
Gather the family and grab the Easter baskets, it is time to go egg hunting.

News in brief

Reports: 2nd suspect believed in Brussels subway attack BRUSSELS (AP) — A second attacker is suspected

of taking part in the bombing this week of a Brussels subway train and may be at large, according to Belgian and French media reports, amid growing signs that the same Islamic State cell was behind the attacks in Brussels and bloodshed in Paris last year.

The chief suspect in the Paris attacks, Salah Abdeslam, is facing a hearing in Brussels on Thursday morning after his arrest last week in the Belgian capital. Belgian authorities have charged him with terror offenses, and French authorities are seeking his extradition.

The Islamic State group claimed responsibility for the attacks in Brussels and Paris, which have laid bare European security failings and prompted calls for better intelligence cooperation.

Belgian prosecutors have said at least four people were involved in Tuesday's attacks on the Brussels airport and a subway train, including brothers Ibrahim and Khalid El Bakraoui, identified as suicide bombers. European security officials identified another suicide bomber as Najim Laachraoui, a suspected bombmaker for the Paris attacks.

Prosecutors have said another suspected participant in the airport attack is at large. Belgian state broadcaster RTBF and France's Le Monde and BFM television reported Thursday that a fifth attacker may also be at large: a man filmed by surveillance cameras in the Brussels metro on Tuesday carrying a large bag alongside Khalid El Bakraoui. RTBF said it is not clear whether that man was killed in the attack.

History points to limited economic pain from Belgium attacks

LONDON (AP) — Financial markets barely registered this week's attacks in Brussels, which killed more than 30 people, a sign that investors think the economic impact on Belgium and across Europe as a whole will be limited. Recent history suggests they may be right.

The experience of terror attacks in Europe in the past decade have helped the business community keep their cool in the face of horrors like this week's deadly bombings at the Brussels airport and subway. Firms have gotten better in their responses. From

identifying personnel, to clearing offices or sanctioning remote working, even at recovery sites, they manage to contain the disruption. The people have shown a willingness to get back to life as usual as soon as they can, whether it be shopping, boarding a train or having a meal. And governments learn to put in place security measures they hope will deter more attacks.





Forever Changing


Think you're following the same rules of grammar that your grandparents or parents did? Think again. While you might have been taught some of the same rules, you might also be learning some new ones. That's because the English language is constantly changing.

Listen to your grandparents or parents chat. Now, listen to some teens chat. Hear a difference? Chances are you do. Computers, cell phones and technology in general have led younger people to speak and use the English language differently. While Grandma might have been taught never to start a sentence with the conjunction "but," you might have been taught differently.

The English language is constantly changing to reflect the times. Emailing and texting have resulted in new words and new uses for punctuation marks. Hawks lose in walk-off to Midland

MIDLAND — The Howard Hawks (14-13, 5-3) "snatched defeat from the jaws of victory," according to head coach Britt Smith Wednesday night.

The Hawks put together a gamechanging ninth inning rally to take the lead, but two big errors in the bottom half scored two Midland runs that led to a walk-off victory for the Chaparrals.

Down 11-7, shortstop Rahman Williams led off the top of the ninth inning for Howard with a walk, and catcher Tracker Conn singled to left field to give the Hawks two base runners. Center fielder James Davison and right fielder Dominic Thornton, two of the hottest hitters on the team, followed with two quick outs via a punch-out and a lineout to the pitcher. Robbie Lammons, who was playing third base for the injured Andrew Beck, walked to load the bases, and Brendon Foust followed with another walk for an RBI to put the Hawks within three.

Midland made a pitching change as Coleman Watts struggled to find the zone, but reliever Jason Conway immediately hit the first batter he faced. Hawks second baseman Jackson Owens, to bring in a run and keep the bases loaded. With the Hawks down 11-9, left fielder Chad Paris hit a bases-clearing double to center field to put the Hawks up 12-11.

"The comeback part of it was good. We took some good at-bats, they didn't pitch it very well and then Chad got a big hit," Smith said. "That put us up one, and we had another opportunity with him on second base. Their shortstop went in the hole and made a great play with two outs. If that ball goes through we've got a chance to put some more cushion on there."

