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# Mosquito alert raised

#### Officials ask residents' help in containing pests

All that rain! All that green! All that water! All those mosquitos!

While there's no doubt that the rainy season has had more than its share of benefits lawns and trees are flourishing and more water is making its way into reservoirs — one big downside is that mosquitos are on the rebound in a

major way in the Crossroads. At their best, mosquito

bites are irritating, but with the outbreak of the Zika virus — which is carried by mosquitos — area residents are being warned to use extra precaution to avoid the airborne pests.

"We have been blessed with rain, but the mosquitos are already here," Howard County Judge Kathryn Wiseman said. "For your protection and that of your family and neighbors, I'm asking all Howard County residents to help keep the mosquito population down." Wiseman asked area resi-

dents to take the following precautions to help minimize the mosquito population: · Check your home and

# **SMMC** honored for hepatitis vaccine efforts

Scenic Mountain Medical Center has been recognized by the Immunization Action Coalition (IAC) and the Texas Health Department, for achieving one of the highest reported rates in the state for its work to protect newborns from hepatitis B virus infec-

"We are very honored to be named to the honor roll. This recognition falls into alignment with the jour-

nev that we are taking here at SMMC. It shows that we are making great strides in the right direction," SMMC CEO Emma Krabill said. "Safety of our patients, from our smallest ones to our most seasoned ones, is our top priority and this award reflects that." SMMC is the newest entry into IAC's

Birth Dose Honor Roll, which recognizes nospitals and birthing centers that have attained high coverage levels for administering the hepatitis B vaccine at birth. SMMC immu-

nized 100 percent of babies born March 2015 through March 2016, and took additional steps to prevent perinatal transmission of hepatitis B. SMMC is one of two facilities in Texas who achieved 100 percent. "This is a big accomplishment for Scenic Moun-

tain, but also for Big Spring. We cannot stress enough how much of a priority safety is when it comes to our patients and their families; however, recognition like this serves as validation of the efforts that we are putting forth," Krabill said.

The national standards of care to prevent hepatitis B virus infection in babies are to administer hepatitis B vaccine to all newborns before they leave the hospital or birthing center. This standard is being

# Seine still rising in Paris as streets flood, landmarks shut

PARIS — The swollen Seine River kept rising Friday, spilling into Paris streets and forcing one landmark after another to shut on Friday. Across the city, parks and cemeteries were being closed as the city braced for flooding that could take weeks to fully clear.



The Seine, which officials the Seine River in Paris." said was at its highest level in nearly 35 years, was ex-

pected to peak sometime later in the day. Authorities shut the Louvre museum, the national library, the Orsay museum, and the Grand Palais, Paris' striking glass-and-steel topped exhibition center. "We evaluate the situation for all the (cultural) buildings nearly hour-by-hour,"

said Culture Minister Audrey Azouley, speaking to journal-

ists outside the world-famous

Nearly a week of heavy rain has led to serious flooding across a swathe of Europe, leaving 15 people dead and others missing.

Although the rain has tapered off in some areas, floodwaters are still climbing. Traffic in the French capital was snarled as flooding choked roads and several Paris railway stations were shut. Basements and apartments in the capital's well-todo 16th district began to flood Friday afternoon as the river continued to creep upwards.

At the Louvre, home to ry — since its 1993 renovation Leonardo da Vinci's "Mona Lisa," curators were moving some 250,000 artworks from storage areas at risk of flooding and taking them upstairs to safety. The Orsay museum, on the left bank of the Seine, was also closed Friday to prepare for possible flooding. The Grand Palais, which draws 2.5 million visitors a year, was also being closed. The closures are highly un-

usual.

The Louvre said the museum had not taken such precautions in its modern histoat the very least. Disappointed tourists were being turned away.

"I am really sorry, but we're closed today," one staffer told visitors. "We have to evacuate masterpieces from the basement.'

Elsewhere in Europe, authorities were counting the cost of the floods as they waded through muddy streets and waterlogged homes.

