The ordeal began as a teenage summer adventure: The boys were last seen Friday afternoon buying \$110 worth of fuel near Jupiter and were believed to have been heading toward the Bahamas Thunderstorms and heavy rains were forecast in the Jupiter area later Friday afternoon. However, Coast Guard Capt. Mark Fedor called it "typical South Florida weather" that didn't provide an immediate answer to what happened to the teens. The Coast Guard was

alerted at 5 p.m. that the boys were overdue, and the search began. The 19-foot boat was found Sunday, capsized, off Ponce Inlet, more than 180 miles north of where the boys started their journey.

The search has continued, day and night, with areas of concentration moving based on the Gulf Stream and ocean conditions. Coast Guard officials have most recently been focusing on waters off northeast Florida and said they had no intention of quitting vet.

"Our intentions are to continue to search aggressively,' Fedor said Monday evening, adding that the decision is being reevaluated daily. Earlier Monday, Guard Coast Officer Steve Lehmann said the search was going on under "the highest level of optimism." He declined to say how long it would continue. Searchers were using helicopter, boat and airplane, and local authorities and the USS Carney also joined the efforts to locate the boys. "We need every clue

and we need everyone's help," Korniloff said. The teens' families

pledgeda\$100,000reward in the search and a famous neighbor - NFLHall of Famer Joe Namath — promised to continue searching local beaches in hopes of finding clues.

Hang gliding competition to begin this weekend

This weekend will begin the 2015 Hang Gliding National competition.

Hang gliders have been coming to Big Spring since 2001 thanks to the weather and the community said Belinda Boulter, spokesperson for the 2015 Hang Gliding Nationals.

"There are very few places in the world with such consistent, excellent flying conditions," said Boulter "And the support of the community is unique; no other place has a standing committee of non-pilots who work to provide the resources we need to put on an event like this, and even help in the launch. Visitors from other regions or other countries are always amazed at the genuine welcome we find in Big Spring and will agree there's no place like it."

The fun will kick off Saturday with the hang gliding competitors getting in some practice runs at 1 p.m. and 4 p.m.

Tandem hang gliding rides will be available throughout the competition most mornings and evenings, weather permitting. The cost of a tandem ride with a USHPA certified tandem instructor is \$100 and the video of the flight will be available for \$40. Space and availability will be limited and offered on a first come first served basis. For reservations contact Lori Brown at 352-874-5742.

The competition itself will take place from Aug. 2 through Aug. 8. The tow lifts will begin around noon and the competition start time will be around 2 p.m.

"The actual starting line is an imaginary circle with a radius of perhaps three or six miles, centered around the airport. Once in the air, the pilots stay inside the circle until the official start time," said Boulter.

Each day's task for the competition will alter throughout the week and the competitors will go over these tasks each morning at their briefing.

The community is invited and encouraged to come watch the hang gliders compete. The city provides shaded bleachers at the McMahon-Wrinkle Airpark and there will be restrooms, food and drinks available to the public inside the airport terminal to make the event enjoyable for





Libyan court sentences Gadhafi's son, Seif al-Islam, to death over killings in 2011 uprising

TRIPOLI, Libya (AP) — A court in Libya's capital sentenced a son of Moammar Gadhafi to death in absentia on Tuesday over killings during the country's 2011 uprising.

The Tripoli court that sentenced Seif al-Islam, who is being held by a militia that refuses to hand him over to the government, central also sentenced to death eight others, including former Libyan spy chief Abdullah al-Senoussi. It was unclear whether the sentences would be carried out.

Libya has slid into chaos since the overthrow and killing of Gadhafi. It is now bitterly divided between an elected parliament and government cornered in the country's east, with little power on the ground, and an Islamist militia-backed government in the west that has seized Tripoli.

Since the end of the civil war, Seif al-Islam has been held by a militia in Zintan, which is allied with the Tobrukbased internationally recognized government against the Tripoli one. He is also wanted by the International Criminal Court in The Hague on crimes charges of against humanity.

