Remembering the fallen

Plans under way for 9/11 service

It's been nine years since Mike Tarpley organized the first 9/11 Memorial Service to honor area military men who died in the recent conflicts and to remember the victims from the largest terrorist attack on U.S. soil.

"The first service I didn't know what I was doing. I told the guys even if no one shows up tonight, we are still going to hold the service and honor those who died in 9/11," Tarpley recalled. "Sixty people came. Last year, we had 350. The

citizens of Big Spring have taken over the event. They know it happens and look forward to it."

For the ninth annual service, Dr. Donald May, an eye surgeon and U.S. Air Force veteran, is scheduled to be the main speaker of the event, which is set for 6:30 p.m. Friday, Sept. 11, at Spring Town Plaza by the Wall of Remembrance. The annual 9/11 Memorial is sponsored by the Disabled American Veterans Chapter 47 and the Howard County Volunteer Fire Department. Members of the Big Spring Fire Department

Army pilot, MP 1st women to pass Ranger school

FORT BENNING, Ga. — A pilot of attack helicopters who competed in triathlons and a wilderness enthusiast who became a military police officer because it was the closest she could get to a combat job are the first women to finish the Army's elite Ranger School.

First Lt. Shaye Haver of Copperas Cove, Texas, and Capt. Kristen Griest of Orange, Connecticut, are "just like all the soldiers" graduating this week from the grueling two-month Ranger course, their families said in a joint statement that confirmed their identities.

Griest, 26, and Haver, 25,

are "happy, relieved, and ready for some good food and sleep" before they line up Friday at Fort Benning alongside 94 male soldiers who also earned the coveted black-and-gold Ranger tab to adorn their uniforms.

The course tests soldiers' ability to overcome fatigue, hunger and stress during combat operations. The Army opened Ranger School to female soldiers for the first time this year as part of the military's push to open more combat jobs to women.

"This has been something she's wanted to do for a long, long time," Griest's older brother, Army Chief Warrant Officer 2 Mike Griest, told The Associated Press in a phone interview. "We're all

very, very proud of her. It's a tremendous achievement not only for her personally but for the Army and women in the military in general."

Haver's father, Chris Haver, also said he was "super proud."

"It's just completely amazing," Chris Haver said. "I know a lot of guys that have been through it and tell me how hard the course is. They tell me it's the toughest, most mentally demanding course they've been to."

Both women are graduates of the U.S. Military Academy at West Point.

Griest grew up loving to camp in the wilderness and test her endurance, making her a natural to take on Ranger School, her brother said.

He noted she chose to become a military police officer because she felt it was the closest she could get to an Army combat job.

"If she had been allowed to go infantry out of college, she would have done that," Mike Griest said.

Haver followed in her father's footsteps to become a pilot of attack helicopters. He also served as a career Army aviator who flew Apaches, and said his daughter has always been mentally tough and incredibly physically fit. He said she has run marathons and competed in triathlons for West Point.

"She's kind of built for this thing," Chris Haver said.

Thai military says international terrorism link 'unlikely' in Bangkok bombing

BANGKOK (AP) — Thailand's military junta said Thursday that this week's deadly bombing in downtown Bangkok that killed 20 people was "unlikely" to have been carried out by international terrorists. Police, meanwhile, said they suspected the plot was well-planned by a network of at least 10 people.

But three days after the attack at a revered shrine in central Bangkok, authorities appeared to have few solid leads into who carried out the deadliest attack in Thailand's recent history.

Confusing statements emerged Thursday, with the military spokesman saying in a televised statement that investigators believe the attack wasn't the work of international terrorists — a day after police issued an arrest warrant for the prime suspect who was described as a "foreign man."

"Security agencies have collaborated with intelligence agencies from allied countries and have come to the same preliminary conclusion that the incident is unlikely to be linked to international terrorism," said Col. Winthai Suvaree, the military spokesman.

Massive car bomb strikes Cairo security building, wounds 6 police

CAIRO (AP) — A massive car bomb exploded early Thursday near a national security building in a popular residential neighborhood in Cairo,

wounding at least six police officers and blowing the facades off nearby buildings, Egyptian security officials said.

There were no immediate reports of deaths from the explosion, which demolished a wall in front of the government building and smashed its structure, leaving gaping holes exposing its offices. Glass from blown-out windows littered the surrounding streets in the popular Shubra el-Kheima neighborhood.

Report on secret Iran side deal angers GOP but Pelosi pledges House Dems will back up Obama

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republican opposition to President Barack Obama's nuclear deal is flaring over revelations of a secret side agreement involving Iranian inspections. But House Democrats are shrugging off the report and claiming they have the votes to back up Obama anyway.

The Associated Press reported Wednesday on a previously undisclosed side deal between Iran and the U.N.'s International Atomic Energy Agency that would allow Tehran to use its own inspectors to investigate a site it has been accused of using to develop nuclear arms.

