## 'Be The Good' and stand up to bullying

Focus on the good and make positive choices for you and others is the message of a new bullying prevention program — Be the Good (BTG) — at the Big Spring Junior High campus.

The program is based around the book "Success for Teens, Real Talk About Using the Slight Edge," copies of which were purchased by the junior high school last year, according to BSJHS Principal Rebecca Otto.

"The reason we selected this is because this year at the junior high we are emphasizing character development," Otto said. "This program focuses on the good. It spends more time emphasizing the good and bringing out the good in others."

With the cutoff deadline on Friday, a number of students have applied to join the program which is under the leadership of junior high staff members Brianne Van Pelt and Bryan Wilkins, Otto said. Only 20 students will be chosen to participate in the program.

"To apply, the students are required to write a little essay about how they can be advocate for themselves and for others," Otto said. "We are looking for students who have a heart to be helpful to others and to set the bar high in how they treat other people."

Students will meet bi-monthly



time to say that enough is enough. My experience of dealing with a bullied child is when my daughter was attending a school close in the area. Over the course of three years, she became more and more quiet about her day, all the while complaining about her teachers and fellow students more and more. She began to report less good stories, and more "woe is me" stories. I wanted her to toughen up and learn to not let what others say upset her so much. She tried to take my advice as I spent the evenings attempting to build her back up and emotionally prepare her for the next day. I then found out that she was still not telling me the whole story. When Christmas break came around, my daughter was relieved. As I tried to build her back up for her return to school, she confided in me that a girl a grade above her had told her before Christmas break that no one liked her and she might as well go home and kill herself.

This was not the first time that another child had spoken to her like this.

While some parents may find this example extreme, it is slowly becoming the norm for our children.

How many other children are going through this and not telling their families what is going on? How many have reached out and sought help only to find their cries fall upon deaf ears?

Make sure you talk to your child. Teach them not to pick on others, but to lift them up and support them. Teach them how to react when a bully attacks them. Talk with the school and keep them aware of what is going on around the school.

Teachers and adults can't always be there to protect the child. The children need to be taught not to bully, that if they are being bullied, they need to find an adult they trust to talk to and help them through the situation.

Teach them to stand up for themselves and that they have worth. Stand up against bullying.

and will be participating in anti-bullying presentations such as puppet shows at the elementary level and more age-appropriate demonstration for their peers, Otto said.

Helping with the program is Teresa Vela of the Texas Department of Health Service. The organization has provided some funds to the junior high for purchase of materials such as bracelets to spread the anti-bully message, Otto stated.

Bullying has been a hot topic in the last few years especially with the rise of social media that can make some teens and children feel they can not escape a bully's torment even in their own home.

As for bullying in the junior high level, Otto said her years of experience has shown this is an awkward time for this age group as students mature from childhood to their early teenage years.

"Our staff is truly committed to and has a heart for these kids," Otto said. "The junior

high age is a difficult time physically, emotionally. These students are exploring new things and going through new changes and sometimes they can become easily frustrated with themselves and say things they would not normally say. We want them to be aware of it and to be proactive to make better decisions."

October is national bullying prevention month. According to the website Stomp Out Bullying, a national anti-bullying organization, bullying can take several forms including:

- Physical. This is the most obvious form of intimidation, according to Stomp Out Bullying and can include any physical violence such as kicking, hitting, biting

and hair pulling. • Verbal. This type of behavior can include name calling, spreading rumors, and persistent teasing.

• Emotional. A bully may try to isolate his or her victim from the rest of the social group such as excluding the person from a group activity or school outing.

• Sexual. Any type of unwanted physical contact or abusive comments can be a type of bullying.

• Cyberbullying. This has been a hot topic in the past number of years, thanks to the proliferation of social media. Bullies are using electronic means from computers and phones to torment, threaten, harass, humiliate or target his or her victim.

# Did you ever wonder: The darkness

**D**id you try to visualize the swarm of locusts? How close together did you visualize them? Every three feet? Only a foot apart? In my vision, with every step I crunched two or three!

Pharaoh feared death by starvation. When he asked to be forgiven, God removed the locusts. Scholars say that the Egyptians had preserved some locusts for food. When God removed all the locusts from Egypt, those that had been dried for food disappeared also!

You have to read very slowly and carefully to distinguish this, but the plagues actually came in sets of three. The first two plagues were announced to Pharaoh; then the third plague just came with no notice.

The locusts were the eighth plague, the second in a set. Without warning, God told Moses, Stretch

out your hand toward the heavens and there shall be darkness upon the land of Egypt, and the darkness will be tangible.”

Have you ever experienced darkness that is tangible? It is not merely the absence of light. This kind of darkness has substance! A candle could not make a light. Today you would not be able to see a street light before you walked into the pole!

