That's because a series of winter storms are expected to move into the area. The first storm was expected today (Thursday), while another was predicted for Saturday night through at least Monday.

Even if the predicted storms bypass the area, last weekend's winter storm could still create some travel

A storm such as that is a humbling experience.

reminds us once again of how utterly dependent we are on electricity.

If you live outside the city limits, no storm." electricity usually means no water.

If you have an energy-efficient dual heating/cooling system, no electricity means no heat.

If you have an all-electric kitchen, complete with microwave oven and dishwasher, no electricity means cold sandwiches, leftovers and tuna salad for the duration, on paper plates.

And if you're a rural resident of Castro County, a deep snow means you're isolated, unless you want to get the tractor out and try to negotihighway.

> 30 minutes before sunrise Saturday and hunters will be stalking the ringnecked birds through the end of the season on Dec. 26.

> Daily bag limit is three cock pheasant per day with six in possession. Hens are off limits to hunters, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Regulations.

> The pheasant population could be double what it was a year ago, when the area was suffering from a severe drought, according to Danny Swepston of Canyon, a Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept. wildlife biologist.

But Swepston is quick to add that the bird numbers are still well below what they once were.

"A lot of the farmers I've talked to think the bird prospects look better than they have in the past few years," When power lines and poles start said Tony Leibel of Hart, who is one swooning and snapping, the situation of the planners of the Hart Lions Club's organized pheasant hunt. "I know I saw several birds along the Not only are there no lights or TV. road Saturday during the snow

> N. Dean Johnson with the Nazareth Lions Club also thinks the bird populations will be up this year.

"We hear prospects are good. As you drive down the roads, you can see a lot of birds. We're looking for a great hunt," Johnson said. "I think the hunters could smell that it was a good year for pheasant-we've had a lot of calls we had to turn down because we were full."

Organized hunts

There are three organized hunts in ate an unpaved road or an unplowed Castro County, and each hunt is already full, according to organizers.

The Hart Lions Club is expecting 130 hunters Saturday's and each paid

The 130 hunters is the club's limit, according to Leibel. Those hunters will receive a souvenir cap, a full breakfast and the right to hunt on approximately 10,000 acres of land Saturday and Sunday.

Hunters are expected from El Paso, Houston, Austin, Dallas, Fort Worth, San Antonio, Boulder, Colo., and other areas, according to Leibel.

The breakfast, which will be served from 5:30 to 8 a.m. at the Hart School Cafeteria, will be free to those signed up for the club's hunt. Others may enjoy the meal for \$4 per plate. The menu will include scrambled eggs, sausage, bacon, biscuits, hash browns, gravy, juice, milk and

During the breakfast, the Hart Volunteer Fire Dept., will sell chances for an 1187 Remington 12 gauge shotgun to be raffled off after the meal. Tickets are \$3 per person, according to Leibel.

The Nazareth Lions Club will host 145 hunters on opening weekend, and each paid \$125 for the right to a guided hunt on selected lands Saturday. Members of the Lions Club and the Nazareth Volunteer Fire Dept., will serve as guides on Saturday. The hunters will be allowed to hunt on that land Sunday, but no guides will be available.

The club is still receiving calls from hunters hoping to get in on the guided hunt, but the 145 is all the club will accept this year. Hunters are expected from Dallas, Houston, Midland-Odessa and other downstate areas, Johnson said.

Power outages were reported Saturday in isolated spots in and around Dimmitt. Nazareth residents were without electricity from about 10 a.m. Saturday through 9 Sunday morning.

Some who live in the country were still powerless Monday and Tuesday as crews worked to replace and repair hundreds of power poles and lines which had snapped.

The storm moved into the Texas Panhandle Friday night, starting with rain which turned into snow during the overnight hours.

By the time the sun came up Saturday morning, a blanket of white department. covered the ground and roads in the county. The snow continued to fall iff's deputies reported zero visibility throughout the day, and wind gusts on State Highway 86 west of of up to 35 miles per hour created deep drifts and visibility problems, closed all roads in Castro County. forcing the Texas Dept. of Transportation (TxDOT) to close all Castro were reported in some areas, making County roads Saturday afternoon.

> The first county road to be closed was State Highway 86 west of Dimmitt to the Parmer County line. That stretch of road was closed at 1 p.m. Saturday after emergency crews reported deep drifts and visibility of less than a quarter of a mile.

> US 385 north of Dimmitt also was closed at 1:25 p.m. after reports that the road in the La Posta area was almost impassable and traffic was reduced to one lane.

> Several motorists were stranded in those areas after they lost control of their vehicles on the snow-packed roads. It is unknown how many people were stranded in the storm, but luckily, no one was seriously injured, according to the sheriff's

Tractor-trailer rigs had a difficult time negotiating the slick roads, but that didn't stop them from going around the road closure signs. Several lost control and the trucks jackknifed, winding up in the ditch or in deep drifts, especially on FM 1055 near the feedlots.

