Jersey Cattle Club Classifies Local Herd

COLUMBUS, O. Feb. 27, 1950—The herd of registered Jersey cattle owned by T. R. Davis of Hart, Texas, has recently been classified for type under the program of the American Jersey Cattle Club.

The classification rated the animals for type, comparing them against the breed's score of 100 points for a perfect animal. In this classification, the first for Davis' herd, 11 animals were rated by Prof. I. Walker Rupel of Texas A. & M. College. Prof. Rupel is an official classifier for the Club, which has its national headquarters in Columbus, O. He scored all females in the herd that have had at least one calf and all bulls over 2 years old.

Three animals scored Very Good, 6 Good Plus, and 2 Good, to give the herd average of 82.95 per cent.

Clinic to Be Held For Cerebral Palsied Youths

The Cerebral Palsy Treatment Center will hold a clinic for the examination of cerebral palsied children on Monday, March 20. Dr. E. B. Sadler, Amarillo; Dr. E. T. Driscoll, Plainview and Dr. R. Q. Lewis, Lubbock will examine patients.

The clinic will be the first held in the Treatment Center's new \$42,000 building located at 3502 Ave. N. The new building provides facilities for physical therapy, occupational therapy and speech therapy. To date 244 cases have been registered at the Center for care.

Representing Dimmitt At State Meet

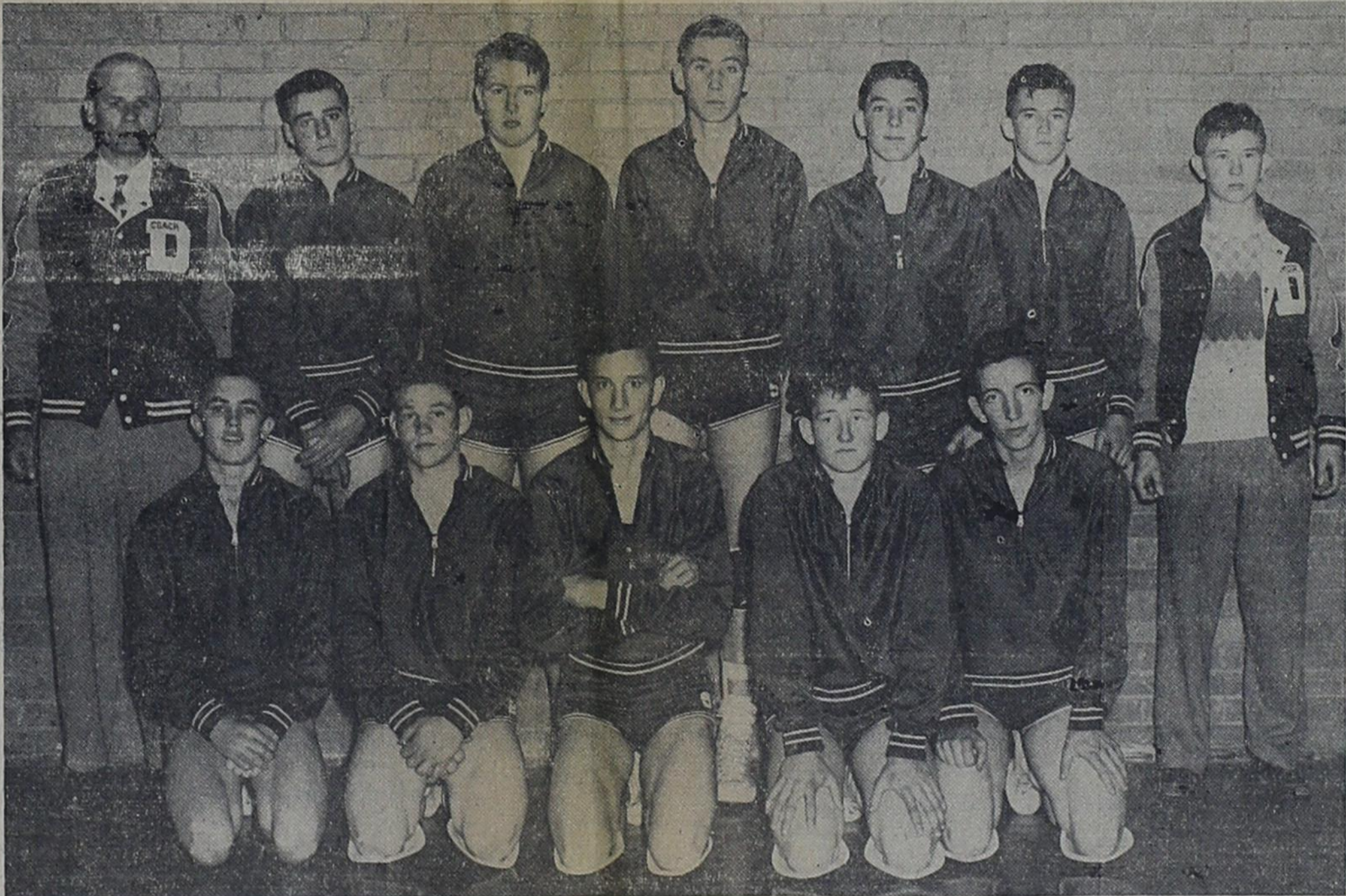

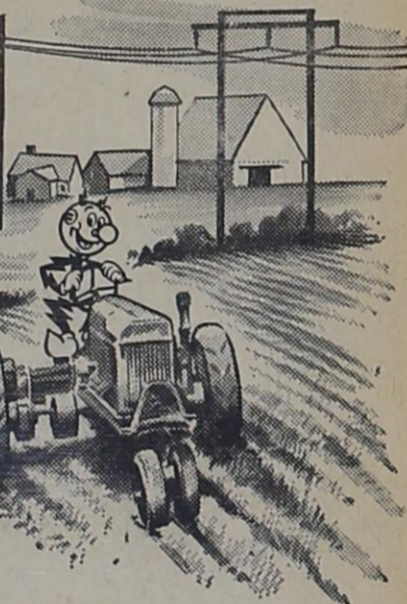

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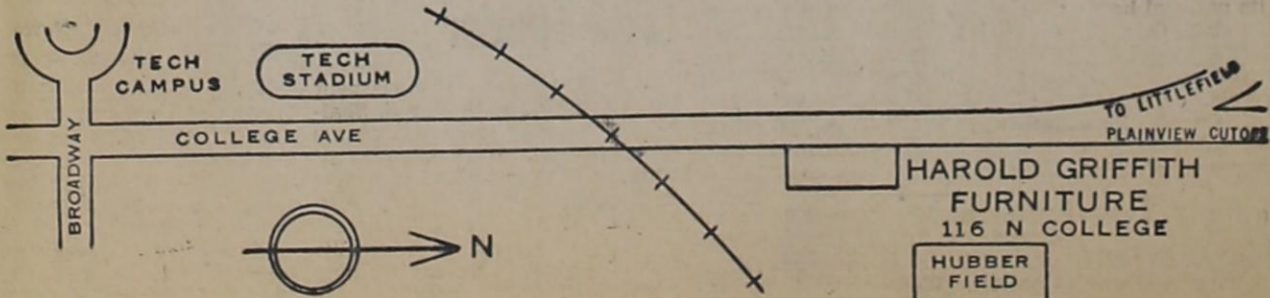

GET THE FARM TRACTOR READY NOW

COLLEGE STATION, March—

Texas weather during the past few weeks may not have been the best for outside work, but right now is a mighty good time to get the farm tractor ready for the busy days ahead. According to W. L. Ulrich, extension agricultural engineer of Texas A. & M. College, a good place to start is on the air cleaner of your tractor.

