"This is a fundraiser for Isaiah 58, as





# Military, Guard join western firefighters

CHELAN, Wash. - Fire managers overwhelmed by massive wildfires blazing across the West are looking for help wherever they can find it and have called in 200 active-duty military troops to fight the flames.

It's the first time since 2006 that the National Interagency Fire Center in Boise has mobilized soldiers for fire-suppression.

National Guard troops set controlled burns outside Chelan to use up fuel as helicopters dropped water. More than 1,000 people worked to protect homes from the lightning-sparked blazes that began there last week, have burned more than 170 square miles and destroyed an estimated 75 buildings.

"Nationally, the system is pretty tapped," said Rob Allen, the deputy incident commander for the fires around the Cascade Mountain resort town of Chelan. "Everything More than 1,000 people worked to protect homes from the lightning-sparked blazes that began there last week, have burned more than 170 square miles and destroyed an estimated 75 buildings.

is being used right now, so competition for resources is fierce."

The active-duty troops are all coming from the 17th Field Artillery Brigade at Joint Base Lewis-McChord near Tacoma and will be sent to a fire north of Republic, a town in central Washington, about 30 miles south of the Canadian border.

Fire managers at the center are able to enlist military help when there are not enough civilian firefighting teams, thanks to a 1975 agreement between the Defense, Interior and Agriculture departments.

The help can be crucial in particularly active years like this one. In the last two weeks alone, more than 1,500 square miles have burned in the Lower 48 states, center spokesman Ken Frederick said.

"It's like the fire season gas pedal has been pushed to the floor in a really short period of time, and that's stressed our resources," Frederick said. "And that's got us relying on help from resources we don't normally use."

The fires in the Pacific Northwest get top priority when it comes to allocating pinched resources.

A lightning-sparked fire in Oregon's Malheur National Forest has grown to 63 square miles and destroyed at least

26 houses. An additional 500 structures are threatened by the flames near the community of John Day.

In the Northern Rockies, so many wildfires have ignited this month that officials are letting some that might be suppressed under normal circumstances burn because manpower and equipment are committed elsewhere.

The area experienced a normal fire season until last week, when a combination of drought, high temperatures and lightning-packed storms created new blazes across western Montana and Idaho.

As of Tuesday, at least 95 fires were burning in the two states, about 30 of them considered large, according to the Northern Rockies Coordination Center in Missoula.

That included a group of fires in northern Idaho that have scorched 90 square miles and destroyed 42 homes in the last several days, as well as a wildfire in the west-



freshing to watch a young man rise to the pinnacle of his sport who is indeed a worthy role model for young and old alike. Whether you are a fan of professional golf or not, you have no doubt heard the name Jordan Spieth in one context or another in recent

months. He has become the number one golfer on the PGA tour and establishing a new standard of excellence on and off the golf courses of the world. This amazing young man displays the maturity of a seasoned veteran even though he is barely 22 years old.

He is a former US Junior Amateur champion who, in his first year at the University of Texas, led the team to an NCAA championship before turning pro. Spieth won his first major at the 2015 Masters Tournament with a score of 270 (18 under par), earning him \$1.8 million. Spieth tied the 72-hole record set by Tiger Woods in 1997 and became the second youngest to win the Masters, behind Woods.

He then proceeded to win the 2015 U.S. Open with a final score of 5-under-par.

He is the youngest U.S. Open champion since Bobby Jones in 1923.

At the Australian Open, Spieth set a course record with his final-round 63. Granted, records are meant to be broken, but not with the ease in which Spieth did it.

Even then world-No. 1 Rory McIlroy was impressed, saying "You could give me another 100 rounds today at The Australian and I wouldn't sniff 63 in a tweet congratulating Spieth.

His incredible skill on the golf course, as well as his humble attitude, has captured the admiration of millions of fans and that base continues to grow after every tournament and interview.

He is humble in victory and gracious in defeat, a rare combination in today's superstar "allabout-how-great-I-am" sports

Nice guys finish first others who have been influential in his life and career. As an example, he paid tribute to his caddie, Michael Greller, after making history by becoming only the sixth player to back up Masters success by immediately winning the US Open.

