Back in the flow

City crew fix major water outage on north side of Big Spring

Complete water service was restored to the north side of town by midnight after city crews wrestled for two days to repair a water line break that was caused by a private contractor accidentally drilled through the line.

According to Johnny Womack, city public works director, isolating the work area and some faulty parts caused lengthy delays in the repair job.

"Normally we don't have a problem, but it was a struggle to get the area isolated," Womack said. "Around 4:30 p.m. yesterday (Thursday) the sleeves wouldn't hold. We had to take it apart and get new ones."

The north side of town was without

West Texas Centers: Learn the warning signs of suicide

Special to the Herald

Many don't understand the deep emotional pain that leads someone to commit suicide, but if they can recognize the signs of suicide and reach out to someone struggling it can make a difference, West

Texas Centers CEO Shelley Smith, LMSW, said.

"We often hear from the public that people who threaten to commit suicide are just seeking attention," Smith said. "When a person says he or she wants to die, we need to pay attention."

People with mental illness

are more often predisposed to attempt suicide, Smith said, as are those who are depressed.

To open a dialogue on suicide, the American Association of Suicidology holds Suicide Prevention Week the week of Sept. 7-13.

'Preventing Suicide, Reach-

ing Out and Saving Lives' is the theme of the 2015 World Suicide Prevention Day.

Suicide is the 10th leading cause of death in the United States with one suicide occurring on average every 12.8 minutes.

Texas ranks 43 in the nation in its rate of suicide deaths,

according to the American Association of Suicidology.

West Texas Centers — the regional mental health authority for 23 rural counties in West Texas — provides outpatient care for people living with mental illnesses and

Jack (John) N. Little, (aka "Papasani") died peacefully at age 81, surrounded by his family on Sept. 2, 2015, in Austin, Texas after a brief illness. A memorial service celebrating Jack's life will be held at 2 p.m. Monday, Sept. 7, 2015, at Covenant Presbyterian Church in Austin, Texas. Jack will be remembered as a man who was a source of intelligent conversation sprinkled with wit, wisdom

and abundant life experience. His love of learning was infectious, and his example of grace and dignity wrapped in an understated package was a joy to behold.

Jack grew up in Big Spring, Texas. He earned the rank of Eagle Scout and served as president of the student body at Big Spring High School. After graduating from high school at age 16, he attended the University of Texas in Austin, where he was elected Foreman of the Texas Cowboys, Abbot of the Friar Society and Vice President of the Student Body before graduating from UT Law School, where he served on the Texas Law Review. He was a member of Delta Tau Delta fraternity.

Jack met Gayle Harlan, the love of his life, at UT, and they remained sweethearts for 61 years until parted by his death. Although Gayle was from Houston, she cheerfully went to Big Spring with him when they married, as Jack wanted to practice law with his father, who specialized in the defense of civil suits.

Jack's practice blossomed and he was inducted into the American College of Trial Lawyers at the age of 41. By the time Jack retired, he had handled hundreds of cases for defendants in civil litigation in more than 30 Texas counties and in courts ranging from El Paso in the west, Abilene in the east, Amarillo in the north, and Del Rio in the south, as well as the Texas Supreme Court and the U.S. Fifth Circuit.

After Jack retired, he and Gayle moved to Austin in 1996 where he devoted his time to passions and hobbies that surpassed his career ambitions. Jack enjoyed spending time with his children, grandchildren and friends. He was a member of Covenant Presbyterian Church.

Jack served as chairman of the Research Task Force of the UT Centennial Commission, and he later served on the Research Committee as a member of the UT Commission of 125.

Jack had a lifelong interest in learning. After retiring and returning to Austin, he audited courses in a variety of subjects at UT, in addition to studying university-level materials both published and online.

Jack earned a twin-engine pilot's license, a Master YMCA Scuba rating, and he was delighted when he finally learned how to (generally) remain vertical on most ski runs. Jack and Gayle traveled extensively around the world, and after brushing up on the languages he would likely encounter in other countries, Jack became proficient enough in Spanish, Italian, German and French to communicate with locals who spoke no English.

water service for about two days after a contractor accidentally drilled into a water main line, Womack said.

According to Womack, the city had crew of about four to five employees working to repair the break. Each

crew worked more than 12 hours each before the repair work was finished.

Water service was lost to residents on the north side from NE 2nd Street to Interstate 20 and between Gregg St. and Birdwell. Several residents around the city experienced low water pressure for a time as the city turned off a pump at the plant until crews could isolate the issue, Womack said.

educates the community on how to help those living with these disorders.

Mental health professionals say that some of the warning signs of suicide are:

• Threatening to hurt or kill himself or herself

- Looking for ways to kill himself or herself: seeking access to pills, weapons, or other means
- Talking or writing about death, dying, or suicide
- Hopelessness
- Rage, anger, seeking revenge
- Acting recklessly or engaging in risky activities, seemingly without thinking
- Feeling trapped, like

there's no way out

- Increasing alcohol or drug use
- Withdrawing from friends, family or society
- Anxiety, agitation, unable to sleep or sleeping all the time
- Dramatic changes in mood
- No reason for living, no sense of purpose in life

People who attempt

suicide may exhibit one or many of these signs or may not exhibit any of these symptoms, Smith said.

West Texas Centers offers a 24-hour mental health crisis hotline for anyone who needs immediate assistance. The toll-free number is 1-800-375-4357.

