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Riding the Orphan Train

Heritage event focuses on program which transplanted unwanted children By LYNDEL MOODY

Staff Writer

For a period of 75 years, orphaned and unwanted children from the streets of New York were shipped by trains throughout the United States in hopes of finding good, Christian

Some of the children did, but others were used as free farm hand labor. Their stories will be told Thursday night during the multi-media presentation, "Riders on the Orphan Train," at the Heritage Museum's annual membership meeting.

"We will have the presentation at 6 p.m. but we are offering a dinner beginning at 5," said Tammy Schrecengost, curator of the Heritage Museum. "The presentation is free and everyone is welcome to come, but if you want to

High winds hamper firefighters in Okla., Kansas The Associated Press

OKLAHOMA CITY — Authorities are responding to wildfires in Oklahoma and Kansas that have led to evacuations, scorched mostly rural land and destroyed an unknown number of structures.

In Oklahoma, the largest fire was in the same area near the border with Kansas where blazes last month scorched hundreds of square miles.

Authorities there urged the approximately 300 residents of Freedom, about 170 miles northwest of Oklahoma City, to evacuate their homes on Tuesday afternoon, Woods County Emergency ManageThat's a huge concern."

ment Director Steve Foster

The fire stalled late Tuesday at the Cimarron River west of Freedom, but Woodward County Emergency Management Director Matt Lehenbauer said early Wednesday that winds shifted overnight, diminishing the threat to the town.

But Wednesday's forecast looked tricky for firefighters

hoping to contain the blaze.

"We're expecting wind gusts of 40, 45 mph. That's going to go all

through the day and probably not start to subside until sundown.

"We're expecting wind gusts of 40, 45 mph," Lehenbauer said. "That's going to go all through the day and probably not start to subside until sundown. That's a huge concern."

Oklahoma Forestry Ser-

vices said in a statement that structures had been lost in the fire and in another blaze in the central part of the state. Spokeswoman Hannah Anderson said damage assessments Wednesday would determine how many buildings were destroyed.

Officials estimate the latest fire has burned roughly

40 square miles of rural land. More than a dozen fire departments and Oklahoma Forestry Services are fighting the blaze, Lehenbauer said, and fresh crews were arriving early Wednesday to relieve firefighters who had been battling the blaze since Tuesday

afternoon. There were no immediate reports of injuries in either

While reporting on the fire for Oklahoma City's KWTV station, storm trackers Amy and Val Castor saw a road grader traveling in the path of the quick-moving flames.

According to Schrecengost, more than 250,000 unwanted street children or orphans in New York were placed on trains and sent out to rural America in hopes of finding a home. At certain train stations, the children were off loaded and were lined up on the platform for viewing by prospective parents. The transportation of the children was funded through The Children's Aid Society established by Charles Loring Brace, a ministry, and was meant to provide these children a chance at better opportunities.

The actual results were mixed, Schrecengost said.

"Some of the farmers saw the children as free slaves," she said. "This presentation is one-hour performance on the social implications of the Orphan Train."

Don't Mess With Texas effort marks 30 years

DALLAS (AP) — The Don't Mess With Texas anti-litter campaign has been around for 30 years with more chances to pick up trash across the state.

The Texas Department of Transportation on Wednesday marked the slogan's 30th anniversary with plans to display, in Dallas, some trash picked up along highways.

Boy Scouts across Texas can try to earn a special merit badge to mark the anniversary by taking part in a trashoff Saturday targeting roads. The partnership involves TxDOT and the group Keep Texas Beautiful.

TxDOT officials say about 1,500 trashoff events were held last year across the state. About 85,000 volunteers collecting more than 10 million pounds of waste and recyclables.

The Don't Mess With Texas campaign has included advertisements with celebrities including George Strait, Willie Nelson, Matthew McConaughey and LeAnn Rimes.

FBI targets alleged mastermind of plot to kill Texas dentist

DALLAS (AP) — A Dallas woman accused of arranging for a hit man to kill the dentist dating her ex-boyfriend will be added to the FBI's Ten Most Wanted fugitives list.

Brenda Delgado is under indictment for capital murder in the September death of Kendra Hatcher, who was shot dead in the parking garage of a Dallas apartment complex. Police have already arrested the alleged assassin.

The indictment alleges Delgado paid Love with drugs and money for killing Hatcher, allegedly out of jealousy.

The FBI will announce Delgado's inclusion on the list Wednesday.

