## Quartet qualify for UIL state meet

Four Big Spring High School students will need to make arrangements to take their final exams early because they will be representing the school at the University Interscholastic League State Tournament.

Kacie Marvin, Amber Monks, Ethan Morlion and Alexess Sosa qualified for the state tournament by placing in the top three of their respective disciplines at the UIL regional tournament held recently on the Texas Tech campus.

For Morelion, this will be his third consecutive year at the state tournament.

"Placing third last year in Lincoln-Douglas Debate was good, but this year my goal is



to bring home two state championships," he said.

The junior was regional champion in Lincoln-Douglas Debate, as well as placing second in persuasive extemporaneous speaking.

"We are excited for Ethan," Coach Jennifer Adams said. "He is really clicking in debate and has the potential to bring home the gold."

Joining Morelion at State in a speech event will be Senior

Kacie Marvin, who placed third in poetry interpretation. This is the first time since 2007 that a BSHS student has qualified to the state meet in an interpretation event.

Debate team member Amber Monks took another path to the State Meet by placing second in ready writing, which is also coached by Adams. "Amber has strong written expression, she has a great shot at placing well," Adams stated.

Fifty-seven speech and debate students have qualified for state competition under the tutelage of coaches Jennifer and Clint Adams during their 15 years at BSHS. "We have been very lucky to coach at a school with excellent stu-

## Property recovered

\$15K in stolen items seized after arrest of local man

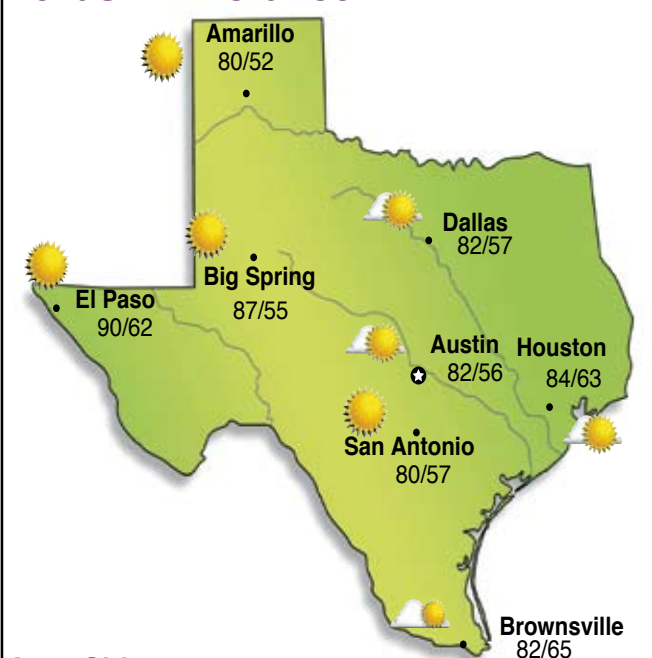

# 'Remembering Elbow' open house set for Saturday

In about a month, the bells of Forsan Elementary at Elbow will ring for the last time marking the end of an era for the farming community.

For more than 109 years, a school building has stood in the Elbow community, a presence of young faces, possibilities and a symbol of enlightenment. Next year, the

pre-kindergarten through fifth grade levels will be housed at the Forsan ISD's newly built elementary, a stone's throw away from the junior/high school campus.

Before the doors are shuttered on the red-brick building located on FM 818 among the fields and open skies, alumni, parents, grandparents and faculty current and past are invited to spend a few hours to reminisce and

say goodbye.

A community wide "Remembering Elbow Open House" is scheduled for Saturday from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. at Elbow Elementary School.

The committee has been requesting former students and employees to bring snapshots, class pictures, annuals, reports card and any memorabilia which will be on display at the open house. Several staff members and former

students will share their personal memories of their time at Elbow Elementary.

The first school to be built in Elbow — a farming community — was in 1906, according to information available on the FISSD web-site. By 1960, FISSD consolidated with Elbow schools. At this time, high school age students attended school at Forsan while elementary and junior high age students attended classes

in their own community at Elbow or Forsan.

