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Council slates tax rate hearing

The time to talk is now.

Big Spring's city council will hold the first of two scheduled public hearings on the city's proposed tax rate, and, if what happened two weeks ago is any indication, there is likely to be plenty of comments to go around.

Two men were rebuffed at the Aug. 11 city council meeting when they attempted to lodge their objections to the new tax rate, which has been tentatively set at 77 cents per \$100 property valua-

tion. Mayor Larry McLellan said no public comment would be allowed What: Big Spring until the public hearings.

> Nevertheless, one man, Scott Emerson, insisted on addressing the council, which led to a sharp exchange between him and the mayor and Emerson's eventual ejection from

council chambers. A second man, T.J. Stewart, also wanted to address council on the issue, but left on his own accord after being denied by the mayor.

All the past drama, however, should be academic Tuesday, with McLellan and the council promising the public

Stocks plunge in early trading

NEW YORK — U.S. stock markets plunged in early trading Monday following a big drop in Chinese stocks.

The Dow Jones industrial average fell more than 1,000 points in early trading and the Standard & Poor's 500 index fell into correction territory, that's Wall Street jargon for a drop of 10 percent or more from a recent peak.

Treasuries surged as investors

bought less risky assets.


Growing concerns about a slow-points. down in China had already shaken markets around the world on Friday, driving the U.S. stock market sharply lower. A big sell-off in Chinese stock on Monday caused the rout to continue.

The Dow was 668 points, or 4.1 percent, lower as of 9:57 a.m. Eastern time. The Standard & Poor's 500 index dropped 81 points, or 4.2 percent, to 1,889. The Nasdaq composite fell 211 points, or 4.4 percent, to 4,496

China's main index sank 8.5 percent amid fears over the health of the world's second-largest economy.

Oil prices, commodities and the currencies of many developing countries also tumbled on concerns that a sharp slowdown in China might hurt economic growth around the globe.

Neugebauer talks crowded GOP field, Iran nuke deal

On at least one issue. Randy Neugebauer is distancing himself from several of his fellow Republi-

"I have an important announcement to make — I'm not running for president," he joked.

Neugebauer (R-Lubbock), who represents Big Spring in the U.S. House of Representatives, discussed the swollen field of candidates seeking the GOP presidential nomination – along with other issues — during a Friday visit to Big Spring.

There are currently 17 men and women seeking the Republican nomination, and while Neugebauer isn't listing any favorites, he said he identifies with the current state of that campaign.

"When I first ran for Congress,

there were 17 Republican candidates," he said. "So I've been there and done that."

The most interesting take-away from the campaign, he said, was that the current front-runners are not exactly establishment darlings.

"The top three in the polls right now are Donald Trump, Ted Cruz and Ben Carson," Neugebauer said. "Two of those men have never held public office, while Cruz only recently was elected to the Senate. What I'm seeing from that is that people are finding non-traditional candidates very appealing."

Neugebauer doesn't expect any significant winnowing of the field

until after the Super Tuesday primaries next spring. "Those primaries will cost candi-

The proposed tax rate is slightly more than 8 cents lower than the expiring levy. However,

because of a sharp increase in local property valuations, it is estimated to bring in about \$160,000 more in tax revenue than the current rate, City Finance Director Donald Moore said.

Most of that increased revenue is being earmarked for city reserve funds, which have been used to make up for recent budgetary shortfalls, he noted.

"We have had more expenditures than revenue the past few years," Moore said. "Our (reserves) have been going down, and they will continue to go down in this new budget. All this will do is decrease the speed in which our reserves go down."

program; this really doesn't stop them," he said. "In addition, this treaty frees up a lot of their frozen assets ... When you bring nuclear capability to the Middle East ... It adds that much more instability to the region, and it could start an arms race.

"Everyday, we learn more about this deal, and everyday there's more we don't like." he added.

The Shanghai index suffered its biggest percentage decline since February 2007, with many China-listed companies hitting their 10 percent downside limits. The benchmark has lost all of its gains for 2015, though it is still more than 40 percent above its level a year ago.

