Local elementary students are learning that a few pennies can go a long way toward curing a disease.

Moss Elementary students have spent the last few weeks collecting for the Pennies for Patients fundraiser.

The students bring in pennies mostly, but also other coins and cash.

The money raised by Pennies for Patients goes to benefit the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society. The funds will used in the society's mission to cure leukemia, lymphoma, Hodgkin's disease and myeloma, as well as to improve the quality of life of patients and their families.

In 2014, Moss students raised \$1,830 after setting a goal of \$1,800. In 2015, the students managed to raise \$1,936, which helped them pass their goal of \$1,900.

"I try to raise it a little each year to see how well we can do. This year, we set a goal of \$2,000. So far, we have \$400 raised, but I am sure that the teachers and students are keeping some of the money back until the very end, so I am hopeful we will reach our goal again," said Richard Cypert, counselor at Moss Elementary School. "The class that brings in the most money wins a pizza party, so the kids are pretty excited."

a name-calling, insulttrading, finger-pointing final debate in which Rubio and Ted Cruz engaged in a tag-team attack intended to slow Trump's momentum before it's too late.

"I've dealt with tougher," Trump sniffed after taking incoming fire for two-plus hours Thursday night. He said he knew the attacks were coming because "they're desperate. They're losing by massive amounts.'

Eleven states vote in Tuesday's mega-round of voting, with 595 delegates at stake. Trump, with three straight victories behind him, has the momentum, and his rivals know they have to change that dynamic to have any hope of derailing his steamroll toward the nomination.

As Trump's rivals ratcheted up their criticism, a pro-Rubio super PAC also announced plans to start running new Trump attack ads in key states Friday morning.

One of the ads charges that Trump "knows nothing about foreign policy." Another targets his business background, highlights the businessman's use of "sleazy bankruptcy laws to avoid paying workers" and highlights his recent comment that he loves "the poorly educated."

The ads are part of a "significant part of a multi-state, multi-million dollar buy," said the pro-Rubio group's spokesman, Jeff Sadosky.

It was far from clear, though, that the new effort will solve Trump's

basic conunrivals' drum — each struggling to emerge as the clear alternative to the frontrunner as non-Trump voters continue to splinter their support among the alternatives.

On the Democratic side, Hillary Clinton claimed new momentum on Friday on the eve of a South Carolina Democratic primary that she's expected to win handily.

"I think it does take me a little bit longer to get into the rhythm of campaigning," she said on MSNBC's "Morning Joe." "We hit our stride in Nevada. Our message of breaking all barriers is really beginning to take hold. I really felt we were on an upward trajectory."

From Houston, the GOP candidates spread out in the hunt for Super Tuesday votes, with Cruz headed for Tennessee and Virginia on Friday. Both Trump and Rubio are signal-Texas before heading to



Trump's trail of irresponsibility

immy Carter knew that one way to win the trust of the citizenry was to appeal to their moral vanity. He was sected president

in 1976 promising
"a government
that is as good and
honest and decent
and competent and

as are the American people."

are. He does it by telling them it's commendable to be bad. His campaign is not so much a challenge to prevailing standards as a rejection of all standards.

Other candidates fudge, exaggerate and mislead, but they operate within accepted limits on dishonesty. Trump denies truth and embraces falsehood. He can't be proven wrong because he and his followers deny the authority of facts. He encourages his audiences to trust what they feel — and nothing else.

"Donald J. Trump's record

on truth and accuracy is astonishingly poor," Angie Drobnic Holan, a reporter for PolitiFact, wrote in December in The New York Times. "So far, we've fact-checked more than 70 Trump statements and rated fully three-quarters of them as Mostly False, False or 'Pants on Fire' (we reserve this last designation for a claim that is not only inaccurate but also ridiculous)."

That was before a new parade

of fictions — saying the United States is the "highest taxed country in the world," claiming he vocally opposed the invasion of Iraq before it happened and accusing Ted Cruz of having a "double passport." Making stuff up is at the core of his campaign.

Of 96 Trump statements scrutinized by PolitiFact at last count, only seven were true. By contrast, Hillary Clinton, whom Republicans regard as a habitual liar, sticks to the facts slightly more than half the time, according to the fact-checkers.

The brazen deceit Trump exhibits would be fatal to most candidates. Cruz, no slave to veracity, had to fire a spokesman for spreading the claim that Marco Rubio had disparaged the Bible. Trump would not have made that claim. He would have recalled the time Rubio spit on a Bible while wearing a Satan mask in the Grand Mosque of Mecca.

