Voters OK amendments

Houston nixes controversial LGBT referendum

Staff and wire reports

Howard County voters followed the state lead in Tuesday's constitutional amendment election, overwhelmingly approving all seven proposed measures.

County Election Administrator Sandra Bloom said 1,285 voters cast ballots in the election.

The county breakdown of Tuesday's vote was:

- Proposition 1 — 1,137 for, 123 against.
- Proposition 2 — 1,155 for, 96 against.

- Proposition 3 — 861 for, 385 against.
- Proposition 4 — 857 for, 385 against.
- Proposition 5 — 1,050 for, 189 against.
- Proposition 6 — 1,103 for, 148 against.
- Proposition 7, 1,038 for, 216 against.

Voters statewide approved all seven proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution on Tuesday — giving themselves tax breaks, cementing their rights to hunt and fish, pumping billions of extra public dollars into roads, and freeing some top elected officials from

having to live in the state capital.

But the most-watched ballot initiative was defeated, as Houston residents rejected a city ordinance extending non-discrimination protections to gay and transgender residents.

Tea party-backed Attorney General Ken Paxton declared that America's fourth largest city "defeated the latest extreme example of political correctness."

"Houston rightly ignored Hollywood and the liberal

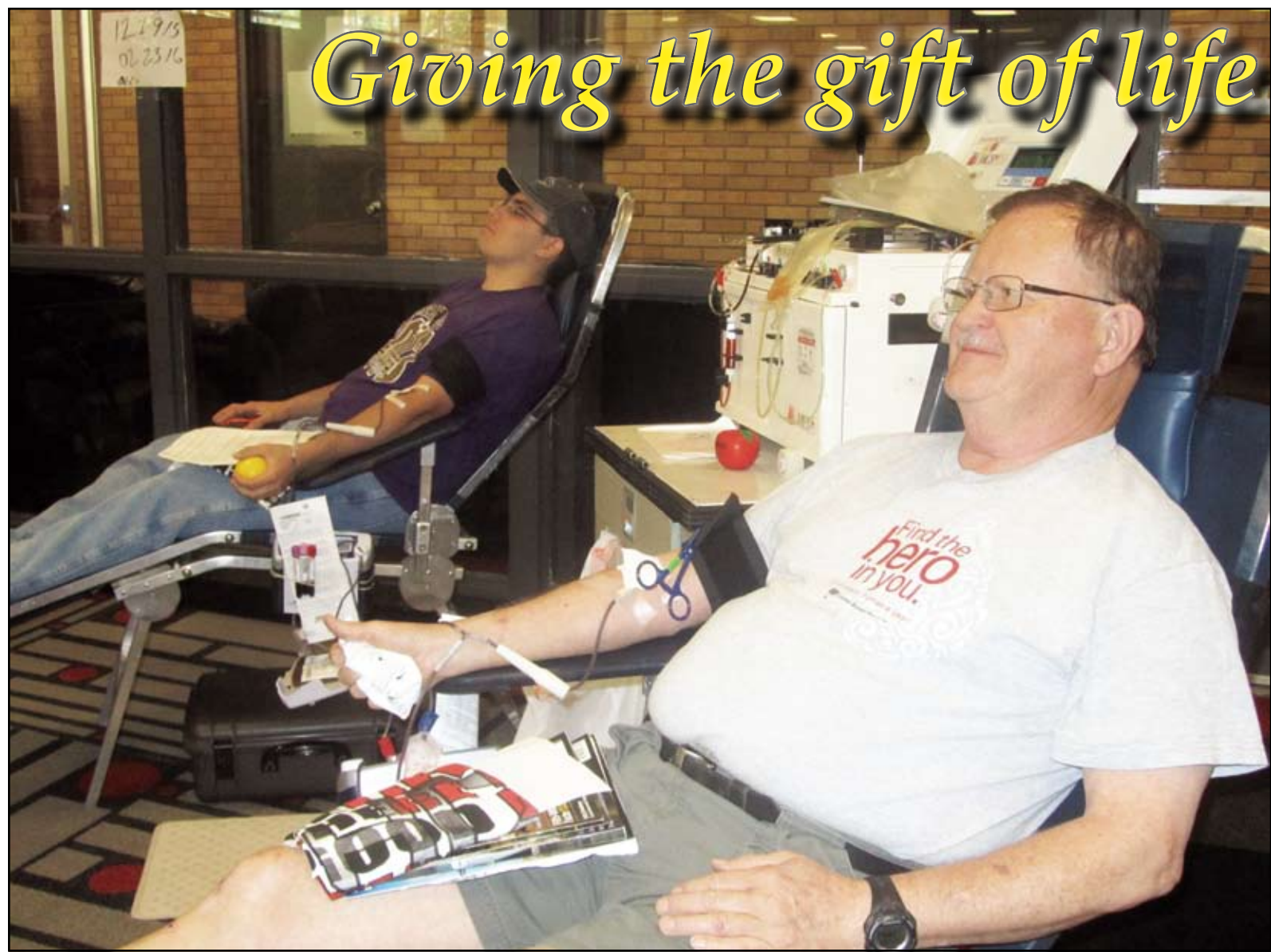
The Feast of Sharing is still in need of volunteers. Only about half of the needed number of volunteers for a successful event have signed up so far.

