DA: Too early to tell how woman died in Texas jail

HEMPSTEAD, Texas — A Texas prosecutor says there are many unanswered questions about the death of a black woman whose family torney Elton Mathis said at bag July 13. disputes authorities' finding a news conference Monday

that she hanged herself in a jail cell three days after a confrontational traffic stop, and that the case is being examined as thoroughly as a murder investigation.

He saved many patients from heart surgery with chelation therapy. He will be remembered as an excellent diagnostician, unearthing the source of issues when the experts couldn't.



prints, DNA and to use any other valid investigative techniques "so we can figure out and say with certainty what happened in that cell." "This investigation is

still being treated just as it would be in a murder investigation. There are many questions being raised in Waller County, across the country and the world about this case. It needs a thorough review," Mathis said, noting, "It will go to a grand jury."

Capt. Brian Cantrell, head of the sheriff's department criminal investigation division, said at the same press conference that Bland's death "was a tragic incident, not one of criminal intent or a criminal act" but that he welcomed the investigation.

Although a medical examiner has ruled Bland's death a suicide, supporters insist she was upbeat and looking forward to a new job at Prairie View A&M University, where she graduated in 2009. She was in the area last week to

interview and accept the job. Bland's family and clergy members have called for a Justice Department probe, and an independent autopsy has been ordered.

Bland's death has resonated on social media, with posts questioning the official account and featuring the hashtags #JusticeForSandy and #WhatHappenedToSandyBland. Others have featured #SandySpeaks, referring to the hashtag Bland had used in monologues she posted on Facebook. In them, she talked about police brutality and what she said was a calling from Bland told her, "I'm God to speak out against fine." About an hour racism and injustice.

Also on Monday, authorities released a three-hour video taken from outside Bland's jail cell and said they expected to release dashcam footage of her arrest Tuesday.

The jail video shows a period of about 90 minutes with no activity in the hallway leading to Bland's cell. The video does not show the inside of her cell or even her cell door.

It then shows a deputy reacting to what she sees while looking in the cell, triggering a frenzy of activity. An EMT crew arrives with a wheeled stretcher. Deputies and medical personnel are seen coming and going, but a body isn't visible.

Cantrell said the video was motion sensitive, indicating if nothing is taking place after a certain amount of time, it turns off. He said the FBI has been given hard drives to determine if there's been any manipulation.

Cantrell said a guard checked with Bland about two hours before she was found dead and later, Bland asked to make a telephone call and was advised over an intercom that the phone was on a wall in the cell, according to Cantrell. There is no record of her ever making a phone call, he said.

Cantrell declined to describe Bland's death in detail, though he said she was found with her feet touching the ground. He described the plastic garbage bag used as a ligature by extending his hands about 5 to 6 feet apart.

The bags, he said, had been approved by a jail inspector, but have since been removed from all cells.

Mathis also said Monday that jail records show Bland had been offered a medical checkup while in custody but declined.

Bland's sister, Shante Needham, has said Bland called her from jail the afternoon after her arrest, telling Needham an officer had placed his knee in her back and she thought her arm had been broken. The Department of Public Safety has said Bland "became argumentative and uncooperative" during the stop and her subsequent arrest for assault on a public servant, and that paramedics were called to the scene but Bland refused a medical evaluation.

Mathis said the dashcam video is consistent with information the officer has provided about the traffic stop, though he said it shows only re-

stricted views of the encounter. The trooper's dashcam shows a view forward toward Bland's car, but not inside and not to the side, where she wound up on the ground after authorities said she kicked the offi-

Cantrell said the video doesn't show how Bland got on the ground.

"Sandra Bland was very combative," Mathis said. "It was not a model traffic stop ... and it was not a model person that was stopped on a traffic stop. I think the public can make its own determinations as to the behaviors that are seen in the video."

A cellphone video posted online purporting to show part of Bland's arrest shows an officer pinning a woman to the ground with one knee. At one point the woman can be heard yelling that she can't "feel my arm."

"You just slammed my head into the ground," she says. "Do you not even care about that?'

Psychiatry ain't what it used to be

here was a time when most of what I knew about psychiatrists came from Woody Allen. In his 1973 movie "Sleeper," his character wakes up in the future and complains,

"I haven't seen my analyst in 200 vears. He was a strict Freudian, and if I'd been going all this time I'd probably almost be cured by now." But even his treatment sounded better than what Jack Nicholson's character got in "One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest"

for being rebellious: a lobotomy. Those films imprinted a couple

of lessons about psychiatry. The first was that mental health professionals were useless; the second, that they were dangerous. No surprise that in the 1970s, Thomas Szasz's book, "The Myth of Mental Illness," got a lot of attention.