He says most farmers do a good job of taking care of the pre-cleaner and oil cup, but the air cleaner itself is often neglected. About 9,000 gallons of air goes through the cleaner for each gallon of fuel burned, and he says you can expect a lot of dirt to lodge in the screen and element of the cleaner. The air cleaner should be removed at least twice a year and thoroughly washed in kerosene or a cleaning solvent. When it is replaced, be sure that all air hose connections are tight for a leaky hose makkes the cleaner useless.

This is a good time to do a valve grinding job, but Ulrich says the valves should be removed and the grinding job should be done by a trained mechanic who has the proper equipment for doing this work. The actual job of seating the valves can be done on the farm.

The next item that should be checked is the fuel system. The fuel screen located on most tractors near the sediment bowl and carburetor should be removed and

cleaned. The carburetor should be cleaned and adjusted. Ulrich says you'll want to remember that the carburetor is not a gas plant but is a metering device, and it cannot measure the proper mixture of air and fuel unless properly adjusted. He says the motor should be warmed to operating temperature before any attempts are made to adjust the carburetor. There are three major adjustments on most tractor carburetors. The idle stop screw which merely stops the throttle lever at idling speed; the idle mixture adjustment; and the third is the load adjustment. Consult your operators manual on how to make the adjustments and the final check will come when the tractor is pulling field equipment.

