A fix for siren system

Repair crews busy after two alarms fail Sunday

 Big Spring city officials are busy trying to get the kinks out of the local storm warning siren system. During last Sunday's severe storm, which spawned at least two tornadoes and dumped hail and up to three inches of rain

in the area, two of the city's 10 storm sirens failed to activate, while others worked almost too well. The siren failures occurred in the Kentwood subdivision and on Fairchild Street near the McMahon-Wrinkle Airpark, Big Spring Fire Department Chief Craig Ferguson said. In other instances, sirens kept wailing

long after the storm system had passed through the area. Mechanical failures were the likely causes in both instances, he noted. "There was a malfunction in the Kentwood siren, but we don't know exactly what the problem was there," Ferguson said. "At

AP: Intruders breach US airport fences about every 10 days

(AP) — Under pressure to prevent people from sneaking onto runways and planes at major U.S. airports, authorities are cracking down — not on the intruders who slip through perimeter gates or jump over fences, but on the release of information about the breaches.

A year after an Associated Press investigation first revealed persistent problems with airports' outer defenses, breaches remain as frequent as ever — occurring about once every 10 days — despite some investments to fortify the nation's airfields. As Americans focus on the wait in ever-longer security screening lines inside terminals, new documents show dozens more incidents happening outside perimeters than airports have disclosed.

At the same time, leaders at some airports and the U.S. Transportation Security Administration are saying some of the 345 incidents AP found shouldn't count as security breaches, even when intruders got deep into secure areas.

Was it a perimeter security breach in March 2015 when a woman walked past a vehicle exit gate at San Francisco International Airport and onto the tarmac, where she tried to flag down a jet for a trip home to Guatemala? No it was not, said the airport and TSA officials, who also tried to suppress information about the case. Nor did they label it a breach when a man, following voices only he could hear, drove through a San Francisco security gate and asked a worker fueling a plane when the next flight was.

After discussing intrusions openly at first, officials at several airports and the TSA started withholding details, arguing the release could expose vulnerabilities. Following a two-year legal struggle with the TSA, AP has now used newly released information to create the most comprehensive public tally of breaches.

State Department email report complicates Clinton's message

SALINAS, Calif. (AP) — Hillary Clinton is telling voters not to trust Donald Trump. But a new government report about her usage of a private email server as secretary of state is complicating that message.

The sharp rebuke from the State Department's inspector general, which found Clinton did not seek legal approval for her homebrew email server, guarantees that the issue will remain alive and well for the likely Democratic presidential nominee for a second summer.

The new report comes at a particularly challenging time for the Clinton campaign, as she faces a two-front war against presumptive GOP nominee Donald Trump and primary rival Bernie Sanders.

Already, Clinton faces questions about her trustworthiness, with months of polling showing voters give her low marks for integrity.

It's a narrative that Trump has been eager to encourage. In the early weeks of his general election campaign he's dubbed Clinton "Crooked Hillary" — a moniker intended to underscore questions about integrity.

Japan urges G-7 to urgently tackle global economic risks

ISE, Japan (AP) — Japanese Prime Minister Shinzo Abe urged fellow leaders of the Group of Seven advanced economies to unite Thursday in forging a more urgent, coordinated response to the faltering global recovery.

Abe and his counterparts sat down at a big round table for the first of their summit working sessions after strolling through the grounds of the Ise (E-say) Shrine, a tranquil, densely forested landmark that is the holiest site in the Japan's indigenous Shinto religion, and then joining a group of children in a tree planting ceremony.

The G-7 gathering dovetails in many ways with Abe's long-term diplomatic, political and economic agenda. A dramatic statement about global economic risks and a strong show of support for public spending to help spur growth could help Abe justify extra stimulus and possibly provide political cover for postponing an unpopular but badly needed increase in the sales tax next April.

An aide said Abe planned to use data charts dramatically illustrating the severity of the recent slump in commodity prices and the slowdown in China.

"There is a concern that the sluggish economy might last some time, and that Abe hopes to share a common notion about the potential risks," said Hiroshige Seko, a deputy chief cabinet secretary.

Nuclear-free aspirations of Obama, Abe conflict with reality

TOBA, Japan (AP) — There is the soaring rhetoric. And then there's the messy reality.

