


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Blaze destroys two-story home

17-member team fights fire for several hours

A two-story house is a complete loss this morning after Big Spring firefighters battle a major fire for several hours to contain the damage only to the home.

Only smoldering remains and the fireplace was left this morning of an old two-story house in the 800 block of N. Main St. after the early morning fire completely engulfed the structure. The cause of the blaze is under investigation by the Big Marshall's office.

According to Big Spring Fire Chief Craig Ferguson, the department received a call of a house fire a little after 3 a.m in the morning.

"When we got here, it was fully

involved, burning," Ferguson said. "It was a really big blaze. It got very

hot. We had to back off when we initially arrived at the scene. It actually melted some decals on some of our trucks. One truck was parked in the middle of the street and the heat melted the stickers."

Ferguson said the 17-member response team went into containment mode to keep the blaze from spreading to adjacent buildings, including an apartment complex located behind the structure.

Neugebauer will not seek re-election in 2016

U.S Rep. Randy Neugebauer, representative of the 19th Congressional District, announced Thursday afternoon he will not seek an eighth term "Every two years, the American

people decide who they want to represent them in the 'People's House.' I have asked for that honor seven times, you have overwhelmingly given me that opportunity each time, and I thank you for that," Neugebauer said in a press release issued Thursday afternoon. "After much thought and prayer, I have decided not to seek reelection in 2016. This was a difficult decision, but I feel this is a good time to end this season of my life and move to another.

The congressman from Lubbock continue to serve in his role until

the end of his term, the release said. "While I am announcing that I will not seek reelection, I am not

walking away from the imporwork that ahead,"

Neugebauer stated.



"There are still 15 months left in this Congress, and I am committed to work tirelessly on your behalf until

the final gavel ends this Congress in

January 2017 and another individual takes that special oath soon after."

Neugebauer was first elected to the U.S. House on June 3, 2003 in a special election to fill the seat of Larry Combest who had resigned. He won that election by defeating Mike Conaway, who is now the 11th district of Texas representative in the U.S. House, by of a vote of 50.5 percent to 49.5 percent. In the 2014, Neugebauer won seventh

term receiving 77.8 percent of

the vote in the general election. His political career included serving on

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Everything is awesome about Lego Vatican on view in Philly

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The city's science museum was hosting a blockbuster exhibit of Lego sculptures and preparing to unveil a huge display of Holy See treasures for the pope's upcoming visit when administrators got a serendipitous inquiry.

Would they like to see a model of the Vatican that a priest built entirely of Legos?

"It's amazing," said Larry Dubinski, president and CEO of The Franklin Institute, where the plastic brick structure is now view in downtown Philadelphia. "People are in awe."

The Rev. Bob Simon spent about 10 months constructing a mini St. Peter's Basilica out of a half-million Legos. His architectural feat includes a Lego pope on a balcony overlooking the crowd in St. Peter's Square,

which itself is made up of about 44,000 Lego pieces resembling cobblestones.

A colorful cast of Lego characters populates the piazza, including a nun with a selfie stick and a bespectacled figurine of Simon. All told, the display measures 14 feet by 6 feet and weighs about 100 pounds.

"It was daunting," said Simon. "It was an exercise in patience, and I was thrilled with the way everything came out."

Simon said he built his first, rather crude, Lego model of the Roman Catholic church's headquarters when he was in seventh grade. Today, he serves as pastor at St. Catherine of Siena church in Moscow, Pennsylvania, about 100 miles north of Philadelphia. He's been to the real Vatican five

To create the model, Simon used an image from a book cover as a guide. The hardest part was crafting the round basilica dome from square bricks, he said. Although he looked for hints by watching YouTube videos. "I hardly understood what I was watch-

"I'm also not really great at math, so I was daunted by that as well," he said.

Yet he persevered. Using Lego life preservers to replicate the dome's windows one of many ways he repurposed various shapes — he delicately built the structure without glue.

Denise Brownell, visiting the museum from Phoenix, was duly impressed.


"It's just such a perfect replica of the real thing," said Brownell. "It's just awesome."

