A Big Spring man is cooling his heels at the Howard County Detention Center this

from the police. When officers arrived at the scene, they found David Morales, 38, with a gun shot wound to the arm, the release stated. Morales was taken

non-life threatening injuries. "Witnesses informed officers that a black Altima had pulled in front of the residence at which time a verbal argument between the driver of the Altima (found to be Johnny Rodriguez Jr.) and Morales began," the release "Witnesses advised

from the residence."

Later, police officers located the Altima and the suspect at his residence, the release stated. Rodriguez was then taken into custody on an Andrews County warrant for failing to pay child support.

"Big Spring Police detectives later executed a search warrant at 1607 Harding locating a silver .22 caliber revolver which is believed to be the firearm used in the shooting," the release stated. "Rodriguez was then also charged with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, a second degree felony."

STAAR test results at Tuesdays **BSISD** board of trustee meeting

Test scores will be on tap when trustees with the Big Spring Independent School District meet Tuesday night.

A report on the STAAR (State of Texas Assessment of Academic Readiness) results for the district is listed at the top of the board agenda. The Texas Education Agency (TEA) uses state mandated tests to gauge student's comprehension of grade level content. Results are heavily used in deterring the academic status for a school

In Big Spring ISD case, the district has been found to be low-performing for some years and was placed on probationary status by TEA in March. If the district fails to "meet standards" when TEA releases district ratings in August,

PFLUGERVILLE, Texas (AP) — Gov. Greg Abbott stopped at a gun range to sign into law bills letting Texans carry concealed handguns on college campuses and openly carry them virtually everywhere else.

AbbottwasatRed'sIndoor Range in Pflugerville (FLOO'-gur-vihl) Saturday. He says the laws mean Texans can be sure their Second Amendment rights will be stronger and more secure than ever The Republican made

expanding gun rights a top priority of his first legislative session governor.

Texas was one of the few states not already allowing licensed residents to

wear handguns holstered, or otherwise in plain sight.

The "campus carry" bill passed despite staunch opposition from leaders of the state's top universities — but includes a concession allowing schools to carve out "gun-free zones."

prohibit or have the effect of generally prohibiting the carrying concealed weapons on campus. We are suppose to take into consideration the nature of the student population, safety concerns and the uniqueness of the campus."

Howard College has three campuses Big Spring, San Angelo and Lamesa along with overseeing the SouthWest Collegiate Institute for the Deaf and six sites at correctional institutes. Although implementation of the bill at the correctional institute sites seems mute, the majority of SWCID students are hard of hearing or deaf. SWCID is the only self-contained community college in the United States for the deaf. Also, the Big Spring campus has a daycare facility on the site. "That will give us some time to begin



US targets al-Qaidalinked leader in Libya airstrikes; reports conflict on if he was killed

BENGHAZI, Libya (AP) — The U.S military says it launched weekend airstrikes targeting and likely killing an al-Qaida-linked militant leader in eastern Libya charged with leading the attack on a gas plant in Algeria in 2013 that killed at least 35 hostages, including three Americans. An Islamist with ties

to Libyan militants, however, said the airstrikes missed Mokhtar Belmokhtar, instead killing four members of a Libyan extremist group the U.S. has linked to the Sept. 11, 2012, attack on the U.S. Consulate in Benghazi that killed Ambassador Chris Stevens and three other Americans. U.S. officials said they

are still assessing the results of the Saturday strike, but Pentagon spokesman Col. Steve Warren said the military believes the strike was successful and hit the target. Neither U.S. officials nor the Libyan government provided proof of Belmokhtar's death, which likely requires a DNA test or an announcement by Belmokhtar's group that he was killed. "I can confirm that the

target of last night's counterterrorism strike in Libya was Mokhtar Belmokhtar," Warren Sunday. "Belmokhtar has a long history of leading terrorist activities as a member of (al-Qaida in the Islamic Maghreb), is the operational leader of the al-Qaida-associated al-Murabitun organization in northwest Africa and maintains his personal allegiance to al-Qaida."

