Warrant issued in hit-and-run

Suspect considered armed, dangerous

Big Spring Police are searching for a man allegedly involved with a hit-and-run accident occurring in early June which resulted in the death of a 47-year-old Big Spring resident.

On Tuesday, an arrest warrant for manslaughter was issued for Bradley Cecil Segers, 45, in the hit-and-run accident on June 7 which caused the death of Tiodoro Diaz.

"The warrant was the result of an extensive investigation by the Big Spring Police Department Criminal Investigation Division," said Big Spring Police Lt. Brian Gordon in a news release. "The Big Spring Police Department Criminal Investigation Division had executed a search warrant at Segers' residence and located the vehicle

BSISD: Parents need to verify enrollment, immunization data within next few days

With August just around the corner, summer break is winding down to its last few weeks and preparations to return for a new school year are now ramping up for Big Spring ISD.

Pre-K and new student enrollment

Pre-kindergarten registration for the 2015-2016 school year will begin Monday and run through Aug. 7. Enrollment for kindergarten and

new students began July 20 and continues through Aug. 20.

Parents can register their child at the Records and Registration office, 1109 S. Benton, between the hours of 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. In order to complete the process, parents must have student's official birth certificate, shot record, Social Security card, proof of residence – a recent utility bill or a bank statement showing the address will suffice – the parent or guardian's license, proof of guardianship and for pre-k only the last three pay stubs for all incoming earning members of the

household.

Address Verification and Meet the Teacher Night

Parents or guardians of Big Spring ISD students entering grades first through fourth will need to bring proof of residency to their child's school campus on or before Friday, Aug. 14.

"This information is needed before the school's administration can place students on classroom rosters," said George Bancroft, Big

Burglars pilfer narcotics from pharmacy

Burglars hit Leonard's Pharmacy this week walking away with thousands of pills.

Pharmacy owner Larry McLellan said police are searching for two suspects who stole about 14,000 tablets of various medications.

"They knew what they were looking for," McLellan said. "The narcotics cabinet has four locked doors and they broke all four. They took Hydrocodone, amphetamines, Adderall and Oxycodone."

The two suspects gained access to the building by breaking a window located in the front of the store and entered the business around 4:20 a.m. Monday, McLellan said. The pharmacy's alarm service had a 6 minute delay before notifying police, McLellan said.

The area was well lit, he added, and the window the suspects entered faces a busy street in town but that did not deter the thieves, McLellan said.

Video of the two suspects show they were wearing hoods and masks and calmly walked around the store, but McLellan said because the incident occurred in the dark the video is of poor quality.

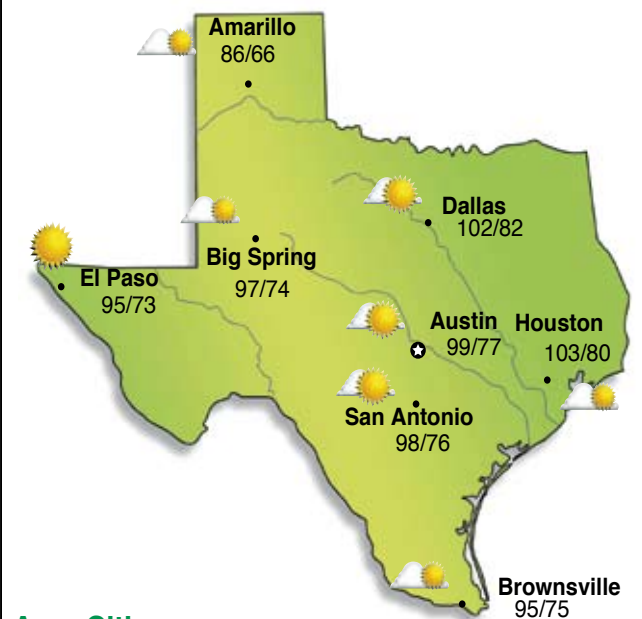

Man arrested in fatal shooting in San Angelo, body in street

SAN ANGELO, Texas (AP) — Police say a West Texas driver has been charged with killing an acquaintance who was hit while riding a bicycle and then fatally shot.

Tom Green County jail records show Stephano Culbreath of San Angelo was being held Thursday on murder and possession of a controlled substance charges.

San Angelo police are seeking a motive in the killing of David Titus, whose body was found last Saturday on a street.

Culbreath was arrested hours later when he drove near the crime scene and seemed preoccupied with the investigation. Police say they found methamphetamine in his SUV. The bumper had marks consistent with the bicycle.

Sandra Bland's arrest, death takes stage at Texas Capitol

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The arrest and death of Sandra Bland is bringing top state officials to the Texas Capitol to testify about jail standards and police officer protocols.

The hearing Thursday in Austin is the first time lawmakers are meeting to discuss the circumstances surrounding the death of the 28-year-old black woman from suburban Chicago. Authorities say Bland on July 13 hanged herself in jail, a finding that her family has questioned.

Bland was in custody for allegedly assaulting a white Texas trooper who on July 10 pulled her over in Waller County for an improper lane change.

The Texas House Committee on County Affairs is now taking a new look at jail procedures and interactions with the police and the general public.

Texas Rangers and FBI are continuing to investigate Bland's death.

Louisiana man convicted in Texas of mystery shoppers fraud

TYLER, Texas (AP) — A Louisiana man has been convicted in a \$1 million mail fraud scheme involving bogus checks to so-called mystery shoppers.