German authorities said the body of a 65-year-old man

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# Hillary on the ropes

ate last week, the inspector general of the State Department completed a yearlong investigation into the use by Hillary Clinton of a private email server for all of her official government email as secre-

tary of state. The investigation was launched when information technology officials at the State Department under Secretary of State John Kerry learned that Clinton paid an aide to migrate her public

and secret State Department email streams away from their secured government venues and onto her own, non-secure server, which was stored in her home. The migration of the secret

email stream most likely constituted the crime of espionage the failure to secure and preserve the secrecy of confidential, secret or top-secret materials.

The inspector general interviewed Clinton's three immediate predecessors — Madeleine Albright, Colin Powell and Condoleezza Rice — and their former aides about their email practices. He learned that none of them used emails as extensively as Clinton, none used a private server and, though Powell and Rice occasionally replied to government emails using private accounts, none used a private account when dealing with state secrets.

Clinton and her former aides declined to cooperate with the inspector general, notwithstanding her oft-stated claim that she "can't wait" to meet with officials and clear the air about her emails.

The inspector general's report is damning to Clinton. It refutes every defense she has offered to the allegation that she mishandled state secrets. It revealed an email that hadn't been publicly made known showing Clinton's state of mind. And it paints a picture of a self-isolated secretary of state stubbornly refusing to comply with federal law for

venal reasons; she simply did not want to be held accountable for her official behavior.

The report rejects Clinton's argument that her use of a private server "was allowed." The report makes clear that it was not allowed, nor did she seek permission to use it. She did not inform the FBI, which had tutored her on the lawful handling of state secrets, and she did not inform her own State Department IT folks.

The report also makes clear that had she sought permission to use her own server as the instrument through which all of her email traffic passed, such a request would have been flatly denied.

In addition, the report rejects her argument — already debunked by the director of the FBI — that the FBI is merely conducting a security review of the State Department's email storage and usage policies rather than a criminal investigation of her. The FBI does not conduct security reviews. The inspector general does. This report is the result of that review, and Clinton flunked it, as it reveals that she refused to comply with the same State Department storage and transparency regulations she was enforcing against

Here is what is new publicly: When her private server was down and her BlackBerry immobilized for days at a time, she refused to use a governmentissued BlackBerry because of her fear of the Freedom of Information Act. She preferred to go dark, or back to the 19thcentury technology of having documents read aloud to her. This report continues the

cascade of legal misery that has befallen her in the past eight months. The State Department she once headed has rejected all of her arguments. Two federal judges have ordered her aides to testify about a conspiracy in her office to evade federal laws. She now awaits an interrogation by impatient FBI agents, which will take place soon after the New Jersey and California primaries next week. Her legal status can only be described as grave or worse than grave.

We know that Clinton's own camp finally recognizes just

how dangerous this email controversy has become for her. Over the Memorial Day weekend, John Podesta, the chairman of Clinton's campaign, sent an email to her most important donors. In it, he recognizes the need to arm the donors with talking points to address Clinton's rapidly deteriorating support with Democratic primary

The Podesta email suggests attempting to minimize Clinton's use of her private server by comparing it to Powell's occasional use of his personal email account. This is a risky and faulty comparison. None of Powell's emails from his private account — only two or three dozen — contained matters that were confidential, secret or topsecret.

Clinton diverted all of her email traffic to her private server — some 66,000 emails, about 2,200 of which contained state secrets. Moreover, Powell never used his own server, nor is he presently seeking to become the chief federal law enforcement officer in the land.

The inspector general who wrote the report was nominated by President Barack Obama and confirmed by the Senate in 2013, after Clinton left office. He did a commendable job — one so thorough and enlightening that it has highlighted the important role that inspectors general play in government today.

Today every department in the executive branch has, by law, an inspector general in place who has the authority to investigate the department keeping officials' feet to the fire by exposing failure to comply with federal law.

If you are curious as to why the inspector general of the State Department during Clinton's years as secretary did not discover all of Clinton's lawbreaking while she was doing it, the answer will alarm but probably not surprise you.

There was no inspector general at the State Department during Clinton's tenure as secretary — a state of affairs unique in modern history; and she knew that. How much more knowledge of her manipulations will the Justice Department tol erate before enforcing the law?

Hitler on the internet and in the mainstream media is not meant to be an exact one. It is meant to be a warning. It is meant to say: Hey, the

good guys didn't take Hitler seriously in the 1930s and never expected him to rise to power and take over most of Europe while coming close to taking over most of the world. But Hitler got as far as he did

because of what Edmund Burke said in his most quoted quotation: "The only thing necessary for the triumph of evil is for good men to do nothing."

