Shelter suspends organizations' privileges

Big Spring Police Department officials announced they are temporarily suspending relocation privileges for two local organizations at the city's animal shelter.

Yellow Rose Rescue and Relocation Rescue have had their privileges suspended until the organizations are

able to update records concerning previous relocations, a BSPD news release stated.

"The issue is being addressed with the Big Spring Police Department and the rescue organizations involved," the news release stated.

"An open dialogue between the police Department and rescue organizations is ongoing and all parties involved

hope to have the issue resolved within a couple of days."

The city's animal shelter is licensed by the state of Texas, which makes the shelter subject to an audit at any time, making the paperwork issue even more important, officials said.

"It is imperative that our records are complete and accurate in regards to when the

police department came into possession of the animal to the time it was adopted out either from the police department or the rescue organization," the release stated.

Officials expressed confidence the matter would soon be resolved.

"We hope to resolve this issue as soon as possible, as the rescue organizations serve an extremely important role

within the community," the release stated.

"The City of Big Spring and the police department work extremely hard on finding homes for all of our shelter animals whether it be through rescue organizations, or adoptions throughout the community."

No other organizations are affected by this action, officials said.

Survey: Disabled Americans 'striving to work'

CONCORD, N.H. — More than two-thirds of American adults with disabilities are "striving to work," according to a national employment survey being released just before the landmark legislation protecting their rights turns 25.

In contrast to census data on how many people with disabilities hold jobs, the survey being released Wednesday by the Kessler Foundation goes further by exploring the experience of finding and keeping a job. It also provides a snapshot of not just the obstacles people with disabilities face but how often they overcome them.

"There has been some work

in previous surveys that looked at barriers but never asking the question, have they overcome the barriers? There was always this sense of doom and gloom," said Andrew Houtenville, director of research at the University of New Hampshire Institute of Disability. The UNH Survey Center conducted the survey for the Kessler Foundation, a West Orange, New Jersey-based nonprofit that funds research and initiatives aimed at improving the lives of people with neurological disabilities.

Among the 3,000 people interviewed, fewer than 6 percent had never worked. Just under 43 percent were currently working, 9 percent were looking for work and 17

percent had worked since the onset of their disability.

Researchers combine the last three figures into the category of "striving to work," and point to other findings they said demonstrate that people with disabilities want to be productive members of the workforce. Those who are currently employed work an average of 35.5 hours per week, more than half work more than 40 hours per week and more than 40 percent said they want to work more hours.

"It's a way of describing how active people with disabilities are in the labor market. It's not just about sitting back and taking benefits," Houtenville said.

The most oft-cited obstacles

to gaining employment were a lack of education or training, employers who assumed applicants couldn't do the job and a lack of transportation. But 42 percent of those who mentioned transportation said they overcame that obstacle. Once on the job, the top three barriers were getting less pay than others in similar jobs, difficult attitudes from supervisors and difficult attitudes from co-workers. More than half reported overcoming difficulties with co-workers, however.

Laurie McCray, whose 25-year-old son has Down syndrome and works four part-time jobs, credits his success to her unrelenting efforts to make him part of his community from an early age.

Of course the timeline becomes changed again because of the trio's meddling causing McFly and Brown to jump back to the mid-1950s to

attempt to mitigate the changes.

Once known as the Broadway of America and now just forgotten stretches of roads, the Bankhead Highway was the first intercontinental, all weather highway built at the turn of the last century during a movement that would transformed the country's transportation system.

Big Spring falls along the route of the original Bankhead Highway. Dan L. Smith, author of "Texas Highway No. 1, The Bankhead Highway in Texas," believes the highway came down what is now Midway Road through Big Spring along what is now called Third Street and exited the town through Fourth Street.

The first intercontinental highway was the Lincoln Highway which stretched from New York to San Francisco through the middle of America, Smith said, but became impassible during parts of the year because of heavy snow and inclement weather.

The southern route across the country which dealt with less severe weather conditions was named after John Hollis Bankhead, a U.S. Senator from Alabama and a powerful southern politician, Smith said.

