

How a family and a community have come together in the wake of a tragic accident

ight before the accident that left Blantyn Gusman paralyzed, he was in the process of getting his lifeguard and CPR certification to help others. According to his mother, Michelle Gusman, Blantyn's spirit of caring for the well-being of others and his big heart has never left him. "Blantyn had \$261 dollars saved up from before the accident from mowing lawns and doing yard work," said Michelle. "He has offered to use that money to help fix his sister's phone and pay for his own medical bills. I refused to let him, but he just has such a big heart."

Blantyn's big heart is either inspirational or infectious. Because either way, the community has been pulling together for months to help raise funds for medical bills, a vehicle that will fit his wheelchair, and other miscellaneous items that will improve Blantyn's quality of life.

"Hesters Mechanical Contractors Inc. came out within five minutes of hearing that we needed an air conditioning and heating unit for Blantyn's room," said Michelle. "They donated it completely free of cost to us. I just couldn't believe it."



According to Michelle, the proceeds from the event will go towards buying a special shower chair for Blantyn, getting a ramp put in front of the Gusman home, getting their front door widened, and buying a wheelchair that Blantyn can control a bit better. "He has a pow-

er chair, but he needs a chair with better grips and an electric drive so he can control it," said Michelle. "The chair will be anywhere from \$10,000 - \$15,000. His shower chair will

cost nearly \$4,000 and of course the main things add up such as medical bills and gas to get to Lubbock and San Angelo for appointments.'

As far as Blantyn's health goes, Michelle says he is determined and making progress. "At a doctor's appoint-

ment, his doctor was trying to help him build muscle and told him he could stop anytime he wants," Michelle said. "Blantyn was so motivated that he told the doctor he didn't want to stop and he kept going with the exercises. He is building muscle in his triceps, bending his elbows, and his waist movement is improving."

With Christmas not too far off, Blantyn's heart remains just as big. When Michelle asked Blantyn what he wanted for Christmas, his answer stayed true to his character.

"It's okay, Mom," Blantyn said. "I have y'all, and that's enough."

Obama honoring Spielberg, Yogi Berra and more

WASHINGTON (AP) -President Barack Obama recognized 17 Americans with the nation's highest civilian award on Tuesday, including the first African-American woman elected to Congress, one of the greatest catchers in baseball history and a "Funny Girl."

"Today we celebrate some extraordinary people: innovators, artists and leaders who contribute to America's strength as a nation," Obama said.

Obama presented the Presidential Medal of Freedom to filmmaker Steven Spielberg, musicians Gloria and Emilio Estefan, singer James Taylor, composer Stephen Sondheim, violinist Itzhak Perlman and actress Barbra Streisand, who won an Academy award for her performance in the classic film, "Funny Girl."

The sports honorees were Baseball Hall of Famers Willie Mays and Yogi Berra. Berra, who died in September, was a famed Yankees' catcher, an 18-time All-Star and 10-time World Series champion. The president noted that Berra also served in World War II. Mays was among the first African-American players in Major League Baseball.

"It's because of giants like Willie that someone like me could even think about running for president," Obama said.

The politicians bestowed the honor are Democrats: Sen. Barbara Mikulski of Maryland, who has championed equal pay and women's health during her 44 years of public service; former Rep. Lee Hamilton from Indiana, a longtime advocate of American national security and international relations; and the late Rep. Shirley Chisholm from New York. Chisholm was the Africanfirst American woman elected to Congress and a founding member of what would become the Congressional Black Caucus.

Of Hamilton, Obama said he helped guide the nation through the Cold War and had a consistent commitment to bipartisanship.

Obama spoke about each recipient; among the other honorees were:

• Bonnie Carroll,

a veterans advocate, who founded the Tragedy Assistance Program for Survivors (TAPS) to support families and loved ones of military heroes killed during their service.

• Katherine G. Johnson, a NASA mathematician, whose calculations influenced every major space program, including the flight of the first American into space.

