## Fair Queen Contest and Fashion Show to Be Held September 4th

The Castro County Chamber of Commerce will sponsor the now-annual Fair Queen beauty contest and Fashion Show in Dimmitt High School Auditorium Monday, September 4, at 8 p. m. The show will feature local talent in the field of beauty and modeling.

The fashion show will not be contested and no winner will be picked. It will be sponsored by Dimmitt merchants, who will choose their own entrants. According to John McFarland, Chamber Secretary, each merchant entering the show will be allowed to have up to four costumes modeled. If present plans are carried through, the show will be both entertaining and educational.

However, the beauty show is designed to be entertainment. Contestants will be required to wear formal or street dresses should they not have a formal gown; This does not fall in line with the usual bathing-suit type contest, but it was believed this type would be better for a Fair Queen. Girls between the ages of 15 to 20 only, will be allowed to enter the contest.

Judges have not been chosen for the beauty contest, but according to McFarland, they will all come from out-of-town to insure impartiality. Bernie Howell, of radio station KGNC, Amarillo, will act as master of ceremonies for the occasion. Howell is organist at the station, and will bring an organ and do some entertaining while here.

Girls in the beauty contest will be chosen with regard to poise, charm, personality, and beauty. Mr. McFarland also said that the last date for entering the show will be Friday, September 1. The beauty contest will be sponsored by individuals and organizations of the county. The secretary issued an open invitation to girls of Hart, Nazareth, and other Castro County communities to enter the fashion show and beauty contest. However, as stated before, they must be sponsored.

The beauty queen will be chosen to reign at the County Fair which will be held September 7, 8, and 9.

McFarland also stated that the Chamber desires pictures of the girls upon entrance. Sponsors will be expected to have these pictures. The purpose of the pictures will be for publicity purposes as they will be printed in this paper and others if possible. To be printed in the Castro County News along with the others, sponsors should turn in pictures Wednesday afternoon or by 9 o'clock Thursday morning. Small pictures are preferred, and if possible, they would like to have both small and large pictures. The large picture to be published in County and regional newspapers if the contestant wins.

Due to costs incurred by the contest and show a charge of 50 cents will be made to adults and 25 cents to children under 12.

## Highway 51 Will Be Widened; Building To End Next Week

According to Mr. R. D. Rogers, maintenance foreman of the local unit of the Texas Highway Department, a paving program is now underway to widen Highway 51 for several blocks from the Texaco Service Station to the Dimmitt Courts. The bed for the addition is finished and the topping will be made sometime next week. The highway at the point will be widened from 20 to 64 feet.

## Band Rehearsals Will Begin On Monday, Aug. 28

Rehearsals for all members of the Senior and Junior Bands will begin on Monday, August 28, and continue through Friday, September 1. Rehearsal time will be mornings from 9:00 to 11:00, it was announced this week by Nolan Frehoner, band director.

Members of the Junior Band will definitely meet with the Senior Band during this week in order that all who do well enough can be given a chance to become regular members of the Senior Band this fall.

Attendance at these rehearsals is required, Mr. Frehoner stated. The reason is that the Band will want to make a good appearance at the football games, and the first game will be on Friday night of the week in which school opens. Hence, full attendance at all of next week's practices is essential in order to gain at least an additional week's headway toward the first fall appearance.

"Band parents, please do not fail to have your children present and on time at the time set," he said.

## Run-off Races To Be Featured in Second Primary

A hotly-contested run-off primary ballot is coming up before voters Saturday. Contrary to usual run-off ballots, several races are being fought out in seeming desperation and a large voting turn-out is expected.

Probably one of the hottest races on the ballot so far as Panhandle residents are concerned is the Rogers-Clark Congress race. Altavene Clark was favored by the first primary, but Walter Rogers is expected to give her a close race. In fact many political commentators say that Rogers has a better than even chance to defeat Mrs. Clark.

Another hard fought race is that between Ben Ramsey and Pierce P. Brooks for Lieutenant Governor. Their race began comparatively light after the first primary, but as election time draws near they are both using every means to get their names before the people and get their votes.

The last of the really talked-of races in this section is the run-off between J. E. McDonald and John C. White for the office of Commissioner of Agriculture. Perhaps the main reason for this race being so hot is that McDonald stands in bad favor with the Texas Democratic Party, having bolted and taken a Republican stand on several issues. However, he is on the Democratic ticket, despite efforts of Texas Democrats to get his name taken from the ballot.

For Associate Justice of the Texas Supreme Court (place 1) is Meade F. Griffin of Hale County and George Harwood of Dallas. This race has stirred up interest in this part of Texas mainly because Judge Griffin is a Plainview resident. Harwood has also been one of the victims of the "scratch Dallas" campaign waged by a group of citizens who do not want Dallas to get too much governmental representation.

Robert L. Lattimore has also been caught in the "scratch Dallas" snare, and his opponent for place 3 on the Supreme Court is W. A. Morrison of Milam County.

No county run-off races will be held as all incumbents in Castro County were returned to office in the first primary.

# Flagg Voting Precinct No. 7 Is Moved to Dimmitt's No. 2

Action was taken here last week by the Commissioner's Court when they formally moved the Flagg voting precinct, number 7 to Dimmitt. This action was taken as a result of a petition circulated by Mr. Elmer Dixon of Flagg, asking for the removal. It has been a

long-felt need in Flagg as no public building was available for balloting when an election came up. It was felt that most people in Flagg would come to town on election day anyway, as it is generally on Saturdays.

The Flagg precinct voting box, since the removal of the church there, has been kept in private homes. Feeling that this was not a suitable place to vote, interested citizens in that precinct decided to move the box by petition. The Flagg precinct is now attached to Voting Precinct No. two in Dimmitt, where qualified voters from the old Precinct seven will vote. Balloting place will be in the County Sheriff's office.

According to County Judge Bob Estes, Precinct seven (Flagg) included the land bordered by Highway 51, north and south, Highway 86, east and west, Farm-to-Market Highway No. 1305 (25-Mile Avenue), and the south-west county line. This also includes the west side of Sunnyside and Big Square.

51 qualified Flagg voters signed the petition, now on file in Judge Estes' office. 104 qualified voters reside in that precinct. According to all reports every Flagg voter is well satisfied with the change. There has been talk for a long time of the action, but nothing had been done until Mr. Dixon circulated the petition during the July 22 primary.

