## Plans for no-kill animal shelter moving forward

The city of Big Spring's animal shelter will be getting more than a new location, it will be getting a new purpose.

Construction is expected to begin soon on a new animal

shelter that officials hope will help end, once and for all, the city's policy of euthanizing unwanted or unclaimed pets.

Back in January, the Big Spring city council put its stamp of approval on a resolution calling for the establishment of a no-kill city animal shelter by the end of this

year. "The citizens of Big Spring deserve an animal shelter that succeeds at saving the lives of homeless animals that is consistent with the most successful animal shelters in Texas," the resolution read in part.

Officials recognized that too many animals at the shelter

are being put down. In addition, they conceded there were policies and programs which are "proven to be effective at reducing the killing of homeless pets, including but not limited to policies and programs related to reducing intake and increasing live outcomes of impounded ani-

mals," the resolution added.

Recently, the city began making the resolution a reality, contracting with Relocation Rescue Inc. to construct and manage an animal rescue center. Relocation Rescue will need to raise the funds

## Lucky Duck Derby slated

Event to benefit food bank, Rotary

A thousand yellow rubber duckies will invade the Russ McEwen Water Park on Saturday in a race that could have one person driving away in a 2016 Jeep Wrangler.

"We still have tickets available," said Debbye ValVerde, a member of the Greater Big Spring Rotary club, the entity sponsoring its fifth Lucky Duck Derby. "People can purchase them at the Chamber (215 W. Third St.) or at the Big Spring Convention Center (113 East Third St.) or from any Greater Big Spring Rotarian."

Proceeds from the derby will be split between Isaiah 58, a food pantry program, and the Rotary club, a community service organization. Tickets are \$10 for each duck and the event is scheduled to begin at 3 p.m. during break time for the annual city of Big Spring Splash-In event.

"All 1,000 ducks will be released down one of the pool's slides and float around the lazy river," ValVerde explained.

## Exhibit to feature work of paralyzed artist

An exhibit at the Big Spring Heritage Museum starting Saturday will feature the art of a paralyzed West Texas man.

Joe Beene of Odessa was paralyzed from the neck down following an injury he received at high school football practice.

Three years ago, he started painting, using a paintbrush in his mouth to dab paint on canvas, to create a birthday present for his father.

"About three years ago, my dad turned 60," Beene said. "I didn't know what to do for him. I prayed about it and the Lord told me to paint him a picture.

I had never painted before in my life. I didn't know anything about painting."

Since then, other people have seen his work and requested more paintings, Beene said.

Beene's exhibit at the museum starts Saturday with a re-

## Joe Mac "Pat" Gaskins



Joe Mac "Pat" Gaskins passed away Sunday, May 29, 2016, at home in the presence of his loving family.

Joe Mac was born December 27, 1926, in Howard County to Oscar Bryant and Nora Smith Gaskins. He married LaVerne Martin June 4, 1949. They were married 61 years.

In 1944, Joe Mac graduated from Knott High School; subsequently he graduated from Draughn's Business School in Abilene. He farmed, raising dry-land cotton for 70 years. Most of his life was spent living on the farm which his great-grandfather purchased for \$3 an acre. In 2008, Joe Mac and his sons were awarded the Texas Department of Agriculture "Century Farm Award" for continuously farming land owned by a single family for 100 years. He was awarded top Agriculture Producer of Howard County in 1988. He was affiliated with the Knott Co-op Gin since 1950 helping build it, working as a book-keeper and later as the manager until retiring in 1972 to run his farming operation full time. Through the later years he was still involved at the gin by serving on the board.

He was a long time member of the Ackerly First United Methodist Church.

Joe Mac was an avid spectator of sporting events. He especially derived great pleasure from watching his grandchildren and great-grandchildren playing their respective sports. His satisfaction in participating in football, softball, basketball, and playing outsider volleyball until he was 45 years old exemplified his love of competition.

