Big Spring teen dies in accident

A 16-year-old Big Spring High School student was killed Sunday night on North Highway 87 after the vehicle he was traveling in collided with an 18-wheeler, according to multiple reports.

Dylan Lance died at Scenic Mountain Medical Center Sunday evening from injuries sustained in the accident, according to family members.

As of this morning, Department of Public Safety officers were not releasing any information, saying the accident was still under investigation.

According to Big Spring Fire Department records, the accident call was received at 5:45 p.m. Sunday.

Family gives up fight for Medal of Honor Marine to posthumously receive Navy Cross instead

SAN DIEGO — The Navy will posthumously award a Navy Cross to a Marine killed in Iraq — after years of appeals by his family asking the Pentagon to approve the Marine Corps' nomination for the Medal of Honor, the nation's highest award for military heroism.

The family of Sgt. Rafael Peralta accepted the nation's second-highest award at a ceremony Monday at Camp Pendleton, north of San Diego.

Peralta's younger brother, Ricardo, has said his mother has grown tired by the fight, though she still believes her late son deserves to be honored with the nation's highest award for covering a grenade on Nov. 15, 2004, in Fallujah, shielding his troops from the blast.

The Defense Department has ruled that Peralta was not

conscious when he smothered the grenade with his body.

California Republican Rep. Duncan Hunter, a Marine veteran who served in Iraq, led the fight in Congress for Peralta's actions to be recognized with the Medal of Honor.

"In my mind, Peralta should be a Medal of Honor recipient, but the Navy Cross is also a major valor award, and even though the fight to upgrade the award is sure to continue when the time is right, it's great to see the Peralta family

finally accepting the award," Hunter said. "The distinction between the awards doesn't change the fact that there are Marines alive today who say, without condition, that Rafael Peralta saved their lives."

The Marine Corps nominated Peralta for the Medal of Honor posthumously, and it was approved by the Navy Department.

Then-Defense Secretary Robert Gates in 2008 said the evidence was inconclusive and awarded him the Navy

Cross.

The Navy and members of Congress asked the Pentagon to reconsider after new evidence surfaced, but the next two defense secretaries said it still did not meet the standard of proof required for a Medal of Honor.

Secretary of the Navy Ray Mabus will present the Navy Cross to the family.

The award's citation reads: "While attempting to maneuver out of the line of fire, Sgt. Peralta was shot and fell mortally wounded. After the initial exchange of gunfire, the insurgents broke contact, throwing a fragmentation grenade as they fled the building. The grenade came to rest near Sgt. Peralta's head. Without hesitation and with complete disregard for his own personal safety, Sgt. Peralta reached out and pulled the grenade to his body, absorbing the brunt of the blast and shielding fellow Marines only feet away."

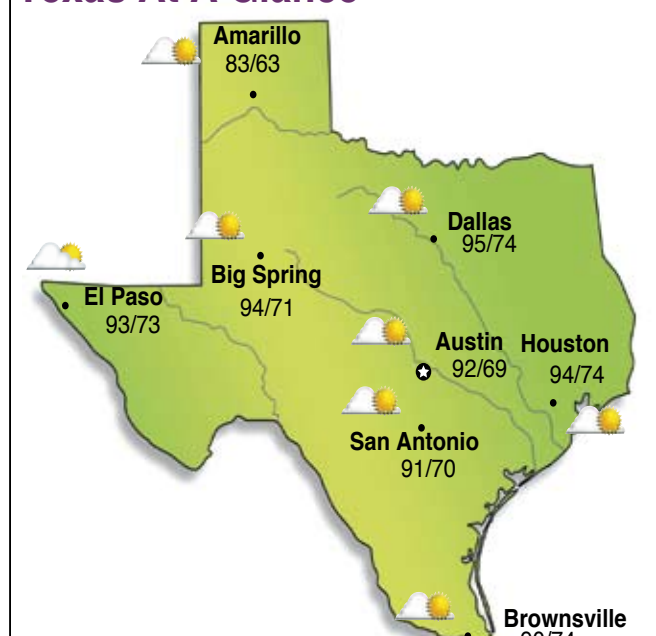

A Big Spring Police Department news release stated Tiodoro Diaz, 47, died from injuries sustained in the accident.

"The preliminary investigation indicates Diaz had arrived at The Bar and had parked his truck in a parking lot on

the south side of Fourth Street," the release stated. "Diaz was then walking across Fourth Street to The Bar when he was struck by the vehicle.