Body found in creek on University of Texas campus AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - A woman's

body has been found in a creek on the campus of University of Texas in Aus-

tin in what authorities describe as a possible homicide.

UT President Greg Fenves says the body was discovered Tuesday in Waller Creek behind the Etter-Harbin Alumni Center. Fenves didn't release the name of the victim.

No cause of death was immediately released.

Fenves says UT officials are working with Austin police to identify possible suspects. Fenves also did not say whether the victim was believed to be a student.

The UT president says everything is being done to ensure safety on campus and that all classes and events remain on schedule.

Judge finds ex-A&M player incompetent in slaying case

DALLAS (AP) — A former Texas A&M wide receiver has been found mentally incompetent to stand trial in the slaying of a man on a Dallas jogging

Thomas Johnson was found incompetent by a Dallas County magistrate judge at a hearing Monday. His attorney, Jennifer Balido, tells The Dallas Morning News that Johnson will be sent to a state hospital for treatment and evaluation.

Balido said it's likely Johnson will eventually "regain competency."

Police have said Johnson has admitted to killing a jogger in a random act of rage on the White Rock Creek Trail in October.

United Airlines fires attendant who deployed emergency slide in Texas

HOUSTON (AP) — United Airlines says it has fired a flight attendant who deployed an emergency evacuation slide at an airport in Houston. A United spokesman said Wednes-

day that the flight attendant no longer works for the carrier. Charlie Hobart declined to release the flight attendant's name or details of her employment history with the Chicago-based airline.

United has said the attendant deliberately deployed the emergency evacuation slide Monday after a flight from Sacramento, California, landed at George Bush Intercontinental Airport. She exited the aircraft by sliding down the inflatable slide.

No one was hurt. Officials have not released a possible motive for the inci-

Val Castor said the driver would have no chance to escape the vehicle before the flames reached him, so he drove near the vehicle and urged the driver to jump in their car.

The road grader, stuck in the dirt, became engulfed in flames seconds after the driver leapt out and ran to the Castors' car. Large flames could

be seen blowing toward the windshield as they pulled away.

"There's no way you can outrun that fire," Castor said. "It probably would have burned him up if he had stayed

The town of Freedom is about 5 miles southa previous fire started in March, then spread from Oklahoma into Kansas, scorching an estimated 574 square miles of rural land in

the two states.

The blaze had threatened homes and an iodine-manufacturing plant but firefighters were able to protect the facility by parking their firetrucks around its perimeter, Lehenbauer said. The flames jumped over the vehicles and west of the spot where burned all the way around the plant before the winds shifted, he said.

> Crews protected some homes using the same tactic, he said.

"A lot of the guys were just surrounding the wagons around the homes as the fire jumped over and around them." he said.

In central Oklahoma. firefighters set up containment lines around another fire north of Luther, about 25 miles northeast of Oklahoma City, and officials advised residents to evacuate their homes.

No containment figure was readily available for that fire, Anderson

In Kansas, the Adjutant General's Office said residents evacuated from up to 150 mobile homes in Riley County, where officials said a wildfire had burned just under a square mile but been contained.

Eight homes were evacuated in nearby Geary County, and voluntary evacuations were underway in Alma in Wabaunsee County. The statement said a

Across the state in far southwest Kansas' Morton County, a fire was threatening the town of Wilburton.

The National Weather Service warned that conditions conducive to fire, including low humidity and high winds, are forecast to occur in both states through Wednesday.

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

This week I only have a few non-fiction books so I will start with them first. Best selling author and pastor, John Hagee wrote "Can America Survive?" (261.709 HAG J) to present political, cultural, and economic challenges in this riveting examination of global issues. He believes that America is being threatened on all fronts but no one is even paying attention. As we face impending nuclear war in the Middle East, continued conflict over Israel, and the death of the dollar, Hagee believes these global threats could have devastating results for America. Pastor Hagee concludes his message with a narrative of the year 2012, a spellbinding description of Armageddon-the mother of all battles-and the ultimate coming of the Messiah.

"I Am America (And So Can You!)" by Stephen Colbert (306.097 COL S) showcases Stephen Colbert at his most eloquent and impassioned. He is an unrelenting fighter for the soul of America, and in this book he fights the good fight for the traditional values that have served this country so well for so long. 

sels' main airport and on a subway train left 270 people wounded, many with severe burns and maimed limbs. A handful have already died in the hospital.

tary hospital where many are being cared for said colleagues were accustomed to treating such wounds in soldiers but were so shocked at the carnage in Brussels they would likely need counseling.

