## BSISD tax hearing tonight

Trustees with the Big Spring Independent School District will hold a second public hearing on the 2016 proposed tax rate tonight.

The district is considering a tax rate of \$1.42 per \$100 valuation for M&O and debt service which is 5 cents higher than the current 2015 rate, however, the district still expects to bring in less taxable revenue.

According to figures provided by BSISD Chief Financial Officer Debbie Green, the 5 cent hike mitigates but does not erase an expected \$3.2 million loss in projected appropriations from loss



of both state funding and the \$76 million drop in the district's total taxable value.

Although officials have created a much tighter budget and reduced positions through attrition, the district is expected to

still work with a budget deficit of \$1.5 million, Green said.

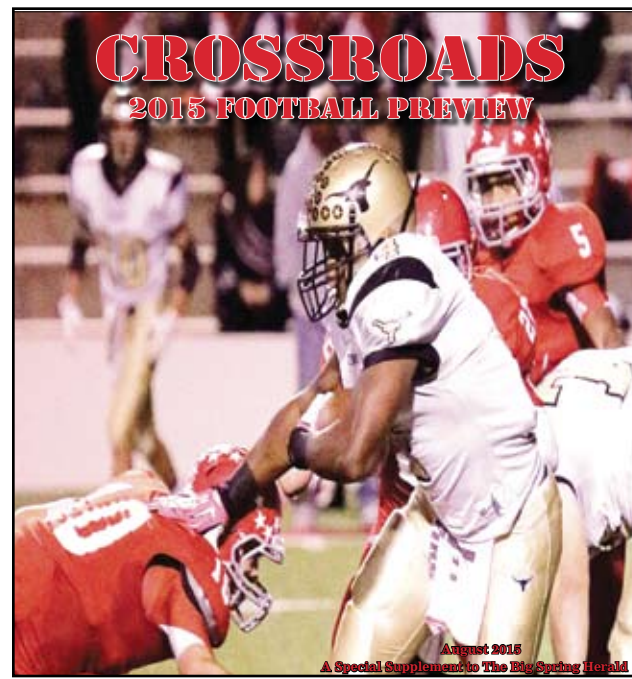
Expected to speak at the hearing are members of a group of citizens that banded together requesting entities not to raise taxes. The group is protesting property values this past year.

Trustees will meet at 5:15 p.m. in the high school board room, 707 11<sup>th</sup> Place.

Also during the meeting, trustees are expected to:

- Consider approval of the final amended budget for 2014-2015.
- Consider approval of the proposed budget for the 2015-2016 fiscal year.
- Consider approval of the tax rate resolution for the tax year 2015.

## Student numbers increase

*School districts report uptick in enrollment figures*

Howard County public school enrollment seems to continue to trend up for the most after a look at first day numbers.

Big Spring ISD first day of school enrollment figures this year was 3,912 students, up 25 students from last year when the enrollment tally was 3,887, according to BSISD Geroge Bancroft, community relations coordinator.

Coahoma ISD also saw jump in enrollment of 30 students, according to district officials. The official first day enrollment figure was 902 students, up from last year at 872.

Coahoma ISD has seen growth for a number of years, prompting administrators to make proactive changes at the campus level, according to CISD Superintendent Dr. Amy Jacobs.

"We're really about 90 to 100 students (up from) four years ago," Jacobs said. "Our elementary classrooms are close to capacity as far as space availability. The key to a small school system is planning to be prepared for that."

