the photo of Tsarnaev, taken three months later in his holding cell at the federal courthouse. "This is Dzhokhar Tsarnaev — unconcerned, unrepentant and unchanged," Pellegrini on Tuesday

told the jurors who will decide whether the 21-yearold former college student should be executed. The penalty phase in the Boston Marathon bomber's trial opened in dramatic fashion, with prosecutors portraying Tsarnaev as a coldblooded killer

and "America's worst nightmare." The government then began trying to drive home the horror of the attack by calling to the stand witnesses who lost legs or loved ones in the April 15, 2013, bombing.

Afghan deportees from Iran, including many vulnerable teens, return to home they barely know

ISLAM QALA, Afghanistan (AP) — Tajigul Haidary had overstayed her residents' visa in Iran and was expecting just a hefty fine when she went to renew it, she said. Instead, she was arrested as an illegal immigrant, imprisoned, held in a transit center with hundreds of other Afghans and, early this week, deported at a dusty border point back to

It's a homeland that she hardly knows. Her family took her to Iran when she was nine years old. Now 26 years old, she is married to another Afghan in Iran, has a 4-year-old son and an 8-year-old daughter and is five months pregnant. When she was deported, she was wrested away from them.

"My husband tried his best to get me out but they wouldn't listen to him. My children cried, but it made no difference. I don't know what to do. I have to get back," she said, tugging at the voluminous black chador warn by many Iranian women, as she sat on a plastic chair in a shed at the Islam Qala border crossing.



And gave Snyder its fourth straight district softball championship.

Snyder, taking advantage of several Big Spring errors and three home runs, broke open a close 2-1 battle by scoring 11 runs in the third inning and cruising to a 17-6 victory in front of a standing-room-only crowd at Lady Steers Field. With the win, Snyder cinched the

District 2-4A championship by improving to 9-0. Big Spring, despite the loss, remained in second place in the district race heading into its seasonfinale on Saturday in Sweetwater.

Mackenzie Roberts gave Big Spring plenty of optimism in the early moments of the contest. The BSHS standout clubbed her second home run of the season - a towering drive to left off Snyder starter Haley Morris - that pulled Big Spring to within 2-1 heading into the third.

Snyder, now 20-5 overall, scored two runs earlier in the game to draw first

When the opponents favor you with a friendly lead, you're not expected to reciprocate by returning the favor. Take this case where West led the jack of clubs against six hearts. As it happened, a diamond lead, or the lead of the ace and another spade, would have fixed South's wagon beyond repair. However, the club lead gave him an

excellent shot at the slam. Declarer won the club with the king and led the deuce of hearts to the ace, on which West showed out. South then crossed to the ace of clubs and finessed the ten of hearts after East followed low. This left South in a difficult position from which he could not extricate himself as the cards lay.

Stuck in dummy, he made the best play of a spade to the queen, but it availed him naught. West took the ace and returned a spade, and East ruffed to put an end to South's mis-ery. (A diamond return by West would have led to the same result.)

South was unlucky to run into a 4-0 trump break, but he should have made the slam anyway. At trick two, he should have led the ten of hearts - not the deuce - to the ace. Leading the ten to the ace could do no harm and might do some good — as it would have in the actual case.

This simple precautionary play would have allowed South to win the second round of hearts in his hand with the nine, draw trumps and concede a spade to the ace to make the

It might seem a bit harsh to criticize South for his failure to lead the heart ten at trick two, but the fact is that bridge is a game where paying attention to small details goes a long way toward determining who comes out on top.



She stood by him through good times and bad, but she never gave up on him. They celebrated 60 years of marriage and enjoyed their retirement for 20 years before she passed away.

Please let your readers know there are some wonderful people in this world who are alcoholics and not the monsters we often read about. -- A Child with a Different Story