Howard County Justice of the Peace Connie Shaw responded to the scene and pronounced Diaz dead, the report added.

Investigation revealed the vehicle involved in the incident, believed

to be a silver passenger car, departed the area prior to the officers' arrival.

"The Big Spring Police Department Criminal Investigations Division has received information and is currently following up on leads in an attempt to locate the vehicle and driver involved," the news release stated. "If you have any informa-

Obama huddles on G-7 sidelines over pressing Mideast problems, pushes Russia sanctions

ELMAU, Germany (AP) — President Barack Obama was huddling with allies Monday on the sidelines of an international summit to address pressing Mideast problems while trying to convince European leaders not to waver on sanctions against Russia in the face of fresh violence in Ukraine.

Obama came to the final day of the Group of Seven summit under the strain of an intimidating list of global pressures and little signs of movement to address them among the world's largest industrial democracies. Climate change and terrorism topped the official agenda, but leaders also grappled with Russia's aggressive moves on Ukraine, an upcoming nuclear deadline with Iran, tenuous trade pact politics and an impasse over Greece's international bailout.

Obama met privately with French President Francois Hollande, a sometimes skeptical partner in the talks with Iran over its nuclear weapons program. Obama also planned to consult with Iraqi Prime Minister Haider al-Abadi as he struggles against an increasing threat from Islamic State militants. Abadi has called for more help from the U.S. and its partners to confront the militants. He also was scheduled to address G-7 leaders during a closed session focused on terrorism.

Obama spokesman Josh Earnest said the president wants to look for "more efficient ways that we can offer assistance to Iraqi security forces" and he expects that will be part of the discussion among the G-7, which also includes Britain, France, Germany, Italy, Canada and Japan.

Meeting on Sunday with British Prime Minister David Cameron, Obama said he wanted to address the fight against the Islamic State in Iraq and Syria and "assess what's working, what's not, and how we can continue to make progress there in dismantling the infrastructure that ISIL has built."

Authorities probing how inmates pulled off 'Shawshank Redemption'-style escape in NY

DANNEMORA, N.Y. (AP) — Two murderers who escaped from a prison by cutting through steel walls and pipes remain on the loose as authorities investigate how the inmates obtained the power tools used in the "Shawshank Redemption"-style breakout.

Gov. Andrew Cuomo said the escape over the weekend was a "sophisticated plan" and announced a \$100,000 reward for information leading to men's capture.

David Sweat, 34, was serving a sentence of life without parole for the 2002 killing of a sheriff's deputy. Richard Matt, 48, had been sentenced to 25 years to life for kidnapping, killing and dismembering his former boss in 1997.

"These are killers. They are murderers," the governor said. "There's never been a question about the crimes they committed. They are now on the loose, and our first order of business is apprehending them."

Despite win, Erdogan's ruling party looks set to struggle to form new government

ANKARA, Turkey (AP) — Turkey's ruling party was left Monday with few options to form a new government, after it was stripped of its parliamentary majority and opposition parties ruled out joining it in a coalition pact.

President Recep Tayyip Erdogan's AKP party won about 41 percent of the votes in Sunday's election and was projected to take 258 seats — 18 below the minimum required to rule alone.

The result was a stunning rebuke to Erdogan's ambitions to expand his powers in a new presidential system.

Prime Minister Ahmet Davutoglu was scheduled to convene his cabinet and party executives Monday to discuss the party's options as its 13-year single party rule came to an end.

The result also puts Erdogan's hopes of passing constitutional changes that would have boosted his powers on hold. He is likely to see his pre-eminent position in Turkish politics erode without the ability to steer the government through his party.

In Gaza, nervous Hamas forces take on a new home-grown jihadi threat from IS loyalists

GAZA CITY, Gaza Strip (AP) — Still recovering from a devastating war with Israel last summer, Gaza's Hamas rulers now find themselves confronting a new internal threat: jihadi militants who support the Islamic State group and appear intent on provoking Israel in order to pressure and embarrass Hamas.

While these Salafi groups are not strong enough to threaten Hamas, they are making life increasingly difficult for the ruling Islamic militant group. Hamas accuses them of being behind a series of mysterious explosions aimed at Hamas security posts, as well as recent rocket launches that have drawn Israeli reprisals and threats of tougher military action. A Hamas crackdown on the Salafists killed a wanted fugitive during an arrest raid last week, appearing to erase any hopes of reconciliation in the near term.

The fugitive, Younis al-Hunnor, had been wanted for months, and his death has prompted angry calls for revenge.

