Contractor hired for Spring project

Most, if not all, of the pieces are in place for Big Spring's namesake to get a badly needed facelift. Renovation of the historic spring in Comanche Trail Park is expected to begin within the next two months following the hiring of a contractor to oversee the project. Onyx General Contractors, LLC of Midland was named by the Big Spring City Council earlier this week to manage the renovation project, completing one of the last steps before work on the landmark can finally begin. Estimated cost of the renovation is

\$1.8 million and will be paid for from the city's hotel tax fund account. Community Services Director Debbie Wegman said work is expected to begin later this summer. "We're just very excited to finally see this coming to fruition," said Wegman. "I think we have a very good contractor — Onyx has managed several municipal projects like this in the past and they come very well-recommended — and we're pleased that they'll be able to get to work soon." US hands drug lord to Mexico

'El Guero' to face trial for two murders

MEXICO CITY — Mexican drug lord Hector "El Guero" Palma, one of the founders of the Sinaloa Cartel, returned to his native country Wednesday after serving almost a decade in a U.S. prison and was transported to another maximum-security lockup where he will await trial on two murders. U.S. authorities handed over Palma in Matamoros, across the border from Brownsville, Texas, according to a statement from the Mexican Attorney General's Office. The U.S. Embassy in Mexico confirmed Palma's transfer in a statement. Palma had been released from federal prison in California on Friday and put into the custody of U.S. immigration officials. He was flown to Mexico City and then transported to the Altiplano prison outside the capital, the same prison that Sinaloa Cartel leader Joaquin "El Chapo" Guzman escaped from in 2015. Palma was detained under an arrest order from the western state of Nayarit. No additional details were provided about the two murders. Earlier, Mexican officials had said they did not know whether authorities in Mexico planned to bring new charges against

HVAC repairs force SWCID closure

The campus of the SouthWest Collegiate Institute for the Deaf (SWCID) will close temporarily while crews perform a major renovation/repair project on the campus' air conditioning and heating system.

"We appreciate your patience with us as we have the campus air conditioning and heating units repaired throughout the SWCID campus," Cindy Smith, HC director of information stated in a news release. "We will make every effort to ensure continuity of service and access to faculty and staff during this time."

The \$1.9 million project was approved during the last state legislative session and is completely funded through state monies, not through local tax property revenue.

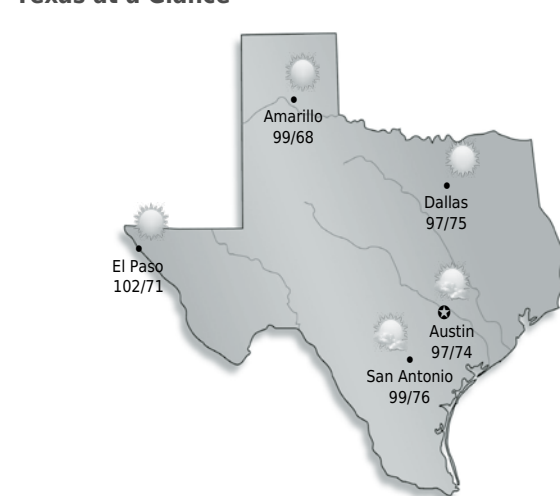

Orlando gunman raged against 'filthy ways of the west'

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — While his victims texted heartbreaking last words to loved ones from the blood-drenched floors of packed bathrooms, Omar Mateen apparently turned to social media to measure the viral shockwaves his attack on a gay nightclub had generated.

As this grief-stricken city prepares to bury the first of the 49 who perished at the Pulse dance club, a Senate Committee has asked Facebook CEO Mark Zuckerberg for help uncovering the trail of hate Mateen left behind in cyberspace.

"The real muslims will never accept the filthy ways of the west," the 29-year-old American-born Muslim wrote on one of at least five Facebook accounts believed to be associated with him, according to the letter from Sen. Ron Johnson, chairman of the Senate Homeland Security Committee.

The call comes as President Barack Obama prepares to visit Orlando on Thursday. On Wednesday, drag queens and motorcyclists paid their respects at a visitation for Javier Jorge-Reyes, beginning the long procession of rainbow-hued sendoffs for Mateen's victims.

