

# **Police:** Moore strangled his wife

Former resident faces 1st degree charges following incident at couple's Midland home

MIDLAND — A former Big Spring man was arrested Saturday by Midland Police for allegedly assaulting his wife, who remains in critical condition, according to news reports.

Benjamin E. Moore, a Big Spring High School graduate, was being held

on a \$150,000 bond on a firstdegree felony charge of aggravated assault of a date/ family/house member with a deadly weapon and family violence, according to the Midland Reporter-Telegram. Arrest documents state



police were dispatched to a residence in Midland where they found Natasha Morris

Moore hanging by a curling iron cord in the bedroom closet.

The Reporter Telegram states Ben Moore said he had been arguing with his wife. a former Howard County resident who attended Forsan schools, and she stormed into the closet with a curling iron in her hand. Moore said he heard a commotion from the closet and looked inside. There he saw his wife hanging from the cord. "Instead of cutting her down, Moore found a stick and poked her to see if she was responsive, according to the affidavit," the newspaper report stated. "Moore later added that someone might have snuck in and hung her, although there was no back door and Moore was sitting by the front door, according to the affidavit."

The historic Big Spring sits in a seldom-visited corner of Comanche Trail Park, identified by little more than a couple of markers and visited more by accident than anything else. And, in truth, there's little to look at — just a large natural pool of green-tinged water surrounded by walking trails.

City officials want that to change. Construction is expected to begin before the end of spring on a \$1.8 million project aimed at both restoring the spring to its former glory and turning the site into an attraction that draws tourism — and tourism

Phase one of the renovation project, which begins this year, calls for repair of pumps which help supply the spring with its water, but Wegman said several other items are aimed directly at attracting visitors, including:

According to the website KidsandCars.org, more than 50 percent of child vehicular heat stroke deaths occur when a child is unknowingly left in a vehicle. On average, 37 children died of heat stoke a year in the nation because they were left in a vehicle, the site stated.

The Texas Department of Family and Protective Services recommends the following tips to help prevent this type of tragedy:

Never leave a child alone in a vehicle. According to Kids and Cars, children have died from heatstroke in cars in temperatures as low as 60 degrees. A child's body overheats three to five times faster than an adult body. Even with the window cracked temperatures can rise very quickly in a vehicle.

Make it a habit to look in every seat every time before you exit the vehicle.

Always lock the vehicle and put the keys out of reach of children.

around the female's neck were indicative of strangulation and not self-inflicted strangulation, " the report stated..

This is not the first time Moore has been in legal trouble.

In 2001, Moore was

Howard charged by County law enforcement with three counts of aggravated sexual assault, according to court records. In 2003, he was convicted of the charges and sentenced to two years in a Texas Department of Criminal Justice prison, with the convictions probated for five years. His probation was revoked in 2004 and he was sentenced to two

years in prison on each count. Moore was back in front of a judge in 2008 when he was convicted of felony theft. He received a three-year prison sentence.

According to news reports, his wife remains in critical condition. If she dies, a Midland city spokesman said Moore's charges would be elevated to murder.

# Check this out: What's at the library

ope everybody has been enjoying the longer daylight hours. Now you have more hours to get a book read! Since I ran out of time last

week, I will tell you about a few fiction books first.

Danielle Steel has a novel "Precious Gifts" (F STE D) that tells the story of a man's last wish to make a difference and of the loved ones he leaves behind fulfilling their destinies at This story last. takes readers from

New York and Los Angeles to the art capitals of Europe and the South of France. Inspiring and uplifting, it is a deeply moving exploration of the rich territory of loss, inheritance, and reawakening.

"The Girl on the Train" by Paula Hawkins (F HAW P) is an emotionally immersive, Hitch-cockian thriller and an electrifying debut. Rachel takes the same commuter train every morning and night. She starts to feel like she knows the couple she sees breakfasting on their deck at the first stop signal. Then she sees something shocking. It's only a minute until the train moves on, but it's enough. Unable to keep it to herself, Rachel goes to the police. Soon she is deeply entangled not only in the investigation but in the lives of everyone involved.

