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Trump mixing business with politics as he campaigns

WEST PALM BEACH, Florida — Republican presidential front-runner Donald Trump appeared to be wrapping up a victory speech at his sprawling Mar-a-Lago club earlier this week when he turned to the negative ads flooding the airwaves against him.

Trump recalled being at a profes-

sional golf tournament held at his Miami golf course recently. Everything was going smoothly, he said, until one of the ads started playing on TV as he schmoozed with tournament

"I'm with these wonderful people from Cadillac and all these top execu-

'Look over there! Look! Don't watch it! No, you don't want watch it!" "Trump said, re-enacting how he tried to distract them. "I'm saying, 'Isn't the grass beautiful?

campaign has transformed day-today life. But it also underscored something deeper: As he

crisscrosses the coun-

try delivering speeches at rallies and calling into cable news shows, Trump's business ventures are never far from his mind and have been playing an increasingly prominent role in his campaign.

In recent weeks, Trump has held election night parties at three of his Florida properties: golf clubs in Jupiter and West Palm Beach, Florida, and twice at his sprawling Mar-a-Lago club nearby. Each evening, members of Trump's clubs have been invited to observe the festivities, followed or preceded by lavish dinners or cocktail parties. Reporters have



District 19 congressional hopefuls Arrington, Robertson gear up campaigns as they prepare for the all-important May runoff election

With Super Tuesday behind him and only a few months away from the election that really matters, District 19 congressional hopeful Jodey Arrington is spending most of his free time campaigning and meeting with the citizens of the district.

Backed with endorsements from the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal and the Texas Farm Bureau, Arrington continues his campaign around the West Texas region that he has always called home.

"I grew up in the farming community," said Arrington, a Plainview native. "My dad sold tractors and my mom was a public school teacher. My upbringing really has shaped my beliefs, values, and view of politics.'

Arrington got an early

Robertson, who also serves as the Ports-to-Plains committee treasurer, met with Big Spring's Greater Rotary Club recently to discuss Ports-to-Plains and the ongoing campaign to ensure that I-27 will run through Big Spring.

left to vie to be the Republican candidate for the U.S. President in the November general election — Donald Trump, a businessman; Ted Cruz, U.S. Senator from Texas; and John Kasich, Governor of Ohio. Although Trump leads the back in delegate numbers, Cruz easily won

the Texas primary on March both overall in the state and in Howard

According to the Republican party website, the party believes in limited government with the largest control on the local level. The party was established in 1854 as a reaction to the Kansas-Nebraska Act that allowed slave or free status to be decided in territories by popular sovereignty, according to History.com.

would be better suited for the position of District 19 congressman.

"I am a former small business owner myself," explained Robertson. "I have dealt with the consequences of the vote of elected officials. Jodey is a lifetime bureaucrat. I've lived in the rural world my whole life and I have never been apart of the Washington elite."

A few days before the March 1 primary, Robertson launched an ad campaign attacking opponents Arrington and former Dyess base commander Michael Bob Starr. Along with television ads, Robertson's campaign purchased websites under the domain names ringtonfortexas.com and michaelbobstarrfortexas.com characterizing Arrington as a "Washington insider" and Starr as "supported by the radical gay lobby".



"Arrington talks about his successes at FDIC and with the Katrina fund, but his record didn't match up," Robertson said, explaining the controversial ads. "He runs on a strong ag campaign, but he's never been involved. In

regards to Starr, he has hid behind the troops. He tried to intimidate me at the Levelland debate. He shows himself as a man with conviction but his history proves something else."

"I thought voters needed to

know what was going on," Robertson continued. "My ads were 100 percent factual. It is all proven and on public record."

However, some of Robertson's former opponents have publicly spoken out in favor

of Robertson's campaign. Jason Corley, who was running for the District 19 slot in the primary but lost to Arrington and Robertson, has officially given Robertson his endorsement for the position.

"Jason became one of my dear friends during the campaign," said Robertson. "We got along really well. He called me the day after the election and and asked about endorsing me. There were no strings attached. I appreciate his endorsement and I think he definitely has a future in politics."

Robertson said he wanted to protect smaller communities like the ones in Howard

"I understand wind energy and support the VA hospital," said Robertson. "We have a very diverse economy. Although Abilene and Lubbock are the largest cities in the district, there are more people that live outside those two cities than inside. I am here to protect the smaller communities."

jumpstart into the political arena while he was earning his masters degree at Texas Tech University. Arrington received an internship with then Texas Gov. George W. Bush. According to Arrington, he connected with Bush and was hired to be his advisor.