Two weeks after the attacks, 66 people are still hospitalized in Belgium while others are being treated abroad. Foreigners from 20 nations were affected. Among them were three Mormon missionaries from Utah, two Jet Airways cabin crewmembers from India and a newlywed from Germany.

Benjamin, a balding man with dark horn-rimmed glasses, was on his way to Israel to visit his daughter. A large backpack shielded his chest from the explosion and probably saved his life. Many died around him.

His heart-rending posts remind readers that many survivors are still at the very beginning of a long road to recovery. Doctors and psychologists who treat attack victims say healing the body is only the first step. More difficult is healing the spirit. "Discharging a pa-

tient from the hospital doesn't mean the end of care," said Dr. David King, a trauma surgeon at Massachusetts General Hospital who treated victims of the Boston marathon attacks. "There could be months, or years, or decades of physical and psychological healing."

Sara Freedman, who works with survivors suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder at Bar Ilan University near Tel Aviv, said after an attack, the people near it — even those who aren't wounded — may suffer from nightmares and flashbacks. For many, those symptoms diminish over time. But she said 35 percent of people who experienced such an incident will suffer post-traumatic from stress disorder, versus

17 percent of those in-

volved in car accidents.

It's a unique journey for everyone, and Benjamin seems to be finding his way, post by post.

Interviewed from his hospital bed by Belgium's RTL television network soon after the blasts, Benjamin declared that most "Muslims are extraordinary people," and that the actions of a few should not represent the whole community. People started sharing the interview.

"After my first interview, people started posting it on social media and then the messages starting coming in," he said. "People even send me gifts. It helps me a lot mentally. Sometimes I get glum, so I read all my messages, and I see that there is still humanity."

Benjamin takes pictures with his nurses and describes his visitors, like the paramedic who treated him at the airport.

"I talked for an hour with Louis, the ambulance driver, and he told me in detail how that March 22 day unfolded, from the first text message informing him of an explosion inside the airport to the rescue operations," he wrote.

Elouafi, his guardian angel, filled in other details in one of his almost-daily visits.

"Everything was darkness, people were screaming. I thought I was in a nightmare," Elouafi said as his eyes welled up. "I saw Walter, he was suffering ... Walter kept repeating: 'I want to talk to my mum. I want to talk to my mum.'"

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Cruz's crushing victory leaves Trump damaged

NEW YORK (AP) — Donald Republican Trump emerged from Wisconsin as a damaged front-runner following a crushing loss to rival Ted Cruz, deepening questions about the billionaire businessman's presidential qualifications and pushing the GOP toward a rare contested convention fight. Democrat Bernie

Sanders also scored a sweeping victory in Wisconsin's primary that gives him a fresh incentive to keep challenging Hillary Clinton. But Sanders still lags Clinton significantly in the delegate count.

Both parties are turning their sights toward New York, which offers a massive delegate prize in its April 19 contests. It marks a homecoming of sorts for several candidates, with Trump, Clinton and Sanders all touting roots in the

Trump, who has dominated the Republican race for months, suddenly finds himself on the defensive as the campaign moves east. He's struggled through a series of missteps, including his campaign manager's legal issues after an altercation with

a female reporter and his own awkward explanation of his position on abortion.

Exit polls in Wisconsin highlighted the deep worries about Trump surging through some corners of the Republican Party. A majority of GOP voters said they're either concerned about or scared of a potential Trump presidency, according to surveys conducted by Edison Research for The Associated Press and television networks.

Cruz has stepped forward as the candidate best positioned to block Trump, though it would likely take a convention battle to accomplish that goal.

A Texas senator with a complicated relationship with Republican leaders, Cruz cast his Wisconsin victory as a "turning point" in the race and urged the party to rally around his candidacv.

Even if Cruz's gains do force the GOP race into a contested convention in July, it is unclear whether he would emerge as the nominee, or whether the party would try to put forward someone else.

Trump was unbowed

in his defeat. His campaign put out a biting statementaccusingCruz of being "worse than a puppet — he is a Trojan horse, being used by the party bosses attempting to steal the nomination from Mr. Trump."

paign also suggested in the statement that Cruz is illegally coordinating with his own special interest group.

In response, Cruz' communications director Jason Miller said late Tuesday that "Donald Trump has a real problem when he gets his tail kicked, and that's exactly what happened tonight."

To win a prolonged convention fight, a can28 go to the national convention as free agents, 10 said in interviews they were committed to Cruz. None has so far endorsed Trump.