When U.S. President Barack Obama and Japanese Prime Minister Shinzo Abe make a historic visit to Hiroshima on Friday — the first time a sitting U.S. president has visited the site of the first atomic bomb attack — their words advocating nuclear disarmament will clash with real-world security necessities.

Far from backing up the vision of a world without nuclear bombs that Obama laid out in a 2009 speech that helped secure a Nobel Peace Prize, his near-finished presidency has seen a multibillion-dollar modernization of the U.S. nuclear force.

Japan's long postwar commitment to disarmament, meanwhile, is only possible because of its reliance on the so-called American "nuclear umbrella" that protects it from antagonistic North Korea and China. Tokyo, should it choose, could probably easily convert its advanced civilian nuclear program into a weapons program, and some conservatives in Abe's ruling party have argued that the

country's pacifist constitution technically allows nuclear weapons.

Despite his own mixed record on nukes, Obama likely sees his Hiroshima visit as a worthwhile expenditure of political capital in order to shore up a global nonproliferation effort that seems at times to be crumbling.

Pro-Trump Hispanics face ridicule from friends and family

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — Hispanic voters in Florida, New Mexico and California have waved Mexican flags and bashed Donald Trump piñatas — clashing with police, at times — to protest the Republican presidential contender's hard line approach to immigration.

Yet far from the protests, an increasingly vocal Hispanic minority is speaking out in favor of the brash billionaire. They are backing Trump even in the face of resentment and suspicion from friends and family, who are among the overwhelming majority of non-white voters opposed to the New York businessman's candidacy.

"I'm not ashamed to vote for Trump. I'd just rather not have the conversation with my family," said Natalie Lally, a 22-year-old college student from New York City whose large extended family has Colombian roots.

She says silence fell over her grandmother's living room when she admitted her support for Trump during a recent family gathering that included more than 30 relatives.

"They just kind of seemed uneasy," she recalled. "And my uncle just said, 'Why?'"

Obama: World leaders rightfully 'rattled' by Trump

SHIMA, Japan (AP) — President Barack Obama says world leaders are "rattled" by Donald Trump and have good reason to feel that way.

Obama is discussing the 2016 presidential campaign during a news conference in Japan, saying foreign leaders are surprised by Trump and not sure how seriously to take the things he says.

Obama says many of the likely Republican nominee's proposals display ignorance about world affairs, a cavalier attitude or an interest in getting "tweets and headlines." He's contrasting that to proposals to make America safe.

The president is also downplaying Democratic concerns about the long-running primary fight between Hillary Clinton and Bernie Sanders.

local veterans organizations such as American Legion Post 506, the Permian Basin Chapter of ex-POWs, and the All Veterans Auxiliary, among others. According to Morris, each group will help participate in a commemorative wreath laying at the

main flagpole during the ceremony.

Fairchild, it malfunctioned because of motor damage."

Crews were working to get both sirens operational this week, and Ferguson said there will be a city wide test of the system Monday.

Even with the failure

of the two sirens, Ferguson said redundancies built into the system are adequate to cover the entire city. Emergency warnings also are available through the local radio stations and through cell phone text and "i-info" email notifications. To sign up for email notifications, visit www.mybigspring.com, scroll to the bottom of the home page and click

the icon that reads, "i-info West Texas Regional Communications Sign Up NOW."

Inclement weather is forecast for today and Friday for Big Spring. If a severe storm strikes, Ferguson urges citizens to hunker down.

"(The Federal Emergency Management Agency) recommends you shelter 'in place,'" he said. "You're safer in

your home than you are anywhere else."

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Making fun of transgender people

When I was a lad, I often heard jokes about blacks, Latinos and gays, who were regarded as amusing because of their supposed inferiority and defectiveness. Today most people would be embarrassed and offended by such humor. But, at least in some places, there is one group that is still a safe source of yuks: transgender people.

Recently, *Time* magazine reports, Texas Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick told a gathering in Dallas, “It is great to be in the largest Republican convention on the planet, and not one man wants to use the ladies’ room.” He advised, “When you go to the restroom, the M does not stand for ‘make up your mind,’ and the W does not stand for ‘whatever.’”

