Kerry defends Belgium's counter-terrorism efforts

BRUSSELS — U.S. Secretary of State John Kerry defended Belgium's counterterrorism efforts despite a series of security and intelligence failings in the run-up to the suicide bombings that killed 31 people this week.

Confirming that several FBI agents are involved in the investigation into the attacks, Kerry said the "carping" about Belgium's shortcomings "is a little bit frantic and inappropriate."

Kerry also said the U.S. and

"We will not be deterred," Kerry said. "We will come back with greater resolve with greater strength — and

Taking aim at trash

Annual campaign seeks to rid city streets of litter

It's spring and that means it's time to clean house. But how about adding a street, a park, a lot, or maybe two to that chore list?

Volunteers are being sought for the annual 2016 Texas Trash Off, scheduled for Saturday, April 2.

Last year, local volunteers' collective efforts brought in around 6,740 pounds of trash taken off the streets and fields of Howard County to be deposited at the city of Big Spring's landfill. Statewide, nearly 28,000 people cleaned around 3,700 highways and collected 1.4 million pounds of litter for the 2015 Texas Trash

Morton was originally schedule to speak in January but the event was canceled due to an illness.

In August 1986, Morton's wife, Christine, was bludgeoned to death in her home, according to news reports. Her body was found in the couple's bed. Later it was determined the bed sheets were stained with semen. On Feb. 17, 1987, Morton was convicted of Christine's murder and sentenced to life in prison.

that could have helped Morton's defense were never presented to his attorneys after the trial judge ordered the prosecution to turn over the reports of the chief investigator in the case.

In 2011, lawyers for Morton were successful in getting the court to grant DNA testing on a bloody bandana found at a construction site near the Morton's home. The test found DNA that matched Christine and an unknown

After the DNA was run through a national data base, it was found to match Mark Norwood who was later convicted of killing Christine Morton. The original prosecutor of the case Ken Anderson, who went on to become a judge, pleaded guilty to criminal contempt and agreed to serve a 10-day jail sentence.

Morton's story has been featured by a number media organizations.

makeup of those killed in Tuesday's attacks was highlighted further Friday as authorities revealed that American, British, Chinese, French and Dutch citizens were among the dead.

Kerry said Belgium has actively sought additional assistance after the attacks, and that 10 or 11 FBI agents are now in Brussels helping with the investigation. Prime Minister Charles Michel, meeting with Kerry, vowed to step up counterterrorism operation with the U.S. and others.

Kerry's comments came as top members of Belgium's embattled government face lawmakers amid heightened criticism of the country's counterterrorism efforts since and before — last November's Paris attacks, which killed 130 people and which authorities believe were plotted from Belgium.

Some of the Brussels attackers had been on the run from authorities in France and Belgium but were still able to hide in safe houses, assemble bombs and carry out linked attacks. Turkey also announced this week that it had warned Belgium last year that one of the Brussels at-Ibrahim tackers, ${
m El}$ Bakraoui, had been flagged as a "foreign terrorist fighter."

A manhunt is underway for one of the Brussels airport attackers the country's nuclear who was recorded on a surveillance video and had fled the scene. Prosecutors have not said how many attackers there were in total, or how many accomplices might be at large.

Belgian prosecutors said the raids Thursday night targeted central Brussels, Jette and the Schaerbeek neighborhood, where police had earlier found a huge stash of explosives and bomb-making material in an apartment used by the Brussels attackers.

Elsewhere, Belgium's nuclear agency said Friday that it has withdrawn the entry badges of some staff and denied access to other people recently amid concern plants could be a target for extremists.

Nuclear control agency spokeswoman Nele Scheerlinck said the move at some plants "is not necessarily linked with the terrorist attacks," noting that the decision to deny access usually takes weeks.

Immediately Tuesday's attacks, security was boosted around Belgium's nuclear sites and hundreds of staff sent home.







Did you ever wonder: God's direction

od promises to bless the Israelites if they love Him and follow His ways .. that is, "have no other gods besides Me."