Republicans and racial fears

After the 2008 presidential election, it was obvious that American politics was entering a new era in which race would figure less than it had before. For the first time in our history, we had a president who was not white, and it was bound to have a profound, positive impact.

Whites would find that a black president would not make their lives worse. Blacks would face less prejudice and feel more fully American. The deep wounds of slavery and discrimination would heal and fade. We were entering a “post-racial” era.

It lasted about as long as the average honeymoon. Barack Obama stimulated more racial neuroses than he banished. Before long, Fox News host Glenn Beck called him a “racist” with a “deep-seated hatred for white people.” Rush Limbaugh said he was “behaving like an African colonial despot.” Obama’s birth certificate was an issue that wouldn’t go away.

From this year’s campaign, it’s clear that race is just as potent a factor as ever. In fact, attitudes about race may be the basic divide in the 2016 election.

The shooting of Michael Brown in August 2014 exposed a wide gulf among Americans — between those of any race who regarded black anger about police conduct as legitimate and those who didn’t. To a large extent, the split ran along partisan lines.

An ABC News-Washington Post poll last year found that Republicans were twice as likely as Democrats to think whites and blacks get equal treatment from the criminal justice system or to say police don’t discriminate. Put simply, most Democrats sympathize with African-American grievances. Most Republicans don’t.

In an Associated Press-Times Square Alliance survey last De-

cember, GOP voters said the rise of the Islamic State was the most important news event of 2014. Democrats, by contrast, gave priority to the unrest in Ferguson and elsewhere over the deaths of unarmed black men at the hands of cops.

This is not purely a matter of differing philosophies of criminology. On issue after issue, racial attitudes play a major role in where the two parties come out. Illegal immigration, “Black Lives Matter,” the Confederate flag, even the mountain previously known as McKinley — all are filtered through fundamental though sometimes subconscious feelings about race.

Donald Trump is doing so well because he exploits racial anxieties masterfully without ever raising them directly.

He complains we are “losing our country,” ridicules “political correctness,” blames Mexicans for “bringing crime” and claims to represent the “silent majority.” All these themes are perfectly designed to appeal to white resentments and fear of minorities.

Trump’s strategy is hardly unique. When a white sheriff’s deputy was shot to death in Houston, allegedly by a black man, Ted Cruz blamed it on Obama for striving to “tear us apart along racial lines, to inflame racial divisions.”

When Martin O’Malley apologized for telling “Black Lives Matter” protesters that “all lives matter,” Jeb Bush took umbrage. “If he believes that white lives matter, which I hope he does, then he shouldn’t apologize with a group that seemed to dis-

agree with it,” said Bush, neatly smearing both O’Malley and the demonstrators.

Mike Huckabee said Martin Luther King Jr. would be “appalled by the notion that we’re elevating some lives above others.” It’s never clear whether Huckabee is an ignoramus or merely a demagogue. For the record, King said, “A society that has done something special against the negro for hundreds of years must now do something special for the negro.”

The activists’ slogan is meant to elevate the value of black lives, not diminish that of white ones. A longer version would be: “Black lives should matter as much as white lives.”

Responding to police mistreatment of African-Americans by saying “all lives matter” is like demanding that doctors divide their time evenly between the healthy and the sick. Taking the slogan to be racist is like regarding Black History Month as racist. Which, come to think of it, Trump probably does.

Whites are on their way to becoming a minority of the population. The Republican candidates know that many of the party faithful associate this trend with national decline and social decay, so they cater to — and maybe even share — these fears.

For half a century, the GOP has been able to reap political success from the racial reality once noted by Alabama’s George Wallace (a segregationist Democrat): “They’re more of us than they are of them.” That won’t be the case for many more years, and a party that wants to prosper has to adapt.

But Republicans are campaigning like it’s 1968.

Generals have marked their operations by putting pins on wall maps of the world. I could do the same for friends and neighbors who have just gotten back from some place and are about to leave for another. They often move in battalions meeting friends or family — who themselves have traveled great distances — in some center of cultural/culinary/scenic excellence.

A few appear to spend fewer nights in their gracious homes than in airport hotels, preparing for a pre-dawn flight out.

There may be no place like home, but elsewhere always seems preferable.

Are we to believe that their travels are as fabulous as their Facebook posts suggest?

Note the pictures showing them in some sublime Croatian village, never at overcrowded Gate 42B.

The dreaded FOMO — fear of missing out — may contribute to this perpetual need to venture far. Oxford Dictionaries defines FOMO as “anxiety that an exciting or interesting event may currently be happening elsewhere, often aroused by posts seen on a social media website.”

The mania for making bucket lists further inflames this angst. The book “1,000 Places to See Before You Die” is the mother of them all.

When someone asks the author, Patricia Schultz, to cite her favorite trip, she responds, “My next one.”

Given her mile-long list of destinations, one can well believe

Schultz’s contention, “It is rare that I return to a place where I have already been.”

How about the quality of time spent traveling? You’ve seen those “36 Hours in Madrid” travel pieces listing four hot restaurants/bars, three markets and two museums in addition to the Prado. The reality is you and a million other tourists racing around the plazas to witness the “relaxed” Iberian culture enjoyed by old Spaniards who themselves never go anywhere.

As for Italy, Schultz raves about the Piazza del Duomo in Parma, adding that one might want to visit the city during the Festival del Prosciutto.

