

Britain votes to leave EU

LONDON — Britain voted to leave the European Union after a bitterly divisive referendum campaign, toppling the prime minister Friday, sending global markets plunging and shattering the stability of a project in continental unity designed half a century ago to prevent World War III.

The decision launches a yearslong process to renegotiate trade, business and political links between the United Kingdom and what would become a 27-nation bloc, an unprecedented divorce that could take decades to complete.

"The dawn is breaking on an independent United Kingdom," said Nigel Farage, leader of the U.K. Independence Party. "Let June 23 go down in our history as our independence day!"

Prime Minister David Cameron, who had led the campaign to keep Britain in the EU, said he would resign by October and left it to his successor to decide when to invoke Article 50, which triggers a departure from European Union.

"I will do everything I can as prime

minister to steady the ship over the coming weeks and months," he said, "but I do not think it would be right for me to try to be the captain that steers the country to its next destination."

Polls ahead of the vote had shown a close race, and the momentum had increasingly appeared to be on the "remain" side over the last week. But in an election Thursday marked by notably high turnout — 72 percent of the more than 46 million registered voters — "leave"

TxDOT project nearing end line

Daily commuters to and from Midland or Odessa maybe shouting "Hallelujah!"

TxDOT announced Thursday afternoon traffic along the west of town will revert back to the main lanes of Intestate 20. As part of the interchange project to connect to the Highway 87 bypass roadway, traffic west of town on Interstate 20 has been diverted from the main lanes to the frontage

road for the past few years. According to MaryBelle Turner, TxDOT public relations officer out of the Abilene office, the change is the next phase of con-

struction which is nearing completion. "East-bound traffic will be moved to the right lane of I-20 on Friday morning," the release stated. "Once the traffic barriers and detours are removed from all lanes, eastbound traffic will be allowed on both lanes. After the eastbound switch is completed, westbound traffic will be switched to the right lane of I-20 until detours are removed, at which time westbound traffic will be moved to the left lane to allow con-

The change was expected to take place beginning Friday morning. Construction of the 87 bypass is expected to wrap up either later this month or early August. A grand opening is expected to be held before the roadway is open to traffic. The relief route, which will be designated as U.S. Highway 87 once completed, is expected to help cut down truck congestion in anticipation of increased trade along the Ports-to-Plains



givers to always make sure children are accounted for and not left behind in a car," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "Members of the public can also do their part to keep kids safe by notifying emergency personnel if they

witness a child alone or in distress inside a vehicle — regardless of the weather."

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, temperatures inside a car can rise more than 20 degrees in only 10 minutes; and even with an outside temperature of 60 degrees, the temperature inside a car

can reach 110 degrees. Leaving windows partially rolled down does not help. In addition, young children are particularly at risk since their bodies heat up faster than an adult.

ing tips for preventing heatstroke vehicular deaths and injuries:

Always check the back seats of your vehicle before walking away.

Establish reminders that help ensure you remove children from the vehicle. For example: leave your bag, lunch or cell phone in the back seat with the child's car

Call 9-1-1 if you see a child alone in a car, and emergency personnel will instruct you what to do next.

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Free condoms — what could go wrong?

emember when the left passionately insisted that public schools distribute free condoms to students on the bizarre theory that they were going to have

sex anyway and we might as well make it safe? Well, the results are in, and the left isn't looking too great.

When this nation was first experiencing the AIDS scare, liberals were adamant that we had to saturate the culture with condoms for teens to prevent

the spread of the deadly disease. They ignored warnings that this massive giveaway program would publicly sanction and, thus, encourage teen promiscuity. They rejected reports that condoms are hardly fail-safe in preventing the spread of this They were not about to be

deterred by such arguments because their single-minded focus was to distribute these condoms. They were certainly not moved by the moral argument that making condoms more available and showing students how to use them would increase sex.

The free-sex left has never been too concerned about the proliferation of teenage sex, which is one reason it irrationally opposes abstinence programs, even as part of a broader sex education curriculum. Who are we to judge whether kids have sex? Sex, after all, feels good, and feeling good is the endgame in our pursuit of happiness. Besides, if pregnancy occurs it's no big deal. The kids can just have an abortion, which, to the left, is a morally neutral act.