Big Square Community Enters Rural Neighborhood Progress Contest

The Big Square Community in Southwest Castro County have been working a year on the Neighborhood Contest sponsored by the Farmer Stockman magazine and the Extension Service. Mrs. Orbie Armstrong was elected secretary and her report in part is as follows:

In 1949 which was the start of the Contest our first meeting for the Neighborhood was called by our Home Demonstration Club president, Mrs. Paul Chance in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Orbie Armstrong for a big supper, business meeting and discussion about a "Public Road Side Park." We looked around and decided that the corner of Mr. Paul Chance's farm that was cut off by the highway was the place for it if we could come to some agreement with Mr. Chance.

At this meeting we elected Mrs. Paul Chance, chairman, Mrs. Orbie Armstrong, secretary, Mr. Truman Lowe, Mr. Ray Barrett and Miss Wilma June Kellar as sponsors. Then we saw Mr. Chance about the two acres of land. We agreed to pay Mr. Chance a dollar a year for a 10 year lease, so we started our park. After this came the financing we had to have some money, so eleven adults in our community put on a 3 Act Play at 5 different places and cleared \$112 and we had a box supper total \$30.00, three auction total \$45.00 with this and some few donations we started the park.

A man who lives out of our

community donated 112 Chinese elm. The next meeting was called by the chairman and eleven families came to this block of land with their lunch, hoes, and rakes and spent the day. The first thing Mrs. Chance and Mrs. Bill Kellar motored to Plainview and brought back 9 evergreens, and the men went for these trees while the other ladies raked, cleaned, and burned weeds from this block of land, ust before noon our commissioner sent the maintainer to clean and grade the old road that was around the park, he also threw a border up all the way around it. Then lunch was called and we took one hour to go to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Chance and spread our lunch for an old fashion noon spread. Then some of the men went for post hole diggers to dig holes for the trees, some went for the level to level the ground. Others went for barrels of water, that evening when our day's work was finished we had an attractive park started with 112 Chinese elm and 9 evergreens, also one rose and one butterfly bush that was donated. After this wonderful day of work the men got busy in the field, and as we didn't have any water, the ladies carried water in barrels and watered these evergreens and trees every other day until at last we got a rain and our days work began to green up.

Then on May 2, 1949 we had the Dedication of the Park at 7:30

p. m. Mr. R. L. King, our county agent gave the dedication talk, we also had a basket supper after the dedication and visited until a late hour.

Then we had a plaque made for the park to tell what it was and when we had our dedication.

Our neighborhood has also done the following:

1. Painted 51 mail boxes
 2. Nine land owners worked and helped commissioner get mail route in our community.
 3. There are three girls in our neighborhood rainbow circle girls.
 4. A cooking school was given and sponsored by the Maytag dealer.
 5. The entire neighborhood has signed up for rural telephones.
 6. The school has a nurse and has checked all vaccines, eyes, ears, checked for T. B. and a complete examination.
 7. Made plaque for park.
 8. Had park wired for R.E.A.
 9. We had an all day picnic in Lubbock, a nice size crowd attended.
 10. Chicken Fry and Stanley party combined.
 11. House warming for a family who completed a new home.
 12. We gave a Negro family a shower after their house burned.
 13. Placed two exhibits at the County fair in Dimmitt. One was a general farm products exhibit and the other was an exhibit of pot planes which was a home demonstration club exhibit.
 14. There are two new churches being built and our neighborhood is helping.

Early Clean-Up Campaigns Combat Typhoid Epidemics

Austin, Texas—Dr. Geo. W. Cox State Health Officer, says that the season of the year when typhoid fever is most prevalent will soon be here and urges everyone to clean up their premises to eliminate flies and other insects. A town is only as clean as the individual citizens and public health should be everyone's concern.

The typhoid germ travels from an infected person to the well person; this is generally accomplished by water, milk, flies, fingers, or food. Every case is contracted by way of the mouth and digestive system.

A carrier is a person who has had typhoid fever at some time

and who even after recovery carries the germs of the disease in the urine and discharge of the bowels. Carriers who are careless in their personal habits are likely to infect any food they handle with unwashed hands. Some of the most serious and far-reaching outbreaks of the disease have been caused by drinking milk or eating

foods that have been handled by carriers. Persons may be carriers without knowing it.