"I would meet with him (Bush) and make recommendations him about a variety of things," explained Arrington. "When he became the president I would meet with him once a week in the Oval Office ... I owe a lot of my experience to President Bush."

Arrington said part of his job as an advisor to the president was to assemble the agriculture and energy team and work with the president's appointed cabinet to advise Bush on decision-making. rington said that the same decision-making skills he learned during Bush's administration have guided him through his different career paths at the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) and at Texas Tech.

"It all comes down to who has experience and

a record that shows tangible results," said Arrington. "When it comes to results in the state, region, and district, it's me. I have a proven, public leadership track record."

Arrington lists border security, the national debt, and local agriculture and energy as his top priorities if he were to be elected. On a regional level, Arrington said he will "champion for rural West Texas and the Big Country and specifically work with Big Spring with its healthcare needs".

"I want to put American farmers on an even playing field," said Arrington. "I support policies that support American farmers. I will provide vigilant oversight to regulatory agencies who are overregulating beyond their powers in a way that is

destructive to the oil

and gas industry." In regards to competitor Glen Robertson's controversial "attack" ads a few days before the March 1 primary, Arrington said he was surprised to see them.

"For him to put those out in the 11th hour of the race, it was surprising," said Arrington. "It was Washington style gutter politics. In the short term, it helped him stay alive in the race, but in the long

term I think it will catch up."

The primary race was tight. In the March 1 primary, Robertson pulled ahead in Howard County with 805 votes to Arrington's 514, but in the district as a whole, Arrington was just behind Robertson by 912 votes with Robertson earning 26,848 and Arrington earning 25,936. Abilene's Colonel Michael Bob Starr, who was also a recipient of Robertson's "attack

also been invited to transmit images Trump's particular brand of opulence to the world.

From the beginning of

his campaign, Trump has pointed to his business success as his fundamental qualification for the job of president. He likes to say his "whole life" has been about making money, and now he wants to make money for the United States. He often references his assets and projects — from the skating rink in Manhattan's Central Park, which he rebuilt, to his many skyscrapers — as evidence of what distinguishes him from what he describes as the "all talk, no action politi-

Trump's financial disclosure form released in July listed nearly

500 business entities owned at least partially by Trump, according to the campaign, as well as income from a web of sources ranging from rovalties from his books to stocks and speaking fees.

But Trump often sounds like he's promoting products he profits from, such as the WGC-Cadillac Championship. Of particular pride in recent months has been his transformation of Washington, D.C.'s Old Post Office Pavilion into a hotel.

"We're building a magnificent hotel," Trump bragged to the crowd gathered at a Tampa convention center for a town hall-style event this week. "I don't even like to say that I'm two years ahead of schedule. I am actually two years ahead. I don't like to say it. You know why? You know why? Because it doesn't sound believ-

Trump's business ven-

tures have also left him open to attack from his rivals. Lawsuits filed against Trump's now-defunct "Trump University" business course program by former students accusing him of fraud, for instance, have been featured in attacks ads and the issue has been

raised on the debate stage. And Trump, who is synonymous with his brand, has been fighting back, at one point having staff set up displays of various Trumpbranded products at a recent event to try to prove that the products

The first one is in spring, the Festival of Matzos. Matzos is unleavened bread like the Israelites carried with them when they left Egypt.

It is also called Passover because this commemorates when the Death Angel passed through Egypt. The firstborn was killed in every house

The Hebrews who loved God had placed the blood on the doorposts,

and they were spared. This is worth celebrating.

Later, when the Romans forced pagan holidays on the Christians, this was changed to Easter. Ashtera was the Roman goddess of fertility, hence baby chickens and baby rab-

The next holy day is the Festival of Harvest or Shavuot. In Hebrew, Shavout means 'weeks.' They count off 49 days or seven weeks from Passover. Shavuot falls exactly 50 days after Passover. As Greek became the dominant lan-

guage this holy day became known as Pentecost, which means 50 in

Grain planted in the spring, just before or after Passover, would be ripe enough to harvest in 50 days.

At that time in history all people were agrarian; in order to have food for his family, a man must raise grain.