By 1964, the information states, Elbow became the junior high school building for FISSD while elementary and secondary students attended classes in Forsan.

In 1966, the Elbow campus became the primary school for FISSD and continues today with the kindergarten and pre-kindergarten levels added later.

## News in brief

### Baltimore authorities' secrecy on probe of Gray's death fuels suspicion

BALTIMORE (AP) — Authorities' refusal to provide more than a few sketchy details about the Freddie Gray investigation is fueling suspicion and mistrust as a weekend of protest rallies looms.

The secrecy may be legally appropriate, but many in Baltimore were finding it hard to be patient Thursday when police revealed next to nothing about the criminal investigation they turned over to the state's attorney's office.

Nearly two weeks after Gray's death, the public still doesn't know much more than it did on Day One. The central question — what caused his fatal spinal cord injury while he was in police custody earlier this month — remains a mystery.

"The transparency is just not there," the Rev. Cortly "C.D." Witherspoon said after Police Commissioner Anthony Batts refused to answer any questions Thursday.

### May Day rallies for labor and immigrant rights broaden to address police brutality, race

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Activists who are marching for labor and im-

migrant rights in U.S. cities on Friday will broaden their message to direct attention toward police brutality as tensions simmer in communities across the nation.

The marches on May 1 have their roots in labor movements, which hold annual demonstrations in a myriad of countries calling for workers' rights. In recent years, marches in the United States got a boost from immigrants seeking authorization to live and work in the country legally.

Now, some of the activists in cities from Boston to Oakland, California, say they are also rallying in support of "Black Lives Matter" — the slogan of the growing movement in the wake of a series of high-profile deaths of black men as the result of a police encounter.

The move comes after unrest in Baltimore and protests in other cities over the death of Freddie Gray, who suffered severe spinal injuries at some point after he tried to run from police April 12.

### Nepal quake victims trek from remote mountain hamlets to pick up temporary shelters, aid

BALUA, Nepal (AP) — After roughing it five nights in the rain, the 60-year-old woman finally had a plastic sheet over her head.

Sukhmaya Tamang had walked about 12 miles (20 kilometers) in flip-

flops on mountain paths to get the emergency kit to help ward off the weather, and faced the same long journey back home.

She and hundreds of others — many elderly and all of them poor — arrived in recent days at this village to collect the emergency shelters after their

remote mountain homes shaken to a shambles by Saturday's magnitude 7.8 earthquake.

Tamang's cliffside hamlet in the Gorkha district can't be reached by vehicle, and Balua is the closest place to her home that even the toughest trucks and SUVs can get to.

# FFC invites area nurses to attend annual blessing of nurses' hands on May 6

All Big Spring and surrounding area nurses and others who provide healing care are invited to celebrate National Nurses Week 2015, which is observed May 6 through May 12, with the special tradition of the Blessing of Nurses' Hands.

This special event is to be held at 7 p.m. on May 6 in the auditorium of Family Faith Center, 810 East 11th Place (across from Big Spring High School). May 6 is designated as National Nurses Day while May 12 is National Parish Nurse Day.

May 12 is also the birthday of Florence Nightingale whose writings have helped advance nursing to the position it holds today.

Senior Pastors at Family Faith Center (FFC), Sam and Christina Segundo, will be hosting the sixth annual ceremony. The church motto is "Your Healthy Place To Be" and the church readily recognizes that prayer, nurses, and parish

nurses play an important part in the health of a faith-based community.

FFC includes the Parish Nurse Ministry as one of the assets available to the congregation. A Parish Nurse is a registered nurse who specializes in matters of health and healing in local fellowships.

FFC's Parish Nurse Ministry is known as "The Gate Called Beautiful." It is headed by certified parish nurse Les White, PhD APRN-BC. Dr. White received his certification in 2003 at Bellarmine University in Lexington, Ken.