He was a life-long domino enthusiast, playing at the gin and later at the "Knott Domino Palace." He

enjoyed winning tournaments at the Howard County Fair Domino Tournament. He and Laverne hosted weekly pot luck dinners playing with family and friends. He passed the love of the game on to his sons and grandsons, all of who perfected their skills at Texas A&M.

Joe Mac and Laverne raised three children: a son, Kelly Gaskins and wife Teresa of Knott; a daughter, Kayla McDonnell and husband, Tom of San Antonio; and a son, Van Gaskins and wife, Manda of Knott. They had six grandchildren: Dustin Joe Gaskins and Somer of Knott; Katie Gaskins Page and husband Jeremy of Shamrock, Texas; Clay Hart and wife Erin of Midland; Thomas McDonnell of Hammond, La.; Katherine McDonnell Jones and husband Peter of Houston; and Logan Bryant Gaskins and wife Meagan of Montgomery, Texas; and six great-grandchildren: Wiley Joe, Tye and Kinley Gaskins, Bailey and Jacob Page, and Ryan Hart.

for construction and maintenance of the building.

The shelter will be located in the vicinity of the the current city-county landfill in the Interstate 20-FM 700 area, on land the city purchased as a contingency in case the landfill ex-

ceeded capacity. With a new site for the landfill purchased and under development, the property near the old landfill is a surplus with no foreseeable purpose, City Manager Todd Darden said.

A lease agreement between the city and Relocation Rescue is for 30 years. Once the new shelter is open, the current site will be razed,

Darden said.

No timetable has been set for completion of the new shelter, but even if the city doesn't quite meet its end-of-the-year deadline, Darden sees the new facility as a step in the right direction.

"This was all brought about by the city's decision to adopt a no-kill policy at the animal shelter," he said. "Relocation Rescue will work

hand-in-hand with the city to bring that about."

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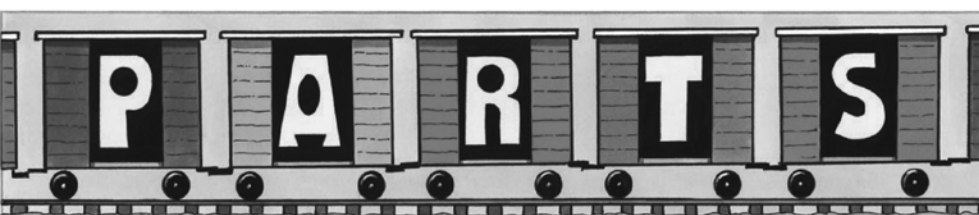