But can you imagine how cynical and hardened of heart you would have to be to be indifferent to the distribution of thousands of condoms to students — from nurses, counselors and

vending machines — in school districts all over the country?

How about the argument that increasing (even "protected") sex would increase pregnancies and also the spread of HIV? Don't be silly. At the time, liberals cited isolated, localized studies concluding that increasing the availability of condoms

to students would not increase sex — and certainly not pregnancy. They pooh-poohed valid concerns that condoms are not wholly reliable in preventing the transmission of the virus. But those truly interested in the science wouldn't have relied on such a ridiculously small sampling of schools.

Though the left boasts about its overarching deference to science and empirical evidence, the reality is that for the left, politics trumps science. Like trial advocates, liberals present only evidence that supports their policy goal. When their minds are set

on a goal, dissenters must be passed over and even attacked. For example, with abortion on demand, evidence that abortion might cause physical and emotional damage to women must be ignored. In a classic case of projection, they charge anyone who cites such evidence with being motivated purely by politics. The same thing is true with

respect to their man-made global warming advocacy. They use fact-starved computer models to "prove" that dangerous warming is occurring. They distort surveys to legitimize their theories — such as their claim that vast majorities of scientists subscribe to their conclusions, willfully ignoring the thousands of scientists who disagree and all evidence that contradicts their theories.

Indeed, the left usually won't give an inch when confronted with evidence that scientists in their camp have manufactured and doctored evidence and that scientists are pressured by their peers and grant monies to reach the "correct" conclusion.

As they subscribe to an endsjustify-the-means philosophy, they'll unapologetically dismiss such evidence and say it doesn't matter anyway — because there is a scientific consensus on the question, so any distortion of the evidence is irrelevant. Never mind that there is no such consensus, and never mind that the very reason they manipulated their data is that the actual data didn't support their theories.

As is so often the case with liberals, their real motives go beyond their public pronouncements. They refuse to consider information that counters their narrative because they believe that any limitation on their various crusades would produce a slippery slope that would ultimately result in the defeat of their goal. That's why many liberals are so extreme on abortion that they even oppose the outlawing of partial-birth abortion. They substitute propaganda for rational argument and deceive the public about their true intentions, saying, for example, that they want to make abortion "safe, legal and rare" when they devote tireless hours ensuring that abortion is anything but

Every once in a while, however, the left just can't hide from the reality. A recently published study by the National Bureau of Economic Research reveals clea evidence that access to condoms in schools leads to a 10 percent increase in teen pregnancy and a rise in sexually transmitted diseases. Unlike the bogus studies the left relied on, this one involved thousands of schools. Liberals are already tying themselves in pretzels to discredit this report, but once again, conservatives are vin-

dicated. Liberals arrogantly

tion that the Trump endgame may involve establishing a famerate" — a kind of CNN or Fox News. Trump is already a media phenomenon with an enthusiastic audience. His campaign, meanwhile, has been featuring his wife, his children and a sonin-law as prominent co-stars.

The article said that Trump is sore about providing so much free content to the aforementioned media outlets without his getting a cut of the profits. (So much free airtime would be a source of joy for the conventional politician seeing election as the goal.)

Trump already controls a TV **Amen** production company. Making

hat's Donald Trump the leap to Trump News Network, or whatever it might be called, would not seem so outlandish. The bigger the audience Trump builds dominating the news cycles, the more advertisers will pay for his product. And maintaining that high level of attention requires continually saying inflammatory things that turn off the larger electorate.

> Suspicions began growing early on that Trump's candidacy is a brand-building scheme and little more. Recall how every ludicrous thing out of his mouth — mocking John McCain for becoming a prisoner of war, smearing Latinos and savaging fellow Republicans — was deemed a campaign killer. His candidacy had to collapse. But it didn't. Trump won more and more support from the so-called Republican base despite (or because of) his vulgarity and disregard for conservative principles that were never widely popular to begin with.

When Trump became the presumptive nominee, the political sophisticates assumed he'd clean up his act and behave in a dignified, presidential manner. He's done neither.