Their uncertainty vanished with the help of Lady Hawks head coach Earl Diddle, who took notice of their success and made them a part of his recruiting trail, offering them something few other colleges did.

"Coach Diddle came to us and it just seemed like a no brainer. We shouldn't waste this awesome opportunity, and we've always been on the same team so getting to play together in college is really cool," Camille said.

The duo gave coach Diddle a true point guard in Camille, and a smart shooter from outside in Ashlyn.

"Camille as point guard is always looking to make the next pass and trying to set up her teammates," Ashlyn said.

"Ashlyn's a really good shooter. I don't know how, but she is always open. She also makes the right shot and doesn't shoot just to get on the board, but when it's actually a good

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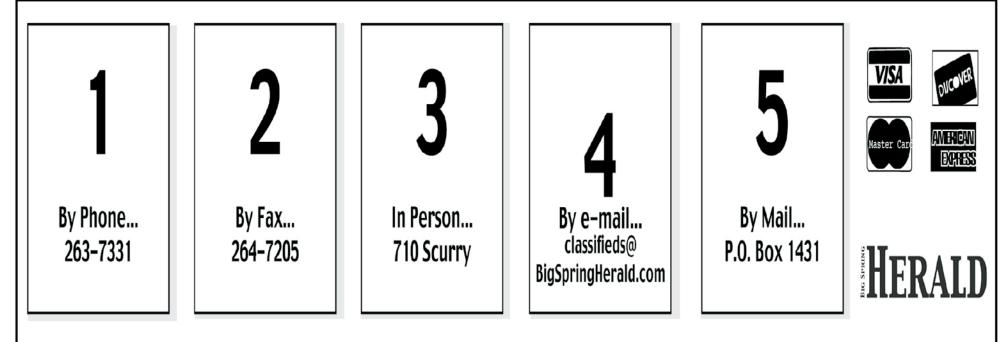

Consider this deal where it seems South must go down one in four hearts. He has four losers - a spade and three clubs - but if East-West stumble, South makes the contract.

Assume West leads a spade to East's ace. East then cashes the K-Q of clubs, West signaling with the six followed by the four. Regardless of what East does next, South takes the rest of the tricks.

East's first three plays seem nor-mal, but they clearly leave something to be desired. After winning the spade with the ace, East should play the Q-K of clubs, not the K-Q. This abnormal order of plays would tell West that East has a doubleton club. West would then overtake the king with the ace and play a third round of clubs for East to ruff.

Any departure by a defender from the normal method of play should be read by his partner as an attempt to convey a special message. The play of the Q-K, in that order, falls into this category and puts the defenders on the winning path.

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Cowboys face Carolina knowing this: They're 3-0 with Romo

IRVING — Even safety Barry Church felt a boost from the return of Tony Romo as the Dallas Cowboys ended a losing streak that covered all seven games their Pro Bowl quarterback missed.

And maybe it's not a coincidence that a defense struggling to make big plays while Romo sat with a broken left collarbone got its first touchdown of the season on Rolando Mc-Clain's interception return for the first points in a 24-14 win at Miami on Sunday.

This much is true as Dallas (3-7) prepares to face unbeaten Carolina at home on Thanksgiving: The Cowboys can say they haven't lost a game that Romo started this year.

"I just feel like we had one of our best players back in Romo," Church said after Dallas improved to 3-0 in Romo starts. "That had a heck of a lot of difference. So, our defense was very

hungry, but Romo was out there. He did a heck of a job. I'm just glad to have him back."

The Cowboys are still alive because the NFC East is mediocre. The New York Giants (5-5) lead the division by a game over Washington and Philadelphia, with both those teams getting blown out while Dallas was winning for the first time in two months.

The problem for the defending NFC East champion is the long losing streak means the playoffs have basically started. And not only are the Panthers (10-0) visiting four days after a long-awaited victory, but the Cowboys face December road games against Green Bay and Buffalo.