Other peoples around the Hebrews attributed a good harvest to Mother Nature. They thought this idol controlled the seasons, weather, rainfall and bountiful crops. God wanted His people to come to Jerusalem and celebrate with Him that they had a good stand of grain ready to cut. The Festival of the Ingathering,

Sukkot, is a joyous celebration after the hard work of the summer. In celebration of this holy day, God told the Hebrews to live in booths or tents for seven days. This was to remind them that they lived in tents when He led them through the wilderness for 40 years.

Sukkot falls either in September or October because the Hebrew calendar is figured on the lunar cycles and the Roman calendar is figured on the solar cycles.

The sages say it was during this holy day that Jesus, Yeshua, was

At that time Romans had conquered Israel. The Roman census ordered every Israelite to return to the city of his tribe to be counted. Since Joseph and Mariam were of

the tribe of Judah, they traveled to Bethlehem, the city of David.

The city was overflowing with people needing lodging, and there was no room available for them. The kindly innkeeper allowed Joseph and Miriam to stay in the sukkah he had built outside for the festival.

hat a blessing a good father can be. Fathers love their family. They provide for them and protect them. A good

father will raise his children, training and preparing them for adulthood.

At least, that's the ideal situation. Not everyone is blessed to have a father like that. Some people never even know their father and that is very sad.

The Bible tells us that we have a Father who is better than any earthly

father could be. We have a heavenly Father (Matthew 6:9,14,26). Everyone who has ever lived is a child of

God from a physical perspective. In Luke's account of the genealogy of Christ, he works his way backwards in time, tracing the lineage of Jesus all the way back to Adam, the son of God (Luke 3:38). He is our Father because he created us.

However, he didn't create us as physical beings only. He created humanity in his image (Genesis 1:26-27). We are more than a body – we have a spirit within us that was given by God (Zechariah 12:1). In the beginning (Garden of Eden), it was a perfect relationship. They were in the presence of God. He would come and walk in the garden (Genesis 3:8).

Sin severed that ideal relationship. Because of sin Adam and Eve were cast out of paradise. Isaiah 59:1-2, Behold, the LORD's hand is not shortened, that it cannot save, or his ear dull, that it cannot hear; but your

iniquities have made a separation between you and your God, and your sins have hidden his face from you so that he does not hear (ESV). 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Reflections: the young Messiah

s we approach Easter, Hollywood has again released new movies about the life of Jesus. This year, The Young Messiah, the story of Jesus as a

child wrestling with the dawning discovery of his identity as the Son of God.

We don't know much about Jesus' childhood. For the most part, the Bible is silent regarding these years. We do know that Joseph took his family to Egypt fol-



soldiers fell upon the small village slaughtering all the male children under the age of two. Joseph made a home for the family in Egypt and waited. When Herod

departure from Bethlehem, Herod's

died, they returned to their childhood home of Nazareth. Matthew points out that this was a fulfillment of the Messianic prophecy, "Out of Egypt I called My Son." (Matthew 2:15). The movie focuses on this event, when Jesus was a child returning with his family to Naza-

The movie is based on a book written by Anne Rice, Christ the Lord, Out of Egypt. The book and the movie try to imagine what Jesus would have been like as a child, how He and His family would have wrestled with the growing awareness of His identity. The Bible only tells us that "He grew in wisdom and stature and in favor with God and man."

Almost as interesting as the movie's plot is the journey of the author who wrote the book upon which it is based. Anne Rice grew to fame writing the Vampire Chronicles while professing to be an atheist.

She shocked the secular world

when, in 2002, she announced she was done with vampires. After thirty-eight years as a professed atheist, she said she had found faith in Christ and returned to the Catholic Church. Eight years later, she rocked the Christian world by proclaiming she was renouncing Christianity. She stated, "For those who care, and I understand if you don't: Today I quit being a Christian. I'm out. I remain committed to Christ as always but not to being "Christian" or to being part of Christianity." She went on to say, "My faith in Christ is central to my life. My conversion from a pessimistic atheist lost in a world I didn't understand, to an optimistic believer in a universe created and sustained by a loving God is crucial to me." Anne represents many who con-

tinue to believe in Christ but have left organized Christian churches. George Barna, the leading researcher on faith in America, reported in 2008 that "a majority of adults now

believe that there are various biblically legitimate alternatives to participation in a conventional church." It appears that there is a growing number of people who claim faith in Jesus but want little or nothing to do with the institutional church.

