## Council to vote on budget

A pair of public hearings and a vote on the new municipal budget and tax rate will highlight tonight Big Spring City Council meeting, which begins at 5:30 p.m. at 307 E. Fourth St.

Council members will hold public hearings on both the proposed budget and tax rate at the start of Tuesday's meeting. Later in the evening, the group will take the first of two votes needed to approve the fiscal package and tax rate.

City officials say the new budget is as lean as possible, while also addressing pressing infrastructure concerns. Among the highlights of the package are:

- A 3 percent pay raise for city employees.
  - About \$500,000 for street sealcoating projects.
  - \$1 million in water line upgrades.
  - \$500,000 in sewer line upgrades.
  - Almost \$300,000 to replace water lines on 17<sup>th</sup> Street and the airpark sewer line.
  - Capital outlays which include five new patrol vehicles for the police department, street sweeper, roll off truck and trash truck for the sanitation department and a dump truck for the cemetery.
- Fueling that budget is a proposed tax rate of 77 cents per \$100 valuation. That rate is 8 cents lower than the expiring levy but, because of a noted increase in property valuations, will bring in approximately \$160,000 more in revenue than the previous year.
- Most of that increased revenue is being earmarked for city reserve funds, which have been used to make up for recent budgetary shortfalls, City Finance Director Donald Moore noted.