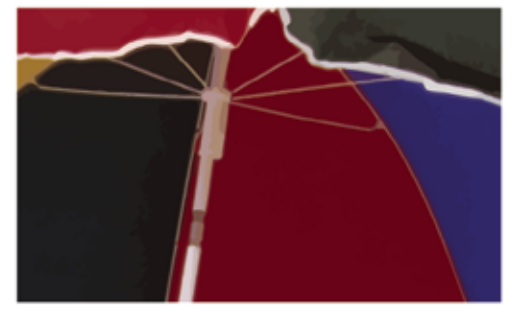

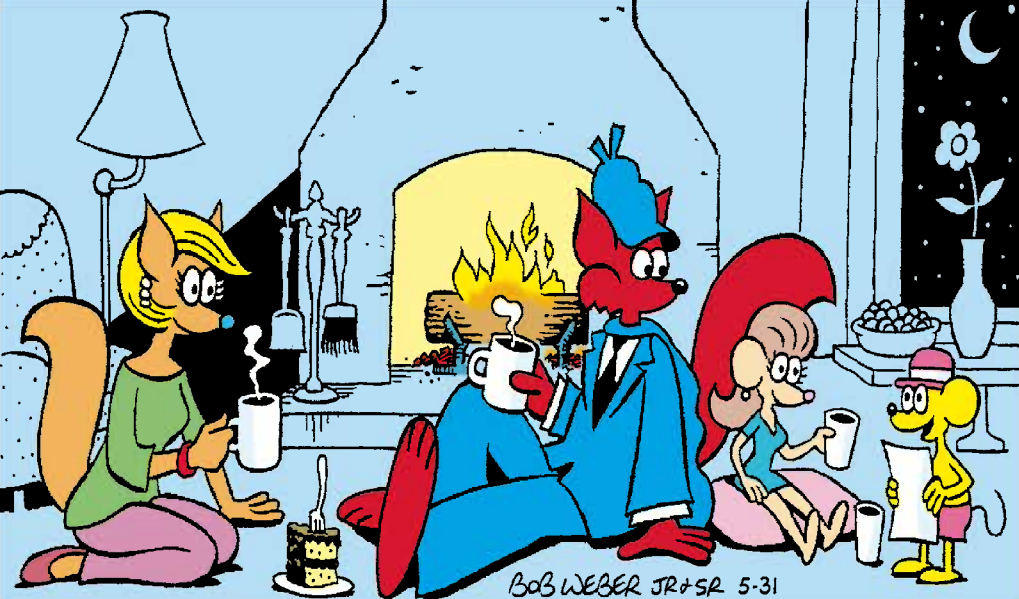

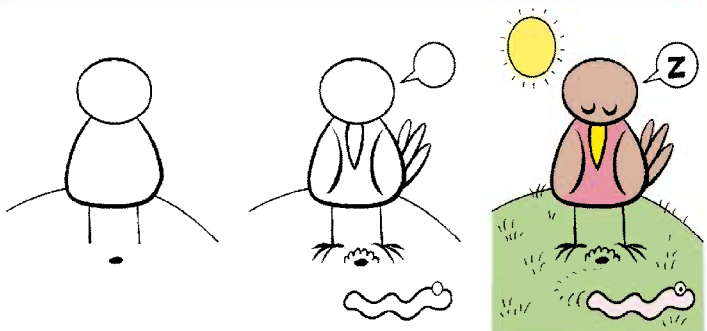

Bird Poop:

Mississippi kite take flight again with a little TLC

The Mississippi kite's name is derived from the area of the United States where it was first documented, and its soaring abilities. In August or September, the specie begins its long journey south in order to find a fall and winter food source.

Its arrival in May is no surprise. Especially with recent rains, its diet of insects is assured. To see its sleek silhouette plummet through the skies is to know its summer stay has begun.

From Colorado City, the game warden called regarding a casualty. Alerted to "a hawk that could not fly," David Hopkins quickly realized dried blood on one wing was an indication of an injury that had grounded the sleek gray raptor.

Before he began the drive to Big Spring, I suggested he consult with Kyle O'Haver, manager of Lake Colorado City State Park. Experienced in bird rehabilitation, Kyle could determine if the Mississippi kite's injury was severe enough for euthanasia.

Their meeting prompted another call. Not having found an obvious break, Kyle felt the kite was a prime candidate for rehab.

After removing the kite from its carrier, I extended its injured wing. Although there was dried blood about mid way from the end, it was questionable whether or not it had been shot.

A quick feel of the flesh surrounding its breastbone indicated it had good body fat. While thinking it was rather lethargic to

appear so healthy, a movement within the feathers on its dark gray wings alerted me to another serious problem.

