Historic storm hits Crossroads

Unofficial reports of 7 inches of snowfall in Big Spring Sunday


Winter hit the Crossroads with a vengeance this weekend, dropping as much as 6 to 7 inches of snow — and a generous portion of sleet and freezing rain, to boot over much of the area.

Julie Phillipson, a meteorologist with the National Weather Service's Midland station, said a very slow-moving winter storm system that developed over the western United States slammed through the Permian Basin Saturday and Sunday,

blanketing the area in sleet and snow and sending temperatures plunging toward the

Unofficial reports of up to 7 inches of snow were reported in Big Spring, but the main brunt of the storm was felt in far west Texas and southeastern New Mexico. Phillipson said the NWS had received reports of 14 inches of snow in Hobbs and snow drifts up to 5 feet in height in parts of southeast New Mexico.

You call this snow!?! DPS urges caution as severe weather impacts the state

AUSTIN – The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is urging Texans to monitor weather forecasts and take necessary precautions due to the threat of severe or winter weather in various parts of the state. Travelers are advised to monitor weather conditions along their route before traveling, and avoid unnecessary travel if possible in affected areas.

Texans are encouraged to follow these safety tips in the event of severe weather or flooding:

When severe storms threaten, the safest place to be is indoors. See dps.texas.gov/ dem/threatawareness/weather aware severe .htm for additional safety tips.

Avoid areas already flooded and avoid any fast-flowing water. Be extremely cautious of

any water on roads or in creeks, streams, storm drains or other areas – never attempt to cross flowing streams or drive across flooded roadways and always observe road barricades placed for your protection. (Please note it is against the law to go around barriers.) Dangerous waters can seem

deceptively calm, and if you encounter flooding, move to

higher ground. Keep in mind that flood dangers are even harder to recog-

nize at night. Stay informed by monitoring weather radios and news broadcasts for updated information on current and anticipated severe weather in your

Monitor local weather broadcasts and follow up-tothe-minute weather conditions, at www. weather. gov/. Purchase an all-hazards

weather radio for up-to-date warnings, watches, forecasts and other hazard information. Sign up for your local

emergency notification sys-On icy roads, drive slowly

increase distance required for stopping, and avoid using cruise control. Remember that ice often forms first on overpasses.

Watch for downed trees and power lines across roads. If power is out, treat all intersections as four-way stops.

Keep your gas tank full.

Blankets/sleeping bags, extra clothing, gloves and a

Windshield scraper, tool kit, booster cables, tow rope and a shovel.



Large storm brings twisters, floods — and it's not over yet

Associated Press GARLAND, Texas (AP) — As residents of North Texas surveyed the destruction from deadly tornadoes, the same storm system brought winter storm woes to the Midwest on Monday, amplified flooding that's already blamed for more than a dozen deaths and prompted hundreds of

flight cancellations. At least 11 people died and dozens were injured in the tornadoes that swept through the Dallas area on Saturday and caused substantial damage. That, plus the flooding in Missouri and Illinois, was the latest in a succession of severe weather events across the country in the last week that led to

A range of precipitation was forecast Monday for the country's midsection, including heavy snow, ice and blustery winds in parts of 11 states and heavy rain in already-waterlogged parts of Missouri

at least 43 deaths.

and Arkansas.

The system caused nearly 900 flights to be canceled — more than a third of which were at Chicago's two main airports — and another 500 to be delayed, according to flight-tracking service FlightAware. typical day sees about 150 cancellations and 4,000 delays.

In North Texas, local officials estimated as many as 1,450 homes were damaged destroyed by at least nine tornadoes. "This is a huge impact

on our community and we're all suffering," Garland Police Lt. Pedro Barineau said of the suburb about 20 miles northeast of Dallas, where eight people died, 15 were injured and about 600 structures, mostly single-family homes, were damaged.

The weather service said an EF-4 tornado, which is the secondmost powerful with winds up to more than 200 mph, hit the community at about 6:45 p.m. Saturday.

Natalie Guzman, 33, took photos of her family's damaged home in a Garland neighborhood. The only part of the house that appeared to be spared was the master bathroom, where her brother-in-law shelter Saturday night with his dogs.

