New Deal first, Sundown second at UIL contest

The Forsan High School band ended its ninth trip to the University Interscholastic League State Marching Contest Monday with an eighth place finish out of 17 bands in Class 2A preliminary competition.

The spot was just one short of making it to finals held later that night at the Alamodome in San Antonio. New Deal High School earned the Class 2A State March-

ing title by two points. Sundown High School earned second and Carlisle High School placed third.

It was almost a role reversal from the Area A 2A competition in which Forsan placed third. In that contest, Sundown High School placed first followed by New Deal. Sundown also had the lead going into the finals Monday night, placing first at prelims followed by New Deal, however, both bands tied with 17 compos-

ite points each.

Interestingly enough, this was the same type of scenario Forsan High School was in two years ago in the 2013 state finals. Forsan lost by one composite point to Shiner High School for the state title. At prelims, Forsan placed first in prelims, followed by Shiner.

Now the 103-member band can begin to turn its attention to concert season. The community will

Plant fire claims life of local man

Jason Ogle dies from burns received in Sunday incident

Jason Ogle of Big Spring, who was seriously injured in a gas plant explosion Sunday, has died from his injuries.

Officials say Ogle died around 4 p.m. Monday in a Lubbock hospital where he was transported after being severely burned in the Sunday incident.

Howard County Volunteer Fire Department Chief Tommy Sullivan said fire units responded to the WTG plant on FM 846 between Luther and Vincent at 7:30 p.m. Sunday. Upon arriving, crews discovered a pickup and grassy area near the plant ablaze.

"Crews extinguished the pickup and the grass fire," Sullivan said. "By the time they were finished, Mr. Ogle had already been airlifted to Lubbock."

Reports state Ogle, a former employee with the Howard County Sheriff's Department's inmate work program, was in the pickup at the time the fire occurred.

Sullivan said the official cause of the fire is still under investigation, but it is suspected that a faulty pilot light in the plant's flare was the ignition point. No other injuries were reported and the plant suffered no damage in the fire, he added.

Aside from his current work at the gas plant, Ogle was described as a car enthusiast and was active in several local organizations, including the Girl Scouts.

"I want to offer my prayers and condolences to his family," Sullivan said.

Ag producers qualify under drought relief program

Farmers and ranchers in the Crossroads area may qualify for disaster relief from the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) due to damages and losses caused by a recent drought.

Agriculture producers in Howard, Mitchell, Glasscock and Borden counties qualify for natural disaster relief from USDA under the program, Agriculture Secretary

Tom Vilsack announced in a recent statement.

"Our hearts go out to those Texas farmers and ranchers affected by recent natural disasters," Vilsack said. "President Obama and I are committed to ensuring that agriculture remains a bright spot in our nation's economy by sustaining the successes of America's farmers, ranchers, and rural communities through these difficult times. We're also telling Texas pro-

ducers that USDA stands with you and your communities when severe weather and natural disasters threaten to disrupt your livelihood."

Several Texas counties were designated natural disaster areas on Oct. 28, making all qualified farm operators in the designated areas eligible for low interest emergency loans from USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA), provided eligibility requirements are met, the statement noted.

Farmers and ranchers in eligible counties have eight months from the date of the declaration to apply for loans to help cover part of their actual losses.

Interested farmers may contact their local USDA Service Centers for further information on eligibility requirements and application procedures for this program. Additional information is also available online at http://disaster.fsa.usda.gov.