Worldwide, we are witnessing the largest growth in the number of Jesus followers in history. In China, some estimate that more than 30,000 new believers are baptized every day. The number of believers in Africa grew from 9 million to 360 million in the last century. More Muslims have come to faith in Christ in the last two decades than at any other time in history. Churches, what they look like and how they function, are changing while the number of Jesus followers is growing.



Godwin shines, bats come alive for Steers

The Big Spring Steers (6-9) beat the Seminole Indians 7-2 Thursday behind solid team hitting and another quality start from senior Anthony Godwin.

Godwin gave up only one earned run on seven hits in his seven innings pitched, adding seven strikeouts along the way. He changed speeds consistently and didn't have any problems locating and getting the Seminole hitters out in front of his off-speed pitches. He finished with 108 pitches thrown.

"That's a typical Anthony Godwin outing. He's going to throw strikes and if we're making plays in the field and we're hitting the ball, it's going to be a good quick game and we're going to have a chance to win," Big Spring head coach Bobby Smith said. "The last time he threw, he threw just as well and we just didn't hit the ball. He's done that the last two years. He's going to look the same every time, and you know he's going to throw strikes and he's going to keep you off balance. Just a great job by number 33 again."

After a scoreless first two innings, Seminole got on the board in the top of the third to take a 2-0 lead. Dylan Marquez led off the bottom half for Big Spring with a single, and advanced to second on an error. Noah Perez followed with a single that scored Marquez and the Steers got within a run. Godwin would walk, and a sacrifice by Riley Henson gave the Steers runners at second and third. Preston Alexander followed with a groundout, but it was enough to get the game-tying run home from

"We preach all the time that it's about responding. Sometimes things are going to go bad, and I don't like to say 'react' because sometimes when you react, you react the wrong way. We like to say 'respond' because when it goes bad, you've got to respond. Doesn't matter if it's a game of baseball or if it's life. When something goes wrong, you respond, you pick yourself up, and you try to make something good out of it. And we did that tonight," said Smith.

The Steers ended the game on a 7-0 run that included a three-run fifth inning, highlighted by a two-out, two-RBI single by Elijah Munoz. He finished 1-for-4 with the two RBIs and a stolen base. Marquez and Perez had great days at the bottom of the lineup, going 2-for-2 and 2-for-3, respectively, with a combined two RBIs and two runs scored.

"We made the plays that we're supposed to make. There weren't any all-star plays, they were just routine plays and that's what we made today. The only thing out of the ordinary was that we hit the ball well tonight. We haven't been doing that all year long. We've had some guys that have been hitting all year long, but as a whole team, getting runners on and hitting the ball and putting it in play, it was a great job tonight. We need to do that every night," Smith said.

The Steers travel to Monahans to take on the Loboes at 1 p.m. today and have a home game at 1 p.m. Saturday against Lubbock Christian. It was also announced that the 7 p.m. game on March 25 against Levelland will include a pre-game memorial service for Dylan Lance, a Big Spring High School student and Steer baseball player who died in a car accident

Martin helps Butler pull away, top Texas Tech 71-61

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — Butler coach Chris Holtmann wasn't overly concerned when his second-leading scorer Kelan Martin played a quiet first half to open the NCAA Tourna-

No need to worry, he figured. Not the way Martin — and these Bulldogs, for that matter — can break loose, get out in transition and score in bunches.

"He rolls out of bed ready to score the ball," Holtmann said.

Martin proved his coach right, too, hitting consecutive 3-pointers during a critical second-half stretch to help Butler beat Texas Tech 71-61 in

Thursday's first round of the NCAA Tournament.

Kellen Dunham scored 23 points to lead the Bulldogs (22-10), including a critical 3 of his own with 2:29 left as the Midwest Region's No. 9 seed pulled away in the final minutes. Butler shot 52 percent after halftime, using some NCAA Tournament experience to rally from an early eight-point deficit and push ahead midway through the second half.

Butler is in the tournament for the eighth time in 10 years, and now has won at least one game in eight of its last nine appearances.

Martin, a 6-foot-6 sophomore, came in averaging 16.1 points but had gone

scoreless on 0-for-4 shooting when he scored 11 points in the final 8½ min-

"I know I didn't score the first half or the beginning of the second half," Martin said, "But Coach was telling me on the bench just let the game come to me — it's going to come, I'm going make plays — but just impact the game defensively and rebound-

He first hit a 3-pointer in transition to snap a 48-all tie with 8:22 left. Then, after a miss by Texas Tech, Roosevelt Jones found Martin again for another 3 - a shot that rolled around the inside of the rim at least twice before finally dropping through the net.