That would knock off two items in one day.

These checklists often seem “a commodification of cultural experience,” Rebecca Mead wrote in *The New Yorker*.

And how deep is the experience? Some of the great sites go almost unseen by tourists using them mainly as picturesque backgrounds for their selfies.

I, too, have fallen into the FOMO trap at times, gulping rather than savoring travel. Why must the most valuable trips involve being far from home and spending a lot of money? I’m trying to fight back, though.

I’ve made peace with the fact that I will never skydive in New

Zealand, heli-ski in Zermatt or bungee jump in the Vanuatu archipelago.

I wouldn’t mind seeing India’s Golden Temple of Amritsar or Victoria Falls in Zambia/Zimbabwe. But if I die before that happens, then I guess I won’t see them.

“Leisure” and “vacation” used to be more or less used interchangeably. Now they’re very different.

Non-working days are often devoted to the labor of earning more badges to place on the ledger of life.

Promoting frenetic travel has become a way to profit off Americans’ sense of inadequacy. Note how few lists include simple, free things, such as observing a year’s worth of full moons — or identifying the trees on your street.

About dying. The greatest regrets of dying people, according to a famous list, focus on personal ties — for example, neglecting old friends.

One, importantly, is wishing they hadn’t lived the life others expected of them.

As far as we know, none of the interviewees cited not having rafted the Mangoky River in Madagascar or missing out on the fire dance festival in Bhutan’s Bumthang District. Not that they might not have been interesting.

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Did you ever wonder? Moses' exile from Egypt

When Moses observed an Egyptian man striking a Hebrew slave, he interceded and the Egyptian was killed. Moses thought no one had seen, and he buried the Egyptian.

The next day Moses went out to observe the slaves again. He saw two Hebrew men fighting; again he tried to intervene. One of the men said, "Who appointed you a judge over us? Do you intend to murder me as you murdered the Egyptian?"

Wouldn't you expect the Hebrews to be grateful that Moses stood up for them? But most of them considered Moses to be one of the feared Egyptians.

When Pharaoh heard of the matter, he sought to kill Moses. So Moses

fled to Midian.

Midian is the land east of Egypt, across the Red Sea. Along the Red Sea edge of the Sinai Peninsula there is a rugged, desert mountain range.

There Moses met seven young women who were caring for their father's sheep. They had drawn water from a well that was used by all shepherds in the area. When the men who herded sheep arrived with their herds, they tried to drive the young women away. Moses saved them and watered their sheep.

These women were the daughters of Jethro, a Midian priest. Moses was wearing his royal robes and they assumed he was Egyptian.

Jethro welcomed Moses; he stayed and became a shepherd for Jethro. He was given Zipporah, one of Jethro's daughters, to be his wife. Zipporah gave birth to a son and was expecting another child, giving us some idea of the timeline.

During this time, Pharaoh died and a new king came to power. The

Hebrew slaves groaned because of their hard labor, and God heard them.

Let's stop a minute to examine this. God always knows our trials and tribulations. I believe that He uses these hardships to get our attention. When we use up our own strength and ask for His help, He hears us.

The context of the Hebrew language used here shows that their outcry was because of pain and frustration, not because of prayer and worship of their Almighty God. But He showed them mercy.

While Moses was shepherding in Midian, the sheep were grazing on the slopes of Mount Sinai. (Later this mountain would be called the Mountain of God.) An Angel of God appeared to Moses in a bush that burned but was not consumed.

The Hebrew word translated "Angel" can also mean "Messenger." The scholars say that when an Angel is dispatched from God to give a message, he is speaking the words of God. So here the Scripture changes

the speaker to "God."

And He said, "I am the God of your father, the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. I have seen the affliction of My people and heard their outcry. I shall "descend" to rescue it from the hand of Egypt and bring them up to a land flowing with milk and honey.

"And now, go and I shall dispatch you to Pharaoh and you shall take My people, the Children of Israel, out of Egypt."

Think back to the time of Moses' birth and his rescue from the water. He was raised and educated in Pharaoh's palace and he had power and prestige. God sent him to the quiet of the desert to be alone...so he could hear God

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Report: Some top baby monitors lack basic security features

NEW YORK (AP) — Several of the most popular Internet-connected baby monitors lack basic security features, making them vulnerable to even the most basic hacking attempts, according to a new report from a cybersecurity firm.

The possibility of an unknown person watching their baby's every move is a frightening thought for many parents who have come to rely on the devices to keep an eye on their little ones. In addition, a hacked camera could provide access to other Wi-Fi-enabled devices in a person's home, such as a personal computer or security system.

The research released Wednesday by Boston-based Rapid7 Inc. looks at nine baby

monitors made by eight different companies. They range in price from \$55 to \$260.

The cameras are often mounted over a baby's crib or another place where they spend a large amount of time. They work by filming the child, then sending that video stream to a personal website or an app on a smartphone or tablet. Some of the cameras also feature noise or motion detectors and alert parents when the baby makes a sound or moves.

"There's a certain leap of faith you're taking with your child when you use one of these," says Mark Stanislav, a senior security consultant at Rapid7 and one of the report's authors.

The Rapid7 researchers found

serious security problems and design flaws in all of the cameras they tested. Some had hidden, unchangeable passwords, often listed in their manuals or online, that could be used to gain access. In addition, some of the devices didn't encrypt their data streams, or some of their web or mobile features, Stanislav says.