They could walk through it, but they had no idea where they were stepping or what was in front of them. Can you imagine walking through chocolate pudding? It would part as you moved through it, but where would you be going? Could you master your fear enough to even want to move around?

Here scripture speaks of two three-day periods of darkness. The scholars think this refers to two different degrees of darkness. And the seventh day of darkness was reserved for when Israel was crossing the Red Sea...darkness fell on the Egyptian soldiers.

Yet in Goshen, the Hebrews had daylight! And candles shone at night!

Pharaoh sent servants to fetch Moses. “Go – serve Hashem, only your flocks and cattle shall remain behind; even your children may go with you,” he said.

Moses answered, “Even you will place in our hands feast-offerings and elevation-offerings. Our children and our herds shall go.”

Pharaoh shouted, “Go from me! Beware – do not see my face again, for on the day you see my face you shall die!”

Moses replied, “You have spoken correctly, I shall never see your face again.”

One scholar discussed the fact that, even in slavery, the Hebrews maintained ownership of their large herds of livestock and were therefore very wealthy. Yet, they must work as slaves and were powerless to save their infants from the Egyptian guards. But he gave no conclusion.

My conclusion is that God does things as He must to fulfill His overall plan, and He doesn't have to give us an explanation.

# Do I have to love you?

This article will continue to look at the writing of the Apostle John which we know as 1 John. This letter was written to Christians to show them what it meant to be in a relationship with God and Jesus. We have also used the words fellowship and partnership to describe this relationship. Remember that this relationship can only be initiated and maintained according to the terms that God has set. If we are doing whatever we want to do yet claim to have a relationship with God and Jesus, John calls us liars. Our fellowship with God is

dependent upon walking in the light (1:5-7), confessing our sins (1:8-10), keeping His commandments and trying to live like Jesus (2:1-6).

But another aspect of fellowship with God is described in John's letter. Remember in 1:7, as we are walking in the light, we also have fellowship with one another. Every individual who is doing those things in order to maintain fellowship with God is not only in a relationship with God but is also in fellowship with everyone else who is doing those very same things. 1 John 2:7-11 reads, Beloved, I am writing you no new commandment, but an old commandment that you had from the beginning. The old commandment is the word that you have heard. At the same time, it is a new commandment that I am writing to you, which is true in him and in you,

because the darkness is passing away and the true light is already shining. Whoever says he is in the light and hates his brother is still in darkness. Whoever loves his brother abides in the light, and in him there is no cause for stumbling. But whoever hates his brother is in the darkness and walks in the darkness, and does not know where he is going, because the darkness has blinded his eyes (ESV). John is writing near the end of the first century. The church had been in existence for about 60 years at this point. John is reminding Christians of what the Lord had said to him and the other Apostles on the night before He was crucified. Jesus told them in John 13:34, A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another: just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another (ESV).

To me, this is a sobering and humbling passage. I think we, as people, like things that are concrete and measurable. We are good at

tracking statistics and looking at trends and drawing conclusions from these things. However, we cannot view our relationship with God in this way. I can't play the religion game like some play fantasy football! (This week I didn't keep what belonged to others; I was fair with everyone; I didn't cheat on my wife; I gave a really nice offering at worship service. I really racked up the points! Wait, was that me or someone else? Luke 18:9-14) I can be the most pious person in the world but, if I am not loving others the way Jesus loved (and still loves) others, then I am stumbling around and lost in the darkness. Yes, I have to love you, not because of who you are or what you have done, but because if I want to maintain my relationship with God, then I must see you like Jesus sees you, a soul created in the image of God.

## Reflections: Secret to a successful marriage and family

The University of Georgia recently interviewed 468 married individuals in an effort to discover the secret to a successful marriage. The study, published in the journal of Personal Relationships, discovered one primary factor in marriages that were health and happy. In every case, those marriages included gratitude. According to their findings, gratitude was the "most consistent significant predictor" of a happy marriage.

Allen Barton, lead author of the study, said, "It goes to show the power of 'thank you.'" Associate professor and study co-author Ted Futris stated, "Feeling appreciated and believing that your spouse values you directly influences how you feel about your marriage, how committed you are to it, and your belief that it will last."

Each bride and groom stands at the marriage altar beaming with gratitude for the "love of their life." And, it is easy to remain thankful for each other as long as things go well.

But all married couples will face difficult demands. Hard times will come. Many will experience financial stress, competing demands from in-laws, professional pressure from their jobs, exhausting schedules that leave little time for rest. Most will experience the stress of parenting: sleepless nights with newborns, the constant attention required by preschoolers and the complicated schedules of school, sports and activities as children grow.