Charges in the trial included recruiting mercenaries who were given Libyan nationality, planning and carry-

Obama closes Africa trip with first speech to African Union by sitting American president

ADDIS ABABA, Ethiopia (AP) President Barack Obama highlighted his administration's efforts to combat hunger worldwide on Tuesday as he prepared to end a historic return to the land of his father's birth with a speech to the African Union.

Obama toured a plant operated by Faffa Foods, which participates in the U.S. Feed the Future program. The initiative focuses on helping smaller farmers in 19 countries, including Ethiopia and 11 other African nations, grow their businesses.

Faffa, in the Ethiopian capital, is the chief supplier of baby food for children in Ethiopia, where child malnutrition is a serious prob-

Obama said the "huge percentage" Africans who still get their income from agriculture can improve their yields with a few interventions. He said a woman he met at the factory had increased her yield threefold, providing enough money for her to buy a cow and send her children to school.

At Shiite militia 'summer camps', Iraqi children undergo training to fight Islamic State

BAGHDAD(AP) - Aquiet middle-class Shiite neighborhood in western Baghdad was transformed recently into a mini-boot camp, training teenagers for battle against the Islamic State

The Shiite boys and young men ran through normally placid streets carrying mock exercises urban warfare since the toughest battles against the Sunni extremists are likely to involve street fighting. They were taught how to hold, control and aim light weapons, though they didn't fire them.

In cities from Baghdad to Basra, summer camps set up by the Popular Mobilization Forces, Iraq's largest militia umbrella group, training teens and boys as young as middle school age after the country's top Shiite cleric issued an edict calling on students to use their school vacations to prepare for battle if they are needed.

With dozens of such camps around the country, hundreds of students have gone through the training though it is impossible to say how many went on to fight the Sunni extremists since those who do so go independently. around 200 cadets in a training class visited by The Associated Press, about half were under the age of 18, with some as young as 15. Several said they intended to join their fathers and older brothers on the front lines.

Boy Scouts of America to allow gay adult leaders: church-run units can keep the exclusion

NEW YORK (AP) -The Boy Scouts of America has ended its blanket ban on gay adult leaders but will allow church-sponsored Scout units to maintain the exclusion for religious

The new policy, aimed at easing a controversy that has embroiled the Boy Scouts for years, takes effect immediately. It was approved Monday by the BSA's Executive National Board on a 45-12 vote during a closed-to-themedia teleconference.

"For far too long this issue has divided and distracted us," BSA's president, former Secretary Defense Robert Gates, said. "Now it's time to unite behind our shared belief in the extraordinary power of Scouting to be a force for good."

Initial reactions to the decision from groups on both sides suggested the issue would remain divisive.

The Mormon church, which sponsors more Scout units that any other organization, said it was "deeply troubled" by the decision. Church officials suggested they would look into the possibility of forming their own organization to replace Boy Scouts.

CARROLLTON, Ga. John Russell Houser's mental problems were well known to many, though perhaps not to the store that sold him the .40-caliber handgun used in a deadly attack on a Louisiana movie theater. A federal background check came back clean, the pawn shop said, with no red flags raised at the time of sale.

Yet Houser's own family worried he was dangerous in 2008 and sought court protection. His wife was so worried that she removed his guns from their home, her attorney said. A probate judge in Georgia signed an order allowing sheriff's deputies to detain Houser and bring him to a hospital for a mental evaluation.

But the judge who ordered Houser detained said Monday that she did not — and legally could not — have him involuntarily committed. That may explain why he was able to legally purchase the gun used to kill Jillian Johnson and Mayci Marie Breaux in a theater in Lafayette. He wounded nine others before killing himself.

Houser's case underscores concerns raised in the aftermath of other mass shootings involving suspects with mental health issues — and the gaps in the system meant to "red-flag" people ill-suited to own or carry a firearm.

Funeral services for Johnson and Breaux were held Monday. Johnson was remembered as an artist who worked to beautify her neighborhood Breaux was looking forward to a new job and married life with a longtime boyfriend.