"We really need handmade Christmas cards from kids and handwritten notes and cards from adults in the community.," said Debbie Burrow, secretary/treasurer of HC Adopt a Military Hero organization.

"The people in the community pull together to help us put this together every year. Good volunteers, lots of donations, it is just a caring community. It is not an easy task to get this many boxes filled and sent. We send a few more each year," explains Joel Miller, volunteer with the Adopt a Military Hero program.

The group is planning on sending 550 - 600 boxes this year, making the cost of ship-

ping around \$9,000. They will also use monetary donations to fill in the gaps of donated goods from the people so that each box will contain similar amounts of goodies.

This is the last main donation drive that the group will have before needing to get the items for the boxes sorted and organized. The volunteers with lists of suggested items are going to be outside WalMart and H.E.B. on Saturday from 8 a.m. until 6 p.m. They will have people on site to help load donations and organize.

Some of the desired items

still needed are sudoku/puzzle books, individual drink mixes, playing cards, hard candy, beef jerkey, new or used DVDs, and similar items that can withstand transportation and weeks of being boxed up.

Over a weeks time, the inventory will be set up, counted, organized, missing items will be purchased, boxes will be assembled, and finally, filled and shipped off to soldiers overseas.

elites," Paxton said in a statement.

Here's a guide to what happened statewide on Election Day:

TAX CUTS COMING

Voters approved Proposition 1, which will increase homeowners' property tax homestead exemption from \$15,000 to \$25,000, saving the average family roughly \$125 annually while costing the state about \$1.2 billion in tax revenue for school districts during the first two years.

The Legislature has budgeted extra funding so schools won't see shortfalls, at least in the short term.

Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, who oversees the Texas Senate, said the proposition's "huge margin of victory" will "give us the clout to do more property tax relief" during the next legislative session in 2017.

Also passing was Proposition 2, which offers property tax exemptions to the spouses of totally disabled veterans who died before January 2010. Similar exemptions already exist for spouses of totally disabled veterans who

died in 2011 or later.

ANYWHERE BUT AUSTIN

The land and agriculture commissioners, comptroller, attorney general and members of the Railroad Commission will be allowed to live somewhere other than Austin under Proposition 3.

Supporters argued that modern technology allows elected officials to do their jobs from anywhere. None of the current holders of eligible offices have acknowledged any plans to move away from the Texas capital, however.

The amendment won't apply to the governor and the 1856 Greek Revival-style Austin mansion he occupies. It also has no effect on the lieutenant governor, nor Texas Supreme Court and Court of Criminal Appeals judges.

RAFFLE RIGHTS

Passage of Proposition 4 means professional teams can hold charitable raffles at all home games. That's good news for supporters, which included the Dallas Cowboys and most of the state's top sports franchises.

GONE FISHIN'

Proposition 6 recognizes the right for people to hunt, fish and "harvest wildlife" and will protect those activities from future lawsuits.

Though such legal challenges have been sparse, Texas now joins 18 other states in spelling out such guarantees in their constitutions.

ROAD FUNDING BONANZA

Proposition 5 lets counties with fewer than 7,500 people privatize road construction and maintenance — up from the current maximum of 5,000 residents. About 70 counties qualify.

And Proposition 7 means that when sales tax revenue exceeds \$28 billion per fiscal year, the next \$2.5 billion would go to road construction and maintenance starting in September 2017.

Then, beginning in September 2019, if tax revenue from vehicle sales and rentals exceeds \$5 billion per fiscal year, 35 percent of the amount exceeding \$5 billion would go to road funding.

The amendment allows the GOP-controlled Legislature to bolster transportation infrastructure strained by Texas' booming popu-

lation without raising taxes.

"Prop 7 will provide an efficient way to dedicate a portion of our sales tax revenue to build the roads that our children and grandchildren will use," said Rep. Joe Pickett, an El Paso Democrat who chairs the House Transportation Committee. "All we are doing is taking the success of the Texas economy and dedicating a portion of it to transportation."

Gov. Greg Abbott said that by passing all seven constitutional amendments, Texas residents "are creating an even better place for future generations to live."

EQUAL RIGHTS RERERNDUM

Houston's City Council passed a nondiscrimination ordinance last year, but a public vote ordered by the Texas Supreme Court went the other way.

It was a blow to national gay rights groups, who vowed to make equal protection measures a priority after the U.S. Supreme Court legalized same-sex marriages this summer.

Conservative pastors opposed the ordinance, saying homosexuality violated biblical values. Others worried about men being allowed to

use women's public restrooms.

"The voters clearly understand that this proposition was never about equality — that is already the law," Patrick said. "It was about allowing men to enter women's restrooms and locker rooms."

HOUSTON MAYOR'S RACE

Houston also was choosing a successor for term-limited, openly gay Mayor Annise Parker — but none of the 13-candidate field won a majority of the ballots cast.

Veteran state Rep. Sylvester Turner was Tuesday's top vote-getter. He will face second-place finisher Bill King, former mayor of the Houston suburb of Kemah, in a runoff Dec. 12.

It's all relative

Regardless of one's political or religious persuasion, there are ideologies finding a foothold in our society's fiber that are troubling, if not downright frightening. The deafening call for every conceivable lifestyle equality is an example.

