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Alcohol proposal gaining support



No drinking allowed — not yet, anyway. While a plan to allow alcohol consumption in the city's smaller neighborhood parks remains tabled for now, support for the idea is definitely picking up steam.

During their Tuesday meeting, Big Spring City Council members discovered overwhelming support for a proposal to allow alcohol consumption at the La Familia Pavilion at Andries Park in north

Four local residents spoke during a public hearing on the matter, and all expressed support for allowing alcohol consumption at the pavilion. Perhaps more importantly, a survey of residents in the area of the park resulted in nearunanimous approval of the idea.

"The people have spoken," said Raul Marquez Sr., one of the speakers at the public hearing. "It is the people who will suffer or benefit from this idea."

A door-to-door survey of 29 lots within 200 feet of the park was conducted April 26, asking residents their opinion on the sale and consumption of alcohol at the pavilion. Those not contacted during the canvassing were sent the survey by mail.

City Manager Todd Darden said 17 responses were received. Of those, 12 supported the idea, while two opposed it and three expressed no opinion on the matter. It is unknown when — or if — the pro-

Council OKs more hangar funds, restricts pets at amphitheater

More pilots are welcome at city owned property - pets, not so

Big Spring's City Council took action Tuesday night which cleared the way for more airplane hangar space at the local airport, while also declaring a piece of city property off-limits to animals.

In the past, pets have been allowed at the city amphitheater during community activities such as Pops in the Parks, but that's about to change.

"Over the past couple of years, we've seen an increase in the use of the amphitheater," Big Spring Police Chief Chad Williams told the council. "Unfortunately, more people are bringing animals to the

The new ordinance has a few caveats — it does not apply to service animals such as seeing-eye dogs and is enforceable only within the physical confines of the amphitheater; pets are still allowed elsewhere in Comanche Trail Park.

Concerning the airport, council approved a request to help cover a cost overrun in the construction of

through national research and many colleges are doing this, it not only has success with the students being more successful but the added benefit for us as an institution is we feel it will have a big impact on retention." The program takes a

three-prongedapproach, Smith said — campus involvement, community involvement and career and academic planning. Essential, first time

college students who are not taking any remedial classes will choose to join a cluster reflecting their career choice. Those cluster groups right now are health and science, business and industry, arts and humanities, STEM (science, technology, engineering, mathematics), public service, and undecided. During the year-long

course, students will learn basic skills time management strategies, study skills, financial literary – to help them succeed in college, Smith said. A point structure is worked into the course to encourage both campus and community involvement. Students will receive points for attending campus lectures and activities and performing community services. The college plans to bring in professionals to visit with students to offer advice and information about their chosen career. "Students do better

when they get engaged with other students," Smith said. "The plan is to not only get them engage in their college life by becoming a more

active member on the college of their choice but also more involved and responsible in their community."

By creating a sense of purpose, Smith said, the college hopes to provide opportunities to give these new students a sense of direction.

"We lose a large number of full-time students from fall to spring and spring to fall that first year," she said. "Right now we don't really know why. We just lose them. We will have such close relationship through the clusters, we will still lose students but we will know why. What we want to do as an institution is to help them cross over those barriers and stay in college. We are really looking forward to it. It's going to be a lot of fun."

(Family Features) — With all the noise about foods you should or shouldn't feed your family, it can be difficult to make a confident decision while perusing those grocery store aisles.

One type in particular — processed food— is often vilified in today's food envi-

ronment, but that shouldn't necessarily be the case. Processing foods can have benefits to improve food's shelf-life, reduce food waste, conserve resources and provide healthier and safer food for families every-

'Defining processed foods has been chal-

lenging," says Connie Weaver, Ph.D. and

distinguished professor in Nutrition Science at Purdue University, who works to improve the communication and translation of health studies to the general public. "A common definition is essential so everyone can talk together and have a more meaningful conversation about pro-From a scientific standpoint, processed

foods can include common kitchen staples such as bread, cheese, wine and yogurt. "To a scientist, processing is how many steps the manufacturer of the food requires to transform it from the raw materials into the food you eat," Weaver explains. Yet, people often misunderstand pro-

cessed foods as those with empty calories or junk foods laden with sodium, fat and sugar. For consumers, it's really not about the degree of processing; it's about nutrient density or the formula of the food.

Advantages of processed foods

The nutritional value of processed foods

depends on the formula or recipe, according to Weaver. Processing steps can be used to improve the nutrient content of a food. For example, manufacturers are reducing sugar, sodium and fat to improve the health of some foods, and adding or devising formulas for foods that have nutrients that people need more of, such as dietary fiber, vitamin D, calcium and potassium.

Some of the most important nutritional deficiencies in the world have been resolved because foods have been enriched and fortified with nutrients. For example, adding iodine to salt cured goiter, an enlarged growth in the throat caused by iodine deficiency. Similarly, adding vitamin D to milk in the United States has cured rickets, the bowing of legs in children due to deficiency. More recently, medical foods for people with diseases who can't tolerate the risk of bacteria or infection rely exclusively on processed foods.