Trump's contempt for the truth is no impediment with a large segment of the Republican primary electorate, which has an adversarial relationship with reality. Two-thirds of Trump supporters think Barack Obama is a Muslim, a survey by Public Policy Polling found, and 61 percent think he was born abroad. Other candidates may decline to indulge voters who are ignorant or unhinged. But Trump is not bound by such dreary customs.

In every way, his campaign has been an orgy of irresponsibility. George W. Bush outraged his critics by waterboarding suspected terrorists, a method he insisted is not torture. Trump says it is torture — and its only drawback is being too gentle.

"I think we should go much stronger than waterboarding," he said. In his view, "nothing should be taken off the table." Any form of sadism you can imagine, Trump will happily consider.


Terrorist suspects are not the only ones at risk of brutality. When someone disrupted his rally, Trump wished for the days of old, when a protester "would be carried out on a stretcher."

His anathema for Muslims, like his taste for torture, knows no bounds. He called for a "complete shutdown of Muslims entering the United States until our country's representatives can figure out what the hell is going on." He fondly recalled an American general who, according to a doubtful legend, executed Muslim prisoners using bullets dipped in pig's blood.

For some reason, his glorification of hatred and violence appeals to many evangelical Christians, whose savior preached the golden rule. Saintly attributes, in his eyes, are for suckers. Trump tells his supporters that their most vicious impulses should not be suppressed.

Even on less visceral matters, Trump sees boundaries as something to violate without compunction. His tax plan would swell the federal budget deficit by \$10 trillion over the next decade. His insistence that this approach will bring the economy roaring back will convince only those who need no convincing. Like his other policies, it treats recklessness as a virtue.

Some politicians think that, on occasion, exceptions have to be made to our observance of civilized norms. Trump wants to toss those civilized norms on a bonfire. He's found plenty of Americans just dying to light the match.

Apparently the social media platform's powerful CEO hasn't figured out that when you pat yourself on the back for speaking truth to power — and at the same time, protecting the masses from unsafe speech — you sound like the Politburo. Or a modern university that uses speech codes to muzzle dissenting — that is, conservative — opinions.

Shortly after announcing its new council, Twitter suspended the account of blogger and antifeminist Robert Stacy McCain. Why? A spokesperson explained in an email that Twitter doesn't comment on individual accounts "for privacy and security reasons." I requested the tweets that got McCain blocked. No dice. Techies love to talk about transparency, but not for themselves.

McCain posted a tweet that to decide who ca

informed him he had violated "rules around participating in targeted abuse." Because Twitter won't provide documentation for that abuse, conservative media have been left to guess why the platform silenced McCain. They've noted that feminist Anita Sarkeesian — who has sparred with McCain — is on the Twitter Council. "So it sure seems like that moment Twitter gave Sarkeesian the power to do so, she started blackballing her critics," Robert Tracinski wrote in The Federalist.

I've seen tweets from the now shuttered @rsmccain account. If they crossed Twitter's lines by actually threatening or harassing someone, I missed it. Mc-Cain is best known for his posts on #GamerGate — the hashtag for critics of a feminist crusade against sexism in the video game industry. GamerGate is one of those controversies that draws grievance seekers and social media trolls. Both sides McCain included — have been known to get overly personal. Last year, Twitter suspended McCain's account after he outed a feminist critic as a transexual McCain told me, "I had to delete some tweets and I was back in business."

Twitter has an absolute right to decide who can use its plat-

form and what constitutes overthe-top speech. Before the Truth & Safety Council, the tech giant also suspended the account of George Zimmerman — yes, the guy who killed Trayvon Martin — for posting topless photos of an ex-girlfriend.

In addition, every user has the ability to mute or block unwelcome voices — and hence can shield themselves from harassers. There's even a Twitter account that blocks accounts like McCain's old one and his followers. So I don't see why Twitter needs a council — unless its real purpose is to limit the speech of others.

I reached out to Sarkeesian: no response. I reached out to a woman who tweeted that McCain harassed her friend: no reply. McCain would talk. He noted that of the 40 organizations on the Twitter Council, many are left-leaning and none is conservative or libertarian. The Twitter Council is an echo chamber. "There are some people who just can't stand the idea that someone could have access to Twitter or anything, or a platform to be able to criticize them," McCain told me. They don't believe in freedom of expression for others. Free speech is not safe. And Jack Dorsey has made them Twitter's bouncers.