Two things He points out specifically in Ex 23. He says, "You shall

not come before me empty-handed." In our time, I associate this with our tithe.

All of our provision comes from God. He asks for 10% of what He gives us as a thanks offering. God does not need our money; but giving him a tithe shows that we appreciate what He gives us. It shows that we value

God more than we value money. If God does not need our money,

then why do we give it? We are asked to be good stewards over what He gives us. Take good care of our

children, our animals, our house, car, and clothes.

Our tithe is used to do the work God gives us in the short time we have in this world. It is used for charity, teaching, church building, preacher's salary. So, yes. Do not go before Him empty-handed.

Another thing He specifically asks of us really seems unusual. He is speaking of offerings, "You shall not cook a kid in the milk of the mother." This is repeated in two other places in the Bible.

Sages say this was an offering to a pagan god that the Israelites began

In another place He says not to slay a mother and her baby on the same day. I believe God has a special place in His heart for all mothers and motherhood.

To honor this direction from God, Jews will not eat meat and dairy at the same meal. It is not much to give up for our God. We can have a hamburger for lunch and a cheese sandwich for dinner. Another small thing we can give up ... if you are serving chicken-fried steak, make the gravy with water instead of milk. It works.

God also says that if His children love and obey Him, He will send an angel before us to protect us and lead us to the place that He has made

"Beware of him!" God says. This means, "Do what he says, do not argue with him. He has orders from Me and My Name is in him." I believe this was Jesus serving His Father before He came to be our Savior. But that is just me.

He says, "You shall bless your

bread and water, and I shall remove illness from your midst. A prominent example of this was when the Black Plague ravaged Europe. Very few Jews were killed by the plague.

The Europeans called them sorcerers and killed many of them.

This was during a time of very unsanitary conditions in cities. People bathed only once a month, if then, because they thought it was unhealthy. The King of England spent a fortune on rose water because his own smell offended him.

Who would Jesus vote for?

o you remember the WWJD bracelets that were popular several years ago? For those of you who might have been in seclusion for the past decade or so, WWJD is the abbreviation for "What Would Jesus Do." These

bracelets were given to young people to be a visual reminder to help them think before they spoke or acted in a situation.

Well, our nation is in another election cycle and American citizens will have the opportunity this November to elect a new president along with other national,

state, and local officials. I have heard the discussions - "Did you watch the debate? Did you hear what so-andso said?" Also I have been asked, "Who are you going to vote for?" So I have been thinking about it a little

bit. I thought we might look at some general principles that may help us work our way through the process. First and foremost, God is sover-

eign. He has the right to rule. We don't get to vote on that. Ephesians 4:6, [There is] one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all (ESV). Whether an individual or nation acknowledges that fact or not, it remains true. Even if everyone of earth rejected God, he would still be God. He is eternal – always has been and always will be!

God has granted, or given, all authority to his Son, Jesus (Matthew 28:18). In order to submit to God, we must submit to and obey Christ. He is seated at the right hand of the Father in heaven (1 Peter 3:22). He is the King of kings and the Lord of lords.

But what about here on earth? While our citizenship is in heaven (Philippians 3:20), what is our responsibility to earthly governments? Romans 13:1, Let every person be subject to the governing authorities. For there is no authority except from God, and those that exist have been instituted by God (ESV). Whenever I think of these inspired words of the Apostle Paul, I remember that the people who would first read these words lived in the capital city of the Roman Empire – in the shadow of the emperor himself.

In this passage, Paul shows what the ideal is for a civil government. It ought to be a terror to bad conduct and an approver of good conduct (verse 3). If a person does wrong, then they should fear those in authority because government has been given the authority by God to take vengeance on (punish) the wrongdoer. Peter uses very similar language in 1 Peter 2:13-17. He tells us that it is the responsibility of those in government to punish those who do evil and to praise those who do good (verse 14).