"We moved our sixth grade to our junior high campus

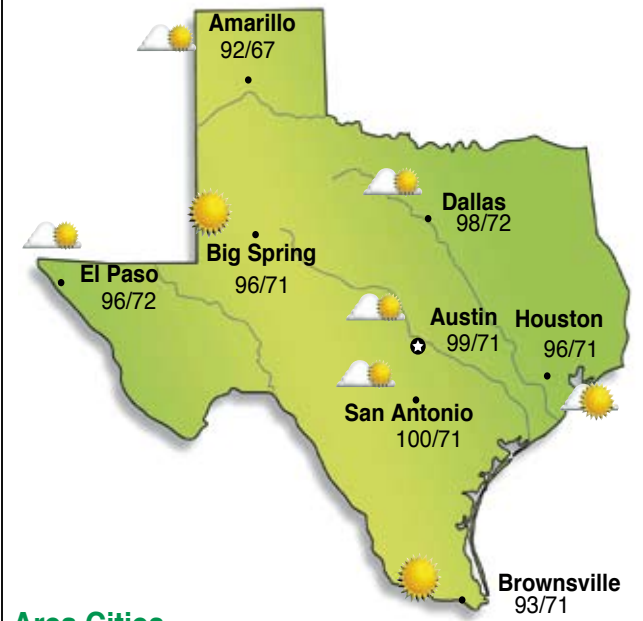

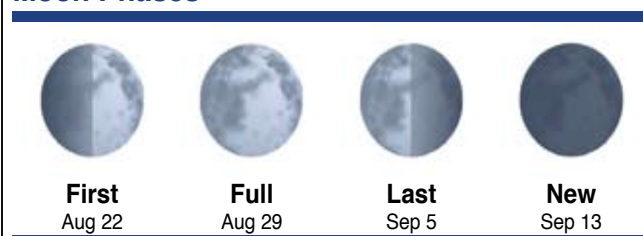

### Killings of 2 journalists on live TV in Virginia gripped millions in social media

MONETA, Va. (AP) — The fatal shooting of a reporter and cameraman unfolded on live TV during the early morning show, as tens of thousands of viewers watched a horrified anchor struggle to comprehend what had happened.

Within hours, the carefully scripted carnage carried out by a disgruntled former colleague spread to millions of viewers gripped by what had transformed into a social media storm. The governor initially described a car chase on his weekly radio show, with police on the shooter's tail on an interstate highway.

Then, social media posts referencing the slain TV pair surfaced on an account under an on-air pseudonym used by the gunman — culminating with a first-person video of the ambush filmed by the shooter.

The 56-second clip shows Vester Lee Flanagan II quietly approach WDBJ reporter Alison Parker and cameraman Adam Ward, gun in hand, as they conduct an interview. But Ward's camera was aimed at the mini-golf course nearby instead of the reporter. So the shooter waited, cursing Parker under his breath, for 20 seconds until the live television picture was back on the reporter. Then he fired eight shots without saying a word.

The attack seemed carefully planned. Flanagan was captured in a rental car he reserved at some point before the shootings; his own Mustang was found abandoned at the local airport, Franklin County Sheriff Bill Overton said. The interview was done at a shopping center not yet open for the day at a remote lake in Moneta, some 25 miles away from WDBJ's studios in Roanoke. The station promoted where the reporter would be, including a plug on Twitter just a half hour before the shooting.

### Trump's campaign operation upends conventional wisdom

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — Not only is Donald Trump an unconventional candidate, he's got a campaign operation that turns the conventional wisdom of electoral politics on its head.

While Democratic front-runner Hillary Rodham Clinton boasts an army of more than 350 paid staffers, Trump's operation fields less than a tenth that number.

It includes a coterie of about a dozen paid staffers operating out of the campaign headquarters at Trump Tower on Manhattan's Fifth Avenue — the same building where Trump lives and runs his real estate empire.

His team has no pollster, fundraisers or media consultant and only announced its first fulltime, big-name policy adviser this week.

The rest of the 25 or so paid members

of the Trump campaign are mostly in the early-voting states of New Hampshire, Iowa and South Carolina, states where the billionaire businessman-turned-reality TV host is ahead in polls, leaving the Republican establishment scratching its head.

### Obama marks New Orleans' rebirth 10 years after Hurricane Katrina

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Barack Obama is marking 10 years since Hurricane Katrina by celebrating the revival of New Orleans, which suffered the worst of the ferocious storm's devastation, while again warning all levels of government to start helping communities prepare for the stronger hurricanes, tornadoes and wildfires that climate change will bring.

Obama planned visits Thursday with Mayor Mitch Landrieu and those who have spent the past decade rebuilding their lives and communities. He was delivering remarks at a newly opened community center in a largely African-American neighborhood, the Lower 9th Ward, that was among those hardest hit by the storm. It is still struggling to recover.

