Plains Memorial Hospital Building Site Is Chosen

The Board of Directors of the Plains Memorial Hospital selected Block 2 of the Wynona addition, just north of the original townsite of Dimmitt, in a meeting last Friday afternoon, and have taken options on the property. The block consists of 16 lots, making it a third larger than an ordinary city block.

The Board of Directors pointed out that the hospital location in the Wynona Addition was selected because of its advantageous location, being in a quiet residential section, and not far from the business section, it is also easily accessible to the main sewer line and other public utility facilities.

Architects are being contacted by a committee appointed from the Board of Directors, and every effort is being made to secure building plans and begin the construction of the hospital as soon as possible.

Pvt. Perry Hoyler Is In Japan

With the sixth Army in Japan—Pvt. Perry Hoyler, husband of Mrs. Eileen Hoyler, Dimmitt, Texas has arrived in Japan with the 32nd (Red Arrow) Infantry Division.

The Division zone includes Kyusu, southernmost large island in the Japanese group, and southern Honshu. The main city of Kyusu is Nagasaki, 12th largest city in Japan, target for the second atomic bombing.

Hoyler's arrival in Japan comes after finishing his basic. For the Red Arrow unit itself, the Kyusu landing meant the end of a long and bloody road studded with smashing victories at Buna, Salidor, Aitape, Morotai, Leyte and Luzon.

The Japan occupation finds Hoyler engaged in guard duty with the crack 128th Regiment in the re-occupation of Yamaguchi, Honshu. On victory day, the famed 32nd division's 654th day of combat in this war, Pvt. Hoyler had completed 6 months in the army. Prior to entering the army, Hoyler was engaged in farming and ranching.

His awards include the Asiatic Pacific Theater Ribbon.

Training Offered By Health Dept.

Austin, Texas. An official announcement from the State Committee for Approval of Educational and Training Institutions has been received by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, designating the Texas State Department of Health as an approved vocational training agency for veterans.

Training offered by the State Health Department will include sanitary engineering, entomology, technician and waste sewage plant operation and typhus control.

Veterans who meet the eligibility requirements under the G.I. Bill of Rights, ages 20 to 40, with at least a high school education and physically fit for field work may apply for this training. Applicants should be men who desire to make sanitation or some other phase of public health activity a career of life work. Applicants who have been accepted will receive such training allowances as is provided under the G.I. Bill of Rights for instance, \$65 and \$90 per month, depending on marital status, which amount may be supplemented by the city where the applicant is taking his training.

For full information concerning this type of training, veterans are urged to consult their local branch of the Veterans Administration, their local health officer or The State Department of Health in Austin.

BETHEL SCHOOL BUILDING RAZED BY FIRE SUNDAY

Church services in the Bethel school building were cut short Sunday morning when an oil stove in one of the class rooms exploded starting a fire that completely razed the building. At the time of the explosion all of the congregation was assembled in the auditorium for the opening exercises of the Sunday School and due to the lack of fire fighting equipment the flames went unchecked until the building was consumed. Practically all of the furnishings in the building were destroyed with the exception of the piano. It is reported that the loss was partially covered by insurance.

This is the second time that a school building has been destroyed by fire in the Bethel District, the first loss was sustained in 1935. Although the Bethel school district was annexed to Dimmitt district last year, the rural school building was used for a community center and for church services of various denominations and plans are being made for the construction of another community building.

Vote Scheduled On Moving Seat

For the 4th time in 16 years, Lamb county voters will ballot on the question of moving their county seat from Olton. Acting on petitions presented by 408 Littlefield citizens, and a petition from 496 Amherst residents, County Judge I.B. (Doc) Holt has ordered an election for Saturday, March 9th. The ballot will read in substance: For removal of the county seat to Littlefield, for removal of the county seat to Amherst; against the removal of the county seat from Olton.

The county has turned thumbs down on the proposition in past elections, in 1929, 1932 and 1937. Judge Holt said it will take two-thirds majority of voters to move the county seat to Littlefield, but only a majority vote to move it to Amherst, as the latter is almost in the geographical center of the county. Littlefield is in the southeast corner; Olton is in the northeast corner; Sudan the fourth incorporated city in Lamb county has never been a contender for the county seat in any election.

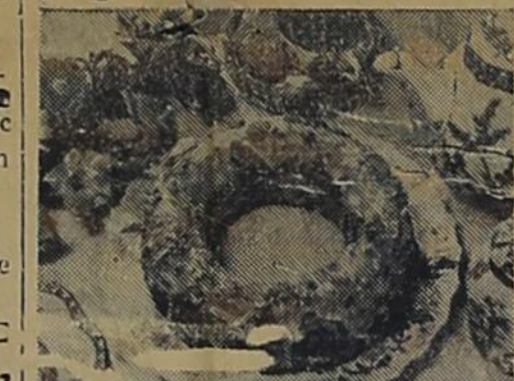

Fruit Coffee Cake
1/2 c. raisins 1/2 cup
1/2 c. water 1 c.
1 tsp. lemon juice 1/2 c. flour
Ground cloves 1/2 tsp. flour
Ground cinnamon 1/2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 c. shortening
Combine raisins, water and water. Bring to a boil and cook for two minutes. Gradually add 1/2 cup flour to mixture, stirring constantly, until thickened. Add lemon juice and a dash of cloves and cinnamon. Cool. Combine raisin mixture, lightly beaten egg and milk. Sift all-purpose flour, baking powder and sugar together. Work in shortening so particles are approximately the size of a small pea. Pour liquid mixture into middle of dry ingredients; stir two together just enough to mix well. Spoon into greased tube pan. Bake in a moderately hot oven (375° F.) for 25 minutes.


