May announces 2nd run at District 19 congressional seat

 Donald May, a Lubbock-area doctor, is making a second run at the U.S. House of Representatives seat held by Randy Neugebauer.

May, a Republican, filed his candidacy papers seat with the Federal Election Commission Wednesday, he

announced in an email message.

May ran for the District 19 congressional seat once before, but was defeated by Neugebauer in the Republican primary.

Neugebauer announced in September he will not seek an eighth term in the House of Representatives.

"I am running for the Unit-



May said in his statement. "I will represent you by actively addressing the problems that threaten our nation. I will bring West Texas values and common sense to Washington."

May, an avowed conservative, said in his statement he will pursue several priority issues if elected:

- "Our national security

Talking trash

City collection crews to unveil new routes, schedule Monday

Following years of planning and study, City of Big Spring crews will institute new trash collection routes beginning Monday.

About the only change many residents will notice is that the day their trash is picked up will change. Crews will collect trash once a week, unless residents or businesses arrange for additional collections, City Manager Todd Darden said.

Darden said sheer numbers — in both customers and trash containers — were the major factor in changing collection routes.

"First of all, the town has grown," Darden said. "Then, there's the number of rollout containers our crews have had to serve. When we first started servicing rollouts, there were 500 of them. Now, there's more than 3,000 — and we still have the same number of trash trucks ... the economy scale of picking up trash and the distribution of the number of containers per truck was real uneven."

To remedy the situation, the city council last year commissioned an outside study to determine what, if any, changes needed to be made, and many of those recommendation will take effect Monday.

"Basically, we're trying to get a more even distribution of containers per trash truck," Darden said.

Under the new system, crews on each truck

daily trips to the city/county landfill.

"I don't think it will be much of a problem for us to help people who have a little too much trash," he said.

The overall goal of the change is to streamline

services to city customers, Darden added.

"Hopefully, our citizens will see better service from us," he said.

Democratic presidential candidates acknowledge Black Lives Matter issues during debate

WASHINGTON (AP) — Democratic presidential candidates gave a meaningful public nod to the Black Lives Matter movement in their first televised debate, fully adopting its slogan and raising the core concerns stemming from police killings of African-Americans that protesters have articulated while disrupting some of their campaign events.

The candidates were careful to avoid uttering the phrase “all lives matter,” showing they clearly learned from confrontations earlier this year with Black Lives Matter protesters. Some in the movement say the phrase “all lives matter” minimizes the deaths of African-American men and women at the hands of law enforcement.

Sen. Bernie Sanders of Vermont, the first to be confronted by Black Lives Matter protesters while campaigning, called during the debate for “major, major reforms” to the criminal justice system and invoked the name of Sandra Bland, the black woman found hanged in a Texas jail after being arrested on a traffic charge.

Former Maryland Gov. Martin O’Malley apologized last summer after using the alternative “all lives matter” slogan. On the stage Tuesday night in Las Vegas, he said, “Black lives matter, and we have a lot of work to do to reform our criminal justice system, and to address race relations in our country.”

Observers noted that the candidates discussed some issues that people have complained about for years, even though there was no minority candidate in their midst — a rarity for Democrats. A black candidate has sought the Democratic presidential nomination in almost every election cycle since Jesse Jackson’s second White House bid in 1988. Former Energy Secretary Bill Richardson, who is Hispanic, ran in 2008. No minority candidates ran against President Bill Clinton in his 1996 re-election campaign.

Syrian troops launch fresh offensive in central province of Homs

DAMASCUS, Syria (AP) — Activists and state media say Syrian government forces have launched an offensive in the central province of Homs under the cover of Russian airstrikes.

Syrian state TV said troops captured the town of Khaldiyyeh near the central city of Hama and killed several militants in the village of Teir Maalah near the city of Homs, Syria’s third largest.

Homs-based activist Bebars al-Talawy said the offensive began early Thursday and was preceded by intense air strikes and shelling.

The Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights said Russian warplanes conducted at least 15 airstrikes on the edge of the rebel-held town of Talbiseh and nearby areas killing 10 people including six opposition fighters.

Syrian troops launched offensives in Idlib and Hama provinces last week under the cover of Russian airstrikes.