After 6 months of consideration, Republican Jeb Bush ready to enter 2016 race for president

WASHINGTON (AP) - Jeb Bush is ready to launch a Republican presidential bid months in the making on Monday by asserting his commitment to the "most vulnerable in our society," an approach targeting the broader American electorate even as he faces questions about his policies from conservatives in his own party. Six months after he

got the 2016 campaign started by saying he was considering a bid, the 62-year-old former Florida governor will formally enter the race with a speech and rally near his south Florida home at Miami Dade University, an institution selected because it serves a large and diverse student body that's symbolic of the nation he seeks to lead.

"My core beliefs start with the premise that the most vulnerable in our society should be in the front of the line and not the back," Bush says in a video featuring women, minorities and a disabled child to be aired at the event before his Monday afternoon announcement speech. 'What we need is new leadership that takes conservative principles and applies them so that people can rise up."

Bush joins the crowded Republican campaign in some ways in a commanding position. The brother of one president and son of another, Bush has likely raised a recordingbreaking amount of money to support his candidacy and conceived of a new approach on how to structure his campaign, both aimed at allowing him to make a deep run into the GOP primaries.

But on other measures, early public opinion polls among them, he has yet to break out. While unquestionably one of the top-tier candidates in the GOP race, he is also only one of several in a capable Republican field that does not have a true front-runner.

Behind-the-scenes government system keeps data 'indefinitely' on those seeking health coverage

WASHINGTON (AP) A government data warehouse stores personal information forever on millions of people who seek coverage under President Barack Obama's health care law, including those who open an account on HealthCare.gov don't sign up for cover-

At a time when major breaches have become distressingly common, the vast scope of the information — and the lack of a clear plan for destroying old records — have raised concerns about privacy and the government's judgment on technology.

"A basic privacy principle is that you don't retain data any longer than you have to," said Lee Tien, a senior staff attorney with Electronic Frontier Foundation. "The more data you keep, the more harm an attacker or unauthorized person can do."

Electronic recordkeeping systems are standard for businesses and government agencies. But they are supposed to have limits on how long data is kept.

The health care system, known as MIDAS, is described on a federal website as the "perpetual central repository" for information that the Affordable Care Act authorizes federal agencies to collect.

Searchers look for more than 20 people, dangerous zoo animals still missing in Georgia flood

TBILISI, Georgia (AP) - Rescue workers in the Georgian capital were still searching Monday for more than 20 people and an undetermined number of potentially dangerous animals that are missing after severe flooding ravaged the city's zoo and left at least 12 people dead.

Tbilisi zoo director Zurab Gurielidze said that none of the people who died was killed by the zoo animals set free in the flooding. Three employees drowned.

Among the animals that fled the flooded zoo were lions, tigers, bears, wolves, a hippopotamus and one jaguar. Some, including the hippopotamus, were tranquilized and returned to the zoo. Others were shot by police, while others remain missing.

spokeswoman Zoo Khatia Basilashvili said three lions, three tigers and two jaguars were killed either in the flood or when on the loose, while the fate of five lions, three tigers and one jaguar was not yet known.

2 teenagers lose limbs in separate shark attacks in **North Carolina** beach town

OAK ISLAND, N.C. (AP) — Two teenagers were seriously injured in two separate shark attacks in the same North Carolina town on

Sunday, terrifying beach goers and prompting one shocked witness to compare the scene to the movie "Jaws." Oak Island Mayor

Wallace told WECT-6 that the first victim, a girl, lost part of her arm and could lose her left leg. Just over an hour later, a 16-year-old boy also was attacked by a shark and was airlifted to a hospital, Wallace said. He lost "I saw someone carry

Before Zhou, many senior party cadres and government officials were reported to have sought help and blessings from qigong masters, feng-shui experts, and Buddhist and Taoist monks.

Obviously, it will have to be tailored to every community college in the state and in our situation we have different sites and different situations that we will have to take into account. As it states, we will work with our faculty staff and students to come up with appropriate rules within the letter of the law."

Four-year universities must be in compliance with the law by August 2016.

In order to be licensed to carry a concealed handgun in Texas, the person must be 21 years of age or older, under go a background check, take a written test and a range test.

