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Bands shine at contest

FHS heads to state; Coahoma makes finals

Saturday was a great day for Howard County high school bands. The Forsan High School band earned its ninth consecutive trip to state marching contest while Coahoma High School fell short by just two points from making the cut.

"I thought they did a good job in the prelims after a four hour bus ride to Amarillo," said a tired but elated FHS Band Director Jim Rhodes. "We talked about stepping it up in the finals and they sure did. We actually tied New Deal for second place in total points but awarded third on judges preference."

"The kids marched with energy and enthusiasm after some rest before finals," Rhodes continued. "We are ecstatic to make it to state and this is a great reward for these kids. We just want to go down and compete and see where the chips fall. I am so proud of this band. I also want to say thank you to the many fans and outstanding band sponsors/drivers that support us. Thank you also to my team of Chans and Misty Moellendorf. You make all this possible."

The band is led by drum majors Lindsey Boeker, a senior, and Hannah Beauchamp, a junior. Assisting Rhodes with the band this year are Chans Moellendorf and Misty Moellendorf.

According to Rhodes, the weather at

Dick Bivins Stadium in Amarillo was very cooperative for the Area A 2A Marching Contest. Final results are: Sundown, 1st; New Deal, 2nd; Forsan, 3rd, and Panhandle, 4th.

The mighty Forsan Band will march seventh in the Class 2A state prelims set for Nov. 2, in the Alamodome in San Antonio. The band will be competing with 17 other high schools from around the state. Forsan marches at 8:54 a.m.

In a close moment, the Coahoma High School band just barely missed a trip to Class 3A contest by two points, ending another strong marching contest season. The band placed fourth in the finals with only three bands making the cut to move on.

"I think the kids did great," said CHS Band Director John Landin. "We actually improved from the prelims earlier that day. We were fifth after the prelims and we ended with fourth place in the finals. That makes us the second best band in the region."

This is the second trip to Area for the Big Red Band under Landin's leadership. In 2013, the band qualified for Area contest for the first time in recent memory.

"Last time we were just happy to be at Area contest," Landin said. "We set our goals to reach the finals because we wanted to set our goals a little out of reach and the kids really stepped up."

City Council: Renovation of the historic spring on tap

The Big Spring City Council will soon learn how much it will cost to provide a facelift to the town's namesake.

The council will vote on a motion to hire KDC Associates of Midland to provide professional services geared toward renovation of the historic spring in Comanche Trail Park.

Sprucing up the spring has long been a priority item for many people in the community and Tuesday's vote will be the latest in recent steps to make renovation a reality.

The push began in August 2014 when the council hired KDC to provide architectural services for spring upgrades, then Oked financing for the plan through an increase in the city's motel tax fund last November.

Preliminary plans call for upgrading trails and vegetation in the area, as well as providing for additional parking.

Community services director Debbie Wegman has been a long-time renovation proponent.

"We want to make the spring area a destination place for visitors and residents to go to," she said.

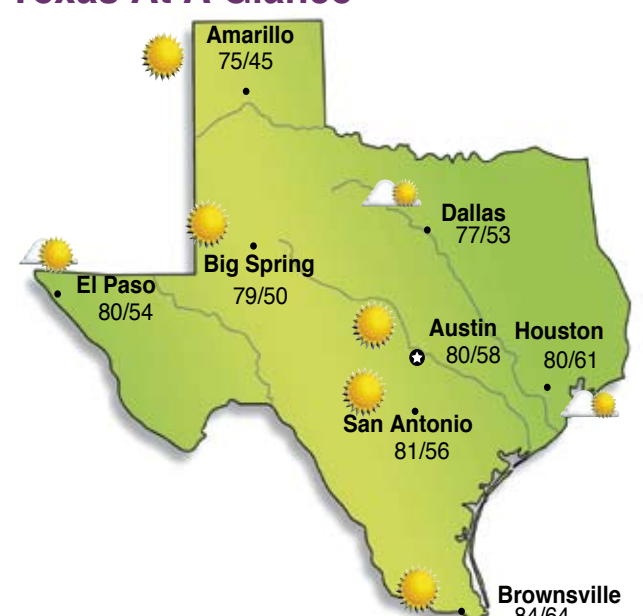

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Errors doom Dallas

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) — Tom Coughlin's 100th regular-season win as Giants coach was all about pouncing on Cowboys mistakes.

New York snapped a five-game slide against Dallas as Dwayne Harris ran back a kickoff 100 yards for the winning points in the fourth quarter against his former teammates Sunday. The Giants' 27-20 victory also boosted them into first place in the NFC East at 4-3, pending Philadelphia's night game at Carolina.

Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie had two interceptions, returning one 58 yards for a touchdown. Brandon Meriweather also had a pick, while Myles White grabbed Cole Beasley's muff of a punt in the final minutes to put it away.