Heesham Broussard of Lake Charles, Louisiana, was convicted in Texas of conspiracy to commit mail fraud, two counts of mail fraud and two counts of aggravated identity theft.

Prosecutors in Tyler on Wednesday announced details of the scheme to distribute counterfeit postal money orders and checks. Broussard could be

sentenced to more than 60 years in a U.S. prison over the fraud linked to scammers in Nigeria.

that struck Mr. Diaz."

According to the release, Segers is approximately 5-foot, 5-inches tall and 140 pounds.

"It is also reported that Segers has recently shaved his head and beard in an attempt to disguise his identity. Segers has been reported to have said he is 'not going back to prison' and has armed himself with a handgun. Segers is considered armed and dangerous," Gordan stated. "Detectives have been unable to locate Segers and are asking for the help from our community."

"Right now we just hope everything goes well and the are able to catch him and it goes smoothly through the court system," said Adolpho Diaz, the brother of the victim this morning. "We are relieved that the police found out who did it. We just want them to catch him and justice is served through the court system.

Tiodoro was a life-long resident of Big Spring and a Big Spring High School graduate. He was a cook at TA Travel Center and the father of one daughter, Adolpho said. The brothers' 63-year-old mother moved back to Big Spring from Colorado after a death in the family and was living with Tiodoro at the time of the accident, Adolpho said.

AP Investigation: Olympic athletes to swim and boat in Rio waters awash in viruses, bacteria

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) — Athletes competing in next year's Summer Olympics here will be swimming and boating in waters so contaminated with human feces that they risk becoming violently ill and unable to compete in the games, an Associated Press investigation has found.

An AP analysis of water quality revealed dangerously high levels of viruses and bacteria from human sewage in Olympic and Paralympic venues — results that alarmed international experts and dismayed competitors training in Rio, some of whom have already fallen ill with fevers, vomiting and diarrhea.

It is the first independent comprehensive testing for both viruses and bacteria at the Olympic sites.

Brazilian officials have assured that the water will be safe for the Olympic athletes. But the government does not test for viruses.

Extreme water pollution is common in Brazil, where the majority of sewage is not treated. Raw waste runs through open-air ditches to streams and rivers that feed the Olympic water sites.

US official: Debris in Indian Ocean belongs to same type of aircraft as missing Malaysia plane

SYDNEY (AP) — A sea-crusted wing part washed up on an island in the western Indian Ocean may be the first trace of Malaysia Airlines Flight 370 since it vanished nearly a year and a half ago, and a tragic but finally solid clue to one of aviation's most perplexing and expensive mysteries.

Air safety investigators — one of them a Boeing investigator — have identified the component found on the French island of Reunion as a "flaperon" from the trailing edge of a Boeing 777 wing, the U.S. official said. Flight 370, which disappeared March 8, 2014, with 239 people on board, is the only 777 known to be missing.

"It's the first real evidence that there is a possibility that a part of the aircraft may have been found," said Australian Transport Minister Warren Truss, whose country is leading the search for the plane in a remote patch of ocean far off Australia's west coast. "It's too early to make that judgment, but clearly we are treating this as a major lead."

Flight 370 had been traveling from Kuala Lumpur to Beijing, but investigators believe based on satellite data that the plane turned south into the Indian Ocean after vanishing from radar. If the wing part is from the Malaysia plane, it would bolster that theory and put to rest others that it traveled north, or landed somewhere

after being hijacked.

The wing piece is about 2 meters (6 feet) long. Investigators have found a number on the part, but it is not a serial or registration number, Truss said. It could be a maintenance number, which may help investigators figure out what plane it belongs to, he said.

Top officials critical of Ohio police officer charged with murder in traffic stop case

CINCINNATI (AP) — This time, some of the sharpest criticism of a police officer after the slaying of an unarmed black man came from top law enforcement and city officials.

The Wednesday indictment of a University of Cincinnati police officer on a charge of murder in the traffic-stop shooting was applauded by officials in a city roiled by racial violence that erupted in 2001 after an unarmed black man was killed by Cincinnati police after a string of earlier shootings by officers.

The family of Samuel DuBose, 43, urged the community to remain calm, as it has in a series of demonstrations since the July 19 shooting by officer Ray Tensing, who is white. Tensing had stopped DuBose for a missing front license plate, which is required in Ohio but not in neighboring states.

DuBose's death comes amid months of national scrutiny of police dealings with African-Americans, especially those killed by officers. Authorities so far have not focused on race in the death of DuBose. City officials who have viewed the video said the traffic stop shouldn't have led to a shooting.

"This officer was wrong," Cincinnati Police Chief Jeffrey Blackwell said, adding that officers "have to be held accountable" when they're in the wrong.

Afghan Taliban indicate they are pulling out of new round of peace talks due in Pakistan

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) — The Afghan Taliban, who have been fighting to topple the Kabul government for almost 14 years, said on Thursday they are "not aware" of a new round of peace talks due the following day in Pakistan — a statement indicating the group may be pulling out of the negotiations.

The apparent rejection of the talks comes a day after Kabul announced the death of the Taliban's reclusive leader Mullah Mohammad Omar, but it was not immediately clear if the two developments were connected.