It is especially during these stressful periods of life that gratitude is matters. Many marriages crumble under the pressure, choosing to play the "blame-game", creating a downward spiral that ends in disaster. Others choose gratitude, building one another up with appreciation and thankfulness under trying circumstances. These marriages prosper and survive. According to Allen Barton, "Even if a couple is experiencing distress and difficulty in other areas, gratitude in the relationship can help promote positive marital outcomes."

What Barton and Futris found regarding marriage can also apply to the family. Strong families are created when parents express gratitude to their children and children are

grateful to their parents. Gratitude in the family starts with the marriage. Children learn to be grateful by watching their parents.

Nothing cultivates a heart of gratitude better than faith in Christ. When we experience God's love in Christ, we become more thankful for others. In Colossians, the Apostle Paul writes, "Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, since as members of one body you were called to peace. And be thankful." (Colossians 3:15).

And again, "So then, just as you received Christ Jesus as Lord, continue to live your lives in him, rooted and built up in him, strengthened in the faith as you were taught, and overflowing with thankfulness."

(Colossians 2:6-7). "Give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus." (1 Thessalonians 5:18)

We all enjoy being around people who are grateful and thankful. They cheer us up. They give us energy. They encourage us. List the aspects of your spouse for which you are genuinely thankful and express your gratitude. Cultivate a heart of faith that is genuinely grateful in all circumstances.

# News in brief

## US secretary of state hopeful at Syrian peace talks but says progress will be difficult

VIENNA (AP) — U.S. Secretary of State John Kerry is acknowledging that progress will be difficult as he launches a marathon day of talks aimed at ending the Syrian War but is expressing some hope of headway.

With 19 foreign ministers and other senior dignitaries attending, participants say the fact that the talks are happening despite deep divisions among key players are in themselves a sign of success. But Kerry was cautious Friday ahead of a meeting with Sameh Hassan Shoukry, his Egyptian counterpart. "I am hopeful that we can find a way forward," he told reporters, adding: "It is very difficult."

A main focus is what to do about Syrian President Bashar Assad. Saudi Arabia, which is backed by the U.S., wants him quickly ousted, a demand opposed by Iran and Russia.

## Little international outcry as hospitals bombed in Syria, Yemen

BEIRUT (AP) — The first missile slammed into the field hospital in the rebel-held Syrian town of Sarmeen, killing a physiotherapist inside. Five minutes later, the aircraft returned, firing another missile that hit nearby just as the first responders were arriving. A total of 13 were killed, and the hospital organizers blamed Russian warplanes.

In Yemen, airstrikes by a Saudi-led coalition targeting rebels destroyed a hospital run by the international medical charity Doctors Without Borders this week. Although there were no deaths, the hospital was the latest casualty of a campaign that has claimed the lives of nearly 3,000 people since March.

But those strikes on hospitals brought little international outcry — a sharp contrast to an Oct. 3 American strike on a hospital in Afghanistan that killed 30 people and brought a firestorm of criticism on Washington.

The reasons are many, perhaps chief among them is general fatigue over the conflicts in Syria, now in its fifth year, and in Yemen, a relatively impoverished and isolated country mired in turmoil for more than a decade. Also, while the U.S. acknowledged relatively quickly that it carried out the strikes and President Barack Obama apologized to Doctors Without Borders, which also ran that facility, Russia and Saudi Arabia categorically deny that their campaigns hit civilians, and conditions on the ground make confirmations more difficult, muddying the waters for critics. Russia denied it hit the Sarmeen hospital, which was struck Oct. 20.

## Congress sends budget and debt deal to Obama

WASHINGTON (AP) — Legislation sparing the country the specter of a catastrophic default and partial government shutdown is ready for President Barack Obama's signature after the Senate

passed it by a comfortable margin.

Senators voted 64-35 for the measure, which also provides a two-year budget, in the early hours Friday. Democrats teamed with Republican defense hawks to overcome opposition from conservatives including two GOP senators running for president — Rand Paul of Kentucky and Ted Cruz of Texas.

Obama had negotiated the accord, passed by the House earlier this week, with congressional leaders who were intent on avoiding the brinkmanship and shutdown threats that have haunted the institution for the past several years. Departing Rep. John Boehner of Ohio made it his top priority in his final days as speaker before making way for Rep. Paul Ryan, R-Wis.

The deal allows members of both parties to look ahead toward next year's presidential and congressional elections. Republican leaders were particularly concerned that failure to resolve this vexing issue could reflect poorly on their ability to govern. There was significant opposition in the Senate, nevertheless, as Paul and Cruz made it a point to be on the floor to register their concerns.

In an hour-long speech that delayed the final vote to around 3 a.m., Paul said Congress is "bad with money." He railed against increases in defense dollars supported by Republicans and domestic programs supported by Democrats.