Satirical Broadway musical 'The Book

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of Mormon' finally comes to heart of Mormonlandia

SALT LAKE (AP) — The biting satirical musical that mocks Mormons has finally come to the heart of Mormonlandia, starting a sold-out, two-week run Tuesday at a Salt Lake City theater two blocks from the church's flagship temple and headquarters.

The Tony Awardwinning "The Book of Mormon" has earned rave reviews while appalling some with its crudeness. But this will mark the first time the show's gleefully naive missionaries come to Utah, where about twothirds of residents are estimated to Mormon.

The show's creators, Trey Parker and Matt Stone of "South Park" told The Associated Press that bringing the show to Salt Lake City feels like validation, and also brings the creative process full circle.

Parker and Stone used to "trip out" on Mormon stuff while taking Temple Square tours in the 1990s. They made their first research trip for the show to Salt Lake City with fellow creator Bobby Lopez in the mid-2000s. They waited to bring the show to Salt Lake City until they were invited by a the-



une this year was but a prelude to our next encounters. Broken bones, pellet and BB holes were the primary injuries seen concerning adult Mississippi kites. Knowing July and August would bring infants and fledglings, we and other rehabbers braced for the youngest of the specie.

After celebrations of "The

After celebrations of "The 4th" had faded, phone calls began. By the 10th of July, we had a nestling, a fledgling

and a juvenile molting into its adult plumage. After escorting the trio to a volunteer from South Plains in Lubbock, we anticipated more to come.

By July 16,, another nestling and fledgling had

arrived. Found in someone's yard, the youngest was covered with white down.

McCasland

Eager to leave the nest area, and also found in a residential neighborhood, the older bird didn't look anything like its parents, even though it had replaced its natal down with plumage. Its white head was streaked with black. Marked with rusty-brown hues, its creamy breast was a notable contrast to its gray wings and darker primaries.

Whatever their youthful

adventures had been, the nestling and fledgling had found themselves alone, and far away from their familiar nesting area. Both had been dependent upon their parents for food and protection.

Without being able to adopt their parents' behavior and guidance in the weeks to come, the twosome's success in migrating to South

America in the fall was questionable.

Along with the arrival of youngsters also came a few phone calls.

"Dive-bombing" swoops from treetops by protective parents with young in the nest were worrisome.

The callers then learned of another incident several years ago.

Western kingbirds made an impressive assault on county residents trying to enter the courthouse from the east. To prevent someone from falling on the descending, curving sidewalk, county officials locked that entry for nearly

two weeks until the adult birds succeeded in luring their young from the nesting area to other environs.

For the few residents that were encountering this problem with kites came an easy solution.

Most had umbrellas

Most had umbrellas, though seldom used. Opened, the contraptions were perfect for fending off the flight of an outraged avian parent.

With the feeding of the nestling and the fledgling during the day came the realization that both would, in the new year, soon resemble their parents.

Their heads would become a light gray accented with

dark eye patches and red eyes.

The soft, darker gray of their bodies, and charcoal colored wing parts and tail would give them a striking appearance.

The twosome would also be given to a volunteer from South Plains. Upon arrival, they would begin the lengthy process toward release. By the last of August, or even mid-September, they could hopefully be riding thermals, soaring, and beginning the process of migrating for a rendezvous with other members of their specie in South America.

The care of young kites will

always be a yearly occurrence for a rehabber. The intensity of the birds' arrivals lessens by mid-August.

By the last of that month, summer skies usually lack the delightful whistling, "phee-phew," "phee-phew," heard previously from high above. To know that the young raptors have an opportunity to attain the skills, graceful maneuvers, and flight abilities of adult birds is encouraging.



Minor league meet Mondays from 5:30 to 7:00 at night and the Major league will meet on Thursdays at the same time.



Rangers host birthday bash for A-Rod in 6-2 loss to Yankees

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Alex Rodriguez had a 40th birthday bash against his former team in Texas, where the Rangers have little to celebrate these days.