"The Humans" by Matt Haig (F HAI M) is a funny and most devastating dark comedy. When an extraterrestrial visitor arrives on Earth, his first impressions of the human species are less than positive. Taking the form of Professor Andrew Martin, the visitor is eager to complete the gruesome task assigned him and hurry back home to the Utopian world of his own planet. As time goes on, he starts to realize there may be more to this weird species than he has been led to believe. Slowly, he forges bonds with Martin's family, and in picking up the pieces of the professor's shattered personal life, he begins to see hope and beauty in the humans' imperfections and begins to question the mission that brought him there.

For all the large print mystery book fans, we have many to choose from.

"Ripped from the Pages" by Kate Carlisle (LP M CAR K) is a biblio-Book-restoration phile mystery.

an excavation of caves deep under her parents' commune in Northern California where a room is unearthed that contains a treasure trove of artwork, rare books, a chest of jewelry, and a perfectly mummified body.

"Peril by Ponytail" by Nancy J Cohen (LP M COH N) is a bad hair day mystery. Hoping for a romantic honeymoon at an Arizona dude ranch, hairstylist Marla Vail and her husband arrive to find a series of mishaps plaguing the resort. More comfortable sleuthing than horseback riding, Marla delves into the investigation and discovers skeletons in the family closet.

Bill Crider's "Between the Living and the Dead" (LP M CRI B) is a Dan Rhodes Mystery. Texas Sheriff Dan Rhodes is called in the middle of the night to investigate gunshots at a haunted house. Rhodes finds the body of meth dealer Neil Foshee who was recently released from jail. Complicating matters is Seepy Benton who wants to solve the murder by communing with Foshee's ghost.

"The Bitter Season" by Tami Hoag (LP M HOA T) tells the story of detective Nikki Liska who is newly assigned to the cold case squad but misses the urgency of hunting killers on the loose. As the trails of two crimes a quarter-century apart cross, Kovac and Liska race to find answers.

"The Opposite of Everyone" by Joshilyn Jackson (LP M JAC J) is a story of Paula Vauss who spent the first decade of her life on the road with her free-spirit young mother who told stories blending Hindu mythology with southern oral tradition to reinvent their history as the roved. Everything changed the day Paula told a story of her own that landed her mother in prison and Paula in foster care. Desperate to find her mother, Paula sets off on a journey of discovery that will take her back to the past and into the deepest recesses of her heart.

## **Charge against Trump** campaign manager overshadows primary

LAUDER-FORT DALE, Fla. (AP) — The 2016 presidential race may have descended on Wisconsin — but most of the campaign buzz surrounds an incident that happened nearly a month ago in Florida.

Police there charged Donald Trump's campaign manager with simple battery Tuesday as a videotaped altercation with a reporter transformed what was another messy campaign sideshow into a criminal court summons. Trump decried the charges.

Jupiter, Florida, police determined that probable cause existed to file a criminal complaint against the Republican front-runner's most trusted political adviser, Corey Lewandowski, for an altercation that took place after a campaign appearance earlier in the month. Police on Tuesday morning issued Lewandowski a notice to appear before a judge on May 4 for the misdemeanor charge.

The unexpected development injects a court battle into an already contentious Republican

primary season just ment to the Wednesday a week before a highstakes election in Wisconsin.

It came on a day that all five presidential contenders campaigned in the state, overshadowing Wisconsin Gov. Scott Walker's endorsement of Ted Cruz and Bernie Sanders' push to narrow Hillary Clinton's delegate lead.

Speaking to reporters on his airplane in Wisconsin on Tuesday, Trump vowed to stand by his campaign manager and lashed out at the young female reporter who conveyed the incident to police.

"How do you know those bruises weren't there before?" the New York businessman charged.

"I'm not going to let a person's life be destroyed," Trump said of Lewandowski. "No jury, in my opinion, would convict a man and destroy a man's life over what you witnessed." He repeated that stance Tuesday night during an interview on a CNNsponsored town hall event in Milwaukee.