To assure a complete and unbroken list of precinct numbers it was decided at the recent meeting of the Commissioners' Court to change the Bethel Election Precinct number from 15 to the vacated precinct number 7. Be (See FLAGG Page 8)

According to an announcement this week by Hart School officials, the Hart Schools will open Friday, September 1 for enrollment. Actual classes, however, will not begin until the next Monday.

Dales, third and second grades; Mrs. Dewey Mae Smith, first grade.

Lunch will be served daily in the school Lunch Room where Mrs. H. L. Sansing will be the supervisor, H. L. Sansing and Mrs. Oliver Jackson will be helpers in the Lunch Room.

Buses will follow the same routes as last year with drivers, H. L. Sansing, Charles Harmon and Mr. Braune, operating them.

Dimmitt High School students will begin enrolling Friday, August 25, in the office of O. T. Loyd, High School Principal. Registration will continue each day from 8:00 to 12:00 a. m. and 1:00 p. m. to 5:00 p. m. through Friday, September 1. Each student is free to choose his own day and time to enroll. Only students in grades 9, 10, 11, and 12 are to enroll early.

Students should allow themselves an hour or more at the high school to enroll.redits will be checked, courses selected, lockers issued, fees accepted, books issued and covered. New students should see that grade transcripts are sent to the principal.

Dimmitt Schools will officially open on Monday, September 4, at 8:45 a. m. Students in grades one through eight will enroll on this date. Buses make their usual runs at about their same time and will make their return trip leaving school at about 11:00 a. m. Chapel will be held at 10:15 in the auditorium for students in grades 5 thru 12 and parents.

Parents of new first grade pupils must file a copy of birth certificate with the school if their children are not listed on the Dimmitt census.

Pupils in grades 1 thru 4 will enroll in the old elementary building. Pupils in grades 5 thru 7 will enroll in the elementary barracks behind the high school. Pupils in the 8th grade will enroll in the high school building.

# Bobcats Will Start Season September 8th

Football enthusiasts in Dimmitt are about to see some bang-up games as soon as the fall football season begins. In an interview Tuesday with John Blaine, Bobcat mentor, it was learned that Conference 3B will be one of the hot spots in Panhandle football this year.

Fall training will begin September 1st, according to Blaine, with a total of 37 boys expected to report for practice. "This will be the hardest schedule that we've had in the last four years," said the coach, "and Dimmitt is definitely the dark-horse of the conference." Of Dimmitt's conference foes, Olton ranks highest with Sudan and Farwell also slated to be close contenders for the crown.

This year the Bobcats will employ the T-formation and double-wing. In the past years the T has worked wonders for Dimmitt and when used with the doubling the Bobcats should have a variety of plays that will keep even the best opponents guessing. And as usual the local footballers will have a fair roster of weight and speed plus much competition for starting line-up positions. Dimmitt, for the past years has had some of the best boys in the Panhandle representing the local high school. They have continually been rated in high esteem by all regional newspaper sports departments. Last year they lost only one game.

The new stadium, built several years ago, is in fine shape for this season as are lights and other fixtures. Expert care and fertilization promise to make the local gridiron one of the best playing fields in the district or region. A lush growth of grass on the field for surer-footing and easier

falls for contending teams.

A number of positions on the team are still open, and that number is ten. The only position apparently fixed is that of left end, which at this time belongs to Jimmy Cluck, 148-pound vet-

eran from last year's eleven.

However, two boys, Jack Dyer and Douglas Dennis will alternate the quarterback and right-half positions. They will have a tough contender in Weldon Warren who would like one of their positions. But the first two boys were strong men in last spring's training and based on their playing then, will be probable starters.

Incidentally, these positions and their holders are based only on spring training and do not necessarily mean the above will be first-string men. However, they seem to be best fitted according to that training.

Guards Billy Murphy and David Behrens will more than likely carry the center of the line, provided Murphy is able to play after a recent operation on his leg. Roy Murphy is able to play after Roy Murphy and Marvin Axe are expected to have a tough time beating out each other for the center position.

At tackles, Donald Wright and Don Nelson are both in each other's hair for right tackle and Coach Blaine will have a hard time deciding whether to run Jim Jowell, James Dobbs, or Glenn Lust at the left tackle spot.

As stated before, Jimmy Cluck seems to have the left end position but it's another story for the other side of the line. At right end Billy Gregory and Forrest Ricketts are nip-and-tuck, or were during spring training.

Of the positions left in the

backfield, it is expected that Gene Easley will get the nod for wing back, but Jack Hodges will probably give him stiff competition. The same story holds true for the center of the backfield.

In the fullback position, Glenn Brown will have a tough time keeping Jess Burch out of the spot.

All in all, Blaine will probably have trouble deciding on who to start as all the boys basically have the same coaching and their weight runs about the same between contenders. But regardless of who makes up the front team, Dimmitt should be strong on reserves at least this year.

According to the coach, the hardest battle for the Bobcats this year likely will be when they travel to Olton, who is nearly always able to pull a conference rabbit out of their hat of cotton pickers.

# State Selective Service Board Urges Oldsters to Forget Present Drafting

AUSTIN, TEXAS, August 24—Some men registered under the World War II draft act, now past 40 and 50 years of age, are attempting to advise old local boards of changes of address and status, although these draft boards have been out of existence for years.

As a result, these cards and letters are flooding present local boards and Selective Service headquarters here.

Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state director of Selective Service, advised today that "these men no longer have to advise of any change of address or status, as the law under which they registered was terminated by Congress in 1947."

The only men who are obligated to keep local boards advised are those registered under the Selective Service Act of 1948, which became law on June 24, 1948, the state director pointed out.

"Any man who has registered with Selective Service in 1948, 1949, or 1950 is obligated to advise his local board of address and status changes," General Wakefield said. "Any man who registered should ask himself the question: 'Should I be registered under the Selective Service Act of 1948?'"

The answer, says General Wakefield, is simple. If the man was born on August 30, 1922, or after, he is required to be registered, provided he is not under 18. If he was born prior to August 30, 1922, is not required by law to be registered under the Selective Service Act of 1948.

Males are required to register on their 18th birthdays or within five days thereafter.