Underlying the gloom in China is the growing conviction that policymakers and regulators may lack the means to staunch the losses in that nation. The country is facing a slowdown in economic growth, the banking system is short of cash and investors are pulling money out of the country, experts

"There is a lot of fear in the markets," said Bernard Aw, market strategist at IG.

China's dimming outlook is drawing calls for more economic stimulus from Beijing, though earlier government efforts to stop the sell-off in stocks appear to have done little to stabilize markets.

bloodletting The spread across Asia earlier, where Japan's Nikkei fell 4.6 percent, its worst one-day drop since in over two and a half years. Hong Kong's Hang Seng index fell 5.2 percent, Australia's S&P ASX/200 slid 4.1 percent and South Korea's Kospi lost 2.5 percent.

Those declines followed tumbles over the weekend in emerging markets such as Egypt, Dubai and Saudi Ara-

The panic has underscored the scale of the challenge for Chinese leaders in seeking to curb excess investment and guide the economy toward a more sustainable pace of growth.

"My biggest concern is that global growth momentum is very fragile. The most important step is to see China take further action to try to bring their economy to a 7 percent growth path," said Rajiv Biswas, Asia-Pacific chief economist for IHS.

In currency trading, the dollar was at 119.99 yen on Monday, down from 122.05 yen on Friday. The euro rose to \$1.1517 from \$1.1388.

Currencies fell hard in developing economies particularly those that rely heavily on the export of commodities and oil, both of which China is a big consumer. The Russian ruble dropped 2.3 percent to a seven-year low.

In commodity markets, benchmark U.S. crude dropped \$2.14 to \$38.29 a barrel in electronic trading on the New York Mercantile Exchange. It fell 87 cents a barrel on Friday. Brent crude, a benchmark for international oils used by many U.S. refineries, fell \$2.50 to \$42.96 a barrel.

Texas Rangers only outscored the Detroit Tigers by two runs in this weekend's four-game series, but they are taking home three victories and a hold on the second American League wild spot.

"That's a tough ball club, so it is extremely important to win a series like this on the road," Rangers manager Jeff Banister said after Sunday's 4-2 win. "These guys know what is in front of them and where they want to go."

The Rangers, who have won nine of their last 11 games, started the day with a half-game lead over the Angels in the wild card standings, with Baltimore another half-game back.

Cole Hamels (7-8) got the win, allowing two runs on eight hits and two walks over six innings. He struck out two. Shawn Tolleson, the third Rangers reliever, pitched the ninth for his 25th save.

Rookie Matt Boyd (1-4) gave up three runs on five hits and three walks in six innings. Boyd was acquired from Toronto in last month's David Price trade.

"He had a little trouble throwing strikes, especially early on, but I think the overall results weren't too bad," Tigers manager Brad Ausmus said. "He was able to get us through six innings and keep the score down."

After scoring 25 runs in a two-game sweep of the Cubs at Wrigley Field, the Tigers only managed nine against Texas, including five in three straight losses to end the series.

Ian Kinsler bristled when asked about De-

 $\overline{DETROIT}$ (AP) — The troit's inconsistent offense, especially after the battered pitching staff held Texas to 11 runs in the series.

"If you look at the numbers, we're top of the league, offensively, in a lot of categories," he said. "Are we supposed to produce six runs every game? Is that how baseball works?"

The Tigers took a 1-0 lead in the second after a terrible throw by Shin-Soo Choo. With Kinsler on first, Miguel Cabrera singled to right. Beltre and Banister were both ejected in the fifth inning in an odd sequence. Home plate umpire Adam Hamari ejected Beltre from the dugout for arguing balls and strikes. That brought Banister onto the field for a lengthy argument.

After Banister returned to the bench, Beltre began arguing with first base umpire Ron Kulpa despite multiple signals from Kulpa to vacate the dugout. Part of the argument stemmed from the fact that the Rangers felt Prince Fielder,





Castro's homer in 10th gives Astros 3-2 win over Dodgers

HOUSTON (AP) — Star rookie Carlos Correa and the AL West-leading Houston Astros were feeling pretty confident on Sunday after sweeping the Los Angeles Dodgers, who lead the NL West.