The whole world seems to be paralyzed with fear that someone is going to be offended if we dare disagree with anything they say or do. One need not be a genius to recognize that many movements today are demanding equality, yet what they really want is dominance. They don't simply want to be accepted for who they are and what they believe; they want to force you and me to believe it, too, or we are labeled haters. I'm pretty sick of it all, if you want to know the truth.

For instance, the idea of cultural relativism is the view that no culture is superior to any other culture when comparing systems of morality, law, politics, etc. It's the philosophical notion that all cultural beliefs are equally valid and that truth itself is relative, depending on the cultural environment. Those who hold to cultural relativism hold that all religious, ethical, aesthetic, and political beliefs are completely relative to the individual within a cultural identity.

Relativism often includes moral relativism (ethics depend on a social construct), situational relativism (right or wrong is based on the particular situation), and cognitive relativism (truth itself has no objective standard).

Cultural relativism, like moral relativism, pervades today's world. As long as we don't "hurt" anyone, anything goes. Absolute truth has been discarded, along with God. We live in a society of pluralism and tolerance. We reject the idea of universal right and wrong.

Predictably, with a diminishing list of objective standards, our legislative system is having a harder time defining the laws, and our court system is having a harder time interpreting them. In just a few decades, our entertainment industry has

pushed the "acceptance" of lewdness and indecency to levels we never imagined. Our children are losing their moral compass and lashing out in violence like never before. Our schools teach that we are an accident of evolution.

Society teaches that we must accept all types of lifestyles or be deemed "intolerant," or worse, "hate mongers." Many things that were considered a "sin" only a few years ago are now either accepted or promoted in our culture. According to the relativists, all points of view are true except for those that teach absolutes - absolute truth, absolute right or wrong, or an absolute God.

Of course, cultural relativism is appropriate in some respects. For example, food, clothing, language, and driving rules are different within cultures, and it's important that these relative differences remain. But in a relativistic society, we have no right to judge or punish anyone. Right and wrong are now defined by socialization. Society changes and morality becomes a moving target. In truth, if the standard of right and wrong is based on relativism, then society has no standards at all.

Cultural relativism is the philosophical belief that all cultural views are equally valid. However, if you test this position under general rules of logic, you soon discover that relativism is illogical and self-defeating. If relativism is true and all points of view are true, then the assertion that relativism is false, is true. Is this contradictory? Yes. Is truth contradictory? No.

Relativists believe that all truth is relative. Therefore, the statement, "All truth is relative," would be absolutely true. If this statement is absolutely true, then not all things are relative and the statement is false. Relativists declare that "there are no absolute truths." However, this is an absolute statement, which is supposed to be true. Therefore, it is an absolute truth and the statement is false.

Then, according to the relativist position, I can have my own version of truth. Therefore, a truth for me is that relativism is false. Based on the relativistic rules, I have just established that relativism is false. Of course, the relativist will say "no" to my logic, but then what is true for me is not really true, and, again,

I have proven the philosophy of relativism false. The truth is you can take many of today's most prevalent, popular and pervading ideologies and dismantle them easily.

Another example could be society's idea of deviance. In everyday language to deviate means to stray from an accepted path. Thus deviance consists of those areas which do not follow the norms and expectations of a particular social group.

Deviance may be rewarded, punished, or simply accepted without reward or punishment. In terms of the above definition of deviance, the soldier on the battlefield who risks his life above and beyond the normal call of duty may be termed deviant, as may the physicist who breaks the rules of his discipline and develops a new theory. Their deviance may be positively sanctioned, as the soldier might be rewarded with a medal and the physicist with a Noble prize. In one sense, though, neither is deviant since both conform to the values of society, the soldier to the value of courage; the physicist to the value of academic progress.

A third form of deviance consists of acts which depart from the norms and expectations of a particular society but are generally tolerated and accepted. The little old lady with a house full of cats or the old gentleman with an obsession for collecting clocks would fall into this category. Usually their eccentricities are neither rewarded nor punished by others. They are simply defined as a 'bit odd' but harmless, and therefore tolerated.

So we are told that deviance is relative. Many in society want us to accept and believe this means that there is no absolute way of defining a deviant act so basically everything is acceptable. But there absolutely are deviant acts that should not be accepted by the populace and until we, as a society, regain our moral balance we will continue our downward spiral into societal decadence.

Debates not kind to Kasich

Ohio Gov. John Kasich is the Republican in the 2016 presidential field whom Democrats I know like the most. He evokes his Christian faith to explain his support for government spending. At the CNBC debate, he declared, "I care about poor people" — in a way that made you wonder if he thought he was the only R who could make that claim. Kasich even liked the CNBC debate. Leon Wolf, a blogger for the conservative web site RedState, seized on Kasich's remarks to declare him "far and away the candidate in this field who is just utterly clueless about the Republican electorate as a whole."

Debates have not been good for Kasich. The more GOP voters hear him, the thinner are the ranks of those who support him. Kasich's high mark in the RealClearPolitics average of national polls was about 5 percent. He's now in ninth place at 2.2 percent. The Kasich campaign has staked his candidacy on scoring big in New Hampshire, where the RealClearPolitics average puts him in fifth place with 8.3 percent of the vote.