## TEXAS-FREEDOM CHIEF



Lieut. General Preston A. Weathered, Dallas, prominent attorney of the Southwest and retired former commander of the 36th Infantry Division, Texas National Guard, has been appointed Texas State Chairman of the Crusade For Freedom by General Lucius D. Clay, national chairman of the movement.

General Weathered said that he was pleased to take the post of directing the Texas program for the Crusade For Freedom, which will include an intensive nation-wide, six weeks campaign in September and October. Plans are being made now for a strong Texas executive committee to lead the campaign in every section of the state.

Designed to halt communism and to save freedom, the movement will enroll millions of Americans on "Freedom Scrolls," to be permanently enshrined in the base of a 10-ton, 8-foot high "Freedom Bell" to be erected in Berlin next October. It also will support a vigorous and continuous series of radio programs to pierce the Iron Curtain of Communist Russia and its satellite countries.

General Dwight D. Eisenhower and General Clay, who was American Military Governor of Germany during the Berlin airlift, together with a group of outstanding business, professional and civic leaders of the nation, are heading the National Committee For A Free Europe, the organization sponsoring the Crusade.

# SPORTS AFIELD

Americans have been strongly sold on packaged products. Perhaps that's why the average sportsman believes he can buy a knowledge of first aid and the equipment of a small hospital by paying a fancy price for a gorgeously wrapped box of medical appliances. But first aid cannot be packed in packages, nor can knowledge of first aid be squeezed into a pamphlet or a 300-page book.

As for the contents of the av-

erage first-aid kit, Dr. Paul Fluck insists that, dollar for dollar, first-aid equipment can be purchased far more economically when it is selected item by item. Here's what he thinks a kit should contain:

One 10-yard roll of one-inch adhesive. This is big enough to provide for lots of injuries and to serve in other emergencies as well. Adhesive tape can pinch hit for a missing reel seat, it can bind guides fast to fly rods, and

cover the splintered edges of a boat seat. And you can't do that with the dol-size can of adhesive supplied with the average kit.

For an antiseptic, he uses tincture of Metaphen, although Merthiolate and a number of other modern antiseptics are equally effective. Tincture of iodine did a great job in its day, but medical research laboratories have developed far better germ killers.

Then include some toothpicks and a small package of cotton, tightly wrapped, so you can make your own swabs. Have at least three rolls of two-inch bandage and a couple rolls of one-inch in your kit. Buy a dozen three-inch squares of sterile gauze in envelopes, and the best pair of scissors you can afford.

When packing your kit, give a thought to your personal ailments. Your doctor can give you pills that will check diarrhea or a headache, and whatever else he thinks you should carry. You should also take along some water-purifying tablets if your water will come directly from streams, lakes or springs.

Here's a special warning to sportsmen: tetanus, or lockjaw, is one of the 10 worst diseases afflicting man. Every splinter, every misguided knife blade, every wire fence barb, every bullet, every grain of shot, every burn wound can carry billions of lockjaw spores into the human body. But how many sportsmen ever

take a precaution against this? Two injections of tetanus toxoid by your doctor, with a "booster" shot every year or so will give you immunity.

**Water District To Hold Hearing In Plainview**

The three-man State Board of Water Engineers will conduct a 21-county hearing in Plainview, Aug. 29, prior to designating boundaries of one or more underground water reservoirs for the purpose of creating underground water conservation districts.

The High Plains Water Conservation and Users Association this week reminded irrigation farmers that their testimony at the hearing will have a direct bearing on boundaries designated.

Arthur P. Duggan, Jr., Littlefield, an attorney for the association, said that all farmers who depend on underground water for irrigation should attend the hearing, set for 10 a. m., Tuesday in the Plainview municipal auditorium.

"Any man who thinks he should be in or out of the district should be prepared to appear before the board, giving reasons for his desire to be included or excluded from the proposed district," Duggan said.

Designation of reservoirs by the State Board is a step towards formation of conservation districts under provisions of House Bill 162, passed by the 51st Legislature in 1949. The law provides for districts, controlled by elective local boards of five directors, to conserve, preserve and protect underground waters in a program of well spacing, recharging and waste prevention.

The board members are H. A. Beckwith, A. P. Rollins and James S. Guleke.

The hearing is for 21 Panhandle-South Plains Counties, Armstrong, Bailey, Briscoe, Castro, Cochran, Crosby, Deaf Smith, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Oldham, Farmer, Potter, Randall, Swisher, and Terry.

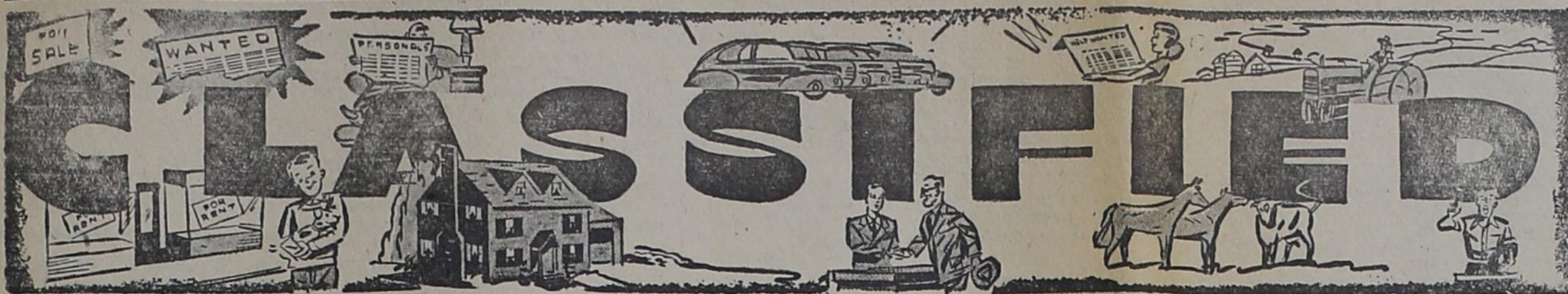

**Urge Farm Storage For Grain Sorghums**

COLLEGE STATION, August 24—With another bumper crop of grain sorghum being harvested in Texas, the farmer is again faced with the problem of disposing of his grain. Although several million bushels of storage space have been provided on Texas farms since last year, additional space may still be needed to take care of this year's crop.

dry site. Plan an easy way for moving the grain in and out. Build the structures so they will last for many years.