## Authorities: Kentucky fugitive accused of shooting at police killed in shootout after manhunt

BURKESVILLE, Ky. (AP) — A fugitive accused of shooting a Tennessee police officer and firing at a Kentucky trooper was killed in a shootout with authorities early Friday, ending a nearly weeklong manhunt.

Floyd Ray Cook, 62, was pronounced dead at the scene in south-central Kentucky after being confronted by state troopers and a federal marshal who were searching an embankment, Kentucky State Police public affairs officer Billy Gregory told The Associated Press.

Cook was armed with a handgun and exchanged gunfire with the officers south of Burkesville, Gregory said. He was wounded and pronounced dead at the scene. No officers were injured.

The manhunt for Cook began after he was accused of shooting and wounding a police officer during a traffic stop last Saturday afternoon.

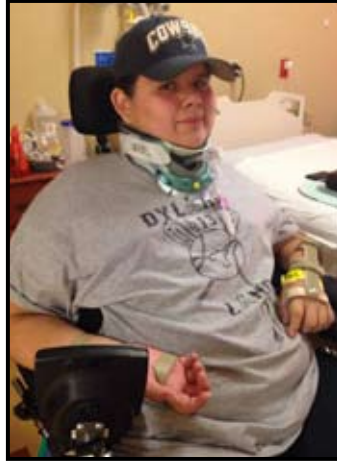

## Game 5 ALDS not how fans should remember the 2015 Texas Rangers season

As fans we sometimes latch on to moments or players for both good and bad reasons. Some Rangers fans may remember the 53 minute drama that was the 7th inning of Game 5 of the ALDS, which forced me out of my chair and on my feet for the remainder of the inning after Rougned Odor cross home plate.

That inning started with excitement and amazement, but quickly turned to anxiety and depression.

Many Ranger fans when asked about the 2015 season will think back to where they were when the Rangers infield committed three straight errors, wasting what should have been a shut down inning by recently acquired ace Cole Hamels, but that's not what we should remember. Fans should remember where this team came from.

The 2015 season started with Yu Darvish down for the season, Jurickson Profar out for the season with a shoulder injury again, Martin Perez down till July and a first-time manager inheriting a 95-loss team.

On Opening Day the team had zero left-handed relievers and were a Ryan Rua single in the 8th inning from being no-hit by Sonny Gray in an 8-0 loss. Derek Holland gave up a home run in the first inning of the home opener and left with a shoulder injury right after, forcing him to miss over half the season.

In late April, the Rangers traded for former Ranger Josh Hamilton. Hamilton was battling addiction issues and hadn't played for Los Angeles yet that season. The trade seemed like more of a marketing move than a baseball move. On that same day, Shin Soo Choo's batting average dipped to .096. The team put together the worst April-record in franchise history.

Two weeks later Odor played his way into a minor league uniform and was sent to triple AAA because he was hitting .144, making Tommy Field the starting second baseman. Odor did not return until June 15th, but did hit .292 after he returned.

Jeff Banister relieved Neftali Feliz of his closing duties (and later on of his roster spot when he was designated for assignment on July 3) and proclaimed a "no roles" bullpen, which created the opportunity for Shawn Tolleson to take over the role.

The Rangers finally climbed back to .500 on May 26th at 23-23, thanks to help from young players like Rule 5 pick Delino Deshields (formally in the Astros farm system). Joey Gallo skipped his promotion to AAA from AA and went straight to the majors after Adrian Beltre went down with a thumb injury (torn ligament),

which he played through for half the season.

The Rangers battled back out of the cellar, but national pendants still pegged the Rangers as sellers at the trade deadline. Speculation was made about Yovani Gallardo and Mitch Moreland, but neither left. Instead, General Manager Jon Daniels went out and got Hamels (club control till 2019) and reliever Jake Diekman (club control till 2018) from Philadelphia for a cavalcade of young talent and Matt Harrison's contract. They also got reliever Sam Dyson (club control till 2020) and catcher Bobby Wilson for practically nothing. They were moves for the future, but also moves for now.

The Rangers started August 8.0 games out of first in the AL West. From that point on the Rangers had one of the hottest lineups, most dominant bullpens and best records in the Major Leagues.

On September 15th, the Astros woke up with the division lead, and the Rangers went to sleep with it. They never relinquished the lead, but did not clinch the division title until David Freese (former member of the unmentionable team) grounded out to Odor for the 27th out of Hamel's complete game on the last day of the regular season.

Not a single baseball writer picked the Rangers to beat the Blue Jays, yet they took the first two in the Rogers Center and had a lead going into the bottom of the 7th inning in Game 5 of the ALDS.