The Afghan intelligence service asserted Wednesday that Mullah Omar died in a Karachi hospital more than two years ago. In Washington, the U.S. government said they considered the

report of the Taliban leader's death credible, though it was not confirmed by the Taliban or Pakistan.

Afghan President Ashraf Ghani's office said Mullah Omar's death would strengthen conditions for the peace process, which has been his priority since he took office last year.

In Greece, push to bring back drachma adds unease to Tsipras' awkward alliance

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — Prime Minister Alexis Tsipras' power-sharing acrobatics look harder to perform by the day.

Opposition parties are propping up his left-wing government long enough to negotiate a new bailout and keep the country in the eurozone, while senior members of his own party, Syriza, have revived a campaign to bring back the drachma.

On Thursday, lead bailout negotiators are due in Athens. They will intensify a new round of talks for a massive third rescue package after Athens and lenders from other eurozone countries reached a bitterly fought compromise.

But Tsipras has a more pressing priority. He will be battling to keep control of Syriza at a meeting of the party's 200-member executive, facing dissenters who argue the Left has abandoned its principles over the past six months under the country's popular prime minister.

In new documentary, gay Palestinian men in Israel grapple with their sexual, national identity

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — During last summer's Gaza war, Khader Abu Seif was living with his then Israeli boyfriend in Tel Aviv, wondering whether Hamas rockets could reach them from the coastal strip.

He thought yet again of the dichot-

omy of his life as a gay Arab Israeli citizen considered an outcast by the Palestinian society for his sexuality and viewed with unease by some Israelis for his brand of nationality.

The rockets were not the only thing that made him feel unsafe.

Outside, Israeli extremists rallied on the streets against Hamas' attacks with chants of "Death to Arabs." Abu Seif was afraid to speak Arabic, his mother tongue, in his native Tel Aviv, the Middle East's most gay-friendly city.

For the 27-year-old, a well-known socialite in Tel Aviv's LGBT community, the city is a haven for gay men, but Abu Seif says he considers himself a Palestinian and that as such, he can never fully integrate.

Toyota's gliding 'human support robot' can pick up after elderly, help the sick

YOKOHAMA, Japan (AP) — Toyota's new robot that glides around like R2-D2 is devoted to a single task: picking things up.

HSR, short for "human support robot," comes with a single mechanical arm that can grasp objects of various shapes and sizes and also pick up smaller items with a tiny suction cup.

It doesn't have other tricks in its repertoire, except for a computer panel on its head for surfing the Internet. A person can also access the robot from another computer.

Kouichi Ikeda, its engineer, is serious about using it to help around regular homes. First people with disabilities, and then for the elderly in general. Picking up is especially challenging for people with spinal disorders and other ailments that hamper the ability to stoop down and grab.

"Although it can only do one simple task of picking up, it's already making disabled people quite happy. We're just getting started, but eventually we want it to enter people's homes," Ikeda said.

Pearson, who was also voted 1st team by the Texas High School Baseball Coaches Association, posted a .513 batting average last season. East had a successful junior campaign with a .418 batting average, 8-1 record as pitcher, and a 2.48 ERA while striking out 56 batters.

Phillies agree to trade Cole Hamels to Texas

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — After years of trade speculation, Cole Hamels' time in Philadelphia is ending.

Two people familiar with the deal say the Phillies have agreed to trade the ace left-hander to the Texas Rangers for a package of prospects.

Both people spoke to The Associated Press late Wednesday night on condition of anonymity because the trade had not been finalized. Hamels has a limited no-trade clause but does not have to approve a deal to the Rangers.

Hamels would become the first pitcher in major league history traded during a season immediately after throwing a no-hitter — he no-hit the Chicago Cubs on Saturday at Wrigley Field.

"He's definitely a great pitcher," Rangers first baseman Mitch Moreland said after Texas beat the New York Yankees 5-2 Wednesday. "Obviously watched the no-hitter the other day, pretty impressive. He's got a long track record of great success. It will be huge for us."

The 2008 World Series MVP was an integral part of the greatest run in franchise history

when the Phillies won five straight NL East titles, two pennants and one World Series from 2007-11.

"He's been here a long time, but that's baseball," Phillies catcher Carlos Ruiz said following an 8-2 loss at Toronto. "Definitely it's sad when you're around one of your teammates for a long time and then they have to go away."

The rebuilding Phillies, a big league-worst 38-64, traded All-Star closer Jonathan Papelbon to Washington on Tuesday. Both players made it clear they wanted to play for contenders.

Texas is seven games behind AL West-leading Houston and four games behind Minnesota for the AL's second wild-card spot.

There was thought the Phillies might wait to move Hamels in the offseason after recently hired executive Andy MacPhail officially replaces Pat Gillick, but general manager Ruben Amaro Jr. pulled the trigger with MacPhail's input.

Hamels was 114-90 with a 3.30 ERA in 10 seasons in Philadelphia.

Tanaka missing spots in NY Yankees' 5-2 loss at Rangers

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Masahiro Tanaka kept missing his spots for the New York Yankees.

Once the Japanese right-hander allowed the first three Texas batters to reach base and score, the Yankees never caught up.

Colby Lewis worked six innings for his 11th victory as the Rangers won 5-2 on Wednesday, a night after AL East-leading New York beat them 21-5.

Tanaka (7-4) had won his previous three starts, a stretch when he was the first Yankees pitcher since April 2013 to go at least seven innings in three consecutive victories. He struck out three and walked three, giving up four runs over six innings in Texas.

