

City council opposes Valor increase

The council voted to oppose a Valor rate increase as are most of the cities served by Valor. According to Mayor Collins, Valor has fallen short on some provisions of an agreement signed on February 22, 2000. One of those provisions stipulated that an office was to be maintained in Dimmitt that would allow walk-in payments, etc. The council voted unanimously to oppose the increase.

The Dimmitt City Coun- recently purchased from the Texas Department of Transportation, west of town. There are 4.2 acres in the tract. This facility will house the city's utility department.

The pay was set for the election judge and the election clerks at \$7.00 per hour. VC Hopson will be the judge. Darla Fisher, Mary Lou Lumbrera will hold the clerk's positions with another clerk to be named later.

Bids were opened relative to the sale of the La Mantia property (old vegetable shed north of town). The high bid was \$7,501 submitted by Heartland Livestock, Inc.

Two bids were also opened for the purchase of a police car. Jack Morris Ford of Plainview submitted a bid of \$22,450 and Whiteface Ford of Hereford submitted a bid of \$22,150. The lower of the two bids was accepted.

A settlement of \$11,500 was received for the police car that was recently wrecked.

credit-reporting agencies Experian, Trans Union and Equifax.

Contact the credit reporting agencies and have them place a fraud alert in your file.

Call your bank or credit union and have them cancel your account numbers, ATM and debit cards and PIN numbers, then get new ones.

Together we can show the Hollywood elites that their views are not our views. Together, we can send a message to entertainment executives that we don't love their shows and love their


music so much that we will turn a blind eye to the behavior of their employees. There are times in American history when it becomes necessary for the "silent majority" to speak out. Now is one of those times.



"I wasn't born in Texas, but I got here as fast as I could." We've all seen those bumper stickers on the highways and byways of our great state. It is a feeling shared by many who have come from all over the world to call Texas home. It is certainly indicative of the unique bond Texans and non-Texans alike share for the Lone Star state.

Very few states enjoy such a rich history. We are the only state to enter the United States as a sovereign nation. Each year, starting on March 2, when Texas declared its independence from Mexico, through April 21, San Jacinto Day, when we defeated the Mexican army, captured Santa Anna and won our freedom, people around the state find ways — small and grand — to celebrate being a Texan.

I have always loved Texas history in large part because of my family heritage. My great-great-grandfather, Charles S. Taylor, was an ""Alcalde" or chief magistrate under the Mexican government. He was later elected as a delegate from Nacogdoches to the Convention, where he signed the Texas Declaration of Independence in 1836. He, along with 58 other delegates, declared our independence from Mexico, setting Texas on course to be an independent republic for 10 years before joining the United States. One of his fellow delegates was Thomas Rusk, who would later hold a seat in the United States Senate — the same seat I proudly hold today.

Each year, on or about March 2, I take the opportunity to read Colonel William Barret Travis' letter, calling for reinforcements at the Alamo, on the floor of the United States Senate. This year was no exception.

Col. Travis wrote:

"I shall never surrender or retreat I call on you in the name of liberty, of patriotism and of everything dear to the American character, to come to our aid, with all dispatch. The enemy is receiving reinforcements daily and will no doubt increase to three or four thousand in four or five days. If this call is neglected, I am determined to sustain myself as long as possible and die like a soldier who never forgets what is due to his own honor and that of his country — Victory or death."

The bravery and solidarity of Col. Travis and the men he led at the Alamo are unmatched. Their refusal to yield in San Antonio enabled General Sam Houston build up his troops, preparing for ultimate victory at the Battle of San Jacinto.

It is important for Texans to revel in our history and celebrate the strength and valor of our forefathers. Our independence was born out of a great battle and must never be taken for granted.

In the nearly two centuries since the Battle of the Alamo, Texas has forged a distinct path, growing into a prosperous and vital state. Dimmitt becomes high-tech community

If you live in or near Dimmitt, then you will soon have a public computer available to you—for free.

If you don't know how to use a computer, then someone will teach youfor free.

If you know the basics of using a computer, then you can learn advanced computer operations-for

If you'd like to learn a specific skill or program on a computer, such as quilting or genealogy or digital photography, then a class will probably be available to you-for free.

If you'd like to learn to use the Internet to communicate with your friends and relatives via "email," or shop for a car, or set up a business conference, or learn about the fishing at Possum Kingdom, you'll be able to do so at any of 12 computer sites around town-for free.

You'll even be able to take your laptop to the Gazebo and get online, either via phone modem or a nifty wireless access service.