Thanking the officer for his delivery and promising to call regarding the results, I rushed back inside the house and shouted for Art to come and help me. Once inside our garage we could both see the worrisome external parasites that darted in and out of its plumage.

Each flat-bodied, wingless louse was capable of biting or sucking. In great numbers, lice could withdraw the sustenance that supports the life or health of a living being.

Not having said anything about the insects that had infested the feathers was an indication that the game warden, and manager, had spent all of their concentration on the possible wing injury.

Normally, birds eliminate pests by preening. Due to injuries or infections, they often neglect this necessary chore.

Keeping a remedy on hand for just such an occasion prompted us to apply it promptly. Since lice scurry quickly in and out of the feathers and are on "a constant go," they would encounter a rapid demise. Our advantage in seeing the pests was due to years of experience in watching for any extraneous movements while examining birds.

My next challenge was feeding the kite. Holding the bird with my left hand, I used my right hand to grasp a hemostat that would enable me to pick up a cricket and present it to the bird. As usual, in captivity, the kite refused to eat.

Its resistance had to be met with persistence. Also, the side of the mouth that it preferred was important. This bird was right-sided.

Defensively, the kite would often open its mouth as if to bite me. Slipping the cricket inside was critical. The first taste of the insect led to its acceptance of another one.

If ever one's patience was tried, this was it. With each feeding, the raptor became a little more cooperative. The next day, the bird actually bit at the incoming food. Soon, it willingly accepted twenty or more insects in one feeding.

Since it was delivered on a Saturday, we would have to wait until Monday for an x-ray. When I left the kite at Highland Animal Hospital, I penned a note saying the left wing felt different from the right. Was there a break?

With Scott Burt's call regarding the kite came optimism. "If ever there were a good break, this one is it."


On the outer wing, between the elbow and the wrist, are two bones. One is the ulna. Parallel to it is the radius. Only partially across it was a crack. With the ulna, a larger bone, keeping the smaller bone in place, Scott felt it would calcify and mend on its own.

The next day, the Mississippi kite was delivered to Gail Barnes at South Plains in Lubbock. As she took it in hand, we had one final, appreciative glance. Its colorful red eyes were accented with dark eye patches. Its light gray head, and softer, darker gray body were quite a contrast to its bold, charcoal-colored wing parts and tail.

Eight days later, Gail called. To those of us who volunteer to be a part of bird rehabilitation came welcome news. "It's flying!"

Big seventh inning rally propels Astros over O's

HOUSTON (AP) — The Houston Astros have scored so many runs in the last three innings this season that their late-game magic has almost become routine.

They did it again Monday night when Evan Gattis drove in two runs in a four-run seventh inning and the Astros rallied for a 5-2 victory over the Baltimore Orioles.

They have scored a major league-leading 94 runs in the seventh inning or later this season, and more than 50 per-

cent of their runs have come after the fifth inning.

"As the game goes along, for whatever reason, our at-bats get better and better," manager A.J. Hinch said. "We punched out early in the game (Monday) and then didn't late. I wish I had the answers because I'd play that answer earlier in the game."

They trailed by one entering the seventh before a lead-off single by Chris Carter knocked starter Ubaldo Jimenez out of the game. He was

replaced by Brad Brach (3-1), who walked Luis Valbuena after a single by pinch-hitter Hank Conger loaded the bases.

George Springer singled to tie it up with one out before Jose Altuve's sacrifice fly put Houston on top. Gattis drove in two more to make it 5-2.

"I just think that this is a very resilient team and the last six to nine (innings) is always a good spot for us and I think that's a good sign of things to come," Springer

said.

Baltimore manager Buck Showalter isn't sure why Brach struggled Monday night.

"He just couldn't seem to get himself back in sync," Showalter said. "Got into a little rut there and couldn't make an adjustment. Something we thought he had gotten over."

Will Harris (2-0) pitched 1 2/3 scoreless innings for the win and Luke Gregerson struck out two in a perfect ninth for his 14th save.

Valbuena hit his 11th homer in the fifth inning to give the Astros their first run.

Chris Davis and Ryan Flaherty drove in a run apiece for the Orioles, who were playing outside of the Eastern time zone for the first time this season.

Houston starter Brett Oberholtzer was activated from his second stint on the disabled list with a blister on his left index finger before the game to make his second start of the season.