Harris spent four seasons in Dallas without running back a kickoff for a score. But he tied a Giants record set in 1994 by romping untouched to the end zone.

The Cowboys (2-4), losers of four in a row without injured offensive stars Tony Romo and Dez Bryant, got a big game from Darren McFadden. Randle left early with a strained back, and McFadden rushed for 152 yards and a TD.

Matt Cassel, in his first start for the benched Brandon Weeden while Romo heals, forced some throws, and New York took advantage.

This third-period score was the seventh touchdown in Rodgers-Cromartie's eight pro seasons, six by interceptions. He had a 57-yard runback with a fumble against Dallas in the season opener.

Two plays later, Cassel uncorked a wobbler down the left sideline for Terrance Williams, and Meriweather made a leaping pick at the Giants 1. Rueben Randle, making like receiving mate Odell Beckham Jr., followed with a terrific one-handed catch down the sideline on Brandon Carr, the same cornerback Beckham victimized last season for his play of the year. That 44-yarder immediately was followed by Shane

NFL roundup:

Brady leads Patriots past Jets

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. (AP) — Tom Brady overcame New England's shaky first three quarters by throwing for a pair of touchdowns in the fourth, and the Patriots beat the New York Jets 30-23 on Sunday to remain unbeaten.

Brady completed 13 of 16 passes for 135 yards in the final quarter to overcome a 20-16 lead and give New England a two-game lead over the Jets in the AFC East. He was 34 of 54 for 355 yards overall — numbers that would have been even better if not for the 11 drops by his receivers, six by newly activated Brandon LaFell.

The Jets kicked a field goal on first down and then recovered the onside kick with 15 seconds left. But a false-start penalty on Brandon Marshall ended the game after a short pass from Ryan Fitzpatrick left the Jets 37 yards from the tying score.

DOLPHINS 44

TEXANS 26

MIAMI GARDENS, Fla. (AP) — Miami became the first team since at least 1940 to score four offensive touchdowns of at least 50 yards in a half.

The Dolphins led 41-0 at halftime,

making the drubbing even more emphatic than a 38-10 win at Tennessee a week earlier in Dan Campbell's debut as head coach.

Now he's the fifth interim coach of 26 since 2000 to win his first two games. Since the firing of Joe Philbin on Oct. 5, the Dolphins (3-3) have gone from notorious underachievers to contending for their first playoff berth since 2008.

The Dolphins had been 0-7 previously against Houston (2-5). Miami's four long scores in the first half were the most in at least 75 years, according to STATS.

LANDOVER, Md. (AP) — Kirk Cousins threw three second-half touchdown passes, including the go-ahead score with 24 seconds left, to lead Washington to the largest comeback in franchise history.

Tampa Bay (2-4) was up 24-0 in the second quarter, before Cousins ran for an 8-yard TD to get Washington (3-4) on the board.

Cousins hadn't completed more than one TD pass in any game all season.

But he got a pair of 3-yard scores in the third quarter, sandwiched around an interesting kick, to make things interesting.

Then, trailing 30-24, Washington got the ball at its 20 with a little less than 2 1/2 minutes left in the fourth quarter. Cousins capped the drive with a 6-yard TD toss to Jordan Reed.

CHARGERS 29

SANDIEGO (AP) — Derek Carr threw three touchdown passes, including a 52-yarder to Amari Cooper, and Oakland turned two interceptions of Philip Rivers into 10 points on their way to an easy victory over in what would be the last game of the AFC West rivalry played in San Diego.

It was the first meeting of the Raiders (3-3) and Chargers (2-5) since their owners announced plans to build a \$1.7 billion stadium in an industrial Los Angeles suburb if they can't get new stadiums in their home markets.

Coming off a bye, the Raiders looked quicker and more efficient. Cooper, the first-round draft pick out of

Kansas City, New York set to square off in Series

Same old Royals? Think again

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Luke Hochevar was a member of the Kansas City Royals who advanced to the World Series a year ago. He was in the dugout for every playoff game, took part in all the champagne celebrations, got an American League championship ring after the season.

He never threw a single pitch, though.

That makes this year's return to the Fall Classic so much sweeter. Now recovered from Tommy John surgery that sidelined him last season, Hochevar has been able to contribute to the success of the club that made the reliever the No. 1 overall draft pick in 2006.

"It feels great. There's no other way to explain it," Hochevar said. "To experience it last year was unbelievable. To have the opportunity to come back and do it again is even better."

The easy argument is the Royals are back because they're the same team of a year ago. Their core players that became household names against the San Francisco Giants, such as first base-

man Eric Hosmer and outfielder Lorenzo Cain, are still doing their thing in Kansas City.

The reality is the Royals are back largely because of all their new faces.

There were only 12 players on their 25-man roster for the AL Championship Series against Toronto that were on the roster against the Giants. Just four of those were pitchers, and the only starter was Yordano Ventura, who helped Kansas City to victory in the decisive Game 6.