"Not only was it a terrible natural disaster, but it was a fundamental failure on the part of government to respond rapidly," Obama told WWL-TV of New Orleans in an interview Wednesday. He praised recovery efforts by the federal, state and local governments as well as the private sector.

"We've seen this city bounce back. I want to highlight the outstanding work that has been done, but I want to remind people that there's still work to do," he said.

### For the worst wounded of Mideast's many wars, an advanced new hospital opens in Jordan

AMMAN, Jordan (AP) — They are among the most tragically wounded from the Middle East's multiple wars. A 14-year-old Syrian girl whose lower legs were torn off by a shell. A 15-year-old Iraqi boy who was severely burned in a car bomb explosion.

To treat such patients, the international charity Médecins Sans Frontières (Doctors Without Borders) next month officially inaugurates its new reconstructive surgery hospital for war victims, which it says is unique in the region.

The Amman hospital gathers together battle-tested surgeons, counselors and physiotherapists specialized in war victims. It will eventually offer 3-D printing for hand and face prostheses. The eight-story building is also envisioned as a learning center where surgeons from the region and the West can teach each other new skills.

three years ago, which was very fortunate, because our elementary school finished out the school year with 440 students at the elementary pre-kindergarten through sixth in 2012. Now the figures are about 460 pre-k through fifth."

Although student growth is welcome, Jacobs said it presents a double-edge sword as values have drastically declined from \$520 million to \$380 million,

causing the district to dig into its reserve fund to prevent cutting student services.

"This will be our lowest (tax) revenue and highest student population," Jacobs explained. "We are trying to be very financially responsible with our cuts in order to finish out the year without drastic budget cuts to our student programs. We will have to have a budget deficit this coming fiscal year. We are in a position where we don't have a choice."

Forsan ISD was the only county school district to report a decrease

in enrollment, but it was very slight.

Superintendent Randy Johnson shares that FISD had first day enrollment figures to be 721, which is down two students from last year's 723.

Despite the slight decrease, Johnson said the first-day figures were a pleasant surprise.

"We had increases the past couple of years, but with the downturn in the oil industry, when we were making projections for this year, we thought we'd have a pretty dramatic loss, but that didn't happen," Johnson said.

### Astros top last year's win total, beat Yankees 6-2

### 2nd Howard Co. Bowl Friday

NEW YORK (AP)—A green laser beam bounced around a fog-filled clubhouse, music blared from all corners of the darkened room. It's a post-game party that's becoming commonplace with these Houston Astros.

Gattis hit two home runs, Coltin McHugh excelled once again and the Astros exceeded last season's win total, beating the New York Yankees 6-2 Wednesday.

"We could see it," said Gattis, in his first year with Houston. "We're not on an island out there. We could see it."

Still, did he expect such a dramatic turnaround?

"Maybe not this quick," he said.

The AL West leaders improved to 71-57, a year after going 70-92. With almost six weeks left on the schedule, the Astros already have achieved their best season since 2010.

Houston also managed to win a road series for the first time since mid-June at Colorado, taking two of three at Yankee Stadium.

"We see what we've done and haven't done," McHugh said. "It's always there."

Following four seasons in which they averaged 104 losses, the Astros now lead the majors in home runs and have the

best ERA in the AL and the most stolen bases.

"We have a lot of strengths," manager A.J. Hinch said. "We can do a lot of damage."

The Yankees have lost five of seven, a slide that's cost them first place in the AL East. The Astros kept them skidding.

"They pitch very well, good defense and they hit the ball out of the ballpark. That's a pretty good combination," Yankees manager Joe Girardi said. "And they can steal bases."

"They got the best of us," he said.

Gattis sliced an opposite-field shot to right in the second inning and launched a long drive into the left field seats in the eighth. His third homer in two days gave him 22 this year and boosted the Astros' total to 174.

McHugh (14-7) kept up a recent run of ace pitching, both for himself and the team.

Houston has won seven of nine, setting a team record by not permitting more than two runs in any of three

The last AL team with a longer streak was Baltimore in 1974, which went 10 in a row.