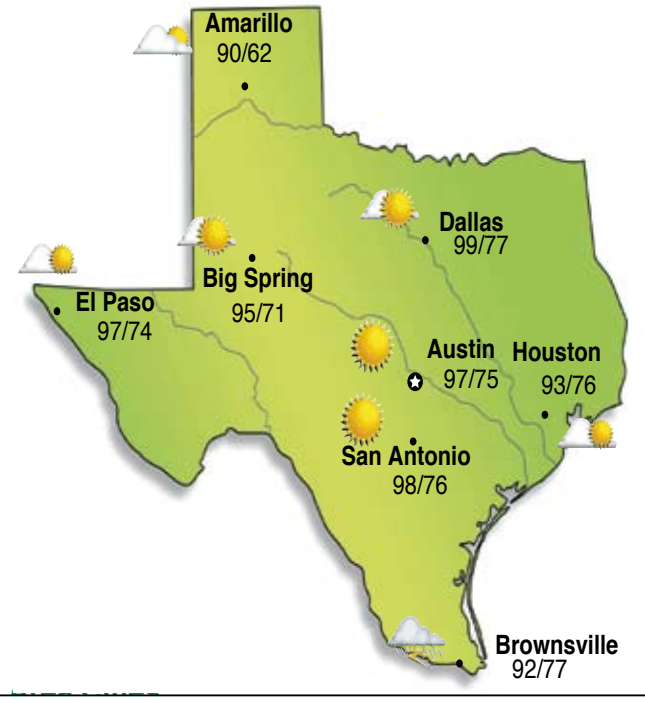

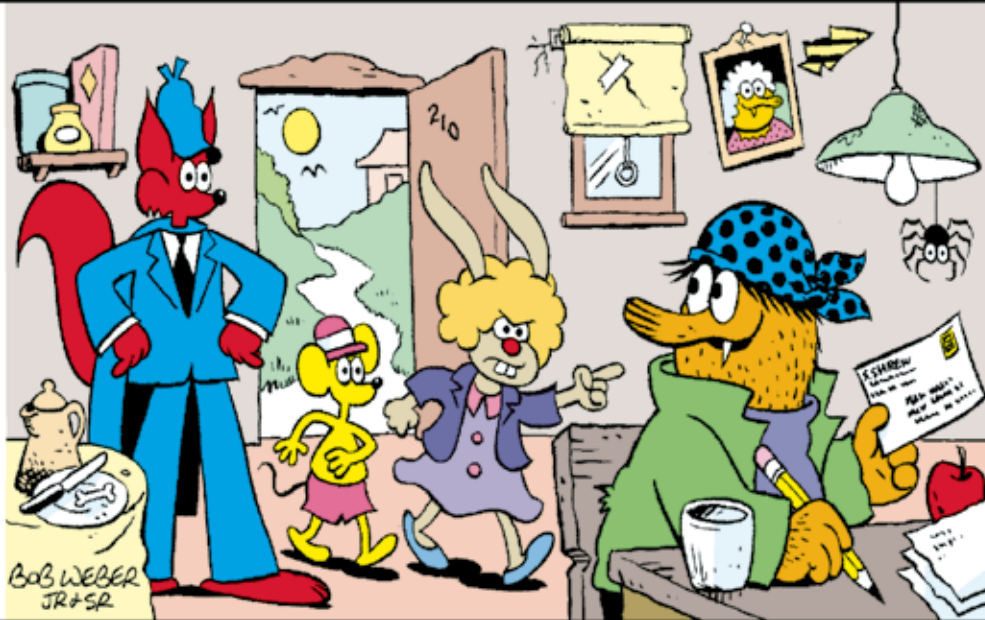

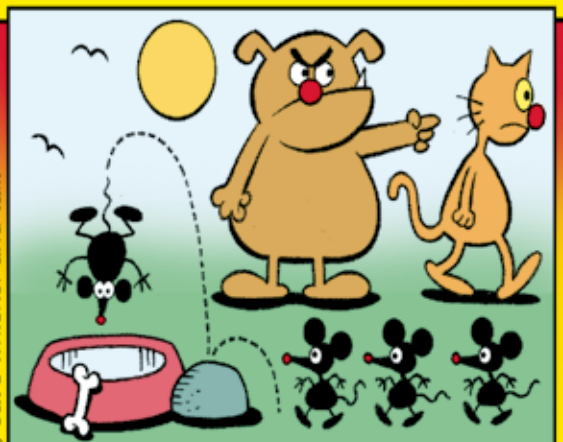

# A hawk's thorny situation

Every year, they come. By the middle of August, some will have been discovered in the most unlikely places. Often, they are on the ground and too weak to fly. Starvation and dehydration take their toll on these late spring/summer hawks.

Having flown into a truck, another one in Odessa was bruised and sore. The latest in San Angelo was a victim of nature's natural defense system.

When Diane Tracy heard her phone ring, she wondered what specie it would be this time. She soon learned that a couple had observed a hawk in their back yard for two days. Realizing it could not fly over their fence, they had decided the raptor needed help.

Upon examining the bird, she noticed some feathers missing on the back of its head, but no wound. Extending its wings showed no sign of injuries.

Although its appearance was that of a healthy, adult Swainson's hawk, she knew to look further. When she and her husband, Dale, saw cactus thorns imbedded in the bottom of its feet, they knew the reason for its being grounded. The raptor had been weakened by its inability to grasp its prey.

Slowly, and meticulously, the thorns were extracted. Medications to thwart any infection were given over the next seven days.

As its suffering was eased and its appetite encouraged, the Swainson's went from a complacent patient to being anxious to exercise. The bountiful helpings of quail, mice, and beef heart were having a positive effect.

Upon moving the hawk to a larger containment area, Diane learned quickly that

the bird was becoming a handful of energy. As the Swainson's proved it needed an even longer and taller facility, she decided to test its flight ability.

Taking it to a remote area, she and her husband realized quickly that although the hawk wanted to return to nature, it wasn't prepared to do so. Knowing that Art and I were taking other birds to Gail Barnes in Lubbock, she arranged for the Swainson's to "hitch a ride."

After coming back from meeting Diane and Dale in Sterling City, we readied a large container for the Swainson's overnight stay. Handling the bird told me the strength exhibited in its feet and legs would serve it well.

The physique of this handsome raptor was striking. cross its creamy upper chest was the chestnut-brown bib. Its brown upper parts and head were a sharp contrast to its pale belly.