"We are a first-place team and the atmosphere here (is) we are the best team in baseball," Correa said.

Jason Castro's solo homer in the 10th inning lifted the Astros to a 3-2 victory that completed the sweep on Sunday.

The Astros are four games ahead of the Texas Rangers in the division after going 7-3 during this homestand.

There was one out in the 10th when Castro connected off Chris Hatcher (1-5), launching a 96 mph fastball into the first row of the seats in left field. The play was reviewed and confirmed.

It was their fourth last at-bat win in the last eight games and their third game with extra innings in that span. "We've been in so many of them

this year it's just that mentality that we're comfortable playing from behind late," Castro said. "I think that's an attribute that's going to serve us well going forward in the playoffs ... we don't give up."

Kenley Jansen, who had converted

17 straight save opportunities, allowed a leadoff single to Correa in the ninth before the Astros tied it on a two-out RBI single by Marwin Gonzalez.

"Any time you've got to go through the middle of our order, I've got a ton of confidence that we're going to put something together that gives us a chance," manager A.J. Hinch said.

Luke Gregerson (7-2) allowed one hit in a scoreless 10th for the win.

The Dodgers were swept by the Astros for the first time since May of 2008 and have dropped a season-high five straight overall. It was a series that started with Houston's Mike Fiers throwing a no-hitter in a 3-0 win on Friday.

Clayton Kershaw allowed seven hits and one run with 10 strikeouts in eight innings for his 10th double-digit strikeout game this season. He is 5-0 in his last nine starts and hasn't lost since June 27.

"I hope we're panicking a little bit."

Kershaw said. "I think panic's a good thing to a certain extent. It's obvious we've got five weeks or whatever it is, too. So, there's a sense of urgency. Maybe that's better to say than panic. I feel like we've got to start playing like that. Not to say we haven't, but

it's definitely time to start thinking that way."

Chase Utley doubled and scored in the first for the Dodgers. A.J. Ellis did the same in the fifth to make it 2-0.

Jose Altuve had three hits and Correa had an RBI single that cut it to 2-1 in the sixth.

Houston rookie Lance McCullers allowed eight hits and two runs with eight strikeouts in seven innings. McCullers, who was recalled from Double-A Corpus Christi for the start, pitched well but was done in by three wild pitches.

Utley doubled with one out in the first inning and took third on a wild pitch. He scored on a sacrifice fly by Justin Turner to make it 1-0.

A double by Ellis came with one out in the fifth inning and two wild pitches by McCullers with two outs allowed him to score and extend the lead to 2-0.

The Astros didn't have more than one hit in an inning until the sixth, when Altuve doubled with one out before a single by Carlos Gomez. Correa's groundball single, which bounced off Kershaw's left foot, scored Altuve to cut the lead to 2-1.

Gomez reached third on a sacrifice fly before ending the inning when he

was caught trying to steal home. The Astros challenged the call but it was confirmed.

Yasiel Puig was ejected for arguing with the umpire after he struck out looking for the second out of the ninth

TRAINER'S ROOM

Astros: OF George Springer (broken right wrist) is expected to take batting practice Monday or Tuesday for the first time since he was injured. Springer has been on the disabled list since July 2 and resumed baseball activities Aug. 14. ... 3B Jed Lowrie left the game in the seventh inning with a bruised right thumb.

UP NEXT

Dodgers: The Dodgers are off on Monday before beginning a series at Cincinnati on Tuesday, when lefthander Alex Wood (8-8, 3.79) opposes Cincinnati's John Lamb (0-1, 6.35). Wood allowed five hits and three runs for the loss in his last start.

Astros: Scott Feldman (5-5, 4.05) opposes New York's Nathan Eovaldi (13-2, 4.24) when Houston opens a series with the Yankees. Feldman is 1-1 with a 2.87 ERA in six starts since a stint on the disabled list after arthroscopic surgery on his right knee.

Nelson hurt as Packers fall to Steelers 24-19

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Jordy Nelson caught the ball, spun and prepared to dart downfield.