Trump took his argu-

morning network news shows as well, making reference to video surveillance film of the incident and telling NBC's "Today" show, "What's clear is that she was touching me and she broke through the Secret Service and was asking me questions."

"She wasn't yanked down," Trump said of reporter Michelle Fields, who was working at the time for Breitbart News. "She was hardly even touched. You look at her face ... I mean, her face isn't that of a woman screaming in pain."

Brad Cohen, Lewandowski's lawyer, said "the police report doesn't match the video" of the incident. Interviewed on ABC's "Good Morning America" Wednesday, he acknowledged the video "shows contact" between Lewandowski and Field, but said, "I certainly see that she didn't lose her balance. When you watch it in real time, it's literally a half a second."

He noted Lewandowski's background as a former New Hampshire state trooper and said,

"If he sees a threat ... or something that's irregular, he thinks he can take action. It's not just a job of the Secret Service."

Police charged Lewandowski after reviewing the video, obtained from security at the Trumpowned property. Police determined the video shows Lewandowski grabbing Fields as she tried to ask Trump a question after a March 8 appearance.

It's unclear what impact, if any, the news will have on Trump's march toward his party's presidential nomination. Critics cast it as another example of why the brash billionaire would struggle to attract women in a prospective race against Clinton, the Democratic front-runner.

"What Donald Trump has been doing over these last months is inciting violent behavior, aggressive behavior that I think is very dangerous and has resulted in attacks on people at his events including this charge that has now been brought against his campaign manager," Clinton said in La Crosse, Wisconsin. "I think ultimately the responsibility is Mr. Trump's."

The New York businessman's Republican rivals also seized on the news.

Texas Sen. Ted Cruz said the incident is "the consequence of the culture of the Trump campaign — the abusive culture when you have a campaign that is built on personal insults, on attacks and now physical violence."

Ohio Gov. John Kasich said he "probably would suspend somebody" depending on the evidence available.

## President crystalizes criticism of campaign coverage

NEW YORK (AP) President Barack Obama's turn as a media critic this week may not have thrilled many journalists, but it has forced a new look at how a media-saturated presidential campaign is being covered.

Obama's challenge to reporters to be more probing comes at a time the media is facing two seemingly contradictory strains of criticism for its treatment of Republican frontrunner Donald Trump: that it has covered him too much, or not done enough to look into his background. speaking Obama, Monday night at a Syracuse University awards ceremony honoring the late political journalist Robin Toner, said he's not the only one dismayed by the tone of the campaign to succeed him. "I was going to call it a 'carnival atmosphere,' but that implies fun," he said. He said he always believed there was a price to pay


if a politician said one thing and did another and wondered "in the current atmosphere, is that still true?'

For reporters, he said "a job well done is about more than just handing someone a microphone." The billions of dollars in free media should come with "serious accountability, especially when politicians issue unworkable plans or make promises they can't keep," he said. Steve Capus, executive producer of the "CBS Evening News" and a former NBC News president, said Tuesday that he's wary of politicians who become media critics. Lumping all of the media together is not accurate. "When he calls for holding people accountable and talks about the role of the press in a free society, we would agree," Capus said. "I kind of think that's part of our marching orders on a daily basis.'

ing Joe." Host Joe Scarborough and Politico founder Jim VandeHei said that while Obama is urging the press to do better, he's had his own challenges running an open government.

Much of the criticism seems directed at cable news networks, which have been covering the campaign virtually nonstop for the past several months. They've been rewarded financially: Fox News Channel reported Tuesday that it will finish the first three months as the top-rated network in all of cable TV, the first such quarterly victory in the network's history.

CNN's chief executive Jeff Zucker has refined the strategy of "flooding the zone," or staying on one big story nearly exclusively while it's hot, and driven the use of town hall meetings with candidates to feed

#### Unusual dissent erupts inside Cuban Communist Party

HAVANA (AP) — Days after President Barack Obama's historic visit, the leaders of Cuba's Communist Party are under highly unusual public criticism from their own ranks for imposing new levels of secrecy on the future of social and economic reforms.

