

Marching bands shine at contest

And the bands will play on.

It was a stellar day for all three Howard County high school bands Saturday. Big Spring, Coahoma and Forsan bands all earned Division I ratings for their marching performances at the Region 6 contest held in Odessa.

"All the judges were complementary. It was the kids' best performance both musically and marching," said Big Spring High School band director Rocky Harris.

Led by drum majors Abbey Bryan

and Danelle Conner, the band's halftime routine of "Superstar" garnered several positive remarks from the judges, Harris said.

"My favorite remark from a judge was 'good marching, well taught and smart band.' That is just what you want to hear," Harris said.

The Division I rating places the band on track for another consecutive sweepstakes. Now ,Harris and his assistants can turn the students' focus toward concert season in the fall. This is not a state-qualifying year for 4A march bands.

As for the Coahoma and Forsan bands, the (marching) show goes on.

Because both bands earning Division I rating, they qualify to move on to the area round of competition set for Saturday in Amarillo.

A powerhouse in its class, Forsan High School has earned a number of consecutive trips to state competition for the last 15 years or more. Under the leadership of Director Jim Rhodes, the FHS band has proved to be a regular favorite to win state honors.



Hopkins puts on a show as Texans win

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — DeAndre Hopkins could be a huge problem for the

Jacksonville Jaguars for years, maybe even the next decade. The budding star caught 10 passes for

148 yards and two touchdowns, helping the Houston Texans beat the lowly Jaguars 31-20 on Sunday. It was Houston's eighth win in the last 10 meetings.

And unless Jacksonville finds a way to slow down the 23-year-old Hopkins, the recently lopsided series might not turn.

"When you have a guy like that who wants the ball, who wants it in crunch time and who has the ability to go out and do it, it's fun to have him on your team," quarterback Brian Hoyer said.

Hopkins put on quite the show against the Jaguars (1-5), who lost their fourth straight.

The third-year pro made a catch down the sideline in which he trapped the ball with one hand against his helmet just before going out of bounds. He bobbled a ball briefly in the back of the end zone before securing it for a 9-yard touchdown. And he smoked cornerback Davon House with a double move on the next possession before hauling in a 26-yard score.

And that was just Hopkins' fourth-quarter highlights for the Texans (2-4).

"We played complimentary football," Hopkins said. "It wasn't just the DeAndre Hopkins show. This was the Houston Texans show."

Try telling that to the Jaguars, who felt like they did a good job on Hopkins for three quarters. House shadowed Hopkins all over the field and even made some plays early.

But the Texans adjusted and found ways

to get Hopkins the ball.

"One or two plays can determine how you do out there," House said. "In the first three quarters, we shut him down with a few pass breakups. Then the fourth quarter came, they took some shots and capitalized."

Here are some things we learned about the Texans and the Jaguars:

HOYER SHINES: Hoyer looked every bit deserving of the starting job. A week after regaining the position from Ryan Mallett, Hoyer threw three touchdown passes on third down, two to Hopkins. Hoyer completed 24 of 36 passes for 293 yards. He even bounced back from a vicious hit in the fourth quarter, a shot that forced him

to the sideline for one play. "You never want to get hit like that," Hoyer said. "It's one of those things where you get hit, you kind of have to assess yourself and there's a little bit of showmanship, too, to make sure you get the penalty. I didn't know I would have to come out of the game. I guess I stayed down too long, but I was able to bounce right up and get back in the game."







History: On October 19, 1765, the Stamp Act Congress, meeting

in New York, adopted a declaration of rights and liberties which the British Parliament ignored.

Chicago goes with Kyle Hendricks in Game If the long-downtrodden Cubs are to reach the World Series for the first time since 1945, they must first force the best-of-seven NLCS back to Citi Field next weekend.

"We're all about onegame winning streaks,' Chicago manager Joe Maddon said. "I know it's psychobabble 101, but it actually works."

After homering off Kershaw, Greinke and Lester, Murphy added his fifth home run of the postseason, giving him eight RBIs in seven games. He's one from matching Carlos Beltran's record of homering in five straight postseason games.

"He's about as locked in as I've seen a hitter," Wright said.

Long, blond locks flowing out the back of his cap, Syndergaard seems to be taking on a bit of Harvey's cockiness. He gained the nickname Thor — the Norse god known for fierce storms — after he tweeted a photo of himself in costume doing squats on Halloween two years ago.

Ahead of his start against the Cubs, Syndergaard changed the photo atop his Twitter page to a shot featuring lightning striking Chicago's famous Willis Tower.

Jon Niese came in and struck out Anthony Rizzo. Chicago didn't advance another runner past first.

Syndergaard allowed three hits, struck out nine and walked one. Jeurys Familia's fourth postseason save finished a five-pitcher fivehitter and sent the Cubs to consecutive losses for the first time since they dropped three in a row from Sept. 23-26. Arrieta had not lost since July

It was 45 degrees at game time with an 18 mph northwest wind. Some players wore balaclavas that covered their faces, including Mets outfielder Yoenis Cespedes, who played on his 30th birthday.

Arrieta, who wore short sleeves, had not given up a first-inning run in 25 consecutive starts since May 29. With his velocity down slightly, he found himself trailing after nine pitches and down 3-0 after 13.

Granderson singled through the shift into right field for his ninth hit in 22 postseason atbats. Wright, in a 1-for-19 playoff slide, drove a

"The ambush early got us," Maddon said.

Granderson made his dashing defensive play in the second, leaping to get his glove to the top of the 8-foot wall just to the right of straightaway center.

"I was able to time it up, reel it in," Granderson said.

He walked leading off the third and stole second as Wright struck out. After Murphy was Granderson walked, swiped third, too — at Murphy's suggestion. He came home when Cespedes grounded to the shortstop hole for an infield single.

"Two tough games here, but the series is not over," Arrieta said. "We feel good where we're at."