Before this season, writers and TV personalities did not think Texas would make the postseason, let alone two ball clubs from the state. The Rangers took on Banister's message of "Never Ever Quit", which he has epitomized through his unwavering determination in his own life, and surprised not only baseball writers, but also their own fan base.

This season was amazing for the Rangers despite the hurt we felt after E6, E3, E6, bat-flip. That 7th inning, which was probably top-5 craziest sports moments of my young 22-year old life, does not define the Rangers 2015 season. One moment, one play, and one game cannot do justice the perseverance of the Texas Rangers from the front office to the guys who go out in between the lines 162 days out of the year to play a game they love.

I won't look back at 2015 as a disappointment. Hopefully I'll look back at it as a precursor of many more Ranger moments to come with Jeff Banister and Jon Daniels helping lead this team for years to come.

## Benn's OT goal gives Stars 4-3 victory over Canucks

DALLAS (AP) — The Vancouver Canucks neglected Jamie Benn in overtime on Thursday night, and the NHL's leading scorer made them pay.

Benn skated out of the corner with the puck and shot from just inside the right faceoff dot to beat goalie Ryan Miller 2:28 into overtime, giving the Dallas Stars a 4-3 win over Vancouver.

"I never saw Tyler Seguin locked and loaded there for about 10 seconds," Benn said. "I think they were paying more attention to him than to myself. I just let a shot go, and it was fortunate enough to go in."

Patrick Sharp twice tied the game for Dallas. The Stars have won two in a row 4-3 by overcoming multiple-goal deficits.

Sharp's second score on a tip-in tied it with 4:35 left in the third period, erasing what had been a 3-1 Canucks lead. Jason Demers had scored about 5 minutes earlier.

Dallas coach Lindy Ruff liked his team's first experience with the league's new 3-on-3 overtime period.

"There's going to be a lot of scoring opportunities. The part that we're trying to be real good at is once they get in our zone, we don't want to give up an opportunity like Benn got."

The Canucks fell to

1-0-4 in overtime and shootouts.

"We were good last year 4-on-4 and in shootout," coach Willie Desjardins said. "We won quite a few games that way. And that's been a big difference in the games this year."

Alexandre Burrows, Alexander Edler and Radim Vrbata scored for the Canucks.

Vancouver was held for nearly 12 minutes to start the game.

The Canucks scored first on Burrows' penalty shot, the first awarded in the NHL this season.

Sharp tied it with 4:05 left in the first, but Edler scored early in the second and Vrbata got his goal 10 seconds into the third to build a 3-1 lead.

Dallas' Antti Niemi made 29 saves. Miller had 25.

Benn, the NHL scoring leader with 17 points, assisted on Sharp's second goal. The Canucks' Daniel Sedin had two assists.

The Stars had a 10-0 advantage in shots until Burrows skated in on Niemi and shot into the goalie's pads.

Dallas' Alex Goligoski slashed Burrows on that look, leading to the penalty shot. Burrows skated across from the right and sent a left-handed wrist shot between Niemi's legs.

The Stars tied the game on Sharp's wrist

shot from the top of the right faceoff circle.

Dallas' second penalty led to Edler's slap-shot goal on the power play at 5:38 of the second. Vancouver outshot the Stars 12-5 in the period.

Vrbata put in the rebound of Sedin's shot for the fastest third-period goal allowed by the Stars since they moved to Dallas in 1993.

"It's something that last year would have turned the game the other way," Ruff said.

"We had a tough time with adversity last year, and this year we've started off where we're learning to battle through some tough situations and come up with some big wins," he added.

NOTES: Vancouver C Brendan Gaunce made his NHL debut. His brother Cameron Gaunce formerly played for Dallas. ... Demers returned after a two-game suspension for elbowing. ... Sharp has scored three goals in the last two games after an eight-game drought to begin the season. ... Dallas outshot Anaheim 17-2 in the third period on Tuesday, so the Stars had held opponents to two shots in 31 minutes. ... Dallas D John Klingberg has a six-game point streak, with two goals and five assists. ... Sedin has five points in four road games.

## DeAndre Jordan and Clippers rout Mavs 104-88 in home opener

LOS ANGELES (AP) — If not for an infamous summertime change of heart, DeAndre Jordan would have been wearing Mavericks blue at Staples Center on Thursday night instead of Clippers white.

Jordan is grateful he stayed true to his original colors, and his teammates helped him secure a big win over his spurned suitors.

Blake Griffin had 26 points and 11 rebounds, and Jamal Crawford added 15 points in the Clippers' 104-88 victory over Dallas on Thursday night in Los Angeles' home opener.