"It's not just the splitter. On all my pitches, I didn't have command tonight," Tanaka said through an interpreter. "It all comes down to mechanics. If my mechanics are there, the ball is coming off my hand efficiently. In the second inning, I wasn't getting the tight downfall that I wanted."

After the Yankees scored two runs in the second, nine fewer than in the same inning the previous night, the Rangers quickly responded.

"He didn't throw the split for strikes. When you get in bad counts, you can't get hitters to chase because they can be more selective.

His command was not great," manager Joe Girardi said. "I thought he kept us in the game tonight. That's what we ask of our starting pitchers. But we know he's capable of pitching better."

Adrian Beltre had a single to start the second, before Mitch Moreland walked and Josh Hamilton had the first of his two RBI singles. Texas went ahead after Shin-Soo Choo and Delino DeShields.

Beltre had two hits and scored twice for the Rangers, who won for only the second time in their last 14 home games.

Lewis (11-4) struck out five while scattering seven hits and allowing two runs. He hit a batter but didn't have a walk while winning his third consecutive start.

"Colby probably didn't have his best stuff, but Colby's probably best when he doesn't have his best stuff," manager Jeff Banister said. "I think he stays focused."

Shawn Tolleson worked a perfect ninth with two strikeouts for his 18th save in 19 chances.

Carlos Beltran led off the Yankees second with his eighth homer of the season. There were three consecutive two-strike, two-out singles — including Jacoby Ellsbury's for a 2-0 lead — before Brett Gardner's inning-ending fly ball.

New York had won four straight, and eight

leadoff single in the fifth and came home when Hamilton grounded into a double play. While scoring a run, the play ended the club record-matching nine consecutive games without a double play.

Dear Annie: I'd like to respond

hope this helps. -- Wide Awake
Dear Wide Awake: Thank you for the excellent resource. Narcolepsy isn't simply about insufficient sleep. It's a neurological disorder affecting the way the body regulates sleep-wake cycles. Information on narcolepsy is also available through the National Sleep Foundation (sleepfoundation.org). Anyone who is having problems staying awake should also speak to his or her physician and, if necessary, ask for a referral to a sleep clinic.

Contract Bridge

The bidding:

Some of the most sophisticated plays in bridge are forced upon declarer by the set of circumstances he encounters. Here is a case where South had to employ special measures to overcome a seemingly certain trump loser.

South opened the bidding with three spades, to which North responded five notrump. This was the Grand Slam Force, directing South to bid seven spades with two of the three top spade honors. South had no choice but to obey and so bid the grand slam.

Ordinarily, South would have made 13 tricks easily. But when he took the ace of hearts, the ace of spades, ruffed a heart and played the king of spades, he learned that East had started with the J-9-8-2 of trumps.

Declarer was now compelled to try for a trump coup, which offered the only chance to escape a trump loser. This meant he had to reduce his trump length to that of East by ruffing two of dummy's diamonds.

So South led a diamond to the king and ruffed a diamond, then led a club to the king and ruffed another diamond, reducing his trump holding to the Q-10, while East had the J-9.

When South next led a club to dummy's ace and started to run dummy's remaining diamonds, East found himself in a hopeless position. Declarer was certain to win the rest of the tricks regardless of when East elected to ruff, and the grand slam was home.

This Date In History

Today is Monday, July 27, the 208th day of 2015. There are 157 days left in the year.

Today's Highlights in History:

- On July 27, 1940, Bugs Bunny made his "official" debut in the Warner Bros. animated cartoon "A Wild Hare." Billboard magazine published its first "music popularity chart" (listing best-selling retail records (in first place was "I'll Never Smile Again" recorded by Tommy Dorsey and His Orchestra, with featured vocalist Frank Sinatra).
- On this date: In 1789, President George Washington signed a measure establishing the Department of Foreign Affairs, forerunner of the Department of State.
- In 1861, Union Maj. Gen. George B. McClellan took command of the Army of the Potomac during the Civil War.
- In 1921, Canadian researcher Frederick Banting and his assistant, Charles Best, succeeded in isolating the hormone insulin at the University of Toronto.
- In 1953, the Korean War armistice was signed at Panmunjom, ending three

years of fighting.

In 1960, Vice President Richard M. Nixon was nominated for president on the first ballot at the Republican national convention in Chicago.

In 1965, Shirley Ann Lawson of Auckland gave birth to four girls and a boy, the first quintuplets born in New Zealand.

In 1967, President Lyndon B. Johnson appointed the Kerner Commission to assess the causes of urban rioting, the same day black militant H. Rap Brown said in Washington that violence was "as American as cherry pie."

In 1974, the House Judiciary Committee voted 27-11 to adopt the first of three articles of impeachment against President Richard Nixon.

In 1980, on day 267 of the Iranian hostage crisis, the deposed Shah of Iran died at a military hospital outside Cairo, Egypt, at age 60.

In 1995, the Korean War Veterans Memorial was dedicated in Washington by President Bill Clinton and South Korean President Kim Young-sam.

In 1996, terror struck the Atlanta Olympics as a pipe bomb exploded at Centennial Olympic Park, directly killing one person and injuring 111. (Anti-government extremist Eric Rudolph later pleaded guilty to the bombing.)

In 2003, comedian Bob Hope died in Toluca Lake, California, at age 100.