The revelation, based on a document seen by the AP, newly riled Republican lawmakers who have been severely critical of the broader agreement to limit Iran's future nuclear programs, signed by the Obama administration, Iran and five world powers in July. Those critics have complained that the wider deal is unwisely built on trust of the Iranians,

while the administration has insisted it depends on reliable inspections.

"President Obama boasts his deal includes 'unprecedented verification.' He claims it's not built on trust," said House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio. "But the administration's briefings on these side deals have been totally insufficient — and it still isn't clear whether anyone at the White House has seen the final documents."

Officials: 3 Washington firefighters die after vehicle crashes, flames likely overtook them

TWISP, Wash. (AP) — Three firefighters died after their vehicle crashed and was likely caught by flames as they battled a blaze in Washington state, authorities said. Four other firefighters were injured.

The casualties came Wednesday as firefighters on several fronts fought against raging wildfires advancing on towns in the north-central part of the state.

The accident during the wildfire occurred near the town of Twisp, the National Forest Service said.

"The firefighters were engaged in initial attack operations and were involved in a vehicle accident when it is believed that the fire overtook the vehicle," the statement from Okanogan-Wenatchee National Forest said, relaying information from Okanogan County Sheriff Frank Rogers.

It wasn't immediately clear if the four injured were also involved in the accident.

While the graduating female soldiers have earned the coveted black-and-gold Ranger tab to wear on their uniforms, for now they're still unable to join the elite 75th Ranger Regiment based at Fort Benning. The military's toughest jobs — including positions in infantry, armor and special operations units

such as the Ranger Regiment — remain closed to women.

Haver won admission to West Point as a high school senior in December 2007. At the time, she told her hometown newspaper that being raised in a military family fueled her desire to become an Army officer. She said her determination to join was strengthened after several soldiers who were her father's friends died in Iraq.

Haver also hinted in the 2007 interview with the Copperas Cove Herald that she was willing to test her limits — a trait that would have served her well in Ranger School.

"You have to be the one who's on top of things, who wants to get stuff done," Haver told the newspaper. "I may think that I'm OK right now, but I may not even know my potential yet because I haven't been pushed like that."

Opening lead — queen of clubs. Locating a missing key card by counting the opponents' cards as they are played is one of the most satisfying experiences at the bridge table. But for many players, satisfaction can change to frustration when they find themselves unable to remember every card played. Players who experience this problem are best advised that the key to accurate counting lies in keeping track only of what is pertinent to the issue at hand.

Consider this case where South is in seven spades. Declarer's only worry is a potential diamond loser. But before attempting to guess which opponent to finesse for the queen, South should try to learn more about the opponents' distribution in the other three suits.

South therefore decides to keep an eye on when and if either defender shows out in any of the other three suits. The actual rank of the cards in these suits as they are played doesn't really matter. South starts by taking the club lead with the ace, cashes the A-Q of trumps, then plays the king of clubs and ruffs a club.

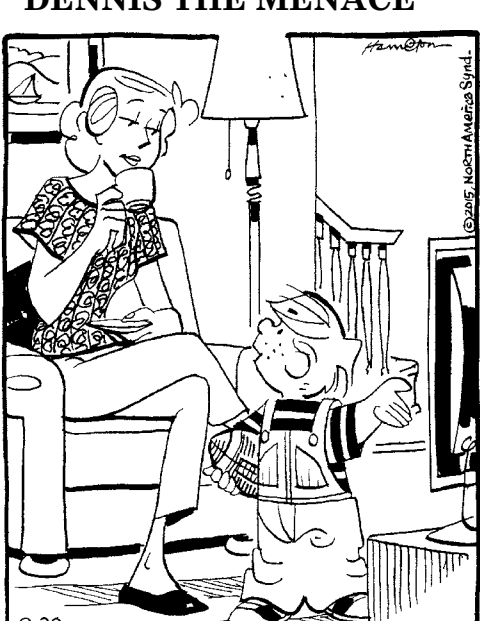
At this stage, all declarer knows is that the spades were divided 2-2 and the clubs 4-3. But when South next cashes the A-K of hearts and ruffs a heart — on which West shows out — he gets the break he's been looking for. Since East has thus far turned up with two spades, three clubs and six hearts, he cannot possibly hold more than two diamonds.

To complete the count, declarer leads a trump to the king and ruffs dummy's last club. When East follows, his original diamond holding drops to one, giving South a sure thing. He simply cashes the diamond king (to guard against the singleton queen in the East hand), then takes the marked finesse through West to secure the slam.

This Date In History

Today is Thursday, August 20, the 232nd day of 2015. There are 133 days left in the year.

Today's Highlights in History:

On August 20, 1940, during World War II, British Prime Minister Winston Churchill paid tribute to the Royal Air Force before the House of Commons, saying, "Never in the field of human conflict was so much owed by so many to so few." Exiled Communist revolutionary Leon Trotsky was assassinated in Coyoacan, Mexico by Ramon Mercader, a Spanish Communist agent working at the behest of Josef Stalin. (Trotsky died the next day.)