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



Did you ever wonder: Responsibility

x 21:7 says, "If a man will sell his daughter as a bondswoman." This next law that God gives concerns the status of young women or girls. Its location as second in

this list indicates its importance in God's laws. It concerns another situation that seems very barbaric

In ancient times women had little worth. Male children were put to work as soon as they were able to fulfill responsibility while girls were children they

were just another mouth to feed. Once they reached puberty and were suitable as brides, they brought income to their father in the form of a bride price. Once they began to age, they were often replaced with a younger wife.

If a father saw an opportunity to place his daughter with a wealthy family, he could sell her services as a maidservant. She would live in the master's house and serve as household help. In the bargain the master promised that he or his son would marry her when she became of age.

This law gives God's rules of how the girl is to be treated and to protect her from being abused.

Ex 21:12 – 15 deal with confrontations between men. These verses give detailed descriptions of the differences between accidental manslaughter and intentional murder. They give detailed descriptions of circumstances to be considered by the judges.

Verses 15 and 17 state that if a man strikes his mother or father or even curses them, he shall be put to death. This would have been ordered by the court and the sentence would have been death by stoning.

Verse 16 states that a kidnapper must also be put to death.

Next it switches to injuries incurred in a fight and who will be responsible. There are detailed instructions that the court hold the winner responsible for the loser's time in bed and lost wages.

If two men are fighting and accidentally injure a pregnant woman so that she miscarries but she does not die, the woman's husband sets the

amount of the loss to him. And the judges of the court will order him to

Verses 23 - 27 are very important and have become an important part of international law. Everybody quips "An eye for an eye." But few people understand its true meaning! It lists a life for a life, an eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth...'

Christians assume this means literally putting out an eye or knocking out a tooth of the perpetrator, and we think it is very barbaric. In Jewish law there has always been a list of the worth of a life, an eye or a tooth, etc. A monetary value is ascribed to each injury which the court assesses against the perpetrator.

Did you remember it is God who is dictating these laws to Moses? Did you realize this is the basis of our personal injury laws? Isn't it wonderful that we have such an awesome and caring God taking care of us?

Next He turns to responsibility for damage caused by animals that we own. My grandfather had a good bull that began attacking people, and he knew it was his responsibility. He had a ring put in the bull's nose and

the bull was very, very protective of that nose. I think this law also pertains to livestock that gets onto the highway. My grandfather always said, "Good fences make good neigh-

Another scenario covered by these laws concerns leaving a pit uncovered. Here again, man's greed comes into play. Everybody knows he should be responsible for dangerous conditions that he creates. A good example of this in our lives today is wells that have been abandoned without sealing them. A number of our children have fallen into them.

These are laws that our God created to help us control the evil inclination that we must contend with while we live on this planet. He knew we would need much strength of character and His constant surveillance and help.

One Baptism: Part one

s we continue our thoughts on the unity that should exist among disciples of Jesus, let us

be reminded of what the Apostle Paul wrote in Ephesians 4:1-6, *I therefore,* a prisoner for the

This article will discuss the one baptism to which the apostle refers. Again, just as with the concepts of

one hope of your calling – one Lord,

one faith, one baptism, one God and

Father of all, who is over all and

one body (church) and one faith (the system of belief) we do not see unity among those professing to follow Jesus, so it is the case with baptism as well. There is not enough space here for an exhaustive and thorough treatment of the subject, however, it is my desire to point out some facts concerning baptism that we find in scripture.

First of all, what type of baptism does Paul specify? Some say that baptism today is "Holy Spirit baptism" and some say that it is water baptism. Notice that it cannot be both since Paul wrote that there is only one. We do have two instances of Holy Spirit baptism recorded in the New Testament and if we look at those two events, we can understand the purpose of it.

First notice in Luke 24:49 the promise that Jesus made to his apostles, And behold, I am sending the promise of my Father upon you. But stay in the city until you are clothed with power from on high (ESV). Next look at Acts 1, which is written by Luke

and picks up where his gospel leaves off. Notice Acts 1:4-5, And while staying with them he ordered them not to depart from Jerusalem, but to wait for the promise of the Father, which, he said, "you heard from me; for John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now." (ESV) Right before his ascension. Jesus gave the apostles some additional information. Acts 1:8, But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth (ESV).