"Those 3s that Kelan Martin made were a dagger," Texas Tech coach Tubby Smith said.

And coming out of a timeout, Martin

followed with a steal and a breakaway dunk for a personal 8-0 spurt that suddenly had Butler up 56-48 with about $7\frac{1}{2}$ minutes left.

That shifted momentum to the Bulldogs, who played from in front the rest of the way. Dunham buried his late 3 to push the lead to nine and all

but seal the win. Devaugntah Williams scored 18 points to lead the eighth-seeded Red

Raiders (19-13), who were making their first tournament appearance since 2007. But Texas Tech made just 2 of 9 shots to close the game as Butler began to take over in the critical mo-

Smith had made history with this group in his third season at Texas Tech by becoming only the second coach to take five schools to the NCAAs. The Red Raiders shot 46 percent in this one, but had trouble keeping up with Dunham all afternoon — and Martin during the game-changing sequence.

Women's NCAA Tournament set to tip off with 16 games Friday

Let the madness begin — in the women's NCAA Tournament.

While the men's tourney is already under way, Friday marks the start of the women's quest for the Final Four with 16 first-round games set to be played. Top seeds Baylor and South Carolina are in action, and we probably won't see a 16-seed upset them — although it has happened once before.

The opening round will be a chance to watch some lesserknown stars play, such as Army's Kelsey Minato, George Washington's Jonquel Jones and Albany's Shereesha Richards. Friday will also be a chance to see seventh-seeded Tennessee. The Lady Vols, who have their worst seed ever, are out in Tempe, Arizona, facing a very talented Green Bay squad.

Maybe this will be the year that a No. 14 or 15 seed finally wins a game in the women's tournament. New Mexico State, Buffalo, Troy and Central Arkansas will try and break the drought.

Texas A&M looking for respect

CITY (AP) — Danuel House cringed as soon as heard the word "overlooked" during a question about Texas A&M's season on Thursday.

It was inevitable after Kentucky coach John Calipari said earlier in the week he felt the fourth-seeded Wildcats should have been seeded higher in the NCAA Tournament than the Aggies after their

Baylor makes 2nd straight first-|WOMEN round exit from NCAA tourney

PROVIDENCE, (AP) — Baylor entered the NCAA Tournament hoping to wipe away the raw feelings from its first-round exit a year ago on a last-second

It left with another heartbreaking loss.

Taurean Prince scored 28 points, but the fifthseeded Bears were unable to stop Makai Mason and lost 79-75 to Yale on Thursday. Mason had a career-high 31 points, including six of the Bulldogs' final nine points.

Baylor (22-12) lost its tournament opener last season on a last-second 3-pointer in Georgia State's memorable vic-

"I thought Yale did a great job in the second half making things tough for us to score," Bears coach Scott Drew said. "We only shot 38 percent. But I thought Mason really controlled the game."

Johnathan Motley added 15 points and seven rebounds for Baylor, which shot 44 percent from the field. The Bears kept pace with

an energized Yale team in the first half, trailing by five at the break. They quickly tied the game in the opening minutes of the second half, but were also dominated inside and trailed by as many as 13 with about seven minutes to play.

"We just got outrebounded and they played harder than us the whole 40 minutes," Prince

Yale (23-6) earned its first NCAA Tournament victory. It comes in its first appearance since 1962.

Justin Sears scored 18 points for the Bulldogs, and Brandon Sherrod finished with 10. "This was bigger than us.

and we wanted to do it for all the Yale faithful out there," Sears said. "It's great right now. I don't think it's really hit us how big this is yet." Yale played a chunk of the

second half without Sears and Sherrod after both picked up their fourth fouls. Both returned with just over four minutes to play.

Even after their return, Baylor kept eating away at the Bulldogs' lead and eventually closed to 76-75.

Baylor applied full-court pressure on the inbounds play, but Yale got a long pass into Nick Victor, who was fouled with 6.8 seconds left.

Victor connected on the first. but air-balled the second attempt. Baylor got the ball into Lester Medford. He slipped on his way to the basket, turning it over.

"I think the biggest thing anyone can mistake is where someone. what conference. what school, whatever, that's what makes March Madness March Madness," Drew said. "It's not who's the best team four out of seven games like the NBA. It's who's best for that 40 minutes. Yale was better than us today for 40 minutes, and that's why they won this game."

