Early voting to end Friday

Early voting for the Texas constitutional amendments election is following recent trends, officials say.

County Election Administrator Saundra Bloom expects about 400 people to cast early ballots by the time early voting ends Friday.

"That's about the same number of people who voted early in the last constitutional amendment election," Bloom said.

About 360 people have cast early ballots through Wednesday, she added.

Early voting will be held from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. today and 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Friday at Bloom's office on the first floor of the Howard County Courthouse.

On election day Tuesday, the following polling places will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.:

- Precincts 11, 12, 12A, 13, 14, 16, 103, 104 and 105 — Sacred-Heath Youth Center, 601 N. Aylesford.
- Precincts 24, 25, 26, 205 and 208 — Spring Town Plaza, 1801 E. FM 700.
- Precincts 32, 33, 34, 35 and 304 — First Baptist Church, 705 W. FM 700.
- Precincts 42, 45, 46, 404, 405, 408 and 409 — Dorothy Gar-

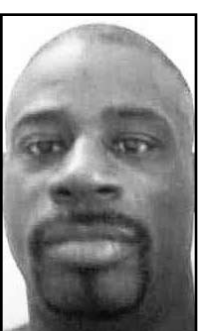

Voters will decide whether to accept seven proposed amendments to the Texas state constitution. Those amendments are:

• Amendment 1 — Would increase the homestead exemption from ad valorem taxation for public school purposes from \$15,000 to \$20,000.

• Amendment 2 — Would provide for an exemption from ad va-

lorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a 100 percent disabled veteran.

• Amendment 3 — Would repeal the requirement that state elected officials reside in the state capital.

• Amendment 4 — Would permit professional sports team

charitable foundations to conduct charitable raffles.

• Amendment 5 — Would authorize counties with less than 7,500 population to perform private road construction and maintenance.

• Amendment 6 — Would recognize the right of people to hunt, fish and harvest wildlife subject to laws that pro-

mote wildlife conserva-

tion.

After a tough 9-21 campaign last season, head coach Earl Diddle and the women's basketball team of Howard College are ready to start fresh.

Last year the high moment for Diddle was beating a then 10th in the nation Odessa College late in the season, which for most programs would be a stepping stone into offseason workouts. Unfortunately for Diddle, only one player, Tamara York, returns from last season.

"Lately it's been normal because some of our students are coming in with concurrent hours and some kids are leaving for four year schools," Diddle said. "We've got very good students and they move on, which they should. We are trying to get where we have a little less turnover in the future."

The 2015-16 Lady Hawks feature 10 freshman and four sophomores, including York. York is a center expected to have a very good year. Over

she was a tenacious rebounder and rim protector for the Lady Hawks.

"She has to separate herself because she's the only one who's been through our con-

ference and seen how tough it is," Diddle said.

With so many new girls trying to learn Diddle's system and gel together quickly, it forced Diddle to look for certain girls when he recruits.

"Kids have to be coachable, believe in the process that we go through, and buy in and trust in the system of play. Those are three nonnegotiables," Diddle said.

With so much turnover, Diddle is also forced to learn his player's strengths quickly so that he can tailor his strategies around their strengths.

The other sophomores on the team are transfers such as Dejah Joshua, a transfer from University of Houston who can score, is aggressive, and has high energy. Shazay Norris transferred from South Plains Junior College and will be relied on for leadership, as will all four sophomores who have already played college basketball.

The Lady Hawks open up the regular season Friday against Victoria College in Victoria at 2:00 p.m.

8 Dallas players reach double figures, Mavs rout Suns 111-95

PHOENIX (AP)—Talk about balance. The Dallas Mavericks had double-figure scorers galore in a season-opening rout of the Phoenix Suns.

Raymond Felton scored 18 points to lead eight Dallas players in double figures and the Mavericks rolled past the Suns 111-95 on Wednesday night.

"It was a tremendous team effort," Dallas coach Rick Carlisle said. "We had eight guys in double figures, which is going to be one of our calling cards because we got to have great balance."

Dirk Nowitzki, in his 17th NBA season, scored nine of his 11 points in the third quarter when the Mavericks built a 27-point lead. Phoenix never got closer than 14 again.

Deron Williams and Dwight Powell scored 12 apiece for the Mavs.

Rookie Devin Booker scored 14 points on 6-of-7 shooting for the Suns,

all in the second half. Brandon Knight had 15 points, Jon Leuer 14 and Eric Bledsoe 13 for Phoenix.