Lamar Odom’s former teammates remember the big man’s sublime skills and selfless career

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Although Lamar Odom’s marriage to Khloe Kardashian introduced him to untold millions of fans who don’t know a power forward from a paparazzo, reality television notoriety was only a small part of a life largely spent in basketball.

Odom won two NBA championships with the Los Angeles Lakers and an award as the league’s top reserve during his 14-year pro career, adding to a trophy case that also includes an Olympic medal and a FIBA world championship medal.

Odom was a can’t-miss prospect from the start of his playing days in Queens, a skilled ball-handler in a rangy big man’s body. His versatility got him through a truncated college career into the NBA, where he played for four franchises and became known as an invaluable teammate who repeatedly sacrificed personal statistics for team success.

“All he cared about was playing basketball,” said Knicks star Carmelo Anthony, a longtime friend. “He wanted to give back to the league. Every time I talked to him, that’s all he talked about.”

Odom’s teammates and friends throughout the sport paid tribute after he was found unconscious in a Nevada brothel and rushed to a hospital this week. Several basketball figures visited Odom’s bedside, including Kobe Bryant and Lakers general manager Mitch Kupchak.

Rihanna, Katy Perry, Mick Jagger party as gold-rush mood grips Havana following Cuba-US thaw

HAVANA (AP) — By midnight, the basement of one of Havana’s hottest clubs is packed wall-to-wall for a private concert by one of Cuba’s biggest pop stars.

Squeezed among the usual crowd of sleek young Cubans and paunchy, prowling European tourists, the owner of one of New York’s hippest restaurants discusses his new Havana boutique hotel project. At the bar, a Swiss venture capitalist describes meeting with Communist Party officials about partnering on a marina complex. An Ohio woman who runs a bespoke guide service for wealthy Americans shows her clients iPhone photos of the private villa where they’ll have a waterfront paella dinner the next day.

The foreigners visiting Havana used to be Canadians and Europeans on cheap beach package tours and left-leaning Americans on dutiful rounds of or-

ganic farms and neighborhood health clinics. Ten months after the U.S. and Cuba declared the end of a half-century of official hostility, the mood in Havana has changed.

The city is filled with celebrities coming to party and hedge-fund managers sizing up their chances to make millions in one of the last bastions of communism.

As an influx of American cash starts feeling imminent and inevitable, there’s a giddy, frothy feeling in the air, at least the air breathed by Havana’s privileged. While most Cubans remain on the outside looking in, Havana’s high society has a gold-rush, center-of-the-universe pulse that hasn’t existed here since Fidel Castro stormed down from the mountains in 1959 and threw out the last group of foreigners who saw Havana as their tropical playground.

“The next big bubble is going to be nightlife. That’s what happened to Cancun,” said Ziad Chamoun, a Boston-area restaurant and club owner turned wine importer who was drinking champagne in a waterfront villa on Saturday afternoon with five friends, including the head of one of the world’s largest emerging-market investment funds.

Police: Brothers beaten by family, church group to force them to confess sins, but what sins?

NEW HARTFORD, N.Y. (AP) — The fatal beating of a young man and the savage attack on his younger brother by relatives and fellow members of an upstate New York church was intended to get them to confess their sins, investigators said, but they still haven’t determined what those supposed sins were.

Police said spiritual “counseling” at the Word of Life church turned into an hours-long attack Sunday night in which Lucas Leonard, 19, and his 17-year-old brother, Christopher, were pummeled with fists and kicked. They suffered injuries to the abdomen, genitals, back and thighs.

Eventually, Lucas Leonard stopped breathing and relatives took him early Monday to a hospital, where he died, police said. Authorities went to the church and found his younger brother, who was hospitalized in serious condition.

“Both brothers were subjected to physical punishment over the course of several hours, in hopes that each would confess to prior sins and ask for forgiveness,” Police Chief Michael Inserra said Wednesday.

He said investigators were still working on details of what provoked the attack.

8 ethnic rebel armies sign cease-fire pact with Myanmar government

NAYPYITAW, Myanmar (AP) — Myanmar’s government and eight smaller ethnic rebel armies signed a cease-fire agreement to end more than six decades of fighting, but other more powerful groups refused to come on board, signaling that peace will remain elusive for some time to come.

The pact was signed at a ceremony in Myanmar’s administrative capital, Naypyitaw, by President Thein Sein and representatives of the groups. The refusal by the larger armies, such as those of the Kachin and Wa ethnic groups, to sign it robs Thein Sein of what he had hoped would be the crowning achievement of his five-year term.