McHugh shut out the Yankees until Didi Gregorius hit a two-run homer in the seventh. He outpitched Michael Pineda (9-8) for the second time this year and has allowed just seven runs in his last five starts.

A day after a 15-1 romp that saw excitable Carlos Gomez get into a dustup with the Yankees, there weren't any signs of ill will between the teams. Houston star Jose Altuve was hit in the shoulder by a pitch in the ninth and merely looked at reliever Nick Goody as he walked to first base.

The power-packed Astros did show off their small-ball side during a four-run fifth that made it 5-0.

Gomez beat out an infield hit and Luis Valbuena followed with a hit-and-run single.

Jake Marisnick then bunted for a single, driving in a run as the Yankees got tangled up trying to make a play at

first.

Earlier, Altuve stole his AL-leading 33rd base. The All-Star second baseman made his big league debut in 2011, the start of four lean years for the Astros.

"I always believed in the rebuilding process," Altuve said.

Pineda came off the disabled list after missing nearly a month because of a strained right forearm.

New York needs him to do well, especially after putting starter CC Sabathia on the DL this week, but Pineda was tagged for five runs on six hits and a walk in 4 1-3 innings.

Gattis connected off Adam Warren in the eighth for his fifth career multihomer game and second this season.

Two of Howard County's own will take Memorial Field Friday night at 7:00 p.m. in what is a forsaken tradition.

Forsan and Coahoma will face off in each of their respective season openers tomorrow, a day that both teams have been planning for weeks.

"This is what we've been working towards since Aug. 3," Coahoma head coach Fred Dietz said.

"This is why we put in so many hours and so much sacrifice, for the chance to go out and compete."

The teams are strikingly different, one built on foundation and the other trying to establish an identity. First-year coach Dietz has spent pre-season converting the offense from Wing-T to Air Raid, and Friday night will be the first true test of their progress.

"I'm excited how our kids have taken to the new system and how they're enjoying it. We've experienced some success in our first two scrimmages offensively and the goal is to build upon that every week," Dietz said.

Junior Kody Barber will be the starting quarterback for Coahoma. Coaches have held him in high regard through the pre-season, but this is still his first game in a new system.

"My biggest concern is

how fast we will be able to make in-game adjustments. I'm pleased with how we've learned, but we will need to make adjustments quickly as the game unfolds," Dietz said.

On the flip side, the Forsan Buffaloes are led by coach Jason Phillips, who is entering his 11th season as coach. He acknowledges that there are challenges to overcome when facing a team implementing a new system.

"It's a whole new team essentially so we can't take much from years past when preparing defensively," Phillips said. "Their defense will be the same and it's quite unique. The biggest factor I think will be how we handle the in-game adjustments."

Forsan's offense is headed by third-year starting quarterback Jesse Cervantes, a dual-threat player. Jesse can beat defenses with his arms and his legs, which should put a lot of pressure on Coahoma's three-man front to contain him.

Forsan is bringing an experienced defense to the game, returning four starters from last year's squad.

Defense hasn't been an issue when these teams face, as last year's game was a 6-2 Coahoma victory.

Kickoff is at 7:00 p.m. and both coaches recommend fans come early, be loud and stay late.

He is 2-3 in six starts since being acquired from Oakland and owns the AL's third-best ERA.

Yankees: RHP Masahiro Tanaka (9-6, 3.61) starts at Atlanta.

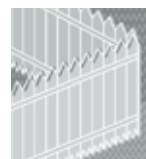

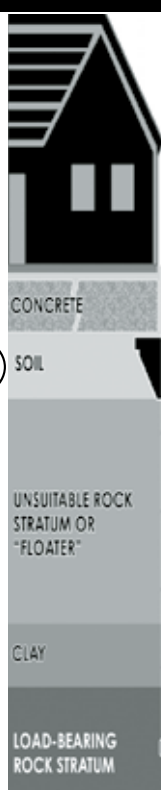

Opening lead — queen of spades.

There are hands where declarer seemingly has no choice but to hope for a 3-3 split in a key suit. But because that division occurs only 36 percent of the time, he should not accept these odds without first looking for a way to improve on them.