Dallas ended the first half with a 13-4 run and started the second with a 12-4 burst for a 66-49 lead on Nowitzki's 22-footer.

"We really got after them and we started to attack the basket," Felton said. "We started making things easy for us."

Phoenix managed a run late. Bledsoe's three-point play, followed by a 13-foot jumper, cut it to 92-78 with 8:06 left. Dallas scored the next seven points with Felton's 3-pointer putting the Mavericks comfortably back on top 99-78 with 6:54 to go. Dallas led by as many as 28 points in the final quarter.

"We stayed in attack mode all night and never let up," Carlisle said, "and that is how we are going to play."

The game was close most of the first half.

The Suns' Archie Goodwin made a 3-pointer to tie it 41-41 4:04 before the break. Charlie Villanueva made a 22-footer and a 3-pointer in the surge that put Dallas up 54-45 at halftime.

Coach Jeff Hornacek said the Suns just need to "flush it down the toilet" and go on to the next game.

"I think everybody from top to bottom can take a piece of this loss," said the Suns' Tyson Chandler, who has twice left Dallas in free agency over the past four years.

WILLIAMS SCARE Williams had been out with a calf injury and didn't play at all until a 15-minute appearance in the team's final preseason game. But he gave the Mavericks a scare when he went down in front of the scorer's table midway through the third quarter. He was helped to his feet and limped off. But the Mavericks pro-

nounced it only a sore knee and Williams was back on the court before the quarter ended.

ROOKIE SHOW Booker, barely 19 years old, was the designated sharpshooter off the bench for Kentucky last season, and he made the most of his time on the court in his NBA opener.

His first basket as a pro was a 15-foot jumper with 2:50 left in the third quarter. He ended the quarter with his first NBA 3-pointer.

Hornacek appreciated Booker's aggressive offense, but the youngster has a lot to learn about NBA defense.

"I think he got back-doored on one and that's when a veteran says, 'I got a rookie and I'm going to pick on him,'" Hornacek said. "That's how you

learn. Overall, for the first game, I thought he played pretty well."

TIP-INS Mavericks: Friday is a day off so Nowitzki plans to fly back to Phoenix for the ceremony inducting former teammate Steve Nash into the Suns Ring of Honor. ... All 10 of Villanueva's points came in the first half. ... The Mavericks' Salah Mejri became the first Tunisian to appear in an NBA game.

Suns: The honor for Nash comes just five years after he led the team to the playoffs for

the last time. He led Phoenix to the Western Conference finals three times in six years. The Suns haven't been in the postseason since. ... Knight had six turnovers. ... Phoenix had 10 players with at least one foul in the first half. ... Hornacek played all 13 players in the first half. ... The Suns made 6 of 24 3s.

UP NEXT The Mavericks are at the Los Angeles Clippers on Thursday night. The Suns are home against Portland on Friday.

Opening lead — king of hearts.
Two-way finesses for a missing queen are the bane of many a bridge player's existence, but there's no need for them to be as difficult as they might at first seem.

Declarer can usually find a way to guess correctly if he puts his mind to the matter. There are nearly always enough clues to point the way to where the queen is located, and all declarer has to do is to assess these clues to reach the right conclusion.

Let's say you reach five diamonds on the bidding shown, and West cashes the K-A of hearts and contin-

ues with the jack. You ruff in dummy, East discarding a club, and there you are, sure to make the contract if only you knew which opponent had the queen of clubs.

The queen is certainly finessable, but which way to finesse — through East or West — is the vital question. You don't solve such problems by mentally tossing a coin. Instead, you try to find out as much as you can about the opponents' hands before committing yourself one way or the other.

You've already learned one important thing — that West started with six hearts. If you could find out how many spades and diamonds West has, you'd be in a much better position to deal with the clubs.