Jordan had six points,

15 rebounds and four blocked shots in his first game against the Mavericks since his summer misadventures in Dallas. Jordan tentatively agreed to join the Mavs as a free agent before the Clippers' top brass and players descended on his Houston home and persuaded him to return to Los Angeles, infuriating owner Mark Cuban and Dallas fans.

"It's definitely an emotional game," said Jordan, who declined to address the Dallas debacle directly. "The emotions were high obviously because it was our home opener. We wanted to give the fans what they

missed."

The Mavs know what they missed with Jordan. From the opening minutes, it was clear that the clubs' off-season conflict over Jordan only amped up the feelings in this lively Western Conference rivalry.

Cuban disparaged the Clippers in pregame remarks, saying that "you can change the owner, you can change the players, but the Clippers are still the franchise that they've been for the last 30 years."

Trash talk was abundant on the court and from both benches.

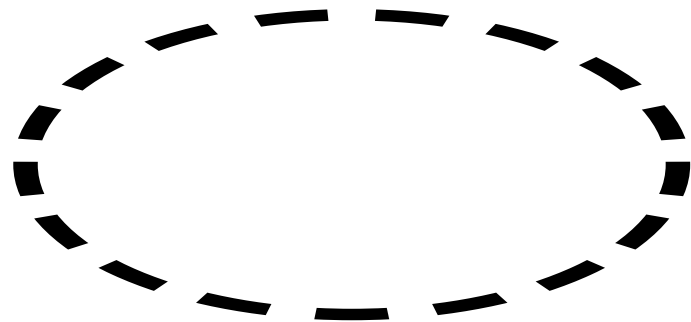

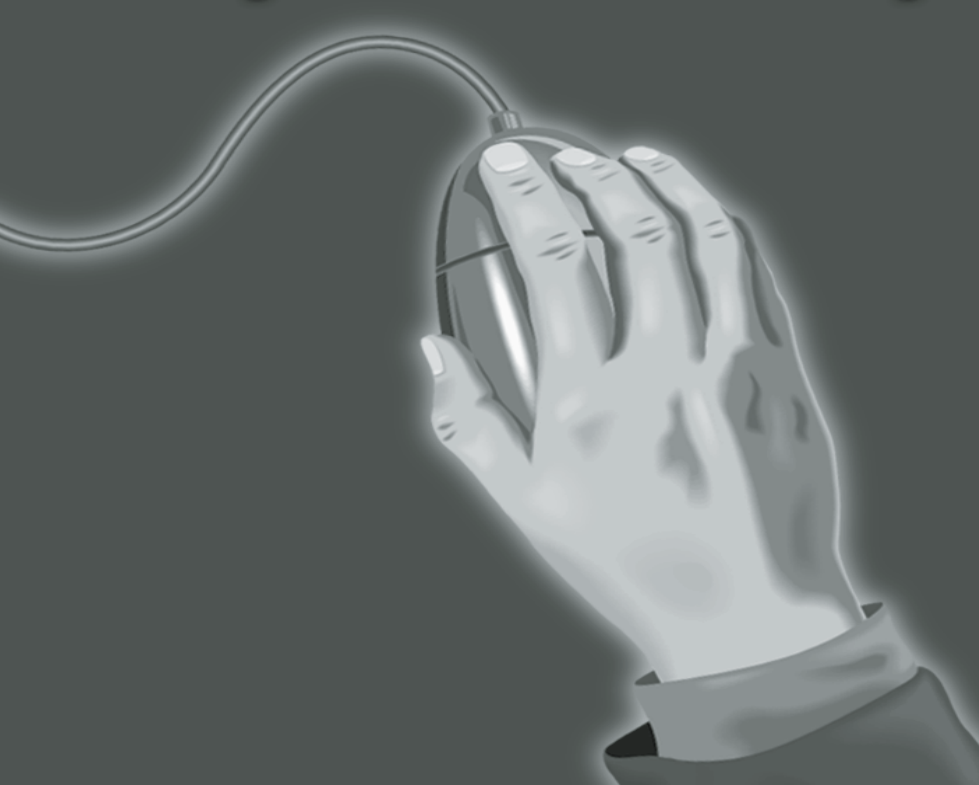

**Dear Fed Up:** Your mother-in-law's behavior is outrageous. Where is your husband in all this? He should quite firmly in-

form his mother that her punitive and destructive actions must stop immediately or she risks estrangement from his family. It is obvious that she is so frightened and upset by your departure that she believes her only recourse is sabotage. You both need to reassure her that living elsewhere will not keep you from calling, writing and visiting often. If she is incapable of adjusting, however, suggest she get professional help. It sounds like she could use it.

**Dear Annie:** I am a 15-year-old freshman. My best friend, "Ella," recently told me she is constantly depressed. She said she's tired of living behind a mask and wants people to understand.