> The win was especially significant for Greller, a Washington state native who caddied for amateurs at Chambers Bay in his gap year from teaching highschool math, before taking to the professional ranks and linking up with Spieth.

> "It was really cool. It's amazing," Spieth said. "What a special place for Michael. He was married here. (literally on the golf course a few yards from the first tee) He shared arguably one of the best moments of his life here. I was able to add to that history that he has at Chambers Bay.

> "That was probably the best work Michael has ever done this week to get me through. At Augusta National I was on, making everything and striking the ball fantastic. He was the one that got me through this week when I wanted to get down when things weren't going well."

> On two different occasions during last season's BMW Championship, Spieth was spotted lifting one of those ropes that keeps fans off the course for a rather large person, displaying a level of class and manners very rare in any situation. Amazingly, he did that during his round! He re fers to his elders as "Mr.," as in Mr. Watson. (Tom Watson) in a recent postgame interview. The world hasn't seen this caliber of true respect and humility on this particular stage in a long, long time. Maybe never.

> But what makes Jordan Alexander Spieth so extraordinary may not have as much to do with how he hits his 8 iron as it does to the life he lives when the cameras aren't following his every move at the Masters or the U.S. Open. His faith and his family are the most important things in his life and he isn't shy about either one.

Jordan saves his deepest love and admiration for his immediate family, which includes a special needs sister.

Their relationship is inspirational and reflects the true character this young man displays to his admiring public. In an age

when many high-profile celebs try to keep their families out of the spotlight, Jordan proudly honors his 14 year-old sister, Ellie. She is his greatest admirer and the feeling is mutual.

This past weekend's PGA event in Wisconsin featured his biggest fan in attendance on Thursday. Huge galleries were walking with the marquee group of the afternoon at Whistling Straits. Thousands of golf fans hoping to get a glimpse of (then) World No. 1 Rory McIlroy, British Open champion Zach Johnson and two-time major winner Jordan Spieth. One of those fans cheering on Spieth was someone who knows Spieth better than anybody, Ellie.

Jordan said he heard Ellie cheering for him before he teed off on the first hole, so he went over and greeted his little sister and his parents.

Ellie, 14, who was born with a neurological disorder, is an inspiration to her 22-year-old oldest brother. And even more, a motivating factor for Jordan to play better.

"She only accepts me if I win. And if I don't win, I better have something for her or take her shopping.<sup>2</sup>

"It's awesome when she comes out to events," Spieth said. "I'm interested to see if she made it through the whole round and what she thought."

"I try to get back home all the time to be with her and regroup things," Spieth said, sitting alone in a dining room at Colonial Country Club in Fort Worth after a recent sponsor outing. "She sets everything in perspective for me. She is so happy for the littlest of things."

He doesn't say and do things like that to be recognized for it. He does it because it's who he really is, and has been all his life. He understands what's really important and makes the most out of every opportunity to make someone else's life special The world could sure use more people like Jordan Alexander Spieth.

# Some choose to be homeless

he Obama Department of Justice argued last week that a Boise, Idaho, law against "public sleeping in a city without adequate shelter space constitutes criminalizing homelessness itself, in violation of the Eighth Amendment." In a statement of interest

filed in federal court, the Obama administration asserted that banning sleeping and camping in public places constitutes "cruel and unusual punishment." Republican candidates, please take note.

David Bieter, described his city as "a fairly progressive island in a deeply red state." Bieter is trying to address homelessness, Journee told me, "from a holistic standpoint" — and with compassion. That said, the Obama statement is "misguided" in that it is based on a notion that "those experiencing homelessness have no recourse and we are willy-nilly criminalizing this by writing tickets for people who have no options. That is not the case."

Homeless advocates have a mantra: No one chooses to be homeless.

I'm sure that's true for some people, but there are homeless individuals who make a series of self-destructive choices that inevitably lead them to home-

... there are homeless individuals who make a series of self-destructive choices that inevitably lead them to homelessness.