The problems with the cameras highlight the security risks associated with what's become known as the "Internet of things." Homes are becoming increasingly connected, with everything from TVs to slow cookers now featuring Wi-Fi connections. But many consumer devices often don't undergo rigorous security testing and could be easy targets for hackers.

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Players hoping "Deflategate" can usher in change

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Tom Brady is free and Ramon Foster can't help but laugh. Sorry, the irony is just a little too delicious.

The Pittsburgh Steelers' rest of his teammates in declining to ratify the new collective bargaining agreement between the owners and the NFL Players Association in the summer of 2011 because of concerns it gave Commissioner Roger Goodell too much authority.

Now Foster was sitting in his locker Thursday night praising the New England Patriots' quarterback for making a stand against Goodell, while the other 31 teams — the Patriots included — rushed to get back on the field and get paid following a four-month lockout.

U.S. District Judge Richard M. Berman's decision to lift the four-game ban levied against Brady by the NFL for the four-time Super Bowl winner's perceived role in "Deflategate" struck a serious

blow to Goodell's credibility. It also shed light on an issue the Steelers homed in on long ago: Goodell's process of serving as judge, jury and executioner when it comes to issuing discipline is misguided.

"That's just Roger Goodell abusing his power again, I guess," Foster said. "We've known it for a while and it's been going on for a while, too. We don't know what's going to happen or change from that, but it shows that he's been abusing power."

Berman took Goodell to task for developing his "own brand of industrial justice" when it came to penalizing Brady on what Berman concluded were shaky legal grounds. The NFL is appealing the decision "to uphold the collectively bargained responsibility to protect the integrity of the game."

Either way, the players hope Berman's victory will serve as a wake-up call to Goodell that maybe it is time to recalibrate the way the commissioner's office polices those who wear "The Shield."

Berman chastised Goodell

for being overzealous while hitting Brady with a lengthy suspension for what was basically an equipment violation. That forced Brady to take the unusual step of going to federal court in an attempt to clear his name after running out of recourse within the NFL's limited appeals process.

"The league is probably going to have to re-examine some of the ways they go about doing these things," St. Louis defensive end Chris Long said. "That's not necessarily a bad thing if it helps players in the future with the punishments."

It's something the men who pay Goodell seem to be up for. Atlanta Falcons owner Arthur Blank conceded there is a larger issue at play. The NFL doesn't want to become the league where every disagreement between players and management ends up in front of a judge.

"I think we have to find ways to get to a better place sooner with the NFLPA than go through the process that we've gone through, just to placate things, which really

isn't about placating any longer," Blank said. "It's about where we can constructively negotiate for decades in terms of the commissioner's responsibilities."

Whether that means limiting the commissioner's power or expanding the appeals process is unclear. What seems certain is that something needs to be done. The players point to Goodell's increasingly spotty track record in the courts as proof.

"I think it has to be looked at that one guy is just making decisions," Tennessee cornerback Jason McCourty said, "and then the fact that those decisions aren't being upheld shows that the system is flawed."

McCourty's words echoed the concerns of former Steelers safety Ryan Clark, who called Goodell's ability to fine players without a series of checks and balances a "deal breaker" before the current CBA was signed in 2011.

It sailed through anyway, though Brady's triumph likely serves as a tipping point going forward.

"This whole ordeal has highlighted the need for players and owners to work together to make all policies fair and transparent for everyone in our game," NFLPA president Eric Winston of the Bengals said in a statement. "I welcome an opportunity to have open and constructive dialogue with the league in the near future for how we can best accomplish that."

The near future may be a little too optimistic. The NFL's decision to fight Berman's decision means the issue could drag on for several more months.

Not that Brady will care next Thursday when he and the Patriots raise another Super Bowl championship banner and welcome the Steelers, the guys who saw this coming long ago. It sounds weird, but Foster wouldn't have it any other way.