The core concept of parish nursing is to help church members understand the relationship between their health and healing and their faith. Dr. White notes that prayer is an integral part of this and conducts a healing service every Sunday morning for those who are ill or injured as part of his health and healing Sunday school class.

Dr. White has completed all the training necessary to be certified as a Parish Nurse but explains

that you do not have to be certified to use the title Parish Nurse.

Any Registered Nurse may provide these services but would be expected to follow the scope of practice as outlined by the American Nurses Association, he said. In addition to Dr. White, FFC has several registered nurses who perform spiritual nursing care as well as licensed vocational nurses that serve as congregational nurses for the fellowship.

After the ceremony, B. Joyce Gumpton, the author of the medical mystery novel "Heart" will be available for autographs and pictures and to offer her congratulations and encouragement to those who participate in the areas of healing.

"Heart" is the first of an Aubrey Stewart series of novels set in the medical field and is a dream come true for Ms. Gumpton who "gives God thanks for making it all possible."

## Did You Ever Wonder: Judah's Loses Two

Sons Lev 38 suddenly interrupts our Joseph story by switching the focus back to what was happening to Jacob's other sons. Judah seems to have separated himself from the family, perhaps because of his part in selling Joseph to the Ishmaelites. We are not told if Jacob wanted to separate himself from them because of shame. Some scholars say the brothers blamed him, saying they considered him to be a leader of the family and if he had told them to return Joseph to Jacob, they would have.

We are told that at that time Joseph left Hebron and went east to the lowlands and camped near Adullam, a Canaanite city. He became friends or perhaps business associates with a man named Hirah. Judah married the daughter of a prominent Canaanite merchant, and she bore him three sons.

Remember that Canaanites were idolaters and indulged themselves in perverse sexual practices, and the mother is usually the main influence on the children's religious ideas. God had forbidden the Hebrews to intermarry with the Canaanites, lest they take up the religious and sexual practices of the Canaanites.

When his eldest son, Er was old enough to marry, Judah took a wife for him. She was described as a very beautiful woman. Possibly Er did not want her to become pregnant and ruin her beautiful and youthful figure. Therefore when they were intimate, "Er spilled his seed upon the ground." (Evidently this was a form of birth control of the time.)

Stop here and try to think from God's perspective. The reason God gave us sex was to procreate and fill the Earth. When Er chose

to follow his own will instead of God's will, "this was evil in God's eyes and God cause him to die." Gen 38:7

According to Hebrew custom, when a man dies without children, his brother was expected to marry his widow and produce a child who would carry the name of the dead brother. Tamar was married to the middle brother, Onan. But he knew that a child would not be considered his. If he produced a child to give his brother an heir, the child would receive the double portion inheritance of the firstborn, and his inheritance would be diminished greatly. So he spilled his seed on the ground. Because Onan followed his own will instead of God's will, God caused him to die also.

Do you see how these brothers each chose to do what pleased himself instead of following what he knew God desired? God's greatest desire is for us, His creation, to choose to love Him. He is ever so patient with us...up to a point. Only He knows when our time is up and we can no longer turn back to Him.

Judah realized the gravity of this. It was his responsibility to provide a husband for Tamar, but he wouldn't take a chance on losing his youngest son, too. He told Tamar that his youngest son was too young to marry, and he sent her back to her father's house. She was to remain a widow until the youngest son grew up.

Until such time that Judah called for her, she was to wear widow's weeds (black clothing), and because her two husbands had died, she would be shunned. People were superstitious in those times also!

# What is love?

Is it a feeling? Many people probably think that is what it is. But love is not a feeling. It is doing what is best for someone, having their well-being as my goal.

This is the love that Jesus said we are to have. Sometimes we talk about "tough love" meaning that we don't want to enable someone we care about to keep hurting themselves. And that can be tough.

But what about loving someone who hates me or someone that I may not really like?

