

The criteria for selection is as follows

 The nominator must be a Chamber member, but the nominee does not have to be.

Nominations must be in writing and should be based on a record of accomplishments rather than a single contribution or an achievement, although, ValVerde said, it will not be ruled out if that contribution is of sufficient importance. The committee will base its choice on information provided in the written nomination and not on personal knowledge of the nominee.

Health insurance

Most Americans enrolling on Healthcare. gov will receive financial support

"Open enrollment" — the annual threemonth period during which Americans can comparison shop and purchase healthcare coverage on the government's Health

Insurance Marketplace — is in full swing.
According to the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services (HHS), between 11 and 14 million consumers will purchase 2016 covthrough erage

Marketplace, and most will qualify for financial assistance.

HHS relays that 7 out of 10 returning customers will be able to buy a health plan and pay less than \$75 for monthly premiums - which is the monthly fee charged

for coverage; eight of 10 will pay less than \$100. Those figures are tied to estimates that 80 percent of individuals re-enrolling will qualify for advanced tax credits based on their projected annual income. Newcomers to the Marketplace are expected to fall in the same income brackets and receive similar help.

"If you're eligible for a tax credit, the government will send money directly to your insurance company to help pay the premium," says SMMC Marketing manager Amanda Duforat.

Howard College sweeps competition over weekend

The Howard College men's basketball team extended their winning streak to five and improved to 6-1 this season after a successful weekend of games.

Howard College rolled past Our Lady of the Lake 132-43 Friday night in the first of two games at the Howard College Classic. The Hawks outplayed their opponent in almost every facet of the game.

The Hawks shot 57.3 percent from

the field and a staggering 46.7 percent from beyond the arc, sinking 21 shots from long range. Howard College averaged an impressive 1.65 points per possession.

The defense held Our Lady of the Lake to 27.3 shooting percentage from the field and did not allow them to shoot from the free throw line during the second half. Howard College had a good shooting night from the charity stripe, sinking 17-of-20 free throws.

Guard Reggie Oliver was the game's leading scorer with 29 points, and he added a team-high four steals. For-

ward Jakub Nizoil fell a rebound shy of a doubledouble. He also added 16 points, shooting 70 percent the from field.

Six different Hawks finished with double digits thanks great ball movement. The toteam

taled 32 assists, with guard Michael Dawn leading the way with seven. Guard Shawn Jones also had six assists on the night.

On Saturday, Howard College took on On Point Hoops Academy, a prep school.

"We were a little bit worried going into this one because they played New Mexico Military in a close 6 point game," head coach Scott Raines said.

The first ten minutes of the game were close as both teams communicated well on defense, limiting their opponents to mostly perimeter shots with the use of a 2-3 zone.

Around the halfway point of the first half was when Howard College began to put some distance between them and On Point Hoops Academy. Shots began to fall for the Hawks, and they began to get good ball movement inside and out to beat the zone.

On the other side of the ball, the Hawks continued to limit their opponent to mostly perimeter shots. Howard College went on a 23-6 run in the final 13:20 of the first half.

"Our guards didn't give them any space and that wore on them as the game went on," Raines said.

The Hawks led at halftime 33-14.

The second half was simply more of the same, as Howard College continued to move the ball well against the zone. By six minutes in, it was clear that they had the game wrapped up.

Howard College won this game and their previous one on both ends of

the court, but what impressed coach Raines was their defensive communication.

"Shawn Jones and Winston Morgan were great defensively all weekend. We had a three or four guys doing a great job communicating on that end of the court. We'd like to have all 11 being that vocal, but when those few guys are in the game in makes a big difference," Raines said.

Morgan finished with a team-high of 18 points and was a vocal defensive leader for a young team still growing.

"It's [being vocal] a big impact. I try to keep my guys in line and playing hard on defense," Morgan said. "Anything I can do to help the team whether that's playing defense or shooting threes I'm going to try as hard as I can."

One name that doesn't jump out of the score box was guard Shaq Preston. He tallied nine points, five boards, and five assists, but he also brought a ton of energy to the court as he constantly harassed ball carriers.

"We're just always trying to challenge him [Shaq] to play with high energy and not play down to the level of his opponent. He had some bright spots today," Raines said.

The Hawks will travel to Ranger College this Wednesday for their next matchup.

The Howard College women's basketball team dropped their first game of the year over the weekend in Kansas, improving their record to 5-2.

The Lady Hawks played in Garden City, Kansas, for three games in three days. The first game, their only win, came against Garden City Community College in a 63-57 victory.

The Bucs beat the Dallas Cowboys 10-6 on Sunday, benefiting from a defensive holding penalty that nullified a goal-line fumble that could have cost them the victory.

Winston scored on a 1-yard keeper on the next play, giving the Bucs (4-5) their third win in five games and extending the Cowboys' longest los-

> ing streak in 26 years to seven games.

"I'm answering a lot of questions that fumble.

fumble? What ... There was a called penalty on that play, so why are we talking about that?" Smith said.

"You know what we should talk about? How about that last run of Jameis Winston to get it in the end zone to win it," the added. coach "That's what we should be talk-

The No. 1 overall draft pick also shrugged off two interceptions — the first he'd thrown in a month — to lead the second game-winning drive of his career.

The Cowboys (2-7) have lost seven in a row without injured quarterback Tony Romo, the team's longest skid since 1989. Five of those losses have been by a touchdown

"Very disappointing. We had high expectations to say the very least this year," Cowboys owner Jerry Jones said.