"Hamas are infidels," says a spray-painted message written on the stairway of al-Hunnor's apart-

ment building in southern Gaza. "No condolences before revenge," said another message.

Texas officer on leave after video shows him pushing teen to ground, pointing gun at others

McKINNEY, Texas (AP) — A suburban Dallas police officer has been placed on administrative leave after a video showed him pushing a 14-year-old girl in a swimsuit to the ground outside a pool and pointing his gun at other teens.

McKinney Police Chief Greg Conley said at a news conference Sunday that the incident began when officers responded Friday to a report of a disturbance involving a group of juveniles at a neighborhood pool.

The police department said in an earlier statement that the young people did not live in the area or have permission to be there.

When officers arrived, residents and private security pointed out the juveniles, who were "creating the disturbance, fighting and refusing to leave," Conley said.

As officers dispersed the crowd, the 14-year-old girl was "temporarily detained" by an officer, said Conley, who did not describe what led to her detainment.

Police shoot tear gas to disperse crowd outside New Jersey concert

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) — New Jersey State Police blocking gates outside of a major hip-hop concert at MetLife Stadium had bottles thrown at them by angry people in the crowd who were trying to get inside — some without tickets — and they later used tear gas to try to disperse them, according to officials.

Crowds at the Hot 97 Summer Jam concert

became upset Sunday night when the gates were closed and blocked off by police in riot gear. An armored state police vehicle began blasting a piercing loud noise to try to disperse the crowd and police later deployed tear gas.

Additional troops were sent for "crowd control" and arrests were made, a police spokesman, Sgt. Gregory Williams, told The Associated Press. State police didn't release details about what measures they used to disperse the crowd. The number of arrests wasn't immediately known.

The disturbance began when crowds of people tried to "illegally" force their way into the sold out event by climbing over fences and forcing their way through security, state police said in a statement Sunday night. Police said they insisted that everyone outside of the gate leave the stadium complex to avoid congestion when the concert ended.

Videos and photos posted by people outside of the stadium on social media showed fights between concertgoers and police in riot gear blocking the entrance. Images also showed police using large military-style vehicles to try to disperse the crowds.

Triple Crown winner to rest, then race some more

NEW YORK (AP) — A hero's welcome greeted Triple Crown winner American Pharoah in Kentucky on Sunday, the first of many such receptions expected for the sporting world's newest superstar. The 3-year-old colt has more racing in his future, along with an avalanche of publicity and money-making opportunities after pulling off the first sweep of the Kentucky Derby, Preakness and Belmont in 37 years.

Before leaving Belmont Park, trainer Bob Baffert led American Pharoah onto a patch of grass outside of, fittingly, Barn 1 on a sunny and warm morning. It was only hours after his front-running, 5 1/2-length victory, but the low-key champ appeared to enjoy the attention, dutifully posing for photographers and patiently letting bystanders pet him. "He's a really sweet horse," Baffert said. "We're going to share him with everybody." There were celebrity

visits, too, for the newest member of racing's elite club. Fellow Hall of Fame trainer Bill Mott stopped by for a close-up look at American Pharoah, much like Baffert visited Mott's barn in the mid-1990s to see Cigar, who won 16 consecutive races. American Pharoah arrived in Louisville, Kentucky, later in the day, and was greeted by hundreds of cheering fans at Churchill Downs, his home in between Triple Crown races.

Jockey Victor Espinoza threw out the first pitch at Yankee Stadium, where Baffert attended the game. Next up for racing's 12th Triple Crown winner is some well-deserved downtime, having run in and won five Grade 1 races in nearly 2 1/2 months. That's a compressed schedule for a racehorse, most of which have at least 30 days between starts. "It's ridiculously insane what he did yesterday," Baffert said. "It was a beautiful moment."

Blue Jays sweep Astros

TORONTO (AP) — The Houston Astros saw their losing streak hit a season-high four games with an agonizing loss to Toronto. Chris Colabello hit a two-run single to cap a ninth-inning rally, and the Blue Jays beat the Astros 7-6 on Sunday for their fifth straight win. "To have this one taken away from us is painful," manager A.J. Hinch said. "We needed to win that game and we didn't." Houston was left frustrated after an unusual play in the ninth. Pinch-hitter Munenori Kawasaki doubled to begin the inning and scored on a single by Jose Reyes. After Reyes stole second with one out, Jose Bautista reached on a strange single when shortstop Jonathan

Villar collided with Reyes, who was standing on second base, and dropped a popup. Hinch argued and the umpires huddled, but no interference was called. "My interpretation was that (Reyes) has to make an attempt to get out of the way," Hinch said. "He can't just hold his position." "It's a play that I'm not sure anyone could have expected, but it was very costly," Hinch added. Villar was upset that Reyes, who bent over to protect himself, didn't stand still. "He moved to the side where the fly was," Villar said through a translator. Reyes called the play "a little bit crazy" but denied any wrongdoing.