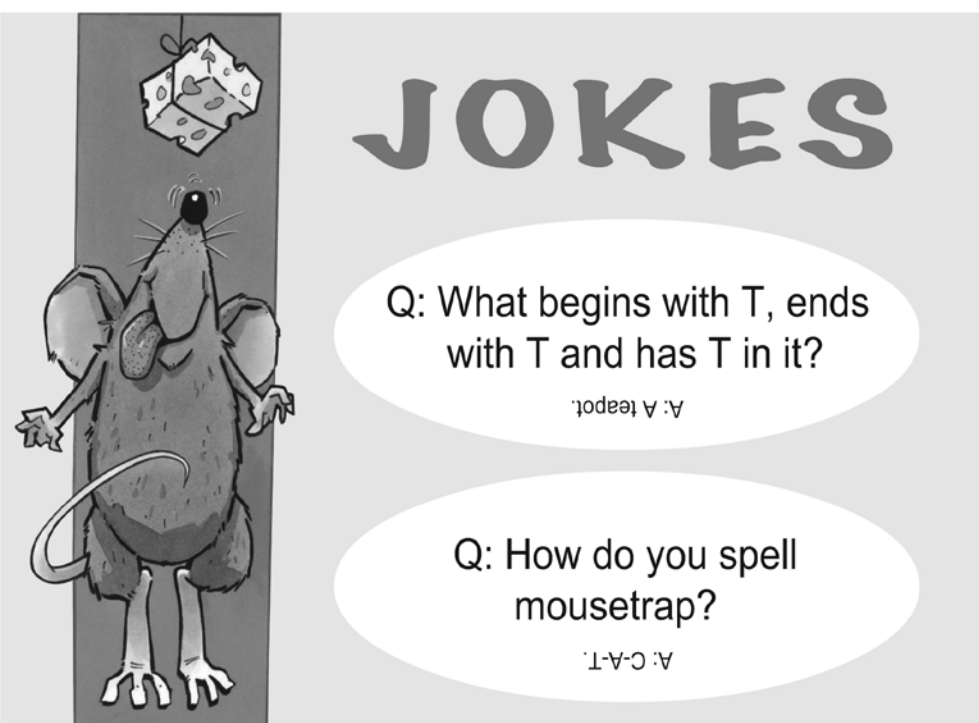

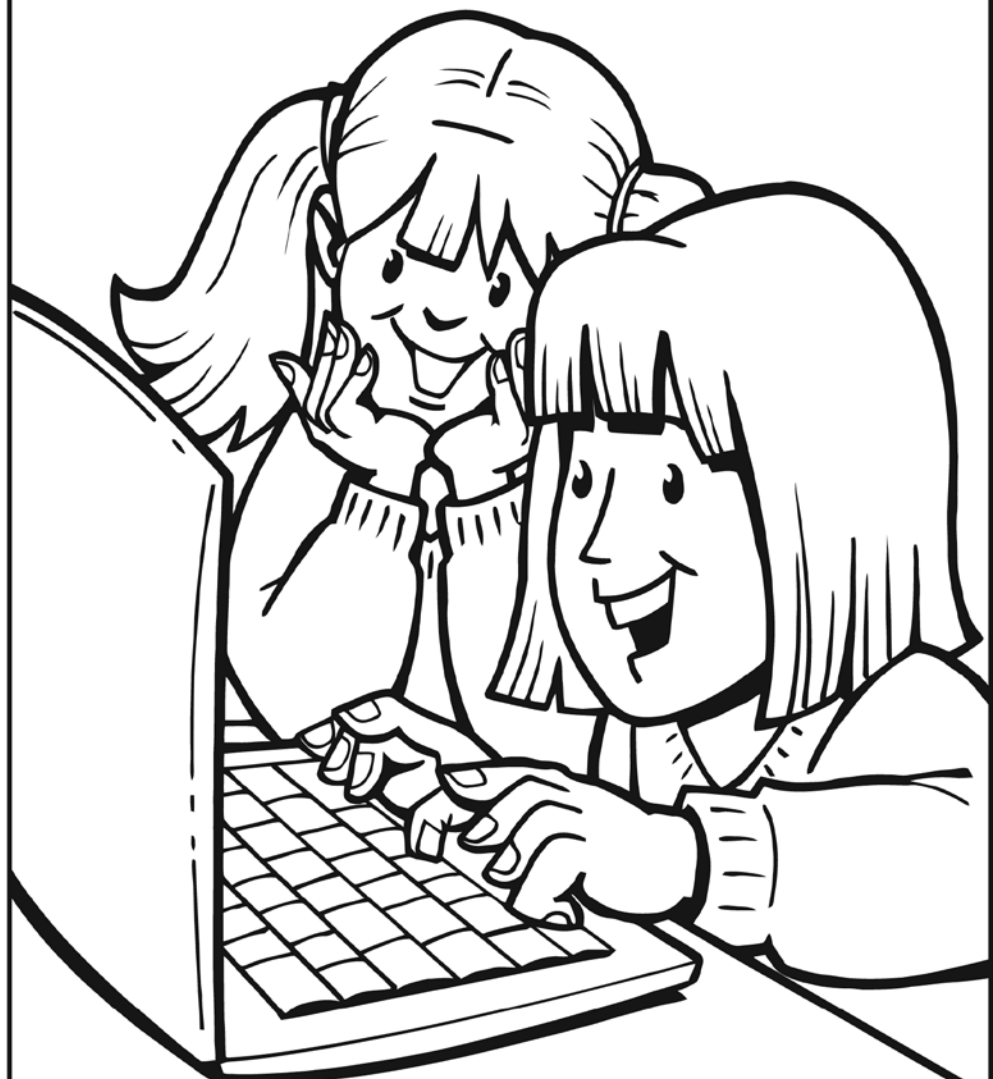

# Baylor chancellor Starr resigns

WACO, Texas (AP) — Ken Starr resigned as Baylor University's chancellor on Wednesday, a week after the former prosecutor who led the investigation of the Bill Clinton-Monica Lewinsky scandal was removed as the school's president over its handling of sexual assault complaints against football players.

Starr, who will continue to teach at the law school, told ESPN's "Outside the Lines" in an interview broadcast Wednesday that he didn't know about the allegations of sexual assault involving members of Baylor's vaunted football program until media reports first surfaced in 2015 during a player's trial.

"I didn't know about what was happening, but I have to, and I will, do to accept responsibility. The captain goes down with the ship," said Starr, who was hired as president of the nation's largest Baptist university in 2010 after gaining renown as the special prosecutor who investigated Clinton's affair with Lewinsky, a White House intern.

The school hired Pepper Hamilton to investigate allegations surrounding the football team last year. It released its findings last week, determining that under Starr's leadership, Baylor did little to respond to accusations of sexual assault involving football players over several years.

School regents came under fire for allowing Starr to stay on in the prominent role of chancellor for external fundraising. Starr resigned the position Wednesday morning, effectively immediately, telling ESPN he did it "with sorrow" and "as a matter of conscience."

"We need to heal Baylor. ... We need to put this horrible situation behind us," Starr said.

Baylor regents issued a statement thanking Starr for his service. "We recognize this is a tumultuous time for Baylor, most importantly for our current and former students and victims of sexual assault. We were horrified by what we learned from the investigation and again express our public acknowledgment and deepest apologies," the regents said. Starr didn't immediately respond to requests from The Associated Press for comment.

The scandal has resulted in major upheaval at the Waco school, which emerged from the athletic