Two steps later, Green Bay's Pro Bowl wide receiver was on the turf, his left knee injured and his season very much in doubt. While Nelson was able to gingerly walk to the sideline early in the first quarter of Sunday's 24-19 exhibition loss to Pittsburgh, it might be the last sign of Nelson in his familiar No. 87 jersey this year.

While Packers coach Mike McCarthy stressed the defending NFC North champions "will look for good news" when Nelson is re-evaluated in Green Bay on Monday, quarterback Aaron Rodgers expressed equal parts frustration and mystification.

"It's difficult to lose a guy like that in a meaningless game," Rodgers said. The play that may change

the course of Green Bay's season started innocently enough. The Packers were driving crisply down the field on their opening possession when Rodgers hit Nelson on a little hitch route. Nelson leapt to make the catch and planted his left leg while turning to face Pittsburgh

cornerback Antwon Blake only to unexpectedly drop to his knees, a potentially devastating blow for the Packers and dynamic playmaker who set career highs in receptions (98) and yards receiving (1,519) in 2014.

"I'm not going to get into the 'What if' game," Rodgers said. "I don't know what his status will be. I'm just hoping for the best."

So are the Steelers after Pro Bowl center Maurkice Pouncey exited in the first quarter with a left ankle injury coach Mike Tomlin said will likely require surgery. Pouncey, who missed all of 2013 after tearing multiple ligaments in his right knee in the opener against Tennessee, is out indefinitely.

"He got rolled up on but he walked it off," Steelers right tackler Marcus Gilbert said. "I was hoping that it wasn't nothing too bad. Once he got carted off, it struck me."

READY TO GO

While Nelson and Pouncey are sidelined, Rodgers and Steelers quarterback Ben Roethlisberger appear ready to

Rodgers completed 4 of 5 passes for 57 yards during two series of work, with one

drive ending with a touchdown run by Eddie Lacy and the other with Rodgers getting sacked by James Harrison for a safety. Rodgers banged his forearm on the play and iced it afterward but said he could have continued if it was the regular season.

Lacy gave the Packers the lead four plays after Nelson's exit with a remarkably easy

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7-yard touchdown sprint through a massive hole on the left side of the line. A 2-point conversion by James Starks — through an equally massive hole on the right side — put Green Bay up 8-0.

"We've done some really good things the first two weeks, but shoot, there's a lot of football still," McCarthy said.

Roethlisberger finished 11 of 14 for 100 yards and a score, though it took some time to get going.

The Steelers struggled in the first quarter — a 58-yard touchdown pass from Roeth-lisberger to Antonio Brown was wiped out by an offensive pass interference penalty — but regrouped in the second. Working out of the hurry up offense, Roethlisberger led the Steelers 51 yards in seven plays, the last one a little 5-yard flip to a wide open Markus Wheaton that put the Steelers up 9-8 before the reserves took over.

"We've done a ton of red zone work and that's one of the plays we've been working on and we got the look we wanted," said Wheaton, who added he's never been that open when the offense has run that play during training camp.

QUARTERBACKS

Green Bay second-string quarterback Scott Tolzien completed 11 of 19 passes for 102 yards and a 21-yard score to Richard Rodgers late in the first half.

Bruce Gradkowski's preseason debut was brief. The primary backup behind Roethlisberger spent the first three weeks of training camp on the physically unable to perform list with a sore arm. He connected on 3 of 5 passes for 12 yards before leaving with a left finger injury.

Third-stringer Landry
Jones, trying to convince the
Steelers to keep him around,
tossed a pair of fourth-quarter touchdowns to complete a
rally from a 10-point deficit.
OTHER INJURIES

Green Bay guard T.J. Lang went out in the first half to be monitored for a concussion. Linebacker Adrian Hubbard and cornerback Damarious Randall were treated with IV fluids due to dehydration.

Pittsburgh defensive lineman Stephon Tuitt injured his left ankle.
IN A RUSH

The Steelers collected six sacks in all, including two by rookie linebacker Bud Dupree. The first-round pick from Kentucky was also in the area when Harrison tagged Rodgers for Pitts-burgh's first score.

"I just feel like things are starting to come together a little bit, just being patient," Dupree said. "I know eventually I'm going to keep doing good and get better and better each week."

sacks, and that was impressive."