Ella told me she's thought about cutting herself. She is usually a bright and cheery person, so this came as a shock. I can't help thinking that maybe I never knew the real girl. She absolutely refuses to talk to her parents because she dislikes them. To me they seem like great parents, but I don't live in her house.

What should I do? I don't want to let Ella down in her time of need. -- Trying To Understand

**Dear Trying:** If Ella won't talk about this with her parents, encourage her to talk to the school counselor, a favorite teacher or another trusted adult. Suggest she get some exercise. It boosts endorphin levels and could make her feel better. You are a good friend to care about Ella's mental health. **1. You are declarer** with the West hand at Six Diamonds, and North leads the jack of spades. How would you play the hand?

**1. You are sure to make the slam** if the opposing clubs are divided 3-2, so all your thoughts should be centered on how to overcome a 4-1 or 5-0 club division.

By far the best approach, after winning the spade lead with the ace, is to play as many trumps as necessary until the opponents have exactly one trump remaining. You deliberately do not draw this last trump, but instead next play the ace of hearts and A-K of clubs.

If both opponents follow to both clubs, you draw the missing trump and concede a club trick. If the clubs divide 4-1 or 5-0 and the ace or king of clubs gets trumped, you score the rest of the tricks because the player who ruffs is forced to return a spade or a heart to dummy.

If the clubs divide 4-1 or 5-0 and neither the ace nor king gets ruffed, you next lead the deuce of trumps, hoping that the player who wins with the missing trump will be forced to return a spade or a heart.

**2. Let's say you win** the spade queen with the king and try a club finesse. If it loses, South will return a spade, and if North started with five spades to the A-10, you go down one.

Alternatively, you could win the spade lead, cross to the king of hearts and take a heart finesse through South. If this lost, you'd still be in trouble because you'd have only eight sure tricks. You could then try a club finesse, but again would go down if it lost.

The safest line of play is to let South win the first trick! This assures the contract whether North has four or five spades. Let's say South returns a spade at trick two. When you play the jack, North may or may not take his ace, but the contract is safe either way.

Assume he ducks. You next try the club finesse, confident that if it loses, South cannot harm you. If he has a spade to play, it means North started with only four of them, and you finish with nine tricks. If South has no more spades, you also have at least nine tricks.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Oct. 30, 1965, the mini-skirt had its "coming out," of sorts. British model Jean Shrimpton scandalized onlookers by showing up for Victoria Derby Day at Flemington Racecourse in Melbourne, Australia, in a white, sleeveless shift dress that had a hem four inches above her knees. (Shrimpton was also criticized for not wearing a hat, gloves or stockings to such a formal occasion.)

On this date:

In 1735, the second president of the United States, John Adams, was born in Braintree, Massachusetts.

In 1864, Helena, Montana, was founded.

In 1921, the silent film classic "The Sheik," starring Rudolph Valentino, premiered in Los Angeles.

In 1938, the radio play "The War of the Worlds," starring Orson Welles, aired on CBS.

In 1945, the U.S. government announced the end of shoe rationing, effective at midnight.

In 1953, Gen. George C. Marshall was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize. Dr. Albert Schweitzer received the Peace Prize for 1952.

In 1961, the Soviet Union tested a hydrogen bomb, the "Tsar Bomba," with a force estimated at about 50 megatons. The Soviet Party Congress unanimously approved a resolution ordering the removal of Josef Stalin's body from Lenin's tomb.

In 1974, Muhammad Ali knocked out George Foreman in the eighth round of a 15-round bout in Kinshasa, Zaire (zah-EER), known as the "Rumble in the Jungle," to regain his world heavyweight title.

In 1975, the New York Daily News ran the headline "Ford to City: Drop Dead" a day after President Gerald R. Ford said he would veto any proposed federal bailout of New York City.

In 1985, schoolteacher-astronaut Christa McAuliffe witnessed the launch of the space shuttle Challenger, the same craft that carried her and six other crew members to their deaths in January 1986.

In 1997, a jury in Cambridge, Massachusetts, convicted British au pair Louise Woodward of second-degree murder in the death of 8-month-old Matthew Eappen. (The judge, Hiller B. Zobel, later

reduced the verdict to manslaughter and set Woodward free.)

In 2000, comedian, television host, author and composer Steve Allen died in Encino, California, at age 78.

Ten years ago: The body of Rosa Parks arrived at the U.S. Capitol, where the civil rights icon became the first woman to lie in honor in the Rotunda; President George W. Bush and congressional leaders paused to lay wreaths by her casket. Baseball Hall of Fame catcher and manager Al Lopez died in Tampa, Florida, at age 97.

# Cowboys' Randle takes personal time, out with back injury

IRVING, Texas (AP) — Joseph Randle was the starting running back for Dallas until Darren McFadden had the team's first 100-yard game of the season last weekend.