The Republican Party unwittingly created the conditions for a Trump candidacy. Its leaders have sat quietly for decades as a right-wing media — run by personalities flogging their own wares — normalized crazy political rhetoric. They probably figured that come Election Day, they could easily herd the fired-

up base to the proper stalls. And

they misread its strong support

for Social Security, Medicare

and other government programs. That Trump has almost no campaign funds fits the theory he's not in it to win it. His people insisted he's never needed that kind of money. His arresting personality would do the job. Then came the sinking poll

numbers.

Trump raised \$5.4 million last month and spent over a million of it at his Mar-a-Lago club in Palm Beach, Florida, on private iet service provided by his Tag Air and at other family-owned enterprises. He put in \$2.2 million of his own money, but that was just a loan.

Trump's dumping of campaign manager Corey Lewandowski can be interpreted as a logical response to evidence that he's wearing thin among likely voters. But there's no taking anything at face value in the Trumpian house of funny mirrors. It may reflect the family's concern that it's losing audience share.

The Republican Party has provided the vehicle for Trump's joy ride. If at the end he returns a smoking wreck to the counter, not his problem. He'll be fine, he keeps telling us.

For party leaders, another story. They will need much time for reflection, starting with how they got so royally set up.

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
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
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

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Freedom is coming First Nazarene plans new location

Have you seen the yard signs around town that proclaim "#Freedom is Coming"?

awareness campaign organized by Big Spring's First Church of the Nazarene to highlight a planned new location for Sunday morning worship.

First Church of the Nazarene. or "NazFamily" as the congregation's members refer to the church, is located at 1400 S.

Lancaster, and it also operates New Hope Christian School at 118 Cedar Road. The new worship service will be held inside the school cafeteria at the New Hope school, said NazFamily's pastor, the Rev. Calvary Callender.

"It started out as a vision to start a new church. That's what we're doing, but we're doing it a little differently," Callender said. "It's for people who feel like they don't belong in church or who have been hurt by the church. It's a neutral place." Callender said the services at the Cedar Road

location will feature live music, and will be synced with those at the church's main campus on Lancaster Street.

"We'll have a live video feed, coordinated from

the Lancaster campus," he said. "We're installing professional video and sound equipment."

Callender related the "#Freedom is Coming" campaign to the church's message.

"The idea is that people can be set free by a relationship with Jesus," he said.

The Rev. Josh Cisneros has been named campus pastor for the new location.

"The idea is not to start a new church and then bring people from Lancaster over there," Cisneros emphasized. "The idea is to meet new people. All people are welcome. We're just there to serve and love the community."

Services at the new location will start Sept. 18, but First Church of the Nazarene has some events planned before then to introduce the concept to the community. The first is a series of three "Launch Team" sessions staring July 31.

"They're basically preview services," said Callender, adding that the church plans to use the Launch Team services to practice logistics and gauge community appeal.

An open house event will be held Sept. 17, the day before the first "live" service.

"We're calling it a 'Block Party'," Cisneros said. "We're going to introduce people to what we're going to be doing. We'll have food, music...not really a service, but just share the idea." For more information about the new

God's sustaining grace


race is a very broad subject. Grace can be defined simply as favor. God shows favor to man

in many ways. Grace has been defined further as unmerited favor. We do not deserve God's grace, but He loves us to the extent that He gave Himself for us by sending His Son (God in the flesh) to die on the cross (John 3:16; Romans 5:8). Grace is also a gift. We cannot buy it or earn it on our own merit (Romans 3:24; Ephesians

3:7). Grace has been extended to

everyone (John 1:16; Romans 4:16;

Titus 2:11). Those who receive God's



grace and take hold of it, through faithful obedience, receive salvation (Ephesians 2:5,8; Titus 2:11; 1 Peter

For a moment, though, let us consider another aspect of God's grace: His grace sustains us. Paul encouraged the Ephesian elders to be built up in the word of God's grace (Acts 20:32). God's word must be the foundation upon which our lives are built. We must read and study the Bible to increase our knowledge of God and His will for us. What about when things are not going our way? Do we think about God's grace during these times? We may think of how much God loves us. We would do well to remember the salvation we have as a faithful Christian. But God's grace will also help us when we are hurting. We can go to God for help and find grace (Hebrews 4:16). Which brings up another aspect of

