BSPD officer commended for emergency stop

A Big Spring police officer has been commended for his actions during an unconventional traffic stop Thursday.

Police were attempting to stop a motor vehicle after it hit another automobile in the 2600 block of South Gregg about 6:30 a.m. Thursday.

Officers responded and located the vehicle traveling northbound in the 400 block of Lamesa Highway. They attempted a traffic stop using lights and sirens, but the vehicle did not

After making visual contact with the driver, officers found him to be slumped over and non-responsive.

"At this time, the decision was made to position a police unit in front of the suspect vehicle, and utilize the police unit to stop the vehicle," a news release from Big Spring

Residents protest ISD's proposed FY '16 tax rate

Even with budgeted increase, school district to carry \$1.5 million deficit, officials claim

Taxes have been on the minds of many lately.

On one side, a group of citizens have banded together requesting taxing entities not raise more revenue than this past taxing year. Their motivation, they say, comes from a hike in property values around the county. On the other side are taxing entities caught up in balancing budgets through a slowing oil and gas economy, a drop in values and an unsympathetic state legislature that continues to cut funding to local communities.

The two sides came together in polite but pointed discourse Thursday during Big Spring Independent School District's public tax hearing. "The new inflated tax valuations have placed a burden on the property tax owners in this district that has never happened before," said Scott Emerson during the public

comment portion of the hear-

ing. "The year 2015-2016 poses

Flag raised over U.S. embassy in Cuba

HAVANA — The Stars and Stripes rose Friday over the newly opened U.S. Embassy for the first time in 54 years, making a symbolically charged victory lap for the Obama administration's new policy of engagement with Some waking as early as

6 a.m., hundreds of Cubans gathered outside the embassy for what they universally called a historic day. Cuban TV carried the event live, broadcasting flattering biographical facts about Secretary of State John Kerry and interviews with Cubans who praised detente with the U.S. as a necessary and positive step for their country. Cuban dissidents were not

invited to the embassy ceremony, avoiding tensions with Cuban officials who typically boycott events attended by the country's small political opposition. State Department said it had





half-century-old American claims over confiscated property after the Cuban revolution. Cuba has its own claims, as noted in a newspaper column by Fidel Castro on Thursday saying the U.S. owes the island "numerous millions of dollars" for damages caused by the embargo. "We have diplomatic

relations; now we can get to the real work," said Wayne Smith, a retired U.S. diplomat who witnessed the closing of the U.S. Embassy in 1961, served in Cuba under President Jimmy Carter and returned this week to attend Friday's ceremony.

Obama and Raul Castro announced on Dec. 17 that they would re-establish diplomatic ties 54 years after the flag was taken down from the embassy overlooking Havana's seaside boulevard, the Malecon.

Obama also said he would be moving to empower the Cuban people by loosening the U.S. trade embargo on Cuba through a series of exec-

Earlier this summer, trustees opted not to change the 20 percent off the top exemption even though they knew if they didn't make a change then, the district would be locked into the 20 percent rate for five years, Green said. She also added the district is one of only a handful in the state that has such large of an exemption.

"Everyone who has a homestead exemption will be paying less even though the tax rate is going up," she said.

According to figures provided by Green, a person with a home val-

ue of \$100,000 will pay \$103.57 less taxes for 2016 due to the change.

Although officials have created a much tighter budget and reduce positions through attrition, the district is expected to still work with a budget deficit of \$1.5 million, Green said.


A second public hearing over the tax rate will be held Aug. 27 at the Big Spring High School board room.

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
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


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

Did you ever wonder? Enslavement in Egypt

fter Joseph and his entire generation died, the attitude of the Egyptians __changed. Egypt had survived what seemed to be a regional famine at the very least. Because of that famine Egypt had collected all the known wealth.

The Lord God had blessed Egypt because of Joseph and Jacob. He had also greatly blessed the Hebrews while they dwelled in Egypt. He blessed their finances and made them prosperous. He blessed them with increase of their flocks and herds. But most noticeably He blessed

them with children.

Seventy Hebrew people, men women and children, came into Egypt. In approximately 200 years their numbers had increased to more than 600,000 adult males between

ages 20 and 60. These were considered capable warriors. Allowing for women and children the Hebrew population in Egypt was approximately three million.

Much earlier as they entered Israel, Joshua told the Hebrews, "Do not turn to the left or the right. Be strong in your faith and worship only Hashem; then you will succeed wherever you go." (Jos 1:7 paraphrased.) This is repeated in many other places, emphasizing the importance of true worship of God.