Kasich should be doing better, because he has impeccable conservative credentials. At the CNBC debate, he boasted he was "the chief architect of balancing

the federal budget." PolitiFact ruled he was not the only party responsible, but indeed was "one of the chief architects of the balanced federal budget." In 1996, when Kasich was chairman of the House Budget Committee, Congress passed and President Bill Clinton signed a budget that reduced domestic appropriations by 9 percent and cut discretionary spending by \$53 billion over two years.

A year later came the Balanced Budget Act of 1997.

When Kasich became Ohio governor in 2011, the state faced an \$8 billion projected shortfall. That deficit is gone and has been replaced by a \$2 billion rainy day fund.

As a GOP presidential nominee, he will need to win the Buckeye State. While Ohio voters preferred Barack Obama to John McCain in 2008 and to Mitt Romney in 2012, Kasich has done well in his battleground state. In 2010, he beat the Democratic incumbent governor, Ted Strickland, in a tight race. The vote was 49 percent to 47 percent.

In 2014, Kasich won re-election with 64 percent of the vote.

Some conservatives won't forgive Kasich for expanding Ohio Medicaid rolls under the Affordable Care Act. (For the first three years, Obamacare funds new enrollees at full freight, then the federal contribution decreases to 90 percent.) Kasich told Fox News he expanded the rolls because it's his job to "bring Ohio money back to Ohio." His constituents pay federal taxes, so it makes no sense to send them to pay for health care in other states. That's a strong answer.

Sometimes, however, Kasich strays from pragmatic to sanctimonious. He famously told one conservative critic, "When you die and get to the meeting with St. Peter, he's probably not going to ask you much about what you did about keeping government small. But he is going to ask you what you did for the poor." There have been respectable arguments on both sides of the Medicaid expansion issue. So my advice: When you're running in the Republican primary, it's best not to talk like Nancy Pelosi.

News in brief

Presidents of China and Taiwan to meet for first time since sides split in 1949 amid civil war

BEIJING (AP) — The presidents of China and Taiwan will meet this weekend for the first time since civil war divided their lands 66 years ago, their governments said Wednesday, a highly symbolic move that reflects quickly improving relations between the formerly bitter Cold War foes.

The meeting Saturday in Singapore between Chinese President Xi Jinping and his Taiwanese counterpart, Ma Ying-jeou, could be China's last chance to press its case for closer economic and political ties before Taiwan elections in January that may put the brakes on Ma's pro-China initiatives.

Ma's ruling Nationalists have been lagging in polls for the presidential and legislative elections. Saturday's meeting could boost their credentials for driving progress in relations with China, but also carries the risk of appearing too close to Beijing, further damaging their chances with voters wary of the mainland's government.

Presidents of the two sides have not met since Chiang Kai-shek's Nationalists lost the Chinese civil war to Mao Zedong's Communists and the Nationalists rebased in Tai-

wan, 160 kilometers (100 miles) from the mainland, in 1949. The two sides have been separately ruled since then, with Taiwan evolving into a freewheeling democracy. Communist Party-ruled China insists that the two sides eventually reunite, by force if necessary.

Confirmation of the meeting from Chinese Cabinet's Taiwan Affairs Office came hours after the Taiwanese side announced the meeting earlier Wednesday.

Taiwan defined by conflicted identity, diplomatic isolation, complicating weekend China talks

BEIJING (AP) — It has no membership in the United Nations. In the Olympics, it competes as "Chinese Taipei." Most nations don't recognize it as a country.

The economically dynamic, self-governing island of Taiwan has struggled with diplomatic isolation and a conflicted identity that makes it not quite a sovereign nation — although many Taiwanese insist it is.

It has de facto independence from mainland China, but has never formalized that, so it technically still vies with the mainland to be the "real China."

Taiwan retains its official name "Republic of China," along with

a constitution that defines its territory as encompassing all of mainland China. But as far as Communist China is concerned, Taiwan is part of its territory, and it insists that the two sides eventually reunite.

Among Taiwan's 23.5 million people, sentiment for unification with China is declining. Surveys show significant majorities favor simply maintaining the status quo of de facto independence.

1st 30 refugees to be relocated from Greece head to Luxembourg

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — The first 30 refugees to be relocated from Greece have boarded a plane in Athens bound for Luxembourg.

The six families from Syria and Iraq who left Greece on Wednesday mark the start of a program seeking to relocate refugees who have arrived in Greece from nearby Turkey to other European Union countries without them having to make the arduous and often dangerous overland journey across the Balkans on foot.

More than 600,000 refugees and migrants have arrived in Greece so far this year, most of them in the last few months.

Mayor says fight not over after Houston LGBT nondiscrimination ordinance defeated

HOUSTON (AP) — Amid the defeat by voters of an ordinance that would have established nondiscrimination protections for gay and transgender people in Houston, Mayor Annise Parker rallied supporters of the measure, telling them the fight was not over.

The Houston Equal Rights Ordinance was soundly rejected Tuesday by a vote of 61 percent to 39 percent. The defeat came after a nearly 18-month battle in the nation's fourth-largest city that spawned rallies, legal fights and accusations of both religious intolerance and demonization of the lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender community.

But Parker, who is gay and championed the ordinance, led a crowd of more than 100 people at an election night watch party in downtown Houston in a chant that referenced the ordinance's nickname, HERO, yelling, "A hero fights for justice."

"I guarantee that justice in Houston will prevail. This ordinance, you have not seen the last of. We're united."