Soy beverages are another example of processed food. Weaver's research team at Purdue University studied calcium absorption from a soy beverage enriched with calcium and found it just as bioavailable, or absorbable, as cow's milk. That caused the U.S. Department Agriculture to allow calciumfortified soy beverages in school lunch and breakfast programs as an alternative to milk.

Before eliminating processed foods from your family's diet, it's important to understand the true definition, as well as the many associated benefits, Weaver advises. Processed foods enable us to have safe, nutritious and affordable food available yearround. Additionally, to feed the world, every method will need to be considered, including processing, to feed the masses and reduce waste.

Baltimore police enforce curfew with tear gas; streets once rocked by riots nearly empty

BALTIMORE (AP) — Baltimore streets previously rocked by riots were eerily quiet early Wednesday as residents obeyed an all-night curfew enforced by 3,000 police and National Guardsmen.

The curfew, which went into effect at 10 p.m.

Tuesday, got off to a not-so-promising start, however, as about 200 protesters initially ignored the warnings of police officers and the pleas of community activists to disperse.

Some threw water bottles or lay down on the

ground. A line of police behind riot shields hurled tear gas canisters and fired pepper balls at the crowd and slowly advanced forward to push it back. Demonstrators picked up the canisters and hurled them back at officers. But the crowd rapidly dispersed and was down to just a few dozen people within minutes.

The clash came after a day of high tension but

relative peace in Baltimore, which was rocked by looting and widespread arson Monday in the city's worst outbreak of rioting since 1968. Police, city leaders and many residents con-

demned the violence, and hundreds of volunteers showed up Tuesday to sweep the streets of glass and other debris.

Nepal earthquake death toll passes 5,000 as aid reaches area near epicenter

PASLANG, Nepal (AP) — Aid reached a hilly district near the epicenter of Nepal's earthquake for the first time Wednesday, four days after the quake struck and as the death toll from the disaster passed the 5,000 mark.

But it will still take time for the food and other supplies to reach survivors in remote communities who have been cut off by landslides, warned said Geoff Pinnock, a World Food Program emergencies officer.

"It doesn't happen overnight," said Pinnock from the village of Majuwa, 20 kilometers (16 miles) downhill from Gorkha town, a staging area for relief efforts to areas worst-hit by Saturday's magnitude-7.8 earthquake.

Nearby, five cargo trucks filled with rice, cooking oil and sugar stood on a grassy field fringed with banana and acacia trees beneath the soaring Himalayas, waiting for a helicopter carry the supplies to remote, quake-hit villages.

In a country overwhelmed by grief, Nepalese family mourns 18 lost in single house collapse

KATHMANDU, Nepal (AP) — Flanked by funeral pyres flickering in the darkness, Shankar Pradhan stood barefoot on the edge of Kathmandu's sacred Bagmati River, where the dead pulled daily from the city's ruins have been brought nonstop since a massive earthquake shook this impoverished mountain nation.

He doused his daughter's feet and lips in holy water three times. He knelt down and kissed the orange shroud she was wrapped in. And then helped by grieving relatives, he spread red ochre and marigolds over the corpse, encased it in a tomb of dry wood and set it ablaze.

The ancient Hindu cremation rite is meant to purify souls for the afterlife, and this was far from the only one for Pradhan and his extended family. When the quake crumpled his brother's four-story house into a cloud of dust Saturday, it left them with a total of 18 souls to prepare.

"I don't know why this happened. But I don't blame anyone. I don't blame the government, I don't blame the gods," he said, struggling to fight back tears. "You can't escape the rules of this life. None of us escape the fact that one day you'll have to leave it."

Pradhan's 21-year-old daughter was one of nearly 5,000 people who perished in the worst tremor this country has seen in more than 80 years. Even in a nation where death and destruction have touched a vast area stretching from the icy peaks of Mount Everest to remote villages that rescue workers have yet to reach, the grief visited upon Pradhan's

family is overwhelming.

Justice Kennedy offered clearer sign of vote in last gay marriage arguments at Supreme Court

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two years ago, Justice Anthony Kennedy left little doubt during Supreme Court arguments that a part of the federal anti-gay marriage law was doomed.

When the justices heard arguments Tuesday in a broader case about the right of same-sex couples to marry anywhere in the United States, the 78-year-old Kennedy's comments were less clear-cut and his potentially decisive vote less certain than it was two years ago.

He left people on both sides of the issue with

hopes and fears about the outcome in the landmark civil rights case, although Kennedy's track record as the author of the court's three earlier rulings in favor of gay rights probably gives same-sex marriage supporters less to fear.

Kennedy's role as the often-pivotal vote on the

court was rainforced

court was reinforced by the apparent deep divide between the court's liberal and conservative justices over whether the Constitution gives same-sex couples the right to marry. Those couples can do so now in 36 states and the District of Columbia, and the court is weighing whether gay and lesbian unions should be allowed in all 50 states.