His stand-up routine is nearly as sharp as that of Ted Cruz, who in the closing days of his campaign often quipped, “Even if Donald Trump dresses up as Hillary Clinton, he shouldn’t be using the girls’ restroom.” His audiences would laugh till their ribs ached.

This jocularity relies on the belief that anyone who is transgender is bizarre, dangerous and mentally ill. The comedy expresses contempt. These conservatives firmly believe that anyone born with male genitalia is a male and anyone born with female genitalia is a female. End of story.

If only humans were so simple. Right-wing culture warriors have long tried to depict gays and lesbians in similar terms. If you have a penis, you should not be attracted to men. If you do, you’re a deviate — akin to someone who engages in bestiality.

But reality indicates that heterosexuality is not quite universal. Neither is gender dysphoria — the intractable sense that you are fundamentally different from what your body denotes.

The Justice Department offered a more rational understanding in the lawsuit it filed against North Carolina for a law requiring people to use public restrooms corresponding to the sex on their birth certificate.

The state’s mandate makes sense if you assume that gender is a straightforward matter of plumbing equipment. For most people, it may be. But for a small segment of the population, it isn’t.

“An individual’s ‘sex’ consists of multiple factors, which may not always be in alignment,” the Justice Department explained. “Among those factors are hormones, external genitalia, internal reproductive organs, chromosomes, and gender identity, which is an individual’s internal sense of being male or female.”

It may seem absurd that someone could be born with a penis yet feel female. But University of Chicago law professor David Weisbach offers an illustration that helps to make sense of it.

Suppose a heterosexual male were captured by a James Bond villain and subjected to surgery to replace his penis with a vagina. Would he then be a woman even though his mind tells him he’s a man? Would he embrace being female? Wouldn’t he want the change reversed to make his body match his gender identity?

That, says Weisbach, is how transgender people feel. When

someone who lives, identifies and presents as a woman is required to use the men’s restroom, it humiliates her. And it does no good; it’s not as though men will be comfortable having someone who appears to be female in the next stall.

But to understand what it’s like to be transgender, you have to want to understand. People like Patrick and Cruz don’t. They would rather depict this group as perverted and predatory — and therefore undeserving of any accommodation from normal folks.

It’s an old tactic used against despised minorities. Southern whites once recoiled at the idea of sharing water fountains with African-Americans. Straight men blanched at having to shower alongside gays. Nazis perceived Jews as parasitic vermin.

“For a long time, our society, like many others, has confronted same-sex orientations and acts with a politics of disgust, as many people react to the uncomfortable presence of gays and lesbians with a deep aversion akin to that inspired by bodily wastes, slimy insects and spoiled food,” writes Martha Nussbaum (also a University of Chicago law professor) in her book “From Disgust to Humanity: Sexual Orientation and Constitutional Law.”

Their habits, she says, are said to “contaminate and defile society, producing decay and degeneration,” and that perception is used to justify their mistreatment. The same language is now aimed at transgender people.

They, like those other minorities, merely want to be treated with ordinary respect rather than baseless hostility. Isn’t that hilarious?

Cure for expensive cities is moving vans

A funny thing didn’t happen on the way to the digital revolution. It failed to empty out the cities. If knowledge workers could communicate from anywhere, the futurists figured, why would they subject themselves to the traffic and noise of urban life? They could easily move their screens to a mountain chalet, beach house or Mediterranean cafe.

The opposite happened. Instead of spreading out, many members of the “creative class” scrunched themselves into a handful of acres in a few select cities. As a result, housing prices have exploded in London, New York and San Francisco — and are rising fast in Boston, Seattle, Denver and other centers for tech and finance. The elite apparently want to be around good restaurants, high-end shopping and other elites.

And so what happens to the longtime residents of modest means and new arrivals serving the gentry’s needs? When an influx of genius coders pushes small-apartment rents into the thousands, working families of four get pushed out.

The solution to the high cost of shelter is to increase the supply, say some economists, real estate interests and politicians owned by the real estate interests. In

cities bounded by water, that means increasing population density.

That can be part of the answer. Some decaying industrial areas may be ripe for new development. But here’s the problem:

Many of the most desirable urban neighborhoods are desirable precisely for their quirky small houses and low-slung apartment buildings. Local shops and restaurants line their main streets. Replace these structures with a forest of sterile towers and you destroy what made these areas valuable in the first place.