This promise is fulfilled in Acts 2 on the day of Pentecost (Acts 2:1-4). Peter tells the crowd that this is also a fulfillment of the things God had said through his prophet Joel (Acts 2:16). Holy Spirit baptism was specifically promised to the apostles by Jesus and it took place on Pentecost.

The second account is found in Acts 10. Luke records the first Gentiles being obedient to the gospel.

Peter was sent to preach to Cornelius and his household. The Holy Spirit fell on them (verse 44). This again was in fulfillment of Joel's prophecy which stated that God would pour out his Spirit upon all flesh (Joel 2:28; Acts 2:17). It was poured out upon the Jews (specifically the apostles) in Acts 2 and now upon the Gentiles in Acts 10. Peter when relating this moment to the congregation in Jerusalem would stress that this was heaven's stamp of approval upon the Gentiles being accepted by God through the gospel (see Acts 11:12-18;

Holy Spirit baptism was for a specific purpose. God fulfilled those purposes just as he promised. That leaves water baptism as the one baptism which the Apostle Paul was referring to. Lord willing, we will discuss more concerning the one baptism in our next article.

young friend wrote on his Facebook page, "Religion is still the opiate of the masses." He got some interesting responses. One person agreed with him. Another wrote, "It can't be. If it was, I

would take it for recreational purposes." Of course the statement originated with Karl Marx when he was developing the Communist Manifesto, the philosophical foundation that would eradicate religion in Russia for 75 years. When I visited Mos-

cow and Lenin's tomb 17 years ago, the hopeless despair left in atheism's wake was palpable.

My first inclination, like many, is to jump to the defense of religion. But that might not be the most thoughtful response. After all, religion killed Jesus. The Roman government reluctantly carried out the crucifixion only after Pilate had repeatedly tried to release Jesus concluding, "I find no fault in him." It was the religious leaders of Jerusalem who incited the crowds and demanded Jesus be cru-Mankind is incurably religious.

Every culture on every continent has spawned religion. And, more often than not, the results have not been good. 9-11 and the Twin Towers serve as a monuments to the deadly effects of Islamic Jihad. ISIS has terrorized the world. The Hindu caste system of India consigns millions to poverty without hope.

The Christian religion can also become corrupt, self-serving and self-absorbed. Perhaps Dan Brown's novel, The Da Vinci Code, found credibility with so many because they suspect that religion can become vicious if its survival is threatened. The mentally unstable often use religion to justify atrocities against the innocent. We cannot forget the 909 people, including women and children, who voluntarily drank cyanide out of religious devotion to Jim Jones in Guyana in 1978.

Sometimes religion is not just an opiate, it is a poison.

Jesus, on the other hand, makes people less selfish, more generous, fills them with hope and leads them to sacrificial efforts to help others. Jesus transformed a little Albanian girl named Agnes into Mother Teresa

who spent her life living among the poor of Calcutta and caring for them. Faith in Jesus made William Wilberforce the leader of reform in England to abolish slavery in the British Empire. Faith in Jesus Christ changed a backwoods playboy from North Carolina into Billy Graham who preached grace and forgiveness to millions. Faith in Jesus Christ catapulted Martin Luther King Jr from the backstreets of Atlanta into the forefront of the Civil Rights move-

The list goes on. Jesus Christ goes beyond religion. He transforms us into better people and the world into a better place.

Women lose must-win, Hawks fall to NMJC

HOBBS, N.M. — The Howard College Lady Hawks (18-12, 7-7) were eliminated from the postseason Thursday, falling to first-place New Mexico junior College (27-2, 14-0) 59-51.

Howard fell to fifth in the conference at 7-7, while Odessa College and South Plains College improved to 8-6 with wins Thursday night. Midland College finished second with a conference record of 11-3.

Howard struggled at the beginning of each half, being outscored in the first quarter 15-4 and in the third quarter 21-10.

"I thought we never recovered from our slow start," Howard head coach Earl Diddle told KBYG radio. "And the other thing is we had a really tough time getting away from them defensively. They've got great quickness."

Howard guard Ashlyn Hoover finished with a game-high 17 points, but the Lady Hawks' bench was outscored 31-13 by the NMJC bench.

The Lady Hawks started the year on a hot streak in conference play. They put themselves in position for a playoff run with five wins in their first six conference games, but it wasn't enough to overcome a 2-6 record in their final eight games.

"We had some great success early, and then I thought we got a little complacent and then it kind of caught up to us a little bit. I don't think we ran out of gas, I just think we got a little complacent and thinking 'Oh, now we're going to go,' and it just doesn't work like that," Diddle said.