These new benefits of living in Dimmitt are coming available soon through the new Dimmitt Community Network, which will offer free public use of 33 computers (plus necessary printers, scanners and fax machines) at a dozen different sites around town.

The ambitious project is financed by a \$250,000 grant from the Texas Infrastructure Fund, plus \$25,000 in city matching funds and in-kind contributions.

The Infrastructure Fund (TIF) is made up of money collected mandated through a surcharge that's on everyone's monthly telephone bill.

supervises the Alternative School and writes the Dimmitt ISD's grant applications, landed the "TIF Grant" for the community and is the project's manager.

sites will be available for individual use, and several will double as classrooms when needed. "Computer rooms" have been built in at the Dimmitt City Hall council will be "on line" constantly

computers), the Senior Citizens Center (six computers) and the Teen Center at 105 SE Second St. (four computers). Also, the network will utilize the computer labs at all three of the public schools.

Individual computers for public use will be located at the Dimmitt School Administration Building boardroom, 608 W. Halsell St.; the Castro County Museum, 404 W. Halsell Texas St.; Azteca Housing Complex office, 910 E. Jones St.; Chamber of Commerce, 115 W. Bedford St.; Rhoads Memorial Library, Southwest Second & Bedford; and Panhandle Darlene Collins, who Community Services office, 108 SW Second St.

Collins works with a steering committee of local civic leaders, public servants, teachers and individuals who are "savvy" All of the computer in computer technology. Local contractors are being used for as much of the construction work as possible, she said.

The entire network

chambers (with eight via wireless Internet access, which is being installed by WT Services, Inc., Collins said. All the computers in the network are Texas-made Dell models.

An "open house" to show the system to the public will be announced soon, and Collins said she hopes computer classes can begin about May 1.

Everyone signing up to use the network for any purpose will have a personal password or security-ID number that will guard his or her files or Internet address from being accessed or used by anyone else. Also, the system will deny access to pornographic sites, and parents will have approval of what types of network services their children may access, Collins said.

If you're interested in utilizing the new Dimmitt Community Network or taking a course, you may pick up the proper sign-up forms after April 15 at Rhoads Memorial Library.

Collins and her fellow planners—all of whom are volunteers—are enthusiastic about Dimmitt achieving this new "high tech" level community-wide.

"This network can have a tremendous impact on the quality of life in our community," Collins said. "It will put us in touch with the whole world. Our business and professional people will be able to teleconference with it; our students will have more research capabilities; and we'll all be able to communicate with each other and with people everywhere. The benefits we may get from it are just limitless."

What's the law....

Q. I want to be cremated after I die. I also would like my ashes destroyed. I am concerned that my family will not follow my wishes. What can I do to ensure that my remains are disposed of the way I want?

A. Texas law permits a person to direct, in writing, how his or her remains should be disposed of following death. You may do this in your will or in a separate document. You also have the right to designate an agent to carry out your wishes. This is the best way to ensure that your remains are handled in the manner that you desire.

If you do not leave directions for the disposition of your remains, the law determines who makes the decision.

slowed, I would like to explain a problem that several clients have experienced this tax season. Re-Some were quite a bit less. The reason for this is that the government is trying to put more money into the economy through the year by requiring less withholding from paychecks. This means that from January through July 2002, a single person or a married person having the income taxes withheld as a single person were having 10% to 12% From July to withheld. December withholding decreased to 6% or 8%. This may not sound like much but it really makes a big

year when taxes are filed.

For part time workers the percentage decreased to 1% or 3% less withholding. If funds are less this year. you are in the 10% tax ried individual check the bracket, your refund was approximately 100 to 600 dollars less. For those taxpayers in the 15% to 27% bracket, you either broke even or had to pay taxes. Several taxpayers had help with the education, child tax credit and savers credit this year making the refund about the same as last year.

> To check your withholding, to make sure you are having enough withheld, take the amount withhold and divide it by your gross wages. If this percentage is less than 10%, you may want

employer to withhold a larger amount. If you are looking for a large refund, we recommend that a marbox on the W-4 to withhold as "married but withhold as single" and claim zero dependents. If you mark the box for one dependent, the chart is set up to withhold for three exemptions. If you are married and check the "married" with no exemptions, the withholding is actually deducted for two exemptions. For single taxpayers, you may want to withhold an extra \$10 a week.


> A. As far as the law is concerned, your employer doesn't even need a reason to fire you. Unless you have an employment contract for a set period of time, Texas law treats you as an employee at will. This means you may be fired, or quit, at any time, for any or no reason.

Q. I am being threatened with a lawsuit by a credit card company. If they sue and win, do they have the right to take the money in my IRA?