After a long season full of ups and downs, the Lady Steers are now officially in offseason mode after losing in straight sets to Amarillo Bushland Tuesday night at Frenship Gym.

FIRST SET
Big Spring opened the set with a 4-2 lead thanks in part to double hits by the Lady Falcons. After an Addie Jimenez kill, Bushland woke up and began mounting an offense of their own. Bushland scored five straight, then four straight, and in a matter of minutes the score was 17-6. Bushland won the first set 25-8.

The lopsidedness was due in part to mental miscues by Big Spring, but Bushland earned the victory. The Lady Falcons had 11 kills during the first set to Big Spring's two.

Bushland showed that not only did they have a clear height advantage on the front line, but also a power advantage.

Down 6-9, Wash hammered home two kills past the tall Bushland block. Unfortunately, Bushland went on a 5-0 run and stretched their lead back out to 14-8.

Wash then got her team back in the game, thanks to four straight kills, a season high for any Lady Steer. The Lady Steers clawed their way to a 14-15 deficit, but could not keep up with the dynamic front line of Bushland.

Bushland tallied five more kills on their way to a 25-15 second set victory. The Lady Falcons finished with 12 kills in the second set, giving them 23 total kills to Big Spring's 23 total points after two sets.

Randle was the choice to replace DeMarco Murray after last year's NFL rushing champion picked Philadelphia in free agency. The third-year back was spotty at best, and suddenly was out last week because

of personal issues. The Cowboys said they were cutting him so he could focus on the unspecified problems.

Dallas (2-5) is on the second quarterback trying to fill in for Romo in Matt Cassel. The team is on its second starter trying to replace Murray in Darren McFadden, who signed as a free agent a

departure. And the Cowboys are still looking for the first win since Romo broke his left collarbone in Week 2 against the Eagles (3-4), the opponent Sunday night at home.

Some plays are so well-known that when the opportunity to use one of them arises, there is a tendency to make the play automatically, without pause for thought. This is a somewhat dangerous practice, since what is right on most occasions might easily be wrong on a particular deal.
Take this case where West led the king of hearts against three notrump. Recognizing the chance for a "Bath Coup," declarer allowed West's king to hold the trick, hoping West would continue with a heart into the A-J. Unfortunately, this was a case where the cure proved worse than the disease.
Warned against a heart continuation by partner's discouraging deuce, West switched to the spade queen. South ducked, but when West continued with the jack, covered by East with the king, declarer was well on his way to irreversible defeat. If he ducked the king, East would return a heart through the A-J, while if he won the trick, the defenders would finish with three spades, a heart and the diamond king for down one.
South should have realized that ducking the heart king was wrong for two reasons. First, West was very likely to shift to a spade; second, South was in a position to guarantee a minimum of nine tricks if he took the first trick with the ace. He would then cross to dummy with a club and lead the diamond queen.
If East had the king and did not cover, the finesse could be repeated to yield at least three diamond tricks. And if the finesse lost to West, declarer would have nine ironclad tricks consisting of three diamonds, four clubs and the two major-suit aces.
All of which goes to prove that a little knowledge can sometimes be a dangerous thing.

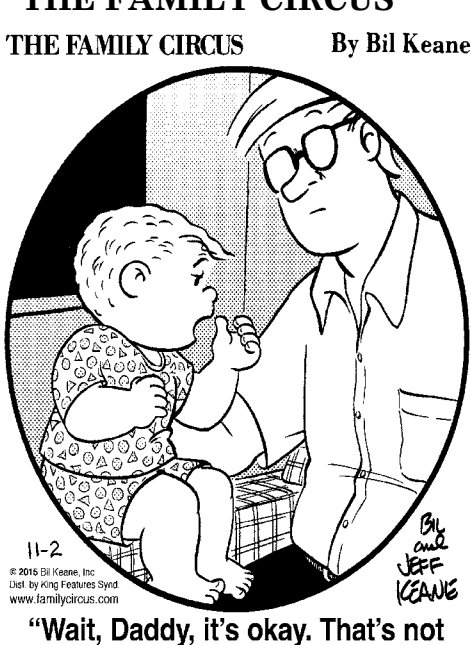

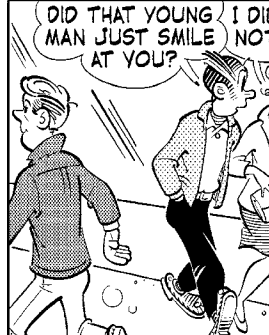

This Date In History

Today is Monday, Nov. 2, the 306th day of 2015. There are 59 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Nov. 2, 1865, the 29th president of the United States, Warren Gamaliel Harding, was born near Marion, Ohio.

On this date:

In 1795, the 11th president of the United States, James Knox Polk, was born in Mecklenburg County, North Carolina.

In 1889, North Dakota and South Dakota became the 39th and 40th states with the signing of proclamations by President Benjamin Harrison.

In 1914, during World War I, Russia declared war on the Ottoman Empire.

In 1936, the British Broadcasting Corp. inaugurated "high-definition" television service from Alexandra Palace in London.

In 1947, Howard Hughes piloted his huge wooden flying boat, the Hughes H-4 Hercules (derisively dubbed the "Spruce Goose" by detractors), on its only flight, which lasted about a minute over Long Beach Harbor in California.