Szasz had grounds for doubt. In his new book, "Shrinks: The Untold Story of Psychiatry," Jeffrey A. Lieberman writes, "Back then, the majority of psychiatric institutions were clouded by ideology and dubious science, mired in a pseudo-medical landscape where devotees of Sigmund Freud clung to every position of power."

Lieberman, a psychiatrist and chairman of psychiatry at the Columbia University medical school, is aware of the many wrong turns the profession has taken, which his book recounts. But he contends that it has come a long way and now offers real solutions to real problems.

Recently, he spent an hour on the phone with me — well, more like 50 minutes. Two themes emerged. The first is that his profession has a lot to apologize for. The second is that judging today's psychiatry by what happened decades ago is like judging modern surgery by the

n five of the past six presi-

battlefield amputations of the Civil War.

When he was born in 1948, Lieberman attests, "not a single therapeutically effective medicine existed for any mental disorder. There were no antidepressants, no antipsychotics, no anti-anxiety drugs."

In 1927, he recalls, the Nobel Prize for medicine went to Julius Wagner-Jauregg, who found a cure for a virulent form of psychosis. The remedy — "which sounds barbaric now," he notes — was to infect the victim with malaria. It was dangerous, but it was welcome, because "the alternative was so abominable."

Likewise for such remedies as stupor-inducing drugs, electroshock treatments and loboto-

Psychiatrists didn't resort to these methods because they were sadistic, but because they had no other ways to relieve devastating afflictions. Today, it's clear that some of

those "mythical" mental illnesses have physical origins. Schizophrenics have structural brain abnormalities — and left untreated, says Lieberman, "their brains get smaller and smaller."

New medicines can alleviate the most common and debilitating conditions, particularly depression, schizophrenia and bipolar disorder.

Where at one time psychiatry "couldn't do anything for anybody," Lieberman tells me, it now has treatments offering "the difference between a life of disability and suffering and possibly death, or living in a recovered state and, in many instances, fully normally and productively.'

About one in 10 Americans now takes antidepressants. Do they help? A 2007 study for the National Bureau of Economic Research found that a 12 percent increase in sales of the most common type was associated with a 5 percent decline in suicides.

But most people with mental illness get inadequate treatment, if any. The rest of us see the results: homelessness, suicide and crime. More than a million of those afflicted are behind bars.

There are two ways to address the problem. The first is to make comprehensive treatment available to those who want it. But it's also crucial, as Lieberman notes, to treat those who can't care for themselves but lack the mental clarity to comprehend their plight.

This second option is controversial because it may involve medicating people against their

We have no trouble allowing treatment of unconscious, injured people when doctors deem it necessary.

But civil libertarians oppose involuntary treatment of people incapacitated by serious mental disorders — many of whom, Lieberman points out, will end up in emergency rooms or jails if left to their own devices.

Fortunately, there is a growing sense — reflected in the widespread adoption of state laws making it easier to mandate medication — that the risks of unchecked mental illness are greater than the risks of treat-

Psychiatry has made enormous advances from which many sick people never benefit. The tragedy of the past was that the mentally ill were mostly beyond the help of doctors. The tragedy of the present is that they are not beyond help, but many are beyond reach.

dential elections, the Republican Party has lost the nation's popular vote to the Democrats. In those same six presidential contests, 18 states

and the District of Columbia, totaling among them 242 electoral votes (you need only 270 to win the White House), have voted every time for the Democratic ticket.

This, even our good friends at Fox News would concede, is not good news for the Grand Old Party.

But wait. After the most recent national election, in November 2014, there were actually more Republicans — 247 — elected to the 435-seat U.S. House of Representatives than at any time since Herbert Hoover's landslide victory over Al Smith, some 86 years earlier. With those kinds of numbers,

time to quote the American philosopher George Santayana, who wrote, "Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it." In 1980, the Democrats were

the House majority party, holding 243 seats. But in the presidential elections of 1980, 1984 and 1988, the three Democratic nominees — President Jimmy Carter, former Vice President Walter Mondale and Massachusetts Gov. Michael Dukakis collectively carried a grand total of just 17 states.

There's a real political downside, as Republicans are learning, to being a legislative — and a regional — party.

In those three elections, the Republicans won 1.440 electoral votes to the Democrats' 173.