Zeroing in on London, The Economist blames “faulty land-use regulation” for the city’s high cost of housing. It prescribes building on the “green belt,” which was created to preserve open space around the central city — and scoffs at rules protecting views of the iconic St. Paul’s Cathedral. (Guess only the penthouses would have the views.)

Like much of the “build, baby, build” crowd, the magazine parades its agenda behind the banner of diversity and fighting income inequality. Well, let’s ask. Would turning our old cities into soulless Singapore make these places more affordable?

The Economist complains that population density in central London is only half that of New York. Thing is, the rent for a centrally located one-bedroom apartment is 22 percent higher in New York than in London. In hot real estate markets, increasing supply can also hike de-

mand.

For example, building booms in Williamsburg and other gentrifying parts of Brooklyn have attracted more moneyed people while leveling the tenements where poorer folk used to live.

There are remedies for the high cost of housing. One is to move elsewhere. It could be to a lesser neighborhood or nearby town served by public transportation. (Clamor against high rents tends to focus on upscale districts.)

And don’t forget the other great metropolises in this vast land of ours. Columbus, Omaha, Nashville, Baton Rouge and Spokane, to name a few, cost a lot less. They have great bars, hip districts and housing to die for.

As for the lower-income residents who remain in expensive cities, one fix is to pay them commensurate with the cost of living. A \$15-an-hour minimum wage in the pricier locales makes total sense.

In sum, the notion that only a handful of ZIP codes can quench 21st-century ambitions is strange. The technology that lets Cleveland make video calls to Honolulu ought to be used. As for milulung, there’s now a Starbucks everywhere.