Dark bands accented its grayish tail. With its light wing linings

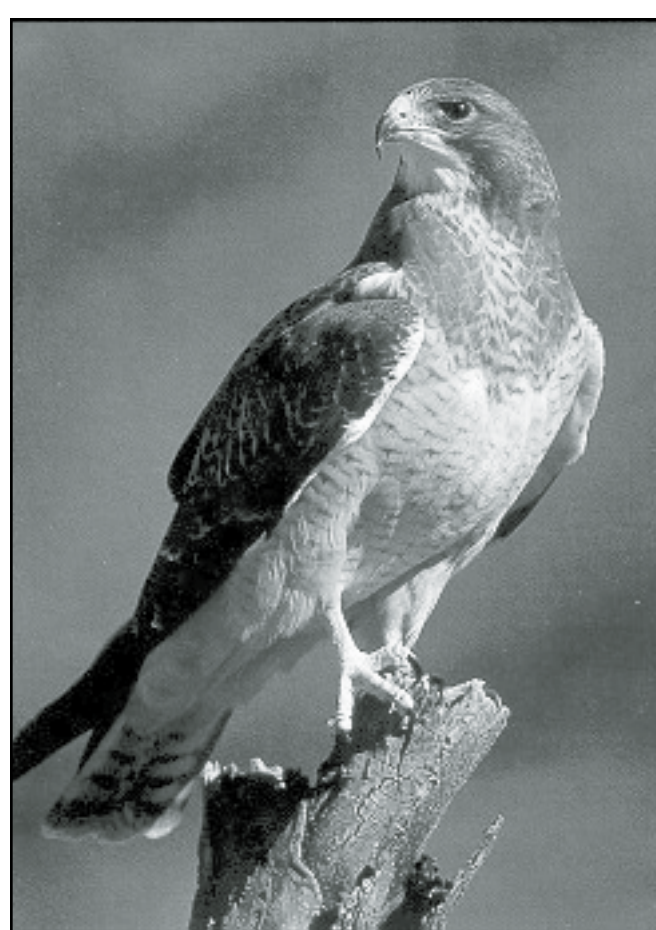
contrasting against its dark flight feathers, it was an outstanding specimen. Mastery of flight would insure its freedom.

At South Plains the next day, inside the long flight cage, we watched as Gail opened our carrier. Having left it, the Swainson's was suddenly introduced to the spaciousness of the facility.

Roosts at various elevations at the opposite end of the structure were tempting. Natural vegetation that is allowed to grow offered not only a hiding place for live prey, but a challenge to any recovering raptor. The hawk remained on the ground as it tried to get its bearings.

After lunch with Gail, we left for an afternoon appointment. She went back to check on the hawk.

Once inside the flight area, she noticed the Swainson's was on the highest perch in a corner of the facility. Its ability to attain that height had been enhanced by its previous



care. Its inherent desire to be free had prompted this show of its physical ability.

To hunt for rabbits, ground squirrels, rats, lizards and snakes was instinctive. Its return to nature would also allow it to snatch grasshoppers from tall grasses lining fence rows. Even soaring on thermal updrafts or perching atop telephone poles and fence posts would be on its itinerary.

Given its freedom the

last week of August, it rose slowly but strongly into the sky. A most fortunate Swainson's hawk was joining the strongest and healthiest of its specie.

Every year, they come. Every year, they go. However, this individual raptor had to be given part of the credit!

### Sasquatch sighting! Maine police say Bigfoot artist nabbed

KENNEBUNK, Maine (AP) — Authorities have nabbed a man who's accused of spray-painting images of Sasquatch on public property in Kennebunk, Maine.

Police in the picturesque coastal town didn't find the graffiti featuring Bigfoot all that amusing and charged 36-year-old Freeman Hatch with criminal mischief and possession of drugs. He's due in court in November.

Police Chief Robert MacKenzie says the Sasquatches defaced public and private property and cost "time and money to repair or replace."

Sasquatch is the folkloric beast thought by some people to roam the forests, particularly in the Pacific Northwest.

Police say the graffiti was concentrated around Kennebunk Beach.

A phone number for Hatch can't be located. It's unknown if he has a lawyer who could comment on the charges.

### Connecticut Gov. Malloy photobombed by whale

MYSTIC, Conn. (AP) — Connecticut Gov. Dannel P. Malloy has found himself upstaged by a beluga whale during a tourism news conference at the Mystic Aquarium.