In 1948, President Harry S. Truman surprised the experts by winning a narrow upset over Republican challenger Thomas E. Dewey.

In 1950, playwright George Bernard Shaw, 94, died in Ayot St. Lawrence, Hertfordshire, England.

In 1963, South Vietnamese President Ngo Dinh Diem (noh ding ZEE'-em) was assassinated in a military coup.

In 1979, black militant JoAnne Chesimard escaped from a New Jersey prison, where she'd been serving a life sentence for the 1973 slaying of New Jersey state trooper Werner Foerster. (Chesimard, who took the name Assata Shakur, is believed to be living in Cuba.)

In 1984, Velma Barfield, convicted of fatally poisoning boyfriend Stuart Taylor, was put to death by injection in Raleigh, North Carolina, becoming the first woman executed in the United States since 1962.

In 1994, a jury in Pensacola, Florida, convicted Paul Hill of murder for the shotgun slayings of abortion provider Dr. John Britton and Britton's bodyguard; Hill was executed in September 2003.

In 2000, an American astronaut and two Russian cosmonauts became the first residents of the international space station, christening it Alpha.

Ten years ago: The Bush administration released details of its potential flu pandemic strategy, saying a pandemic that hit the United States would force cities to ration scarce drugs and vaccine and house the sick in hotels or schools if hospitals were to overflow. A Detroit church packed with 4,000 mourners celebrated the life of Rosa Parks in an impassioned, song-filled funeral.

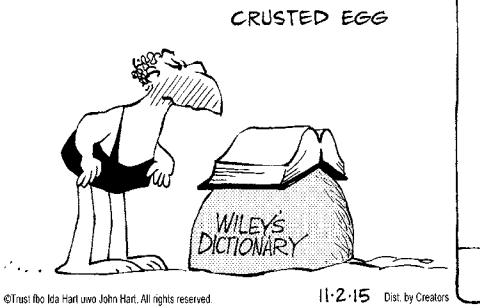

Today is Tuesday, Nov. 3, the 307th day of 2015. There are 58 days left in the year. This is Election Day.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Nov. 3, 1900, the first major U.S. automobile show opened at New York's Madison Square Garden under the auspices of the Automobile Club of America.

On this date:

In 1839, the first Opium War broke out.

In 1903, Panama proclaimed its independence from Colombia.

In 1911, the Chevrolet Motor Car Co. was founded in Detroit by Louis Chevrolet and William C. Durant. (The company was acquired by General Motors in 1918.)

In 1936, President Franklin D. Roosevelt won a landslide election victory over Republican challenger Alfred M. "Alf" Landon.

In 1954, the Japanese monster movie "Godzilla" was released by Toho Co.

In 1957, the Soviet Union launched Sputnik 2, the second manmade satellite, into orbit; on board was a dog named

Laika (LY'-kah) who was sacrificed in the experiment.

In 1960, the Meredith Willson musical "The Unsinkable Molly Brown" opened on Broadway with Tammy Grimes in the title role.

In 1964, President Lyndon B. Johnson soundly defeated Republican Barry Goldwater to win a White House term in his own right.

In 1970, Salvador Allende (ah-YEN'-day) was inaugurated as president of Chile.

In 1979, five Communist Workers Party members were killed in a clash with heavily armed Ku Klux Klansmen and neo-Nazis during an anti-Klan protest in Greensboro, North Carolina.

In 1986, the Iran-Contra affair began to come to light as Ash-Shiraa, a pro-Syrian Lebanese magazine, first broke the story of U.S. arms sales to Iran.

In 1994, Susan Smith of Union, South Carolina, was arrested for drowning her two young sons, Michael and Alex, nine days after claiming the children had been abducted by a black jacker.

Ten years ago: Vice President Dick Cheney's former chief of staff, I. Lewis "Scooter" Libby, pleaded not guilty to a five-count felony indictment in the CIA leak case. (Libby was later convicted, but had his 30-month prison sentence commuted by President George W. Bush.)

Merck and Co. won its first court battle over its Vioxx pain-killer when a New Jersey state jury found the drugmaker had properly warned consumers about the risks of the medication.

Five years ago: President Barack Obama acknowledged that Democrats had taken "a shellacking" in midterm elections. The Federal Reserve announced a plan to buy \$600 billion in Treasury bonds over the next eight months in an attempt to boost lending and stimulate the economy. Former Russian Prime Minister Viktor Chernomyrdin died in Moscow at age 72.

This Date In History

Today is Wednesday, Nov. 4, the 308th day of 2015. There are 57 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Nov. 4, 1955, Baseball Hall of Fame pitcher Cy Young died in Newcomerstown, Ohio, at age 88.

On this date:

In 1884, Democrat Grover Cleveland was elected to his first term as president, defeating Republican James G. Blaine.

In 1922, the entrance to King Tutankhamen's tomb was discovered in Egypt.

In 1924, President Calvin Coolidge, who'd succeeded the late President Warren G. Harding, was elected to a full term of office; Nellie T. Ross of Wyoming was elected the nation's first female governor to serve out the remaining term of her late husband, William B. Ross.

In 1939, the United States modified its neutrality stance in World War II, allowing "cash and carry" purchases of arms by belligerents, a policy favoring Britain and France.