Forever Changing

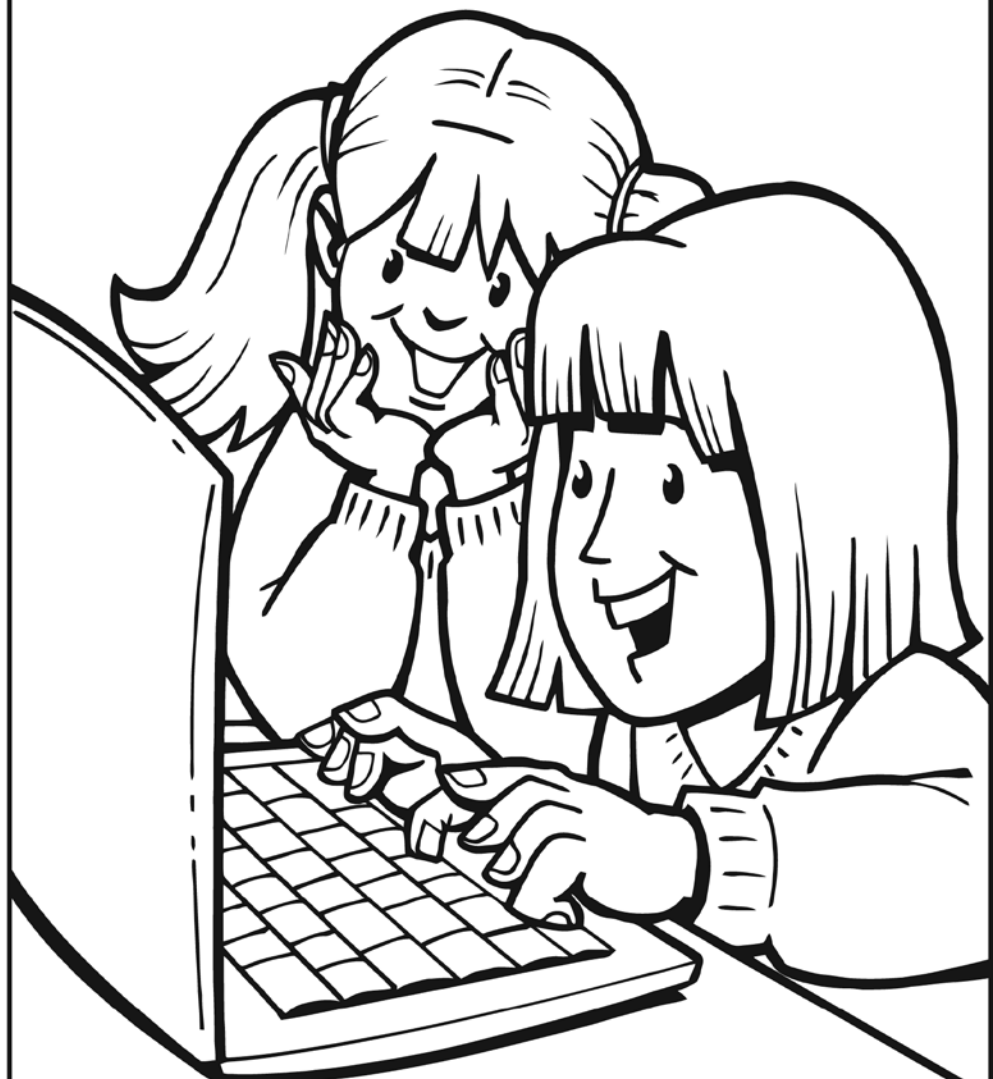

Mazara hits 491 ft. bomb as Rangers beat Angels

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Like Rounched Odor before him, Nomar Mazara is having an impact for the Texas Rangers as the youngest player in the major leagues.

Mazara, a 21-year-old rookie slugger, hit the longest home run in the majors this season while Odor drove in three runs and scored three more in likely his last game before a suspension, a 15-9 win over the Los Angeles Angels on Wednesday.

"Wow, that was a grown-up homer right there," said Bobby Wilson, who had a career-high four hits. "That's where the big boys go."

Mazara led off the second with a drive into the second deck of the right-seat seats that would have traveled 491 feet had it landed unimpeded, according to Major League Baseball's Statcast program.

"They don't give you extra points for distance, but it was a majestic home run. Happy for the kid," manager Jeff Banister said.

"It's cool. Hope more to come," said Mazara, who was then asked if it got all of it. "Probably, yeah."

Odor, who at 20 was the MLB's youngest player when he made his debut two summers ago, is playing while awaiting the outcome of his appeal heard in New York on Tuesday for an eight-game suspension. The

discipline was assessed for punching Toronto slugger Jose Bautista during a brawl May 15. A decision is expected before Friday night's game.

"He's a huge player for us, a big player us," Banister said. "We're obviously going to miss him however many days it is."

Along with his eighth homer, Mazara had a two-out, two-run homer during a four-run sixth that made it 11-6.

While Mazara's homer is the longest in the majors this season, the Rangers wouldn't verify it as the longest hit in their 22-year-old ballpark; the Statcast system has been used only since last season.

Ballpark records list Josh Hamilton's 490-foot homer against Houston on June 27, 2010, as the longest, a measurement determined by a University of Texas-Arlington physics professor. That home run also was hit into the

upper deck in right field, but higher up and three sections closer to center field.

The Rangers trailed 1-0 when Odor led off the first with a bunt single, stole second base and moved up on a throwing error before scoring the first of his three runs. He later drove in runs with a groundout, a fielder's choice and a sacrifice fly.

Los Angeles also led 4-1 after its second at-bat, but Hector Santiago (3-3) also quickly gave up that lead. It was 4-4 when Texas started the third with consecutive hits off the lefty before Ryan Rua greeted Mike Morin with a two-run single that put the Rangers ahead to stay.

"It just kind of fell apart. I didn't have good stuff today," Santiago said. "Just an all-around bad day. I fell behind in counts, not making some great pitches."

Valbuena's tiebreaking homer lifts Astros over O's

HOUSTON (AP) — Evan Gattis is proving how valuable he is at catcher for the Houston Astros.

Gattis hit a two-run homer and Luis Valbuena had a tiebreaking solo shot in the sixth inning that gave the Astros a 4-3 win over the Baltimore Orioles on Wednesday night.

Baltimore tied the score 3-3 with a two-run sixth, and Valbuena homered for the second straight day with an opposite-field drive, with two outs to left-center field off Tyler Wilson (2-3).

Gattis has four homers and six RBIs in eight games and is batting .355 since his return from Double-A Corpus Christi, where he went to prepare to play catcher in Houston after not working behind the plate since 2014.

Gattis, who missed the first two weeks of the season recovering from sports hernia surgery, hit just one homer in the 20 games before his trip the minors after leading the Astros with 27 home runs last season.