doldrums to become one of the top football programs in the Big 12 and nationally.

The same day Baylor released its report, the coach fired head coach Art Briles and sanctioned athletic director Ian McCaw, who resigned on Monday, the same day the school hired Jim Grobe to coach the 2016 season.

Starr called Briles "a very powerful father figure" who "wants the best for these young men." Starr said he wasn't consulted before Briles was fired.

The report didn't identify specific cases, but two football players have been convicted of sexual assault since 2014. In the past year, there have been multiple reports of other alleged assaults and women who said the school did nothing to help.

The report said school administrators discouraged students from reporting or participating in student conduct reviews of sexual assault complaints, and that they even contributed to or accommodated a "hostile" environment against the alleged victims.

In one case, the actions of administrators "constituted retaliation against a complainant for reporting sexual assault," the report said.

University leaders were also slow to enact federally-required student conduct processes and they failed to identify and eliminate the hostile environment toward victims, the report found.

Starr told ESPN that he didn't think the school had a problem until the August 2015 conviction of football player Sam Ukwuachu, who sexually assaulted another student. But Tevin Elliott, another football player, had been convicted of sexual assault in 2014 and multiple women have said they notified school officials they had been attacked by Elliott.

In Ukwuachu's trial, the judge determined that Baylor's internal disciplinary investigation that cleared Ukwuachu was so bad that defense attorneys were barred from referencing it.

Starr said he considered the Baylor campus to be a safe place for students.

"We're an alcohol-free campus," Starr said. "It's not happening on campus, to the best of my knowledge. They are off-campus parties. Those are venues where those bad things have happened."

# Rangers' winning streak ends in 11-inning loss

CLEVELAND (AP) — The Texas Rangers battled back to tie the game against the Cleveland Indians on three occasions Wednesday.