Still, the agreement, called the “National Cease-fire Agreement” despite its truncated list of participants, is seen as a first step toward ending longstanding insurgencies against the Burmese-majority government by various minority groups demanding autonomy and control over their natural resources in the north, northeast and east of the country.

Ethnic groups, representing 40 percent of the country’s 52 million people, have found themselves victims of military abuses and discrimination in areas spanning from health and education to road construction and access to electricity.

Astros feel sting of 7-2 loss to Royals in Game 5 of ALDS

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — As the Astros trudged back to their clubhouse in disappointment Wednesday night, and the Royals spilled onto the field in celebration, Kansas City manager Ned Yost made it his priority to seek out Houston counterpart A.J. Hinch. In the midst of the chaos, Yost wanted to deliver a simple message. "I told him, 'Man, you've got a team that's going to be good for years to come,'" Yost said, shortly after the Royals had defeated the Astros 7-2 in Game 5 of the AL Division Series. "What they accomplished this year I thought was special, and the job A.J. did over there was unbelievable."

Hinch appreciated the sentiment, even if it didn't take much sting out of the result.

"It's very tough, you know? There's not a man in that room that wanted this season to end," he said. "And you know, there's going to be 29 teams that go through what we're going through today, and there's going to be one champion. So it hurts."

The plucky, young Astros had the series in their grasp until blowing a four-run lead in the eighth inning of Game 4 on Sunday. That sent the series back to Kansas City, where

Johnny Cueto the Royals the kind of masterpiece that they hoped for when they acquired him.

He allowed just two hits, a single by Evan Gattis followed by Luis Valbuena's second-inning homer, before retiring the final 19 batters he faced. He struck out eight without a walk in the kind of clutch performance the Royals expected when they got him from the Reds.

When Wade Davis breezed through the ninth, the Royals poured onto the field to celebrate.

The defending AL champs will host the Toronto Blue Jays in Game 1 on Friday night. The teams have met once before in the ALCS with the Royals winning in the seven games in 1985 — they would go on to beat the St. Louis Cardinals for their only World Series triumph.

"They're a great team," Davis said. "It'll be a fun series to watch."

The Royals trailed the Astros 2-1 in the fifth when Alex Rios led another comeback with a go-ahead, two-run double. Eric Hosmer and Ben Zobrist also drove in runs, and Kendrys Morales capped the festive night with a three-run homer off Dallas Keuchel in the eighth to put it away.

Collin McHugh (1-1),

who won the divisional series opener for Houston, allowed three runs in four-plus innings. His bullpen fared little better just two days after it blew a four-run, eighth-inning lead to send the series back to Kauffman Stadium for Game 5.

"The good version of Johnny Cueto is really tough," Hinch said. "Hats off to him. He pitched a great game. ... We didn't scratch much off him."

Nothing, actually, after the second inning. And even that came thanks in part to a rare series of lapses by the Royals defense that briefly quieted a charged Kansas City crowd.

With two outs in the second, Gattis sent a slow hopper down the line that third baseman Mike Moustakas fielded cleanly. But with plenty of time, his throw across the infield went wide, and first baseman Hosmer had the ball pop from his glove trying to make a swipe tag.

On the next pitch, Valbuena sent his two-run homer streaking into the Astros bullpen.

It wasn't until the fourth that Kansas City got a run back, on back-to-back singles by Cain and Hosmer. But by the fifth, the Royals had figured out McHugh's dart-

ing curveball.

Salvador Perez was hit by a pitch, and Alex Gordon hit a ground-rule double to right. Hinch brought in Mike Fiers in relief, and Rios sent a double bouncing down the chalk of the third-base line, scoring two runs and giving the Royals the lead.

Following a sacrifice bunt, Zobrist's lazy sacrifice fly made it 4-2.

That was plenty of support for Cueto, who was acquired from the Reds for a package of left-handed prospects just before the July 31 trade deadline precisely for moments like this.

Mixing quick-pitch

fastballs with hesitation changeups, Cueto made the Astros look foolish most of the night. He jawed with Houston outfielder Carlos Gomez, strutted around like a Wild West gunfighter, and had the unmistakable swagger of an October ace.

After all, Cueto was finally proving that he was one.