Despite the concern among some Wisconsin Republicans about Trump becoming president, nearly 6 in 10 GOP voters there said the party should nominate the candidate with the most support in the primaries, which so far would be Trump. Even among voters who favored Cruz, 4 in 10 said the candidate with the most support going into the convention should be the party's nominee.

Poll: Cruz wins on fear; Sanders on excitement

WASHINGTON (AP) – In Wisconsin, Democrats went with the candidate who excited them the most, and Republicans chose the candidate who wasn't Donald Trump.

As Texas Sen. Ted Cruz won the state's GOP primary, exit polls show his victory appeared to be driven more by fear of Trump than excitement about Cruz. In fact, a majority of Wisconsin Republican voters say they're either concerned or scared of a potential Trump presidency.

On the Democratic side, voters chose Vermont Sen. Bernie Sanders, who they saw as the more exciting, inspiring and honest candidate, according to early results of exit polls conducted for The Associated Press and television networks by Edison Research.

But even then, more voters view former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton as the candidate most likely to beat Trump, who has been the Republican frontrunner throughout the primaries.

Other highlights from the exit polls:

SCARED OR CONCERNED

A majority of Republican voters say they're either concerned or scared of a potential Trump presidency, exit polls show. Nearly 4 in 10 say they're scared about what Trump would do as president, and about 2 in 10 say they're concerned.

At the same time, though, about a quarter of Wisconsin GOP primary voters say they're excited about Trump, while less than 15 percent say that of either Cruz or Ohio Gov. John Kasich.

But the exit poll shows Republicans could face a challenge in uniting their party whether Trump or Cruz emerges as the eventual nomi-

A third of Wisconsin GOP voters say that if Trump and Clinton are the nominees they'd vote for a third party candidate, stay home or even vote for Clinton. Three in ten say that of a Cruz versus Clinton matchup.

EXCITEMENT, REALISTIC, HONEST

About 7 in 10 Democratic primary voters in Wisconsin said they are excited or optimistic about what either candidate would do in office, but they're more likely

to be excited about Sanders. About a third say they're excited about what he would do, while about half as many say that about Clinton.

Nearly 60 percent say Sanders inspires them more about the future of the country. But more than half also say Clinton is the candidate best suited to beat Trump.

Three-quarters Clinton has realistic policies, more than the two-thirds who say that of Sanders.

Democratic voters were more likely to describe Sanders than Clinton as honest. About nine in 10 say so of Sanders, while about 6 in 10 say so of Clinton.

CONTESTED CONVENTION

When it comes to a Republican contested convention, more than half of Republicans say the party should nominate the candidate with the most support in the primaries, which so far would be Trump. About 4 in 10 say it should nominate the candidate the delegates think would make the best nominee.

TRADE AND JOBS

Democratic voters in Wisconsin are divided on the effect of trade on unemployment, but among those who think trade takes jobs, 6 in 10 supported Sanders.

About 4 in 10 Democratic voters say trade with other countries takes away jobs in this country, while 4 in 10 see trade as beneficial, exit polls show. Only about 1 in 10 sees trade as having no effect on jobs in the United States.

The polls indicate a mixed response on an issue that Sanders has put at the center of his television ads. In the ads, he's connected job losses with the North American Free Trade which Agreement, was signed into law by former President Bill Clinton, and the Trans-Pacific Partnership.

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Astros win opener over Yanks|UCONN

NEW YORK (AP) -There were tiny ice crystals on the infield when batting practice began. New Yankees second baseman Starlin Castro wore a balaclava. Houston ace Dallas Keuchel said the baseballs felt chalky, "like throwing a sandball."

In cold like this, the Houston Astros' opener at Yankee Stadium was destined to turn on a goofy play.

Carlos Correa started the comeback with an RBI grounder and solo homer against Masahiro Tanaka, then reached on an eighth-inning dribbler that reliever Dellin Betances threw over first baseman Mark Teixeira as Jose Altuve scored from second with the tiebreaking run. The Astros went on to beat the Yankees 5-3 Tuesday to win four straight openers for the first time

Betances (0-1) relieved to start the eighth and walked Jose Altuve, who stole second. Playing his first opener after winning last season's AL Rookie the Year award, Correa hit a slow roller that Betances picked up, then shot-putted over Teixeira.

in franchise history.