Simon started the project a year ago in an empty room in his rectory. He finished in time to bring it to BrickFair, a Lego convention held over the summer near Washington, D.C., where it received many accolades. A friend then suggested The Franklin Institute might be inter-

Simon's creation is being displayed alongside "The Art of the Brick," an exhibit of Lego sculptures, and "Vatican Splendors," which opens Saturday. The latter includes art, vestments and religious relics from the Holy See.

There are no plans for Pope Francis to see the Lego Vatican while he's in Philadelphia next weekend. But Simon hopes to see the pontiff: He will participate in the papal Mass on Sept. 27.

Two buildings were evacuated as a precaution and at least three buildings received minor heat damage from the blaze.

"The guys did an incredible job of protecting these buildings with the amount of heat and fuel that was there, an incredible job,' Ferguson said.

Because of the heat, fire-

fighters blocked off several streets around the structure for a number of hours as they battled the flames. The fire was still smoldering as of 8 a.m. this morning while tired, thirsty firefighters regrouped to watch for, and extinguish, hot spots.

"We plan to get a backhoe in to spread the remains out and get water on the hot spots," Ferguson said on the scene this morning, adding that he expected his crew to remain for several more hours to watch any flare ups. 'Our main focus right

the Lubbock city council from 1992-1998 and serving in the Mayor pro-tempore position from 1994-1998. Neugebauer was also the first president of the Ports-to-Plains Alliance, an organization that promotes a trade corridor from Mexico to Canada that comes through West Texas and Big Spring via U.S. Highway 87. "Over two decades ago, I embarked on a

journey that I had never anticipated,' Neugebauer said. "In 1992, with the encouragement of friends, family, and community leaders, I offered myself for public service as a member of the Lubbock City Council. I was very fortunate and humbled that the citizens of District Five gave me that opportunity. Thus began a new season in my life.

"When I decided not to run for a third City Council term, I thought that the season of public service was ending," He continued. "Little did I know that a few years later, on June 5, 2003, I would be sworn in as the fourth Member of Congress to represent the 19th District of Texas, as well as the 236th Texan and the 9,833rd American citizen to serve in the United States House of Representatives.'

Neugebauer is the Chairman of the Financial Institutions and Consumer Credit Subcommittee and Vice-Chairman of the House Agriculture Committee. He also serves on the science, space and technology committee.

"To say that this has been an honor would be an understatement," he said. "Representing the citizens of the Big Country and West Texas has been one of the most rewarding times in my life. Dana and I have had the opportunity to travel this wonderful district and meet many remarkable people. Working for you has been a labor of love. I love this country

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



he scholars fill in bits of the story here that were not mentioned in the Scriptures. Zipporah gave birth to Moses' second son on the day of the Burning Bush. Moses

communed with God on the side of the mountain over a period of seven days.

When Moses finally accepted his commission from God that he must go back to Egypt, the next day he immediately prepared for the journey. He loaded Zipporah and both of their sons on a donkey and began the trip toward Egypt.



the eighth day, and Moses had not

Scholars say that the Angel of God grasped Moses in such a way that Zipporah understood his danger was because he had failed to circumcise the baby. Circumcising the baby was Moses' responsibility. But Zipporah quickly circumcised the baby and touched the foreskin to Moses' foot, transferring the merit to him. The Angel released His hold on Moses; Zipporah had saved his life! God had dispatched Aaron to

meet Moses in the desert so that they re-entered Egypt together. When they addressed the Hebrews, the elders did ask Moses for proof, and Moses showed them the three signs.

After the sign of the affliction of Moses' hand and its healing, they believed strong enough to allow him to represent them before Pharaoh. Remember Jacob and Joseph had been dead a long time. The Hebrews had not heard from God or any representative from Him for many

They were literally putting their lives on the line here. After so many years of slavery, they must have had a hard time believing that God even

The Hebrew elders accompanied Moses and Aaron to Pharaoh's palace, but the elders began to lose their nerve. One by one they dropped out of the procession.