Fielder, Hamilton power Rangers' resurgence

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — With Prince Fielder leading the league in hitting and former MVP Josh Hamilton already having an impact in his Texas reunion, the Rangers have a winning record for the first time in nearly a year.

The Rangers capped a magnificent month with Hamilton's game-ending two-run, two-out double as a pinch-hitter after starting May with a loss for a 7-15 record that was the worst in the American League.

"Felt like in April, we had water in the gas tank," first-year manager Jeff Banister said. "Stopped the car, it kept running ... when you went to start it and push on the gas it (sputtered). We had to get a tuneup, and we had some guys that really have found that rhythm."

At 26-25 to open June, the Rangers are above .500 for

the first time since being 31-30 last June 6 in a season that ended with an AL-worst 95 losses.

Credit the offense for the turnaround from April, along with some shuffling in the bullpen.

Texas hit a majors-worst .210 the first month, and scored only 75 runs.

The Rangers scored more than twice as many runs in May, when .359 hitter Fielder started going deep again (nine homers after only one before that), Shin-Soo Choo batted .295 for the month (after .096 to start the season), rookie Delino DeShields had an AL-high 10 stolen bases and Hamilton rejoined the team a week ago.

"Talent-wise, we have such amazing guys, and we're just going to get better," shortstop Elvis Andrus said. "We have to maintain

what we've got right now, and just build on it."

The Rangers, with Monday off to start June after only one off day in May, have won 19 of their last 29 games and four series in a row. They took three of four games from Boston over the weekend for their first series win at home.

Hamilton, who homered twice Saturday and didn't start Sunday for the first time in his seven games since getting back, delivered the game-winner in a 4-3 win to wrap up his first home series for Texas since 2012.

"You never know what can happen, and that's what Ranger baseball is all about," Hamilton said on the field postgame, after he and Fox Sports Southwest field reporter Emily Jones were doused by the contents of two water coolers.

In the clubhouse a few minutes later, Hamilton said he was reminded of "some good times for the Rangers."

Hamilton was the 2010 AL MVP, a five-time All-Star and part of their only two World Series appearances with Texas from 2008-12 before leaving in free agency to the AL West rival Los Angeles Angels. He was traded back to the Rangers on April 27, four weeks before his season debut.

"Whether or not it's coming back to a place of comfort where he's had success, he looks more sure of himself," Red Sox manager John Farrell said before Sunday's game. "I don't know that I saw the same type of swings at any time that he was elsewhere. ... He looks to be playing with

Aggies win regional by beating California 3-1

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — Texas A&M advanced to its first NCAA tournament super regional in four years after defeating California 3-1 in a regional final on Monday night.

Starting pitcher Matt Kent allowed a lone Golden Bears run over seven innings on two days rest after also throwing seven innings on Friday in the Aggies' 5-0 opening-round victory over Texas Southern.

A&M (49-12) scored its first two runs on sacrifice flies by Mike Barash in the second inning and Blake Allemand in the seventh. That was all they'd need against Cal (36-21), in its first NCAA tournament since 2011. The Aggies added a run in the eighth on an RBI single by Hunter Melton.

A&M reliever Kyle Simonds closed out the game with two hitless innings.

TCU beats NC State 9-8 in 10-inning regional clincher

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Pinch-hitter Elliott Barzilli had an RBI single in the bottom of the 10th inning after TCU rallied from a late seven-run deficit in a 9-8 win over North Carolina State on Monday night to advance to the NCAA super regionals.

Evan Williams led off the 10th for TCU (47-12) with a pinch-hit single, advanced on an errant pickoff attempt by Curt Britt (3-1) and Jeremie Fagnan's sacrifice bunt before Barzilli's clean grounder through the right side of the infield.

N.C. State (36-23) had an 8-1 lead in the eighth after Jake Fincher had a two-run single off TCU closer Riley Ferrell, a likely high pick in next week's amateur baseball draft, and two more runs scored on wild pitches by reliever Preston Guillory.

TCU scored six unearned runs in the bottom half, including runs on a bases-loaded walk, a balk and a passed ball, after second baseman Ryne Willard's error to start the eighth.

Derek Odell led off the TCU ninth with a single, advanced on a sac fly and a balk before coming home a passed ball on a strikeout.