While A-Rod became only the fourth major league player to homer in his 40s after also doing so as a teenager, the Rangers lost for the 11th time their last 12 home games, dropping the series opener against the New York Yankees 6-2 on Monday night.

"I'm not going to sit here and say this is a mental thing. I've never seen it before but I don't believe this is a mental thing and don't think this is a mental thing," manager Jeff Banister said. "They're going to show up in the own ballpark, in their own lockers, in their home uniform in front of their fans and come out here and play. It's not anything other than that."

Still, the Rangers had won four of their previous five games — all on the road. Their 16-27 home record is worst in the majors.

Matt Harrison (1-2) allowed six runs in six-plus innings in the lefty's third start after spinal fusion surgery.

"I feel like I didn't get loose until about the fifth inning," he said.

"The third inning I made some bad pitches to start that inning off and got some trouble there. After us scoring the two runs I went and gave it back to them, gave the momentum right back to them."

Josh Hamilton had a two-out single in the second and scored on Elvis Andrus' double for Texas before a single by Leonys Martin made

Didi Gregorius had a career-high four RBIs and matched his best with three hits. He hit a two-run homer in the third before Brendan Ryan tripled and scored on Chris Young's sac fly to put the Yankees ahead to stay. Gregorious' two-run single in the seventh made it 6-2, a batter after Harrison was pulled from the

New York led 4-2 after A-Rod's opposite-field liner into the right-field seats in the sixth.

"It's amazing, hitting one as a teenager and hitting one here today," Rodriguez said. "A lot has happened, and I'm just happy to be here."

Ty Cobb, Rusty Staub and Gary Sheffield are the only other players to homer before turning 20 and then at age 40 or after, according to STATS.

Rodriguez has 24 homers this season and 678 in his career, fourth on the all-time list. The latest came two days after he went deep three times against Minnesota, in his previous game.

It was A-Rod's big league-best sixth homer on his birthday, STATS said, breaking a tie with Todd Helton, Chipper Jones, Derrek Lee and Al Simmons.

When Rodriguez was traded to the Yankees before spring training in 2004, he was only three All-Star seasons the \$252 million, 10-year contract he signed with Texas after starting his career with Seattle from 1994-2000.

Ivan Nova (3-3) allowed two runs and five hits in five innings. Chasen Shreve, Justin Wilson and Dellin Betances followed with hitless re-

Welter played linebacker for more than 14 seasons in the Women's Football Alliance, mostly with the Dallas Diamonds, where she helped the team win four championships. Welter holds a master's degree in sports psychology. A rugby player at Boston College, she also earned two gold medals on Team USA at the International Federation of Football Women's World Championships in 2009 and 2013.

A news conference was scheduled for Tuesday to introduce Welter and Levon Kirkland, a former Pro Bowl linebacker who is the inaugural participant in the Bill Bidwill Coaching Fellowship established to give recently retired NFL players a chance to coach in the league. He

will work with outside linebackers for the next two seasons.

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

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

In the actual case, this approach would succeed if declarer went along with your scheme by playing his king at trick two. He could cash eight tricks in a row, but would then run out of steam and finish down one.

But South can defuse your scheme by ducking the queen of spades when you lead it. He might see what you are trying to do and apply the suitable countermeasure by allowing your queen to win the trick

Once declarer does this, he wil inevitably prevail, but you should nevertheless feel satisfied that you gave your all to stop the contract and unfortunately met a foeman worthy of your steel.


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



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Rockies trade SS Troy Tulowitzki to Blue Jays

DENVER (AP) — After all that speculation the past couple of years, the Colorado Rockies finally traded Troy Tulowitzki.

Surprising spot, too north of the border to a team loaded with bats.

Tulowitzki was sent to the Toronto Blue Jays for Jose Reyes and three pitching prospects late Monday night in a stunning swap of star shortstops, according to a person with knowledge of the situation.