And the question that should be asked today with regard to Trump is, therefore, simple: Are good people doing nothing? A lengthy, deeply researched

piece on the front page of The New York Times recently quoted everyone from Holocaust schol ars to Hollywood superstars to Anne Frank's stepsister.

The question: Should we be worried that Trump is the thin edge of modern fascism with real menace to follow? And should we be reporting on him the way Hitler should have been reported on when he first started amassing power?

The New York Times piece, by Peter Baker, one of the most respected journalists around, at one point says: "President Enrique Pena Nieto of Mexico criticized Mr. Trump's plans to build a wall on the border and to bar Muslims from entering the United States. 'That's the way Mussolini arrived and the way Hitler arrived,' he said.

The real shocker, however, came not with the quotes but with the illustrations that accompanied the article. One was a photograph of Hitler and Benito Mussolini standing side by side in full military uniform and delivering the fascist salute. Even some months ago, it

would have been hard to imagine a mainstream newspaper running such a photograph. Two thoroughly loathsome mass murderers illustrating an article on the presumptive Republican nominee for president? That would have been considered way over the line — a few months ago. Today it is considered a

justifiable warning. From the Times piece: "'This could be one of those moments that's quite dangerous and

we'll look back and wonder why we treated it as ho-hum at a time when we could have stopped it,' said Robert Kagan, a scholar at the Brookings Institution known for hawkish internationalism."The piece was careful, however, to find a Trump defender or two, such as Newt Gingrich, who said: "Trump does not have a politica structure in the sense that the fascists did. He doesn't have the sort of ideology that they did. He has nobody who resembles the brownshirts. This is all just garbage." But the piece also began by

quoting William Weld, a former Republican governor of Massachusetts who a few weeks ago compared Trump's call for the deportation of 11 million undocumented immigrants in the United States to Hitler's infamous "Night of Broken Glass," a night that marked a wave of anti-Semitism in 1938 in Germany, Austria and Czechoslovakia "I can hear the glass crunching on Kristallnacht in the ghettos of Warsaw and Vienna when I

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


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

# Do you feel like Gideon?

'f you are my age (let's just say middle-age) or older, you might have thought to yourself, "Sometimes I don't even recognize our country anymore." I know-things change, time changes, and people change, but it seems that rate of change has accelerated in the last couple of decades. The

United States does not seem to be the one that I learned about in history class. I recall studying the founding fathers and their belief in God, but now I see a society and culture not just drifting away from God but running in the opposite



to deliver His people from the oppression of the Midianites. In verse 11, the angel of the Lord appears to Gideon while he was beating out wheat in a winepress in order to hide what he was doing from the Midianites. Times were tough for the Israelites. The Midianites controlled every part of their lives including their food supplies.

Normally, in those days, a person would put a threshing floor on a hill so that the breeze could carry away the chaff from the kernels of wheat. But that would have been noticed by the enemy who would come and confiscate their grain. Winepresses, on the other hand, were cut out of the bedrock at the foot of the hills, down in the valley. This location would be more concealed and this is where Gideon was forced to thresh wheat for his family.

"Now wait a minute," you may be thinking, "this is America and we are free to do what we want." Yes, this is America and we still have more liberties than many countries around the world. But let a young person pray to God in many of the public schools or read from the Bible and see what the reaction is. Our society is becoming increasingly secular, moving away from God. Religious people are told that they can practice their beliefs as long as they keep them to themselves and do not offend.

In Matthew 5:14-16, Jesus said, "You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden. Nor do people light a lamp and put it under a basket, but on a stand, and it gives light

to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven Are you practicing your Christianity down in the valley and trying not to attract any attention from people around you? If so, maybe you have become afraid of what other people will think of you.