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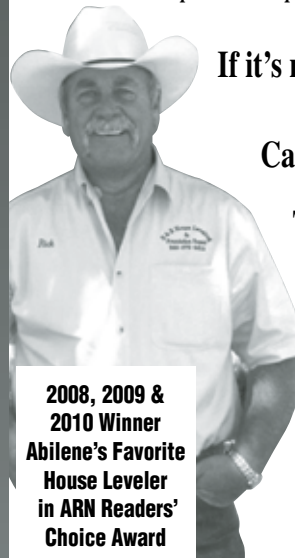
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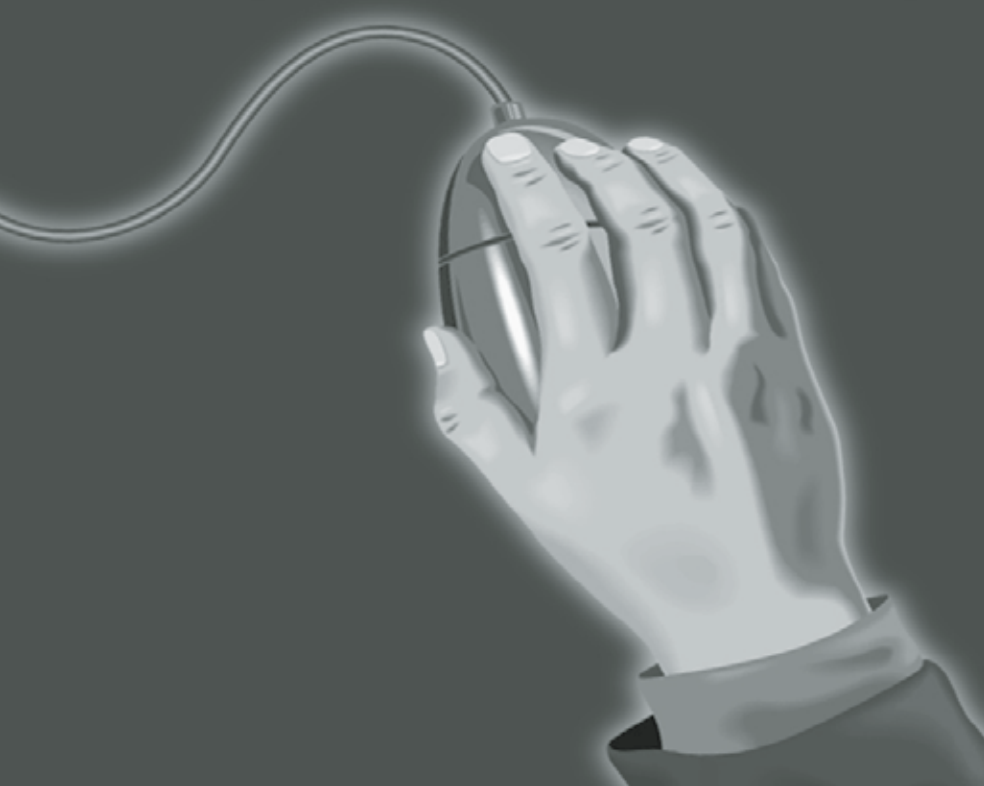

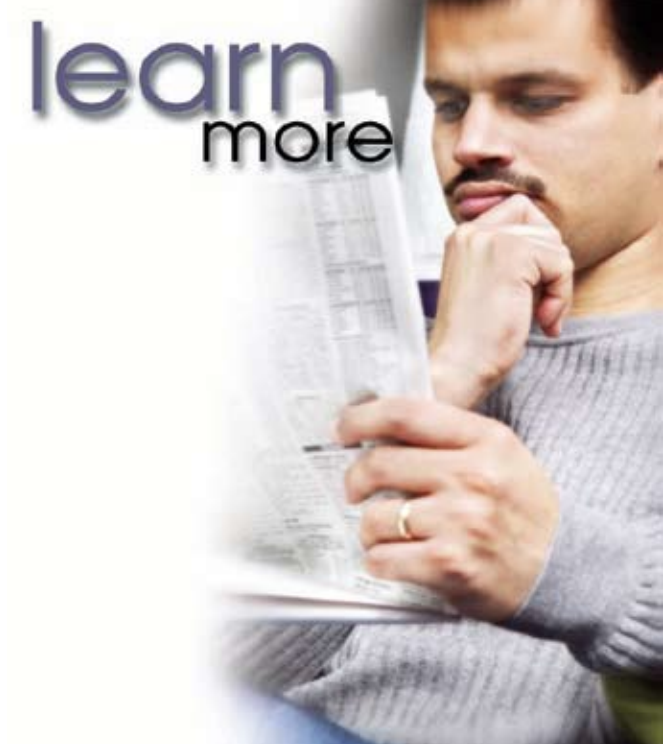
cares who he is -- his wife. -- Regular Person in Phoenix

Contract Bridge

Bidding Quiz

You are the dealer, both sides vulnerable, and open One Diamond. Partner responds One Heart. What would you now bid with each of the following five hands?

- ♠K5 ♥AQ73 ♦AQJ84 ♣K9
- ♠KQ4 ♥8 ♦AJ952 ♣AQ73
- ♠KJ52 ♥974 ♦AKQJ6 ♣7
- ♠83 ♥AK8 ♦KQJ92 ♣AJ2
- ♠AJ9 ♥82 ♦AKJ85 ♣AQ4

- Four hearts.** There is no question about this being a game-going hand after partner has responded with one heart, and the best way to make sure of reaching the game is to bid it. With 19 high-card points plus two doubletons -- worth another two points or so -- facing the six-point minimum promised by the heart response, the partnership assets easily exceed the 26 points required for game. It is hard to imagine a hand partner can hold that will not produce a good play for 10 tricks. The jump to four hearts is by no means a signoff. Rather, it encourages partner to move toward slam with a suitable hand. The one thing to avoid is a raise to only three hearts, which partner could pass with minimal (six or seven points) values.
- Two clubs.** You lack the values for a jump-shift to three clubs, which would show at least 19 points. The two-club rebid has the merit of being ambiguous, since it can be based on anywhere from 13 to 18 points. If partner passes, it is unlikely your side can make a game.
- One spade.** This bid is also in the ambiguous class, but it is better to bid a spade than two diamonds or two hearts. You plan to show your three-card heart support at your next turn if the opportunity to do so arises, thereby appraising partner of the three-suited nature of your hand. This should leave him in an ideal position to select the best contract.
- Three hearts.** It is admittedly highly unusual to double raise partner's suit with only three-card support, but considering your 18 high-card points and the quality of your hearts, the jump is the best bid available. You are not always dealt hands that match the perfect textbook illustration for a particular bid, and the best you can do in such cases is to aim as close to the mark as possible.
- Three notrump.** This hand strongly suggests notrump play, and since the combined high-card holding is known to be at least 25 points -- plus the added value for your strong five-card suit -- you should jump directly to game. Partner can then carry on as he sees fit, knowing he has about 20 points and a balanced hand opposite him.