God instructed Moses and Aaron to say to Pharaoh, "So said Hashem, the God of Israel, 'Send out My people that they may celebrate for Me in the Wilderness."

Pharaoh replied, "Who is Hashem that I should heed His voice to send out Israel? I do not know Hashem, nor will I send out Israel!"

Moses and Aaron answered, "The God of the Hebrews happened upon us. Let us go for a three-day journey in the Wilderness and we shall bring offerings to Hashem, our God, lest He strike us dead with the plague or

Pharaoh would not consider letting the Hebrew slaves leave.

Reflections: The War Room

hen I first saw the advertisement for the movie, War Room, I thought, okay, here we go again, another blood and guts movie: special effects, bombs, explo-

sions, guns; angry men killing each other and trying to survive. It is the typical stuff for most war movies.

My son-in-law slipped off with some of his buddies to see it. This further confirmed my assumptions. The movie was number one at the box office on Labor Day. I decided to check it out. So, I

took my wife, we bought a ticket, and wandered into the theater to sit back and see for ourselves. There are no bombs or explosions.

No one gets killed. There is no blood.

War Room is all about the battle taking place every day in homes around the world. Husbands and wives whose marriages are falling apart. Parents absorbed in their own problems, trying to make ends meet, stressed out and blaming each other. Children falling through the cracks.

The "War Room" is a closet, a place

It could be a break-through movie. It could save marriages. It could lead husbands and wives to discover what we discovered years ago, that there is nothing more powerful than prayer. Across the years my wife has prayed for me, and I am convinced it has made all the difference.

We have always prayed. But years ago I realized that I forget what I pray for. And, when God answers prayer, I seldom give thanks or recognize His answer. I started writing down prayer requests as I prayed. Later, when I reviewed my prayer requests,

I was astounded at how faithful God was to answer my prayers. Of course, sometimes His answer was, "No." Sometimes He taught me that I was asking for the wrong thing. That in itself was helpful. And sometimes He granted what I requested.

I learned that prayer is a conversation with God. He speaks to us as much as we speak to Him. Not in an audible voice, but with an inner voice. Often the best part of prayer is listening to God. I discovered that when I pray in the early morning, the conversation with God lingers and continues through the rest of the day.

I have never met anyone who felt they prayed too much. I have met many, including myself, who wished they had prayed more. When Billy Graham was 92, a reporter asked him if he had it to do over, would he would do anything differently. He said, "Yes. I would spend more time in meditation and prayer."

James wrote, "You desire but do not have, so you kill. You covet but you cannot get what you want, so you quarrel and fight. You do not have because you do not ask God. When you ask, you do not receive, because you ask with wrong motives, that you may spend what you get on your pleasures." (James 4:2-3).

Jesus said, "Which of you, if your son asks for bread, will give him a stone? Or if he asks for a fish, will give him a snake? If you, then, though you are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your Father in heaven give good gifts to those who ask him!" (Matthew 7:9-11). "But when you pray, go into your room, close the door and pray to your Father, who is unseen. Then your Father, who sees what is done in secret, will reward you." (Matthew 6:6).



Rescuers release rehabilitated turtles into Gulf of Mexico

GALVESTON, Texas (AP) - A loggerhead turtle with a hook in her throat dwindled to 70 pounds before weeks of care and her eventual return to the Gulf of Mexico.

Officials with a National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration marine facility in Galveston, Texas, on Wednesday released six rescued turtles into the water.

The Galveston County Daily News reports the five Kemp's ridley sea turtles and the female loggerhead turtle were caught by fishermen in July and August.

Research fisheries biologist Lyndsey Howell says the loggerhead turtle, caught off the Galveston fishing pier, had a lung infection and was emaciated. The turtle had surgery to remove a hook from her esophagus.

Howell says the turtle, when released Wednesday on the Galveston beach, weighed 102 pounds and was eating 5 pounds of food daily.

Seattle Aquarium trains otter to use inhaler for asthma

Agriculture secretary announces goal for cutting food waste

NEW YORK (AP) - Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced a goal Wednesday to cut the amount of food that Americans waste by 50 percent by 2030.