# Reflections: Rescued

🕇 very year I write at least one column about my dog, Buddy, a tri-color Pembroke Corgi who found

his way into our home seven years ago. Animal Control picked him up off the streets of Fort Worth, skinny and sick. They called Corgi Rescue and Corgi Rescue

Buddy it was love at first sight. We adopted him, kennel cough and all. He was little more than a year old, I think. Now he is approaching middle age in dog years. He is not as fast as he once was and he carries a little more weight in his mid-sec-Buddy has a way of teach-

ing me things about God if I take the time to listen and watch and reflect on our relationship. Shortly after we adopted him, he told me his story: how he got lost on the streets of Fort Worth, was befriended by Barney the Bloodhound and ended up in "dog jail" when the "dog police" caught up with them. I wrote it down for my

published e-book on Amazon, Buddy the Floppy Ear Corgi.

Buddy likes to go fishing in my flat-bottom boat. The front of the boat is his. He stands in the front and sniffs the wind to locate the fish. He is good at it. At least he thinks he is. Corgis think they are good at anything.

Once, he leaned too far and sniffed too hard and fell in the lake. Corgis aren't built for water. Their stubby legs don't give much traction for swimming. He coughed, sputtered, went under and splashed for all he was worth until I grabbed him and hauled him back into the

boat, soaked and shivering.

It reminded me of Peter's experience when he leapt from the fishing boat to meet Jesus on the Sea of Galilee. I expect Peter was a better swimmer than Buddy, but there he was splashing and floundering around in the sea, helpless. Until Jesus reached out, lifted him up and hauled him back into the boat.

God has done that for me many times. Across the years I have fallen out of the boat financially, unable to sleep at night, worried about how to make ends meet. I have sunk over my head in work, overwhelmed by responsibilities and challenges. I have found myself drowning in grief with the loss of someone I love.

Every time I have fallen into waters over my head, He has pulled me up and hauled me back into the boat. He is strong enough to save me and He will not let me drown when circumstances threaten to overwhelm me.

Jesus said, "In the world you have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world" (John 16:33). "The Lord Himself goes before you and will be with you. He will never leave you nor forsake you" (Deuteronomy 31:8).

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# Did you ever wonder? God and Moses

et's recap and get back to our story. Moses was on Mt. Sinai for 40 days while God gave him all of the instructions. Moses came back to find the people had made an

idol. They thought Moses must be dead; they needed a strong leader.

I hear comments that Moses smashed the tablets because he was high tempered. Reading the whole passage of Scripture, God saw the unfaithfulness of the people and was about to annihilate them. Moses was very humble before God. He spoke on their behalf and begged for God's forgiveness.

God decided to be merciful, but He sent them to camp a distance from His holy mountain. There the people began to construct the Tabernacle

and all of its furniture. Moses carved two stone tablets, and on Mt. Sinai God engraved them.

Until the Tabernacle was completed, Moses set up a Tent of Meeting outside the camp. A pillar of cloud would descend and stand at the entrance to the tent. There God met with Moses and spoke to him "face to face, as a man would speak with his friend" (Ex 33:11).

God spoke to other prophets in dreams or through angels, but He spoke to Moses face to face. This was a form that Moses was permitted to look upon because in Ex 33:20 God says, "No human can see Me and live." Yet God arranged for Moses to see God and live! Because of this, Moses is called a When Moses emerged from the Tent of Meeting,

his face was bright red, so red that people said it glowed. The people were frightened to even stand before him and hear what God had said.

So Moses covered his face with a veil. After a few days, the red faded and he removed the veil, until God summoned him to the Tent of Meeting again.

God told Moses that He was giving the land of Canaan to the Israelites. They would have to fight to take the land from its inhabitants, but He would fight with them. He gave them strict instructions not to mingle

with the Canaanites: "Do not inter-marry or make a covenant with them because they worship He knew that eventually the lustful practices of these people would cause the Hebrews to worship

their gods. God said, "The very name of Hashem is Jealous One" (Ex 34:14). God also gave Moses a list of thirteen names by

which He is known.

Each name describes a specific attribute of God's nature. Some of them are: "Compassionate and Gracious," "Slow to Anger," "Abundant in Kindness and Truth," "Preserver of Kindness for Thousands of Generations (of those who love Him)."

"Forgiver of Iniquity, Willful Sin, and Error, and Who Cleanses – But Does Not Cleanse Completely" does not translate well into English. In Hebrew it means if we truly repent for sin we committed intentionally, He will forgive but it remains written in His Book. "Recalling the Iniquity of Parents Upon Children

and Grandchildren, to the Third and Fourth Generations" is also hard to explain. If not repented, this becomes a generational curse seen in family traits like extreme anger or violence. But it can be repented and broken off! By any generation!!