Typhoid fever is unnecessary and preventable. Every case is due either to community negligence or to the carelessness of some individual. Persons planning a vacation or trip where sanitation may not be rigidly enforced should protect themselves against this disease by

being immunized. Its prevention is accomplished by the enforcement of public health measures to protect food, milk, and water supplies, and by immunization. The purity of water, milk, or food cannot be judged by looking at it, so the best thing to do is to play safe and have your physician protect you.

OUR FAVORITE RECIPE

Simple Do's for Juicy, Broiled Steak

Broiled steaks merit special cooking attention—but little of it! According to Reba Staggs, well known meat cookery expert, broiling steaks so they are uniformly browned on the outside and cooked to the desired degree of doneness on the inside is quite a simple matter.

First of all it is important where the steak is placed in the broiler. The correct distance from the heat is two to three inches depending on the thickness of the steak (1-inch steaks, 2 inches; 2-inch steaks, 3 inches). This will give a moderate broiling temperature of about 350 F.

The second simple rule of broiling is that the steak needs to be turned only once. When the meat

is nicely browned it is cooked about half way through and then it is seasoned, turned on the second side and finished cooking. When that side is cooked, it is seasoned and the steak is ready for the meat platter and immediate serving. For a rare done 1-inch steak from 18 to 20 minutes cooking time is required; medium-done, 20 to 25 minutes. For a rare done 2-inch steak 30 to 35 minutes is required; medium-done 40 to 45 minutes.

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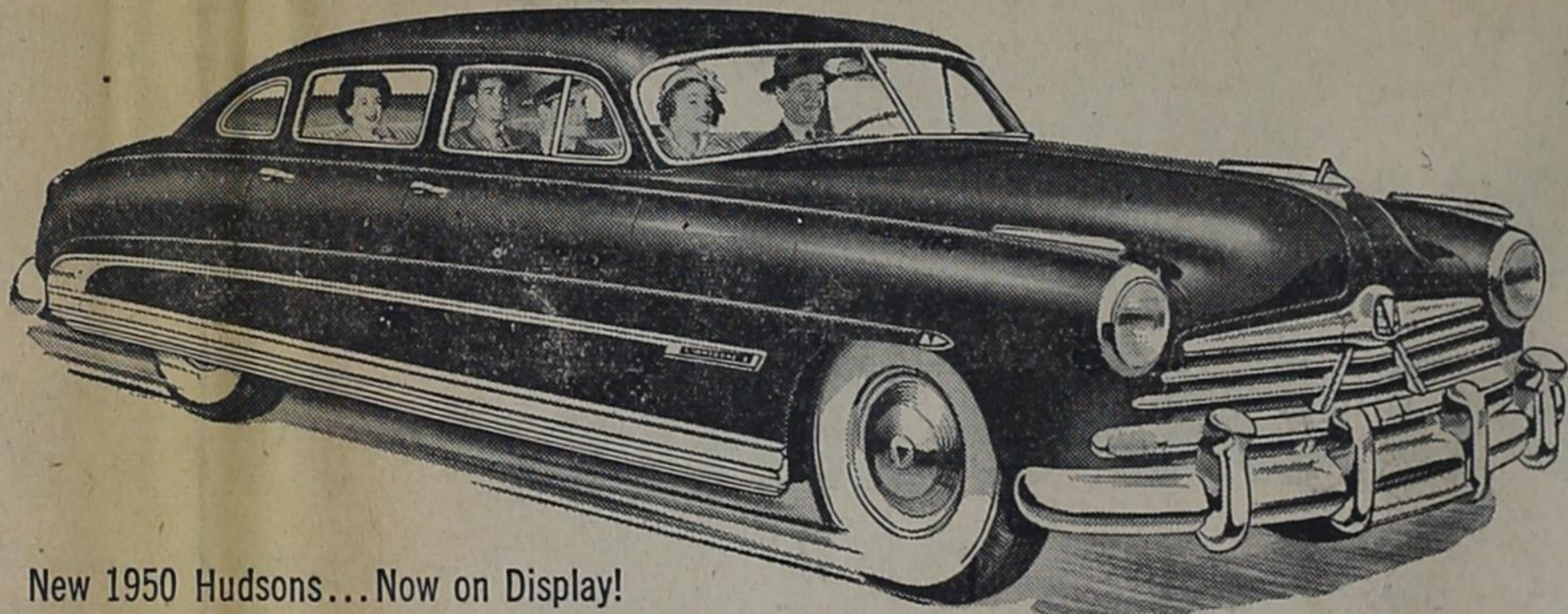