"We fundamentally disagree that people don't have a choice," quoth Journee. Some "are choosing not to avail themselves of the services that are here." They congregate in camps where "there's inevitably conflict. There are inevitably public health issues. There is also illegal activity." That's why Boise police make arrests.

In this story, it depends on what the meaning of "adequate shelter space" is.

Homeless advocates and the Obama administration have a high standard. Eric Tars, senior attorney for the National Law Center on Homeless & Poverty, which first filed the lawsuit against Boise in 2009, told me, "It's not OK even if there are enough shelter beds." And: "Not all people are able to access shelter beds." A city fails his test if there are available beds in a religious shelter that proselytizes; that violates a homeless person's First Amendment right to religious freedom. A veteran with post-traumatic stress

disorder or a victim of domestic violence might feel "threatened or uncomfortable" in a crowded shelter.

I asked Tars: Does that mean anyone can pitch a tent on San Francisco's Market Street and the police can't do anything? He answered, "Anyone who needs a place to stay to survive should be able to shelter themselves as best they can."

Tars is right about the downside of law enforcement. Arrests can tarnish a homeless person's record and hence his or her abil ity to get a job. Law enforcement is expensive. It doesn't always work. Local governments should look for common-sense prescriptions that reduce homelessness. Tars points to a successful housing program in Salt Lake City. The key, he said, is to provide housing — perhaps without preconditions, such as that those given housing not use illegal drugs or alcohol. Do that and "in the short term, you do have to tolerate the tent cities a little bit longer."

Those tent cities are breeding grounds for crime. So why is it that the only people who really get a choice under the Obama administration's regime are the people who make really bad choices?

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

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## News in brief

### New Braunfels police rescue 10 immigrants from train bin

NEW BRAUNFELS, Texas (AP) — Several immigrants have been treated for dehydration after 10 men were rescued from a closed bin aboard a northbound freight train in Texas.

New Braunfels police received a 911 call Tuesday morning from one of the smuggled travelers on the train. Communications coordinator David Ferguson says police contacted Union Pacific and the 80-car train was stopped.

Police say the men from Mexico apparently slipped aboard in Laredo, about 185 southwest of New Braunfels, and were bound for Austin. Forecasters say temperatures were in the upper 80s when the immigrants were rescued.

Emergency personnel examined all of the men, with several treated for dehydration. All ten are in the custody of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security. Their names and further details on their conditions weren't immediately available.

### Sex offender who escaped from Texas found dead in SC

MYRTLE BEACH, S.C. (AP) — A sex offender who escaped from Texas earlier this month has been found dead in Myrtle Beach.

Authorities tell media outlets that 48-year-old Brent Allen Jozefkowicz was found dead on the beach in Myrtle Beach early Saturday morning. The coroner's office says he died of a gunshot wound and his death has been ruled a suicide.

He was listed on the Texas 10 Most Wanted Sex Offenders list and was considered armed and dangerous.

Authorities say he cut off his ankle monitor device Aug. 4 and escaped from the Fort Worth Transitional Center Halfway House.

### North Texas teacher charged with indecency with a child

HURST, Texas (AP) — A third-grade teacher in the Hurst-Euless-Bedford Independent School District has been charged with two counts of indecency with a child.

Hurst police said Tuesday that 25-year-old Angel Omar Sales was arrested by U.S. Custom and Border Protection authorities Aug. 10 at the Dallas/Fort Worth International Airport upon his return to the country from a trip.

He was released after posting a \$20,000 bond. It was not immediately clear if Sales has an attorney.

Sales, who taught at Bellaire Elementary School, has been on administrative leave since May 21 after school officials learned of allegations against him. Hurst police were notified by Child Protective Services on June 1 after an investigation.

The school district said in a statement that it has notified Sales of its intent to terminate his employment.

# 35 years served without conviction, man's retrial nears end

BAY CITY, Texas (AP) — A Texas man kept in prison for more than 35 years even though an appeals court threw out his conviction on a 1976 murder charge could learn if he's returning to prison.

Closing arguments are set for Wednesday in the capital murder retrial of 59-year-old Jerry Hartfield. He faces a life sentence if convicted of killing 55-year-old Eunice Lowe, who sold tickets at the Bay City bus station.

