Hawks claim WJCAC title with wins

The Howard College men's baseball team went into Saturday's regular-season finale against Odessa College needing two wins to secure the WJCAC conference championship. They got both easily.

The Hawks, who split with OC on Friday, nailed down the conference championship by pounding out back-to-back wins of 24-10 and 13-0 in Odessa. As a

team, HC scored into double figures in three of their four games with the Wranglers.

With the win, the Hawks will advance to the Region V Tournament on May 8 as the No. 1 seed.

Lady Steers take 2nd at I-4A meet

LUBBOCK – The Big Spring High School Lady Steers highlighted a stellar showing by BS athletes at the Region I-4A Track and Field Championships on Saturday at the Fuller Track Complex in Lubbock. The BSHS girls racked up wins in both the 4x200- and 4x400meter relays and raced to a second-place finish in the team standings.

The BSHS boys finished seventh in their division, despite an injury to Ryan Lopez that hampered the team.

The Lady Steers' dominated the relay events. Kaitlyn Mathews, Rachel McCalister, Erin Pollard and Autumn Minter combined for a time of 1:44.08 en route to edging Andrews for the 4x200meter title. Mathews, Pollard, Samantha Solis and Minter beat Bushland in the 1,600-meter relay race, winning with a time of 4:04.11.

Minter also qualified for the state meet in the 100-meter dash. She finished second in the race with a time of 12.30 seconds.

Carly Roberts secured a berth in the state meet on Friday by placing second in the girls' discus.

The Steers will also be well represented at the state meet, which begins on May 14 in Austin. Big Spring's 4x400-meter team won the regional title with a time of 3:22.86.

Ian Gonzales also qualified individually with a second-place run in the boys' 400-meter race.







six notrump on the bidding shown. South won the heart lead with the ace, cashed three more hearts, crossed to the jack of spades and led a diamond to the king, losing to West's ace. Declarer later took a winning club finesse to make the slam for a score of 990 points.

At the second table, where Lazard sat West, the bidding went: West South North East Pass 1 🖤 2 🕈 Pass

3 NT Pass 6 NT At this table, West also led a heart. Declarer put up dummy's ace, came to his hand with a heart and returned to dummy with a spade. He then led a diamond to the king, but Lazard, smooth as silk, followed with the deuce!

With 11 sure tricks in sight and the ace of diamonds apparently situated on his right, declarer saw no reason to risk a club finesse for his 12th trick.

So he played the ace and another spade and then led another diamond toward his hand. Lazard took the queen with the ace and returned a diamond to East's jack, and South went down one for a combined loss of 1,040 points on the deal.