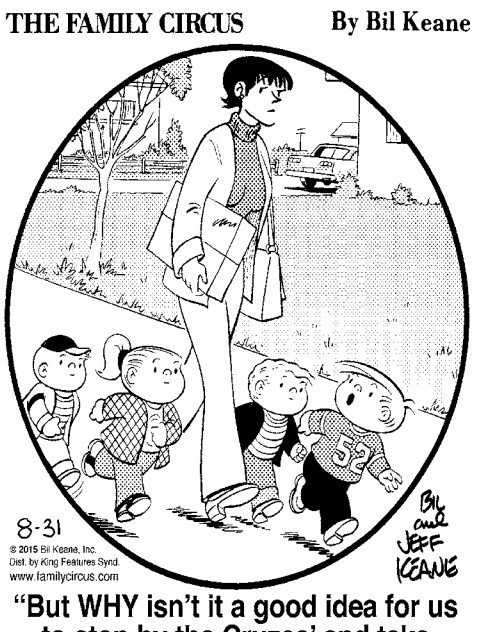

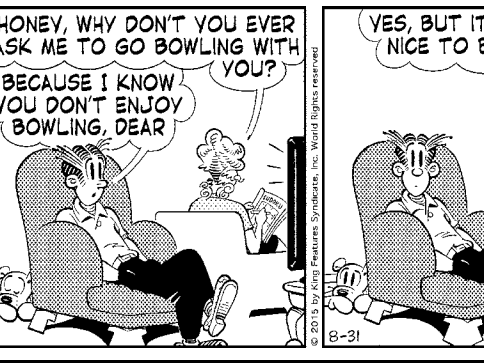

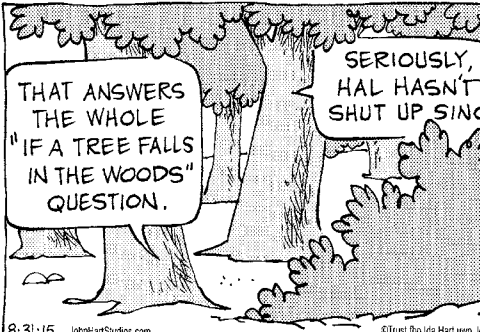

This Date In History

Today is Monday, August 31, the 243rd day of 2015. There are 122 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On August 31, 1965, the U.S. House of Representatives joined the Senate in voting to establish the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

On this date:

In 1886, an earthquake with an estimated magnitude of 7.3 devastated Charleston, South Carolina, killing at least 60 people, according to the U.S. Geological Survey.

In 1888, Mary Ann Nichols, believed to be the first victim of "Jack the Ripper," was found slain in London's East End.

In 1939, the first issue of Marvel Comics, featuring the Human Torch, was published by Timely Publications in New York.

In 1941, the radio program "The Great Gildersleeve," a spinoff from "Fibber McGee and Molly" starring Harold Peary, debuted on NBC.

In 1954, Hurricane Carol hit the northeastern Atlantic states; Connecticut, Rhode Island and part of Massachusetts bore the brunt of the storm, which resulted in some 70 deaths.

In 1962, the Caribbean nation of Trinidad and Tobago became independent of British colonial rule.

In 1972, at the Munich Summer Olympics, American swimmer Mark Spitz won his fourth and fifth gold medals in the 100-meter butterfly and 800-meter freestyle relay; Soviet gymnast Olga Korbut won gold medals in floor exercise and the balance beam.

In 1980, Poland's Solidarity labor movement was born with an agreement signed in Gdansk (guh-DANSK) that ended a 17-day-old strike.

In 1985, Richard Ramirez, later convicted of California's "Night Stalker" killings, was captured by residents of an East Los Angeles neighborhood.

In 1986, 82 people were killed when an Aeromexico jetliner and a small private plane collided over Cerritos, California. The Soviet passenger ship Admiral Nakhimov collided with a merchant vessel in the Black Sea, causing both to sink; up to 448 people reportedly died.

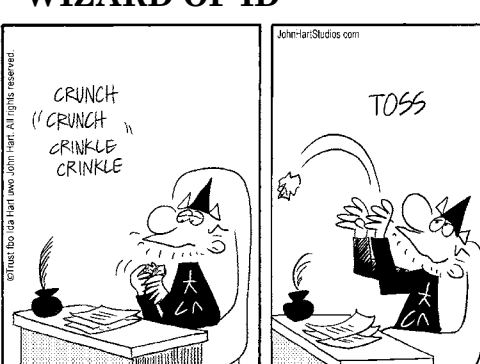
In 1989, Britain's Princess Anne and her husband, Capt. Mark Phillips, announced they were separating after 15 years of marriage.

This Date In History

Today is Tuesday, September 1, the 244th day of 2015. There are 121 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On September 1, 1715, following a reign of 72 years, King Louis XIV of France died four days before his 77th birthday.

On this date:

In 1807, former Vice President Aaron Burr was found not guilty of treason. (Burr was then tried on a misdemeanor charge, but was again acquitted.)

In 1905, Alberta and Saskatchewan entered Confederation as the eighth and ninth provinces of Canada.

In 1914, the last passenger pigeon in captivity, "Martha," died at the Cincinnati Zoo.