W. S. Allen, extension agricultural engineer of Texas A. & M. College, points out that on-the-farm storage gives the farmer insurance that his crop can be taken care of and enables him to qualify for government loans. It also allows him to store his grain and feed it to livestock, if that appears to be his most profitable method of marketing it.

Allen points out that the qualifications for a government loan require that the grain be stored in bins or granaries where it will not be subject to damage from moisture, insects, rodents, or other causes.

According to Allen, storage facilities can be constructed at a cost of from 15 to 50 cents a bushel, depending on the size of the structure. The larger the structure, the less the cost will be per bushel of storage space.

If you are in need of blueprints and additional information about building on-the-farm storage, Allen suggests that you contact your local county agent.

Due to the lack of sufficient labor in many localities, some farmers may prefer to buy prefabricated bins or granaries. This year, most of these prefabricated structures are costing about 30 cents per bushel of storage capacity.

**Offices Open In State Department of Health**

Austin, Texas, August 24. Open competitive examinations for key punch, statistical, and business machine operators for positions with the Texas State Department of Health are being announced this week by Mr. Russel E. Shrader, Supervisor of the Merit System Council.

Allen cautions that regardless of whether the farmers builds his storage or buys a prefabricated bin, there are several things to be considered when planning for grain storage.

Low moisture content is necessary for long, safe storage of grain. This is particularly true of grain sorghum which should not test over 12 percent. Construct a strong, durable building and eliminate cracks and holes through which moisture and insects may enter. Provide facilities for fumigation where necessary. Rat proof the grain structure and locate it conveniently on a firm,

Examinations will consist of a written test to county 100% for all except booking machine operators, whose test will be 50% written, 50 % performance. Classifications for which examinations may be taken are: Key Punch Operator, Junior Statistical Machine Operator, Senior Statistical Machine Operator, Bookkeeping Machine Operator, Statistical Assistant, PBX Operator, and Photostatic Operator. All positions are located in the state offices in Austin.

All applicants must be high school graduates. Other requirements are office experience and special training.

### "Scratch Dallas" Plan Underway All Over State

The campaign to "scratch Dallas" in the Aug. 26 run-off election is sweeping Texas, Chairman Emmett Alexander of Marble Falls said today.

Harwood of Dallas County and Meade F. Griffin of Hale County, for Supreme Court, Place 3; and Robert L. Lattimore of Dallas County and W. A. Morrison of Milam County, for Court of Criminal Appeals.

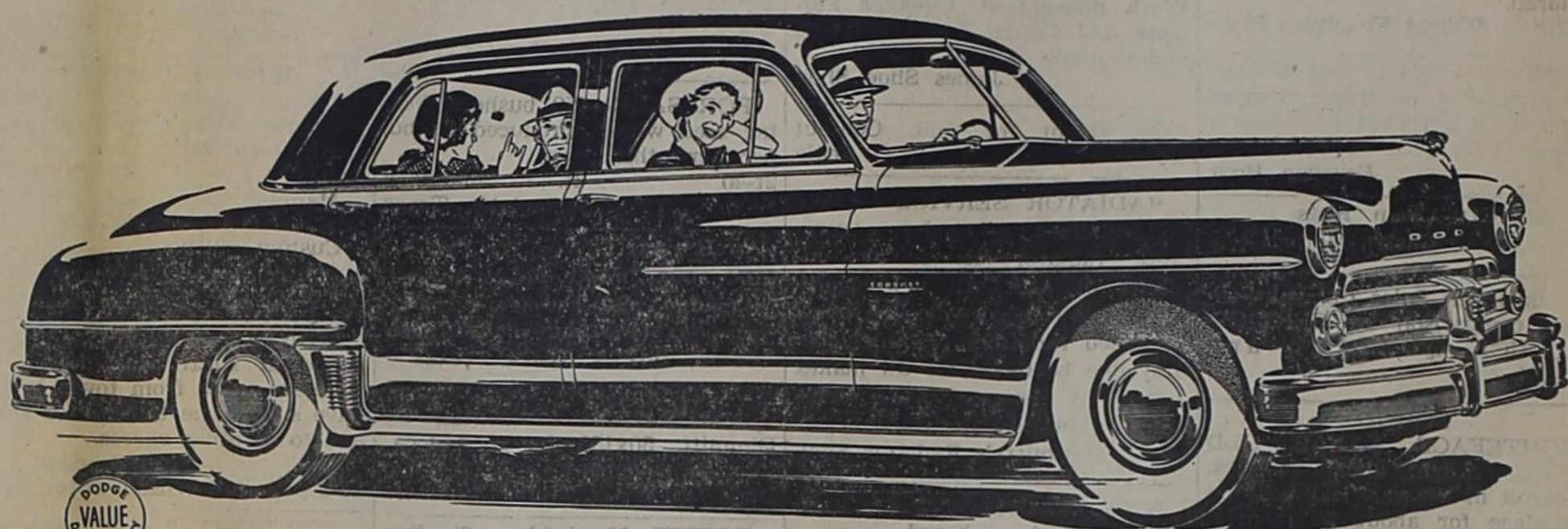

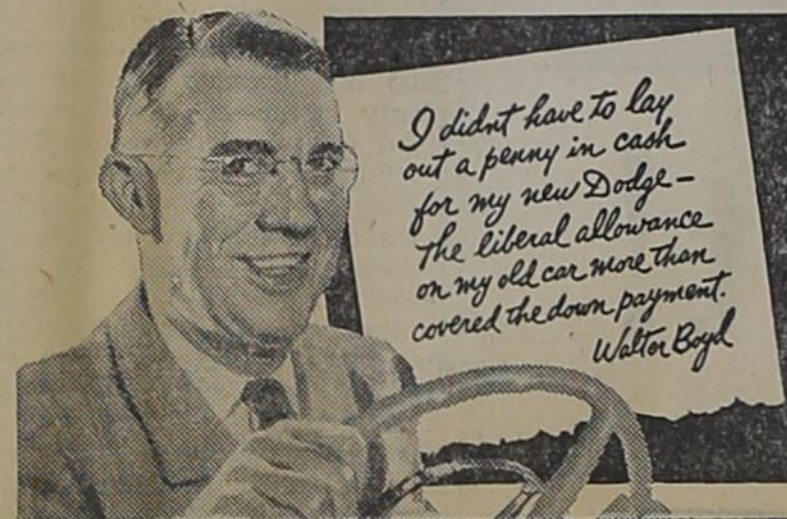

### Red Cross Offers Workers in Korea

Washington, D. C. —The welfare services of American Red Cross field workers in Korea were offered to the troop of other nations responding to the United Nations call for assistance in the Korean conflict.