In 1942, during World War II, Axis forces retreated from El Alamein in North Africa in a major victory for British forces commanded by Lt. Gen. Bernard Montgomery.

In 1952, Republican Dwight D. Eisenhower was elected president, defeating Democrat Adlai Stevenson. The highly secretive National Security Agency came into existence.

In 1964, comedian Lenny Bruce was convicted by a three-judge panel in New York of obscenity charges stemming from his performances at the Cafe Au Go Go in Greenwich Village. (Bruce received a posthumous pardon in 2003 from New York Gov. George Pataki.)

In 1979, the Iran hostage crisis began as militants stormed the United States Embassy in Tehran, seizing its occupants; for some of them, it was the start of 444 days of captivity.

In 1980, Republican Ronald Reagan won the White House as he defeated President Jimmy Carter by a strong margin.

In 1991, Ronald Reagan opened his presidential library in Simi Valley, California; in attendance were President George H.W. Bush and former Presidents Jimmy Carter, Gerald R. Ford and Richard Nixon. At the first-ever gathering of five past and present U.S. chief executives.

In 1995, Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin was assassinated by a right-wing Israeli minutes after attending a festive peace rally. Retired professor Morris Schwartz of "Tuesdays with Morrie" fame died in Newton, Massachusetts, at age 78.

In 2008, Democrat Barack Obama was elected the first black president of the United States, defeating Republican John McCain.

Ten years ago: Violent anti-U.S. protests broke out in Mar Del Plata, Argentina, where President George W. Bush was promoting free trade at the Summit of the Americas. Jewish Defense League activist Earl Krugel, imprisoned for his role in a bomb plot, died after being assaulted in a federal prison in Phoenix; he was 62.

Today is Thursday, Nov. 5, the 309th day of 2015. There are 56 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Nov. 5, 1940, President Franklin D. Roosevelt won an unprecedented third term in office as he defeated Republican challenger Wendell L. Willkie.

On this date:

In 1605, the "Gunpowder Plot" failed as Guy Fawkes was seized before he could blow up the English Parliament.

In 1781, the Continental Congress elected John Hanson of Maryland its chairman, giving him the title of "President of the United States in Congress Assembled."

In 1872, suffragist Susan B. Anthony defied the law by attempting to cast a vote for President Ulysses S. Grant. (Anthony was convicted by a judge and fined \$100, but she never paid the penalty.)

In 1912, Democrat Woodrow Wilson was elected president, defeating Progressive Party candidate Theodore Roosevelt, incumbent Republican William Howard Taft and Socialist Eugene V. Debs.

In 1935, Parker Brothers

began marketing the board game "Monopoly."

In 1942, American showman George M. Cohan died in New York at age 64.

In 1968, Republican Richard M. Nixon won the presidency, defeating Democratic Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey and American Independent candidate George C. Wallace.

In 1974, Democrat Ella T. Grasso was elected governor of Connecticut, becoming the first woman to win a gubernatorial office without succeeding her husband.

In 1985, Spencer W. Kimball, president of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, died at age 90; he was succeeded by Ezra Taft Benson.

In 1990, Rabbi Meir Kahane (meh-EER' kah-HAH-nuh), the Brooklyn-born Israeli extremist, was shot to death at a New York hotel. (Egyptian native El Sayyed Nosair (el sah-EED' no-sah-EER') was convicted of the slaying in federal court.)

In 1994, former President Ronald Reagan disclosed he had Alzheimer's disease.

In 2009, a shooting rampage at the Fort Hood Army post in Texas left 13 people dead; Maj. Nidal Hasan, an Army psychiatrist, was later convicted of murder and sentenced to death.

Ten years ago: Leaders from

across the Americas ended their two-day summit in Argentina without agreeing on whether to restart talks on a free trade zone stretching from Alaska to Chile. Pirates attacked a cruise ship off the coast of Somalia, but the ship changed course and sped away to escape. British author John Fowles died in Lyme Regis, Dorset, England, at age 79. Guitar master Link Wray died in Copenhagen at age 76.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Nov. 6, 1860, former Illinois congressman Abraham Lincoln defeated three other candidates for the presidency: John Breckinridge, John Bell and Stephen Douglas.

On this date:

In 1632, King Gustavus Adolphus of Sweden was killed in battle.

In 1854, America's "March King," John Philip Sousa, was born in Washington, D.C.

In 1861, Confederate President Jefferson Davis was elected to a six-year term of office.

In 1928, in a first, the results of Republican Herbert Hoover's presidential election victory over Democrat Alfred E. Smith were flashed onto an electric wraparound sign on the New York Times building.

In 1934, Nebraska voters approved dissolving their two-chamber legislature in favor of a nonpartisan, single (or "unicameral") legislative body, which was implemented in 1937.

In 1944, British official Lord

Moyne was assassinated in Cairo, Egypt, by members of the Zionist Stern gang.

In 1956, President Dwight D. Eisenhower won re-election, defeating Democrat Adlai E. Stevenson.

In 1962, Democrat Edward M. Kennedy was elected Senator from Massachusetts.

In 1977, 39 people were killed when the Kelly Barnes Dam burst, sending a wall of water through Toccoa Falls College in Georgia.

In 1984, President Ronald Reagan won re-election by a landslide over former Vice President Walter Mondale, the Democratic challenger.