South failed to make that effort on this deal. He played low from dummy on West's first two spade leads, hoping East had started with the singleton or doubleton ace, but East took his ace on the third round

and shifted to a diamond. South won with the ace and cashed all five of his trumps, hoping for a 3-3 club division or a discarding error by the opponents. But East retained all of his clubs, and declarer eventually lost a diamond trick to go down one.

South could have improved his chances considerably had he taken steps to guard against a 4-2 club break. After winning the diamond return, he should cash the A-K of trumps and K-A of clubs, and then ruff a small club high to prevent a possible overruff by West. South next crosses to the ten of hearts, simultaneously drawing West's last trump, and cashes the Q-7 of clubs to make the contract.

Note the importance of ruffing the third round of clubs instead of trying to cash the queen first. This protects against the possibility of either defender having started with a doubleton club and three trumps, as in the actual deal.

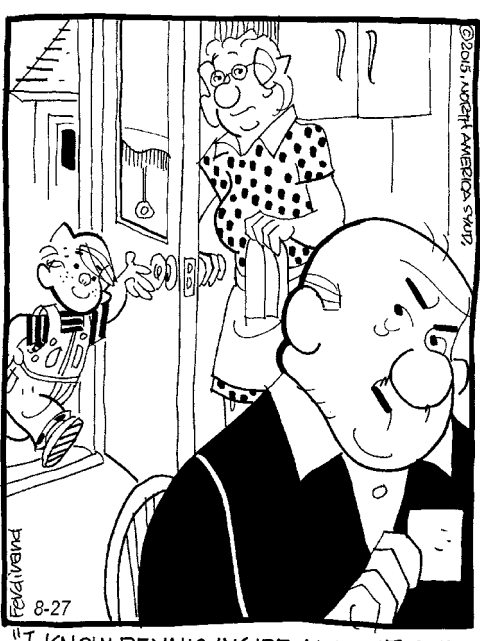
It is true that if the opposing clubs are 3-3, this extra effort turns out to be unnecessary. But if the clubs are 4-2 — a division that occurs 48 percent of the time — declarer can raise his total chance of success to 84 percent (once trumps have divided 3-2) by adopting the recommended line of play.

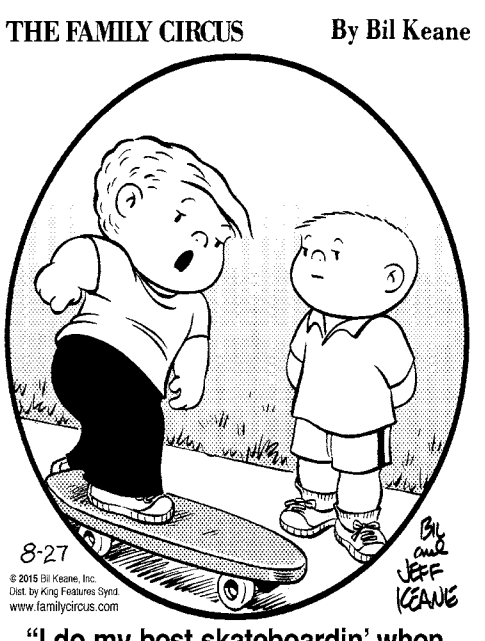

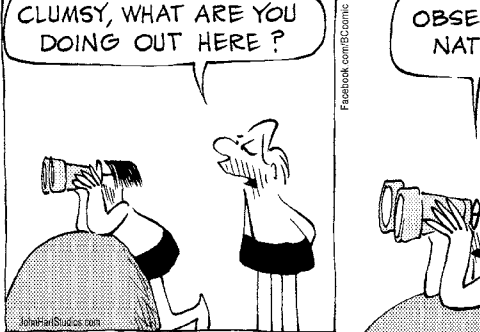

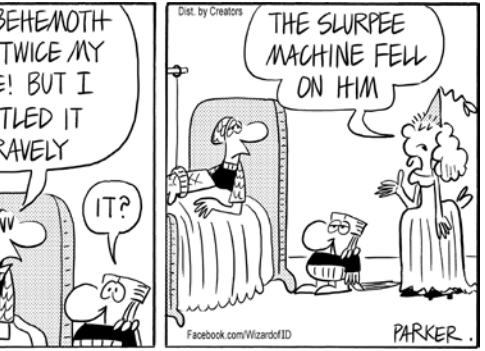

This Date In History

Today is Thursday, August 27, the 239th day of 2015. There are 126 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On August 27, 1975, Haile Selassie (HY'lee sehl-AH'-see), the last emperor of Ethiopia's 3,000-year-old monarchy, died in Addis Ababa at age 83 almost a year after being overthrown.