#### Kerr pushes all the right buttons in Game 1 win over Cleveland

OAKLAND, Calif. — Even as he spent the first 43 games of the season on the sideline while recovering from back problems, Steve Kerr always kept his finger on the pulse of the Golden State Warriors.

That connection, the sense of what buttons to push and what whiteboards to smash, was all over Game 1 of the

"He has just a great feel for the energy and the temperature of the team," said Warriors guard Shaun Livingston, who scored 20 points in Golden State's 104-89 victory over the Cleveland Cavaliers on Thursday night. "He's great at just taking the temperature and finding the right matchups for us and putting us in places where we can excel."

The Warriors sent a statement to the Cavaliers that the "Strength In Numbers" message on those gold shirts that were draped over the seats at Oracle Arena is so much more than just a catchy slogan.

Kerr's first big move of the series was the one he didn't make. After veteran Andre Iguodala helped the Warriors tilt the Western Conference finals and come back from a 3-1 deficit to beat the Oklahoma City Thunder. Kerr resisted the temptation to start him against LeBron James and the Cavs.

# Astros **D-backs**

HOUSTON (AP) — Dallas Keuchel had a solid start on Thursday.

Unfortunately for the Houston Astros, Arizona's Zack Greinke was better. Greinke struck out a

season-high 11, and the Diamondbacks used a three-run seventh inning to beat the Astros 3-0 in a matchup of AL Cy Young Award winners. "It just seems like every

pitch I throw, the game hinges on it, and that's a tough feeling," Keuchel said. "But Greinke was as good as advertised. I thought the game was a very good pitcher's duel."

Greinke (7-3), the 2009 winner with Kansas City, allowed a season-low four hits — all singles over seven innings and walked none. He won his fourth straight start and stopped Arizona's threegame skid. "He throws first-pitch

strikes, he throws every pitch for a strike, he pitches on the margins, he does things to entice you to swing a lot, and he had his put-away pitches going for him," Houston manager A.J. Hinch said. "It was certainly his

Houston, which has won its previous five games,

Keuchel (3-7), last year's Cy Young winner, gave up three runs and six hits in six-plus innings. He has lost six of seven decisions. His struggles come a year after he won a ca-

reer-high 20 games with a 2.48 ERA. "Nobody wants to win more than I do, and I don't

take these losses lightly,"

he said "It wears on you, and I've just got to be bet-

The game was scoreless before Welington Castillo's RBI double off Keuchel put Arizona ahead. Chris Owings added a run-scoring single and Nick Ahmed a sacrifice fly.

"They put two swings on Dallas, really the whole day, that created any sort of havoc," Hinch said. "He didn't have much room for error against Greinke."

It was the first scoreless outing this season for Greinke, who is 7-1 in his last 10 starts to lower his ERA to 4.29; he started 0-2

with a 9.90 ERA.

# Big leaguers may balk at Olympics

Baseball appears set to return to the Olympics for the 2020 Tokyo Games. Major leagu-

"It's not going to happen. I don't think it's fathomable," Los Angeles Dodgers ace Clayton Kershaw said.

Astros shortstop Carlos Correa wasn't sure he'd play for a gold medal even if he

"2020 will be my year before free agency," he said. "We'll see in 2020 what my situation

is, and we'll go from there." Baseball became a medal sport for the 1992 Barcelona Olympics but was dropped for the 2012 London Games and won't be played

this year in Rio de Janeiro. With the 2020 Games in Japan, where baseball is popular, the International Olympic Committee executive board voted this week to support a six-nation tournament that year in both baseball and women's soft-

ball. The full IOC is to vote in August. Chicago Cubs star Kris Bryant is torn.

"I wore 'USA' across my chest one time in college, and it was an awesome experience. It'd be fun to do that again," he said. "But baseball season's so long the way it is. You play 162 games and to add another two weeks, I don't know if it would be the best decision for ourselves and our bodies."

Because the Tokyo Olympics are from July 24-Aug. 9, Major League Baseball would have to interrupt its schedule, a 162-gamein-183-day grind that has little flexibility unless owners and the players' association are willing to cut games — and lose revenue.