In 1990, about one-fifth of the Universal Studios backlot in southern California was destroyed in an arson fire.

In 2012, President Barack Obama was elected to a second term of office, defeating Republican challenger Mitt Romney.

Ten years ago: An overnight tornado killed 25 people in southwestern Indiana. In a clear jab at Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez (OO'-goh CHAH'-vez), President George W. Bush, in Brazil, called on Latin Americans to boldly defend strong democratic institutions. French President Jacques Chirac (zhahk shih-RAHK) promised arrests, trials and punishment in the wake of urban unrest

that had spread to central Paris.

Five years ago: President Barack Obama opened his 10-day Asia trip on a somber note in Mumbai, India, where he memorialized victims of devastating terror attacks two years earlier, declaring, "We'll never forget." A Yemeni judge ordered police to find Anwar al-Awlaki, a radical U.S.-born cleric, "dead or alive" after the al-Qaida-linked preacher failed to appear at his trial for his role in the killing of foreigners. (Al-Awlaki was killed in a U.S. drone strike in the mountains of Yemen on Sept. 30, 2011.)

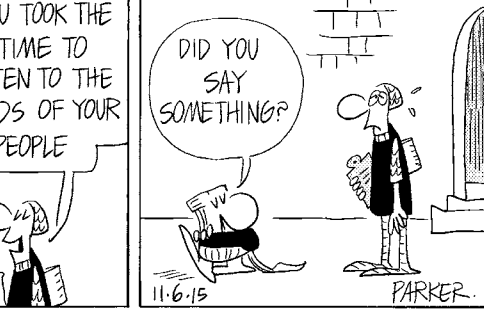

Lowry, Raptors start 4-0 for 1st time, beating Mavs 102-91

DALLAS (AP) — Kyle Lowry wasn't sure what kind of start Toronto would have with plenty of new faces. How about the best one in franchise history. Lowry scored 27 points, and the Raptors spoiled the home opener in Dallas, beating the Mavericks 102-91 on

Tuesday night and opening the season 4-0 for the first time. "I think it was the start that we needed," said Lowry, a former Dallas rival in Houston and now in his fourth season with Toronto. "Either we could have a real good start, or a tough start with pretty

much 10 new guys. But I think we've done a good job of just staying focused with our principles." The Raptors took the lead for good on a 12-0 run that started in the middle of the fourth quarter. Jonas Valanciunas had six of his 16 points during the decisive stretch.

The Mavericks went almost 4 minutes without a basket after Dirk Nowitzki hit a 3-pointer for an 86-82 lead. Nowitzki finished with 18 points. DeMar DeRozan scored 20 points, and Luis Scola had 19 points and 12 rebounds for the Raptors, who opened with three straight wins twice in their first 20 seasons.

Lowry had a game-high 10 assists, and Toronto held Dallas to 6-of-22 shooting in the fourth quarter and 38 percent for the game. It's the second time the Raptors have held their opponent under 40 percent. "They made it more their type of game, physical, grinding and a lot of physical contact," Dallas coach Rick Carlisle said. "They turned it into a boxing match, and we needed it to be a

basketball game." Dallas forward Dwight Powell, a Toronto native, had his first career double-double with 10 points, all in the first half, and 10 rebounds. Valanciunas started the decisive run with a layup on an assist from Lowry and finished it with a tip-in and a pair

a month before Murray went to the Eagles. Randle, who was never charged in the domestic case but could still face discipline from the NFL, started the first six games but only once came close to a 100-yard outing. This after his offseason comment that he thought Murray left "meat on the bone" while running for a franchise-record 1,845 yards.

After injuring his back against the New York Giants two weeks ago, Randle lost the starting job when McFadden rushed for 152 yards in that game. He left the team's facility early last week for what coach Jason Garrett said was an excused absence.

Randle remained away from the team through last weekend's loss to Seattle.

"I think right now, football needs to be on the back burner for Joe and he needs to get his hands around some things," executive vice president of personnel Stephen Jones said. "At the same time, we're looking at our team and what's best for our team and that's where it came down."

Stephen Jones said the team didn't regret letting Murray go in free agency.

"That ship's sailed,"

he said. "We'd make that decision over, same decision, we'd make it again. We have to develop, structure a football team with the salary cap. You can't pay a top receiver, a top quarterback, a top pass rusher, a top left tackle. You've got to make hard decisions."

The Cowboys started the season with defensive end Greg Hardy and linebacker Rolando McClain on four-game suspensions. Then rookie pass rusher Randy Gregory sprained an ankle in the opener after a promising training camp.

All those defenders are back, Bryant came through his first outing with his foot in good shape and Cassel will get another start after throwing three interceptions in his first game and finishing with just 97 yards passing in the second.

Cassel was acquired in a trade with Buffalo after Romo's injury, and was promoted after Brandon Weeden lost his first three starts.

"I see some holes that got filled. I see some holes that some have left behind," Jerry Jones when asked to assess his roster without his two biggest offensive stars. "Hopefully we can get all these potholes, if you want to call them that, patched up and have them all out there together real soon."

Mavericks: Carlisle is 7-7 in home openers, including 4-4 with Dal-

las. The Mavericks had a four-game winning streak in home openers snapped. ... Williams' 3-pointer in the second quarter gave him 1,000 for his career.