Yankees manager Joe Girardi argued with plate umpire Dana De-Muth that Correa should have been called out for running in fair territory. After the four umpires conferred, the call was upheld and Girardi played the remainder of the game under protest.

Luis Valbuena added a two-run single on Betances' 30th and final pitch for a 5-2 lead.

"The personality of our team and strength of our team came out again like it did throughout

last year," Astros manager A.J. Hinch said.

It was 27 degrees when batting practice began, and the temperature rose to 36 with a stiff wind and a cloudless sky at game time.

The crowd seemed slightly more than half the announced attendance of 47,280 — the smallest for a Yankees home opener since April 8, 2003. This also was the lowest temperature for any regular-season Yankees game in the Bronx since that 2003 game against Minnesota.

The three-time AP Player of the Year has said it is up to others to decide her place in women's college basketball lore. There is no denying she is the most accomplished player ever, winning more titles than fellow UConn greats Diana Taurasi and Maya Moore, who watched from the stands at Bankers Life Fieldhouse. Auriemma wouldn't argue with the description of Stewart as the best ever.

'I'll say this. She's the greatest NCAA Tournament player I've ever been around," Auriemma said. "When the lights were the brightest, that's (when) she was at her best."

Stewart said when she came to campus four years ago that she wanted to win four titles. She delivered on that promise by scoring 24 points and grabbing 10 rebounds. She and fellow seniors Morgan Tuck and Moriah Jefferson posed on a ladder after cutting down the net for the final time.

Mission accomplished. The three went 24-0 in NCAA tourney games,

"It wasn't a sense of relief, it was a sense of success. This is exactly what we wanted," Stewart said. "Going into every one of our national championship runs, we were confident and that's what we were tonight, confident. We made history and to be able to say that we did that with those two guys, we're going to remember that forever."

The Huskies (38-0) have been nearly unbeatable since Stewart arrived. They lost four games her freshman year and only one since. The win over Syracuse was the 75th straight for UConn, all by double figures.

Stewart earned the most outstanding player of the Final Four all four years of her career. No other women's player has won it more than twice and only Lew Alcindor did it three times on the men's side.

Like the other great UConn teams, this version had a killer instinct. The Huskies scored the first nine points of the game and UConn built a 23-6 lead. Stewart, Jefferson and Tuck, who have helped the Huskies to an NCAArecord 151 wins over four years, combined for 26 of the 28 points in the opening quarter.

Handling the Orange's press with precision passing that led to easy layups, the Huskies were up 50-23 at the half and extended their lead to 33 early in third quarter before Syracuse scored 16 straight points to get within 60-43 with 2:02 left in the period that brought the Orange fans to their feet. Consecutive layups by Napheesa Collier restored the 20-plus point lead and UConn cruised from there.

"Not shocked by how good they are, not shocked by the things they did in the game. We were definitely prepared for it," Syracuse coach Quentin Hillsman said. "We didn't play scared."


The boys didn't fare as well in Sweetwater, losing to the Mustangs 12-3.



Reluctantly, Obama embracing his role as the anti-Trump

WASHINGTON (AP) — He won't be on November's ballot, but President Barack Obama is slowly embracing his role as the anti-Trump, taking on the Republican front-runner in ways that no other Democrat can.

With Hillary Clinton and Bernie Sanders still fighting it out in the Democratic primary, the task has fallen increasingly to Obama to articulate the counter-message to Donald Trump, whose ascent to the White House would constitute an overwhelming rebuke to Obama. Democrats are working hard to use the contrast between Obama and Trump to paint the Republican candidate as anything but presidential.

For months, Obama and his aides mostly avoided getting dragged into the fray or letting the campaign din distract from Obama's agenda. The White House would sidestep questions about the latest Trump controversies, refusing to turn Obama into a pundit on the race to replace him.

When Obama waded in, it was only to offer implicit rebukes of the Trump phenomenon, such as his assertion in September that "America is great right now" — a not-so-veiled reference to the business mogul's campaign promise to "make America great again."

Now the Trump criticism is coming with increasing frequency and ease. Asked Tuesday whether Trump's proposals were already damaging U.S. relations, Obama answered unequivocally: "Yes."

Battle between religious and gay rights splits GOP states

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. (AP) — Republican lawmakers upset about the Supreme Court decision legalizing gay marriage have advanced measures in about a dozen states this year that could strengthen protections for those who refuse on religious grounds to provide services to same-sex couples.