In Matthew 5:44-48, Jesus said, *But I say to you, Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, so that you may be sons of your Father who is in heaven. For he makes his sun to rise on the evil and on the good, and sends rain on the just and on the unjust. For if you love those who love you, what reward do you have? Do not even the tax collectors do the same? And if you greet only your brothers, what more are you doing than others? Do not even the Gentiles do the same? You therefore must be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect (ESV).*

That is tough love right there.

If we think about it, though, this is how God loves us — all of us. In James 4:4, it is written, *You adulterous people! Do you not know that friendship with the world is enmity with God? Therefore whoever wishes to be a friend of the world makes himself an enemy of God.* When I read that, I am certainly glad that God loves His enemies because when I choose the world over Him, I have made myself His enemy. And everyone who is of the age to know right from wrong has made the same choice.

We all have chosen at some point to do what we wanted even if it was something God has told us not to do. That is sin, and Paul wrote that all have sinned (Romans 3:23). But God doesn't stop loving us when we sin. His love is not dependent on us. Romans 5:8, But God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us.

If we want to love like God loves, then we must show the love of God to others. That means we treat everyone the way that we want to be treated (Matthew 7:12; Luke 6:31). It means we ought to be kind and charitable, humble and forgiving, and concerned not only for a person's physical situation but concerned for their soul.

We can give people everything they need physically to live, but if we don't share with them what they need spiritually to live eternally, then do we truly love them?

You may have heard the illustration before: your neighbor's house is on fire during the night. Are you going to do all that you can to alert your neighbor and try to get him out of the house before it is too late? Absolutely!

I don't always love like God loves, but I want to. I need to love you because God loves you. You need to love others because God loves them. So let's tell everyone how much God loves them (John 3:16). Let's tell everyone what Jesus said to do to become His disciple (Matthew 28:18-20) and what Jesus said to do in order to be saved (Mark 16:15-16).

Let's tell others what the apostles and early disciples told people that they needed to do (Acts 2:38; 3:19; 4:12; 8:12,35-38; 16:31-34; 17:30-31; 22:16). Let us love like God loves. He does not want anyone to perish when this life is over (2 Peter 3:9), rather He wants all people to be saved and come to a knowledge of the truth (1 Timothy 2:4). That truly is love!

**1. Three hearts.** It would be wrong to pass two spades, since partner is showing a strong hand (upward of 17 points, including distribution) with greater length in hearts than spades. For example, partner might have one of these hands to justify his bidding:  
♠AJ63♥AQJ95♦10♣AQ2  
♠AJ874♥AKJ1053♦9♣6  
♠AJ72♥AQ9854♦KQ♣7  
Certainly you'd want to be in four hearts on the first and third hands, and in four hearts or four spades on

the second, proving that an excessively cautious pass of two spades could be very costly.  
**2. Three notrump.** True, you have no heart stopper, but that shouldn't prevent you from bidding what ought to be the right contract. The odds are very good that partner has at least one heart stopper, so undertaking a game in notrump is clearly indicated. The temptation to bid three clubs should be rejected, as virtually all experienced players would treat three clubs in this sequence as not forcing. They would reserve that bid for hands such as ♠Q73♥8♦1065♣K98742, where you are likely to make three clubs, but not three notrump.

**3. Partner probably has** five spades and six clubs, and either two red singletons or a doubleton in one of the red suits. Partner might have five spades and seven clubs, but that is less likely.

The key lies in partner's three-spade bid. He can't be rebidding a four-card suit, so he must have five spades. He must also have more clubs than spades because, if he had equal length in the two suits, he would have bid the higher-ranking suit first. Therefore, partner must have at least 11 black cards, five of which are spades, for all three of his bids to make sense.