"I will not comment until I have a chance to review the recommendation," Commissioner Rob Manfred said Thursday.

Speaking to the Associated Press Sports Editors in April 2015, Manfred sounded reti-"The Olympics are a challenge because of

the calendar," he said then. "They are particularly a challenge when the site is halfway around the world and the date falls in the middle of our regular season."

# Swiss police raid FIFA

BERN, Switzerland (AP) — Switzerland's attorney general's office has raided FIFA again to get more evidence in its ongoing investigations of Sepp Blatter and Jerome Valcke.

"Documents and electronic data were seized and will now be examined to determine their relevance to the ongoing proceedings," the federal prosecution office said Friday, one day after the latest search at FIFA headquarters in Zurich.

Swiss attorney general Michael Lauber opened criminal proceedings against former FIFA president Blatter last September, and in March against former FIFA secretary general Valcke.

Both are suspected of crimi-

nal mismanagement of FIFA money

"The investigations still relate only to the persons named in earlier statements issued by the OAG (office of the attorney general) and further persons unknown," Lauber's office said, adding that the search was conducted with the "aim of confirming existing findings and obtaining further information."

Blatter and Valcke deny wrongdoing but were banned for six and 12 years, respectively, by FIFA's ethics committee.

Three weeks after new FIFA President Gianni Infantino claimed that "the crisis is over," the turmoil rocking soccer's world governing body continues.

Last week, FIFA fired its longtime finance officer Markus Kattner over alleged irregular bonus payments totaling millions of dollars.

Iguodala was the Finals MVP a year ago for his all-around performance against the Cavaliers, but Kerr stayed with the same starting lineup that had worked during a record-setting 73-win regular season. The oft-criticized Harrison Barnes started at small forward and hit 3 of 4 shots in the first quarter to get the Warriors rolling.

"Harrison has started for two years and it's been a pretty good two years for us," Kerr said. "We've had a good run. It's been very effective playing the way we've played in terms of the lineup and the rotation. I didn't feel any need to change our lineup for Game 1 of the series."

The ability to step back and look at the bigger picture in the chaos of the moment has always been one of Kerr's strong suits and the Warriors have flourished under his even-keeled approach.

Even watching Stephen Curry and Klay Thompson morph from the greatest shooting tandem in NBA history into a pair of brick layers wasn't enough to

rattle the seemingly unshakeable coach.

The Splash Brothers combined for just 20 points on 8-for-27 shooting and were 4 for 13 from 3-point range. The Warriors' bench rose to the occasion, with Livingston, Leandro Barbosa and Iguodala picking up the slack and Kerr rode them during the turning point in the game, a run that really caught fire after guard Matthew Dellavedova swiped at the ball but hit Iguodala in the groin.

The Cavaliers had come back to take the lead in the third quarter, and Curry just couldn't find the mark. But Kerr trusted the depth of his team, and let his reserves take center stage for the first five minutes of the fourth quarter.

The lead ballooned to 20 points during that stretch.

"He obviously plays the matchups well," Livingston said. "Just to be able to kind of rotate is impressive."

The only time he lost his cool was when the ball stopped moving and the turnovers started coming in the third quarter. The Cavs jumped in front and Kerr shattered his whiteboard with his marker like a judo champion breaking a stack of bricks.

He urged the World Baseball Softball Confederation to push for inclusion in multiple Olympics, which could become a bargaining position in negotiations among MLB, the MLBPA and the IOC.

"Conceptually, I think it would be good for our game, for baseball generically defined, to be an Olympic sport," Manfred told APSE. "I think it would be a mistake for our sport to make an arrangement with the Olympics whereby we go in for Tokyo and not have some commitment that the Olympics were going to commit to baseball over the longer haul."

The IOC wants the top players to appear in the Olympics. The NBA has sent its players since 1992 and the NHL since 1998 — although the NHL has not yet committed for the 2018 Games in Pyeongchang, South Korea.

At the 2008 Olympic base-

ball tournament, only those not on 25-man big league rosters as of late June were allowed to compete. The American prospects there included Jake Arrieta, who struck out seven over six innings to beat China. Stephen Strasburg defeated the Netherlands and lost to Cuba, which eliminated manager Davey Johnson's team in the semifinals.