"The United States enjoys the most productive and abundant food supply on Earth, so too much of this food goes to waste," Vilsack said in New York City, where he was joined by food-industry representatives and officials from the Environmental Protection Agency. Vilsack likened the effort to reduce

food waste to the anti-littering campaigns of the 1960s and '70s that shamed Americans for tossing trash out car windows.

"This is the logical extension," he

said. "This is the next litter campaign."

The U.S. Department of Agriculture estimates that Americans waste 133 billion pounds of food every year, or 31 percent of their overall food sup-

Vilsack said other nations waste similar amounts and the U.S. must lead a global effort to use food more efficiently. "This is an opportunity for us to make a statement and provide leadership," he said. EPA officials said the massive waste

is a problem not just because the food could feed the hungry but also because it ends up in landfills and affects the environment.

"Twenty-one percent of all the waste

in landfills is food," EPA Deputy Administrator Stan Meiburg said. "Once it's there, it produces methane, which is a greenhouse gas."

Leslie Sarasin, president and CEO of the Food Marketing Institute, a food retailers' trade association, said the industry supports cutting food waste because it operates on a "razorthin" margin of 1 or 2 percent. "Reducing food waste at all levels in

the food chain ,Äî farm, factory, store and home ,Äî is certainly one of those issues with economic and emotional appeal," she said. The officials spoke at a facility in

Long Island City, Queens, operated by the nonprofit City Harvest, which started in 1982 as an effort to salvage excess food from restaurants. City Harvest now takes donations from businesses and farmers and delivers it to 500 food banks and soup kitch-

Vilsack toured the warehouse packed with donated produce like carrots that were too big to sell and called it "truly inspiring."

He said the campaign to cut food

waste includes educating consumers about how long to keep food before it must be thrown out. He said he recently used the USDA's

new mobile FoodKeeper app to determine whether chicken salad in his refrigerator was still good.

It was, and he ate it.

Thursday that the tsunami generated after an magnitude-8.3 earthquake in the Pacific Ocean off Chile no longer poses a threat.

The center says, however, that some areas may see small sea level changes and surges. The tsunami was recorded

from San Diego to Alaska but only reached the center's advisory level for part of California.

9:30 a.m.

A small tsunami triggered by a deadly earthquake off Chile has reached as far north as Alaska.

The National Tsunami

Cove, Alaska, reported water heights of six-tenths of a foot late Tuesday morning.

Tsunami effects also were felt along the coasts of California, Oregon and British Columbia.

Most of the surge occurred outside a 300-mile

stretch California under a tsunami advisory, said Paul Whitmore, the center's director in Palmer, Alaska. Whitmore says

the advisory likely will be lifted in the early afternoon.

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

Rangers complete 4-game sweep of Astros for 1st in AL West

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) Shin-Soo Choo talked about the veterans on the Texas Rangers, and their collective experience in big games.

"That's what showed the last four games," he said.

Mitch Moreland hit a threerun homer and Colby Lewis, another holdover from the Rangers' two World Series teams, pitched six innings for his 16th victory as the Rangers beat Houston 8-2 on Thursday night to complete a four-game sweep that put them in the AL West lead.

The Rangers (79-67) entered the series trailing Houston by 1 1/2 games, but now lead by 2 1/2 with 16 remaining.

"I believe that our ballclub was as focused, as determined, as locked in as we could be for a four-game set, and especially where we were," said manager Jeff Banister, who was then asked what he likes best about how his team is playing. "The energy, the passion, the grit. These guys, they're here to play."

Houston (77-70) had been alone atop the AL West for 49 consecutive days until losing Tuesday night. The Astros finished a 2-8 trip but stayed 1 1/2 games ahead of Minnesota for the second wild card after the Twins lost 11-8 to the Angels. Los Angeles is 2 1/2 games back, and plays in Houston next week.

"It's difficult to absorb these losses when we've put so much time and energy in," Astros manager A.J. Hinch said. "Obviously, we feel pretty bad about the way these four games went. It's nothing that a good win can't overcome."