After months of simmering discontent, complaints among party members have become so heated that its official newspaper, Granma, addressed them in a lengthy front-page article Monday, saying the public dissatisfaction is "a sign of the democracy and public participation that are intrinsic characteristics of the socialism that we're constructing."

The article did little to calm many party members, some of whom are calling for a Communist Party congress next month to be postponed to allow public debate about the government's plans to continue marketoriented reforms for Cuba's centrally controlled economy.

"The base of the party is angry, and rightly so," party member and noted intellectual Esteban Morales wrote in a blog post published before Obama's visit. "We've gone backward in terms of democracy in the party, because we've forgotten about the base, those who are fighting and confronting our problems on a daily basis."

Across the country, Cuba's ruling party is facing stiff challenges as it tries to govern an increasingly cynical and disenchanted population.

#### Two Republican governors, two different calculations

ATLANTA (AP) — Two Republican governors. Two proposals at the heart of LGBT rights. One rejection. One new law.

Georgia's Gov. Nathan Deal said he was preventing discrimination and protecting commerce when he announced his veto of a measure that would have allowed certain individuals, businesses and faith organizations to deny services based on "sincerely held religious beliefs." In North Carolina, Gov. Pat McCrory said he was protecting his citizens' privacy and using "common sense" when he signed into law a bill that, among other things, prohibits local anti-discrimination ordinances and obligates transgender people to use restrooms matching the gender on their birth certificates.

Their moves highlight a familiar GOP fault line between business conservatives, led by large corporations that have embraced LGBT rights, and social conservatives, who have ramped up their calls for their own legal protections since the U.S. Supreme Court legalized same-sex marriage last year.

The tussle is particularly fierce in statehouses like those in Atlanta and Raleigh, where the GOP holds overwhelmingly majorities.

#### US to beef up military presence in Eastern Europe

WASHINGTON (AP) - U.S. officials say the Pentagon will be deploying an armored brigade combat team to Eastern Europe next February as part of the ongoing effort to rotate troops in and out of the region to reassure allies worried about threats from an increasingly aggressive Russia.

The officials said the Army will announce Wednesday that it will be sending a full set of equipment with the brigade to Europe. Earlier plans had called for the Pentagon to rotate troops into Europe, where they would have used a set of training equipment pre-positioned there.

The new proposal would remove the pre-positioned equipment, send it to be refurbished, and allow the U.S. forces to bring more robust, modern equipment in with them when they deploy. There are about 4,500 soldiers in an armored brigade, along with dozens of heavy vehicles, tanks and other equipment.

Wednesday's announcement is also aimed at easing worries in Europe, where allies had heard rumblings about the pre-positioned equipment being removed and feared the U.S. was scaling back support.

Officials also said the Army would send additional communications

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equipment to Europe so that headquarters units could have the radios, computers and other equipment needed to work with the brigades.

#### Ally to power broker Suu Kyi sworn in as Myanmar's president

NAYPYITAW, Myanmar (AP) — Htin Kyaw, a trusted friend of Nobel laureate Aung San Suu Kyi, took over as Myanmar's president on Wednesday, calling it a "historic moment" in the country's long-drawn transition to democracy after decades of military rule.

In a day full of ceremony and symbolism, Htin Kyaw was sworn in along with his two vice presidents and 18-member Cabinet. Suu Kyi, the face of Myanmar's pro-democracy movement, takes on a prominent role as the country's new foreign minister and the head of three other ministries.

The swearing in was held in an austere hall of parliament, with lawmakers dressed in traditional costume. A few hours later, outgoing President Thein Sein shook hands with his successor and handed him a letter officially transferring power.

While it was a momentous day in the history of this impoverished Southeast Asian country, democracy still feels incomplete. The military retains considerable power in the government and parliament, and the president himself will play second fiddle to Suu Kyi, who has repeatedly said she will run the country from behind the scenes because the military has ensured — through a constitutional manipulation — that she cannot be the president.