In the letter released Wednesday, Johnson, a Wisconsin Republican, said the security guard and

wannabe police officer took time Sunday to search on Facebook for "Pulse Orlando" and "Shooting." The attack took place early that morning.

Sheriff: Charges unlikely after 2-year-old killed by gator

LAKE BUENA VISTA, Fla. (AP) — A sheriff said charges are unlikely against a Nebraska couple after an alligator killed their 2-year-old son by snatching him out of shallow water at a Walt Disney World beach, but the entertainment giant is reviewing whether to add gator warning signs.

Orange County Sheriff Jerry Demings told The Associated Press after a news conference Wednesday there was no indication Will and Melissa Graves of suburban Omaha, Nebraska, committed any crime that contributed to the reptile grabbing their son, Lane Graves.

"There's nothing in this case to indicate that there was anything extraordinary" in terms of neglect by the parents, Demings said.

Demings said his department and the state wildlife agency would look into the issue of signs around Seven Seas Lagoon, where Disney had posted "no swimming" signs but no warnings about the presence of alligators.

Searchers removed five of the reptiles from the

water while looking for the child, who was attacked at a small beach area near nightfall Tuesday.

In wake of mass shootings, Dem senator wages filibuster

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Democratic senator who mourned the loss of 20 children in his home state of Connecticut four years ago waged a nearly 15-hour filibuster into the early hours of Thursday morning, demanding votes on gun control measures just days after a mass shooting at a Florida nightclub.

As compromise on the gun issue remained improbable, Sen. Chris Murphy stood on the Senate floor for most of Wednesday and into Thursday saying he would remain there "until we get some signal, some sign that we can come together."

He yielded the floor at 2:11 a.m., EDT, saying he had won commitments from Republican leaders that they would hold votes on amendments to expand background checks and ban gun sales to suspected terrorists.

It is unlikely that those amendments will pass, however.

Murphy spent much of the time speaking about the shooting at Newtown, Connecticut's Sandy Hook Elementary School in December 2012.

Palma. If not, Palma would go free.

Attorney General Arely Gomez had said her office was reviewing whether there were any pending cases against Palma. "We are in the process of carrying out an exhaustive review, checking all the prosecutors' offices."

Palma was arrested in June 1995 in western Mexico and later extradited to the U.S. where he pleaded guilty to cocaine trafficking charges and was sentenced to 16 years in prison. The U.S. Embassy said Palma received early release for good behavior.

Some experts believed that Palma could have returned to drug trafficking if allowed to walk free, but would have faced a world that has changed since he helped Guzman found the Sinaloa cartel in the early 1990s.

"He could try to get involved, but I don't know how directly," said Mexico City-based security analyst Alejandro Hope. Palma may have lost much of his money and his connections since he was arrested following a plane crash.

Once released, he could have just disappeared into Mexico's hinterlands, "just like Caro Quintero," Hope noted, referring to the last major old-guard drug lord released, Ra-

fael Caro Quintero.

Freed by apparent judicial misconduct in 2014, and currently sought on a re-arrest warrant, Caro Quintero hasn't been seen since. Given that he participated in the 1985 torture-slaying of U.S. DEA agent Enrique "Kiki" Camarena, Caro Quintero's release was a major embarrassment for the Mexican government.

Palma's return threatens to be another headache.

Even before he was extradited to the United States in 2007, Palma had compiled an excellent track record of beating charges in Mexico. He was acquitted, or had the charges dismissed, for accusations including multiple counts of

murder, kidnapping, robbery and drug possession.

In Mexico, Palma, known as "El Guero" for his fair hair, served only a 2 1/2-year sentence for minor convictions including weapons violations.

Like his business associate, "El Chapo," Mexico appears unable to do a very good job of keeping Palma in jail. He essentially fell into the hands of law enforcement in 1995 after his plane crashed.

And with all the trouble that Mexico is currently going to get "El Chapo" Guzman extradited, Palma's return raises the unnerving possibility that some day, Guzman could be sent back.