The Astros play Oakland on Friday, the first of nine games on their final homestand of the regular season. They have the AL's best home record at 48-24.

Moreland's 21st homer was an opposite-field drive that just cleared the 14-foot wall in left in the third. Choo had







Assume you, South, are declarer in a notrump contract, that you have plenty of entries to both hands in the side suits, and that to make your contract you must win five tricks in each of the following three combinations:

- North: K Q 9 3 2 South: A 10 5 4
- North: A 6 South: Q 10 8 7 4 3 2
- North: Q 10 South: A K 8 7 4 3 How would you proceed in each

Also, how would you play each of the next three combinations to assure four tricks?

- North: J 7 6 South: A 9 5 4 3 2
- North: A 10 7 5 3 South: Q 8 6 4 2
- North: J 10 8 South: A K 6 5 2
- 1. The only danger is that one opponent has J-8-7-6. To guard against this possibility, cash dummy's queen. If either defender shows out, take the marked finesse against his partner to score all five
- 2. Lead the deuce toward dummy. If West follows with the five, play the six. This assures at least five

tricks. If West plays the nine, jack or king on the deuce, or if West shows out, win with the ace and return the six toward your hand to attain your

3. Lead the three and, if West follows low, finesse the ten. If West shows out on the three, go up with the queen and return the ten through East's remaining J-9-6-5 to guarantee five tricks. 4. The lone threat is that one

defender has K-Q-10-8. To guard against this, lead the deuce. If West has all four missing cards, he can do no better than win with the queen. You later lead the three toward the J-7 to assure four tricks in the suit. If East has K-Q-10-8, he wins dummy's jack with the queen but later scores only one additional trick with the K-10-8 after you twice lead the suit from dummy toward your A-

5. Lead the deuce and, if West plays the nine, finesse the ten. If West shows out on the deuce, play the ace and return the three toward your hand.

6. The only danger is that one defender has Q-9-7-4-3. To cater to this possibility, lead dummy's jack. 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Manning proves he still has it in comeback win over Chiefs

(AP) — All those doubters who kept saying that Peyton Manning was washed up, that his arm strength was depleted and his drive for championships diminished?

He silenced them along with everyone else in Arrowhead Stadium on Thursday night.

Manning calmly led the Broncos to a tying touchdown in the final minute, then watched from the sideline as Denver cornerback Bradley Roby returned Jamaal Charles' fumble 21 yards for another score with 27 seconds left to cap a stunning 31-24 victory over the Kansas City Chiefs.

"The talk doesn't really get to me," said Manning, who threw for 256 yards and three touchdowns along with a pick-six. "I don't read a lot of papers and watch a lot of analysis. But obviously, you get friends and teammates and it seems to make them quite angry.

"Obviously, it's nice when guys on your team, and your friends and family have your back. But it doesn't affect me," he added. "We're 2-0 and played two really good teams."

Much as he did last week against Baltimore, Manning struggled early against Kansas Citv (1-1), throwing a costly interception to rookie Marcus Peters as the Broncos dug themselves a 14-0 hole.

But when the game was in the balance, Manning looked like the vintage All-Pro.

After Knile Davis had given the Chiefs the lead with 2:27 left, Manning stoically led the Broncos down field. He completed three long passes to Demaryius Thomas, 36 seconds remaining to

knot the game 24-all. And when Charles was stripped by Brandon Marshall on the next play from scrimmage, and Roby picked up the loose ball and ran it back, it was Manning who led the celebration.

DT AND E: Thomas then hit Emmanuel finished eight catches Sanders on third-and-10 for 116 yards, while from the Chiefs 19 with Sanders had eight catches for 87 yards and two touchdowns. "It was definitely one of the best games I've been part of," Sanders said.

UGLY EXECUTION: The turnovers and penalties were costly for the Chiefs, but so were third downs. They had seven of them and never converted one. "We pulled this game out, coming off a short week." De-Marcus Ware said. "It was a great win for us."