The Royals used the same roster in the divisional round against Houston, and figure to have a similar makeup when they open the World Series on Tuesday night against the New York Mets.

"This is a different team," Royals manager Ned Yost acknowledged, "but we play the same."

By that, he means the Royals still rely on pitching and defense. They still win by making fewer mistakes than the opponent. They still cause havoc on the base paths, rarely strike out. It's just that the cast of charac-

ters doing it is slightly different.

The Royals walked on an expensive option on designated hitter Billy Butler, signing Kendrys Morales to replace him. The move proved to be brilliant: Morales hit 22 homers during the regular season and has hit four more during the playoffs.

"He's been the middle-of-the-order bat from the first day," Yost said. "He put up tremendous numbers, power numbers, RBI numbers, he's been great from both sides of the plate."

In the field, the Royals moved on from right fielder Nori Aoki by signing Alex Rios, who is hitting .333 in his first playoff appearance of his 12-year career. Second baseman Omar Infante has been hurt, so deadline-acquisition Ben Zobrist has taken over, hitting .326 while driving in six runs this postseason — including two homers against Toronto.

The backup catcher has been Drew Butera rather than Erik Kratz. The utility men have been Paulo Orlando and Christian Colon, rather than Josh Willingham and Jayson Nix.

The Mets' wild ride to the Fall Classic

NEW YORK (AP) — Whether it was Wilmer Flores wiping away tears at shortstop or David Wright hitting a home run in his return from the disabled list, the New York Mets' storybook ride to the World Series this season has been marked by several seminal moments.

Here's a look back:

MARCH 3

Wright, the team captain, reprimands prized pitching prospect Noah Syndergaard for eating lunch in the clubhouse during an intrasquad game at spring training. Veteran reliever Bobby Parnell tosses Syndergaard's plate into the trash, and the encounter becomes back-page fodder for New York newspapers. Syndergaard acknowledges an ignorant mistake, saying he should have been on the bench looking to learn something. Wright apologizes for not realizing reporters were within earshot, and speaks to the youngster twice to ensure no hard feelings. "It wasn't about work ethic," manager Terry Collins said. "It was about being a team player."

APRIL 6

Bartolo Colon, 41, beats \$210 million ace Max Scherzer as the Mets open the season with a 3-1 win at Washington, a huge favorite in the NL East. Jenry Mejia is unavailable to close because of a

tender elbow that lands him on the disabled list. Days later, Mejia draws the first of two long drug suspensions, and setup man Jeury's Familia is promoted to closer. Familia immediately earns eight saves during an 11-game winning streak and finishes with 43, equaling the club record. With a 1.85 ERA in 76 appearances, he is arguably the team MVP. Then he saves five games in eight spot-

less outings during the NL playoffs.

JULY 24

General manager Sandy Alderson starts overhauling a feeble offense. On the same day outfielder Michael Conforto gets called up from Double-A, veteran pros Juan Uribe and Kelly Johnson are obtained in a trade with Atlanta. From July 25 on, the Mets lead the National League in runs, homers and slugging percentage. "That's who shook the clubhouse up. When Kelly Johnson and Juan Uribe walked in that

clubhouse and guys all of a sudden realized their jobs were at stake, it changed.

JULY 31

One day after a gut-wrenching loss to San Diego, catcher Travis d'Arnaud finally comes off the disabled list and Alderson acquires slugger Yoenis Cespedes from Detroit just 13 minutes before the trade deadline. Hours later, Flores writes a New York fairy tale. The new fan favorite hits a game-ending homer and drives in both Mets runs, prompting four

standing ovations during a 12-inning win over the Nationals. The victory sparks a three-game sweep at raucous Citi Field that erases Washington's three-game lead in the division.

AUG. 24

Sidelined more than four months because of a strained hamstringing and spinal stenosis, Wright hits a colossal homer on his first major league swing since mid-April. "Couldn't have been any better," he says. New York sets franchise records with eight homers and 15

extra-base hits in a 16-7 victory at Philadelphia.

SEPT. 26

Lucas Duda hits a grand slam and Wright adds a three-run homer in a 10-2 victory at Cincinnati that clinches the club's sixth NL East title, putting the Mets in the playoffs for the first time since 2006. "It's been a long time," Wright says. "Too long." Collins and his players return to the field to celebrate with thousands of Mets fans who made the trip, slapping high-fives and spraying them with champagne

OCT. 15

Five days after short-stop Ruben Tejada breaks his right leg on a late takeout slide by Chase Utley, the Mets edge the Dodgers 3-2 behind a gritty Jacob deGrom to win their NL Division Series against Los Angeles.

Daniel Murphy alertly steals an uncovered third base on Duda's walk and hits a go-ahead homer off Zack Greinke. Murphy continues his uncharacteristic power surge against the Cubs and is selected NLCS MVP following a four-game sweep.