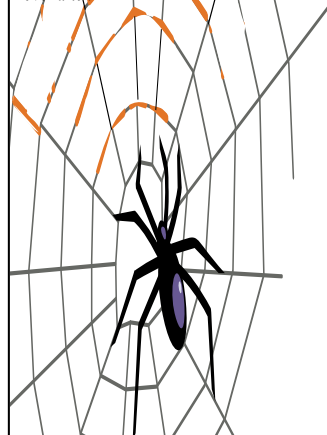

This Date In History

Today is Friday, May 1, the 121st day of 2015. There are 244 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On May 1, 1915, during World War I, a German submarine torpedoed and severely damaged the SS Gulflight, an American tanker near Britain's Scilly Isles, even though the United States was still neutral in the conflict; the incident occurred the same day that the RMS Lusitania set sail from New York, headed for Liverpool, England (it was torpedoed and sunk by Germany off the coast of Ireland six days later).

On this date:

In 1898, Commodore George Dewey gave the command, "You may fire when you are ready, Gridley," as an American naval force destroyed a Spanish squadron in Manila Bay during the Spanish-American War.

In 1911, the song "I Want a Girl (Just Like the Girl That Married Dear Old Dad)," by Harry Von Tilzer and Will Dillon, was first published.

In 1931, New York's 102-story Empire State Building was dedicated. Singer Kate Smith made her debut on CBS Radio on her 24th birthday.

In 1945, a day after Adolf Hitler took his own life, Admiral Karl Doenitz effectively became sole leader of the Third Reich with the suicide of Hitler's propaganda minister, Josef Goebbels.

In 1960, the Soviet Union shot down an American U-2 reconnaissance plane over Sverdlovsk and captured its pilot, Francis Gary Powers.

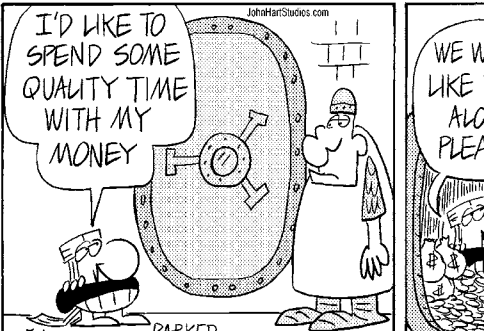
In 1963, James W. Whittaker became the first American to conquer Mount Everest as he and Sherpa guide Nawang Gombu reached the summit.

In 1965, Vice President Hubert Humphrey, in a speech in Williamsburg, Virginia, said: "There are not enough jails, not enough policemen, not enough courts to enforce a law not supported by the people." Bandleader Spike Jones, 53, known for his raucous renditions of popular songs, died in Beverly Hills, California.

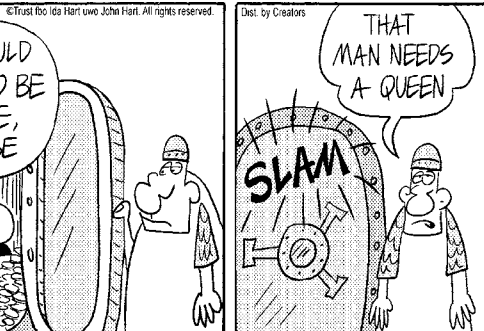
In 1975, Hank Aaron of the Milwaukee Brewers broke baseball's all-time RBI record previously held by Babe Ruth during a game against the Detroit Tigers (Milwaukee won, 17-3).

In 1990, in a case that drew much notoriety, Gregory Smart was shot to death in his Derry, New Hampshire, home by Billy Flynn, the teenage lover of Smart's wife, Pamela. (Flynn was paroled this year; Pamela Smart is serving a life sentence for being an accomplice to first-degree murder.)

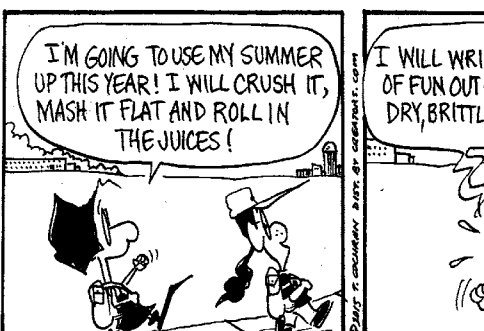