Even in the face of three consecutive presidential pastings, House Democrats still managed to increase their majority, from 243 seats to 262.

The problem, for the Democrats then and for the Republicans now, is that instead of a national party with a coherent and consistent message on the economy and national security issues, the House majority turns into a collective wish list for its most important interest groups and, to discourage primary challenges to its own House members, the congressional party, by frequently pandering to the ideological activists on its side of the aisle, makes the national party appear even more out of step with most of the nation's voters.

The GOP's problems are compounded by the fact that it has become a regional party.

Since the passage of the historic Civil Rights Act of 1964, the South — the most culturally conservative and religiously observant area in the country, which continues to turn more culturally liberal and secular has become the GOP's indispensable home office.

In 1964, there were from the 11 states of the old Confederacy just 10 Republicans in the U.S. House.

only a congressional party Today from those same 11 states, there are 102 House Republicans, without whom there would be no Republican majority in the House.

> Even though Barack Obama won the White House by 9.5 million votes over John McCain in 2008 and even though John Kerry, four years earlier, lost by 3 million votes to George W. Bush, Kerry got a much higher percentage of white Southern votes than did Obama, whose higher percentage of white voters outside the South enabled him to carry Iowa, Colorado and New Hampshire.

In more than a few Southern counties, 9 in 10 whites voted for Mitt Romney over Obama in 2012. Southern whites are almost as monolithic in their voting for Republicans as African-American voters are for Democrats.

Unyielding opposition from Southern Republicans to even voting on the Senate-passed immigration reform bill and House Speaker John Boehner's unwillingness to challenge this powerful group are the reason that this fractious issue is central to the current GOP presidential nomination fight and why the party faces even more hostility from Latino voters.

Bird Poop:

he Ramadan rumble

aving completed a Ramadan service the previous evening, the chaplain said she had heard a commotion

as she walked out of the chapel. With her way welllighted by prison lights, she saw what appeared to be a

on top of something. Pecking relentlessly at the shape beside and beneath them, the avian attackers appeared to

At 11:30 p.m., the sight of birds normally seen during the day was quite a surprise to her. Approaching the set-to, she startled the attackers and shooed them off. Flying to a safe distance, the wrens left behind their quarry.

"It was a burrowing owl!" she said during her phone call. Dazed, it did not move. "When it wouldn't fly, I just reached down and picked it up." Not knowing whether

or not it was injured, she took it home. Trying to think of something to place with it inside a cardboard box, she poured some Gatorade into a container and set it in a corner. During the night, at least the owl would have something to drink that might give it some energy.

Barely standing the next morning, it was mostly unresponsive. It had gained orange feet, however, from the coloration added to the The chaplain's phone

call had brought an enlightening comparison to an event that was reported to us the previous week. In that instance, Western kingbirds had attacked an American kestrel. The act of "mobbing" a specie, in an attempt to protect the nest and young, had yet another

As we continued the conversation, the chaplain said that she had to go to the prison in Colorado City. She promised to deliver the owl on her return to Big Spring.

example.

It was just as she had described, unresponsive. It was probably battered and bruised. As we stood looking into her box at its pitiful stance, I noted the bird's wings and back were the typical color of dirt, a blend of tan and brown.

On top, its feathers were spotted with white. Underneath, its creamy plumage was heavily barred with brown. A black streak divided its white throat from its upper chest.

Its long legs and stubby tail lent to its comical appearance. Although it had no ear tufts, its round head with large, yellow eyes and white eyebrows was captivating.

After thanking the

chaplain, I was grateful for her intervention. Enough birds, given enough time, could have mortally wounded this little raptor.

Finding no visible injuries, but wanting to observe it, caused me to hunt for our "hideyhole" that Art had made years ago for burrowing owls. At that time, he had found a cardboard box that was just the right size. In it he had cut an arched doorway to allow entry.

Since this specie is notorious for wanting to hide when it feels threatened, the box, when placed inside a large carrier, would offer a place of refuge. Food could be place outside the entrance.

As I reached inside the Gatorade stained box, the owl stood as erect as possible. It appeared to be insulted by its captivity. Suddenly, it puffed itself up by ruffling its feathers. As quickly as it had seemed to enlarge its presence, the bird lessened in size as its plumage settled back in place.

Inside the large carrier, and retreating to its new abode, the owl remained in the "hideyhole" for the rest of the day. Toward sunset, a mouse and four baby mice were placed about an inch from the door.

