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## Man and Woman of 2015 Year applications deadline nears

The time to nominate someone for the Man and Woman of year is coming to a close.

Only a few weeks are left to enter a nomination for the prestigious award given during the annual Big Spring Area Chamber of Commerce banquet. The deadline to enter is Dec. 1.

"This is the community's chance to honor people who make a difference in our community everyday but who don't always get or want the credit they deserve," said Debbye ValVerde, Chamber of Commerce executive director. "We all know people who do great things in our community, not because they expect or want to be rewarded. This honor gives us a chance to say we notice and we appreciate your time, effort, and love for our community."

The criteria for selection is as follows

- The nominator must be a Chamber member, but the nominee does not have to be.
- Nominations must be in writing and should be based on a record of accomplishments rather than a single contribution or an achievement, although, ValVerde said, it will not be ruled out if that contribution is of sufficient importance. The committee will base its choice on information provided in the written nomination and not on personal knowledge of the nominee.

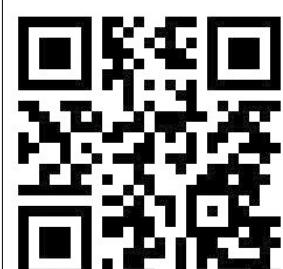

# Health Insurance

Most Americans enrolling on Healthcare.gov will receive financial support

"Open enrollment" — the annual three-month period during which Americans can comparison shop and purchase health-care coverage on the government's Health Insurance Marketplace — is in full swing.

According to the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services (HHS), between 11 and 14 million consumers will purchase 2016 coverage through the Marketplace, and most will qualify for financial assistance.

HHS relays that 7 out of 10 returning customers will be able to buy a health plan and pay less than \$75 for monthly premiums — which is the monthly fee charged for coverage; eight of 10 will pay less than \$100. Those figures are tied to estimates that 80 percent of individuals re-enrolling will qualify for advanced tax credits based on their projected annual income. Newcomers to the Marketplace are expected to fall in the same income brackets and receive similar help.

"If you're eligible for a tax credit, the government will send money directly to your insurance company to help pay the premium," says SMMC Marketing manager Amanda Duforat.

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# One killed in vehicle accident in Runnels County Sunday

A 17-year-old Winters boy was killed in a one vehicle accident in Runnels County early Sunday morning.

According to a Department of Public Safety release, James Scott Lange was pronounced dead at the scene of the crash located on U.S. Highway 83 in the city of Winters.

DPS said a 2006 Ford F350 Pick Up was traveling northbound on US 83 where it drifted off the roadway to the east. The driver, Cameron Doyle Cooper, 18, of Winters, over corrected to the left causing the vehicle to enter a side skid and continue into the west side barrow ditch. Vehicle struck a cement post and a tree.

Cooper was taken to North Runnels Hospital in Winters with stable/non-incapacitating. Cooper was wearing a seatbelt but Lange was not, according to DPS. The road condition was reported clear/cloud and dry.

The crash is still under investigation.

The purpose of the Health Insurance Marketplace is to offer all U.S. citizens access to affordable health plans that offer comprehensive benefits.

To help make health insurance affordable, the government uses household income to determine who is eligible for financial assistance. This assistance might include advanced tax credits to help pay for premiums, or discounts on co-pays and deductibles — which are additional costs related to specific healthcare purchases.

Some of the mandatory benefits included in all Marketplace plans include doctor visits, prescription drugs, hospital and emergency department care, lab services, pediatric care, and free preventive and wellness services. Coverage cannot be denied for individuals with a pre-existing health condition.

"If you are eligible for health insurance but do not purchase coverage, not only will you pay a penalty when filing your tax return, but you will also lose out on financial help with your healthcare expenses throughout the year," says Duforat. "Our assisters can help you shop the Marketplace to find a plan that meets your needs."

"So, for example, instead of paying the full \$350 monthly cost, you might pay \$50 or \$75 a month."