Texas 10 Most Wanted fugitives or sex offenders. To be eligible for the cash rewards, tipsters must provide information to authorities using one of the five following methods:

- Call the Crime Stoppers hotline at 1-800-252-TIPS (8477).
- Text the letters "DPS" - followed by your tip - to 274637 (CRIMES) from your cell phone.

Submit a web tip through the DPS website by selecting the fugitive you have information about, and then clicking on the link under their picture.

Submit a Facebook tip at www.facebook.com/texas10mostwanted by clicking the "SUBMIT A TIP" link (under the "About" section).

Submit a tip through

the DPS Mobile App. The app is currently available for iPhone users on the Apple App Store: itunes.apple.com/us/app/texas-dps/id902092368?mt=8) and for Android users on Google Play: play.google.com/store/apps/details?id=com.microassist.texasdps&hl=en).

All tips are anonymous - regardless of how they are submitted, and tipsters will be provided a tip number instead of using a name.

DPS investigators work with local law enforcement agencies to select fugitives for the Texas 10 Most Wanted

Fugitive and Sex Offender lists. You can find the current lists - with photos - on the DPS website at www.dps.texas.gov/texas10-mostwanted/. Do not attempt to apprehend these fugitives; they are considered armed and dangerous, officials warn.

is expected within the next few weeks, said Kelly Cook, a Midland architect who has been connected with the renovation project for more than a year.

"We had to hire an archeologist to do an in-depth study of the area, and she has to file a report with THC before they approve the project," Cook said. "It will be about three weeks until the commission makes its decision, but we're not anticipating any issues."

The more Cook has delved into the project and studied the history of the Big Spring, the more excited he has become about the pending renovation.

"The spring was instrumental in the shaping of West Texas ... but not too many people in West Texas are aware of that," Cook said. "It was a popular water hole for the Comanches long before Captain Marcy came across it in 1849 ... and water provided by the spring was a major factor behind the decision to bring the railroad through this area.

"The spring is the reason cities like Abilene, Sweetwater, Colorado City, Big Spring, Midland, and Odessa are here," he added.

Phase One of the renovation project, calls for repair of pumps which help supply the spring with its water, but officials said several other items are aimed directly at attracting visitors, including:

- Plaza seating for 1,000+ with full electrical hookups and performance stage.
- Widened trail with security lighting and

emergency vehicle access

- Eight storyboards with accompanying educational signage covering the history of the area.
- Sixteen low-maintenance planting areas with 16 specimen trees
- Observation decks overlooking the spring and artificial outflows.
- Significant thinning of vegetation for visibility, appeal and safety.
- New artificial outflow into area above current spring location creating waterfall at spring.
- Security cameras

- Full handicap accessibility.
- Construction materials featuring native stone and CCC-style architecture.
- Partial demolition of dam to allow spring to reach natural levels.
- Expanded parking.

Phase Two plans haven't been finalized, but tentatively include attractions like a 1,600-square foot open air education center and new pedestrian bridges.

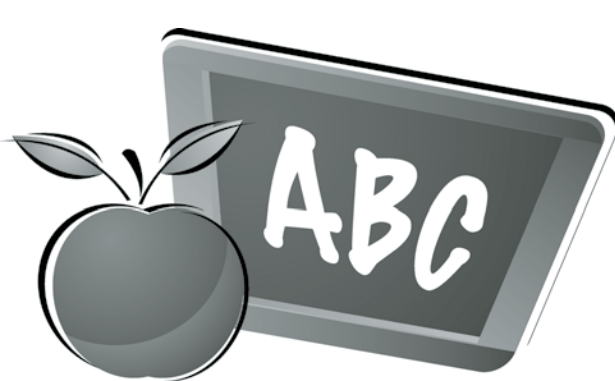

Big Spring buckin' starts tonight

The 83rd annual Big Spring Cowboy Reunion and Rodeo ready to get going

Some call it the most exciting eight seconds in sports, and for many it's the most exciting three days in Big Spring.

The Big Spring Cowboy Reunion and Rodeo kicks off tonight at 7 p.m., and rodeo board member Derek Wash is ready to have some fun.