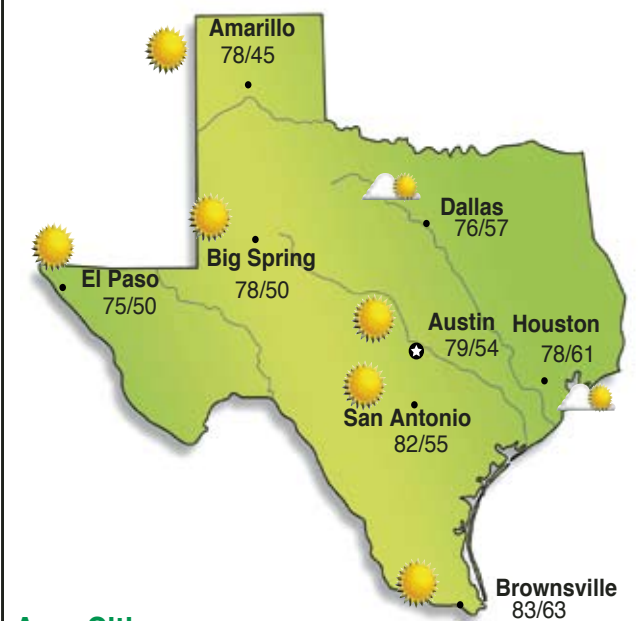

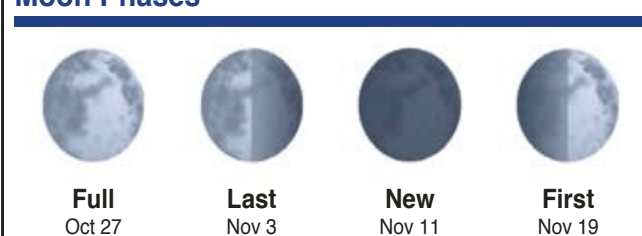

News in brief

First 10 bodies of Egypt plane crash identified as search for cause continues

ST. PETERSBURG (AP) — The first 10 bodies of victims of Saturday's plane crash over Egypt were identified by their families Tuesday, Russian officials said.

Metrojet's Airbus A321-200 en route from Egypt's Sharm el-Sheikh to St. Petersburg crashed over the Sinai Peninsula on Tuesday, killing all 224 on board. The overwhelming majority of the passengers were Russian holidaymakers flying home.

Alexei Smirnov of the Russian emergency situations ministry said that a total of 140 bodies and more than 100 body parts were delivered to St. Petersburg on two government planes on Monday and Tuesday and that a third plane is expected to bring more remains later on Tuesday.

Confusing reports and theories emerged on Monday as to what could have caused the crash.

Some aviation experts raised the possibility that a bomb on board the Airbus brought it down, while others cited an incident in 2001 when the aircraft grazed the runway with its tail while landing.

TransCanada asks US to suspend its review of application for Keystone pipeline

TORONTO (AP) — After waiting seven years for a decision, the company behind the proposed Keystone XL pipeline from Canada to Texas has asked the U.S. State Department to suspend its review of the project. The move comes as the Obama administration increasingly appears likely to reject the pipeline permit application before leaving office in January 2017.

TransCanada said Monday it had sent a letter to Secretary of State John Kerry requesting that the State Department suspend its review of the pipeline application. Until recently, it would have been unimaginable for the Calgary, Alberta-based company to ask for a delay.

The pipeline company said such a suspension would be appropriate while it works with Nebraska authorities to secure approval of its preferred route through the state that is facing legal challenges in state courts. TransCanada anticipated it would take seven to 12 months to get route approval from Nebraska authorities.

The State Department review is mandated as part of the appli-

cation process because the \$8 billion pipeline crosses an international border. The State Department does not have to grant TransCanada's request for a pause in the review.

"We have just received TransCanada's letter to Secretary Kerry and are reviewing it. In the meantime, consideration under the Executive Order continues," State Department spokeswoman Elizabeth Trudeau said.

EU tests new screening process on Greek island where migrants have arrived

LESBOS, Greece (AP) — A garbage-strewn hillside on this Greek island has become the European Union's testing ground for a new fast-track registration process for migrants. If it works, authorities plan rapid expansion to other refugee "hotspots" struggling to cope with the influx of hundreds of thousands of people fleeing war and poverty.

Thousands are camping out here in a tent city that has sprung up around the police registration center chosen for the pilot program, which includes translators and police interviewers who use a secret questionnaire aimed at helping to quickly determine the migrants' country of origin.

The EU chose to launch the program on Lesbos, because it is on the front-line of Europe's migrant crisis. The island has been stretched to the limit with more than 300,000 migrants processed here this year, more than three times the island's population — and most have landed in the past six weeks. Germany said Monday it expects other fast-track registration centers at migrant hotspots to begin functioning by the end of the month.

Francisco Ramos, a soft-spoken Spanish policeman, is currently in charge of running the new program, which is housed in a converted freight container surrounded by razor-wire and guarded by riot police. Ramos and his colleagues interview more than 1,000 migrants and refugees per day to try to quickly establish their identity and pass the information on to police forces.