"He's been good," manager A.J. Hinch said. "He tuned himself up pretty well in his stint in Double-A and almost acted as if it was

a spring training warmup for him. He's a real threat in the middle of the order. He didn't lead our team in home runs by accident."

Houston starter Collin McHugh allowed three runs and eight hits while striking out a season-high 10 in 5 1/3 innings. Pat Neshek (2-0) got the last two outs of the sixth, and Jason Gregerson allowed one hit in a scoreless ninth for his 10th save in 13 chances.

McHugh raved about the work of Gattis behind the plate.

"It's good to get him back there and get his feet back under him," McHugh said. "He thinks through a game really well. He knows hitters really well and it's a pleasure to have him and Jason (Castro) back there. That tandem is tough to beat."

Wilson allowed four runs — three earned — and six hits in six innings, losing his second straight decision.

Baltimore struck out 18 times on Wednesday after whiffing a season-high 19 times in a 3-2, 13-inning loss Tuesday. The 37 strikeouts for Houston pitchers tied the two-game franchise record, set against the Chicago

go Cubs on May 30-31, 2003.

Colby Rasmus reached on Wilson's error in the fourth, and Gattis homered into the left-field seats for a 3-1 lead.

Chris Davis and Trumbo hit consecutive singles starting the sixth, and left fielder Tony Kemp allowed the ball to glance off his glove for an

error that advanced the runners. Davis scored on a wild pitch and Pedro Alvarez hit a chopper for a tying single that chased McHugh.

Neshek allowed a two-out double by Hyun Soo Kim and intentionally walked Machado before retiring Schoop.

LeBron, Love power Cavs to win

CLEVELAND (AP) — Back home, the Cavaliers were not hospitable. Just rude.

They roughed up the visiting Raptors again.

LeBron James scored 23 points then sat the fourth quarter, Kevin Love scored 25, and Cleveland unleashed tenacious defense on Toronto to regain control of the Eastern Conference finals with a 116-78 rout of the Raptors in Game 5 on Wednesday night.

On their court in front of 20,000-plus screaming, towel-waving fans following two straight

losses in Canada, the Cavs opened a 34-point lead in the first half, pushed it to 43 in the second half and took a 3-2 series lead.

They can clinch their second straight conference title and trip to the NBA Finals with a win in Game 6 on Friday night in Toronto.

"We gotta come out from the beginning and that starts with the Big 3," James said, referring to himself, Love and Kyrie Irving, who added 23 points. "We'll be much better."

It's hard to imagine the Cavs being more

in sync. They clicked at both ends in Game 5, handing the Raptors a beating that could linger. After coming in with momentum and confidence, Toronto's players left Quicken Loans Arena shaken and one loss from having their deepest playoff run stopped.

James had eight assists and six rebounds in 31 minutes before checking out late in the third quarter with the Cavs up 37. He spent the fourth quarter on the bench while Cleveland's reserves finished the romp.

Tech rallies to win Big 12 opener

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — Tyler Neslony drove in the tiebreaking run in the sixth inning, four Texas Tech relievers combined to hold Kansas State to one hit over the last five innings and the Red Raiders came from behind to win 8-5 in the Big 12 tournament on Wednesday.

The top-seeded Red Raiders (41-14) trailed 5-2 in the fifth before tying it on RBI singles by Corey Raley, Eric Gutierrez and Hunter Hargrove. Neslony's bases-loaded single and a sacrifice fly gave Tech a two-run lead in the sixth.

The Wildcats (26-30) got to Ty Damron for five runs on five hits and two walks in four innings. Parker Mushinski, Robert Dugger (5-0), Dalton Brown and Hayden Howard allowed two baserunners the rest of the way.

Mitch Zubratt (2-1), the second of three relievers for Corey Fischer, took the loss.

Texas Tech plays West Virginia on Thursday afternoon. K-State eliminates Oklahoma in a morning elimination game.

Oklahoma State beats Texas 10-4

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — Oklahoma State rallied from a 4-0 deficit with eight runs in the fifth inning and beat Texas 10-4 on Wednesday in the Big 12 tournament.

Conor Costello had four RBIs and Donnie Walton knocked in three for the Cowboys (36-18), who will face TCU on Friday.