Penalties for not having health insurance increase significantly in 2016 and will be assessed when 2016 federal tax returns are filed. Fines are \$695 per adult, \$347.50 per child, and up to \$2,085 per family or 2.5% of family income — whichever is higher.

The penalties are expected to drive many newcomers to the Marketplace, as most individuals must choose between paying a premium and paying a fine.

"Individuals who don't have insurance or who need to re-enroll have nothing to lose and everything to gain by evaluating their options," says Duforat. "You may discover you qualify for Medicaid, tax credits, or another type of discount. The goal is to find a plan that best matches your specific health needs and finances."

Scenic Mountain Medical Center is offering community residents free help with evaluating insurance options and enrolling on the Marketplace. Appointments can be made with certified assisters by call-

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### Howard College sweeps competition over weekend

The Howard College men's basketball team extended their winning streak to five and improved to 6-1 this season after a successful weekend of games.

Howard College rolled past Our Lady of the Lake 132-43 Friday night in the first of two games at the Howard College Classic. The Hawks outplayed their opponent in almost every facet of the game.

The Hawks shot 57.3 percent from

the field and a staggering 46.7 percent from beyond the arc, sinking 21 shots from long range. Howard College averaged an impressive 1.65 points per possession.

The defense held Our Lady of the Lake to 27.3 shooting percentage from the field and did not allow them to shoot from the free throw line during the second half. Howard College had a good shooting night from the charity stripe, sinking 17-of-20 free throws.

Guard Reggie Oliver was the game's leading scorer with 29 points, and he added a team-high four steals. For-

ward 32 assists, with guard Michael Dawn leading the way with seven. Guard Shawn Jones also had six assists on the night.

On Saturday, Howard College took on On Point Hoops Academy, a prep school.

"We were a little bit worried going into this one because they played New Mexico Military in a close 6 point game," head coach Scott Raines said.

The first ten minutes of the game were close as both teams communicated well on defense, limiting their opponents to mostly perimeter shots with the use of a 2-3 zone.

Around the halfway point of the first half was when Howard College began to put some distance between them and On Point Hoops Academy. Shots began to fall for the Hawks, and they began to get good ball movement inside and out to beat the zone.

On the other side of the ball, the Hawks continued to limit their opponent to mostly perimeter shots. Howard College went on a 23-6 run in the final 13:20 of the first half.

"Our guards didn't give them any space and that wore on them as the game went on," Raines said.

The Hawks led at halftime 33-14.

The second half was simply 33-14 of the same, as Howard College continued to move the ball well against the zone. By six minutes in, it was clear that they had the game wrapped up.

Howard College won this game and their previous one on both ends of

the court, but what impressed coach Raines was their defensive communication.

"Shawn Jones and Winston Morgan were great defensively all weekend. We had a three or four guys doing a great job communicating on that end of the court. We'd like to have all 11 being that vocal, but when those few guys are in the game in makes a big difference," Raines said.

Morgan finished with a team-high of 18 points and was a vocal defensive leader for a young team still growing.

"It's [being vocal] a big impact. I try to keep my guys in line and playing hard on defense," Morgan said. "Anything I can do to help the team whether that's playing defense or shooting threes I'm going to try as hard as I can."

One name that doesn't jump out of the tallied was guard Shaq Preston. He tallied nine points, five boards, and five assists, but he also brought a ton of energy to the court as he constantly harassed ball carriers.

"We're just always trying to challenge him [Shaq] to play with high energy and not play down to the level of his opponent. He had some bright spots today," Raines said.

The Hawks will travel to Ranger College this Wednesday for their next matchup.

In the Sunday finale, Howard College managed to

hold the lead going into the fourth in what was a back and forth game. Unfortunately, they fell just short, losing 58-56 against Independence College. Howard College struggled to get points in the final quarter, posting a game-low 11 fourth quarter points.

The Lady Hawks defense struggled again, allowing Independence a 50 percent shooting percentage from both the field and beyond the arc.

The Lady Hawks will look to stop their two-game skid as they travel to Ranger College this Wednesday.