In a letter addressed to the Red Cross societies of the nine countries involved, the American organization outlined a four-point program it could offer other UN troops until their own Red Cross workers join them in Korea. The program includes counseling on personal and family problems,

transmitting or requesting information through Red Cross channels, distributing comfort articles and providing such recreation facilities as may be requested by the military.

The offer went to the Red Cross societies of Great Britain, Australia, The Netherlands, The Philippines, Thailand, New Zealand, Bolivia, and Canada and to the Red Crescent of Turkey. All of these countries have announced their willingness to send forces to Korea.

Currently there are 21 American Red Cross field workers in Korea, including three women, providing traditional Red Cross services to American troops. Eleven more workers are enroute. The aid offered other UN forces parallels that being given to U. S. servicemen. Since the conflict started, Red Cross headquarters at Tokyo has requested \$90,000 worth of supplies for use in Korea.

### Sprays May Result In Damage If Not Used Properly, Prof Declares

LUBBOCK, Aug. 16— More harm than good result from indiscriminate use of 2-4-D weed killers and might even result in damage suits, a Texas Technological College plant expert said today.

Dr. A. W. Young, head of Tech's agronomy department, said under Texas laws persons who spray 2-4-D with power-driven machines must have a license from the state before they can begin operation. Only hand-operated sprayers are exempted from the licensing restriction.

Dr. Young exhibited cotton plants which had leaves with finger-like extensions. He said they were caused by weed-killers which had "backfired" on the growers, particularly the stronger forms like amine and ester 2-4-D.

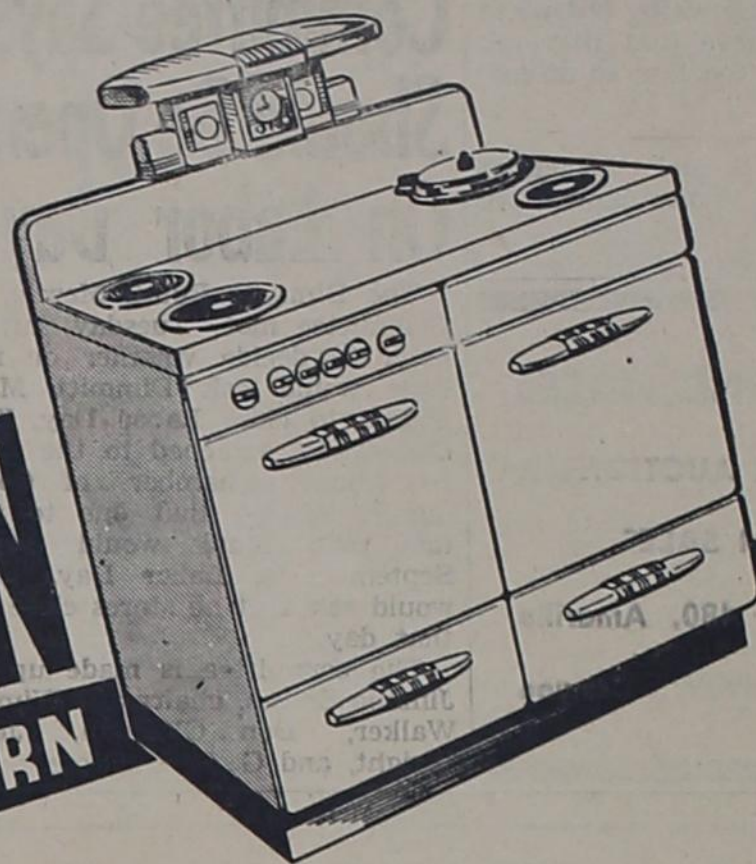
"Wind can cause droplets of 2-4-D to drift into fields where serious damages can result, although ammonium and sodium compounds are not as potent as some forms," he said.

He suggested that persons planning to use the weed-killer write the commissioner of agriculture's office at Austin before they begin operation of the power-driven sprayers.

**State Highway Department Is Improving Roadside Park**

The State Highway Department for the past several months has been making steady improvements on the highway park south of Dimmitt. According to R. D. Rogers, local department maintenance foreman, the present program will last for several years, with a complete park and facilities in view. Driveway construction began first several months ago.

Listed among the improvements is a sanitary pressure system to be in operation in the park soon. The water system is similar to those in many farm homes in this area and will provide outlets for upkeep on trees and grass as well as furnish water for outings and picnics. The unit will replace the windmill and pond formerly used for watering purposes. It was decided not to have a pond because of its unsanitary conditions.

Another improvement will be an added two picnic tables for use of local people and highway traveling, said Mr. Rogers. They will replace the home-made tables that were constructed from cutter blades and foundation steel. With these will also be two barbecue pits and two underground garbage disposal units. The units will be completely sanitary so as to minimize fly breeding and other insects. Drives through the park will be paved with two asphalt parking places.

If present plans are carried through a playground for children will be installed in the park. This playground will also be covered with burmuda grass, whereas the natural grass will cover most of the park.

Several weeks remain, before the present plans are completed but most will be ready by September first. Estimated cost of the improvements will be between \$3,000 and \$3,500. The whole improvement program is a long-range one with several years to be taken for completion. Already the park is one of the better ones in this region. The program will take several years mainly because money for the project must be appropriated from the home office in Austin.

Many Dimmitt and Castro County residents will welcome the program because of the park's popularity as a public picnic spot. Almost every family or group has at one time or another sponsored a party, outing or picnic there.

**THE LAW AND YOU**

DO YOU KNOW what the the community property of a husband and wife is?  
Community property is all property acquired by the husband and wife after their marriage, except that which is received by either of them as a gift or by inheritance, or in exchange for other separate property. Property owned by either of the parties at the time of their marriage is separate property, as is that received after marriage by gift or inheritance. The rents and revenues from separate property of either husband or wife becomes community property.  
Both parties to the marriage are equal owners of the community property, and upon a dissolution of the marriage are entitled to have their rights to all of their

separate property established, and also to one-half of all of the community property.  
The husband has charge of the community property during the period of the marriage, however he may not sell the homestead without the joinder of the wife. The wife has charge of her separate property during the marriage, but may not sell or encumber the real estate of her separate property without the joinder of her husband. Under certain circumstances, the wife can get permission from the Court to sell her real estate without the joinder of her husband.