Most roads in the county were closed for at least a half day and some, like State Highway 86 east to Nazareth, was still closed through Sunday as TxDOT worked to clear the stretch of road.

Two Dimmitt residents volunteered their time and equipment (tractors, etc.) to help pull the trucks and other vehicles out of the snow banks as the storm started to weaken late Saturday afternoon.


He was first appointed to the office on July 1, 1981. He won election by the voters in 1982, and has continued in office since that time. A native of Castro County,

His duties as constable include serving legal papers, including citations, warrants and subpoenas. He patrols the county, answers calls, investigates burglaries, and assists other law enforcement officers as needed.

Dobbs said that he has gone to training schools throughout his tenure as constable, including 90 hours of training this year.

He is a life member of the West Texas JP and Constable Association and has held offices in the association. He also is a member of the Texas JP and Constable Association.



"There are two things a peace officer has to do-preserve the peace and protect the people," Dobbs said. "That is what I have tried to do.

"I've enjoyed serving as constable, and I like working with the people of Castro County. I would appreciate the consideration of the voters at the March primary."



The cost of the screening is \$3 per sample and you should contact the Castro County Extension office by calling 647-4115 to receive an approved water sampling bag and instructions for taking your well water sample. It is very important that only sampling bags from the Castro County Extension Office be used and all instructions for proper sampling followed to insure accurate results.

Electric utilities around the counsoftware, communications systems, try are taking steps to make sure the lights stay on as the turn of the century approaches. The Y2K problem has been widely discussed and solutions have been offered and implemented. Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative is no exception.

"Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative has initiated "Year 2000" assessments and remediations," said DSEC Executive Assistant Mike Veazey. "We believe this program will prepare our company to handle any problems with the coming of the new millennium."

DSEC has a comprehensive checklist of steps toward "Y2K readiness." These steps, begun many months ago, have been to inventory, assess, test, repair or replace, retest, and plan for contingencies.

Veazey stated that DSEC has done assessments in all of the following areas: computer hardware and

critical systems, substations, and metering equipment. No major problems have been identified in DSEC equipment. Company computers have been repaired or replaced to satisfy Y2K compliance.

"Much of our distribution system is mechanical and is less sensitive to Y2K problems because there are few digital controls and relatively few embedded chips in our equipment," Veazey said.

Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative is also very much aware of the interconnected nature of power supply

"We are connected to New Century Energies, Southwestern Public Service's parent company, for generated wholesale power, and they, in turn, are connected to regional electric power grids. There are also many supply and delivery points all along the line, from the manufacture of our

bucket trucks to the sophisticated equipment at power generation stations," Veazey said.

"The delivery of electric power is the result of the efforts of these many different and diverse organizations.

Of course, Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative has no control of these various organizations and we cannot assume responsibility should one or more of these systems fail for one reason or another.

"We are, however, in constant contact with our wholesale power providers and our distribution material suppliers concerning the possibility of Y2K glitches in their equipment. They have assured us that everything humanly possible is being done to alleviate any Y2K problems on their systems.

"Although no one can make 100% guarantees as to what will happen when the new century arrives, Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative is taking any and all prudent steps to help keep the lights on at the arrival of the new millennium," he said. "As always, the number one priority of our cooperative is keeping the lights on whether the problem is the Y2K bug, a tornado, an ice storm, a blizzard or an evening thunderstorm."

duction Credit Associations, two prominent farm credit institutions providing credit service to over 1,300 farmers, ranchers and agribusinesses in the Panhandle and South Plains, have merged.

The merger, as approved by their stockholder-borrowers, became effective in October.

"We are fortunate to serve this highly productive and diversified lending territory which makes a major contribution to the agricultural economy of Texas and the nation," said Carroll Haygood, the Association President.

Geographically, Panhandle-Plains PCA serves a 20-county chartered territory in the western two-thirds of the Panhandle and upper South Plains covering 20,000 square miles. The Association has \$146 million in assets.

"We believe our stockholders will benefit from combining the strengths of these organizations that include a \$30 million capital position," said Troy Christian of Farwell, board chairman of the Plainview PCA and new board chairman of Panhandle-Plains PCA. He further added that when considering efficiencies gained in operations, the association is expected to be positioned for the competitive nature and service needs of agriculture lending of this area.

Mike McLain of Gruver, Amarillo PCA's Board Chairman and now Vice-Chairman of Panhandle-Plains PCA, reports that the merger met the board's philosophy of combining two strong associations with a contiguous territory while maintaining the regional identity of this significant agriculture production area.

He further added "We will still know our stockholders and have a good understanding of their needs."