"After the homer he settled in. He was able to use deception, quick-pitch, slow us down and disrupt our timing," Astros slugger George Springer said. "He's got electric stuff."

Cueto's star turn came after going 0-2 in his

first four postseason starts, including a forgettable outing in Game 2 against Houston. He allowed four runs in six innings in that game, though Kansas City's offense and its stingy bullpen ultimately bailed him out.

There was no need for any help this time. Cueto was good enough on his own.

"Tonight was Cueto's night," Hinch said. "We didn't get a baserunner after the second, is that right? By my book. I thought the crowd got behind him, and he pitches with emotion. He rose to the occasion. This was his night."

Blue Jays beat Rangers 6-3 to win wild Game 5

TORONTO (AP) — Jose Bautista wiped out the need for protests or umpire reviews with the Toronto Blue Jays' biggest home run since Joe Carter's historic shot.

Toronto earned its first trip to the American League Championship Series since Carter's World Series-ending drive in 1993, overcoming one of the craziest plays in playoff history when Bautista hit a three-run homer after three Texas Rangers errors for a 6-3 victory Wednesday in the deciding Game 5 of the Division Series.

"It's the most emotionally charged game that I've ever played," Bautista said.

The Blue Jays became the third team to win a best-of-five series after losing the first two games at home.

The 2001 Yankees also did it against Oakland, and the 2012 Giants did it against Cincinnati. Both of those teams went on to reach the World Series.

"The odds were against us but I don't think these guys ever thought we were out of it," Blue Jays manager John Gibbons said.

Toronto, who led the majors in homers this season, will play the Royals in Game 5 of their series, a rematch of the 1985 ALCS. Game 1 is

Friday night in Kansas City.

"It doesn't really matter, we're just happy we're going to the next round," Blue Jays slugger Josh Donaldson said. "Whoever we play is a very, very good opponent."

Bautista's homer capped an event-filled, 53-minute seventh inning that took a turn when Toronto catcher Russell Martin's seemingly routine throw back to the pitcher deflected off batter Shin-Soo Choo and allowed the tie-breaking to score.

"That was crazy," Blue Jays starter Marcus Stroman said. "With all that happened, we did a good job of keeping our emotions in check."

The Blue Jays filed a protest after an umpire review ruled Rowned Odor was allowed to cross home plate. Toronto fans pelted the field with debris during the 18-minute delay.

The Rangers started the bottom half by making errors on three straight groundballs, and Toronto rallied. Benches cleared twice in the Blue Jays' half of the inning.

Roberto Osuna got the final five outs for his first postseason save.

Osuna turned toward the outfield after striking out Wil Venable, looked to the sky and was mobbed by his teammates as jubilant

fans rocked the Rogers Centre.

After Edwin Encarnacion tied it 2-all with a second-deck drive off tough-luck loser Cole Hamels in the sixth, Odor led off the seventh with a single and went to third on a sacrifice and groundout.

With Choo up, Martin's throw back to reliever Aaron Sanchez deflected off Choo and dribbled toward third base.

Home plate umpire Dale Scott initially ruled it a dead ball but, after Rangers manager Jeff Banister questioned the call, the umpires huddled and Odor was sent home. Martin was given an error.

"I just caught the ball and threw it back very casually and it hit his bat and then next thing you know run scores," Martin said. "It's never happened in my life before. It's just one of those moments, and it created an opportunity for us to do something special."

Scott acknowledged making a mistake with his initial ruling.

"I was mixing up two rules," Scott said. "If there's no intent, if he's not out of the box, that throw is live."

Fans littered the field with objects during the delay as umpires sorted out a play that is certain to rank up there with Derek Jeter's Jeffrey Maier homer in 1996 or

Reggie Jackson's hip block of a throw in the 1978 World Series as one of the craziest in the postseason.

"We went in the tunnel back there (behind the dugout) to get out of the way," Rangers pitcher Sam Dyson said of the barrage of bottles and other items.

According to rule Major League Baseball rule 6.03(a)(3), the batter is not to be charged with interfering with the catcher if the batter is still in the batter's box and doesn't make a movement to block or disrupt the throw.

This type of play is not subject to manager's review but Scott, the crew chief, after discussing the ruling with Blue Jays manager John Gibbons, called an umpire's review.

