

than two years. They have soil and sunshine and man-power—the United States has no monopoly on these assets. It seems to me that we should taper off on relief and send them such things as seed and plows, so they can go to work and shift for themselves.

The Book of Books says that man shall eat bread in the sweat of their own brows-and those people should begin to eat their bread in the sweat of their own brows instead of in the sweat of the brows of the American taxpayers. That, in essence, is what we understand the Marshall Plan to be.

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

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
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