The Rangers did not get the hit they needed to take a lead, however, and lost 5-4 in 11 innings on Yan Gomes' single off Alex Claudio, ending their four-game winning streak.

Though manager Jeff Banister felt his team battled, he pointed to the lack of clutch hitting in a tough extra-inning loss.

"We were 0-for-6 with runners in scoring position," Banister said. "That's kind of the story. We just didn't break through tonight."

Texas rallied in the ninth after Cleveland took a 4-3 lead in the eighth. Mitch Moreland drew a four-pitch walk before Elvis Andrus' bloop single to center moved pinch-runner Hanser Alberto to third. Pinch-hitter Jared Hoyer's fielder's choice ground ball tied the game for the third time.

Claudio (1-1) gave up Lonnie Chisenhall's double over

third base to start the 11th. Gomes fouled off a bunt attempt on the first pitch, before bouncing his hit up the middle.

Chisenhall raced home and Gomes, who is batting .176, was mobbed by his teammates after Cleveland's first walkoff win of 2016.

Ryan Rua smacked a solo home run off Trevor Bauer in the seventh inning to tie the game for Texas. The Northeast Ohio native had family and friends in the crowd, which made the moment special.

Cole Hamels allowed three runs on six hits in seven innings, maintaining his solid start to the season. He wasn't happy to have allowed three walks, including one in the first inning that preceded Mike Napoli team-leading 12th homer.

"You're going to give up your hits," Hamels said. "You're going to give up some runs here and there, but when you're giving up a run on guys that are walking, I think that's probably the toughest part."

# Springer hits walk-off homer in Astros win

HOUSTON (AP) — George Springer has been on quite a roll since moving into the leadoff spot.

Springer homered with two outs in the bottom of the 11th inning to give Houston a 5-4 win over Arizona on Wednesday night for the Astros' fifth straight victory, and third in a row against the Diamondbacks.

Springer hit the first pitch he saw from Tyler Clippard (2-2) off the facade in left-center for his 13th home run of the season and first career walkoff shot.

"It was awesome," Springer said. "I knew that I had hit it well and obviously for our squad right there it's a big hit. I was happy to help us win."

Springer is batting .450 (18 of 40) with five home runs and 10 RBIs in the nine games since being moved to the first spot in the Astros' lineup.

"He's locked in," manager A.J. Hinch said. "Him being able to do damage and at the same time draw a walk, hit a double, throw

a runner out, he runs the bases well. He's an extraordinary player."

Michael Feliz (4-1) pitched two innings for the win.

"It's an emotional win after a punch in the gut with them able to post three runs in the ninth," Hinch said. "Again, I think our guys continued to battle, continued to compete."

Michael Bourn hit an RBI double to cut Houston's lead to 4-2 in the ninth before Jake Lamb hit a two-run homer off Luke Gregerson to tie it.

"It was more a team effort," Lamb said. "We battled back and then we just didn't come through with the win. We're getting close. We're playing fairly solid defense. We're playing good baseball. That's a frustrating one, that's a tough one to lose."

Carlos Correa had a two-out RBI single and Evan Gattis followed with a homer off the facade in left to give the Astros a 3-1 lead in the fifth.

Tony Kemp added a sacrifice fly

in the eighth for Houston, which won for the eighth time in nine games and gave Hinch his 200th career victory — 89 with the Diamondbacks and 111 with the Astros.

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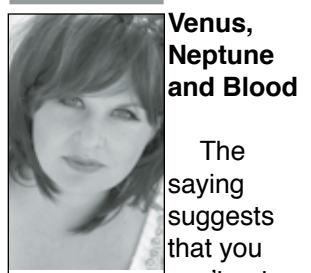

Contract Bridge

Little strokes fell great oaks

Fast dealer.  
Both sides vulnerable.

The bidding:

Most mistakes made at the bridge table are of a relatively simple sort. This is not surprising when you consider that the number of easy deals that arise in the ordinary course of events far exceeds the number of difficult ones.