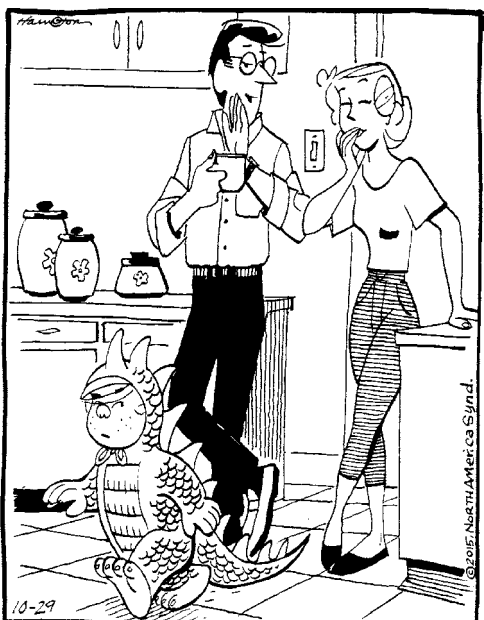
You start by cashing the ace of spades and trumping a spade. Next you draw two rounds of trumps ending in dummy. In the process, you discover that each opponent had two diamonds. Now you cash the king of spades, discarding a club, and then ruff the ten of spades, learning that the opposing spades were divided 4-4.

The picture is now complete. West started with exactly four spades, six hearts and two diamonds and therefore only one club. So you lead a club to the king and a club back. After East follows low, you finesse, knowing with absolute certainty that the finesse will succeed.

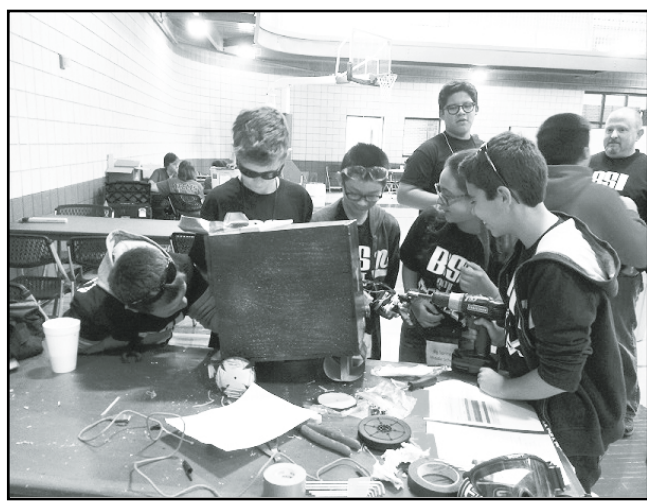

Coahoma looks to stop skid against tough Coleman team

The Coahoma Bulldogs have dropped their past four games and are a team that desperately needs a win. That win may come against the Coleman Bluecats at home Friday night, but it won't be easy.

Coleman is 7-1 this season with their only loss coming at the hands of Post, a team Coahoma saw that is playing on another level firsthand last week, who shut them out 21-0.

Coahoma will be without starting running back Kyler Franks again this week. He practiced in shorts and a t-shirt earlier this week, but still has discomfort in his knee. He is scheduled for a doctor's visit this Saturday in hopes of being cleared to play the last regular season game of the year.

With Franks out, it means that head coach Fred Dietz and his staff have to make some important personnel choices against a Coleman defense that hasn't allowed more than 24 points in the last six games.

Brittain Heath was pegged early on in training camp as the top threat at wide receiver, however he's been forced to play more tailback since Franks went down against Ballinger. Other members of the receiver corps have done a good job out wide, but Heath can be a game changer and a play maker out wide.

"When he's in the backfield it allows teams to stack the box more and not worry about him as a receiver. That's tough at our level," Dietz said.

Coahoma has several options at tailback and it will be interesting to see both who starts the game at running back along side junior quarterback Kody Barber, but also who finishes the game in that role.

Last season Coleman went 5-0 in district and were area finalists led by head coach John Elder who's back again this year. The team returns 13 starters from that area finalists squad, including dual threat quarterback Corder Norris. The 6'11" quarterback can run and throw very effectively and does so with confidence in his offensive line. Coleman is very big and very experienced on both lines.

The Bluecats also bring back several skill posi-

tion players from last year's district championship team including tight end Mason Burkey who can catch and block at a very high level.

Coleman operated mainly out of the I formation and run behind their tough offensive line. Gap control and disciplined defense are a must this Friday if Coahoma is to keep the Bluecats from lighting up the scoreboard.

While the success of the defense does depend on the success of an offense, that hasn't stopped Dietz and his staff from returning to the basics.

"At the beginning of the year we ran base out of 3-3 stack, and we have gotten away from that," Dietz said. "We are going to return to it and get back to coaching the basics this week. We've had to move kids around which has a trickle down effect on the team, kids are playing in different positions and it effects the rest of the unit. Regardless though we need to tackle better and get 11 hats to the football on every play. It's a mind set thing."