Hartfield initially was on death row. Matagorda County prosecutors decided against a death sentence in the retrial after evidence showed he's mentally impaired.

Hartfield's original conviction was thrown out on appeal but he never was retried. Gov. Mark White in 1983 commuted his sentence to life, but courts more recently decided the governor didn't have a sentence to commute.

### San Antonio police say man's body found in vacant apartment

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — San Antonio police say a body has been found in the bathtub of a vacant apartment

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building in a death being investigated as a homicide.

Authorities say the man's body was discovered early Wednesday as officers responded to a call about a foul odor near a unit.

Police are trying to identify the man. Authorities had no immediate information about the victim, who may have been in the tub for as long as a week. Police did not immediately say who called for help.

Authorities ordered an autopsy.

Further details weren't immediately available.

## Oil lease sale Wednesday for tracts off of Texas

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — The federal government on Wednesday will offer 21.9 million acres off the Texas coast to oil and gas developers, though low oil prices are likely to limit interest.

The last two comparable lease sales in the western Gulf of Mexico brought \$109.1 million last year and \$100.1 million in 2012.

A March 18 sale in the far more popular central Gulf of Mexico brought the lowest number of bids since 1986. Officials said low oil prices were the reason. Since then, the price of U.S. crude has dropped \$1.44 a barrel.

The National Ocean Industries Association, an offshore trade group, said in a news release Tuesday that members looked forward to the lease sale "but do not anticipate jaw-dropping results under current conditions."

The group cited low prices, uncertainty over new regulations — including stronger rules proposed for equipment designed to prevent oil well blowouts — and an upward trend in lawsuits over permits and leases.

### 2 high schools in Odessa to start classes 2 weeks late

ODESSA, Texas (AP) — Construction delays have forced a West Texas school district to push back the start of classes at two high schools by more than two weeks.

The Ector County Independent School District on Tuesday announced classes at Permian High School and Odessa High School will begin Tuesday, Sept. 8. The rest of the district's schools will start as scheduled on Monday, Aug. 24.

Superintendent Tom Crowe blamed weather and delivery delays for upgrades and additional structures at the two high schools not being finished. Students at those campuses, to make up for the delayed start, will face school days running 25 minutes longer than initially planned.

### Perry asks top Texas criminal court to nix 2nd felony charge

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Former Gov. Rick Perry's legal team has asked Texas' highest criminal court to toss the second and final felony charge against him.

Last month, a lower state court threw out a coercion of a public servant charge against Perry, but allowed an abuse of power charge to stand.

Perry's attorneys responded Tuesday by asking the Court of Criminal Appeals to quash the second charge. Perry left office in January and is running for president, but may yet face trial.

### Sierra Leone awaits countdown to Ebola-free declaration as families still grieve

MASSESSEHBEH, Sierra Leone (AP) — It had been five months since an Ebola death when Musa Kamara traveled to his hometown for festivities to mark the end of Ramadan. Not long after his sudden death in this roadside village, authorities came with a grim message: The killer virus was back.

Soon officials barricaded this community of nearly 600 people, putting up orange plastic fencing to quarantine half the town for the 21-day Ebola incubation period after potential exposure.

But late last week, residents who could only talk to family on the other side of the fence by phone erupted into song and dance when President Ernest Bai Koroma came to cut it down, marking the formal end of Sierra Leone's largest remaining quarantine.

Alie Senkoh, 21, said he couldn't wait to "move all around town" after days of playing cards and dice at home with his aunt and grandmother.

"We are feeling good because we are healthy and there is no more Ebola here," he said. "We believe this was the only way to stop the transmission."

### Police release sketch of Bangkok bombing suspect and offer \$28,000 reward for help finding him

BANGKOK (AP) — Police in Thailand released a sketch Wednesday of the man they believe carried out this week's deadly Bangkok bombing, and offered a 1 million baht (\$28,000) reward for help leading to his arrest. But apart from a rough portrait, authorities have few solid leads — they don't know the bomber's motive, where he's from or if he's still in the country.