MARCH SUCCESS: First-year Green Bay coach Linc Darner will make his tournament debut, but he is no stranger to postseason success — having led Division II Florida Southern to a national championship last season. Including Green Bay's Horizon League championship run two weeks ago, Darner has won 13 straight games in March. "We can just go out and play and relax and have fun," Darner said.

LATE-SEASON RUN: Texas A&M's tournament hopes appeared in jeopardy last month after it lost four straight games and five of six overall. However, following a 76-71 loss at LSU on Feb. 13, the Aggies won eight straight games before losing in the SEC championship game to Kentucky. The winning streak included an overtime win over the Wildcats, giving the Aggies plenty of confidence entering the tourna-

QUICK SUCCESS: After playing with a slowed-down, defensive-first approach the last few seasons, the Phoenix embraced Darner's up-tempo "RP 40" style this season. The motto stands for "Relentless Pressure for 40 minutes," and it applies to both ends of the court. One of the biggest benefactors of the new approach has been senior guard Carrington Love, who is averaging a career-high 17.7 points per game this season after averaging 10 a year ago.

NCAA EXPERIENCE: Texas A&M senior Anthony Collins is the only player in the game who has played in the NCAA Tournament. The guard, who transferred from South Florida, helped the Bulls reach the third round in 2012.

That certainly got the notice of the Lady Bears (33-1), who went on to sweep the Big 12 regular-season and tournament championships for the sixth year in a row. "I think it grabbed our

attention right out of the gates. I think it made us think about not the end result, but the next game more so than any team I've ever had," coach Kim Mulkey said before the Lady Bears' NCAA opener on their home court Friday against Idaho. "You could not afford to lose another one. Because you didn't know what it was going to take to win the Big 12, and I just know that got our attention."

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
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This Date In History

Today is Friday, March 18, the 78th day of 2016. There are 288 days left in the year. Today's Highlight

History: On March 18, 1766, Britain repealed the Stamp Act of 1765.

On this date: In 1837, the 22nd and 24th president of the United States, Grover Cleveland, was born in

Caldwell, New Jersey. In 1910, the first filmed adaptation of Mary Shelley's novel "Frankenstein," a silent short produced by Thomas Edison's New York movie studio, was

released.

In 1925, the Tri-State Tornado struck southeastern Missouri, southern Illinois and southwestern Indiana, resulting in some 700 deaths. In 1937, some 300 people,

mostly children, were killed in a gas explosion at a school in New London, Texas. In 1940, Adolf Hitler and

Benito Mussolini met at the Brenner Pass where the Italian agreed to join dictator Germany's war against France and Britain.

In 1959, President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed the Hawaii statehood bill. (Hawaii became a state on Aug. 21, 1959.)

In 1962, France and Algerian rebels signed the Evian Accords, a cease-fire agreement which took effect the next day, ending the Algerian War. In 1965, the first spacewalk

took place as Soviet cosmonaut Alexei Leonov went outside his Voskhod 2 capsule, secured by a tether. Farouk I, the former king of Egypt, died in exile in Rome. In 1974, most of the Arab oil-

producing nations ended their 5-month-old embargo against the United States that had been sparked by American support for Israel in the Yom Kippur War. In 1980, Frank Gotti, the 12-year-old youngest son of

mobster John Gotti, was struck

and killed by a car driven by

John Favara, a neighbor in

Queens, New York. (The follow-

ing July, Favara vanished, the apparent victim of a gang hit.) In 1990, thieves made off with 13 works of art from the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum in Boston (the crime remains

unsolved). In 1996, rejecting an insanity defense, a jury in Dedham, Massachusetts, convicted John C. Salvi III of murdering two women in attacks at two Bostonarea abortion clinics in Dec. 1994. (Salvi later committed

suicide in his prison cell.) Ten years ago: Thousands of anti-war protesters took to the streets around the world, mark-


ing the third anniversary of the U.S.-led invasion of Iraq. Five years ago: President

Barack Obama demanded that Moammar Gadhafi halt all military attacks on civilians and said that if the Libyan leader did not stand down, the United States would join other nations in launching military action against him. Former Secretary of State Warren M. Christopher died in Los Angeles at 85. Princess Antoinette of Monaco, the late Prince Rainier III's oldest sister and a prominent advocate for animal rights, died at 90.