Though the season didn't end the way the Lady Hawks wanted, Diddle was still proud of his team.

"This has been a really good group to work with. Overall, I thought this team performed remarkably well throughout the season," he said. "I'm pleased with our sophomores, but I think we needed to score a lot more in the post than what we did, but that's the way it is."

Even without a tournament berth, Howard still exceeded many expectations that come with a team with a lot of freshman and not a lot of height. That



bodes well for a potential top four finish next year, when key players like Ashlyn and Camille Hoover, Marie Tsoungui, Audrey Sutterfield and Aubrie Elliot return. Diddle also gave a glimpse of a couple future Lady Hawks.

"We've got a commitment from a 6'1" girl from Del Rio, Texas, and we've got a commitment from a 6'4" center from Rwanda, Africa. So we've got some real pieces," he said. "We've got to get some guard

Manziel's domestic violence case going to grand jury

DALLAS (AP) — Dallas police said Thursday they have referred their domestic violence case against Johnny Manziel to a grand jury, which will consider whether to charge the troubled Cleveland Browns quarterback on allegations that he attacked his exgirlfriend.

Police released a statement saying they have asked the Dallas County District Attorney's Office to present a misdemeanor assault case to the local grand jury. Such a charge carries a maximum punishment of one year in jail and a \$4,000 fine.

Manziel's attorney, Bradley Beckworth, didn't immediately return an email seeking comment Thursday. Manziel's agent and marketing agency have both dropped him, and the Browns have indicated they will release Manziel as early as March 9, when the league begins its new calendar year.

The 2012 Heisman Trophy winner and Texas A&M star was accused by ex-girlfriend Colleen Crowley of hitting her and threatening to kill her during a night out on Jan. 30. Crowley said Manziel accosted her at a Dallas hotel and later struck her when they drove back to her apartment in Fort Worth.

Crowley said in court documents that he hit her so hard, she temporarily lost hearing in one ear.

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JPP sues ESPN HAWKS

NEW YORK (AP) — Giants defensive end Jason Pierre-Paul filed a lawsuit Wednesday against ESPN and reporter Adam Schefter for posting his medical records last summer.

The lawsuit, filed in Miami Dade County in Florida, alleges that Pierre-Paul's privacy was violated — as was the state's medical records statute — by the report after the player severely injured his right hand in a fireworks accident on July 4.

The New York Post first reported the lawsuit Wednesday night.

According to Pierre-Paul's lawyers, Mitchell Schuster and Kevin Fritz, Schefter "improperly obtained" the defensive end's medical chart, which showed he had his right index finger amputated at Jackson Memorial Hospital

According to Florida statute 456.057, patients' medical records can't be given to or discussed with anyone not involved in their care — something the suit alleges Schefter violated.

Schefter posted a photo of Pierre-Paul's chart on July 8 on Twitter, where he currently has more than 4.5 million follow-

"This action arises out of ESPN reporter Schefter's blatant disregard for the private and confidential nature of Plaintiff's medical records," the lawsuit states, "all so Schefter could show the world that he had 'supporting proof' of a surgical procedure."

In a later interview with Sports Illustrated, Schefter said he "could have and should have done even more to protect (Pierre-Paul's) medical records," according to the lawsuit.

all pick a "flip of the coin" between Wentz and California quarterback Jared Goff. NFL Network analyst Mike Mayock compared Wentz's ceiling to Indianapolis Colts star Andrew

That reference made Wentz blush a bit during his interview with reporters at the annual scouting combine.

"Those guys have already proven themselves. We're all just college kids coming out trying to make a name for ourself," Wentz said.

Goff and Wentz, interestingly, have been training together this winter in Irvine, California.

"He's going to be really good wherever he goes," Goff said.

Wentz's de facto agent at the combine, former North Dakota State teammate and left tackle Joe Haeg, was predictably just as confident about his close friend's ability to step into the league and become the next Joe Flacco, Tony Romo or Steve McNair, all quarterbacks who made successful leaps from FCS schools to the NFL. Flacco and McNair were first-round draft picks.

"If you would've asked me two or three years ago, I definitely would've said he has the potential to be a firstround pick," Haeg said. "You see what he does off the field, and then you see what he does on the field. There's no question. The guy is so committed to the game. He's just a master of his

In 2011, when Wentz was a redshirt, Haeg said, "Carson was the best quar-

terback our defense faced." The schedule that year included a Big Ten foe at Minnesota, which the Bison beat 37-

"Whenever we play an FBS team, the first thing that we say when we come out of that first drive is, 'These guys aren't as good as you think,'" Haeg said.