"It feels good. At the same time we have to work," Dez Bryant said after his 50th touchdown catch from Romo, topping the franchise record of 49 connections between Hall of Famers Troy Aikman and Mi-

chael Irvin. "Nobody is going to be jumping for joy around here." But the Cowboys were

clearly a different team with Romo after Brandon Weeden went 0-3 and Matt Cassel finished 0-4 filling in for him.

Case in point, the drive after the Dolphins wiped out a 14-0 deficit and pulled even with a touchdown in the third quarter. Romo completed all four of his passes, the last a 16-yarder to Bryant in the end zone when he threw well out in front of his All-Pro receiver and between a pair of defenders on a crossing route.

It was just the kind of precise downfield throw the Cowboys lacked with Romo sidelined, and helped overcome two interceptions on bad decisions with pressure coming.

"There are a couple of plays he would like to have back, but again, his demeanor was outstanding and he responded to the adversity

throughout the game, said coach Jason Garrett, who tied Jimmy Johnson for second with 44 victories behind Tom Landry. "I think the guys really feed off of that."

Now comes the tricky part: the short week for a 35-year-old quarterback who must maintain his surgically repaired back and is likely to be sore after getting knocked around a few times by Miami's defensive line.

Romo's worst game last year was a Thanksgiving loss to Philadelphia, and he admitted that he wasn't at his best physically without the normal rest and rehab for his back. This time, however, he doesn't have two months of wear and tear since he's been sitting.

"Oh, I don't know," said when Romo asked about the challenge of getting ready on a short week with Carolina looming.

Johnson's return should bolster Panthers strong pass rush

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — The unbeaten Carolina Panthers already have one of the best pass rushes in the NFL — and more help is on the way.

The Panthers plan to activate defensive end Charles Johnson from short-term injured reserve on Tuesday. Coach Ron Rivera said he expects Johnson will play on Thanksgiving Day against the Dallas Cowboys.

Johnson will take the roster spot of backup guard Amini Silatolu, who tore the ACL in his left knee in Sunday's 44-16 win over the Washington Redskins and will be placed on injured

the stretch run we want our best players available."

The Panthers have 22 sacks in the last six games and 31 for the season, tied for secondmost in the NFL.

Johnson, who had 52 ¹/₂ sacks over the past five seasons, has missed the last eight weeks on short-term injured reserve with a hamstring injury.

He has practiced with the team for the last two weeks and is officially eligible to return to the 53-man roster on Tuesday.

Johnson has spent all nine seasons with the Panthers.

He battled off and on with hamstring prob lems in the preseason before re-injuring it more severely in the third game of the season against New Orleans, prompting the team to shut him down. He had six tackles and one sack in the first three games.

The Panthers promptly traded for Jared Allen, the NFL's active career leader in sacks. Allen has 12 tackles and two sacks in six games and has provided some needed veteran stability at defensive end.

Others have stepped too with Johnson up out.

Second-year defensive end Kony Ealy, who has been starting opposite Johnson, has a sack in each of the last four games including

two forced fumbles. Defensive tackle Kawann Short leads the team with six sacks, five of them coming in October when he was named NFC Defensive Player of the Month. And pass rushing specialist Mario Addison has 4 ¹/₂ sacks for the league's fourth-ranked defense.

Carolinahadfivesacks against Redskins quarterback Kirk Cousins, marking the third time in the last five games they've had at least five

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sacks in a game.

The question now for Rivera is which two defensive ends to start among a threesome that includes Johnson, Allen and the young, but improving Ealy. He said the team hasn't decided yet, but added that is a good problem to have.

Teammates agree. "C.J. is one of the most fierce, respected all-down linemen in this league," Ealy said. "When he comes back he is going to open up

even more for us."

As for Silatolu's left guard spot, Rivera said he expects regular starter Andrew Norwell back this week, which will soften the blow. Norwell has missed the last three games with a hamstring issue. Silatolu filled in while Norwell was out.