Five years ago: BP announced that its much-criticized chief executive, Tony Hayward, would be replaced by Robert Dudley as the company reported a record quarterly loss and set aside \$32.2 billion to cover the costs of the massive Gulf of Mexico oil spill. Canadian character actor Maury Chaykin died in Toronto on his 61st birthday.

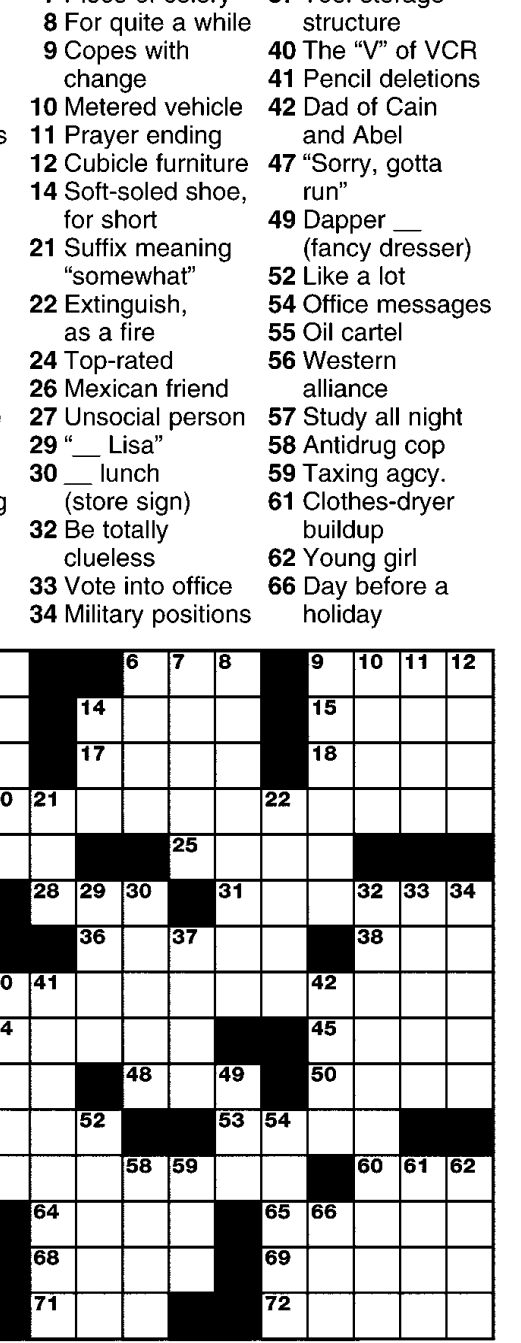

This Date In History

Today is Tuesday, July 28, the 209th day of 2015. There are 156 days left in the year.

Today's Highlights in History:

On July 28, 1945, a U.S. Army bomber crashed into the 79th floor of New York's Empire State Building, killing 14 people. The U.S. Senate ratified the United Nations Charter by a vote of 89-2.

On this date: In 1540, King Henry VIII's chief minister, Thomas Cromwell, was executed, the same day Henry married his fifth wife, Catherine Howard.

In 1655, French dramatist and novelist Cyrano de Bergerac, the inspiration for a play by Edmond Rostand, died in Paris at age 36.

In 1794, Maximilien Robespierre, a leading figure of the French Revolution, was sent to the guillotine.

In 1821, Peru declared its independence from Spain.

In 1914, World War I began as Austria-Hungary declared war on Serbia.

In 1915, more than 300 American sailors and Marines arrived in Haiti to restore order following the killing of Haitian

President Vibrun Guillaume Sam by rebels, beginning a 19-year U.S. occupation.

In 1932, federal troops forcibly dispersed the so-called "Bonus Army" of World War I veterans who had gathered in Washington to demand payments they weren't scheduled to receive until 1945.

In 1959, in preparation for statehood, Hawaiians voted to send the first Chinese-American, Republican Hiram L. Fong, to the U.S. Senate and the first Japanese-American, Democrat Daniel K. Inouye, to the U.S. House of Representatives.

In 1965, President Lyndon B. Johnson announced he was increasing the number of American troops in South Vietnam from 75,000 to 125,000 "almost immediately."

In 1976, an earthquake devastated northern China, killing at least 242,000 people, according to an official estimate.

In 1984, the Los Angeles Summer Olympics opened.

In 1995, a jury in Union, South Carolina, rejected the death penalty for Susan Smith, sentencing her to life in prison for drowning her two young sons (Smith will be eligible for parole in 2024).

Ten years ago: NASA said space shuttle Discovery had escaped any serious damage from a potentially deadly piece

of foam that broke off from the fuel tank during liftoff and looked safe to fly home in a week. The Irish Republican Army renounced the use of violence against British rule in Northern Ireland and said it would disarm. Lightning struck a group of Boy Scouts taking shelter from a storm in Sequoia National Park in California, killing an assistant troop leader and a teenage Scout.

Five years ago: U.S. District Judge Susan Bolton put most of Arizona's toughest-in-the-nation immigration law on hold just hours before it was to take effect. (In September 2012, Bolton ruled that police could enforce the so-called "show me your papers" provision of the law.)