Here's the thing – who gets to decide what is good and what is evil? Do I? Does the majority? God's word is the standard of right and wrong!

Remember God is God and I don't get to vote him out of that office! But, as a citizen of this country, I am afforded a voice in the appointment of certain public officials all the way up to the President of the United States. There are those who want to silence God and eradicate religion. They will say things like, "Leave your religion outside the voting booth." Well, guess what? God knows who you vote for just like he knows everything else about you.

Who should you vote for? You should vote for a candidate who will use God's standard to determine good from evil. Vote for someone who will use their authority the way God intends for it to be used – to approve what God approves and to punish the wrongdoer. And whoever is elected, let's pray for them (1 Timothy 2:1-2). God bless you and God bless America.





It's been our family tradition for a long time every year on Easter Sunday, the whole family gets together after church for a meal, followed by a big Easter egg hunt. The responsibility has always fallen to me to hide the eggs in our back yard. This is a task that has grown more complicated as the grandchildren have reached their teenage years. And the fact that we allow both adults and youth to hunt necessitates enormous amounts of eggs and an exhaustive search for new hiding places. When the hunt begins, it is total chaos, and is usually over in a matter of minutes because everyone has become an expert at discovering the hiding places. And teenage boys can even climb trees if necessary. However, there will usually be two or three that never get found; never that is, until spring or summer, when in the process of mowing or gardening, I will find an occasional undiscovered egg.

What remains for me a very special memory from years past is that time when the grandchildren were small. Hiding Easter eggs then was very different from now. For little ones the eggs must be hid where they can easily be found. Some will just be lying in full view on the grass; others will be placed under a dish that can be conveniently turned over. The point is to provide just enough challenge so the toddlers can wag their Easter baskets along and have the joy of filling them full. My reward is the excitement in their eyes when they proudly hold up an egg and exclaim, "I find one! I find one!"

I have often thought that our

Heavenly Father must experience the same joy when His children make the wonderful discovery of a spiritual truth. In one of my favorite passages of Scripture, Jesus said, "I praise you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, because you have hidden these things from the wise and learned, and revealed them to little children. Yes, Father, for this was your good pleasure." (Matthew 11:25-26 NIV). It's true: some of this world's wisest persons have never made the discovery of God's love displayed through the cross of Christ and His resurrection. Yet even a child is able to grasp its mean-

Through the years, it has been my greatest delight to discover some new truth as I read my Bible or pray or meditate on a particular aspect of God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. The Bible speaks of "the riches of God's grace," and I know that there are unfathomable treasures of the mystery of God that I have yet to uncover. Such treasures keep me searching, praying, trusting that more will be revealed to

Our Lord's resurrection on Easter Sunday is a glorious truth, so plainly displayed for all the world to see, and yet, how is it that so many still have not found it? Perhaps it is because of their lack of interest. God has said, "You will seek me and find me when you seek me with all your heart. I will be found by you," declares the Lord (Jeremiah 29:13-14). And perhaps it is because we who know this truth have not shared it with those who have never heard.

Bulldogs squeeze out win

Coahoma uses suicide squeeze for walk-off victory against Colorado City

The Coahoma Bulldogs (9-8,1-1) were on the verge of starting 0-2 in district, but a comeback victory and walk-off suicide squeeze put them back at .500 as they beat the Colorado City Wolves 7-6 Thursday night.

The top of the ninth inning started with the score tied at five. Colorado City catcher Andrew Burolla reached on a dropped third strike with one out. He then used his legs to get into scoring position, stealing second and forcing an overthrow that got him to third base. Third baseman Rion Maxwell then grounded out to shortstop, but Burolla came home to give the Wolves a 6-5 lead.

In the bottom half, Coahoma's Zach Taylor led things off by fighting his way through an 0-2 count and working it back full. With the count 3-2, he ripped an off-speed pitch just over the Colorado City first baseman to give Coahoma a much needed leadoff runner. Braden Pearson followed with a base hit that just missed the shortstop's glove, and was a few inches away from being a devastating double play opportunity for the Wolves.