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# Rogers Expresses Views On Russia's Seat in UN

PAMPA—As the second last week of the Congressional race came to a close, Walter Rogers, Pampa contender for the 18th District seat, took an outright, definite stand on Russia, calling for the ouster of the Soviet from the United Nations, advocated outlawing Russia—and her Politburo—and demanded an economic blockade against her and her satellite nations.

It was the strongest statement in the campaign issued by any candidate—the first, in fact, since the campaign for the special Election on May 6.

Rogers made his strongly worded statement during his regular Friday night radio round-table over KGNC, Amarillo.

Comparing the Soviet Union with an octopus, and the Korean situation as one of its tentacles, Rogers declared:

"The final annihilation of that tentacle (Korean communism) will not effectively destroy the body from which it came. I feel now . . . that to destroy the evil the root of that evil must be rendered ineffective. Therefore, it is time to expel Russia from the United Nations. Outlaw Russia and the entire Politburo—including Stalin, Molotov, Malik and the rest of the war monger, and create an economic blockade against Russia and all her satellites. Russia cannot stand an economic blockade nor an immediate shutdown. We cannot afford to continue to sacrifice American lives fighting one tentacle of that octopus . . . the play must be called against the body of that octopus and without delay, hesitation, and without appeasement."

He called, too, for all out mobilization and said that it should start by immediately channeling federal funds toward defense projects, and abolish the "vast number of useless bureaus, boards and commissions, that are fighting to keep their place at the public hog trough."

Rogers cited two instances of bureaucratic action; one of them an "apple census" taken recently by the Dept. of Agriculture to determine whether families ate their apples raw, or cooked, and how cooked, and followed up with the refusal of the agent in charge of the survey refusing to give the press any statements in the survey. The other instance was when a Florida sugar planter was penalized by the government for overplanting his crop at the same time sugar rationing stamps were being put on the presses in Washington. The first instance, Rogers said, was gleaned from a story in a newspaper and the second from a farmer in the cotton growing section of the Panhandle.

In answer to question from a farmer asking if he thought the Panhandle would be better off if Congress did as much for it as the farmers themselves have, Rogers replied: "In traveling over the District I have realized what great progress the farmer has made. That progress can continue only under sound farm program based on common sense, local control and sound practices. The basic principles of the present program must be retained and developed on a practical basis and keeping bureaucratic trends from taking it too far afield that it eventually destroys itself."

Replying to another query on coddling commies, Rogers termed it "a disgrace," pointing to the insults suffered by Judge Harold S. Medina while trying the 11 top reds in the U. S. and concluded, saying, "if this agitation would have been pulled off in Russia, the instigators would have been shot."

The lanky Pampa Candidate wound up his last week's itinerary with visits to the Perryton birthday celebration, the Phillips Fair, and a canvass of Dalhart and Dumas. Campaign workers for Rogers returning from points in the District jubilantly reported the trend swinging in the Pampa Candidate's favor with "still more" former supporters of eliminated candidates "jumping on the Rogers bandwagon"—even some of his present opponent's supporters were coming over to Roger's camp. A meeting by men and women of the Rogers for Congress Club was held in the Gray County Court Room Monday night. Campaign manager Wiley Reynolds, Gray County farmer-rancher, said the itinerary for the last week looks "just as rough and rugged" as it did the other weeks, but an exact timetable was still not completed.

## Texas Economy Commission To Be Set Up For Lowering Costs

The Texas Economy Commission is pushing is pushing the work to give the average Texas citizen a voice in securing "the

bargain of a lifetime," according to an announcement today by John Shepperd, Secretary of State and secretary of the TEC.

"The Commission offers the average citizen a chance to spend a little in order to save a great deal," Mr. Shepperd said.

"Texans paid \$164,232,500 for state government in 1939. Last year, only ten years later, they paid a staggering \$443,776,800. This year it is going to cost over half a billion dollars.

"The TEC needs \$75,000 for its first year of operation. This will be spent on intensive, impartial research into all agencies of the executive branch. The facts turned up will be the basis for designing an efficient reform program to be acted upon by the Legislature.

"If the rising trend in governmental costs can be reduced through the TEC's work and influence of its individual members

The TEC is composed of six hundred Texas citizens appointed by Governor Allan Shivers to conduct the study of the executive branch and present its recommendations to the Legislature. Its status is unofficial and no tax money is allocated to operate it. The TEC depends entirely upon individual membership fees and private contributions for its stand.

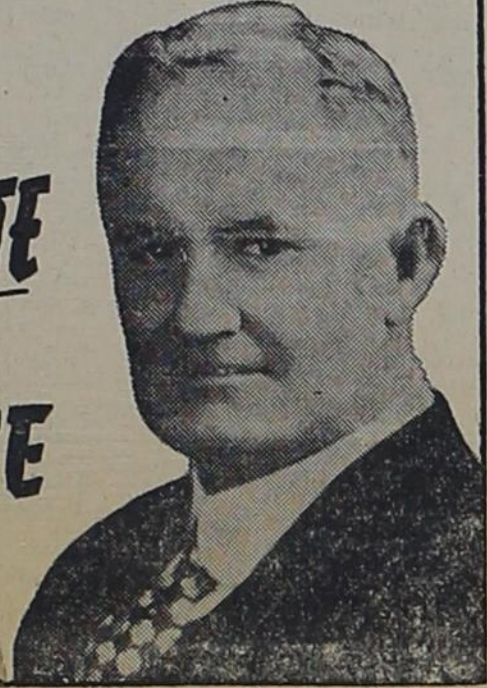

Austin, Texas—The Department of the Army announced this week that veterans of five divisions listed as being in the Far East Command, and members of the Enlisted Reserve Corps who formerly served with the divisions may now volunteer for extended active duty with their old units. Col. Oscar B. Abbott, Chief of Texas Military District stated here today.