Malloy was standing in front of the Alaskan Coast exhibit Wednesday touting an increase in summer tourism in Connecticut when a whale named Juno swam over to the glass to

watch. The whale hovered over the governor's shoulder and pressed its head to the glass as photographers recorded its antics. The whale became an Internet sensation in 2011 after a video surfaced of it interacting with a mariachi band playing for a wedding at the aquarium.

Belugas are social animals and communicate using assorted whistles and clicking sounds.

The Democratic governor says attendance at nearly two-dozen venues surveyed by the state is up 5 percent over last year.

### Custody battle waged over Bay Bridge chicken

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Three people are claiming ownership of the small brown chicken that fouled up rush-hour traffic in the San Francisco Bay Area earlier this week.

The Oakland Tribune reports Friday that the Oakland Animal Shelter has the chicken that strutted between cars at the Bay Bridge toll plaza early Wednesday.

She was eventually captured by the California Highway Patrol.

Animal Services Director Rebecca Katz says people claiming ownership of the chicken, named Chip in a nod to the CHP, need to come to the facility with proof, such as previous photos of the famous fowl.

Two rescue groups are also interested in Chip.

On Thursday, Chip laid an egg. But the shelter will likely swap in a substitute egg for her to sit on, because it

doesn't want any more chickens.

BRANCBURG, N.J. (AP) — A New Jersey man has been indicted on burglary charges after police say he inadvertently dialed 911 and let authorities in on his plans.

Police say they heard Scott Robert

NJ.com reports Friday that officials described the call as an errant, open-line emergency cellphone call "commonly referred to as a 'butt dial.'"

The 42-year-old Esser was indicted on burglary, theft and other charges in connection with burglaries in Branchburg and Stafford townships and Berkeley Heights.

### Beltre's 2-run single helps Rangers beat Mariners 3-0

SEATTLE (AP) — The AL West may be turning into a Texas shootout.

Adrian Beltre lined a two-run, bases-loaded single in the sixth inning and Yovani Gallardo pitched into the sixth as the Texas Rangers beat the Seattle Mariners 3-0 Monday to gain ground in the division.

Texas picked up a game on AL West-leading Houston, which lost to Oakland 10-9. The Astros lead the Rangers by 2 games.

The Rangers' go-ahead rally began with Delino DeShields drawing a one-out walk from Roenis Elias (4-8). Shin-Soo Choo followed with a single to left, and Elias then hit Prince Fielder with a pitch, loading the bases.

Beltre worked a full count, then punched a fastball to right, scoring DeShields and Choo.

"We really needed that," Rangers manager Jeff Banister said. "That's something we haven't done much on this trip."

Mariners shortstop Ketel Marte stepped further damage with a nifty grab of a one-hop grounder by Elvis Andrus that he turned into a double play.

"When he got contact, I never see the ball," Marte said. "I see the ball at the last second and that's it."

The Mariners were denied an early opportunity to unsettle Gallardo (12-9), who allowed five hits, struck out four and walked two in 5 1-3 innings. The Mariners put the first three runners on base to open the first, but Rangers catcher Bobby Wilson caught two of them stealing and Robinson Cano struck out.

"We didn't 'kind of run ourselves out of it, we ran ourselves out of it," Mariners manager Lloyd McClendon said. "That is something that has plagued us, something we've talked about. It's very frustrating."

Gallardo shut the Mariners down into the sixth, exiting with one out and one on. Rookie left-hander Andrew Faulkner took over and got two quick outs, then a 1-2-3 seventh.

"This time of year, that's what you need from the minor leaguers who come up fresh. He showed up big for us, five up, five down," Banister said.

The Rangers added a run in the seventh on consecutive wild pitch-

es by Rob Rasmussen, allowing Rowned Odor to home.

Shawn Tolleson finished the ninth to pick up his 30th save in 32 opportunities.

The loss ended the Mariners' season-high five-game win streak. It was their 10th shutout.

The Mariners had 11 relievers, adding RHP Danny Farquhar before the game for his fourth stint this season. LHP Edgar Olmos was optioned out. However, the bench is as thin as it has been all season, despite the September callups. With Nelson Cruz (quad) and Franklin Gutierrez (groin) both unavailable, manager Lloyd

McClendon had just two bench options, and one was catcher Jesus Sucre. The other was OF Stefen Romero.