On this date:

In 1776, the Battle of Long Island began during the Revolutionary War as British troops attacked American forces, who ended up being forced to retreat two days later.

In 1883, the island volcano Krakatoa erupted with a series of cataclysmic explosions; the resulting tidal waves in Indonesia's Sunda Strait claimed some 36,000 lives in Java and Sumatra.

In 1908, Lyndon Baines Johnson, the 36th president of the United States, was born near Stonewall, Texas.

In 1928, the Kellogg-Briand Pact was signed in Paris, outlawing war and providing for the peaceful settlement of disputes.

In 1939, the first turbojet-powered aircraft, the Heinkel He 178, went on its first full-fledged test flight over Germany.

In 1949, a violent white mob prevented an outdoor concert headlined by Paul Robeson from taking place near Peekskill, New York. (The concert was held eight days later.)

In 1957, the USS Swordfish, the second Skate Class nuclear submarine, was launched from the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard in Maine.

In 1962, the United States launched the Mariner 2 space probe, which flew past Venus in December 1962.

In 1965, influential Swiss-born architect Le Corbusier, 77, died in Cap Martin, France.

In 1979, British war hero Lord Louis Mountbatten and three other people, including his 14-year-old grandson Nicholas, were killed off the coast of Ireland in a boat explosion claimed by the Irish Republican Army.

In 1989, the first U.S. commercial satellite rocket was launched from Cape Canaveral, Florida, as a Delta booster carrying a British communications satellite, the Marcompolo 1.

In 2008, Barack Obama was nominated for president by the Democratic National Convention in Denver.

Ten years ago: President George W. Bush asked Americans in his weekly radio address to be patient with the U.S. military mission in Iraq as thousands of pro-Bush and anti-war demonstrators competed for attention in his tiny hometown of Crawford, Texas.

Five years ago: Cuba issued a pair of surprising free market decrees, allowing foreign investors to lease government land for at least 99 years and loosening state controls on commerce to let citizens grow and sell their own fruits and vegetables.

# Parent's Corner

A little history about a quality product line

At one time or another we have all been involved in some sort of home improvement activity which involves the purchase of an appliance. This happened to me recently when I had to remove an old vent-a-hood from our kitchen.

I attempted to repair it but all my efforts failed.

I even enlisted the help of my 'fix anything' brother-in-law, but he was also unable to get the 'hood' to working properly. So, the next step was to purchase a new one and my first thought happened to be Kenmore.

I've been purchasing Kenmore products for years and have always been pleased with the performance I have gotten, but for the first time I began to wonder; where did the Kenmore product originate and where did the name come from?

As I began to do a bit of research I found some pretty interesting information so I thought I'd share some of it with you.

Strangely enough, No one really knows where the brand name originated, however it's been thought that it was

named after Kenmore Avenue, which is a prominent street name in Chicago. I learned that Kenmore is the number one brand in the appliance industry today, ranked either number one or two in every major appliance category.

It first appeared as a Sears laundry appliance, an agitator type, wringer washing machine in 1927. However its first appearance almost escaped notice since it did not show up in the Sears catalog that year, and no known photograph of that model machine exists today.

By the end of the 1920s nearly 99 percent of urban homes were wired for electricity and Sears recognized the huge untapped market in household appliances. To reach this market Sears began offering a wide assortment of appliances with the Kenmore name.

By 1936, Sears had already sold 1 million Kenmore laundry items. After the Second World War, Sears helped revolutionize home décor with the introduction of additional Kenmore appliances, which featured the latest designs and technology for washing machines, dryers, and ranges. These appliances came in bright colors, including Sunshine Yellow,

Malibu Coral, Aquamarine, and the standard white finish.