Assurance was given that qualified veterans and personnel of the Enlisted Reserve Corps who have previously served with the 2nd Infantry Division, 7th Infantry Division, 24th Infantry Division, 25th Infantry Division or 1st Cavalry (Infantry) Division and who enlist or are recalled specifically for duty with one of the five divisions would be assigned within the units.

The invitation to join these widely known Army units was made following many inquiries from veterans of the division who want to rejoin their old outfits now on duty in the Far East.

The authorizing directive states that no guarantee can be given to an individual as to the duration of assignment to the units of his choice. All enlistments for this program, however, will be for periods of 3, 4, 5, or 6 years in the Regular Army.

Members of the Enlisted Reserve Corps will serve in the grades now held in the Corps.

## Health Officer Recommends Fluorination

City fathers in three Texas cities, by artificially adding fluoride salts to their municipal wa-

ter supplies, are making the dream of fewer tooth cavities come true. Corpus Christi and Marshall have fluoridation systems working now. Austin has one in the installation process. If things go according to plan children in these towns will be spared easily half the visits they now have to make to their family dentists, because they'll have fewer cavities. State Health Officer Geo. W.

Cox describes the fluoridation process as a "tremendous step forward in the fight against dental diseases. It's simple and inexpensive, as well as effective." "It won't be a cure-all," Dr. Edward Taylor cautions, director of dental health at the State Health Department. "It won't give children complete protection against tooth decay, but it will reduce decay from 23 to 47 per cent."

He said that range of reduction percentage had been established in departmental experiments with artificial fluoridation in Marshall. The addition of the chemical in drinking water in the ratio of 1 to 1.5 parts per million parts of water now has been recommended as a decay control measure by the United States Public Health Service, the American Water Works Association, and the Association of State and Territorial Dental Health Directors.

Recommendations are subject to approval of state and local health departments, which has been granted in the case of three Texas cities.

Marshall began artificial fluoridation in 1946 in a controlled experiment, and was a leader in the field both nationally and locally. Corpus Christi began the water treatment in October last year.

Austin City Manager Walter Seaholm has indicated that orders for equipment have been placed and treatment will begin as soon as delivery and installation are complete.

Combining the population of the three cities, over 300,000 people will soon be drinking water chemically treated to retard or prevent dental decay.