The sketch was released after grainy security video footage showed the man leaving behind a backpack just 15 minutes before the blast at a popular downtown shrine. Police said the picture was also partly based on a description provided by a motorcycle taxi driver believed to have given him a ride on the night of the Monday blast.

Two days after the attack, which authorities have called the worst in Thai history, the open-air Erawan Shrine reopened to the public. But little is known about who carried out the blast that left 20 people dead and more than 120 injured, and no one has claimed responsibility.

Police chief Somyot Poompanmoung said authorities didn't know if the suspect seen in the video was still in the country, whether he was Thai or a foreigner and were wondering if he wore a disguise to mask his identity.

The sketch released Wednesday showed a young man in eyeglasses with bushy, dark hair that is cropped at the sides.

### Deadly Thai blast strikes blow to tourism, sole bright spot in ailing economv

BANGKOK (AP) — The bomb blast that ripped through a Bangkok shrine, killing 20 and injuring dozens, is also certain to take its toll on tourism, the one bright spot in Thailand's sputtering economy.

impact on tourism will be short term or a crippling blow that drives visitors away for longer.

Prime Minister Prayuth Chan-ocha called the bombing "the worst incident" to ever hit the country, saying, "this time they aimed for innocent lives. They want to destroy our economy, our tourism."

### FDA OKs first pill for boosting sexual desire in women, but it comes with safety restrictions

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Food and Drug Administration has approved the first prescription drug designed to boost sexual desire in women, a milestone long sought by a pharmaceutical industry eager to replicate the blockbuster success of impotence drugs for men.

But stringent safety measures on the daily pill called Addyi mean it will probably never achieve the sales of Viagra, which has generated billions of dollars since the late 1990s.

The drug's label will bear a boxed warning — the most serious type — alerting doctors and patients to the risks of dangerously low blood pressure and fainting, especially when the pill is combined with alcohol. The same problems can occur when taking the drug with other commonly prescribed medications, including antifungals used to treat yeast infections.

"Patients and prescribers should fully understand the risks associated with the use of Addyi before considering treatment," said Dr. Janet Woodcock, director of the FDA's drug center, in a statement announcing the approval Tuesday.

Under an FDA-imposed safety plan, doctors will only be able to prescribe Addyi after completing an online certification process that requires counseling patients about Addyi's risks. Pharmacists will also need certification and will be required to remind patients not to drink alcohol while taking the drug.

### **Television report: Ex-Subway** pitchman expected to plead guilty to child-pornography charges

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Longtime Subway pitchman Jared Fogle is expected to plead guilty to childpornography charges, an Indiana television station reported.

The Tuesday report on Fox59 came six weeks after authorities seized electronics and other items from Fogle's home in Zionsville, an affluent Indianapolis suburb.

Citing sources it did not identify, the station said Fogle would enter a plea Wednesday. It also said the U.S. Attorney's Office in Indianapolis planned to hold a news conference Wednesday.

The 37-year-old Fogle became a Subway pitchman more than 15 years ago after shedding more than 200 pounds as a college student, in part by eating the chain's sandwiches.

Subway suspended its association with Fogle after the raid. The company declined to comment Tuesday, saying only that the chain had "already ended our relationship with Jared."

One such Bush family stalwart is Dirk Van Dongen, president of the Washington-based National Association of Wholesaler-Distributors. Van Dongen said he is one of a "huge" network of volunteer fundraisers — called "bundlers" because they gather checks from friends and associates to turn over to campaigns — who sprang to action when the former Florida governor said at the beginning of the year that he was thinking about running.

Activists: IS suicide bomber kills 11 in Kurdish town in northeastern Syria

BEIRUT (AP) — Syrian activists say an Islamic State suicide bomber has targeted a predominantly Kurdish town in northeastern Syria, killing at least 11 people.

The Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights says Wednesday's explosion happened outside a local Kurdish police station in the town of Qamishli. It also says more than 40 people were wounded.

Syria's state news agency SANA reported the explosion, saying it killed 13 and wounded about 50.