Lupul, Reimer lead Maple Leafs to 4-1 win over Stars

TORONTO (AP) — When a lead evaporated in 58 seconds and a goal was taken off the board on a coach's challenge, it looked like it just wasn't the Toronto Maple Leafs' night. Again.

Then Jeffrey Lupul scored twice, James Reimer found his groove, and the Maple Leafs picked up their first home victory of the season by beating the Dallas Stars 4-1 on Monday night.

"That's really been the story ... just not getting those favorable bounces or hitting posts or getting goals disallowed," said Toronto's Nazem Kadri, who assisted on Lupul's second goal. "Tonight was one of those nights where we were able to battle a little bit of adversity."

Lupul helped overcome a soft goal Reimer allowed early and what looked like a snowball effect of bad breaks.

The Leafs carried the play at times but managed to hold off the charging Stars thanks in large part to Reimer. Starting in place of Bangerter. Jonathan Bernier, he atoned for giving up a bad goal by finishing with 43 saves to snap Dallas' three-game winning streak.

"I feel like I've been playing well this season, not getting a couple bounces," Reimer said. "Tonight I got a couple bounces, a couple posts and

Head Coach Lynn Osborne is proud of the way her team fought in the regular sea-

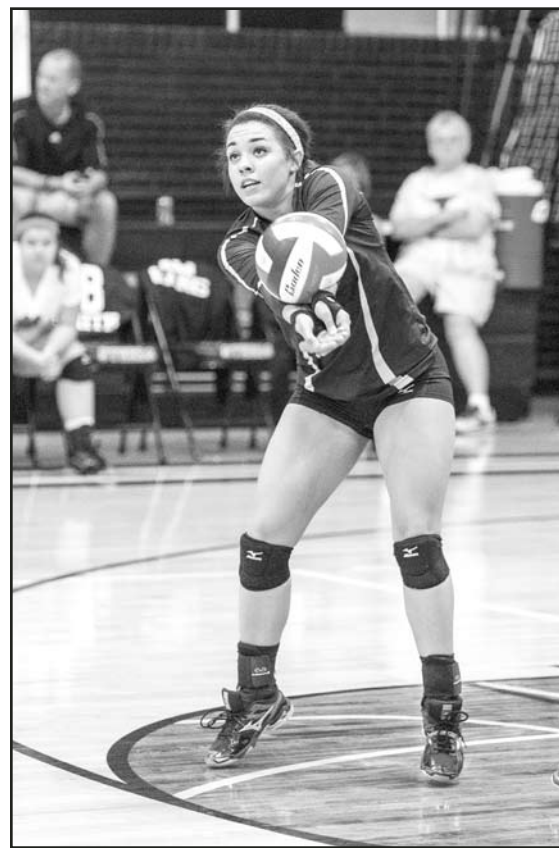

They also have a limit on how much time I can use my phone -- two hours a day. They think that whenever I'm in my room, I'm using the phone, which I don't always do.

My parents never listen to me when I try to suggest a compromise. What should I do? -- Want My Phone

Dear Phone: Try to understand that your phone is not an entitlement. It is a luxury that your parents are allowing you to have. They get to set the rules. They wonder why you care where the phone is at night if you don't plan to use it. Things like that make them

suspicious of your motives.

Extra time on your phone and having it in your room are privileges that must be earned incrementally. What you promise isn't as important as what you do. Your parents will trust you when they know that you will accept and follow their rules. If you show that you are responsible for several months and your parents still won't grant you additional time, then it is time to ask another adult to help you reach a compromise. Perhaps a grandparent, aunt, uncle or trusted family friend would be able to intervene on your behalf.

Dear Annie: Over the years, I've been called to the emergency room for family members hurt in an accident or asked to rush to the bedside of a dying friend. Sometimes, it has been necessary to spend the night.

I started keeping an old duffel bag in the garage alongside my car to serve as an emergency bag. Any time I had to go to the hospital, I'd grab it. It has been helpful in many instances, and I would recommend that everyone keep such a bag for future needs. Some things that come in handy are:

comfortable slippers and socks, sweat-pants and a T-shirt to sleep in, a blanket, a neck cushion, a paperback book, a flashlight and a packet of baby wipes. Tucked into the side pockets are two bottles of water, two protein drinks, two protein bars and a bag of trail mix, along with a few dollars for the vending machines. (Sometimes these things also come in handy for the patient.) I go through the bag once a year and replace items such as water and other food as needed. -- Trying to be Prepared in Connecticut

Dear Connecticut: Thank you for an excellent suggestion.