In 1923, the Japanese cities of Tokyo and Yokohama were devastated by an earthquake that claimed some 140,000 lives.

In 1939, World War II began as Nazi Germany invaded Poland.

In 1945, Americans received word of Japan's formal surrender that ended World War II. (Because of the time difference,

it was September 2 in Tokyo Bay, where the ceremony took place.)

In 1951, the United States, Australia and New Zealand signed a mutual defense pact, the ANZUS treaty.

In 1969, a coup in Libya brought Moammar Gadhafi to power.

In 1976, U.S. Rep. Wayne L. Hays, D-Ohio, resigned in the wake of a scandal in which he admitted having an affair with "secretary" Elizabeth Ray.

In 1983, 269 people were killed when a Korean Air Lines Boeing 747 was shot down by a Soviet jet fighter after the airliner entered Soviet airspace.

In 1985, a U.S.-French expedition located the wreckage of the Titanic on the floor of the Atlantic Ocean roughly 400 miles off Newfoundland.

In 1995, a ribbon-cutting ceremony was held for the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame and Museum in Cleveland. (The hall opened to the public the next day.)

Ten years ago: Al-Qaida's number-two made the terror group's first direct claim of responsibility for the July 7 bombings in London in a videotape.

Five years ago: President Barack Obama convened a new round of ambitious Mideast peace talks at the White House as he hosted Israeli Prime

Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas in the first face-to-face negotiations in nearly two years. A man upset with the Discovery Channel's programming took two employees and a security officer hostage at the network's headquarters in Silver Spring, Maryland; police shot and killed the gunman, James Jae Lee, and all three hostages escaped safely. Cammie King Conlon, 76, the former child actress who'd played the doomed Bonnie Blue Butler in "Gone with the Wind," died in Fort Bragg, California.

Today's Highlight in History:

- On September 3, 1783, representatives of the United States and Britain signed the Treaty of Paris, which officially ended the Revolutionary War.

"Summit Ridge Drive" and "Special Delivery Stomp" for RCA Victor.

In 1951, the television soap opera "Search for Tomorrow" made its debut on CBS.

In 1967, the original version of the television game show "What's My Line?," hosted by John Charles Daly, broadcast its final episode after more than 17 years on CBS.

In 1976, America's Viking 2 lander touched down on Mars to take the first close-up, color photographs of the planet's surface.

In 1989, a Cubana de Aviacion jetliner crashed after takeoff in Havana, killing all 126 aboard and 45 people on the ground.

In 1995, the online auction site eBay was founded in San Jose, California, by Pierre Omidyar under the name "AuctionWeb."

Ten years ago: President George W. Bush ordered more than 7,000 active duty forces to the Gulf Coast as his administration intensified efforts to rescue Katrina survivors and send aid to the hurricane-ravaged region in the face of criticism it did not act quickly enough.

Five years ago: Defense Secretary Robert Gates toured U.S. bases and war zones in Afghanistan, saying he saw and heard evidence that the

American counterinsurgency strategy was taking hold in critical Kandahar province.

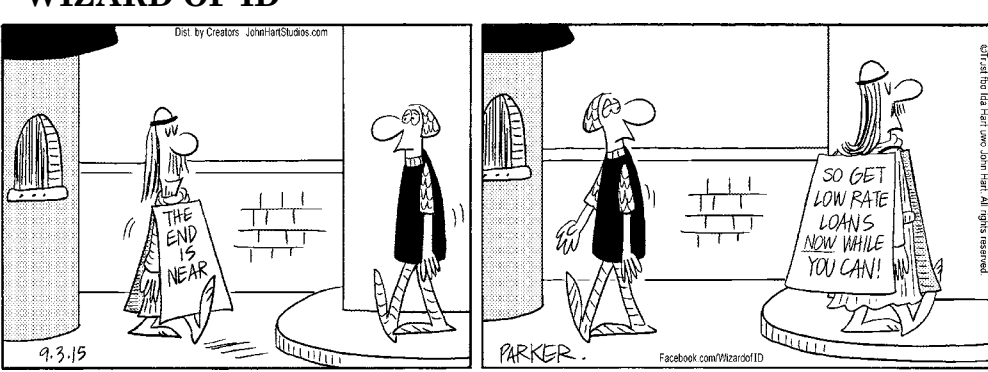

This Date In History

Today is Friday, September 4, the 247th day of 2015. There are 118 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On September 4, 1781, Los Angeles was founded by Spanish settlers under the leadership of Governor Felipe de Neve.

On this date:

In 1886, a group of Apache Indians led by Geronimo (also known as Goyathlay, "One Who Yawns") surrendered to Gen. Nelson Miles at Skeleton Canyon in Arizona.

In 1888, George Eastman received a patent for his roll-film box camera, and registered his trademark: "Kodak."

In 1917, the American Expeditionary Forces in France suffered their first fatalities during World War I when a German plane attacked a British-run base hospital.

In 1948, Queen Wilhelmina of the Netherlands abdicated after nearly six decades of rule for health reasons.

In 1951, President Harry S. Truman addressed the nation from the Japanese peace treaty conference in San Francisco in the first live, coast-to-coast television broadcast.

In 1957, Arkansas Gov. Orval Faubus used Arkansas National Guardsmen to prevent nine black students from entering all-white Central High School in Little Rock. Ford Motor Co. began selling its ill-fated Edsel.