This Date In History

Today is Wednesday, July 29, the 210th day of 2015. There are 155 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

- On July 29, 1890, artist Vincent van Gogh, 37, died of an apparently self-inflicted gunshot wound in Auvers-sur-Oise, France.
- On this date: In 1588, the English attacked the Spanish Armada in the Battle of Gravelines, resulting in an English victory.
- In 1900, Italian King Humbert I was assassinated by an anarchist; he was succeeded by his son, Victor Emmanuel III.
- In 1914, transcontinental telephone service in the U.S. became operational with the first test conversation between New York and San Francisco.
- Massachusetts' Cape Cod Canal, offering a shortcut across the base of the peninsula, was officially opened to shipping traffic.
- In 1921, Adolf Hitler became the leader ("fuhrer") of the National Socialist German Workers Party.
- In 1948, Britain's King George VI opened the Olympic Games in London.

In 1958, President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed the National Aeronautics and Space Act, creating NASA.

In 1965, The Beatles' second feature film, "Help!," had its world premiere in London.

In 1975, President Gerald R. Ford became the first U.S. president to visit the site of the Nazi concentration camp Auschwitz in Poland.

In 1981, Britain's Prince Charles married Lady Diana Spencer at St. Paul's Cathedral in London. (However, the couple divorced in 1996.)

In 1985, space shuttle Challenger began an 8-day mission that got off to a shaky start: the spacecraft achieved a safe orbit even though one of its main engines shut down prematurely after lift-off.

In 1994, abortion opponent Paul Hill shot and killed Dr. John Bayard Britton and Britton's bodyguard, James H. Barrett, outside the Ladies Center clinic in Pensacola, Florida. (Hill was executed in September 2003.)

In 2004, Sen. John Kerry accepted the Democratic presidential nomination at the party's convention in Boston with a military salute and the declaration: "I'm John Kerry and I'm reporting for duty."

Ten years ago: The U.N. Security Council unanimously adopted a U.S.-sponsored reso-

lution expanding U.N. sanctions against al-Qaida terrorists and Afghanistan's former Taliban rulers to affiliates and splinter groups. Cabaret singer Hildegard, whose career spanned almost seven decades, died in New York at age 99.

Five years ago: Army Spc. Bradley (now Chelsea) Manning was flown from a detention facility in Kuwait to the Marine Corps brig in Quantico, Virginia, to await trial on charges of giving military secrets to WikiLeaks. A House panel charged New York Democrat Charles Rangel with 13 counts of ethical misdeeds (he was later censured by the full House).

Today's Highlight in History:

On July 30, 1965, President Lyndon B. Johnson signed a measure creating Medicare, which began operating the following year.

On this date:

In 1729, Baltimore, Maryland, was founded.

In 1864, during the Civil War, Union forces tried to take Petersburg, Virginia, by exploding a gunpowder-laden mine shaft beneath Confederate defense lines; the attack failed.

In 1953, the Small Business Administration was founded.

In 1956, President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed a measure making "In God We Trust" the national motto, replacing "E Pluribus Unum" ("Out of many, one").

In 1963, the Soviet Union announced it had granted political asylum to Harold "Kim" Philby, the "third man" of a British spy ring.

In 1975, former Teamsters union president Jimmy Hoffa disappeared in suburban Detroit; although presumed dead, his remains have never been found.

In 1980, Israel's Knesset passed a law reaffirming all of Jerusalem as the capital of the Jewish state.

In 1990, British Conservative Party lawmaker Ian Gow was killed in a bombing claimed by the Irish Republican Army.

Ten years ago: President George W. Bush was pronounced "fit for duty" after a checkup that showed that the 59-year-old commander-in-chief, an avid mountain bike rider, had lost 8 pounds since his last physical exam in December 2004.

Five years ago: President Barack Obama toured Chrysler and General Motors assembly plants, where he offered an upbeat assessment of the U.S. auto industry a year after the big government bailouts. A 12-year-old Florida girl was seriously injured when she plunged about 100 feet to the ground from an amusement park free-fall ride in Lake Delton, Wisconsin. (Nets and air bags that were supposed to catch Teagan Marti (TEE'-gehn MAHR'-tee) had not been deployed.)

Astros regain lead in AL West with 6-3 win over Angels

HOUSTON (AP) — The Los Angeles Angels have certainly missed the big bat of Mike Trout in two straight losses to the Houston Astros.

Still, manager Mike Scioscia isn't using his absence as an excuse.

"He's a huge part of our offense, but if one guy is going to be out of the lineup you have to have a good enough one to go out and make things happen," he said.

Rookie Lance McCullers pitched seven solid innings and Preston Tucker and Jon Singleton both homered to help the Astros to a 6-3 victory over the Angels on Wednesday night to regain first place in the American League West.

Houston won the first two games of the series to move one game ahead

of the Angels, who came into town leading the division.

Conor Gillaspie's RBI triple put the Angels up early, but they were unable to string hits together after that with Trout out again with a left wrist injury.

McCullers (5-3) allowed five hits and one run with five strikeouts to lower his ERA to 2.48.

The Astros trailed by one before a two-run fifth, capped by an RBI single by Jose Altuve made it 2-1. Tucker hit a solo homer in the sixth and Singleton's shot came in the seventh to push the lead to 4-1.

Los Angeles starter Garrett Richards (10-8) yielded seven hits and four runs in 6 1-3 innings.

Richards said he was done in by his mistakes,

not the hitting of the Astros, who lead the majors with 140 homers.

"That's kind of how they've been going all year," he said. "They depend on the long ball. I got to be better. Bottom line. I'm not going to give them any credit. I've got to be better."