Over the decades new Kenmore products reflected consumer demand and Kenmore began producing dishwashers, garbage disposals, and trash compactors, ranges, washing machines, dryers, countertop appliances, sunlamps, electric baby bottle sterilizers, vacuum cleaners, electric blankets, 3-piece barber sets, and electric shavers.

In 1977 Sears began producing refrigerators. Kenmore has continued to be a trusted name in appliances and its market share continues to be extraordinary. Today, nearly one in every three American homes contains a Kenmore appliance, but many of those appliances are actually produced by other brand name companies under the Kenmore quality guidelines.

Now you know as much as I do about Kenmore products. By the way, my search for the vent-a-hood was successful, but the installation is yet to be completed. I think I need to put in another call to my brother-in-law.

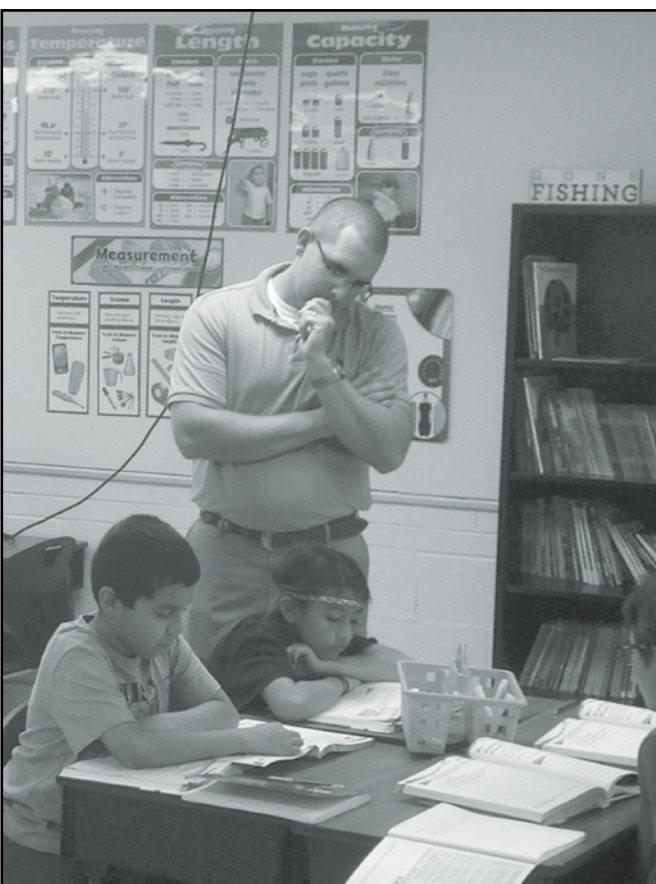

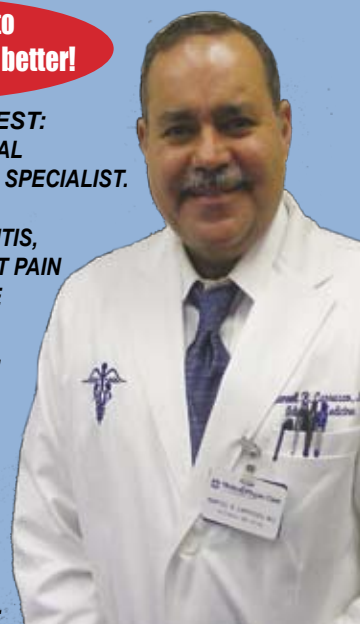

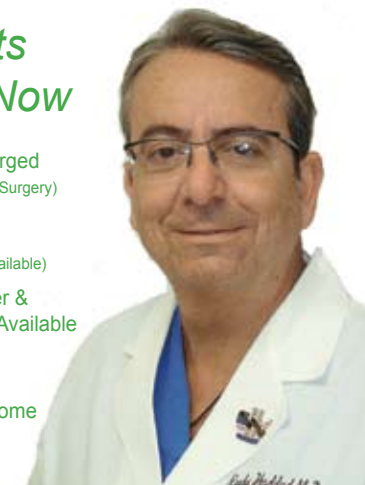