Brian Trieglaff (3-0), the fifth TCU pitcher, retired all six batters.

The Horned Frogs, who went to the College World Series last year, are in the super regionals for the fifth time in seven seasons, and be at home for the second year in a row. They play Texas A&M next weekend.

VCU takes Dallas regional with 3-1 win

DALLAS (AP) — Virginia Commonwealth's Sean Thompson and Matt Lees held host Dallas Baptist to four hits in a 3-1 victory to take the Dallas regional championship on Monday.

VCU (39-23) advanced to a super regional against Miami.

The Rams won three of four regional games, allowing only six runs.

Lees earned his third save, pitching 3 1/3 innings after relieving Thompson (6-3) in the sixth.

Joseph Shaw (10-5) lost to VCU for the second time in the tournament. He left in the second inning after forcing in a run by hitting James Bunn with a pitch and giving up another when Cody Acker grounded out.

Jimmy Kerrigan led off the sixth with a double, stole third base and scored on another groundout by Acker.

Adrian Peterson returns to Minnesota Vikings

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Adrian Peterson is coming back to the Minnesota Vikings, telling The Associated Press that he will participate in the team's voluntary practice on Tuesday and still has love for his team after nine months away.

Peterson sent an e-mail to the AP early Tuesday morning saying he's excited to put on a uniform again after missing the final 15 games of last season while addressing child abuse charges in Texas. He also skipped the team's voluntary practices last week while openly lamenting the fact that the final three years of his contract are not guaranteed.

"I've been away from the game for

an entire season," Peterson wrote to the AP. "I wanted the chance to be around the players and coaches, the guys that really matter to me."

After skipping the three practices last week, Peterson tweeted that he was looking for more long-term security on a contract that has three years and roughly \$45 million left on it, none of which is guaranteed. He told the AP that a family commitment caused him to miss the workouts, but also said "it's normal procedure for any player in my position to want to secure his future."

Peterson's agent, Ben Dogra, told The Associated Press they have received no assurances from the Vi-

kings that changes to his contract are on the table.

The relationship between the team and its franchise player has been tense dating back to September, when the child abuse allegations first surfaced. He spent much of the season on the commissioner's exempt list while his case unfolded and he was angered by a perceived lack of support from some members of the organization, namely COO Kevin Warren.

Suddenly, Peterson says he's ready to put all of that behind him.

"I understand this is a business. Clearly there were a lot of emotions

Opening lead — king of diamonds.
It is a basic principle of declarer play that, if a contract can be made only when the opponents' cards are divided in a certain way, you assume that that distribution exists.
Consider today's deal, where declarer made a slam by applying this principle. He won the diamond lead with the ace and played the A-K of trumps, learning that he had to lose a trump trick to West.
The slam now looked hopeless,

since even a 3-2 spade break would not allow declarer to discard both of his remaining diamonds before West ruffed and cashed the setting trick in diamonds.

But South thought the matter over carefully — trying to visualize hands East-West might have that would allow him to make the slam — and found the right answer.

He led a spade to the king, East following with the nine, and continued with a spade toward dummy. Then, after West followed low, South finessed the eight! When East showed out, the slam was in the bag. Declarer played the A-Q-5, discarding both diamonds, and so made the contract.

Observe that it would not have helped West to play the ten on the second spade lead. South would have won, led a club to the ace and then a spade to the eight to achieve the same result.

South's only chance, after West turned up with a trump trick, was to hope West started with four spades and that East's singleton was the nine, ten or jack. Only this distribution would allow declarer to dispose of both of his diamonds before West could ruff in, so South had no choice but to assume that it existed.

Tomorrow: A tough nut to crack.

This Date In History

Today is Tuesday, June 2, the 153rd day of 2015. There are 212 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On June 2, 1995, a U.S. Air Force F-16C was shot down by a Bosnian Serb surface-to-air missile while on a NATO air patrol in northern Bosnia; the pilot, Capt. Scott F. O'Grady, was rescued by U.S. Marines six days later.

On this date:

In 1863, during the Civil War, Union Maj. Gen. William T. Sherman wrote a letter to his wife, Ellen, in which he commented, "Vox populi, vox humbug" (The voice of the people is the voice of humbug).

In 1886, President Grover Cleveland, 49, married Frances Folsom, 21, in the Blue Room of the White House. (To date, Cleveland is the only president to marry in the executive mansion.)