"I personally say that it's the most intensely packed two-plus hours that you'll get anywhere. It's just packed full of family entertainment. It's just nonstop entertainment for that amount of time, and in my mind it's the biggest thing we ever bring through here. We're built down in an old concrete bowl and you won't find that anywhere else," Wash said. "Big Spring was built by these cowboys, and we continue to try and keep up that heritage and that legacy."

The rodeo will feature similar events each night, with the big difference being the cowboys riding bulls and kids riding sheep.

"You're going to have the same thing every night, but different sets of cowboys, different sets of kids mutton busting, so different participants each night," Wash said.

From bull riding and Shetland bronc riding, to mutton busting and entertainment from Keith Isley, an award-winning rodeo clown, there's sure to be something for everyone at the 83rd annual event. Madison McDonald, a trick rider from Stephenville, will also put on a show for the fans in the stands.

"It's the second longest running rodeo in the state. Pecos has been running longer than we have. 83 years is a pretty long time," Wash said. "I went and I was never a cowboy at all when I was younger. You've got great entertainment, you've got great comedy for the kids. You've got great concession stands and great music. And we've got a scoreboard now that's a digital scoreboard and it'll show all the replays."

The dances on Friday and Saturday

Ichiro passes Pete Rose for most professional hits

TOKYO — Ichiro Suzuki's latest milestone has been a really big hit in Japan.

Newspapers published special editions for the morning rush hour, the national broadcaster led with the news, and fans and dignitaries paid tribute Thursday after Suzuki raised his career hits total in the Japanese and North American major leagues to 4,257, passing Pete Rose's record Major League Baseball total.

Prime Minister Shinzo Abe praised Suzuki's mark as "an amazing record."

"A Japanese athlete has once again made a monumental contribution," Abe said, "and I feel tremendous pride."

The 42-year-old Suzuki singled in the first inning against the San Diego Padres and doubled in the ninth to move past Rose, who had 4,256 hits over 24 seasons.

Suzuki had 1,278 hits for Orix in Japan's Pacific League (1992-00) and the rest with the Seattle Mariners, the New York Yankees and his current team, the Miami Marlins.

In his 16th season in Major League Baseball, Suzuki has 2,979 hits in the

majors and is rapidly approaching the 3,000-hit club.

"He is like a national treasure,"

office worker Tadahito Inaga said. "It will be fun to watch him go for 3,000."

Japan's national broadcaster NHK reported that Suzuki "broke the record for most hits ever by a Major League ballplayer" while acknowledging the record is unofficial because it spans two professional leagues.

Rose has previously played down the comparisons.

Rose was quoted recently by the USA Today newspaper as saying: "I'm not trying to take anything away from Ichiro, he's had a Hall of Fame career, but the next thing you know, they'll be counting his high-school hits."

The debate over Suzuki's mark is reminiscent of when Japanese slugger Sadaharu Oh passed Hank Aaron's record of 755 home runs in 1977. Japanese fans regarded it as a world record but many in the U.S. said the records were not equivalent, as Japanese ballparks tended to be smaller.

Oh, who would finish his career in Nippon Professional Baseball with 868 home runs, also had high praise for Suzuki.

"To do this at 42, he is an inspiration to baseball fans around the world," Oh said. "I look forward to following him as he continues to get more hits."

The Japanese professional baseball hit record is 3,085 held by Isao Harimoto in 2,752 games.

Astros and Cardinals keeping it civil during investigation

ST. LOUIS (AP) — The Houston Astros happened to be in town when the St. Louis Cardinals paraded out one of their just-signed first-round draft picks to take some cuts in the batting cage and do interviews.

It was a bit surreal, given long-time speculation that the investigation into the Cardinals' hacking of the Astros' player database might cost them draft picks, along with a fine. St. Louis had three first-rounders this year.

Both teams took it as a coincidence.

"All around baseball there are first-round draft picks being introduced," Astros general manager Jeff Luhnow told the Associated Press on Wednesday before the conclusion of the two-game inter-league series. "It's that time of the year."