Howard started the bottom of the ninth with an easy fly out to Davison, but a walk and then a single to center put two aboard. Davison then overthrew the cutoff man for the first error of the inning, allowing Midland to get both runners into scoring posi-

tion. Midland's Yahir Gurrola hit the next pitch in the air to right field, but Thornton dropped the ball and the second consecutive error from Howard brought two game-winning Chaparral runs in to score.

"It's a simple game where we outplay them, but we made too many mistakes. And our mistakes were big mistakes. You can't make mistakes like that and win, not against good teams and certainly not with them getting to hit last when the weather is like that," Smith said. "Not only do we drop it, but it goes behind him. So both runs score and we lose."

The wind was howling at Christensen Stadium in Midland, blowing between 20 and 30 miles per hour throughout, making any fly ball more difficult than in fair conditions. Smith said it can also be an issue for the pitchers if they're not ready for it.

"If you're not mentally tough, it really can affect you. But the guys that went out and executed pitches, they pitched great. I thought we had some really, really good innings, especially in those conditions and certainly from some guys that haven't pitched much all year," he said. "The guys that didn't compete very well made mistakes, pitched tentative, left the ball up in the zone, and those are the ones that got hit."

Davison and Thornton went 2-for-6 and 3-for-5, respectively, and Owens went 3-for-4 with two runs scored. Rahman Williams, who has been struggling on the defensive side of the

ball all season, played an errorless game at shortstop and went 2-for-3 at the plate with two RBIs and two runs scored. Lammons continued to struggle a bit, going 1-for-5 on the day.

Beck, who Lammons replaced at third base for the game, received a cortisone shot on Monday for his injured shoulder and should be ready to play Friday at Clarendon College, according to Smith. Starting left fielder Hunter Hill pulled his hamstring in the loss, and Smith said it's unlikely that he'll travel with the team this weekend.

The Hawks will take on Clarendon College in two doubleheaders starting at noon Friday and Saturday in Clarendon.

Bush impresses in first spring action

go Cubs 5-0 Wednesday. Bush was the No. 1 overall choice in the 2004 draft by San Diego as a shortstop and never made it above Double-A. In 2012, he was sentenced after pleading no-contest to driving under the influence with serious bodily injury to a motorcyclist.

The 30-year-old Bush was released from prison last October. The Rangers signed him to a minor league contract on Dec. 18, and he's been working with minor leaguers this spring.

Bush's fastball was clocked from 95-97 mph and nine of his first 10 pitches were strikes. He struck out two and walked one.

"It was very exciting," Bush said. "I had

March 24, On Germanwings Flight 9525, an Airbus A320, crashed into the French Alps, killing all 150 people on board; investigators said the jetliner was deliberately downed by the 27-year-old copilot, Andreas Lubitz, who had a history of depression and mental illness.

In 1999, NATO launched airstrikes against Yugoslavia, marking the first time in its 50-year existence that it had ever attacked a sovereign country. Thirty-nine people were killed when fire erupted in the Mont Blanc tunnel in France

and burned for two days.



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


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#GPstrong Day at Coahoma **Elementary**

The students really enjoyed getting to hear Garett speak and having a chance to visit with Garett.

Curiosity allows us to set the goal of discovering the unfamiliar in the familiar; to suspend judgments and notice how things are, not how we expect them to be. But curiosity is not just being curious about things in general, but being curious about specific things and different people are interested in different specific things. Something must be guiding each of our unique obsessions.

Scientists who study the mechanics of curiosity are finding that curiosity is our brain's continuous calculation of which path or action is likely to gain us the most knowledge in the least amount of time, and curiosity builds upon itself, it's less about what we don't know than about what we already do; every question leading to the next.

And that's what makes it interesting. To emphasize this point, I heard of a man, who in in the field of safety, pose a very interesting

statement that interested my curiosity. He said that all the stupid people in the world should be eliminated. I was curious; I wondered where he was headed with that statement, so I asked how he proposed to make this happen. He replied: It would be easy; just remove all the warning labels on things, and the problem would be resolved automatically.