While most people don't make frequent trips to the emergency room, the point of such a bag is to have it handy for those rare instances when you need it.

Think First, Play Later

North dealer. Both sides vulnerable.

The bidding:
North East South West

The importance of planning the play is well-illustrated in this deal, where South failed to justify his leap to six spades by not finding the way to make the contract. West led the ten of hearts, covered by the jack and king and ruffed by South. Declarer then drew trumps and led a club to the queen, losing to the king. There was now no way to avoid losing another club, and South finished down one. Declarer could have made the slam had he given more thought at

the outset to how he might avoid staking his chances solely on the club finesse. He knew from both the bidding and opening lead that East had the A-K of hearts, and could have capitalized on this knowledge to assure the contract.

The simplest approach (a similar variation also works) is to refrain from covering the ten of hearts with the jack at trick one. After East also follows low, South ruffs, draws two rounds of trumps, cashes the K-A of diamonds and ruffs the ten of diamonds in dummy.

The stage is now set for the decisive play. Declarer leads the queen of hearts from dummy's Q-J-4 and, after East covers with the king, discards the club deuce!

This places East in a hopeless position. If he returns the ace or a low heart, dummy's jack becomes a trick on which South can dispose of his other club loser. A club return from East into dummy's A-Q is equally fatal, and so is a diamond return, which allows declarer to discard a club as he ruffs in dummy.

Many declarers would fail to appreciate the value of dummy's hearts as a means of endplaying East and would sooner or later resort to the club finesse, just as the actual declarer did. But that is not the right way to play the game. Think first, play later!

Today's Highlight in History:

On Nov. 3, 1900, the first major U.S. automobile show opened at New York's Madison Square Garden under the auspices of the Automobile Club of America.

On this date:

In 1903, Panama proclaimed its independence from Colombia.

In 1911, the Chevrolet Motor Car Co. was founded in Detroit by Louis Chevrolet and William C. Durant. (The company was acquired by General Motors in 1918.)

In 1954, the Japanese monster movie "Godzilla" was released by Toho Co.

Laika (LY'-kah) who was sacrificed in the experiment.

In 1960, the Meredith Willson musical "The Unsinkable Molly Brown" opened on Broadway with Tammy Grimes in the title role.

In 1964, President Lyndon B. Johnson soundly defeated Republican Barry Goldwater to win a White House term in his own right.

In 1970, Salvador Allende (ah-YEN'-day) was inaugurated as president of Chile.

In 1979, five Communist Workers Party members were killed in a clash with heavily armed Ku Klux Klansmen and neo-Nazis during an anti-Klan protest in Greensboro, North Carolina.

In 1986, the Iran-Contra affair began to come to light as Ash-Shiraa, a pro-Syrian Lebanese magazine, first broke the story of U.S. arms sales to Iran.

In 1994, Susan Smith of Union, South Carolina, was arrested for drowning her two young sons, Michael and Alex, nine days after claiming the children had been abducted by a black jacker.

Ten years ago: Vice President Dick Cheney's former chief of staff, I. Lewis "Scooter" Libby, pleaded not guilty to a five-count felony indictment in the CIA leak case. (Libby was later convicted, but had his 30-month prison sentence commuted by President George W. Bush.)

Merck and Co. won its first court battle over its Vioxx pain-killer when a New Jersey state jury found the drugmaker had properly warned consumers about the risks of the medication.

Five years ago: President Barack Obama acknowledged that Democrats had taken "a shellacking" in midterm elections. The Federal Reserve announced a plan to buy \$600 billion in Treasury bonds over the next eight months in an attempt to boost lending and stimulate the economy. Former Russian Prime Minister Viktor Chernomyrdin died in Moscow at age 72.

long enough, eventually you get some results.”

That was definitely the case for Reimer who earned another start Wednesday against the Winnipeg Jets, coach Mike Babcock said. Reimer frustrated the Stars, especially early in the third period when he denied Patrick Sharp from in close and forced Valeri Nichushkin wide on a penalty shot.