"Ultimately, you have to do what's necessary to win the game," Dallas coach Jason Garrett said. "You have to make the stops and make the plays. We all know that."

Romo is eligible to return from a broken left collarbone next week at Miami. The question is whether it's too late to salvage the season.

"I haven't looked at what would have to happen for us

to win the division, which looks like the logical way to look at it," Jones said.

Tampa Bay has doubled its victory total from last season, when the Bucs went 2-14 and earned the opportunity to select Winston, the 2013 Heis-

man Trophy winner. "We're not the same old Bucs. We are trending this direction," Smith said, motioning upward. "I'm just anxious to see what we can do the second half of the season."

Winston completed 22 of 39 passes for 264 yards, including a 17-yard throw to Brandon Myers to help get the Bucs into position to win the game. On third down from the 5, the 6-foot-4, 230-pound rookie scrambled through an opening in the middle and dove for the end zone, losing the ball before crossing the

Felton helps short-handed Mavericks beat Rockets 110-98 ing started early on Saturday

(AP) — Dallas Mavericks veteran point guard Raymond Felton danced his way down the court to his team's bench, wearing an ear-to-ear grin.

Late in the fourth quarter, Felton scored seven straight to give his Dallas a 14-point lead in their 110-98 road victory over the Houston Rockets. Still smiling after the win and his best scoring night in two years, Felton downplayed the celebration.

"That wasn't a dance move, man," Felton said. "It was just a little hop and a skip, that's all it was."

Even Dallas coach Rick Carlisle admitted he was a fan of Felton's celebration.

"He was fired up," Carlisle said. "I thought it was terrific. When you get one of those moments, you've got to enjoy

It was a long-awaited breakout game for the former star who has struggled with injuries and finding his role in recent years. Felton's hot shootin a shooting competition during warmups, when he outdueled fellow veteran role player Charlie Villanueva in a 3-point contest.

"I didn't want to hurt his confidence, so I let him win," Villanueva said with a laugh.

Villanueva scored 19 points as the pair stepped up in the absence of a trio of starters in Dirk Nowitzki, Wesley Matthews and Chandler Parsons.

Emotions ran high and plenty of hard fouls were shared between the in-state rivals. They met in the first round of the playoffs in April, where Houston won 4-1.

by Houston's Elevated poor defense and their own hot shooting, the Mavericks scored a season-high 57 firsthalf points.

Dallas led by as many as 26 in the first half before Houston finally started to hit shots in the third quarter, outscoring the Mavericks 33-25 in that period after trailing 57-34 at halftime. Despite multiple rallies in the second half, Houston never pulled within single digits.

Terry scored 19 points off the bench for Houston and drew a flagrant foul trying to block Dwight Powell's layup in the third quarter. With an opportunity to cut into the lead late in the game, Terry air-balled a 3-pointer and caught playful trash-talk from his former teammate Nowitzki, who was nearby on the bench.

Aldridge's double-double lifts Spurs over 76ers

SAN ANTONIO (AP) The Philadelphia 76ers are winless, but they gave San Antonio a scare just as Spurs coach Gregg Popovich expected. LaMarcus Aldridge

had 17 points and 19 rebounds to help the Spurs hold off a late charge and beat the Philadelphia 76ers 92-83 on Saturday night.

The loss was the 76ers' 10th straight to open their season and 20th overall dating back to last season.

San Antonio has won four straight and is 3-0 at home, but Popovich knew it wouldn't be easy against his friend and former longtime assistant, Philadelphia coach Brett Brown.

"They are going to play from minute one to 48 with the same standard, the same hustle. the same camaraderie,' Popovich said. "It's really a tribute to their character and Brett Brown as a coach. He just does a fantastic job."

Philadelphia rookie center Jahlil Okafor

had 21 points and 12 rebounds for his second double-double. Nerlens Noel, returning after a two-game absence due to a sore wrist, was limited to six points and three rebounds. Tony Parker scored 16

points and Tim Duncan added 15 for San Anto-The Spurs led by as

many as 19 points, but could never put the 76ers away decisively.

San Antonio was without Kawhi Leonard and Manu Ginobili, but their absence wasn't felt against a young Philadelphia squad until the final minutes

Okafor scored seven points during a 14-2 run that pulled Philadelphia within 87-83 with three minutes remaining.

"You have to give them credit, they made it hard until the end," Parker said. "That's just Brett Brown's team, they're always in games."

The Spurs forced three straight turnovers following that run to seal the victory, handing the 76ers losses in back-toback nights following a 102-85 loss in Oklahoma City on Friday.

"We have to make a few more plays," Okafor said. "We turned the ball over. We know what we did wrong, we're going to watch film and try correct those things when we come into tight situations."

Parker, who was playing with a heavy heart, played only eight minutes in the second hair.

San Antonio played France's National Anthem after a moment of silence before tipoff to honor the victims of Friday's terrorist attacks in Paris. Parker and Boris Diaw are both from France.

"It's unbelievable," Parker said. "All my prayers go to the families of the victims. It's tough."

Parker scored points in the first half and finished the game 5-for-10 shooting with three assists and four turnovers. "It helped me think

about something else," Parker said. "For the past 24 hours, I've just spent my time calling family and friends to make sure they're OK."

TIP-INS

76ers: Noel, who has a team-high four doubledoubles this season. was limited to 2-for-8 shooting. ... Philadelphia had six players out with injury, including C Joel Embiid. The 7-foot Embiid is expected to miss the season following a second surgery on his right foot, but he is listed as right foot injury. ... 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


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