With two on and no outs, shortstop Alex Biddison came to the plate. Either tired or rattled by the pressure, Wolves pitcher Erick Hernandez lost his command and hit Biddison to load the bases, and immediately followed with a wild pitch to Logan Franklin that advanced all three runners and scored Taylor from third, tying the game at six. Franklin would strike out, bringing up Fletcher Mashburn with the winning run in Pearson on

Mashburn swung and missed at a first-pitch strike, and squared to bunt on the next pitch. He sent a dribbler straight back to Hernandez on the mound with Pearson sprinting for home plate from third. Coming off the mound, Hernandez scooped the ball, but had a fraction of a second worth of trouble transferring the ball from his glove to his throwing hand, and that small window was just enough time to score a sliding Pearson for the walk-off suicide squeeze as the Coahoma dugout and stands erupted.

"We played good baseball. It was a fun baseball game to be a part of and I'm sure it was great for the fans and all that, but it's stressful for the people

involved. But it was a good baseball game and an entertaining baseball game," Coahoma head coach Bryan Jacobs said after the game.

The game could have been less stressful for the Bulldogs. They had 12 hits in 25 at-bats and six free bases given to them by Hernandez throughout the game, but had trouble advancing runners and getting big hits with runners in scoring position until the ninth inning.

"Getting on base wasn't a problem for us, it was executing when we had people on base and scoring the runs from third base," Jacobs said. "That's the reason C-City's in this game is because their kids did a great job. If they had a runner on third, they'd

The Sooners blew open a close game by going on a 19-4 run during the last 7:42 of the first half to take a 45-26 lead. The Sooners forced the Aggies into bad shots and turnovers, and Woodard was the catalyst on the offensive end.

Woodard started the decisive first half run with a 3-pointer and had another shot from behind the arc with 3:15 to go. He also fed Khadeem Lattin for a slam dunk and then hit a sweet, off-balance bank shot as the shot clock was close to expiring with about 20 seconds left.

The Aggies went more than seven minutes without a field goal. Tonny Trocha-Morelos made a layup to pull them to 24-20 with 9:32 to go

Today is Friday, March 25, the 85th day of 2016. There are 281 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight History: On March 25, 1776, Gen.

George Washington, commander of the Continental Army, was awarded the first Congressional Gold Medal by the Continental Congress.

On this date:

In 1306, Robert the Bruce was crowned King of Scots.

In 1865, during the Civil War, Confederate forces attacked Fort Stedman in Virginia but were forced to withdraw because of counterattacking Union troops. In 1911, 146 people, mostly

Abraham. In 1990, 87 people, most of them Honduran and Dominican immigrants, were killed when fire raced through an illegal social club in New York City.

In 1996, an 81-day standoff by the anti-government Freemen began at a ranch near Jordan. Montana.

In 2001, at the 73rd Academy Awards, "Gladiator" won best picture; its star, Russell Crowe, was named best actor; Julia Roberts received the best actress Oscar for "Erin Brockovich"; Steven Soderbergh won best director for "Traffic."

Ten years ago: In Seattle, Aaron Kyle Huff opened fire in a house full of ravers, killing six of them before killing himself. Country music star Buck Owens died in Bakersfield, California, at age 76. Five years ago:

Teams to reach Elite 8 using painful memories as lessons

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Losing in the NCAA Tournament is downright painful. Several teams still in the hunt for the title are using the unpleasant memories of the past as good lessons that have helped them move into the Elite Eight.

The Villanova Wildcats know the misery well. They lost their second game each of the past two tournaments, while their seniors were around for an opening loss in 2013.

Rather than letting those memories haunt them, the Wildcats adjusted and reached the Elite Eight for the first time since 2009.

"What you're seeing is a team that's learned a lot from those games and that is experience," Villanova coach Jay Wright said Thursday night after a 92-69 rout of No. 3 seed Miami in the South Region semifinal.