Coahoma has fought through injuries all season long and it clearly has effected the outcomes of several games. Not many teams could be without their two best players on both sides of the ball for mul-

tiple weeks and not have a drop off in production.

Though the Bulldogs aren't back at full strength and they are up against another imposing opponent, they have several things going in their favor.

First of all they are playing at home on senior night which should provide added motivation for a team that has had a lot go against them. It is the last chance to cheer on the Bulldogs at home and the last home game for the seniors.

Secondly, this is a trap game for Coleman. They are playing on the road against a team that has dropped their last four games and suffered a worse loss to Post than they did. Coahoma can seem unassuming to the Bluecats and without their best player, Coleman may not think much of what Coahoma could offer come Friday night.

If the Bulldogs can string together plays on offense and play sound defense they could surprise Coleman early and have a chance at their first district win of the year under rookie head coach Dietz.

Friday's game starts at 7:30 in Coahoma as the Bulldog's attempt to get a district win in front of their home crowd in 2015.

Big Spring searching for complete game, Abilene Wylie travels to Big Spring

Big Spring still has a lot of questions to answer. Can they play solid on both sides of the ball against a tough opponent? Can they play a clean game and not shoot themselves in the foot? Fans may get the answer to these questions and more Friday night when Big Spring looks to get their first district win of the year against Abilene Wylie.

The Wylie Bulldogs are coached by Hugh Sandifer who has been a fixture in the playoffs during his 30 years at Wylie. Last season, his team went 4-0 in district and made it to the regional semifinals. This year the Bulldogs have less experience on the offensive and defensive line, but what they have not lost is size.

Wylie is big, tough, and fast at almost every position. They run a pro style offense that operates out of both the shotgun and under center. The team uses their size up front to attack defenses and run the ball.

"If they played Ker-ville Tivy they would match up pretty well," head coach Phillip Ritchey said.

The past few years Wylie has used that size to control the line of scrimmage. That is a trend Ritchey hopes to stop this year.

"They have a size advantage, but we can't let them physically move us backwards like they've done the past few years and expect to win," Ritchey said.

Wylie's offense will be a handful for the Steers, but their defense is what gives offensive coordinator's sleepless nights.

"They are the best team we've seen this year defensively," Ritchey said.

The Bulldogs have only allowed 87 points all year, with only 17 of that coming during their three game win streak. They've held opponents to less than 10 points five times this season. A somewhat one dimensional Steer offense will need a balanced performance to put up points

Friday night.

"They know how people have defended us and will take from other teams to game plan against us. We just need to adjust to what we see and prepare in practice to attack any part of the field. If they are loading the box and giving us single coverage outside we need to be able to air it out," Ritchey said.

Balance has been an issue for the Steers the

past month. During their four game losing streak, the Steers have fell behind early in all but one game and been forced to get away from their game plan.

Turnovers have hurt this team in all of their losses, and negated some opportunistic de-

fense by the Steers.

"We're turning the ball over way too much. Sometimes the more you work on it the more it happens. We've been harping on it all year long and done a good job of taking the ball away more than we give it away, but that's turned

the other way as of late,"

Ritchey said.

It's going to take Big Spring's best game of the year Friday night to get their first district win. They can compete against Wylie, but they can't make mistakes and get away with them.

percent health, but they face a tough Christoval team at home Friday night.

"Offensively, they are one of the better, if not the best passing team we will face all year," Phillips said.

Christoval has a dynamic offense led by the 2014 District 3-2A DI Offensive Player of the Year Jakob Whitworth. The senior has had a solid year despite Christoval's 3-5 record, totaling 19 touchdowns, 11 interceptions, and completing 66 percent of his pass attempts.

He is surrounded by a quality group of receivers including all-district receivers Cole Carpenter and Cody Moreno. Junior Seth Parker has emerged as another deep threat for Whitlock this season. He has eight receiving touchdowns and averages just under 17 yards per catch. In front is a good offensive line that block well for all-district running back Trenton Burchett.

"We've got our work cut out for us," Phillips said.

Forsan will attempt to put the pressure on Whitlock early, but they will have to be weary of screen passes. Christoval is a great screen team that gives teams fits. Don't be surprised to see a linebacker or safety up in the box spying the running back throughout the night to guard against a screen play.

"We need to limit the big plays against Christoval and force them to drive the ball methodically down the field," Phillips said.

Christoval's defense is very similar to what Forsan has faced the past few weeks. The only distinct quality of