New Cardinals scouting director Randy Flores, asked whether it was strange to have the Astros in town while 33rd overall pick Dylan Carlson was getting his first

Chirinos leads Rangers over A's

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — The Texas Rangers trailed by five runs against a resurgent All-Star pitcher, and found a way to rally for a win. That's how things have been going for them lately.

Robinson Chirinos and Rougned Odor both homered twice to lead Texas to a 7-5 win over the Oakland Athletics on Wednesday night, giving the Rangers their fifth win in six games.

"Huge win for us because it did not look good," Rangers manager Jeff Banister said. "It goes to another chapter in the book of what these guys are writing this year of staying en-

gaged."

And with the Rangers off to their best start in club history through 67 games — at a league-best 41-26 — their fans are already glued to the script.

"We never give up," Chirinos said. "That's what's special about this team."

The Rangers' power surge has been special too. Texas has homered 17 times in the first six games of a 10-game trip.

The A's lost for the ninth time in 11 games.

Three of Chirinos' four homers on the season have come in the last two days. Chirinos hit a solo homer off A's reliever John Axford (3-

2) in the top of the seventh inning that broke a 5-5 tie.

Texas trailed 5-0 in the sixth when Chirinos started a five-run rally with a leadoff homer off starter Sonny Gray. Odor's two-run homer off Gray tied the score. He added a solo shot — his 12th — in the eighth off Sean Doolittle.

Gray, a 2015 all-star who's bounced back from a slow start since coming off the disabled list on June 5, was dominant through five innings.

"I left some pitches up and they didn't really miss," Gray said.

Springer homer boosts Astros past Cardinals 4-1

ST. LOUIS (AP) — The Houston Astros have found life since moving George Springer to the leadoff spot, and Wednesday night was a perfect example.

Springer had the go-ahead two-run homer in the eighth inning, threw out a runner at the plate from right field and almost nailed a second with his arm in a 4-1 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals for a two-game sweep.

"George always does

things," Houston starter Collin McHugh said. "It was a very typical George day."

Tony Sipp (1-2) got the last out of the seventh, Carlos Correa's two-run single off Trevor Rosenthal made it a three-run lead in the ninth and Will Harris finished for his fifth save in as many chances.

The Astros are 15-7 since shifting Springer ahead of Jose Altuve, who batted third in both games against

St. Louis and had two hits on Wednesday. Springer had been in a 4-for-37 slump before connecting to straightaway center off Kevin Siegrist (4-2) with two outs for his 15th homer.

"I've been hitting the ball hard, just haven't gotten anything out of it," Springer said. "You just have to keep grinding and do anything that you can, and that's on the bases or the outfield or try to draw a walk, whatever it is."

Cardinals starter Adam Wainwright worked seven innings of four-hit ball and Greg Garcia, batting for the pitcher in the bottom half, hit an RBI single off McHugh to open the scoring.

"I'd rather be up 10-0 but when you get locked in those 0-0 games sometimes it does drive you to pitch a little

Dear Grandmother: If you were unrelated, we'd say a card is perfect. But you are not just any guest. You are the grandmother and this puts you in a separate category. (Not to mention, third weddings should be very small affairs.)

No one is obligated to attend any wedding, particularly a second or third. But your daughter obviously wants the support of her family and your blessing would mean a lot. If you can afford to attend, it would be a kindness to do so, but we understand the hardship of an out-of-state wedding. You also are not obligated to keep giving gifts for subsequent marriages. But again, as the grandmother, you may wish to send something small, such as a picture frame or bottle of wine.

The point is not to

create a rift, upset your daughter or make your granddaughter think you love her less because she can't seem to get her act together. We say, send her a lovely card with a small token gift. Add that you are so sorry you cannot attend, but you will be thinking of her.

Dear Annie: You would be a hero to English teachers everywhere, and a help to many people, if you would use your column to explain when to use "I" and when to use "me." Sometimes, using a different pronoun or the singular version makes it obvious which is the correct choice. We've heard people say, "Jim and me went to the store," but if you remove "Jim," you'd never say, "Me went to the store" (unless you are Cookie Monster).