North Dakota State had seven former players in the NFL last season, plus Jacksonville head coach Gus Bradley. San Francisco general manager Trent Baalke started his coaching career there. "I know just how much people re-

spect his play on the field, but I think as you get a chance to meet him as a person it'll even climb even higher," Bradley said.

Bradley's Jaguars won't be looking for a quarterback with the No. 5 pick, but Baalke's 49ers might be at No. 7.

"He's got the stature you're looking for. He's got the intelligence you're looking for. There are so many positives to draw from," Baalke said. "Now, how ready is he going to be when he gets to the league? I think there will be a learning curve, but there is for everybody at that posi-

So how do the NFL evaluators take into account those game tapes that Wentz produced against FCS teams, when an equally alluring prospect like Goff was putting together his resume against Oregon, Stanford and

"Do they dominate?" Arizona head coach Bruce Arians said. "They need to dominate at that level. They can't just be a good player at that level. They have to dominate the competition, and they have to have a swagger about them to be able to come into a locker room of SEC guys and other guys with a chip on their shoulder."

Wherever Wentz winds up, whether in Cleveland or San Francisco or elsewhere, he'll be in a larger market on a bigger stage with greater responsibilities than he's ever experienced in Bismarck or Fargo.

A longtime Dallas criminal defense attorney, Pete Schulte, said police handling of the Manziel case was puzzling. Based on Crowley's affidavit, Schulte said police likely had enough information to at least charge Manziel. Misdemeanor cases like the one Manziel is facing are typically decided by police, not a grand jury, Schulte said.

"I think they're giving Johnny more of the benefit of the doubt than they give every other citizen they deal with," he said.

Crowley requested and was granted a protective order against the 23-year-old quarterback that prevents him from seeing her for two years. The order also requires Manziel to stay at least 500 feet from her home and place of work, and that he pay \$12,000 in legal fees.

Crowley alleged she and Manziel had a confrontation in a Dallas hotel room, which eventually continued downstairs to the valet station. She said he forced her into a car and a valet disregarded her pleas for help. The two eventually drove to where her car was parked in front of a Dallas bar, she said in an affidavit. She accused Manziel of getting into the driver's

seat and beginning to drive her.

She said she tried to jump out, but he stopped the car, dragged her back inside and hit her.

She said Manziel threatened to kill himself as he drove her back to Fort Worth, about 30 miles west of Dallas, where police were called.

Dallas police announced on Feb. 5 that they were investigating the case, one day after they issued a statement saying they considered the case to be closed.

In the wake of the allegations, Manziel's father said the family had made two recent, unsuccessful attempts to get him into a rehab clinic.



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


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
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NASA's 'Iron Man' coming back to Earth

Astronaut coming home after nearly a year on ISS

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — After nearly a year in orbit, America's spaceendurance champ, Scott Kelly, is just a few days away from returning to Earth — and he can't wait.

Kelly held his final news conference from the International Space Station on Thursday. He told reporters that space is a "harsh environment," and you never feel perfectly normal. From a hygiene perspective, he said, he feels as if he has been camping in the woods for a year. From a physical point of view, though, he feels "pretty good."

The toughest part? Being isolated from loved ones, a situation that will pose even more of a challenge for astronauts sent to

Despite all this, Kelly said he could go another 100 days or even another year "if I had to."

By the time he comes home, he will have spent 340 consecutive days aloft, a U.S. record. The world record is 438 days, set by a Russian cosmonaut in the 1990s. Even that will pale in comparison to a Mars exround trip.

Scientists hope to learn much from Kelly's mission to pave the way to Mars in another two decades; they also will collect data from his Russian roommate for the year, Mikhail Kornienko.

Along with Kornienko, Kelly will check Houston.

out of the space station Tuesday, riding a Russian capsule back to the planet to end NASA's longest space flight. They will land in Kazakhstan. Then Kelly will be hustled home to

The 52-year-old astronaut said he can't wait to jump in his pool and dine at a real table with friends and family.

Kelly rocketed away last March on a research-packed mission, leaving behind two daughters and his girlfriend. He lightened things up recently by donning a gorilla suit a gag gift from his identical twin, retired astronaut Mark Kelly — and cavorting through the station.

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