Rangers rally, but Royals take 4-3 win

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — A late rally put the Texas Rangers in position for yet another win. Salvador Perez had other ideas. Perez hit a solo home run with two outs in the eighth inning and the Kansas City Royals avoided a sweep, beating Texas 4-3 Sunday. The Rangers have the best record in the majors over the last month, winning 22 of 33. Down 3-0, they tied it in the seventh. "It's tough to sweep a series, especially against a team like that," Rangers manager Jeff Banister said. "After the

first couple of innings we continued to battle. We battled back and put runs on the board and got back in the game." "The game can be fragile. It can hinge on one pitch. If you misexecute, a good hitter, a calm hitter, can make you pay. We wanted to win the series, but we want to win games, too. We put ourselves in a position to complete the day," he said. The Rangers managed just one hit through six innings against Jeremy Guthrie. "Guthrie's secondary stuff gave us fits," Banister said.

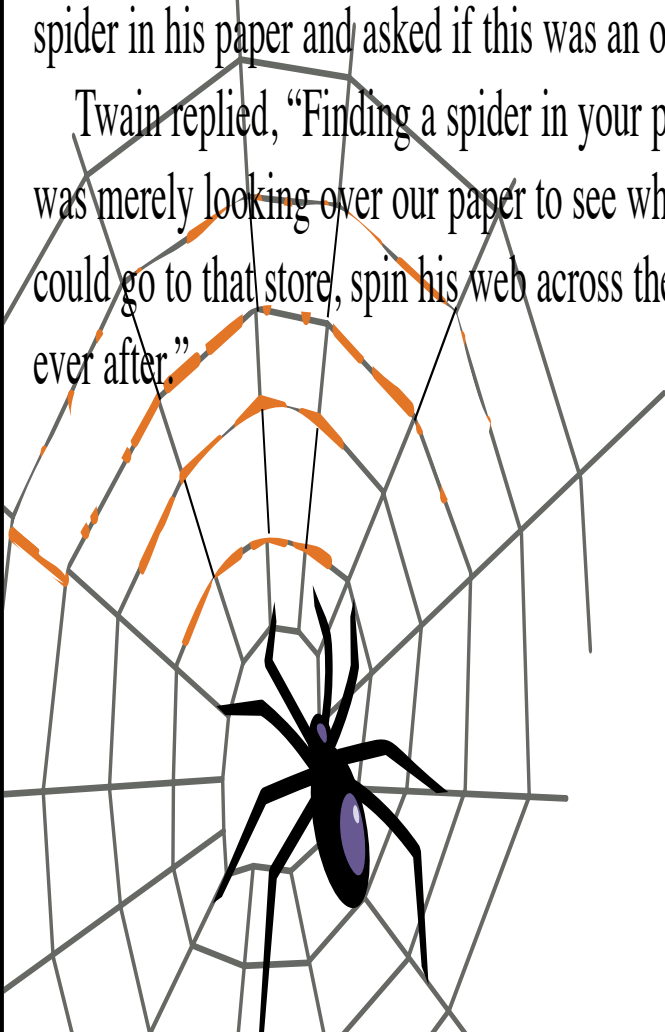

France won the 1992 World Team Olympiad, handily defeating the United States in the 96-board final.

Oddly enough, the deal most vital to the French cause came not in the final, but in its quarterfinal match against Denmark. Going into the last hand of that 64-board match, the Danes led by 2 IMPs. The deal shown then occurred, and the outcome hung in the balance.

When a Danish pair held the East-West cards, they reached three spades and made exactly nine tricks, seemingly an excellent result. The auction shown occurred at the other table, with Knut and Lars Blakset of Denmark seated North-South.

The Blaksets bid aggressively to reach three hearts. If South made three hearts or went down one, the Danes would win the match. Even if declarer went down two for a loss of 2 IMPs, the match would be tied, with a short playoff to follow. Only if he went down three could the match be lost.

West cashed two spades and then shifted to the king of diamonds. At this point, declarer could have made the contract by taking the ace, crossing to dummy with a club, leading a heart to the queen and cashing the A-J of hearts. South could then run clubs until West ruffed in, losing only that trick and a diamond.