The Astros added two runs in the eighth inning on a sacrifice fly by Hank Conger and an RBI single by Singleton.

Albert Pujols hit his 30th home run of the season off Luke Gregerson to cut the lead to 6-2 in the ninth inning. It made him just the sixth player in major league history to hit 30 homers in at least 13 seasons and the only one to do it in his first 15 seasons.

Johnny Giavotella added an RBI single

with two outs in the inning, but he retired Carlos Perez to end the game.

Luis Valbuena doubled to lead off the bottom of the fifth, advanced to third on a wild pitch and scored on a sacrifice fly by Colby Rasmus to tie it at 1-1. Houston took a 2-1 lead on an infield single by Altuve, which extended his hitting streak at Minute Maid Park to 18 games, a record for the park.

Tucker added a run for the Astros with a homer to start the sixth.

Singleton's shot chased Richards with one out in the seventh and pushed the lead to 4-1. It was the first home run in the majors this season for Singleton, who hit 17 at Triple-A Fresno before he was called up on June 26.

Erick Aybar doubled with one out in the second and scored on a two-out triple by Gillaspie to make it 1-0.

The Angels got both of their new acquisitions in the lineup on Wednesday, with David DeJesus starting in Trout's place in center field and David Murphy playing left field. DeJesus was traded from Tampa Bay and Murphy from Cleveland on Tuesday.

"The chemistry of this lineup I think will develop quickly because I think we have some veteran guys who know what they can do," Scioscia said. "Tonight was not exactly what we were looking for but I think we're going to be fine on the offensive side."

AP Investigation: Filthy Rio water a threat at 2016 Olympics

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) — The waters where Olympians will compete in swimming and boating events next summer in South America's first games are rife with human sewage and present a serious health risk for athletes, as well as for visitors to the iconic beaches of Rio de Janeiro.

An Associated Press investigation found dangerously high levels of viruses and bacteria from sewage in venues where athletes will compete in the 2016 Olympic and Paralympic water sports.

In the first independent comprehensive testing for both viruses and bacteria at the Olympic sites, the AP conducted four rounds of tests starting in March. The results have alarmed international experts and dismayed competitors training in Rio, some of whom have already fallen ill with fevers, vomiting and diarrhea.

These ailments could knock an athlete out for days, potentially curtailing Olympics dreams and the years of hard training behind them.

"This is by far the worst water quality we've ever seen in our sailing careers," said Ivan Bulaja, a coach for the Austrian team, which has spent months training on the Guanabara Bay. "I am quite sure if you swim in this water and it goes into your mouth or nose that quite a lot of bad

things are coming inside your body."

Sailor David Hussl has already fallen ill.

"I've had high temperatures and problems with my stomach," Hussl said. "It's always one day completely in bed and then usually not sailing for two or three days."

Water pollution has long plagued Brazil's urban areas, where most sewage isn't collected, let alone treated. In Rio, much of the waste runs through open-air ditches to fetid streams and rivers that feed the Olympic water sites and blight the city's picture postcard beaches.

Dr. Richard Budgett, the medical director for the International Olympic Committee, said after seeing the AP findings that the IOC and Brazilian authorities should stick to their program of testing only for bacteria to determine whether the water is safe for athletes, as that is the accepted norm globally.

"We've had reassurances from the World Health Organization and others that there is no significant risk to athlete health," he told the AP on the sidelines of an IOC meeting in Malaysia.

He went on to

say that "there will be people pushing for all sorts of other tests, but we follow the expert advice and official advice on how to monitor water effectively."

experts in the U.S. and Europe are pushing regulatory agencies to include viral testing in determining water quality because the majority of illnesses from recreational water activities are related to viruses, not bacteria.

Brazilian authorities pledged that a major overhaul of the city's waterways would be among the Olympics' most significant legacies. But the stench of raw sewage still greets travelers arriving at Rio's international airport. Prime beaches remain deserted because the surf is thick with putrid sludge, and periodic die-offs leave the Olympic lake littered with rotting

fish.

More than 10,000 athletes hailing from over 200 countries are expected to compete in the Aug. 5-21, 2016, games. Nearly 1,400 of them will come into contact with waters contaminated by rampant sewage pollution, as they sail in the Guanabara Bay; swim off of Copacabana Beach; and canoe and row on the brackish waters of the Rodrigo de Freitas Lake. And starting next week, hundreds of athletes will take to the waters in Olympic trial events.

Brazilian officials insist the waters will be safe, but the AP testing over five months found not one venue fit for swimming or boating, according to international experts, who say it's too late for a cleanup.

"What you have there is basically raw sewage," said

John Griffith, a marine biologist at the independent Southern California Coastal Water Research Project. Griffith examined the protocols, methodology and results of the AP tests. "It's all the water from the toilets and the showers and whatever people put down their sinks, all mixed up, and it's going out into the beach waters."

In the U.S., Griffith said, areas with such levels of contamination "would be shut down immediately."

Brazilian officials who oversee water quality at the Olympic sites said they are not monitoring for viruses.

But Leonardo Daemon, coordinator of water quality monitoring for the state's environmental agency, said officials are strictly following Brazilian regulations on water quality.

Reality TV show unveils life as a trainer of animal actors

LOS ANGELES (AP) — For years, Bill Berloni has taught his dogs to play make believe. Now, he's making it real.