"They've been there twice. They've lost. They don't fear it. They don't fear losing in the second round, they don't fear losing in the Sweet 16. They just are driven to advance," he said. "And I think having no fear is what we're seeing."

Other teams are making a similar play:

Oklahoma also is in the Elite Eight for the first time since 2009 after early exits each of the past three seasons, while Kansas hadn't gotten to a regional final since 2012.

Oregon hasn't played past the opening weekend since 2013, and now the Ducks are a game away from their first Final Four since 1939.

"We went through those early exits," Villanova junior guard Josh Hart said. "We went through that heartache, and it was tough. But we learned from it. ... We're just using that as momentum, using that experience to get us through these games."

All four advanced Thursday night with pretty impressive performanc-NOVA SHOOTING: The Wildcats

lost to North Carolina State in 2015 and Connecticut in 2014 in their second NCAA games. In 2013, it was an opening loss to North Carolina. Villanova came into this tournament having spent three weeks as the nation's top-ranked team for the first time in the Wildcats are showing just how good they might be, shooting better in each of their first three games. Villanova never trailed against Mi-

ami, scoring the first eight points. The Hurricanes got within one at 31-30 before Villanova finished the game hitting 62.7 percent of its shots and a season-high 66.7 percent (10 of 15) beyond the arc. They even hit their first 15 free throws before finishing 18 of 19 at the line to earn their third regional final under Wright and seventh all-time.

"If they go 10 of 15 and 18 of 19, you know nobody's going to beat them," Kansas coach Bill Self said.

CHALK IT UP JAYHAWK: As the top of the No. 1 seeds, Kansas was expected to reach Saturday night's South Region final. The Jayhawks know only too well expectations and seedings mean little in this tournament after losing to Wichita State in their second game last year and to Stanford in 2014. Reaching the Sweet 16 proved no help in 2013 with a loss to Michigan.

Maryland stuck around long enough in the first half to give fans a few jitters. Kansas took a 36-34 halftime lead and opened the second half hitting its first six shots to seize the lead. The Jayhawks turned in what Self called a "superb" performance in the second half in pushing that lead to as much as 16 for a 79-63 win and first Elite Eight since 2012.

SOONER TIME: No. 2 seed Oklahoma romped over third-seeded Texas A&M 77-63 in the West Regional semifinal with five Sooners in double figures. They now are in the Elite Eight for the first time since 2009 after losing in a regional semifinal a year ago with opening losses to North Dakota State in 2014 and San Diego State in

The Aggies did have a nice start, jumping to a 13-6 lead behind two 3-pointers by Jalen Jones and one by Anthony Collins.

It didn't take the Sooners long to catch up, though. Alex Caruso didn't

think there was a hangover from the Aggies big comeback Sunday. "I feel like we were

ready. I mean, we came out firing on all cylinders in the first five

minutes of the game, and they made a little bit of a run and we didn't answer it the way we should have," Caruso said. "Then they extended it, so we dug ourselves a bit of a hole. Against a good team like that, you're not going to be able to come back. We just didn't get it done."

The Sooners advanced to the regional finals for the first time since 2009, when they lost to North Carolina in the South Regional. Oklahoma is trying to reach the Final Four for the first time since 2002, when it lost to Indiana in the national semifinals.

Oklahoma shot 49.2 percent while holding the Aggies to 34.2 percent. Texas A&M added to its misery by making only six of 28 3-pointers and just 13 of 24 free throws.

Woodard made five of six 3-pointers. Hield wasn't as effective as normal from behind the arc, making just two of

Christian James added 12 points for Oklahoma while Ryan Spangler and Lattin had 10 apiece.

Jones had 11 for the Aggies while Danuel House scored 10.

"It hurts," Jones said. "We know we're a way better team than the way we played tonight. We can't sit up here and sulk in our performance. We have to give a lot of credit to Oklahoma. They came out prepared and ready to go, and the shots that we usually make weren't falling.'