“There was a couple of times when he made some key saves,” Dallas defenseman Johnny Oduya said. “I think we could have made a better job in getting some more traffic and putting some more pucks at him, but tremendous job by him. I’m not going to take that away from him.”

The Stars had been one of the league’s best teams coming into the game, and though Babcock wasn’t terribly pleased with how his team matched up, he’ll take the win.

“They’re hard to handle, but our goaltending was good tonight and gave us an opportunity to have some success,” Babcock said.

NOTES: Maple Leafs Nick Spaling returned after missing three games with a lower-body injury. ... Ontario native Devin Shore was a healthy scratch for the Stars after getting his first call-up to the NHL over the weekend. He could make his debut Tuesday at Boston. ... Kadri has registered at least a point in each of his last six games against Dallas.

Kuechly, Panthers find ways to win, beat Colts 29-26 in OT

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — Luke Kuechly is the first to admit the Carolina Panthers don’t always win pretty.

Seems the team’s gritty star middle linebacker wouldn’t have it any other way.

“That’s not what we do,” Kuechly said after Carolina’s 29-26 overtime win Monday night over the Indianapolis Colts. “We just find a way to win at the end of the game, and that’s what makes it fun here is we keep it exciting. You never know what to expect.”

Kuechly had a chance to put away the Colts at the end of regulation, but he dropped Andrew Luck’s pass in the end zone.

The 2013 NFL Defensive Player of the Year allowed a wet football to slide through his hands with 2 seconds left in regulation. Adam Vinatieri kicked a field goal from there to send it overtime.

Kuechly would make the most of another opportunity, ultimately intercepting Luck on a tipped pass by teammate Roman Harper to set up Graham Gano’s game-winning 52-yard field goal with 5:22 left in overtime.

“Roman made a great

play and it really just popped right to me and all I had to do was catch it, and that time I was like, ‘All right, just catch it this time,’” Kuechly said. “It was a great play by those guys up front; I was just in the right spot.”

The Panthers forced four turnovers.

The win moved the Panthers to 7-0 for the first time in franchise history and extended the team’s regular season win streak to 11 games. It also left the Panthers as the only unbeaten team in the NFC with a big home game looming this Sunday against the Green Bay Packers.

“We just know that you’ve got to step up in big moments and we were able to do that today,” Kuechly said.

Things we learned from Monday night’s Colts-Panthers game:

LUCK’S RIBS A MYSTERY:

Andrew Luck didn’t discuss a report that he’s been suffering from a rib injury in addition to a problematic shoulder.

“I’m not going to talk about that right now,” Luck said after throwing for 231 yards with two touchdowns and three interceptions.

Luck rallied the Colts from 17 points down in the fourth quarter, but his third interception proved decisive.

Luck has thrown a league-high 12 interceptions amid speculation that injuries are hurting his play.

“It’s my problem, and it’s hurting the team,” Luck said of his interceptions. “I’ve got to fix it. It’s tough to win like that, and I’m disappointed in myself. Mentally, I feel all right. It’s tough to overcome in the game.”

LEAN ON FLEENER: Luck leaned hard on Coby Fleener, targeting the tight end 11 times. He came through with seven receptions for 43 yards and a score. If Fleener can give the Colts more production it might open up some

things for the team’s other receivers.

Andre Johnson had a productive game — his second of the season — catching four passes for 81 yards and a score.

PANTHERS ON THE RUN: The Panthers recorded 140 yards rushing, marking the 18th consecutive 100-yard rushing game. The 18-game stretch is currently the second-longest active streak in the NFL, behind Seattle’s streak of 19.

Carolina ranks first in the league in rushing.

The Panthers did have two fumbles — one by Jonathan Stewart and another by Cam Newton — but the wet field conditions played a role in those turnovers.

OFFENSIVE LINE WOES: The bad news for Carolina is their of-

fensive line is getting banged up. Center Ryan Kalil sat out with an ankle injury and Andrew Norwell left with a leg injury in the first quarter and did not return.

FILING A PROTEST: Sometimes you never know what you’re going to get in a Monday night game — and that doesn’t necessarily mean on the field.

Two activists grabbed some attention after rappelling on ropes from the upper deck holding a protest sign for most of the second half as fans watched in awe. They finally descended. Altogether four people were arrested by Charlotte Mecklenburg Police. The biggest concern for the Panthers might be how rappelling ropes got through stadium security.