On this date:

In 1833, Benjamin Harrison, 23rd president of the United States, was born in North Bend, Ohio.

In 1866, President Andrew Johnson formally declared the Civil War over, months after fighting had stopped.

In 1882, Tchaikovsky's "1812 Overture" had its premiere in Moscow.

In 1910, a series of forest fires swept through parts of Idaho, Montana and Washington, killing at least 85 people and burning some 3 million acres.

In 1914, German forces occupied Brussels, Belgium, during World War I.

In 1953, the Soviet Union publicly acknowledged it had tested a hydrogen bomb.

In 1964, President Lyndon B. Johnson signed the Economic Opportunity Act, a nearly \$1 billion anti-poverty measure.

In 1968, the Soviet Union and other Warsaw Pact nations began invading Czechoslovakia to crush the "Prague Spring" liberalization drive.

In 1972, the Wattstax concert took place at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum.

In 1977, the U.S. launched Voyager 2, an unmanned spacecraft carrying a 12-inch copper phonograph record containing greetings in dozens of languages, samples of music and sounds of nature.

In 1989, entertainment executive Jose Menendez and his wife, Kitty, were shot to death in their Beverly Hills mansion by their sons, Lyle and Erik. Fifty-one people died when a pleasure boat sank in the River Thames (tehzm) in London after colliding with a dredger.

In 1994, Benjamin Chavis Jr. was fired as head of the NAACP after a turbulent 16-month tenure.

Ten years ago: Northwest Airlines mechanics went on strike rather than accept pay cuts and layoffs; Northwest ended up hiring replacement workers. San Francisco 49ers offensive lineman Thomas Herrion, 23, died of a heart attack shortly after a preseason game against the Denver Broncos.

Five years ago: President Barack Obama invited Israel and the Palestinians to meet face-to-face in Washington the following month for talks aimed at achieving an agreement to establish an independent Palestinian state and secure peace for Israel.

dress and grooming code for all grades

It's almost time to head back to the classroom and for many that means a new or updated wardrobe, however, Big Spring ISD student will still need to conform to the district's dress code when attending classes.

According to BSISD, Students and parents may determine a student's personal dress and grooming standards, provided that they comply with the following:

Dresses and skirts: The highest consideration point for the hemline of any dress or skirt shall be the width of a dollar bill from the top of the knee. The same measurement applies to the slit in a dress or skirt. Skirts must be worn at the proper waistline.

Dresses or tops with spaghetti straps are not permitted unless they are worn with a jacket over them.

Shorts: Shorts will be permitted as long as they are no shorter than the width of a dollar bill from the top of the knee in length. Form-fitting shorts or pants such as spandex or bicycle shorts are not acceptable.

When wearing spandex underneath a skirt or a pair of shorts, the outer garment will be the garment measured for appropriate length. Jogging or nylon "wind" shorts are not acceptable. Shorts must be worn at the proper waistline.

Shirts: Crop tops, tube tops, halters, and strapless dresses are not acceptable. Transparent and/or see-through material is unacceptable. Any strap on the shoulders of a dress or blouse must be the width of a dollar bill.

Any blouse, shirt, or top deemed by the administration to be too low/and or revealing will be considered inappropriate for school.

Students will be in violation of the school dress code and will be asked to change shirts before being allowed to return to the classroom.

Sleeveless shirts are not permitted for males. Shirts or blouses must cover the entire torso at all times during movement.

Shirts, jackets, or any clothing with decoration, patches, lettering, advertisements, etc., that may be considered obscene or offensive are not to be worn to school.

This includes garments or jewelry that refers to marijuana, tobacco, profanity, alcohol, sex, violence, weapons, and others deemed inappropriate by the administration. Shirts that exceed the fingertips when hands are down by the side must be worn tucked in. Pajama tops are not permitted.

Pants: Slacks, jeans, khakis, etc., must fit properly and be worn on the waist. Tight form fitting pants are not allowed. Overalls must

be worn with both bib straps up and fastened.

Skin and/or undergarments (ex. boxers) must not be visible in pants with holes between the knees and the tops of the thighs.

Tights, shorts, etc., may be worn under such pants. If they are worn along, they must have

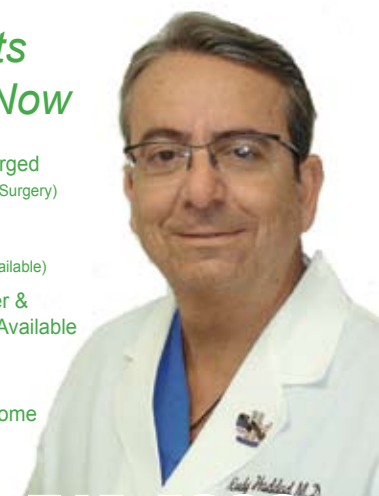