The Islamic State group has been fighting Kurdish fighters in Syria since last year and the extremists have carried out dozens of suicide attacks against the Kurds. The Kurdish fighters, aided by U.S.-led airstrikes, have also captured significant territory from IS in northern Syria.

### Here lies Vera: Woman's death still haunts New Orleans neighborhood a decade after Katrina

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Amid the chaos after Hurricane Katrina swamped New Orleans, Vera Smith's body decayed for four days on a sidewalk until her horrified neighbors covered her with dirt, a makeshift plastic shroud and a bleak epitaph: "Here lies Vera. God help us."

Broadcast to the world, the stark image came to stand for what seemed like the complete breakdown of a great American city.

Although her cremated remains were later buried on a family plot in Texas and the place where she died of unknown causes has sprung back since Katrina, Vera Smith remains part of her neighborhood.

A colorful memorial by local artist Simon Hardeveld stands beside an upscale restaurant built near the site of her death, and her all-too-public demise was recounted in a book written by a man who helped erect her temporary sidewalk tomb.

Ten years later, friends - as well as neighbors who never even met Elvia Briones Smith, her full

name — sense that she could have been any of them, a victim of a natural disaster compounded by human mistakes.

### The Bush boost: Donors who gave to Jeb Bush's father and brother account for half of his money

WASHINGTON (AP) — Jeb Bush's fundraising network is two generations in the making, and it shows.

About half of the roughly \$120 million raised to help him win the Republican presidential nomination comes from donors who previously gave to his brother or father, both former presidents, according to a new analysis of Federal Election Commission records by Crowdpac.com, a nonpartisan political research company.

The finding puts a numerical exclamation point on the advantage Bush's presidential family gives him when it comes to fundraising.

# Gonzalez's 10th-inning homer gives Astros 3-2 win over Rays

HOUSTON (AP) — Tampa Bay's bullpen hadn't given up a run to the Houston Astros in four games this season.

That changed Tuesday night when Houston tied it off Jake McGee before Marwin Gonzalez hit a homer leading off the 10th inning off All-Star closer Brad Boxberger to lift the Astros to a 3-2 victory.

The game was tied 2-all when Gonzalez connected off Boxberger (4-9), sending a fullcount fastball into the seats in right field.

"I think it's just a rough patch we're hitting right now," Boxberger said. "It's part of it. Everyone goes through it. It's just a matter of how quick you

can turn it around." Manager Kevin Cash doesn't believe Tuesday's performances by McGee and Boxberger are cause for concern.

"I don't think so," he said. "I think both of their velocities have been consistent pretty much all year. I think you have to credit the hitters that are having the approach off of them."

Luke Gregerson (6-2) pitched two scoreless innings for the win.

The Rays led 2-1 in the eighth before an RBI double by Carlos Correa off McGee tied it.

Curt Casali homered for the Rays, who lost for the fourth time in five games.

Gonzalez drove in a double in the third inning.

Kevin Kiermaier singled to center field to start the top of the seventh and Casali followed with a bloop double. Grady Sizemore drew a walk with one out to load the bases before Evan Longoria grounded into a forceout that scored Kiermaier to put the Rays on top 2-1.

Jason Castro singled with one out in the third and Jose Altuve reached on a bunt single. He was ruled out initially but the Astros challenged the call and it was overturned. Gonzalez followed with his double to left to score Castro and give Houston a 1-0 lead. Casali's towering hom-

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) The Texas Rangers still haven't figured out Seattle's Hisashi Iwakuma.

The Mariners right-hander didn't make history Tuesday night with a second consecutive no-hitter, but he limited Texas to two runs and five hits over seven innings in a 3-2 victory.

He is 6-0 in his last seven starts against the Rangers.

"He was pitching everything down," said Texas' Rougned Odor, who had two hits, including his ninth home run of the season. "Fastball and split and slider. He did a good job."

The Rangers ended Iwakuma's bid for another no-hitter with Shin-Soo Choo's one-out single in the first inning but saw their winning streak end at five games. Texas fell to four games out of first place in the American League West. The Rangers went into Tuesday one game out of the second wild-card spot.