Costello's grand slam highlighted Oklahoma State's decisive rally, and Oklahoma added three hits for the Cowboys as they pulled away from the Longhorns.

Ty Culbreth (8-4) started strong but faded in the fifth for Texas (22-40), allowing six runs in just over four innings.

The Longhorns will play Baylor Thursday.

TCU beats Baylor 12-5

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — Luken Baker had five hits and scored four runs to lead TCU past Baylor 12-5 Wednesday in the opening round of the Big 12 Tournament.

Josh Watson added three RBIs for the third-seeded Horned Frogs (39-14), who had six players with at least two hits and 17 overall.

Baker knocked in a pair of runs to put TCU ahead 9-5 in the sixth inning, and he became just the fourth player in Big 12 tournament history with five hits in a game with a solo home run in the eighth.

Steven McLean and Kameron Estay each homered for Baylor (24-28).

Bears starter Daniel Castano took the loss, letting up seven runs in just four innings.

Vance shuts down OU in WVU win

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — Senior left-hander Ross Vance held Oklahoma to one hit over the last 8 2/3 innings and Kyle Davis hit a three-run homer, leading West Virginia to a 6-0 victory over Oklahoma in the Big 12 tournament on Wednesday.

Vance took over with one out in the first inning after starter Michael Grove injured his leg when he fielded a sacrifice bunt and tagged out Ben Hollas. Vance (7-3) struck out seven and walked three, and the Sooners managed only two hits for the game.

The Mountaineers (34-21) play Thursday afternoon against Texas Tech. The Sooners (28-26-1) meet Kansas State in a morning elimination game.

But your son's reaction was totally out of proportion, and it makes us wonder whether something else may have been going on. Perhaps he felt you were somehow showing favoritism to his

sister or her children. If such an accusation has merit, please examine your behavior honestly to see what you can change.

Is anyone in touch with your son -- a relative or family friend? Perhaps this person could intercede on your behalf and find out whether reconciliation is possible. It may require counseling, in which case, we hope you both would agree to go. Otherwise, whatever you do with your estate is up to you. We hope, in addition to whatever you were planning to leave your son, you also include a letter to him expressing your love, without judgment or blame, and your regret that the relationship wasn't closer.

Many years ago, B. Jay Becker, the former editor of this column,

received a letter from a reader who expressed his admiration for the way Becker bid Hand No. 30 in the world championship match between Sweden and the United States in 1953!

Bursting with curiosity, Becker looked up Hand No. 30. When he

reviewed the bidding (he was East), it turned out that his entire contribution consisted of passing four times in a row!

His partner, John Crawford, opened the bidding with one club. Becker had no reason to respond, so he did what most players would do — he passed.

The Swedish South couldn't bring himself to sell out for one club, so he bid one spade. Crawford doubled for takeout, and North helped Becker out of an unpleasant predicament by bidding two diamonds. Becker passed, of course, but Crawford persisted by doubling again.

Becker naturally assumed that Crawford wanted him to bid hearts or clubs, but he found the thought of naming either suit revolting. So he decided to pass and take his chances against two diamonds doubled.

This proved to be a lucky shot when South ran to two spades. Again Crawford doubled, but this time when Becker passed, he was on much firmer ground.

When the smoke cleared, South had gone down four (700 points in those days). At the other table, the Swedish East-West pair landed in three notrump and went down one, so the U.S. team gained 750 points on the deal.

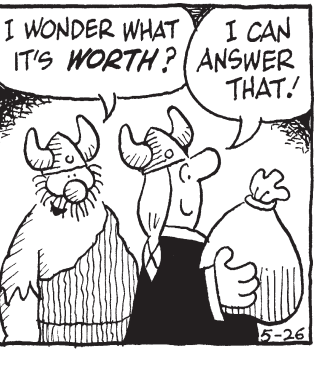

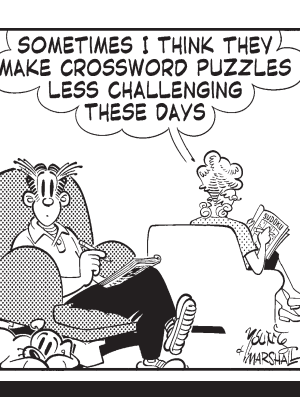

This Date In History

Today is Thursday, May 26, the 147th day of 2016. There are 219 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On May 26, 1521, Martin Luther was banned by the Edict of Worms (vohrms) because of his religious beliefs and writings.