Now the third-year back's status is in question with him taking time away from the team to deal with an unspecified personal issue while already ruled out of Sunday's game against Seattle with a back injury.

Randle appeared at practice Wednesday before leaving the team's facility, and he left after

a brief appearance at the facility Thursday morning. Coach Jason Garrett declined to discuss the specifics of Randle's absence.

"We have players who for different reasons, at different times can't be here, whether it's a family issue, a personal issue of some kind," Garrett said. "We address them, we solve them and then move on. We certainly try to support our players in every way we can."

Randle started the first six games for the Cowboys (2-4), but Garrett said McFadden would

get the nod against the Seahawks (3-4) after rushing for 152 yards on 29 carries last week against the New York Giants.

It was the most yards for McFadden since 2011 and the most carries since 2012, both with Oakland after the Raiders made him the No. 4 overall pick in 2008. McFadden signed with Dallas a day after NFL rushing champion DeMarco Murray chose Philadelphia in free agency.

After his back bothered him at times in training camp, Randle

was sidelined after two carries against New York. Christine Michael and Rod Smith, who both started the season with Seattle, are the backups to McFadden.

Michael came in a trade the first week of the season, and Smith was claimed on waivers two weeks ago. Smith is likely to be active for the first time with the Cowboys against his former team.

Randle's absence comes about a year after he was arrested on a shoplifting charge at a Dallas-area shopping mall. He was arrested again four months later in his hometown of Wichita, Kansas, and police investigated a domestic disturbance complaint before declining to pursue charges against him.

While the case was being investigated, NFL officials showed up in Wichita to gather information on the case, something the league has said it will do under a revised personal conduct policy that includes a six-game suspension for a first offense in a domestic violence case.

An NFL spokesman said Thursday he had no information on whether the league had issued a report on Randle or was planning to discipline him.

Through the offseason and training camp, Randle remained the favorite to start in place of Murray, even after running afoul of coaches by suggesting Murray's franchise-record 1,845 yards rushing in 2014 could have been better because "there was a lot

of meat on the bone."

Randle's best showing was early in a loss to Atlanta in Week 3 when he had 85 yards on his first three carries, including the first of three first-half touchdowns on a 37-yarder. But he had just 2 yards on his final 11 runs and was similarly inconsistent in other games. Randle has 315 yards and four touchdowns on 76 carries.

"Right now, we're on to our seventh game," offensive coordinator Scott Linehan said. "What guys' roles are defined by the week that we're in. So it's kind of the nature of the game and where we are at this particular week. But each week is a new week, and this is no different."

The teams combined for four technical fouls and a series of hard personal fouls, including a heavy foul from Nowitzki that left Jordan flexing and yelling instead of fighting.

"We didn't look at it that way, but obviously there's got to be something there from all the (offseason) stuff," Clippers coach Doc Rivers said.

The Mavericks engaged in Hack-a-DJ tactics late in the first half, sending the inept Jordan to the free-throw line eight times.

Austin Rivers scored 14 points for the Clippers, who pulled away easily in the second half with a strong bench performance.

Dirk Nowitzki scored 16 points for the Mavericks, who played without injured starting guards Deron Williams and Wesley Matthews.

"The (lack of) manpower made it tougher," Dallas coach Rick Carlisle said. "We really would have had to play a perfect game. I thought we did a lot of things well, but in the end, from a shooting standpoint, we couldn't hit a bull in the (rear) with a bass fiddle."

Nowitzki is still surprised by the decision made by Jordan, who abruptly stopped texting with the German star during the process.

"I think we were disappointed, but we still have to move on as a franchise, and that's what we did," Nowitzki said. "That happens in free agency sometimes."

### HACK-A-JOSH

While slipping behind in the third quarter, the Mavericks also resorted to intentional fouls against Clippers newcomer Josh Smith, who hasn't made 54 percent of his free throws in any of the past four seasons.

### WAY BACK

The Mavericks had to play without both halves of their projected starting backcourt, but they're hoping the

absences aren't long. Williams has a sprained left knee that shows no structural damage, while Matthews is returning to action slowly after surgery on his heel.

### TIP-INS

Mavericks: John Jenkins scored 17 points in his first start for Dallas, which signed him from Atlanta in the offseason. ... Former Utah forward Jeremy Evans made his first start for the Mavericks, scoring two late points in 24 minutes.

Clippers: Doc Rivers used all 13 players on his roster, and 11 scored. Argentina's Pablo Prigioni and UCLA's Luc Mbah a Moute made their Clippers debuts, and Cole Aldrich scored his first basket for Los Angeles on a sweet assist from Prigioni.