In 1963, a Swissair Caravelle III carrying 80 people crashed shortly after takeoff from Zurich, killing all on board.

In 1971, an Alaska Airlines jet crashed near Juneau, killing all 111 people on board.

In 1972, U.S. swimmer Mark Spitz won a seventh gold medal at the Munich Olympics, in the 400-meter medley relay.

In 1974, the United States established diplomatic relations with East Germany.

In 1984, Canada's Progressive Conservatives, led by Brian Mulroney (muhl-ROO-nee), won a landslide victory in general elections over the Liberal Party of Prime Minister John N. Turner and the New Democrats headed by Ed Broadbent.

In 1995, attorney William Kunstler, who spoke out for the politically unpopular in a controversial career, died in New York at age 76.

Ten years ago: Six days after Hurricane Katrina left a devastated New Orleans in chaos, police stormed the Danziger Bridge, shooting and killing two unarmed people and wounding four others. (Five New Orleans police officers were found guilty of civil rights violations in connection with the shootings; however, a federal judge threw out those convictions in September 2013 and ordered a new trial, concluding the case had been tainted by "grotesque prosecutorial misconduct.")

Five years ago: Protesters hurled shoes and eggs at Tony Blair in Dublin, Ireland, as he held the first public signing of his memoir as British prime minister amid high security. Pulitzer Prize-winning cartoonist Paul Conrad, 86, died in Rancho Palos Verdes.

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Texans' Mallett forced into preseason loss to Cowboys

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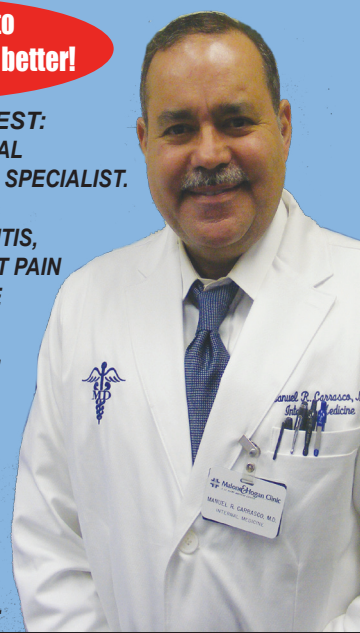
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ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Backup Houston quarterback Ryan Mallett was forced into the game unexpectedly when third-stringer Tom Savage went out with an apparent shoulder injury in the fourth quarter of the preseason finale.

Instead of handing off three times and heading home after a go-ahead 5-yard run touchdown by Dallas' Ben Malena, the Texans did try to throw twice with Mallett. After a pair of incompletions, Dallas ran out the clock in a 21-14 victory Thursday night.

"You know, we had a chance to make a play at the end," said Mallett, who lost the competition for the starting job to Brian Hoyer. "And we didn't make it."

Corey White returned an interception 3 yards for a touchdown in the third quarter, and the Cowboys scored again quickly after another turnover by Savage, who had two touchdown passes, to avoid their second straight winless exhibition season.

Texans coach Bill O'Brien didn't have an update on Savage, who was hurt on a tackle by Davon Coleman just after he threw a pass. The incompleting led to a punt, and the Cowboys drove to Malena's touchdown.

Savage's tying 16-yard touchdown pass to Keshawn Martin in the fourth quarter came after Dallas' Nick Harwell muffed a

punt that was first flagged for interference before officials waved off the penalty. It was the second punt by Houston's Shane Lechler after the first hit the huge video board over the center of the field.

White was alone in the flat when he stepped in front of a pass intended for Jaelen Strong and scored easily for a 7-7 tie in the third quarter. Two plays later, Savage was hit by rookie Ryan Russell and the ball squirted forward. Officials ruled an incomplete pass that was overturned on review.

The original call wiped out Dallas linebacker Keith Smith's 21-yard return. Rookie running back Gus Johnson scored on the next play, spinning out of a tackle while barely avoiding the sideline near the pylon.

Some observations from the game:

RUSHING GAME

Malena had 88 yards rushing, and Johnson added 68. But both are long shots to make the roster behind Joseph Randle, Darren McFadden and Lance Dunbar. All three top backs trying to replace NFL rushing champion DeMarco Murray sat out.

"We'll have some hard decisions to make," Cowboys coach Jason Garrett said. "We'll have some really good discussions."

HARDY'S ABSENCE

Garrett said defensive end Greg

Hardy missed the game to be with his girlfriend for the birth of their child. Garrett said the baby hadn't been born when he last talked to Hardy on Wednesday night. Hardy's four-game suspension for his role in a domestic violence case starts Saturday. Hardy wasn't expected to play against the Texans.

HOLD ON

There were six holding penalties in the second quarter. Four were declined, including one for each team because the quarterback was sacked. The Cowboys got to choose between two calls that negated about a 30-yard punt return by Houston's Keith Mumphery, and a Dallas holding call wiped out most of a 23-yard return for Lucky Whitehead. The Cowboys finished with 11 penalties for 82 yards, and the Texans had seven for 46.

THIRD QBS

Savage finished 18 of 29 for 135 yards with two touchdowns and an interception, and Dallas third-stringer Dustin Vaughan was 11 of 20 for 115 yards. "There are a lot of guys who think they've shown enough, but the fact of the matter is that the brutal reality of the NFL is that it's out of our control now," said Vaughan, who was on the practice squad last season.