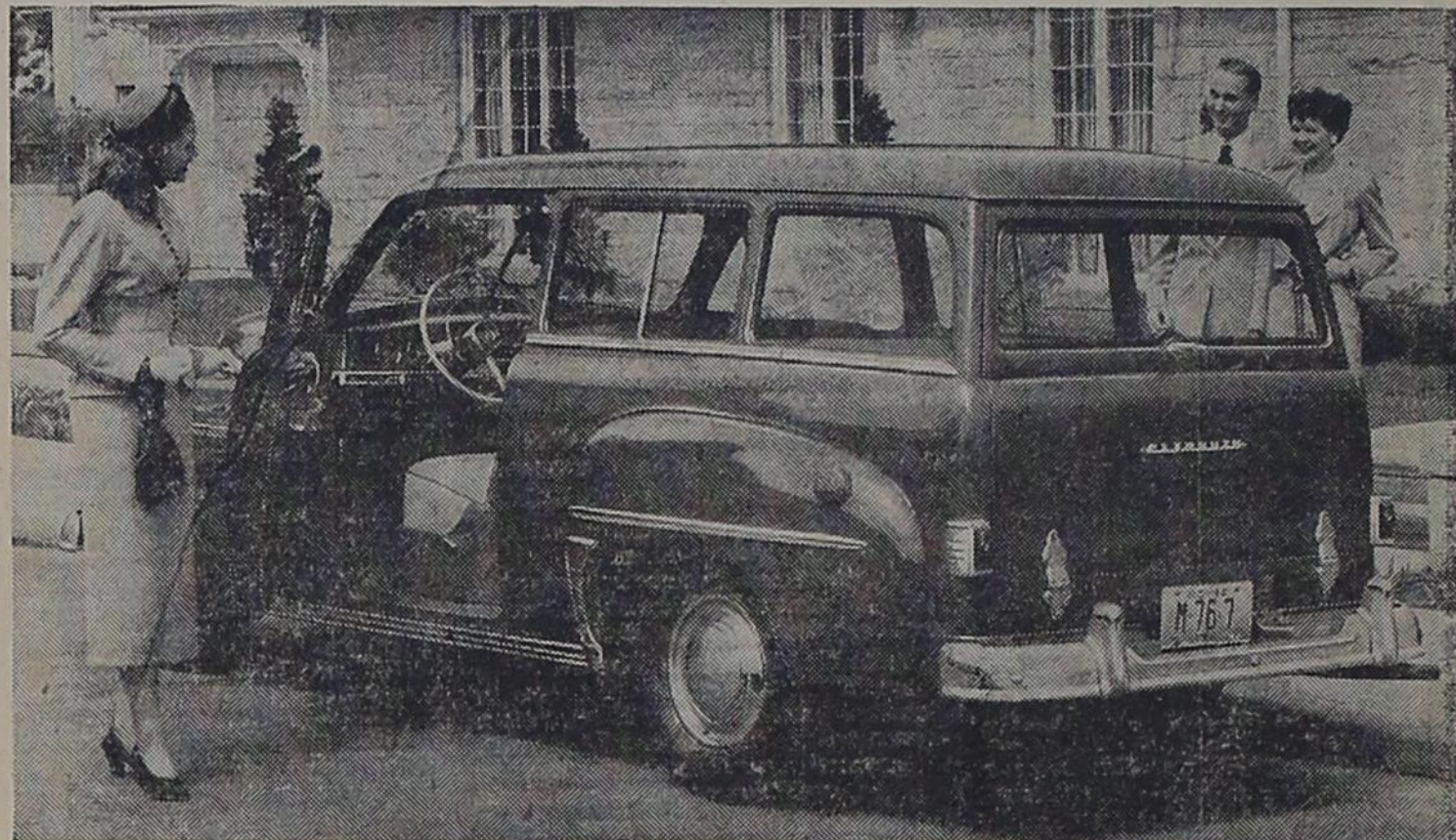

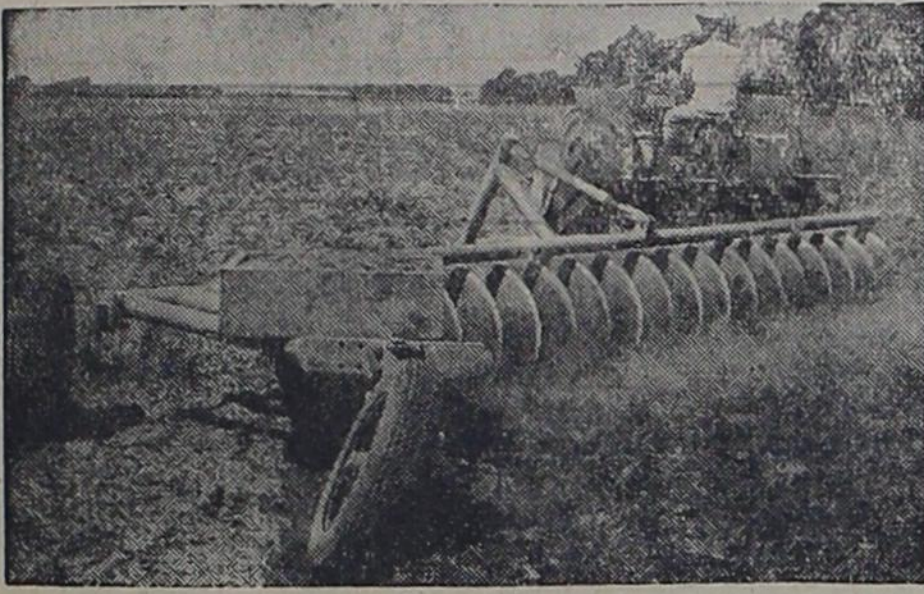

### Nationwide Expansion Of Natural Gas Lines Seen Aid to Rearing

The country's ability to carry out the stepped up arms program without weakening the civilian economy has been aided by the tremendous expansion of the natural gas industry since V-J Day, W. Paul Jones, president of Servel, Inc., said today.

Because natural gas is the most sought-after type of basic energy, the gas utility industry has spent three billion dollars since Aug. 14, 1945, to extend pipelines into every major industrial area of the United States, Jones explained in a review of progress made during the first half of a ten-year postwar development.

With 282,000 miles of pipeline now in service—50,000 more miles than the nation's total rail mileage—the gas industry is delivering energy at the annual rate of over four thousand billion cubic feet, Jones said, compared with less than 2.7 thousand billion marketed in 1945.

"The significance of this expansion to America's new industrial mobilization program is that natural gas can be counted upon heavily to ease the nation's transportation burden," said the executive. "Natural gas does not have to be transported by ship,

rail, truck or plane."

He estimated that natural gas pipelines are currently carrying to industry and homes the energy equivalent of 80,000 hopper cars of coal weekly, or 40,000 more "carloads" of gas a week than during 1942 in the midst of World War II.

By the end of 1950, when pipeline service into New York City is scheduled to begin, natural gas will account for about 20 per cent of the nation's total energy supply. In 1946 it supplied only 13 per cent of the total, Jones pointed out.

"Given adequate supplies of materials and manpower, the utility industry will continue largescale construction of storage facilities, pipelines and local distribution systems for natural gas well into 1955," Jones predicted. "Demand from all classes of cutomers is nowhere near the saturation point, even though annual capital expenditures by the natural gas industry between 1939 and 1949 increased three times faster than the gain for all private industry investment. There are still millions of industrial, commercial and residential establishments which want natural gas service, or additions to present service, because of the fuel's low cost, its efficiency, the dependability of supplies and negligible maintenance costs involved in its use."

### John T. Haynes Rites Thursday At Silvertown

John T. Haynes, 68, died at 9:30 this morning at a Lubbock hospital. He had been taken there for treatment three days ago after being in ill health for several months.

Funeral services are scheduled tomorrow afternoon at Silvertown. He will be buried in the Silvertown cemetery beside the body of his wife, Mrs. Nanny Haynes, familiarly known as Mammy during the later years of her life.

Last month Mr. Haynes donated an eighty acre tract of land near Silvertown to the Plainview Girl Scout Council. It adjoins another 80-acre tract previously given by Haynes to the Boy Scouts. The camp sites are known as Camp Silvertown and Camp Mammy Haynes, respectively.

Mr. Haynes will be remembered by many Boy Scouts and older people of Dimmitt as one of the old-timers of the Panhandle. The local Scout organization has spent several outings on his scout encampment.

John T. Haynes settled at Petersburg in 1893. He later moved to Briscoe county where he acquired large land holdings north of Quitaque. He lived in a home on the brink of the canyon overlooking the scout camp sites.

Active throughout his career, Mr. Haynes did not let advancing years curb his adventurous spirit during World War II. He entered government service at Honolulu, where he remained 18 months. Then he joined the Merchant Marines and served the latter part of the war sailing South Pacific and Mediterranean waters.

Two sons, Jim of Eagle Pass and Jack of Lubbock, survive. Other survivors include three sisters: Miss Billy Haynes of Los Angeles, who joined her brother in the gift of land to the Girl Scouts; Mrs. Mary Daniels of Plainview, and Mrs. Lou Holderness of Oklahoma City.

### Texas Zephyr Makes Initial Run for FW&D

Today is the first anniversary of the completely streamlined Texas Zephyr, which made its initial trip out of Dallas and Fort Worth for Denver City on Thursday, August 22, 1940.

Upon delivery of two 4,000 HP diesel-electric locomotives to Fort Worth and Denver City Railway earlier that year, an accelerated train service was established partially with conventional equipment on June 2, 1940, but it was not until mid-August that all of the streamlined equipment was delivered.

The inaugural train was called the "Advance Texas Zephyr". As soon as it became completely streamlined the word "Advance" was dropped, and since August 22 of 1940, it has been known as the "Texas Zephyr".

Railroad fans will be interested in knowing that the two diesel-electric locomotives placed in operation for this service in 1940 have accumulated in excess of 2.8 million miles of service each.

Hundreds of thousands of passengers have been accommodated on this high-speed train during the past ten years. It performed notable service at the height of the heavy movement during World War II, when on occasions as many as 800 passengers per day would leave Fort Worth on the northward Zephyr.

On June 2nd of this year, more than 5000 commemorative cachets were mailed from the Texas Zephyr to collectors all over America and to a number of foreign countries.