Suspect only death in attack on Dallas police building

Associated Press

DALLAS (AP) — A man who authorities say opened fire outside Dallas police headquarters from his parked van, with bullets piercing the glass at the entrance and causing damage inside, was the only person killed after the gunfire turned into a street battle and standoff.

Chief David Brown said the suspect told authorities he was James Boulware and blamed police for having lost custody of his son and for "accusing him of being a terrorist." But authorities declined to officially identify the man until a medical examiner verified it.

A police sniper shot and killed the man in his van early Saturday after, according to Brown, the department felt he still posed enough of a threat. The suspect had told police negotiators that he had explosives in the van.

"When the negotiation was on, he became increasingly angry and threatening, such that we were not only concerned with our officers there trying to contain the scene being shot by him at a moment's notice," but also people nearby, Brown said at a news conference.

Officers also found the man had planted pipe bombs outside police headquarters.

Police questioned Boulware's father, also named James, later in the day Saturday, arriving while an Associated Press reporter was at the home.

Authorities said the shooting miraculously left no one else dead or injured. Among the areas damaged inside: the front desk where the worker

on duty had just gone to get a soft drink.

The suspect also fired on officers who drove up to confront him, riddling at least one squad car with bullets but not actually hitting anyone. Cellphone video shot from a nearby balcony or roof showed the suspect's darkcolored van ram a squad car as gunshots rang out. At one point the man got out of his van and walked toward the entrance to the building firing his gun but turned around, according to Dallas Police Maj. Jeff Cotner.

Police would not say why he retreated.

The van then fled, eventually stopping in a restaurant parking lot in the suburb of Hutchins, where the standoff ensued until the police sniper shot and killed the man.

Investigators found a package of pipe bombs in the parking lot at police headquarters and at least two more pipe bombs in the van, police

Wary that the van may have been rigged with explosives, police used a cameraequipped robot to inspect it rather than have officers approach it immediately, which was why it took several hours to confirm the suspect was dead.

After he was confirmed dead, the van erupted in flames while the authorities were detonating the suspected ordnance inside.

Boulware's father said that his son had strong feelings against law enforcement after he lost custody of his son, now 12 or 13 years old. Boulware spent several hours Friday at his father's home in Carrollton, a Dallas suburb.

about how well his recently purchased van drove. But he also discussed a widely publicized video of a police officer in McKinney, Texas, pushing a black teenage girl to the ground and brandishing his gun at other teens.

Boulware's father last spoke with Boulware by phone about three hours before Dallas police said the shooting began.

"Not being able to get a job and the legal system letting him down, (he) finally snapped," the elder James Boulware told the AP in a phone interview before police arrived to question him about his son. "But I can't say shooting at a police station is right in any way.'

The attack beganaround 12:30 a.m. when several police officers were standing nearby. popular bar across street from police headquarters was still open, and the neighbor hood is also home to boutique hotel apartment buildings.

Reporters allowed walk through the after it had been secured counted numerous bullet holes in the front window of the police building. Number markings were all over the street to show where shell casings and other forms of evidence had been found. Blackened debris marked the spot where the pipe bombs exploded in the parking lot of the police station.

One squad car that police said had been occupied by two officers at the time had a bullet hole in the back of the driver's seat. Police on the scene declined to say how the two officers escaped the shots or if they had ducked below the dash.

In the early confusion, witnesses reported seeing as many as four attackers, including some who had taken high positions for betlater said investigators were confident the only attacker was the suspect later killed.

Anita Grendahl was asleep in her seventh-floor apartment in a high-rise across from police headquarters when she heard gunshots loud enough to wake her up over a white noise machine in her room.

"We just woke up to a few pops and thought somebody was on my balcony, and then looked outside and saw the van crash into the car," she



of hearts, lead a club at trick three and play low from dummy! Take East's probable spade return with the ace, cash the queen of hearts, lead a club to the king and ruff a club. Then lead a heart to the ace and discard the Q-4 of spades on the A-8 of clubs.

This method of play offers by far the best chance. It does the job whether the clubs are divided 3-3 or 4-2, a combined probability of about 84 percent, and renders the spade finesse virtually unnecessary.