The next morning, the head of the mouse was missing. The remains of the rest indicated that it had previously eaten before encounter-

High-tech aerospace exhibit starts world tour

WASHINGTON — With space shuttles now housed in history museums, innovators in aerospace are thinking of newer, better ways humans could reach space. One idea: What about a space elevator?

This real idea is one simulation that's part of a new high-tech interactive exhibition about the future of flight opening Aug. 1 at the Smithsonian's National Air and Space Museum. The exhibit also will serve as an important test case for new technologies to overhaul the popular museum with more interactives.


Designers at Evergreen Exhibitions in San Antonio, Texas, been developing the new exhibition "Above and Beyond: The Ultimate Interactive Flight Exhibition" with Boeing, NASA and the Smithsonian to explore new innovations and ideas. It uses immersive videos, simulations, virtual reality, touch-tables and a 180-degree theater experience to create a hands-on, immersive Curators experience. said it is more interactive technology than the Smithsonian has ever had in an aerospace exhibit

"Above and Beyond" will debut at one of the nation's most popular museums. The National Air and Space Museum draws nearly 7 million visitors each year on the National Mall. The exhibit runs until early January and then begins a worldwide tour through 2020.will include museums in Dubai; St. Louis; Charleston, South Carolina; Riyadh, Saudi Arabia; London, Tokyo and

One exhibit capsule will simulate the idea of a space elevator with video screens surrounding visitors to give them the feel of rising above Earth.

Researchers are developing such an idea to see if it's possible to create a real capsule that could crawl up a cord from the ground to the level of orbiting the Earth.

The Smithsonian's Air and Space Museum is planning to overhaul all of its exhibit galleries in the coming years, and the temporary exhibit will help the museum test what works.

Some current galleries date back to the museum's opening in 1976. The museum has mostly shied away from integrating much technology into its exhibits because the galleries receive heavy traffic, and technology tends to break down, said Roger Launius, the museum's associate director of collections and curatorial affairs.

"In the future as we're re-envisioning the museum, we're putting more and more of these kinds of things in, but this is sort of taking us to a level we haven't had," Launius said. "One of the things we want to do is kind of test the technologies."

Beyond the gee-whiz technology, the exhibit is rooted in the themes of how to fly higher, farther, faster and smarter to challenge visitors with the real problems of how to make space flight more efficient and less expensive, Launius said.

Curators planning the museum's overhaul are also looking at how to use new technology to give visitors a better look at space history. The museum is considering a future simulation that could recreate what it was like to land on the moon during the Apollo era.

John Tracy, the chief technology officer for Boeing, which is funding the "Above and Beyond" exhibit and part of the museum's overhaul, said the company wants to work with the museum to inspire the next generation of innovators.

ing the wrens. Filled with insect fragments, a pellet it cast later in the day confirmed my suspicions.

The next night one and half mice were eaten. Toward the end of the third day, the owl became restless around 4:30 p.m. After trying to fly within the confines of the carrier, it finally settled down.

The next morning,

our offering of mice the night before had disappeared. That afternoon, a repetition of activity and wanting to fly occurred at about the same time. Since burrowing owls hunt during the afternoon and evening, its behavior was indicative of the needed time of release.

A quick trip to the closest area of prairie dogs and owls thirty minutes later was rewarding. Not only were the prairie dogs outside their holes and sunning. A burrowing owl

was perched on a power line above. To release it in like company was imperative.

Back at the house, we loaded the large carrier with its "hideyhole" and occupant. To see that the owl had remained above on the line when we returned was heartening.

Parking a short distance beyond the still perching owl, so as not to frighten it, we took the carrier out of our vehicle. Opening the gate, we removed the "hidey-hole" and placed

it on the ground facing the direction of the other owl.

Once clear of the arch, the burrowing owl took flight. Flying low over the ground, it covered approximately twenty feet before setting down. Taking flight again, and setting down, was typical of the specie's habit of frequent landings as it continues to search

open land.

When it quickly took flight again, a gust of wind assisted it in banking slightly to the west. After it landed, the owl above decided to join it.

Once the carrier and its magic box were back inside the vehicle, we turned to watch the owls. They were nowhere to be seen.

Since burrowing owls

accept vacant prairie dog holes for shelter and nest sites, we felt the welcoming committee of one had offered our charge a new place to stay. It just proved that summer has its own surprises.

DENVER (AP) The Texas Rangers rallied from seven runs down to tie it. Then they lost the game in agonizing fashion. Ben Paulsen,

whose blunder in the field aided the Rangers' comeback, hit a tiebreaking single with one out in the bottom of the ninth inning, and the Colorado Rockies beat Texas 8-7 on Monday night. "We

fought our way back," Rangers manager Jeff Banister said. "Seven runs down and we came back. These guys continued to gut it out and perform, tie it up. That's a tough way to lose."