After a delay of 2 minutes, 32 seconds, the play stood and fans continued to throw objects on the field.

The Blue Jays filed a protest.

No need for the paperwork, though.

The Rangers made three consecutive errors to start the bottom half, with Martin reaching on a fielding error by shortstop Elvis Andrus to start it off.

Kevin Pillar followed with a grounder to first, but Martin was safe at second on an errant throw by Mitch Moreland.

After Dalton Pompey pinch ran for Martin, Ryan Goins followed with a sacrifice bunt. Adrian Beltre fielded the ball and threw to third, but Andrus dropped the ball for his second error of the inning, loading the bases for Ben Revere.

"This is the toughest moment of my career so far," Andrus said. "I feel like I let down my team and my city."

Revere grounded into a fielder's choice, with Moreland throwing Pompey out at the plate.

After Sam Dyson relieved Hamels, Donaldson tied it at 3 with a flare just beyond the reach of Odor at second, but Revere was forced out.

Bautista followed with a towering drive into the second deck, glaring at Dyson as he stood at home plate to admire his go-ahead drive, enthusiastically flipping his bat away.

"He's been known to hit dramatic home runs and there ain't a better time," Gibbons said. "This is his first opportunity on a national stage and he rose to the occasion."

With some fans continuing to litter the field, Encarnacion turned to face the crowd and appealed for calm, lifting his bat and helmet over his head.

Dyson took exception and walked over to

confront Encarnacion, leading to both dugouts and both bullpens emptying.

"I told him Jose needs to calm that down, respect the game a little more," Dyson said.

During the scrum that was quickly dissolved, 20 Toronto police officers stood across the outfield, while others gathered along the foul lines. Police later took position on the roof of the Rangers' first base dugout before the bottom of the ninth.

Encarnacion and Chris Colabello both singled when play resumed, but the bat-around inning ended when Troy Tulowitzki fouled out. Dyson made contact with Tulowitzki as he walked off, leading benches to clear again, with Texas catcher Chris Gimenez shoving Tulowitzki.

Texas opened the scoring in the first when Delino DeShields scored on a fielder's choice by Prince Fielder.

Choo homered off Marcus Stroman in the third to make it 2-0.

Choo's homer was the first for the Rangers since Odor connected off David Price in the seventh inning of Game 1.

Toronto cut the deficit in half in the third on Bautista's two-out double.