#### Flint official: State overruled plan for corrosion control

FLINT, Mich. (AP) — Shortly before this poverty-stricken city began drawing its drinking water from the Flint River in April 2014 in a cost-cutting move, officials huddled at the municipal water treatment plant, running through a checklist of final preparations.

Mike Glasgow, the plant's laboratory supervisor at the time, says he asked district engineer Mike Prysby of the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality how often staffers would need to check the water for proper levels of phosphate, a chemical they intended to add to prevent lead corrosion from the pipes. Prysby's response, according to Glasgow: "You don't need to monitor phosphate because you're not required to add it."

Recalling the meeting Tuesday in an interview with The Associated Press, Glasgow said he was taken aback by the state regulator's instruction; treating drinking water with anti-corrosive additives was routine practice. Glasgow said his gaze shifted to a consulting firm engineer in attendance, who also looked surprised.

"Then," Glasgow said, "we went on to the next question."

#### Caregivers of people with dementia face financial hardships

CHICAGO (AP) — Many relatives and friends providing financial support or care to people with dementia have dipped into their retirement savings, cut back on spending and sold assets to pay for expenses tied to the disease, according to a survey released Wednesday by the Alzheimer's Association.

About one in five go hungry because they don't have enough money.

"This was a big shocker for us," said Keith Fargo, Alzheimer's Association director of scientific programs.

Fargo said he didn't expect so many families to be struggling. He said the survey shows that people are not prepared for the high costs of home care or nursing home care. The median cost of a home care aide is \$20 per hour and the average cost of a semiprivate room in a nursing home is \$80,300 per year.

## Harden, Rockets rally to stuns LeBron-less Cavs, 106-100

CLEVELAND (AP) - The Cleveland Cavaliers appeared headed to a victory without LeBron James.

Then James Harden and the Houston Rockets had the final say.

Harden scored 27 points and the Rockets rallied from a 20-point deficit for a 106-100 victory over the Cavaliers, who rested James.

Cleveland led 62-42 early in the third quarter before Houston, fighting to make the playoffs, roared back. Harden scored 18 points in the fourth and Houston outscored Cleveland 35-16 in the period.

3-pointer from the corner with 17 seconds left gave Houston a 101-97 lead.

Irving scored 31 points for Cleveland, which fell to 1-3 this season and 4-13 over the last two when James doesn't play.

The victory marked the 12th time Houston has come back from a double-figure deficit to win a game.

"I don't think we pay attention to the score at all times, honestly," Howard said. "Tonight, we just kept fighting and pushing through, so I'm happy.



"That's what the first three quarters were for — to figure out what they were doing," Harden said. "Even when we got down 20 points, we felt confident because they weren't shooting the ball well, even when they were winning."

Dwight Howard's free throw with 2:13 left put Houston ahead 95-94. Harden's 3-pointer made it 98-94 before Kyrie Irving hit a 3-pointer with 1:30 left, making it a one-point game.

Both teams missed shots on their next possession, but Trevor Ariza's

Cleveland (52-22) leads Toronto by 2 1/2 games for the top seed in the East. The win moves Houston (37-38) a half-game ahead of Dallas for the eighth spot in the West.

"A few plays didn't go our way in the fourth quarter and that kind of cemented them getting back in the game," Irving said.

Michael Beasley scored 17 points while Ariza added 15 for Houston. Howard had 11 points and 11 rebounds.