Troy Tulowitzki homered and Nolan Arenado had two RBIs for Colorado, which has won a seasonbest five in a row at home.

Prince Fielder had two hits and three RBIs and Adrian Beltre had three hits for the Rangers, who have lost 10 of 12.

Beltre's second double of the night tied the game at 7 in the ninth against closer John Axford (2-2) but the Rockies rallied in the bottom of the inning. Tulowitzki and Carlos Gonzalez both fought off tough inside pitches to lead off with singles off Tanner

Scheppers (3-1). One out later Paulsen

Slam gone, Spieth gears up for the next major

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland (AP) — I won't beat myself up too bad because Jordan Spieth headed home from a grueling week at the British Open with history on his mind and another major in his future.

Next up is the PGA Championship at Whistling Straits. And if the Grand Slam is no longer in play, there's still plenty out there.

"I don't know how many guys have done three majors in a year," Spieth said. "I'm sure there's only been a

Very few, actually.

Ben Hogan did it in 1953, winning the Masters, U.S. Open and British Open. Tiger Woods missed in the Masters but won the last three majors of the year in 2000 on his way to what became known as the Tiger Slam.

After his chances at winning his third straight major evaporated with a couple of missed opportunities on the last two holes Monday, Spieth was already looking ahead.

It was hard not to after coming up one shot short of a three-man playoff that Zach Johnson won over Louis Oosthuizen and Marc Leishman in what otherwise might have been a British Open for the ages at the home

Besides, the 21-year-old golfing sensation was not going to get too down after failing to add the claret jug to his Masters green jacket and U.S. Open

"I made a lot of the right decisions down the stretch and certainly closed plenty of tournaments out, and this just wasn't one of those," Spieth said. "It's hard to do that every single time.

I do understand that."

A missed 8-footer on the treacherous 17th hole helped seal Spieth's fate on the Old Course. A misplaced drive on the final hole did the rest. He could also point to four putts from

120 feet on the eighth green where he tried to get greedy on his first putt. But Spieth followed that with back-toback birdies, something he tends to do when things go bad. Something he also tends to do is pay

respect to the game and its fans. He's been described as a young man with an old man's wisdom, and it showed in the way he took what had to be a most bitter defeat.

When Spieth walked off the green, he applauded the fans who cheered him on. Later, he came out and watched Johnson win a playoff, then gave him a congratulatory hug.

Johnson earned it.

Starting the final round three shots behind, he shot 31 on the back nine and took the lead with his seventh birdie of the round on No. 12. It looked as though his hopes were slipping away when his right foot spun out on his second shot at the 17th that led to bogey. But with the most significant shot of the tournament, Johnson holed a 30-foot birdie putt on No. 18 for a 6-under 66 and was the first to post at 15-under 273.

Leishman, who lost the lead with a bogey on the 16th hole, had a birdie putt on the 18th to win that stayed left. He shot 66. Oosthuizen saved



The Bidding Points the Way

The bidding: South 6 ♦ Pass Dble Dble Pass Pass Opening lead queen of spades. Let's say you reach six diamonds doubled on the bidding shown and West leads a spade. When dummy comes down, it occurs to you that

North's takeout double was a tad light, but you concentrate instead on how to play the hand. At first glance, it seems you must lose a heart and a club and go down one. But when you think about it some more, you realize you actually have an excellent chance for the

slam. West is bound to have the ace of hearts and king of clubs for his bids, and if he also started with the

ten of spades to go with the Q-J indi-

So you win the spade with the ace and lead the heart deuce. West can't afford to go up with the ace — you'd have 12 tricks if he did — so he plays the ten. You win with the queen, dis-

cated by his opening lead, you're a virtual shoo-in for the contract.

card your king of hearts on the king of spades and ruff a heart. Next you lead a low trump to the eight, ruff dummy's last heart, con-

tinue with a low trump to the nine and lead the nine of spades. But instead of ruffing, you discard a club! West wins the spade with the ten but is helpless. If he returns a spade or a heart (if he has one), you ruff in dummy and discard another club. If he returns a low club instead, you let

it roll around to your queen. Either way, you make the slam. Actually, you should feel reasonably confident of making the contract from the start. The bidding and the opening lead tell you it is likely that you have West over a barrel, in which case there is no way he can

escape his fate. As the cards lie, declarer can also make the slam after the queen of hearts wins at trick two by keeping the king of hearts and discarding a club on the king of spades, then running all his remaining trumps and conceding a heart to West's ace. But as this would involve guessing what West's last three eards are, the suggested line of play is preferred.