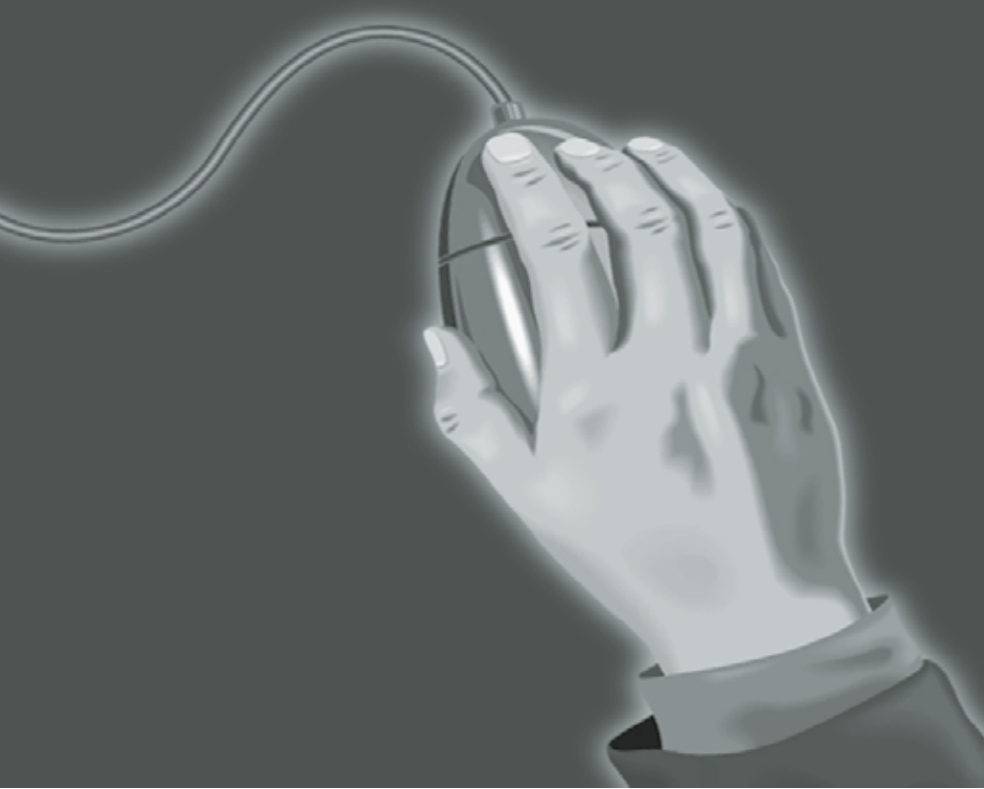

The Rabbit-in-the-Hat Trick

West dealer.
Both sides vulnerable.

One does not have to do something brilliant in every deal to acquire a reputation as a good player. On the contrary, the best players achieve their high standing primarily because they play right down the middle and make very few errors.

It is true that what might seem like a simple play to an expert may appear to be brilliant to a lesser player. But most of the good plays made turn out to be only well-reasoned actions necessitated by the circumstances of that particular deal.

In this hand, for example, declarer made a somewhat unusual play that enabled him to make five clubs. West led a spade, on which declarer, holding a singleton jack opposite the ace, played low from dummy, losing to East's queen!

Of course, South could have avoided the loss of a spade trick by playing the ace, but he had a very good reason for ducking. It did not matter to him that he lost a spade trick because he knew he could later discard a diamond loser on the ace of spades. He merely swapped a non-existent spade loser for a certain diamond loser. The difference, however, was that as a result of this play, South was able to make the contract.

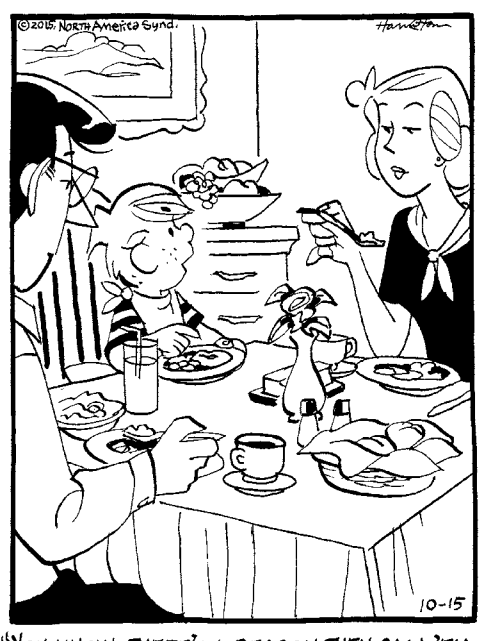
East returned a spade at trick two, declarer discarding a diamond. After leading a trump to the king, South cashed the K-A of diamonds and ruffed a diamond. A trump to the nine allowed him to ruff another diamond, establishing dummy's fifth diamond. One of his heart losers was later discarded on the nine of diamonds, and South finished with 11 tricks.

Observe that if declarer had won the opening lead with the ace of spades, he would inevitably have gone down, losing two hearts and a diamond. By substituting one loser for another, he found a virtually fool-proof way of preventing West from gaining the lead and returning a heart through dummy's king.

High School Football In Howard County



Forsan looks to extend winning streak

After a successful and strenuous road trip to Anthony to start off district play, Forsan (5-2) will host the McCamey Badgers (2-4) at home Friday night.

Despite calling upon a bevy of sophomores and juniors from the Junior Varsity team, Forsan has been playing some of their best football during their three-game win streak. Forsan's offense, which was held to 20 and 12 points in their two losses before, have averaged just under 45 points per game during their three-game win streak.

McCamey is led by rookie head coach Ricky Peacock. The team returns eight starters on each side of the ball, though that experience hasn't translated into success on the field.

After losing their first three games by an average margin of 21 points per game and scoring no more than nine points in a contest, McCamey has gone 2-1 including a 28-21 win over Christoval at home last weekend.

The Badgers return several key position players from last year's playoff team, including senior quarterback Adrian Alonzo, senior running back Levi Guevara and senior wide receiver Hugo Garcia.

When the offense fails to keep up with opposing offenses, McCamey loses. The Badgers have scored just 19 points in their four losses, including a goose egg they laid against Van Horn High School at home. If the game is low scoring McCamey will have a chance, but if the Buffaloes high-powered offense gets rolling early it should be a long night for the Badgers.