As Joseph and his brothers died Jacob's strong teaching was diminished. Younger generations were raised observing the Egyptians bowing to many statues and they began to imitate them.

The main gods of the cultures around them were gods of lust and fertility. The Hebrews tried to justify their actions, "Oh, what will it hurt? This one little idol of clay can be easily hidden. No one will ever know, and it brings such pleasure."

Does this sound familiar today? Do we wonder, "What will it matter? God will forgive!"

God promised to reward them for loving and worshiping Him only, but they didn't. Without His protection, the Egyptians began to mistrust and to hate this people among them...a people who had been so blessed.

A new line of Pharaohs came to power in Egypt. They had not known Joseph, and they did not care what Joseph had done for Egypt in the past. One commentator called it a "What have you done for me lately?" mentality.

They saw the strength of the Hebrews and they feared them. The Hebrews were too dangerous to keep and too important to lose. A plan was crafted to enslave

the Hebrews. Pharaoh stirred up a national pride campaign. Plans were made to build fortified cities and every man in Egypt was assessed a 'work tax.' The Hebrews were willing to contribute their labor because

now they knew Egypt as their home. It seemed that Egypt had been good to them.

Without attracting any attention. an Egyptian here and there was released from the workforce. Eventually, all the Egyptians were gone from the workforce and the Hebrews were now expected to reach the same quotas of building materials. The supervisors had become guards who punished them for not producing their quotas. The Hebrews were now slaves!

Does this sound like the frog swimming in a pot of water? He is not alarmed as the water becomes warmer until the water is really hot and he is almost cooked!

In all wisdom

e have been considering how to have the word of Christ dwell in us richly (Colossians 3:16). We should not be satisfied with a basic knowledge of the Bible. Knowing a few facts and names and

being able to quote John 3:16 should not make us feel like we have God's word dwelling in us richly.

We need to study and grow so that we can teach one another and even correct one another when needed. In this article, I want us to look at how the Apostle Paul writes that we should do these things. Let's look again at our pas-

sage — Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, teaching and admonishing one another in all wisdom, singing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, with thankfulness in your hearts to God.

Paul tells Christians that the teaching and admonishing needs to be done "in all wisdom." Dictionary. com defines wisdom as: knowledge of what is true or right coupled with just judgment as to action; discernment or insight. Solomon wrote in Proverbs 1:7, The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge; fools despise wisdom and instruction. Also in Proverbs 9:10, he wrote, The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom, and the knowledge of the Holy One is insight. When we understand who God is and what He is like (His character), we will want to do what

He tells us to do because we respect and revere Him above everything else and because we do not want to be a recipient of His wrath on the Day of Judgment. Proper love, respect, fear, and awe of God will lead us, even compel us, to know more about Him and His will in order that we might be pleasing to Him.

In Job 28, Job talks about the things that people value.

He tells how people will dig deep down into the ground in search of metals and rocks and gems. They will overturn mountains by the root (verse 9) and stop the flow of rivers to attain the treasures that might lay beneath them (verse 11). Job sums it up in verse 28 — Behold, the fear of the Lord, that is wisdom, and to turn away from evil is understanding.

How much do you value wisdom? Do you value it more than money? Do you value it more than possessions?

If we are to teach and admonish in all wisdom, then it should be pretty

important to us. If we are to gain the wisdom that God wants us to have, we must value it more than anything

This must be on a personal level, so here are some questions that we all must consider for ourselves. How much time do I spend studying God's word compared to my time spent earning money? How much time do I spend reading the Bible compared to doing things for fun and relaxation? How much time do I spend teaching my kids the Bible compared to teaching them how to read and write or ride a bike or throw a ball? How much time do I spend helping my kids gain more knowledge of God compared to helping them with their schoolwork/homework? How important is wisdom, the wisdom that comes from God, to me?

looked like a felt tip marker and marked it. After a long second, she placed it in the cash register and gave me my change. It seemed simple enough. But it made me wonder.





a counterfeit. You can't recognize honesty or dishonesty by a person's looks.

Wouldn't it be nice if it was just as easy to discern fake people as it is to recognize a fake \$20? What if we could hold people up to a light, squint and examine them for watermarks, or just swipe them with a pen and watch for discoloration?

Unfortunately, it isn't that simple. Sometimes the people we trust the most disappoint us. That was the case with Richard Nixon. After winning the presidency by a landslide vote, the Watergate investigations revealed a man far different than the public image. One of our great difficulties today is the widespread doubt that no politician can be trusted. They seem more intent on vilifying their opponents and promoting their

own agenda than engaging in sincere dialogue.