"It was worse than I thought," Guzman said, comparing the scene to the photos he had sent Saturday.

In the nearby town of Rowlett, City Manager Brian Funderburk said Sunday morning that 23 people were injured, but that there were no deaths and no reports of missing people. The weather service said damage indicated it was likely an EF-3 tornado, which has winds up to

165 mph.

Cowboys fail to get spark in QB Kellen **Moore's first start**

N.Y. (AP) — The Dallas Cowboys offense is still going nowhere without Tony Romo.

Add Kellen Moore to the Cowboys growing list of quarterbacks unable to provide a spark.

In making his first career start, Moore failed to produce one touchdown drive as Dallas settled for kicker Dan Bailey hitting two of three field-goal attempts in a 16-6 loss at the Buffalo Bills on Sunday.

"We can make excuses and all that stuff," said Moore, referring to an offense that was also minus injured star receiver Dez Bryant. "Bottom line is, we had an opportunity to score points, we didn't. Hopefully, we learn from this."

That time has all but run out for the Cowboys, who at 4-11 are eliminated from playoff contention in preparing to close their season hosting Washington next week.

The Bills (7-8), who are also eliminated from contention, sealed the win on Mike Gillislee's 50-yard touchdown run with 2:25 remaining.

The Cowboys dropped to 1-10 in games without Romo, who's sidelined by a broken collarbone.

Against Buffalo, they were limited to 307 yards of offense. They've combined to score just four touchdowns in their past five games. And Dallas has managed to score

one or fewer touchdown eight times.

"We certainly need to get better offensively," coach Jason Garrett said. "We did a good job of running the football at different times. But, we weren't able to sustain drives."

Moore went 13 of 31 for 186 yards passing and an interception, a week after Matt Cassel was benched during a 19-16 loss to the New York Jets.

The Cowboys settled for Bailey's 22-yard field goal after Moore overthrew Brice Butler in the end zone on thirdand-goal from the 4 in the second quarter.

In the third quarter, Moore led the Cowboys to the Buffalo 26 only to have his low pass tip off Butler's fingers and into the hands of linebacker A.J. Tarpley.

Garrett liked what he saw from Moore, but said he hasn't yet determined who will start next week.

"I thought he operated well and made some big plays in the game, but obviously not enough for us offensively," Garrett said. "We need to score more points."

Butler led the team with four catches for 74 yards. Darren McFadden had 99 yards rush-

Tight end Jason Witten was limited to just one catch for 12 yards.







Famous Hand

The best hands are those where a relatively simple way to assure the contract might be overlooked by novice and expert alike. Today's deal, from the 1993 Vanderbilt

Teams, provides a case in point. When the deal was first played, North-South reached five clubs doubled as shown. South's opening twoclub bid showed 11 to 16 points and at least five clubs, and two diamonds asked for more information. The rest

of the bidding was natural. West led the king of diamonds, ruffed by South with the three. It might seem that with East holding

five trumps headed by the Λ -Q and declarer already reduced to just five trumps, there is no way he can maintain control of the hand. It appears that whenever East gains the lead with the club ace, he can force South to ruff another diamond and thus assure himself of a third trump trick. Then, too, there is the matter of what South will do with the ten of hearts.

Unfazed by these concerns, David Berkowitz, the declarer, found a virtually sure route to 11 tricks that was elegant in its simplicity. Noting that his clubs were solid apart from the A-Q, he cashed the K-Q of hearts followed by the K-Q-A of spades, discarding the seven of hearts from dummy. The ten of hearts was then ruffed with dummy's club ten. If East refused to overruff, Berkowitz could ruff a diamond in

his hand and ruff the ace of hearts with the club jack. South's only losers in that case would be the A-Q of clubs. If instead East overruffed the club ten with the queen and returned a low trump to prevent another heart ruff in dummy, South could win with the king and force out the ace of clubs, eventually scoring the heart ace as his 11th trick. At the other table, South also

played five clubs doubled but slipped by leading a heart to dummy at trick two in order to play a club toward his hand. East rose with the ace and forced declarer to ruff a diamond, and the contract went down one.





The Bills had used more than 4 minutes when Gillislee scored.