### Winston rallies Buccaneers over struggling Cowboys

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — When Lovie Smith was asked a third time about the Jameis Winston fumble that wasn't, the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' coach declared it time to

move on. The Bucs beat the Dallas Cowboys 10-6 on Sunday, benefiting from a defensive holding penalty that nullified a goal-line fumble that could

have cost them the victory.

Winston scored on a 1-yard keeper on the next play, giving the Bucs (4-5) their third win in five games and extending the Cowboys' longest losing streak in 26 years to seven games.

"I'm answering a lot of questions on that fumble. What fumble? ... There was a penalty called on that play, so why are we talking about that?" Smith said.

"You know what we should talk about? How about that last run of Jameis Winston to get it in the end zone to win it," the coach added. "That's what we should be talk-

ing about." The No. 1 overall draft pick also shrugged off two interceptions — the first he'd thrown in a month — to lead the second game-winning drive of his career.

The Cowboys (2-7) have lost seven in a row without injured quarterback Tony Romo, the team's longest skid since 1989. Five of those losses have been by a touchdown or less.

"Very disappointing. We had high expectations to say the very least this year," Cowboys owner Jerry Jones said.

"Ultimately, you have to do what's necessary to win the game," Dallas coach Jason Garrett said. "You have to make the stops and make the plays. We all know that."

Romo is eligible to return from a broken left collarbone next week at Miami. The question is whether it's too late to salvage the season.

"I haven't looked at what would have to happen for us

to win the division, which looks like the logical way to look at it," Jones said.

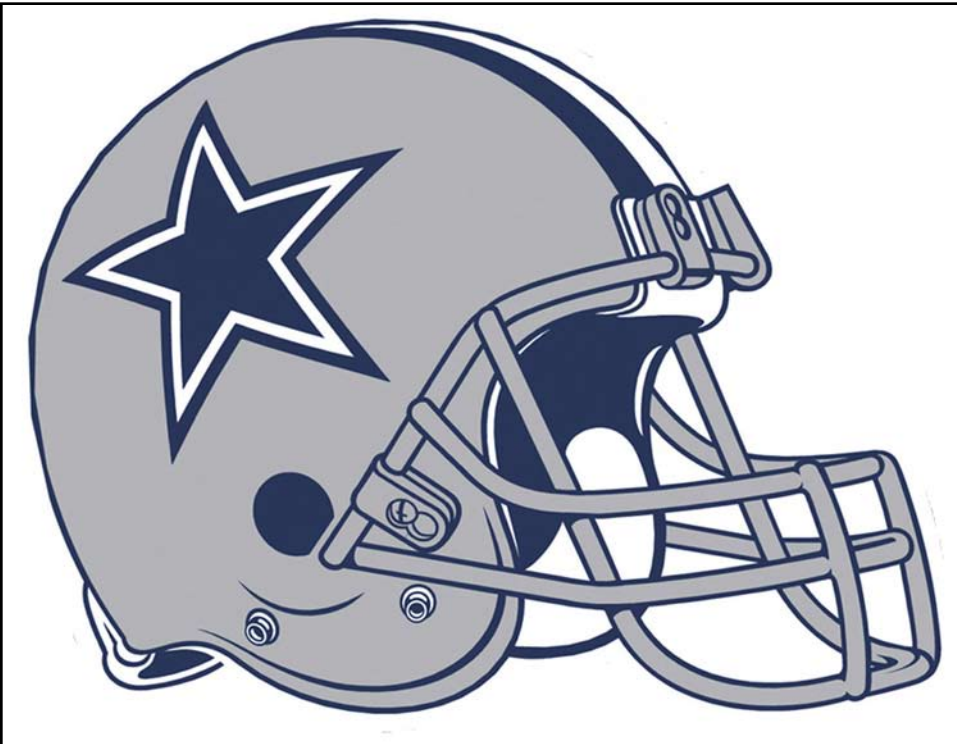
Tampa Bay has doubled its victory total from last season, when the Bucs went 2-14 and earned the opportunity to select Winston, the 2013 Heisman Trophy winner.