We all know that no one is perfect. We are all human. We are all sinners and we all make mistakes. We are not looking for perfection. But we are desperate for authenticity. We are desperate for authenticity in parents, teachers, employers, employees, preachers and politicians.

Jesus ranked authenticity among the highest of virtues. His harshest words were leveled at those who pretended to be what they were not. Speaking to people of his day, Jesus said, "You're like manicured grave plots, grass clipped and the flowers bright, but six feet down it's all rotting bones and worm-eaten flesh. People look at you and think you're saints, but beneath the skin you're

total frauds." (Mt. 23:27-28, The Message). He warned his disciples, "Beware of the leaven of the Pharisees, which is hypocrisy." (Luke 12:1).

What really gets scary and complicated is to examine ourselves. Am I authentic? Is there any hypocrisy in me? Are we being open, honest and authentic with one another? Someday, of course, there will be a test. God will hold each of us up to the light. He will examine us for authenticity. Are we people of authentic faith living authentic lives?

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

McIlroy, Spieth try to make up ground on Johnson at PGA

SHEBOYGAN, Wis. (AP) Rory McIlroy found the right answers in his first competition in just under two months, and the score was only part of the equation.

After opening with a bogey on Thursday in the PGA Championship, McIlroy ripped his drive into the wind on the par-5 second and, with 286 yards to the hole, hit a 3-wood so pure that he knew his game was ready in a major way. It settled 15 feet away and set up a birdie. It was a big mo-

"I know when I start a season off, the first couple of rounds are sometimes a little tentative, just trying to get your way around," McIlroy said after a 1-under 71 that left him five shots behind Dustin Johnson. "But that was full bore, as good as I can do, especially with a wind like that. So it was a nice feel-

It's only a start — for McIlroy, coming off an ankle injury, and for Johnson, who has been in this position before.

Here's what to look for on Friday:

NO. 1 AND NO. 2

McIlroy and Jordan Spieth effectively played to a draw on Thursday as both shot a 71, even though that's not the way to keep score. Both are trying to work their way into contention going into the weekend, just as they would at any major.

It's no less intriguing because of what's at stake. Spieth is going for an unprecedented sweep of the U.S. majors in the same season, and it likely would be enough for him to replace McIlrov at No. 1 in the world. A victory by McIlroy would mean majors in four of his last five seasons — Tiger Woods, Tom Watson and Jack Nicklaus (each with majors in four straight seasons) are the only players to do that in the last 50 years.

DUSTIN PART Johnson has the first part down. Counting his 6-under 66 on Thursday, he is now 37-under par in the opening two rounds of the last six majors in which he's appeared.

He'll try to improve on that Friday afternoon, when winds are expected to kick up and there will be a 40 percent chance of thunderstorms.

He said he's most comfortable playing in the

"There's less shots you've got to make up. But you still have to play your game, especially in majors," he said. "When

you try to push and try to make things happen, that's when you can make some big numbers at the majors.'

He did that at the British Open, following opening rounds of 65 and 69 with a 75-75 weekend that dropped him from the lead to a tie for 49th place.

Hardly his worst major heartbreak, though. There was that three-putt at the U.S. Open from 12 feet to finish one shot behind Spieth. There was that 2-iron out-of-bounds in the 2011 British Open when he was trying to chase down Darren Clarke. And don't forget Whistling Straits five years ago. He had a oneshot lead playing the 18th and grounded his club in a bunker. The two-shot penalty kept him out of a playoff.

TIGER'S SEASON

Tiger Woods could be playing his final round of the season on Friday.

He opened with a 75, and while he says he hit the ball well and couldn't make a putt, it looked ordinary to most everyone else. He goes off Thursday afternoon in typically tougher conditions and likely will need a round under par to make it to the weekend.

If not, he will miss the

cut in his third straight major. Woods now has gone six straight rounds over par, tying his career-high.

FAST START

David Lingmerth got off to a blazing start for the second straight major. This time, he finished

A month ago at St. Andrews, the Swede shot a 29 on the front nine in the British Open only to post a 40 on the back nine to fall back. He thought about that round Thursday when he made five birdies in his opening five holes, and had a good look at another on the par-3 17th. He missed, and that was that. But he played solidly the rest of the way, trading a birdie for a bogey, and shot 67 for the best score of the afternoon.

The advantage goes to Lingmerth on Friday. He plays in the morning.

DAY JOB

Brian Gaffney is taking a break from his real job as a club pro at Quaker Ridge in New York. Out of 20 club pros in the field, he was the only one to break par. Gaffney had a 71 and was tied with McIlroy and Spieth, Ernie Els and Steve Stricker.

A club pro did not make the cut last year.