Cavaliers forward Tristan Thompson, who played in his 362nd consecutive game, the longest streak in franchise history, scored 16 points and



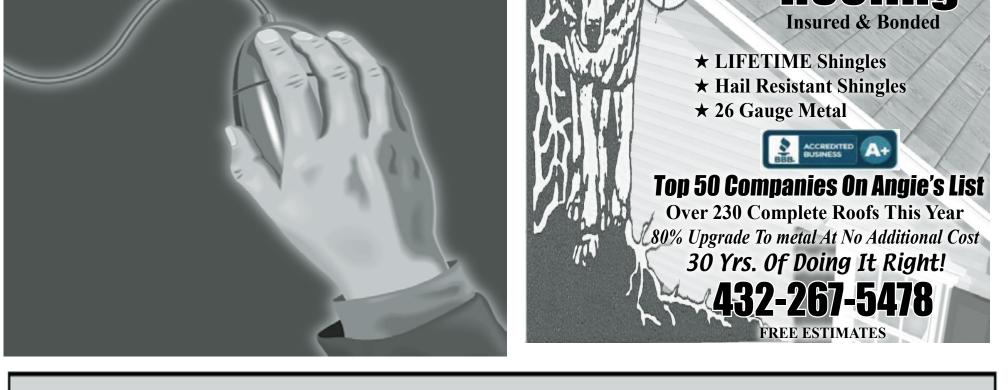

Dear Annie: I have a beautiful daughter who is in rehab for drug addiction. For the past two years, she has had an abusive boyfriend who also encouraged her drug use. He broke up with her before she entered the facility, but I just discovered that she has been calling him.

I want to call the boyfriend and tell him not to accept her calls or I will turn the names of his dealers over to the police. What should I do? -- Worried Mother

Dear Mother: Instead of issuing threats, contact the facility and let them know that your daughter is maintaining contact with an abusive, drug-using boyfriend. This is probably against the rules, in which case, they would take away her phone privileges.

Ask the facility for help with the drug dealers. This could be dangerous.

Then contact the National Domestic Violence Hotline (thehotline. org) and ask for their help in disentangling your daughter from her abusive relationship. This is not going to be easy, Mom. We hope you can transmit some of your strength to your daughter.

Dear Annie: I am writing about the responses to "Please Leave Animals at Home." I am touched by the people who wrote in support of service animals. I know firsthand the independence they bring through their trained skills. I have been using a service dog since 2001. However, I feel it is important

to correct some information that these supporters mentioned.

Service animals are defined by the Americans with Disabilities Act. They include only dogs or miniature horses. They must have a trained skill that is directly related to the individual's disability. Emotional support and companionship are NOT service dog skills.

Service animals are allowed in all places the public is allowed to go. They are to be under control of their handler and working when in public. Stores cannot require that they ride in shopping carts. When it is not obvious what service an animal provides, only limited inquiries are allowed. Two questions may be asked: (1) Is the dog a service animal

required because of a disability, and (2) what work or task has the dog

Service animals are not required to wear special vests or tags. But they must be harnessed, leashed or tethered, unless this interferes with the animal's work. The team should have good public behavior. Allergies and fear of dogs are not valid reasons for denying access or refusing service to people using service animals. The rules for visiting therapy dogs or emotional support animals are different. They must have documentation

and do not have public access rights. Emotional support animals are addressed under the Fair Housing Act and the Airline Carrier Access Act. Service dogs deserve respect and access for the work they are doing. Kristin Hartness, Executive Director, Canines for Disabled Kids

Today's Highlight in History:

On March 30, 1981, President Ronald Reagan was shot and seriously injured outside a Washington, D.C., hotel by John W. Hinckley Jr.; also wounded were White House press secretary James Brady, Secret Service agent Timothy McCarthy and a District of Columbia police officer, Thomas Delahanty.

On this date:

In 1822, Florida became a United States territory. In 1867, U.S. Secretary of

State William H. Seward reached agreement with Russia to purchase the territory of Alaska for \$7.2 million. In 1870, the 15th Amendment

to the U.S. Constitution, which prohibited denying citizens the right to vote and hold office on the basis of race, was declared in effect by Secretary of State

RMS Laconia became the first passenger ship to circle the globe as it arrived in New York.

In 1945, during World War II, the Soviet Union invaded Austria with the goal of taking Vienna, which it accomplished two weeks later.

In 1959, a narrowly divided U.S. Supreme Court, in Bartkus v. Illinois, ruled that a conviction in state court following an acquittal in federal court for the same crime did not constitute double jeopardy.



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