History: On July 21, 1925, the so-called

"Monkey Trial" ended in Dayton, Tennessee, with John T. Scopes found guilty of violating state law for teaching Darwin's Theory of Evolution. (The conviction was later overturned on a technicality.) On this date:

In 1944, American forces landed on Guam during World War II, capturing it from the Japanese some three weeks later. The Democratic national convention in Chicago nominated Sen. Harry S. Truman to be vice president.

In 1949, the U.S. Senate ratified the North Atlantic Treaty.

In 1955, during a summit in Geneva, President Dwight D. Eisenhower presented his "open skies" proposal under which the U.S. and the Soviet Union would trade information on each other's military facilities and allow aerial reconnaisance. (The Soviets rejected the proposal.)

In 1959, the NS Savannah, the first nuclear-powered merchant ship, was christened by first lady Mamie Eisenhower at Camden, New Jersey. In 1961, Capt. Virgil "Gus'

Grissom became the second American to rocket into a suborbital pattern around the Earth, flying aboard the Liberty Bell 7. In 1972, the Irish Republican

Army carried out 22 bombings in Belfast, Northern Ireland, killing nine people and injuring 130 in what became known as "Bloody Friday."

In 1973, Israeli agents in Lillehammer, Norway, killed Ahmed Bouchikhi, a Moroccan waiter, in a case of mistaken identity, apparently thinking he was an official with Black September, the group that attacked Israel's delegation at the 1972 Munich Olympics and killed 11 athletes.

In 1980, draft registration began in the United States for 19- and 20-year-old men.

In 1990, a benefit concert took

place in Germany at the site of

the fallen Berlin Wall; the con-

cert, which drew some 200,000

people, was headlined by Roger Waters, a founder of Pink Floyd. (The concert ended with the collapse of a mock Berlin Wall made of styrofoam.) Five years ago: A triumphant President Barack Obama signed into law the most sweep-

ing overhaul of U.S. lending and high finance rules since the 1930s.

Hammon, Spurs take Las Vegas Summer League championship

LAS VEGAS (AP) -Becky Hammon already made history when she became the first female head coach in NBA summer league.

Leading the San Antonio Spurs to the Las Vegas Summer League championship made the experience that much sweeter.

Hammon coached the Spurs to a 93-90 victory over the Phoenix Suns in the title game on Monday night.

"It was a grind," Hammon said. "They've been together for 17 days. They really started to jell the last two or three games. They listened and they played really hard for me. I just really appreciate their attentiveness and alertness. They were tired but they fought through."

The Spurs participated in both the Orlando and Las Vegas summer leagues, but Hammon served as the head coach only in the higher profile Vegas event.

The Spurs lost the opener to the New York

Knicks, and then reeled off six straight victo-

Jonathon Simmons scored 23 points and took home MVP honors for the championship game. Treveon Graham added 22 points for the

"It's amazing. It was a humbling experience." Simmons told NBATV of playing for Hammon. "For all of us. I really love her and I've only known her a couple days. She's a real cool coach. She's a player coach. That's something we all like."

Last year the Spurs made Hammon the first female full-time assistant coach in league history. Earlier this summer they told her she would lead the team in Las Vegas. "She's a firecracker,

she takes no prisoners, she's got a great personality," Spurs coach Gregg Popovich said during a visit to Minnesota in the regular season. "She knows her stuff. She's competitive."

The Spurs have worked hard not to make too much of their hiring of Hammon. Popovich has said time and again that she was hired because of her coaching acumen and not because the team was looking to help a woman break the glass ceiling.

"I don't know if her perspective is unique. It's women instead of men, but it's the same game," Popovich said. "Becky knows what to do on a pick-and-roll just as much as what Tony Parker knows. So I don't think it's unique at all."

The players gave Hammon a Gatorade bath during the celebration in the locker room, and the Spurs were the third team to win the Vegas Summer League tournament, following the Warriors in 2013 and Kings in 2014. "You never know

what your journey has in store," Hammon said, according to Sports Illustrated. "You just work hard and keep your nose to the grind. You do things the right way, you treat people the right way, and good things happen. ... I'm just thankful that (Popovich) trusted me with the guys in that locker room, and that those guys trusted me back."