The person spoke to The Associated Press on condition of anonymity early Tuesday because the deal had not yet been announced.


In addition to Tulowitzki, the Rockies sent 42-year-old reliever LaTroy Hawkins to the Blue Jays.

Along with Reyes, the Rockies picked up rookie reliever Miguel Castro and two minor league pitchers in a blockbuster transaction - the biggest yet in the days leading up to Friday's trade deadline. FoxSports.com first report-

ed the sides agreed to a swap involving Tulowitzki, Reyes and minor leaguers. The talented but oft-injured

Tulowitzki is a five-time All-Star who is hitting .300 with 12 homers and 53 RBIs in 87 games this season. He helped the Rockies reach the World Series as a rookie in 2007. Tulowitzki was replaced on

defense in the bottom of the ninth inning during Colorado's 9-8 loss to the Cubs in



Shortstop Troy Tulowitzki, a five-time All-Star, was traded to Toronto after spending his first 10 years with Colorado.

Chicago on Monday night. After the game, the slugger spent at least 30 minutes in manager Walt Weiss' office at Wrigley Field, but was unavailable to reporters. The deal gives Toronto (50-

50) another powerful, righthanded bat in a dangerous lineup that includes Jose Bautista, Josh Donaldson, Edwin Encarnacion and Russell Martin. The Blue Jays, by far the highest-scoring team in the majors, sit three games behind Minnesota in the race for the second AL wild card.

They are tied for second place in the AL East, seven games back of the New York Yankees. Toronto has not reached the playoffs since winning the 1993 World Series — the longest drought of any major league team.

Donaldson bid farewell to Reyes on his Twitter account: "Going to miss my boy. ... Once a brother always a brother."

Reyes is batting .285 with four homers, RBIs and 16 steals in 69 games. He was acquired by Toronto in November 2012 trade with Miami.

The face of Colorado's franchise, 30-year-old lowitzki spent his entire career with the Rockies (42-55)

but has been the subject of trade talk for some time. Still, the Blue Jays seemed an unlikely destination.

"Tremendous player," Giants manager Bruce Bochy said in San Francisco. "Sometimes you're surprised when you have a guy like Tulo who's so iconic in Colorado." Before the 2011 season, Colo-

rado made a big commitment to Tulowitzki by agreeing to a contract that guaranteed him \$132 million over seven seasons from 2014-20. The deal included a \$14 million team option for 2021 with a \$4 million buyout.

Combined with his previous deal, it meant the Rockies agreed to pay Tulowitzki \$157.75 million over 10 years. The plan was to build around him and outfielder Carlos Gonzalez, who signed an \$80 million, seven-year contract around the same time.

"I don't worry about it. I've been through it multiple times. My job is to play for the Rockies. I signed up to play here for a long time. Until they tell me differently, which they

With the Tulowitzki trade, Gonzalez might be next - especially considering how hot he's been at the plate lately after an injury-riddled 2014 season.

The speedy Reyes is signed through 2017 on a \$106 million, six-year contract he received from Miami. A four-time All-Star with

the New York Mets, Reyes also has struggled with injuries throughout his career. Hawkins is 2-1 with a 3.63

ERA in 24 games and is headed to his 11th major league There's no doubting the hit-

ting prowess of the 6-foot-3 Tulowitzki. Staying healthy has been his biggest challenge. During his career, he's had stints on the disabled list for a quadriceps tendon tear,

lacerated right hand, broken left wrist and a groin injury.

Last season, Tulowitzki played only 91 games before undergoing hip surgery.

This year, he's been injuryfree, with Weiss resting him on occasion to save wear and tear. Tulowitzki was out of the lineup Sunday, which would've been his last appearance at Coors Field in a Rockies uniform.

Asked about Friday's nonwaiver trade deadline before leaving town, Tulowitzki responded: "I don't worry about it. I've been through it multiple times. My job is to play for the Rockies. I signed up to play here for a long time. Until they tell me differently, which they haven't, I plan on being here."

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


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