And for all those who are still paying attention, the correct phrase is "between you and me." Please.

This deal occurred in a team-four match. At both tables, South was declarer at three notrump and West led a club.

At the first table, declarer ducked East's queen and ten of clubs, and won the third club with the ace. He then led a heart to dummy's eight, losing to the queen, and won East's diamond return with the king. Another heart lead to dummy's jack lost to East's king, but declarer had

the rest of the tricks and so made exactly three notrump.

At the second table, however, South went down two, a result which came about in a perfectly reasonable manner. Here also, East won the opening lead with the queen of clubs and returned the ten, ducked by declarer. But West, recognizing the futility of persisting with clubs, overtook the ten with the jack and shifted to the queen of diamonds.

Declarer was helpless against this attack from a new quarter. He took the queen with the king and finessed the eight of hearts, losing to the queen. Back came a low diamond, West's jack forcing dummy's ace. When South now crossed to his hand with a spade and tried another heart finesse, East won with the king and cashed two diamond tricks to put the contract down two.

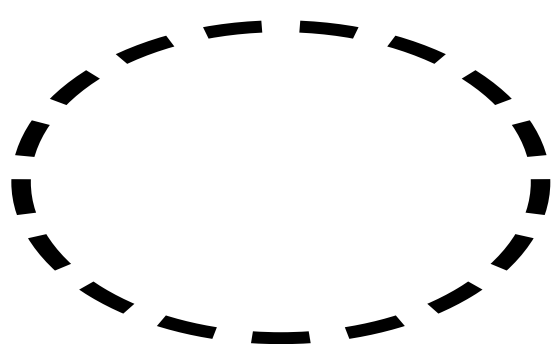
Certainly the defense at the second table was much more sensible than at the first. West saw no future in clubs and shifted to a diamond at trick three, hoping East held either the king or ten.

It is true that East might have held a different hand that would have made a diamond shift ineffective. But in that case, it was likely that every other method of defense would also fail.

This Date In History

Today is Thursday, June 16, the 168th day of 2016. There are 198 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

- On June 16, 1663, the world's first female space traveler, Valentina Tereshkova (teh-ruhsh-KOH'-vuh), 26, was launched into orbit by the Soviet Union aboard Vostok 6; she spent 71 hours in flight, circling the Earth 48 times before returning safely.
- On this date: In 1567, Mary, Queen of Scots, was imprisoned in Lochleven Castle in Scotland. (She escaped almost a year later but ended up imprisoned again.)
- In 1858, accepting the Illinois Republican Party's nomination for the U.S. Senate, Abraham Lincoln said the slavery issue had to be resolved, declaring, "A house divided against itself cannot stand."
- In 1903, Ford Motor Co. was incorporated.
- In 1911, IBM had its beginnings as the Computing-Tabulating-Recording Co. was incorporated in New York State.
- In 1933, the National Industrial Recovery Act became law with President Franklin D. Roosevelt's signature. (The Act was later struck down by the U.S. Supreme Court.)
- The Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. was founded as President Roosevelt signed the Banking Act of 1933.
- In 1941, National Airport (now Ronald Reagan Washington National Airport) opened for business with a ceremony attended by President Franklin D. Roosevelt.
- In 1943, comedian Charles Chaplin, 54, married his fourth wife, 18-year-old Oona O'Neill, daughter of playwright Eugene O'Neill, in Carpinteria, California.
- In 1944, George Stinney, a 14-year-old black youth, became the youngest person to die in the electric chair as the state of South Carolina executed him for the murders of two white girls, Betty June Binnicker, 11, and Mary Emma Thames, 7.
- In 1956, poets Sylvia Plath and Ted Hughes were married in London.
- In 1978, President Jimmy Carter and Panamanian leader Omar Torrijos (toh-REE'-ohs) exchanged the instruments of ratification for the Panama Canal treaties.
- In 1987, a jury in New York acquitted Bernhard Goetz of attempted murder in the subway shooting of four youths he said were going to rob him; however, Goetz was convicted of illegal weapons possession.