"We're not the same old Bucs. We are trending this direction," Smith said, motioning upward. "I'm just anxious to see what we can do the second half of the season."

Winston completed 22 of 39 passes for 264 yards, including a 17-yard throw to Brandon Myers to help get the Bucs into position to win the game. On third down from the 5, the 6-foot-4, 230-pound rookie scrambled through an opening in the middle and dove for the end zone, losing the ball before crossing the goal line.

But safety Jeff Heath, who had two interceptions

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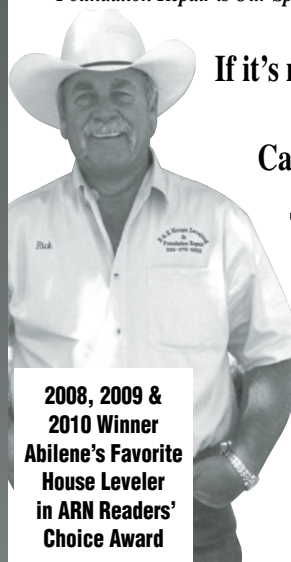
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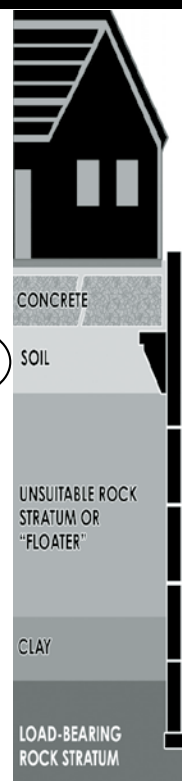

This deal occurred during the 1970 world championship match between Italy and the U.S. At the first table, with a U.S. pair North-South, West led the five of hearts against three notrump. Declarer won East's jack with the queen, played a club to dummy's ace and led the three of spades to his queen. West won with the king and returned the king of hearts to declarer's ace.

When South next cashed the king of clubs, he got a rude shock when East discarded the eight of diamonds. The contract was now in serious danger, since South's apparently sure nine tricks had suddenly dwindled to seven.

South did not panic, however, and made the contract anyway. He cashed the Q-J of clubs, led a spade to dummy's ten and, after the finesse succeeded, cashed the ace of spades. When the opposing spades split evenly, he was home free.

At the second table, the Italian North-South pair also got to three notrump, and again a heart was led. Declarer won with the queen, played a club to the ace and, just like his counterpart, led a low spade to the queen, losing to the king.

But at this point, West, Bob Hamman, returned the eight of spades! He knew that the clubs were divided 5-1, something South did not yet know. Not surprisingly, declarer put up dummy's ace. From his viewpoint, he had nine almost certain tricks and could not afford to finesse the ten of spades, risking disaster if the finesse lost and the opponents switched to diamonds.

Once the ace was played, South had no chance, and he finished down two, giving the U.S. an 11-IMP gain on the deal.

Things to know about the Cowboys and Bucs:  
**LAST CHANCE:** The Cowboys drove to the Tampa Bay 44 after falling behind in the final minute. But

Matt Cassel's throw to the end zone intended for Dez Bryant was intercepted by Bradley McDougald after the Bucs safety gave the receiver a slight push in the back. Bryant argued for a pass interference penalty, but later said he should have done more to try to make the catch. "I'm not going to sit here and make a ton of excuses. I know the standard that I have for myself," Bryant said.

**WINSTON'S STREAK:** After throwing four interceptions and losing a fumble during a loss to Carolina on Oct. 4, Winston went four games without a turnover. Heath's first interception ended a stretch of 134 consecutive pass attempts without a pick.

**DALLAS SKID:** The Cowboys' losing streak is their longest since they also dropped seven straight

while going 1-15 under Jimmy Johnson in 1989. Matt Cassel is 0-4 and Brandon Weeden 0-3 filling for Romo.

**BIG DAY:** Tampa Bay's Mike Evans had eight receptions for 126 yards. Meanwhile, the Bucs' defense had three sacks, held the Cowboys to 42 yards rushing, and limited Bryant to five receptions for 45 yards.