Panhandle-Plains PCA is headquartered in Amarillo with regional credit offices in both Amarillo and Plainview. Other credit offices are located in Dimmitt, Dumas, Floydada, Friona, Muleshoe, Olton, and Tulia.

The Dimmitt office of the Panhandle-Plains PCA has an important role in the association's overall business of providing credit services to farmers and ranchers, according to information from the association. Currently the office serves approximately 115 stockholder/borrowers in Castro County and surrounding ar-

The importance of Castro County to the state's agricultural economy is also highly significant, according to the association. The 1997 census of agriculture reports total agriculture sales of \$668,439,000 to lead the state in total sales. 
Haygood, the former president of Amarillo PCA, further added that the association has 31 employees including 18 loan officers, and most of the staff are existing employees with significant experience.

New Century Energies discloses Y2K readiness

recently that the company is ready for the Y2K transition, and does not expect any disruption of services to

customers.

Comprised of three primary operating utilities, including Southwestern Public Service Co. based in Amarillo, NCE Year 200 Program Manager Robert C. Ray said, "We believe the likelihood of Y2K-related failures is minimal, and we do not expect the transition to cause electricity or natural gas outages for our customers on Dec. 31 or thereafter."

Ray reported that the company reached completion of work on all critical systems and equipment in June, and work has continued on low-priority systems, testing and contingency planning.

"Even though we feel confident the Y2K date transition today, we will continue our comprehensive testing and contingency planning through the remainder of the year," Ray said.

Ray said the company has completed Y2K reediation and testing on 91 high-and medium-critical application systems (involved in energy supply, customer information and records, and internal accounting and financial reporting). These systems have been tested and are back in service under normal operating conditions. He said work has also been completed on low-critical systems and vendor upgrades have been installed on over 600 hardware and software products.

Ray reported that all cirical embedded systems are considered Y2K ready, including 44 generating units. Also, all major power plants are now operating in the Year 2000.

"By moving clocks forward, we were able to verify reliable operation under future dates," Ray said. "We intend to leave these plants operating under 'future time' until well after the New Year's transition.'

Key suppliers for the company have been monitored to gauge their Y2K readiness levels, and will continue to be monitored before, during and after the Dec. 31 transition date.

Although problems are not expected, Ray said the company has developed response procedures for "worst-case Scenarios" such as a loss of communications or a disruption in the national electricity grid.

"We have identified additional staff and technicians who will be on site Dec. 31 to help deal with any unexpected issues," Ray said. "We also will have media information centers staffed that evening in several cities to help communicate any necessary updates or information to the

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
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



Jacob Reyna and Velasquez combined for 27 of Hart's 41 points, with Reyna finishing with 14 and Velasquez chipping in 13.

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
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



City gets 'clean' audit report

"clean" audit report from Henry Ramaekers of Brown, Graham & Co., as reported at the Monday night meeting of the Dimmitt City Council.

Ramaekers said there were no areas that needed attention and complimented the city staff on their good work and help with the audit process.

He also gave the council a "pat on the back" for getting the city's bonded indebtedness paid off during the past fiscal year, as he had recommended in a previous audit to save the city some money on the interest on the bonds.

Ramaekers reported that he found no instances of non-compliance with accepted auditing standards and no material weaknesses in the internal controls that are in place.

In another matter, the council voted to go out for bids on a new bulldozer for use in the city landfill. The current bulldozer is in need of repairs, and the council voted to see what a new one might cost compared with the cost of the repairs.

Council members also voted to accept a bid on a new police car. The only bid received was from Western Ford of Hereford for \$20,882.55 after trade-in allowance. City Manager Don Sheffy told the council that the city has a fleet number issued by the Ford Motor Co., and that enables them to get a bid price that is "pretty close to the state contract price."

Sheffy gave the council an update on the city's status in applying for funding for improvements to the city airport under the Aviation Capital Improvement Program for fiscal year

The City of Dimmitt received a 2000 through 2002. The program provides for 90-10 funding, with the city providing 10% of the cost of the

> In his manager's report, Sheffy was very complimentary of city workers in their response to the snow problems the city had.

He particularly praised Saul Arce and Juan Almanza of the works department for the long hours they put in on Sunday. He said they first worked on a broken water line at the First United Methodist Church, then helped with snow removal at the schools until dark.

Sheffy said someone at the Cerestar plant called about 9 p.m. to report that their water pressure was low, so Arce and Almanza drove out to the south water field to check the wells. The power was out.

Sheffy said Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative promised to give the well field a number one priority, and service was restored about midnight. He said wells in town were turned on to take up the slack in the water supply for the city, but it was not enough to cover Cerestar, too. Also, he said some fuses were blown when the wells were turned on and those had to be replaced.