**SLIDING INJURY**

DeShields, attempting to steal third in the seventh inning, slammed hard into the bag then collapsed to the ground. He lay along the baseline briefly as the trainer treated him. He had to be helped off the field. It was diagnosed as a mild left knee sprain. He is day to day.

pieces in looking at each other. Should we step to the sideline? Should we step to the field? Coach Meyer was like, 'Go Cardale,'" Jones said about that slightly awkward moment Monday night when a winner was finally declared in the eight-month minise-

ries that has been the Ohio State quarterback competition.

Jones started, threw two touchdowns and ran for another as the top-ranked Buckeyes beat Virginia Tech 42-24. Barrett, last year's Big Ten player of the year, has been relegated to best backup

quarterback in the country — at least for now.

"I don't think the battle is over," Jones said.

Neither does Urban Meyer. He said he gave some serious thought to switching to Barrett after Jones struggled in the second quarter and threw a bad interception. But

he felt the 6-foot-5, 250-pound Jones would be the best guy to go up against a Virginia Tech defense that put a lot of bodies in the quarterback's face.

After cashing the K-Q of trumps and finding the suit divided 2-2, South realized he was now 100 percent certain to make the slam regardless of how the missing cards were divided. So he cashed the A-K of spades, ruffed a spade, then ruffed the eight of hearts and dummy's last spade.  
**Declarer was now ready** to tackle the diamonds. Dummy at this point consisted of the jack of clubs and A-Q-J-3 of diamonds, while declarer's last five cards were the ace of clubs and 9-7-5-2 of diamonds.  
**South led a low diamond** and finessed dummy's jack. East did his best by ducking, but declarer countered by returning dummy's three of diamonds. East won with the ten but had to concede the last three tricks whether he returned a heart or a diamond.  
**Declarer would have been** on equally safe ground if West had been dealt the K-10-x-x of diamonds. He would also have been forced to return a diamond or yield a ruff-and-discard, bringing a happy conclusion to a well-played hand.

A reader sent this deal, which he labeled "a good exercise in the logic of dummy play." We agree with his sentiments and the method of play declarer chose to make the slam.  
The bidding was likewise first-rate. North pushed on to a slam in clubs once South showed extra values and a good suit by bidding three

# Murray's major QF streak ends with US Open loss to Anderson

NEW YORK (AP) — Andy Murray watched a 130 mph ace zoom by to create a two-set deficit at the U.S. Open, and then sat in his change-over chair and cursed at himself, over and over and over. A little later, Murray cracked his racket against the court once, breaking the frame, and went to the sideline and mangled his equipment even more, before meandering over to hand it to someone in the stands.

Often able to spur himself by letting out some anger, the two-time Grand Slam title winner only briefly managed to get into this match. The third-seeded Murray lost before the quarterfinals at a major for the first time since

2010, beaten 7-6 (5), 6-3, 6-7 (2), 7-6 (0) by 15th-seeded Kevin Anderson of South Africa in the fourth round at Flushing Meadows on Monday.

"Disappointing to lose because of that," Murray said about his earlier-than-usual exit. "Obviously that's many years' work that's gone into building that sort of consistency."

For the 6-foot-8 (2.03-meter) Anderson, known mainly for a booming serve but terrific off the ground in this 4-hour, 18-minute victory, it marked a real breakthrough: He entered with an 0-7 record in fourth-round matches at majors, including when he had a two-set lead against Novak Djokovic before losing

at Wimbledon two months ago.

This time, Anderson held it together, with the help of 25 aces and 81 total winners.

"I'm a little lost for words right now," said Anderson, who will face two-time major champion Stan Wawrinka in the quarterfinals. "I just managed to keep my composure throughout."

Murray, meanwhile, reached at least the quarters at his previous 18 Grand Slam tournaments, a streak that included championships at the U.S. Open in 2012 and Wimbledon in 2013, along with four runner-up finishes. His last loss this soon also happened in New York, in the third round five years ago.

Roger Federer also pulled off a shutout in a tiebreaker Monday, doing so in a 7-6 (0), 7-6 (6), 7-5 victory against big-serving No. 13 John Isner. According to the ATP, Isner had never been beaten 7-0 in 428 previous official, tour-level tiebreakers.