**INJURIES:** The Cowboys played without LB Sean Lee (concussion) and lost CB Morris Claiborne with a hamstring injury in the first half. Bucs DE George Johnson injured a calf muscle in the first half and did not return.

## Felton helps short-handed Mavericks beat Rockets 110-98

(AP) — Dallas Mavericks veteran point guard Raymond Felton danced his way down the court to his team's bench, wearing an ear-to-ear grin.

Late in the fourth quarter, Felton scored seven straight to give his Dallas a 14-point lead in their 110-98 road victory over the Houston Rockets. Still smiling after the win and his best scoring night in two years, Felton downplayed the celebration.

"That wasn't a dance move, man," Felton said. "It was just a little hop and a skip, that's all it was."

Even Dallas coach Rick Carlisle admitted he was a fan of Felton's celebration.

"He was fired up," Carlisle said. "I thought it was terrific. When you get one of those moments, you've got to enjoy it."

It was a long-awaited breakout game for the former star who has struggled with injuries and finding his role in recent years. Felton's hot shoot-

ing started early on Saturday in a shooting competition during warmups, when he outdueled fellow veteran role player Charlie Villanueva in a 3-point contest.

"I didn't want to hurt his confidence, so I let him win," Villanueva said with a laugh.

Villanueva scored 19 points as the pair stepped up in the absence of a trio of starters in Dirk Nowitzki, Wesley Matthews and Chandler Parsons.

Emotions ran high and plenty of hard fouls were shared between the in-state rivals. They met in the first round of the playoffs in April, where Houston won 4-1.

Elevated by Houston's poor defense and their own hot shooting, the Mavericks scored a season-high 57 first-half points.

James Harden led Houston with 25 points, 10 assists and seven rebounds, and Terrence Jones had 23 points. The Rockets fell to 1-3 this season in games played without

center Dwight Howard, who rested on Saturday night.

The Mavericks took advantage of Howard's absence by dominating the Rockets in paint scoring, 54-40, and out-rebounding the Rockets 46-43.

After a four-game winning streak followed their slow 0-3 start, Houston has now lost three straight again and is on the verge of its first four-game losing streak since the 2012-13 season.

"This is as bad as it can get, I hope," Rockets coach Kevin McHale said. "I can't imagine it getting much worse than that."

Dallas led by as many as 26 in the first half before Houston finally started to hit shots in the third quarter, outscoring the Mavericks 33-25 in that period after trailing 57-34 at halftime. Despite multiple rallies in the second half, Houston never pulled within single digits.

Former Maverick Jason

Terry scored 19 points off the bench for Houston and drew a flagrant foul trying to block Dwight Powell's layup in the third quarter. With an opportunity to cut into the lead late in the game, Terry air-balled a 3-pointer and caught playful trash-talk from his former teammate Nowitzki, who was nearby on the bench.

## TIP-INS

Mavericks: Nowitzki sat out his first game of the season. ... Felton's points were his most since the 2012-13 season.

Rockets: Houston scored a season-low 34 points in the first half. ... The Rockets lost to Dallas at home for the first time since 2013. ... Howard was sidelined on Saturday night for a planned game of rest. Houston was also without PG Patrick Beverley (ankle) and Sam Dekker (back).

## HONORING VICTIMS IN PARIS

There was a pre-game moment of silence in the Toyota

Center for those impacted by the terrorist attacks in Paris. The Rockets waved the French flag on multiple screens. Houston second-year center Clint Capela grew up in Chalon, France, and played high school basketball just outside of Paris.

## ROUGH STUFF

Harden was called for a flagrant foul after driving to the basket and throwing an elbow that caught Felton in the face.

The game ball had to be replaced by a backup in the second half after it was contaminated with an unknown player's blood.

## CLUTCH CITY

The Rockets debuted their sleeved "Clutch City" uniforms featuring font inspired by the franchise's "ketchup-and-mustard" jerseys of the 1980s and their championship years in 1993-94 and 1994-95. The red and yellow uniforms featured white "Clutch City" script on the front.