Texas is 27-33 against teams below .500, including 3-8 five losses and a no-decision. "I'm not happy, but I went six (innings)," Gonzalez said. "Got me two (runs). Just couldn't get that third one."

After the game, Gonzalez was optioned to Triple-A Round Rock with left-hander Derek Holland coming off the disabled list and starting Wednesday for the first time since April 10.

Odor hit nine homers last season in 114 games and needed 81 games to do so this year. Since his recall from Round Rock on June 15, he's hitting

.342 with eight homers.



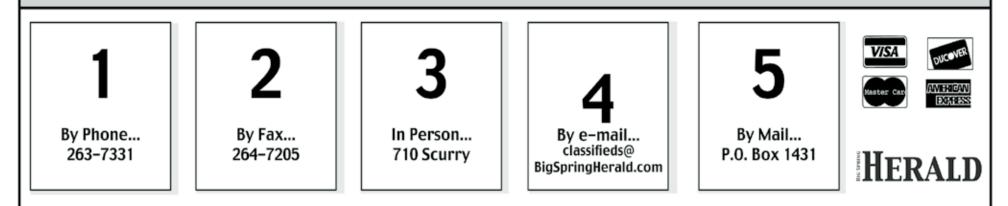

It's not difficult to make five clubs on this deal if you see all four hands. All you have to do is to time your plays properly to avoid losing two spade tricks.

But to make the contract without seeing the opposing hands is quite a chore, since it requires visualizing the East-West cards precisely and then taking advantage of that knowledge. This is by no means an impossible task, however. The bidding speaks for itself, and the missing cards are apt to be exactly where the bidding indicates they are.

East is practically sure to have seven hearts for his leap to four, and West's treasures, considering his bidding, probably consist of a spade suit headed by the A-J. If so, the play becomes merely an exercise in good technique.

East wins the heart lead with the jack and continues with a heart, which you ruff with the ten as West shows out. Taking a long-distance view of the situation, you cash the A-K of diamonds before leading a club to the eight. Next you ruff a diamond high, lead a club to the nine and ruff dunnny's last diamond in order to run West out of diamonds.

Having attended to these preliminaries, you draw West's last trump, reducing his hand to the A-J-9-7 of spades. You are down to the Q-10-5 of spades and a trump, while dummy has the K-4-2 of spades and a heart.

You now lead the queen of spades, and West has had it. If he takes the queen, he must return a spade, and your ten and king become tricks. If he ducks the queen, you simply play another spade toward the king.

# **Cowboys, Rams end practice** early after fights break out

OXNARD, Calif. (AP) – The Cowboys and St. Louis Rams cut short the second of two joint practices at training camp Tuesday after several fights broke out, including one where Dallas receiver Dez Bryant was punched in the face.

The workout at the Cowboys' camp facility ended about 30 minutes earlier than expected after the skirmishes on the field where the St. Louis offense and Dallas defense were scrimmaging.

It was the second time in less than two weeks that a joint practice had to be cut short because of fights. On Aug. 8, Houston and Washington ended the mixed

Most of the St. Louis defensive players left a drill on the other field when the first fight broke out. The second fight ended with several players in a pile on a fence where fans could reach out and touch them, although no fans appeared to get involved.

The third fight be-Cowboys tween the and Rams included the punch on Bryant and ended the practice, although the Cowboys ran a few more plays with their own players while the Rams huddled with coach Jeff Fisher before walking to their buses. It wasn't clear who threw the punch on Bryant. Dallas cornerback Patmon, Tyler who fought with Bryant earlier in camp, had several red marks on his face.

St. Louis linebacker James Laurinaitis said he was trying to make a defensive call when he noticed several teammates had left his field and run toward the first fight.

"There's a fine line between defending yourself, so to speak, versus instigating it," Laurinaitis said. "You want to defend your teammates, but you never want it to turn into that. I'm just glad nobody got hurt."

Patmon, who threw the first punch in his fight with Bryant on the fourth day of Cowboys camp, said he wasn't thinking about the fact that he joined the fray without a helmet.

"All you're thinking about is having your fighting earlier when the topic was whether the Cowboys had shown enough intensity in the first joint practice Monday.