But Lars Blakset allowed the diamond king to hold, after which West reverted to spades. Declarer ruffed in dummy, discarding a club, and led the heart jack, covered by the king and ace. If he had now cashed the heart queen and then started running clubs, he would have gone down one and won the match.

Instead, Blakset played a club to the ace and led a heart to the nine. Curtains! West won with the ten and returned a spade, forcing declarer to ruff and lose control of the hand. When the smoke cleared, Blakset was down three and the French had scored a 2-IMP victory.

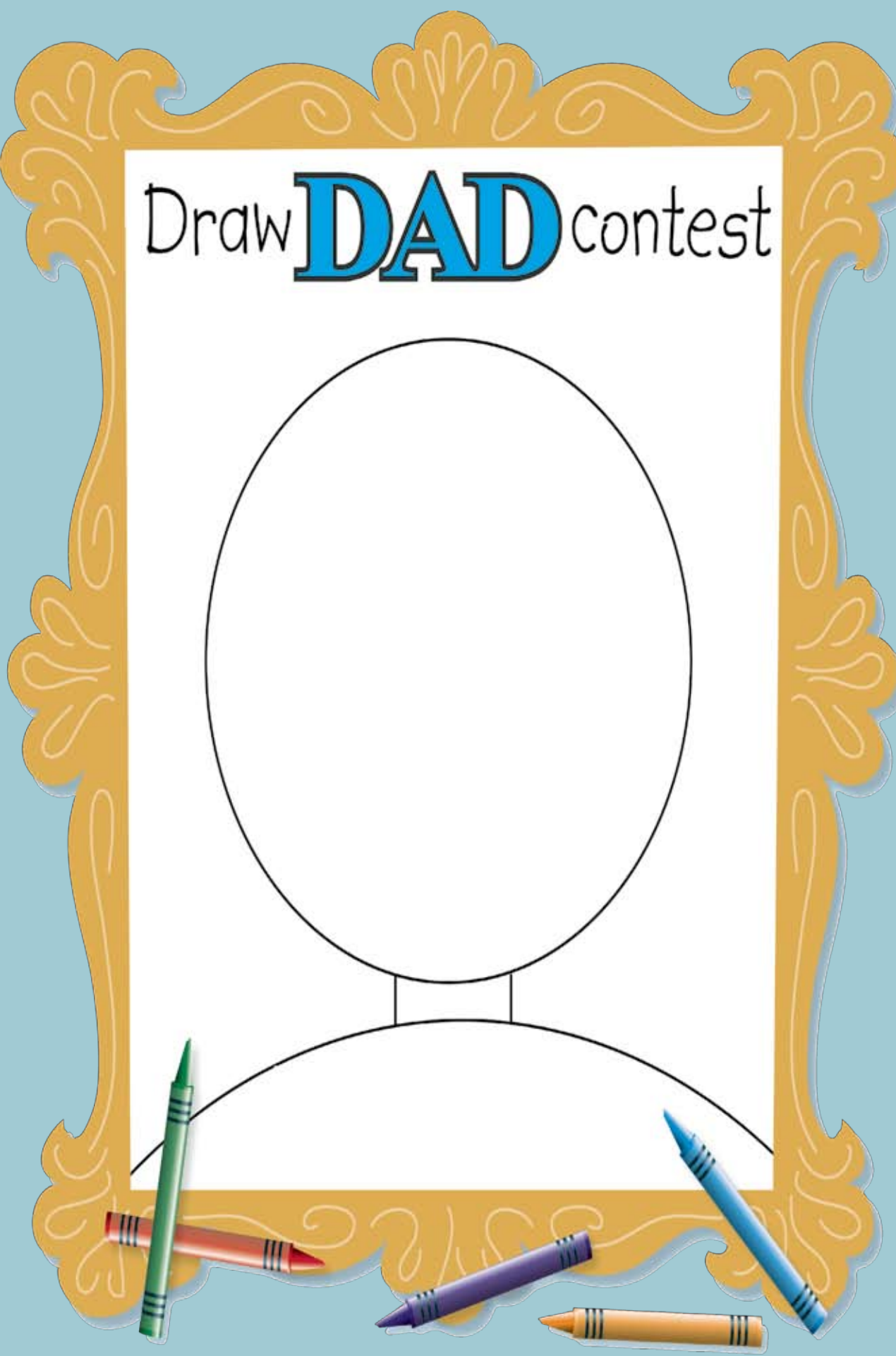