Take this case, for example. Superficially, there seems to be no good reason for South to go wrong. But even thoroughly experienced players might overlook the delicate but important point involved.

West leads the jack of hearts against three notrump. Declarer covers with the queen, hoping West has the king, but East produces the monarch. South ducks the king and also the heart continuation before being forced to win the next heart with the ace.

Since it is impossible to win nine tricks without utilizing his spades, declarer crosses to dummy with a club to take a spade finesse. That brings declarer to the critical point of the deal, though he might not realize this until it's too late. If he leads the jack of spades to take the finesse, he goes down against best defense, even though the finesse wins. East and South follow low, and the jack holds the trick.

When declarer repeats the finesse, he is forced to win in his own hand and can no longer capture East's king. South can cash eight tricks, but eventually finishes down one.

To prevent this unhappy scenario, declarer should lead the nine of spades from dummy initially rather than the jack. The nine lead permits three spade finesses through East, while the jack lead permits only two. This seemingly insignificant choice makes all the difference between making the contract and going down.

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This Date In History

Today is Thursday, June 2, the 154th day of 2016. There are 212 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On June 2, 1941, baseball's "Iron Horse," Lou Gehrig, died in New York of a degenerative disease, amyotrophic lateral sclerosis; he was 37.

On this date:

In 1863, during the Civil War, Union Maj. Gen. William T. Sherman wrote a letter to his wife, Ellen, in which he commented, "Vox populi, vox humbug" (The voice of the people is the voice of humbug).

In 1886, President Grover Cleveland, 49, married Frances Folsom, 21, in the Blue Room of the White House. (To date, Cleveland is the only president to marry in the executive mansion.)

In 1897, Mark Twain, 61, was quoted by the New York Journal as saying from London that "the report of my death was an exaggeration."

In 1924, Congress passed, and President Calvin Coolidge signed, a measure guaranteeing full American citizenship for all Native Americans born within U.S. territorial limits.

In 1946, Italy held a referendum which resulted in the Italian monarchy being abolished in favor of a republic.

In 1953, the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II took place in London's Westminster Abbey, 16 months after the death of her father, King George VI.

In 1966, U.S. space probe Surveyor 1 landed on the moon and began transmitting detailed photographs of the lunar surface.

In 1976, Arizona Republic investigative reporter Don Bolles was mortally injured by a bomb planted underneath his car; he died 11 days later. (Prosecutors believed Bolles was targeted because he had written stories that upset a liquor wholesaler; three men were convicted of the killing.)

In 1981, the Japanese video arcade game "Donkey Kong" was released by Nintendo.

In 1983, half of the 46 people aboard an Air Canada DC-9 were killed after fire broke out on board, forcing the jetliner to make an emergency landing at Cincinnati/Northern Kentucky International Airport.

In 1986, for the first time, the public could watch the proceedings of the U.S. Senate on television as a six-week experiment began.

In 1997, Timothy McVeigh was convicted of murder and conspiracy in the 1995 bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City. (McVeigh was executed in June 2001.)

Ten years ago: Canadian authorities announced they had foiled a homegrown terrorist attack to set off bombs outside Toronto's Stock Exchange, a building housing Canada's spy agency and a military base. Grateful Dead keyboardist Vince Welch died in Sonoma County, California, at age 55.

Five years ago: Former Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney announced his bid for the Republican presidential nomination during an appearance in New Hampshire. A 73-year-old man opened fire in the Yuma, Arizona, area, killing five people and wounding one other before fatally shooting himself. A judge in Placerville, California, sentenced serial sex offender Phillip Garrido to life in prison.

## Parent's Corner: *Happiness is within our reach*

Researchers have been studying what makes people really happy. It appears that the constant characteristic of happiness is a sense of gratitude about life, no matter what the circumstances. This sense of gratitude, not wealth, health or the accumulation of material goods is the object of happiness.