On this date:

In 1868, the impeachment trial of President Andrew Johnson ended with his acquittal on the remaining charges.

In 1913, Actors' Equity Association was organized by a group of actors at the Pabst Grand Circle Hotel in New York.

In 1938, the House Un-American Activities Committee was established by Congress.

In 1940, Operation Dynamo, the evacuation of some 338,000 Allied troops from Dunkirk, France, began during World War II.

In 1941, the American Flag House, where Betsy Ross once lived, was donated to the city of Philadelphia.

In 1954, explosions rocked the aircraft carrier USS Bennington off Rhode Island, killing 103 sailors. (The initial

blast was blamed on leaking catapult fluid ignited by the flames of a jet.)

In 1960, U.N. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge accused the Soviets during a meeting of the Security Council of hiding a microphone inside a wood carving of the Great Seal of the United States that had been presented to the U.S. Embassy in Moscow.

In 1969, the Apollo 10 astronauts returned to Earth after a successful eight-day dress rehearsal for the first manned moon landing.

In 1971, Don McLean recorded his song "American Pie" at The Record Plant in New York City (it was released the following November by United Artists Records).

In 1972, President Richard M. Nixon and Soviet leader Leonid Brezhnev signed the Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty in Moscow. (The U.S. withdrew from the treaty in 2002.)

In 1981, 14 people were killed when a Marine jet crashed onto the flight deck of the aircraft carrier USS Nimitz off Florida.

In 1991, a Lauda Air Boeing 767 crashed in Thailand, killing all 223 people aboard.

Ten years ago: Air Force Gen. Michael Hayden won confirmation to be the 20th CIA director in a 78-15 Senate vote.

Five years ago: Congress passed a four-year extension of post-Sept. 11 powers contained

in the Patriot Act to search records and conduct roving wiretaps in pursuit of terrorists; President Barack Obama, in France, signed the measure using an autopen machine minutes before the provisions were set to expire at midnight. Ratko Mladic (RAHT'-koh MLAH'-dich), the brutal Bosnian Serb general suspected of leading the massacre of 8,000 Muslim men and boys, was arrested after a 16-year manhunt. (Mladic was extradited to face trial in The Hague, Netherlands.)

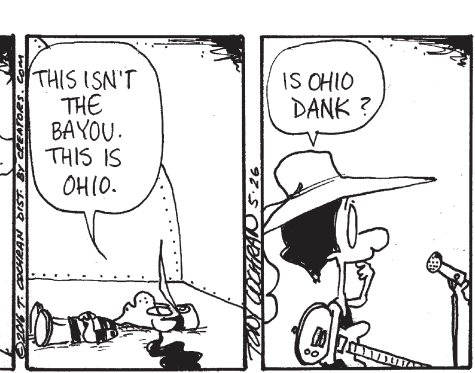
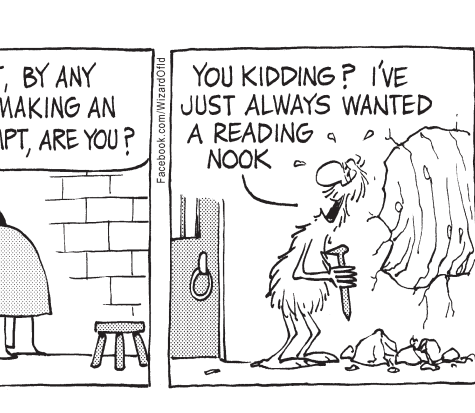
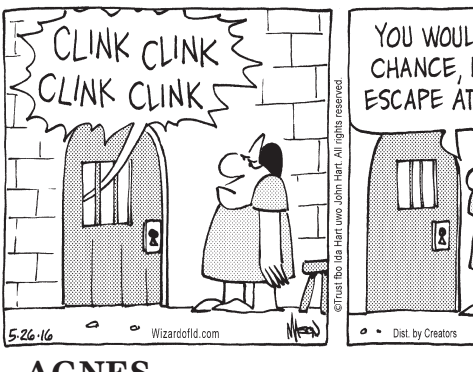