## Aldridge's double-double lifts Spurs over 76ers

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — The Philadelphia 76ers are winless, but they gave San Antonio a scare just as Spurs coach Gregg Popovich expected.

LaMarcus Aldridge had 17 points and 19 rebounds to help the Spurs hold off a late charge and beat the Philadelphia 76ers 92-83 on Saturday night.

The loss was the 76ers' 10th straight to open their season and 20th overall dating back to last season.

San Antonio has won four straight and is 3-0 at home, but Popovich knew it wouldn't be easy against his friend and former longtime assistant, Philadelphia coach Brett Brown.

"They are going to play from minute one to 48 with the same standard, the same hustle, the same camaraderie," Popovich said. "It's really a tribute to their character and Brett Brown as a coach. He just does a fantastic job."

Philadelphia rookie center Jahlil Okafor

had 21 points and 12 rebounds for his second double-double. Nerlens Noel, returning after a two-game absence due to a sore wrist, was limited to six points and three rebounds.

Tony Parker scored 16 points and Tim Duncan added 15 for San Antonio.

The Spurs led by as many as 19 points, but could never put the 76ers away decisively.

San Antonio was without Kawhi Leonard and Manu Ginobili, but their absence wasn't felt against a young Philadelphia squad until the final minutes.

Okafor scored seven points during a 14-2 run that pulled Philadelphia within 87-83 with three minutes remaining.

"You have to give them credit, they made it hard until the end," Parker said. "That's just Brett Brown's team, they're always in games."

The Spurs forced three straight turnovers following that run to seal the victory, handing the 76ers losses in back-to-

back nights following a 102-85 loss in Oklahoma City on Friday.

"We have to make a few more plays," Okafor said. "We turned the ball over. We know what we did wrong, we're going to watch film and try correct those things when we come into tight situations."

Parker, who was playing with a heavy heart, played only eight minutes in the second half.

San Antonio played France's National Anthem after a moment of silence before tipoff to honor the victims of Friday's terrorist attacks in Paris. Parker and Boris Diaw are both from France.

"It's unbelievable," Parker said. "All my prayers go to the families of the victims. It's tough."

Parker scored 12 points in the first half and finished the game 5-for-10 shooting with three assists and four turnovers.

"It helped me think about something else," Parker said. "For the

past 24 hours, I've just spent my time calling family and friends to make sure they're OK."

## TIP-INS

76ers: Noel, who has a team-high four double-doubles this season, was limited to 2-for-8 shooting. ... Philadelphia had six players out with injury, including C Joel Embiid. The 7-foot Embiid is expected to miss the season following a second surgery on his right foot, but he is listed as right foot injury. ... Philadelphia's last victory against San Antonio came at home on Feb. 11, 2011.

Spurs: Leonard and Ginobili both missed their first game of the season. Leonard, who leads San Antonio in scoring at 21.9 points, had an upper respiratory infection. Ginobili sat out with a strained abductor. ... Second-year player Kyle Anderson made his first start of the season in place of Leonard. Anderson, who started eight games last season, had 10 points and seven rebounds in 30 minutes.

... San Antonio recalled Jonathon Simmons from its Development League affiliate prior to Saturday's game.

## MY IDOL

Okafor was anxious to play against Duncan, who the 6-foot-11 center has said was his favorite player growing up.

"It's a surreal feeling playing against a guy you idolized," Okafor said. "We're in here in the locker room drawing up the game plan and you see who is guarding who and you see Duncan and you see my name saying I'm go-

ing to stick him. It's just a weird feeling."

## ANOTHER MILESTONE

Duncan had five blocked shots to become the franchise leader with 2,955 blocks, surpassing former teammate David Robinson's career total of 2,954.

"It's a skill," Popovich said. "It's great timing. He's got length. He cares. He moves. He has just got unbelievable timing more than anything."

Duncan also moved into fifth all-time in the league. Former Utah center Mark Eaton is fourth with 3,064 blocks.

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