"With regard to professional players competing in the games, as we have stated publicly in the past, we are committed to finding the best possible and most reasonable solution for 2020," union head Tony Clark said.

Wedded to routine and used to the comforts of spacious big league clubhouses, baseball players are reluctant to divert from their norm. It has taken effort from management and the union to persuade them of the benefits of regular-season games that have been played in Australia, Japan, Mexico and Puerto Rico.

"You could get a quality representation of each country if you were open to

it," San Francisco catcher Buster Posey said. "I think that would be the problem, getting everybody on board. I think it'd be pretty difficult — not just players obviously, but owners and management."

MLB and the union are partners in the World Baseball Classic, a quadrennial tournament for national teams whose fourth edition is scheduled for next March. But with the Olympics, they wouldn't split any revenue. And teams likely would lobby for certain players not to risk getting hurt while with national teams.

And then there is the problem of inactivity for players who don't go to Janan

"It depends on if the players not playing with those national teams would be OK with it, having those two weeks off," said Minnesota outfielder Max Kepler, who has played for Germany. "They'd probably be a little rusty from all that."

"I think it would have to be Triple-A guys," Baltimore's Adam Jones said.

# Protesters punch, throw eggs at Trump supporters in San Jose SAN JOSE, Calif. (AP) — A group of protesters

attacked Donald Trump supporters who were leaving the presidential candidate's rally in San Jose on Thursday night. A dozen or more people were punched, at least one person was pelted with an egg and Trump hats grabbed from supporters were set on fire on the ground.

Police stood their ground at first but after about 90

minutes moved into the remaining crowd to break it up and make arrests. At least four people were taken into custody, though police didn't release total arrest figures Thursday night. One officer was assaulted, police Sgt. Enrique Garcia said.

There were no immediate reports of injuries and no major property damage, police said.

The crowd, which had numbered over 300 just after the rally, thinned significantly as the night went on, but those that remained near the San Jose Convention Center were rowdy and angry.

Some banged on the cars of Trump supporters as they left the rally and chased after those on foot to frighten them.

#### Crews search for 4 missing in Texas from flooded Army truck

FORT HOOD, Texas (AP) — Army teams and other emergency crews searched along a Fort Hood creek for four soldiers still missing from a truck that overturned in the swift water, killing at least five and injuring three.

Fort Hood spokesman Chris Haug said the search continued after teams late Thursday night found the bodies of two soldiers who had been in the vehicle. Three others were found dead shortly after the 2 ½-ton truck overturned in Owl Creek during a morning training exercise on the sprawling Central Texas army post.

Three soldiers were rescued and were hospitalized in stable condition.

Aerial and ground crews searched the 20-mile creek that winds through heavily wooded terrain on the northern fringe of the base. Army aircraft, canine search teams, swift-water rescue watercraft and heavy trucks were being used.

The Army did not release the names of the dead because it was still notifying relatives.

# Japan praises boy who survived after abandonment in forest

TOKYO (AP) — Nearly a week after he was abandoned in the forest by his parents, the boy did not shed a tear when he was found safe Friday. The soldier who discovered him by chance in a military hut gave him two rice balls, which 7-year-old Yamato Tanooka ate ravenously. He looked a bit worn out but was "genki," the military said, using a Japanese word describing healthy children.

The boy's safe return was welcomed in a nation

riveted by his disappearance and undergoing intense soul-searching about how it raises and disciplines its children.

Yamato's story, as pieced together from com-

ments from the military and police, was admirable in resourcefulness and resilience.

His parents, trying to teach him a lesson for misbehaving and throwing rocks, made him get out of the car last Saturday on the northernmost main island of Hokkaido in a forest reputedly ridden with bears. They couldn't find him when they returned several minutes later.

Apparently walking for several kilometers, the boy found the empty hut in a military drill area and entered a door that had been left open. The long-house-style hut had no heat or power and no food, but Yamato huddled between mattresses on the floor and drank water from the solitary faucet outside the hut for several days, local media reported.

#### Zoo dangerous-animal squads arm for a weighty responsibility

When a 400-pound gorilla grabbed a 3-year-old boy at the Cincinnati Zoo, the sharpshooter who killed the ape wasn't from the police. Instead, the shooter was a specially trained zoo staffer on one of the many dangerous-animal emergency squads at animal parks nationwide.