(In 1996, a civil jury ordered Goetz to pay \$43 million to one of the persons he'd shot.)

In 1996, Russian voters went to the polls in their first independent presidential election; the result was a runoff between President Boris Yeltsin (the eventual winner) and Communist challenger Gennady Zyuganov. Sportscaster Mel Allen died in Greenwich, Connecticut, at age 83.

Ten years ago: The House rejected a timetable for pulling U.S. forces out of Iraq, 256-153. In Iraq, three 101st Airborne Division soldiers were killed in an attack while two others were abducted (their mutilated bodies were found three days later). In Martinez, California, Susan Polk, 48, was convicted of second-degree murder for stabbing to death her millionaire psychotherapist husband, Felix Polk.

40 years after students sparked apartheid's end, a new anger

JOHANNESBURG — The day was a key moment in the long campaign to end South Africa's harsh apartheid system of white-minority rule. Forty years ago, black students in Johannesburg's Soweto township marched in protest and some were gunned down by police, appalling the world.

South Africa has changed dramatically since June 16, 1976, when the high school students defied being forced to study in Afrikaans, the language of their white rulers, and hundreds were killed as the protests spread across the country. In 1990, Nelson Mandela was freed from prison, later winning the Nobel Peace Prize and becoming the country's first black president. In 1994, blacks got the right to vote. "Whites only" barriers fell.

But a new wave of student protests, over fees charged for higher education, show the country remains starkly divided between the haves and have-nots. Although living conditions have improved, many blacks are still in poor neighborhoods without electricity or running water in their homes. Meanwhile, concerns are growing that a new black elite is plundering the country's wealth.

"What has changed? Nothing has changed," said Seth Mazibuko, one of the organizers of the 1976 Soweto protest who is today the head of the June 16 Youth Development Foundation. "When we were fighting, we were saying doors must be opened to all. Now these doors, when they open, they're closed for those who do not have money."

Economic stress is widespread. In a country where the well-off, including most whites, live behind high walls and enjoy sleek malls and international chains including the newly arrived Starbucks, more than a quarter of the 55 million people are unemployed, official statistics say. Unofficially, it's higher. Government management of the economy is a concern. South Africa's credit rating is near junk status.

Many of those who supported the Soweto uprising 40 years ago are troubled by the protests of today, in which students or others have burned schools and other community structures. Student protests since October

have caused property damage of more than \$30 million, the country's minister for higher education said last week.

"You can fight whatever you want to fight, but don't burn down what belongs to you," said Peter Magubane, whose photographs of the students' clash with police in 1976 helped rivet the world's attention on the apartheid regime.

At the nearby Apartheid Museum, where visitors receive tickets that randomly designate them as white or black and enter through corresponding doors, archivist Jacqui Masiza says she gets emotional putting together the narrative of the 1976 uprising. She was a 10-year-old student in Soweto at the time.

Economic equality is not yet where South Africa's people want it to be, she said. She understands why this generation of students is angry and says that promises made have not yet been fulfilled.

But 40 years ago, the student protest leaders were more disciplined, Masiza said. "If you can find leaders like that among our youth right now, that would be so greatly appreciated."

To today's generation of students, that sounds like a challenge.

Students once again marched through Soweto last weekend, following one of the routes used by the protesters in 1976. This time the students, as well as church leaders and survivors, were protected by police, both black and white.

Sizwe Makhubo, 17, expressed optimism for South Africa, mixed with frustration.

A high school like his in Soweto can have about 1,000 students, and yet the government offers it just three scholarships, he said. "So only the top three students get to go to university, and what does that say about the rest?"

Such competition for a decent future can breed hatred, he said. Undaunted, the slightly built Makhubo said he hopes to become a lawyer, a politician, and make South Africa a better place.

"Let's show this old generation we're not as lost as they think we are," he said.

Heavy rain in Texas unearths dog tags from WWII veteran

WICHITA FALLS, Texas (AP) — Sixty years ago a child buried treasure in the backyard of David Harmon's house on Ninth Street.

It took heavy rain to reveal it. The small piece of metal Harmon discovered was World War II veteran Clarence Massey's Army dog tag.