It is inward and not outward; and so, it does not depend on what we have, but what we are. Therefore, by building an inner feeling of gratitude, happiness is within our reach and is available.

But how do we develop gratitude? Gratitude is a life skill or an inner attitude that takes years to develop. Many people, and especially young children, do not understand the concept of gratitude. It is normal for a young child to believe that everyone in the world exists exclusively for their benefit. Being grateful is not part of their natural self. But a sense of gratitude can be nurtured by caring and concerned parents.

For instance, a parent can develop a sense of gratitude by cultivating the feeling of appreciation within their children. This can be done by simple things such as telling your children that you are really happy to have them in your life and modeling behavior that reinforces that feeling.

When a child performs an unselfish act, such as giving his/her toy to another child,

let him/her know how proud you are that he/she has made another child

happy. When a child says, "thank you," be sure to provide positive reinforcement by telling him/her that you are really pleased by his words.

Another way is to demonstrate the behavior you wish to enforce would be to include your child in writing a "Thank You" or "In Appreciation" notes. Kids of any age can assist in bringing meals to shut-ins, visiting folks in nursing homes or assisting the needy.

Sharing experiences like these makes children feel important and moves their focus from themselves to others. By nurturing thankfulness in your children you will see their gratitude grow. Eventually, as your child matures and doesn't see the world exclusively through his own eyes, he will more often think of others and express his own gratitude.

However, while your child is still young, consider spontaneous hugs and kisses as a measure of gratitude. It has been documented that people who feel grateful have less depression and stress, fewer physical symptoms, feel better about their lives, make more progress toward personal goals, show positive states of alertness, enthusiasm, determination, attentiveness and energy, have a greater sense of feeling connected to others and are more optimistic about their future. Allow me to share

a poem that echoes these feelings.

### Be Thankful Author Unknown

Be thankful that you don't already have everything you desire. For if you did, what would there be to look forward to?

Be thankful when you don't know something, for it gives you the opportunity to learn.

Be thankful for the difficult times, for during those times you grow.

Be thankful for your limitations, because they give you opportunities for improvement.

Be thankful for each new challenge, because it will build your strength

and character.

Be thankful for your mistakes, for they will teach you valuable lessons.

Be thankful when you are tired and weary, because it means you've made a difference.

It is easy to be thankful for the good things. A life of rich fulfillment comes to those who are also thankful for the setbacks.

Gratitude can turn a negative into a positive.

Find a way to be thankful for your troubles and they can become your blessings.

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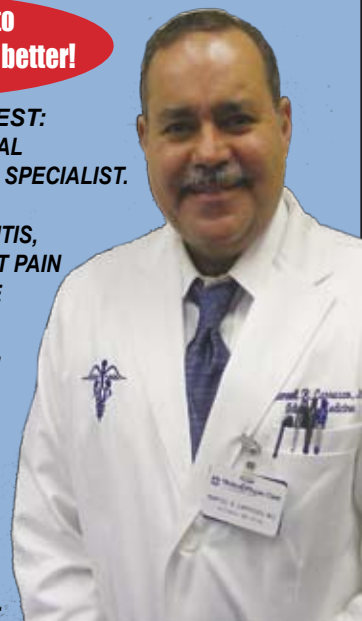
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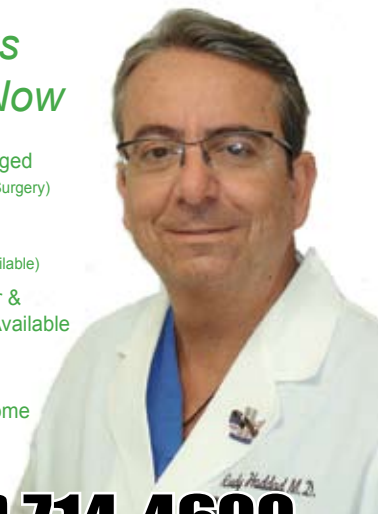
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