The trainer teaches rescue dogs to beg, bark and bow or sit, stand and shake for movies, TV and the Broadway stage. Once the animal actors retire, he brings them home to join his 30 dogs, one cat, farm animals and singing macaw that swears like a sailor.

He is bringing the motley crew to reality TV in "From Wags to Riches with Bill Berloni," the Discovery Family Channel's first original series, debuting next week.

Berloni's stable of stars — all found from shelters — have appeared in Broadway shows, touring companies, special events, the New York City Ballet, movies, television and commercials. He estimates he's rescued 150 dogs since 1977.

Berloni, 58, who was recognized by the Tony Awards for excellence in the theater, has been approached about a real-

ity series before. He says he gave this one the green light because "there aren't many shows about good people doing good things."

Some animal-welfare groups denounce animals in entertainment, but Berloni believes dogs were made for show business. He says he would never train a wild animal, but he does transform rough-and-tumble pooches into top actors.

He rescued a Chihuahua named Chico, who went on to play Bruiser in "Legally Blonde: The Musical," when he was prone to biting and about to be euthanized at the pound. Berloni worked with Chico until he could bark on cue and run into his carrier whenever an actress says, "White shoes after Labor Day."

Now, the tiny pooch that sleeps in the crook of his arm.

"Chico lives for me, and you can't help but respond to that. It is a huge responsibility," the self-taught trainer said.

Dogs are hardest to train for the stage, Berloni said. Unlike TV

and film, there is no editing button, and it's impossible to mask distractions from audiences and actors.

The dog he trained to play Sandy in the original stage production of "Annie" in 1977 eyeballed the audience as theatergoers in the front row were munching on fried chicken. But Sandy didn't leave the stage, Berloni said.

"Annie" was a huge hit, and Sandy became the longest-running dog actor on Broadway — she didn't miss a performance in seven years.

Sandy gave Berloni his start training celebrity dogs. He was working at an opera house in Connecticut, where he and his family live on a farm in Higganum, when a producer asked him to find and train the dog for "Annie."

Things are a bit less glamorous on the reality show, which is wrapping up its first four episodes.

At home, Berloni's salty macaw rules the roost. The bird named Kevin turns the kitchen sink into his stage, belting out tunes such as "Tomorrow" and "It's Raining Men." Despite

his outrageous personality, Kevin has never acted, unlike his fellow pets.

"He is only a star in our living room," Berloni said.

Co-executive producer Sarah T. Davies says the show stands out for its simple moments: A group of dogs playing in the snow; a massive St. Bernard getting a bath; his wife and daughter competing to bake the best dog biscuits.

"I do regard him as a real-life Dr. Doolittle," Davies said.

Berloni says he's focused on improving animals' lives rather than the camera crews, but fame is nothing new. He had to confront it even at his daughter's preschool about a decade ago.

"They called us in and said our daughter had a vivid imagination. They said she told them I was at 'Sesame Street' playing with Elmo. I told them I was," Berloni said.

Future unsure for troubled New Mexico green chile production

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — Green chiles have defined New Mexico for generations, gaining fans and fame around the globe.

However, as this year's harvest begins, labor shortages, shrinking acreage, drought and foreign competition have hurt production in the state.

Farmers and producers say the problems reveal the need for changes in the industry.

To rejuvenate production, investors and

inventors are testing machines that would harvest and de-stem the crop.

The delicate chiles are now picked by hand, and problems with bruising and the removal of stems have made it difficult to make the transition to machines.

"The labor force is getting older and not a lot of young people are getting into the business," said Ed Ogaz, owner of the Anthony, New Mexico-based chile wholesaler Seco Spice Co. "Something needs

to happen."

Ogaz prefers the old ways and believes farmers need more laborers to improve production as acreage dedicated to chile production has fallen to a 43-year low in the state.

Chile has been a staple of New Mexico cuisine for centuries, and the Hatch region has become world famous for its flavorful hot peppers.

Chile is also the state vegetable and the basis of the official state question, "red or green?"

In recent years, researchers at New Mexico State University have been trying to solve the labor issue by developing machines for the harvest.

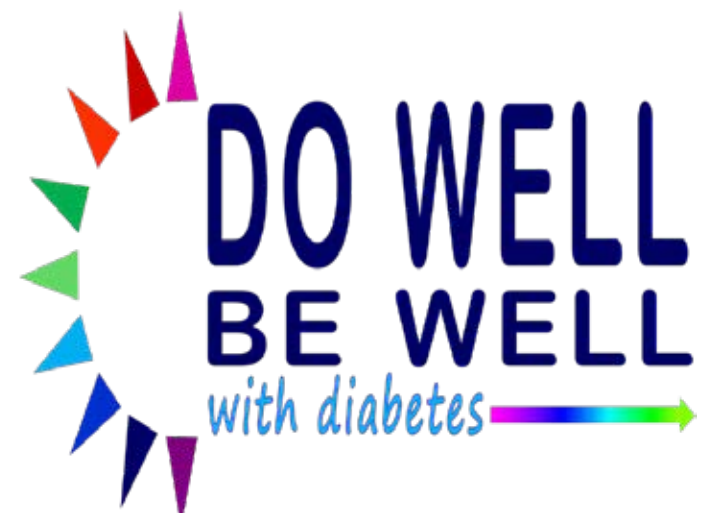