The drama played out in the packed, grand courtroom with its 44foot ceiling, marble columns and mahogany bench. Kennedy's wife, as well as those of Chief Justice John Roberts and Justice Stephen Breyer watched the arguments along with many of the plaintiffs whose cases were before the court. Also in the crowd was Rives Miller Grogan, who briefly interrupted the proceedings after about 30 minutes with an anti-gay harangue that warned gay marriage supporters they would "burn in hell." Supreme Court police officers quickly removed Grogan from the courtroom.

Saudi king removes half-brother, names nephew as crown prince, elevates son in major reshuffle

RIYADH, Saudi Arabia (AP) — The Saudi king on Wednesday removed his half-brother from the post of crown prince, replacing him with his nephew, and elevated his son to the position of deputy crown prince in the most significant repositioning of power among members of the kingdom's royal family since King Salman assumed the throne in January.

The appointments, announced in a decree from the royal court, further thrust a new generation of Saudi princes into the line of succession and mapped out the future of the throne for potentially decades to come.

The post of crown prince secures Prince Mohammed bin Nayef, 55, as the most likely successor to the king.





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Texas asks appeals court to uphold voter photo ID law

NEW ORLEANS (AP)
— Supporters and opponents of a Texas law requiring specific forms of photo identification for voters faced close questioning in a federal appeals court Tuesday on whether the law was meant to discriminate against minorities and whether there are ways to remedy it.

The U.S. Justice Department and others oppose the law as an unconstitutional burden on minority voters. The state of Texas says the law was aimed at preventing fraud. The state is appealing a federal district judge's ruling last October that struck down the law.

Judge Catharina Haynes, one of three judges hearing the Texas case at the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, suggested in questioning that the matter should perhaps be sent back to the district court for further consideration. She noted that the Texas Legislature currently has several bills that that could broaden the number and types of ID voters could use to cast ballots.

Haynes also noted that a statewide election took place in Texas last year under the requirements of the new law, which was being enforced while the appeal was pending. "Shouldn't we look at the last election?" she asked Erin Flynn of the Justice Department.

Flynn argued otherwise. "Turnout number doesn't capture the deterrent and suppressive effect that a voter ID law has," she said.

The law requires vot-

ers to provide one of seven kinds of photo identification to cast a ballot. Four are available from the state Department of Public Safety — driver's licenses, personal IDs, concealed-handgun permits, and election identification certificates. Federally issued passports, citizenship certificates and military IDs also are acceptable.

Opponents said the old law required an ID with or without a photo — such as a voter registration card, a utility bill, a bank statement or a paystub that identified the voter and the voter's address. They said fraud was rare and actual incidents of voters showing up at a poll pretending to be someone else were virtually nonexistent. They also complained about the exclusion of some photo IDs, including federal or state employee IDs and college student IDs.

Haynes asked whether "a more nuanced" remedy than striking the whole law might be called for — for instance, allowing the use of a voter registration card, which does not contain a photo, but stopping short of going back to the old law's allowing of utility bills or bank statements.

Both sides stuck to their arguments, with Scott Keller of the Texas Solicitor General's Office arguing that the law does not discriminate. Lawyers for the Justice Department and other opponents of the law said the ruling of U.S. District Judge Nelva Gonzales Ramos was sound.

Tuesday's arguments

also focused on the intent of Texas legislators who passed the ID law. The law's opponents, and Ramos' opinion, noted Republican state

Rep. Todd Smith's statement during debate on the bill that it was "common sense" that those lacking the required IDs would most likely be mi-

nority voter

Another issue touched on in Tuesday's arguments: Whether fees involved in obtaining proper IDs constitute an unconstitutional "politax."

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

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



The bidding:

Pass Pass 5 NT Opening lead — jack of hearts.

Assume you're in seven spades and West leads the jack of hearts. Offhand it might seem that you need a successful club finesse to land the grand slam, but further study reveals that you have much better than a 50

Accordingly, you win the heart lead with the king and draw three

rounds of trumps, finding them

divided 3-2. You then cash the A-K

of diamonds, and when both opponents follow suit, your chances of making the grand slam rise to 100

You next play the A-Q of hearts, discarding the 10-9 of diamonds, and ruff a diamond, establishing dummy's eight as a trick. A club to the king allows you to discard your eight of clubs on the eight of diamonds, and you make the grand slam without risking a club finesse.

Note that in adopting this method of play, you do not at any point relinquish your chance of making the contract via a successful club finesse. If the diamonds turn out to be divided 4-1 when you cash the Λ -K, you still discard the 10-9 on the A-Q of hearts and fall back on the club

The applicable principle is a very common one. Whenever the outcome appears to depend on the favorable location of a particular card — in the present case, the queen of clubs declarer should look for an alternative line of play that reduces or eliminates the luck factor associated with

A different way of stating the same principle is to say that declarer should always try to find an approach that gives him two chances to make the contract instead of only one.