With Isner gone, and 68th-ranked American Donald Young eliminated 6-4, 1-6, 6-3, 6-4 by Wawrinka earlier Monday, it's the 16th Grand Slam tournament in a row with zero men from the U.S. in the quarterfinals.

Isner had his chances against Federer, six times standing two points from evening the match at a set apiece. But Federer was masterful down the stretch in that tie-

breaker, winning one point by returning a 140 mph serve before smacking a forehand passing winner, then using a forehand return winner off a 128 mph serve to earn a set point he converted with a backhand down the line.

Federer broke in the last game, ending Isner's streak of 110 service holds in a row at the U.S. Open, dating to the start of last year's tournament.

Federer's quarterfinal opponent will be No. 12 Richard Gasquet, who got past No. 6 Tomas Berdych 2-6, 6-3, 6-4, 6-1.

Two women's quarterfinals will be No. 2 Simona Halep against No. 20 Victoria Azarenka, and No. 5 Petra Kvitova against No. 26 Flavia Pennetta. Azarenka has won two Australian Open titles and twice was the runner-up at the U.S. Open. Kvitova has won Wimbledon twice. Halep was the runner-up at last year's French Open. And Pennetta? Well, she is into her sixth U.S. Open quarterfinal in the last seven years after a 6-4, 6-4 victory against 2011 champion Sam Stosur, the last woman to beat Serena Williams at Flushing Meadows.

Adept at comebacks — in the second round, he recorded his eighth victory in a match after dropping the opening two sets — Murray did push Anderson to a fourth set, but that was the extent of the rally this time.

Still, Murray kept trying to rile up himself — and his backers — as the fourth set carried on, even reaching over to slap the extended palm of a front-row spectator.

"I was trying to use the energy of the crowd as much as I could to help me," Murray said.

Anderson limited his signs of emotion to one uppercut after winning a point by tracking down a lob and conjuring up a sky-hook winner from the baseline.

ing to be all season. "We're going to ride my opinion in that moment," Meyer said. "In that situation to drive the ball down the field to score, who should be in the game? J.T. has to stay warm. If J.T.'s in the game, Cardale has to stay warm. Is that the right thing to do? At this point it is. Will that change and adapt throughout the year? I don't know. Remains to be seen."

"I'd expect more," Meyer said of Jones.

Barrett stayed engaged on the sideline, dapping up the offensive linemen and greeting his teammates after touchdowns. He got his chance to play in the fourth quarter and promptly led a touchdown drive, ripping off a 40-yard run and throwing a 26-yard scoring pass to Michael Thomas.

When it was over and the Buckeyes lined up in the corner of Lane Stadium to sing Carmen Ohio with the band, Jones was late getting over to the gang. He made sure to sneak into the front row and slip in between Barrett and star running back

Ezekiel Elliott.

The two quarterbacks, arms around each other's shoulder pads, swayed and sang. When the music stopped, they kidded around with each other, smiling and chatting before heading to the locker room.

"Both kids handled it great," Meyer said.

Meyer really could not make a bad choice, but he refused to show his hand going into the opener against the last team to beat the Buckeyes. He said the competition was tight and Barrett almost nudged ahead late in preseason practice.

"It was real close and Cardale finished the season as the starter and I started thinking for him to not take the first snap he had to get beat out," Meyer said.

Right up until kickoff, Meyer did everything he could to keep his pick a mystery.

The quarterbacks alternated reps in pregame warmups just as

they did in practice.

The Buckeyes won the toss and deferred until the second half, which is standard operating procedure but felt almost comical because it pushed the great reveal back a few more minutes.

After a Virginia Tech punt, it was time and Jones was the man. Just like everyone watching, the Buckeyes found out who their starting quarterback would be when Jones lined up behind center.

"I just lined up and saw him in there," Thomas said.

Things will get interesting if Jones struggles. How much patience will Meyer have with his starter knowing he has an ace in the hole?

"This journey is going to be interesting. Right now I don't have an answer," he said.

For now, it's Jones' job when the Buckeyes open at home against Hawaii. Right?