In 1897, Mark Twain, 61, was quoted by the New York Journal as saying from London that "the report of my death was an exaggeration."

In 1924, Congress passed a measure that was then signed by President Calvin Coolidge guaranteeing full American citizenship for all Native Americans born within U.S. territorial limits.

In 1941, baseball's "Iron Horse," Lou Gehrig, died in New York of a degenerative disease, amyotrophic lateral sclerosis; he was 37.

In 1953, the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II took place in London's Westminster Abbey, 16 months after the death of her father, King George VI.

In 1966, the U.S. space probe Surveyor 1 landed on the moon and began transmitting detailed photographs of the lunar surface.

In 1975, Vice President Nelson Rockefeller said his commission had found no widespread pattern of illegal activities at the Central Intelligence Agency.

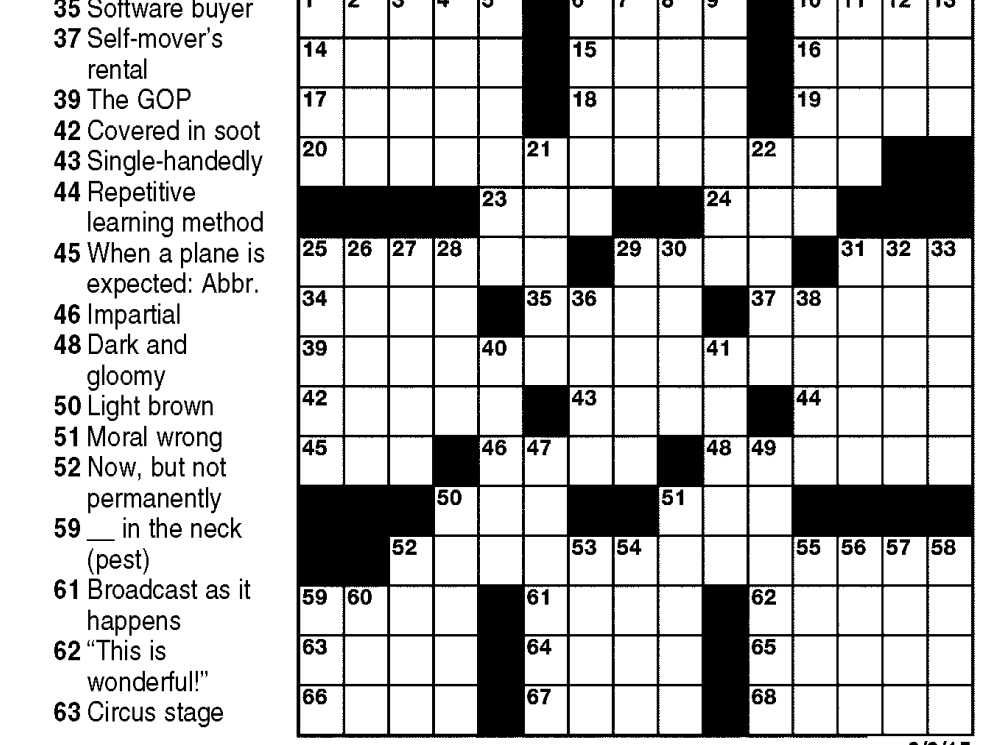
In 1983, half of the 46 people aboard an Air Canada DC-9 were killed after fire broke out on board, forcing the jetliner to make an emergency landing at Cincinnati/Northern Kentucky International Airport.

involved, but I will only be better from the situation," Peterson wrote. "I have a role to play and the Vikings have one as well. It's time to move forward and put my energy and focus on preparing for the season."

Peterson pleaded guilty to a misdemeanor for striking his 4-year-old son with a wooden switch while disciplining him, and his agents initially pushed for a trade once he was reinstated from his suspension. The Vikings maintained all along they had no plans to trade the former NFL MVP, believing that his pres-

ence could help turn a team that finished 7-9 last year into a playoff contender.

Once the draft came and went last month without a deal, the focus shifted toward his contract.

The 30-year-old Peterson will have his \$12.75 million salary for 2015 guaranteed in Week 1, but all bets are off after that.

The Vikings declined to comment on Peterson's decision to return to the team.

"I have an agent who handles any contractual questions or business-related questions, but it's normal procedure for any player in my position to want to secure his future," Peterson wrote in his email.