"I knew it was somebody's hero," Harmon said. "It brought tears to my eyes."

The Wichita Falls Times Record News reports Harmon set out to find the Massey family, turning to Veterans Affairs, Veterans of Foreign Wars and other sources. When things got challenging, his 10-year-old son Landon encouraged him.

"Landon didn't let it go," David Harmon said, eyes brimming with pride. "He told me 'Dad, we're gonna' return that.'"

After a Google search turned up two local Massey families, David Harmon began making calls. A voice message was returned by Clarence Massey's daughter, Gay Williams, on Memorial Day.

Williams was quick to visit David

Harmon at the home where decades ago she, brothers Steve, David, Scott and sister Carol spent part of their childhood. David Harmon soon visited Mary Ann Massey, Clarence's widow, intent on returning the dog tag in person.

"David went to a lot of trouble to find out something about Clarence," Mary Ann Massey said. Her husband was decorated for Army artillery service.

"I'll always appreciate the time and effort David and Landon went to bringing this back to me," she said.

Raised by his grandparents, David Harmon's grandfather J.R. Holcomb was an Army captain during World War II. He feels a strong connection to the Greatest Generation.

"We wouldn't be here if it wasn't for so many who died to keep us safe," David Harmon said. "I knew Mr. Massey was a good person. Returning the tag was the right thing to do. It was meant to be."

Asked what would become of Clarence's dog tag, Mary Ann Massey was sure.

"I'll keep it close to my heart," she said. "It will go in my treasure box." www.timesrecordnews.com

Sharper sentencing delayed until August

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Sentencing dates for ex-NFL star Darren Sharper have been pushed back to late August.

Sharper had been set for sentencing in state and federal courts in New Orleans this week. The changes give prosecutors time to evaluate Sharper's cooperation

in the case involving his Louisiana co-defendants in a drug and sexual assault case.

Brandon Licciardi (lih-CHAR'-dee) and Erik Nunez are set for a July 11 federal trial. They also face state charges related to allegations involving the drugging and raping of women.

Sharper has pleaded guilty or no-contest to related charges in state courts in Arizona, Nevada and California; and in state and federal courts in Louisiana. A judge rejected a nine-year sentence in Sharper's original plea deal and has noted federal guidelines calling for a 15-to-20-year sentence.

look at Busch Stadium, said, "No, I don't think so."

It's unclear when investigations by the FBI will conclude. Last July, the Cardinals fired scouting director Chris Correa, who awaits sentencing after pleading guilty in federal court in January to five counts of unauthorized access to a protected computer.

Luhnow was scouting director in St. Louis before becoming Astros general manager in 2011.

"It's all going to be resolved," Luhnow said, "but I'm not sure when."

Under the circumstances, relations appear to be stable.

"My relationship with Houston and specifically with Jeff Luhnow has been professional," Cardinals

general manager John Mozeliak said. "I'm sure we're both looking forward to a resolution."

Luhnow encounters members of the St. Louis front office at GM meetings, the Winter Meetings and spring training and recalled a nice chat with assistant general manager Michael Girsch at a spring training game in Florida.

He credits the Cardinals with "keeping the pipeline running" and being a model organization "from a baseball standpoint."

"So obviously, you spend eight seasons with a group of folks, you stay connected to them in some ways," Luhnow said. "I've followed the Cardinals with keen interest because it's my former club and there are a lot of the players I was involved with scouting, signing and developing."

Major League Baseball is awaiting a resolution be-

fore acting. The Cardinals have basically been mum since chairman Bill DeWitt addressed the case at the annual Winter Warmup in January, saying it was far too early to gauge potential punishment that could be levied.

Correa was originally to be sentenced on April 11, the date of the home opener, but it's been twice postponed since then and now has been set for July 5 in Houston. The Cardinals have maintained that Correa's actions were atypical for the organization.

The Astros swept a two-game series in the first meeting between the teams since 2013. Both teams were off Thursday before the Cardinals, the three-time defending NL Central champions, opened a weekend series against the Texas Rangers and the Astros come home to face the Cincinnati Reds.
