


City-wide garage sale is Saturday




"Each waiter tries their best to raise as much in tips as they can," Finley said. "Many of them are willing to do almost anything, including singing and telling jokes."


A bridal shower honoring Amy Garcia was held May 20 at the home of Susie Bradford.

Getting rid of SALE 'bad apples'

One of the biggest headaches for superintendents is how to get rid of bad teachers called "bad apples." Getting rid of the "bad apples" is almost impossible. Superintendents must have a lot of documentation by the teacher's principal or assistant principal or you get to keep the "bad apples" for another year.

Most classroom teachers do not want a bad teacher teaching next door to them because it is not good for students. Also, for instance, if a bad teacher teaches ninth graders this will carry over through their 10thgrade year.

Superintendents have three choices: nudge the "bad apples" out the door; fire them; or reform them. I

like the third choice. Superintendents need to reform the "bad apples" and make them good apples.

New York Public Schools has a plan for bad these teachers to report to a room with desk to keep these teachers away from cream, cheese and milk. students. This room is called the 'lemon room."

Most bad teachers can usually keep their jobs unless they are incompetent, insubordinate, or committed an immoral act. These three things will get a teacher fired pretty fast.

Surveys show most teachers leave the profession because of low pay and Texas continues to slide down the scale on teacher pay. Maybe, this special session will reward Texas teachers with a hefty pay raise.