One of the only position groups for Forsan not stricken by injury is quarterback. Senior Jesse Cervantes continues to be a dual-threat quarterback, scoring 11 touchdowns through the air and nine on the ground. His growth during his third year at quarterback has helped the Buffaloes average 39 points per game. Forsan has eclipsed the 50-point mark in four of their five wins.

Cervantes has played with a mix-and-match offensive line the past few weeks, with only one lineman playing in his natural position. The offensive line was the key to the team's early offensive success and must continue to perform if Forsan hopes to do more than just make it to the postseason.

The Buffaloes will need as many healthy bodies as possible against a big physical Badgers team. Despite a lack of offense, McCamey is well-known for their physical style of play and relentless effort.

Senior running back Walker Park may be held out of this Friday's game. He has been a versatile offensive threat for the Buffaloes.

Park averages 10.6 yards per carry and has seven rushing touchdowns, second only to Cervantes (9).

Park only has eight receptions, but has made the most out of the few opportunities he's had. He averages 21.1 yards per catch, a good portion of which comes after contact.

A win on Friday would guarantee a spot in the playoffs for head coach Jason Phillips and his team, but a playoff berth is not enough for them.

"We want a district championship. That has been our goal from day one and this is another step toward achieving it," Phillips said.

All signs and statistics point to a Forsan victory this Friday, but the team has learned to not take anything for granted. Forsan was favored by many members of the media before their two losses this season, and in district games where teams have a more intimate knowledge of what the other likes to do, anything can happen.

McCamey certainly may have an unknown factor in some regards with a brand new head coach, but not to much should be different then what Forsan has seen in the past.

"Our philosophies and schemes won't be different, but the terminology will be a challenge to learn," Peacock said during the preseason.

Battered and bruised Bulldogs hungry for first district win

This Friday night the Coahoma Bulldogs (3-3) will face the Stanton Buffaloes (2-3) Friday night at Coahoma.

Stanton is returning 12 starters, seven on defense. Esteban Escamilla and Donovan Armendarez highlight a strong defensive line that will challenge Coahoma's best weapon. The question is will Coahoma's best weapons be on the field.

Last week without quarterback Kody Barber and dynamic running back Kyler Franks, seniors Brittain Heath and Zach Taylor took over the starting jobs.

Heath completes just 1-of-5 passes for two yards, but did score the team's one touchdown. He led the team with 71 yards on the ground with just 10 carries. Taylor gained 35 yards on 16 carries.

The Bulldogs struggled to move the ball on Ballinger, which gave the opposition plenty of chances to score against what became a tired defense. Barber and Franks also played linebacker for Coahoma, making the impact of their absence even more devastating.

It is unclear yet if both members of the backfield will be back. Barber has been cleared to play after suffering a concussion three weeks ago, which will add some much-needed firepower for the offense.

Franks, on the other hand, is listed as doubtful to play. It seems that the team is playing it cautious with Franks' knee sprain. As was reported last week, Franks has no tear of any kind.

On offense Stanton is led by Tristan Graves, a wide receiver converted to quarterback. Graves has struggled at his new position, completing just 37.5 percent of his passes and throwing more interceptions than touchdowns. In the backfield the Bulldogs will have to keep Estevan Chavez in check. He was injured during the third week last season

while playing against Forsan, cutting his season short.

In his first game back from injury, Chavez rushed for 231 yards and two touchdowns on 16 carries as part of a 321-yard effort on the ground by Stanton against Kermit. Chavez averages 6.1 yards per carry and leads the team with eight rushing touchdowns.

Chavez may or may not play this week, which would have a huge impact on Stanton's offense. His status is unknown for the game, but the Coahoma staff has heard rumblings about an injury that will keep him on the sideline.

"We don't know anything for sure, but we are going to game plan for him starting

Friday night," head coach Fred Dietz said.

Stanton has other good backs who run out of the I-formation with authority. Stanton will desperately need success running the ball because they use it to create chances for the play action passes.

After dropping their past two games, Coahoma needs a

statement win to get back on track.

"Any district game is a big game, but coming off a loss just makes it bigger," Dietz said. "Not one game ever makes a football season. We've had two rough ball games in a row and we need to bounce back," Dietz said.