The bills could benefit court clerks, photographers, florists, bakers, wedding-hall operators and others who say gay matrimony goes against their

For a party already being torn apart by the presidential contest, the state legislative efforts have exposed deep rifts between the GOP's social conservatives and its pro-business wing. Business leaders worry that such measures will allow discrimination and scare away companies and major events.

So far, only a few proposals have become law. Those include narrowly tailored protections shielding Florida clergy from having to perform samesex weddings and college religious organizations in Kansas from losing aid.

A far more sweeping one was signed into law Tuesday by Mississippi Gov. Phil Bryant, despite objections from some major corporations. It creates a religious shield from government penalties for an array of people and organizations, including marriage-license clerks, adoption agencies, counselors and more than a dozen categories of businesses that provide wedding-related services. It applies not only to those with religious beliefs about gay marriage, but also to those who believe that sex outside marriage is wrong and that sexual identity is determined at birth.

Scrutiny on officials worldwide increases in offshore leaks

LONDON (AP) — Iceland's prime minister became the first major figure brought down by the leak of millions of records on offshore accounts as the scrutiny intensified around officials from other countries, including Ukraine's president.

Icelandic leader Sigmundur David Gunnlaugsson stepped aside Tuesday amid outrage over revelations he had used a shell company to shelter large sums while Iceland's economy was in crisis. Officials in several

other countries also are facing questions about possibly dubious offshore tax-avoidance following schemes, the publication of the names of rich and powerful people linked to the leaks, dubbed the Panama Papers.

They include Ukraine President Petro Poroshenko who, the leaks show, set up an offshore holding company to move his candy business offshore, possibly depriving Ukraine of millions of dollars in tax

Poroshenko insists he



has done nothing wrong and hasn't managed his assets since being elected. Still, some adversaries are calling for his removal from office.

In Pakistan, tackling extremism is a political minefield

ISLAMABAD (AP) — Tackling extremism is a political minefield in Pakistan, where politicians openly consort with leaders of banned militant groups and sympathy exists within the security forces and civil administration for perpetrators of crimes committed in the name of religion. As a result, many remain skeptical of the state's ability to put an end to the militant violence that kills hundreds of Pakistani civilians each year.

A suicide bombing in a park in Lahore that killed 72 people, many of them Christians celebrating Easter Sunday, brought renewed international attention to Pakistan's extremism problem. In the aftermath, security forces arrested hundreds of suspected militants.

At the same time, however, demonstrators calling for the implementation of Islamic law and expressing their support for the man who murdered an anti-blasphemy campaigner were allowed to congregate freely in the capital. On social media, pictures circulated showing senior members of Pakistan's elite police forces praying at the grave of Mumtaz Qadri, the policeman charged with killing the secular, left-leaning politician Salman Tanseer because he defended a Christian woman accused of blasphemy. When Qadri was hanged for the murder in February, tens of thousands of Pakistanis rallied in his support.

The sincerity of authorities' efforts to tackle extremism was further called into question when Rana Sanaullah, the law minister for Punjab province — of which Lahore is the capital — issued statements denying that militant groups operated in the area.

White House to transfer Ebola funds to combat Zika virus

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Obama administration is to announce Wednesday it will transfer leftover money from the largely successful fight against Ebola to combat the growing threat of the Zika virus, congressional officials say.

Roughly 75 percent of the \$600 million or so would

be devoted to the Centers for Disease Control, which is focused on research and development of anti-Zika vaccines, treating those infected with the virus and combating the mosquitoes that spread it. The rest would go to foreign aid accounts to fight the virus overseas.

The officials spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to publicly discuss the matter before the White House announcement.

Researchers fear Zika causes microcephaly, a serious birth defect in which a baby's head is too small, as well as posing other threats to the children of pregnant women infected with it.


Life story, movie star father lift Poe in Philippines' race

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Her life story could have come straight out of a soap opera. As a newborn, Grace Poe was abandoned in a Catholic church and adopted by movie star parents, giving her a powerful narrative and name that have helped catapult her to front-runner in the Philippine presidential race.

A political newcomer, elected to the Senate just three years ago, Poe has promised to cut taxes, fight crime and offer free kindergarten-to-college education for the poor. But it is the popularity of her late father, regarded as the king of Philippine movies, and her humble beginnings that appeal to the masses in this country where presidents have traditionally come from the landed gentry and po-

The 47-year-old candidate's campaign speeches are peppered with dialogues from the movies of her late father Fernando Poe Jr., popularly known as FPJ, who often played roles of an underdog battling powerful opponents to champion the poor.