The teams train at firing ranges, stash rifles and shotguns around the grounds, and rank the most hazardous species in their care. Members train in elaborate drills for situations like what unfolded in Cincinnati, when the child fell into the gorilla's enclosure Saturday. The staffer who fired hasn't been publicly identified.

It's a weighty commitment for people who work among animals they might one day have to kill. But team members understand the need to do it if a human life is in danger.

"We all know, every day that we go to work, that we are responsible for the safety of not only the animals in our care, but our co-workers and the visiting public," said Denise Wagner, a

member of the response

team at the Phoenix Zoo, where she's a senior primate keeper focused on orangutans. "We take that responsibility very seriously."

The Cincinnati gorilla's death has created crosscurrents of outrage over the vigilance of both the zoo and the child's mother. But it also has highlighted the unusual work of zoos' homegrown emergencyresponse teams.

# Finding overdose killed Prince just the beginning of probe

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Word from authorities that Prince died of an overdose of fentanyl, a powerful opioid that is up to 50 times more potent than heroin, is far from the end of the investigation. In some ways, it's just the beginning.

After Thursday's announcement about the superstar's death, investigators in the months to come will try to determine whether the singer had a prescription for the drug or whether it was supplied illegally. If it's latter, someone could face criminal charges carrying years, or even decades, in prison.

Prince was found dead April 21 at his Minneap-

olis-area estate, and at least one friend has said he suffered from intense knee and hip pain from many years of performances. Although the death was formally ruled an acci-

dent, that merely signified that it was not intentional and does not preclude a criminal prosecution.

According to a one-page report released by a med-

ical examiner, Prince administered the drug himself on an unknown date. The office said the death investigation is complete, and it had no further comment.

#### Carter: Military will learn from 2 fatal training accidents SINGAPORE (AP) — The U.S. military w

SINGAPORE (AP) — The U.S. military will investigate and attempt to learn from the tragic loss of life in two incidents Thursday, one in Texas, the other in Tennessee, U.S. Defense Secretary Ash Carter said Friday.

Speaking in Singapore, where he was conferring with his Singaporean counterpart on Southeast Asian security issues, Carter expressed condolences to the families of those killed.

"With respect to the fact that both of these were losses, safety issues, in training we are going to make sure that we learn lessons that we can from investigations that we conduct after these incidents and take actions in the future to prevent such accidents," he said.

Five soldiers were killed and four were missing after a troop carrier overturned Thursday in a rainswollen creek at Fort Hood. In the other incident, a pilot was killed when his Blue Angels fighter jet crashed near Nashville.

# With new tactics, Taliban gain ground in south Afghanistan KABUL, Afghanistan (AP)—In the rugged terrain

of the Taliban heartland in southern Afghanistan, the fight against Kabul has become a war for control of key stretches of main roads and highways as the insurgents use a new tactic to gain ground. First they storm a checkpoint, kill all the policemen, seize their weapons and equipment and ef-

fectively cut off the main road to a remote village. They raise the white Taliban flag and plant road-side bombs to prevent cars from coming through the checkpoint. Any vehicle that attempts to pass through is either blown up or attacked, residents and local leaders say.

Then they wait. Faced with shortages of basic food items and price hikes as their symplical dwine.

food items and price hikes as their supplies dwindle, the villagers are eventually forced to abandon their homes and to move to a place where they can afford to eat and live. Most sneak out on foot or on donkeys through backroads and mountain paths, leaving many of their belongings behind.

Though the new tactic may be obviously simple, it has helped the Taliban gain ground — albeit at a slower pace than a deadly, surprise raid on an entire village.

The Taliban have been waging war against the Kabul government since 2001, when their regime was overthrown in the U.S.-led invasion. Since the international combat troops pulled out of Afghanistan at the end of 2014, leaving behind only a largely training and advising contingent, the insurgency has intensified as Afghan forces struggle to take the lead in the battle.

NEW YORK (AP) — Rising drug and alcohol overdoses, suicides, and disease from chronic alcoholism — labeled "deaths of despair" by one expert — are cutting the lives of white Americans short by nearly a half a year on average.