God's sustaining grace-grace does not mean that God will always remove the problems, discomfort, or suffering from our life. In 2 Corinthians 12, Paul writes of a physical ailment he had received. In verses 8 to 10 he records, "Three times I pleaded with the Lord about this, that it should leave me. But he said to me, 'My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness.' Therefore I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may rest upon me. For the sake of Christ, then, I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and calamities. For when I am weak, then I am strong." When difficulties come, we may pray to God asking

Him to remove the problem. Paul prayed three times for his "thorn in the flesh" to be removed. God did not grant his request, but that did not mean that God withheld His grace from Paul. No, rather, through this ordeal, God was showing Paul that it was not his own strength that would get him through but it was God's strength that would sustain him. That is the grace of God.

God does not cause bad things to happen to people, but He does allow them so that we can come to understand it is not by our strength alone that we will make it through this life and receive an eternal reward. God's grace will sustain you. It will build you up through His word.

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Reflections: Rescuing the refugee

Te have always thought of ourselves as a nation of courage and hope. Few statements reflect our identity better than the quote affixed to the Statue of Liberty, "Give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses." There is something sacred

about Ellis Island, the entry point for so many who came in response to the beacon of life and liberty. Most of us

are descendants of those who came.

Facing severe persecution in the civil wars that swept across Liberia, thousands fled to the United States in the last decade. A few weeks ago I attended the building dedication for Ebenezer Liberian Church in Brooklyn Park, Minn. More than a thousand people showed up. They filled the auditorium and spilled over into corridors and classrooms. I was

inspired by their hymns, songs, and testimonies. Four decades ago I visited Vietnamese refugee camps in central Texas. Most were "boat people" who fled persecution and poverty after the fall of South Vietnam. We picked them up with buses and brought them to our church, even though most spoke little English. A few members in our church resented their presence, but most reached out with the compassion of Christ. Today more than 1.5 million Vietnamese call America home. The largest Christian Vietnamese church has over 4,000 members and the number of Vietnamese Christians is growing.

In Minnesota I met Hmong Christian leaders. The Hmong were Animists from the hill country of Laos and close allies to the U.S. during the Vietnam War. They fled brutal persecution and sought refuge in America. More than a quartermillion now live in the U.S. Many have embraced Christ. There are now more than 140 Hmong Christian churches in the United States, most in Minnesota, Wisconsin and California. Their children are attending college and moving into professional ranks.

Today the oppression in Syria represents the world's greatest refugee crisis. Eleven million Syrians, more than half of them children, have fled the brutal attacks by ISIS. Most of them are

Muslim. But many Christian organizations are reaching out to these refugees providing shelter, blankets, water, food, and comfort. Virtually every denomination is represented, as well as para-church groups like Samaritan's Purse.

When Jesus introduced himself to the syna-

gogue in his hometown at Nazareth, he infuriated the crowd by stating that God loved the Syrians. He reminded them that Elisha healed a Syrian leper when there were many lepers in Israel. They were so enraged they tried to throw Jesus off a high cliff (Luke 4:16-30). We are always afraid and suspicious of people

We are always afraid and suspicious of people who are different than we are. But "perfect love casts out fear." Isaiah says, "Hide the fugitives, do not betray the refugees. Let the fugitives stay with you; be their shelter from the destroyer. The oppressor will come to an end, and destruction will cease; the aggressor will vanish from the land" (Isaiah 16:3-4)

Raiders knocked out, lose 7-5

Coastal Carolina capitalizes on Texas Tech errors in win

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Coastal Carolina's incredible postseason run will continue for at least another day.

The Chanticleers got a big boost offensively from an unlikely source, and they capitalized on Texas Tech's struggles in the field to beat the Red Raiders 7-5 on Thursday night in a College World Series elimination game.

The Raiders, at No. 5, were the third and final national seed knocked out of the NCAA Tournament, and the second by Coastal Carolina. The Chanticleers swept No. 8 LSU on the road in super regionals, and they beat No. 1 Florida in their CWS opener.

"If you had told me we would be where we're at right now four months ago, two months ago, maybe three weeks ago, I'm not sure I would have laid a whole lot of money on it by any means," coach Gary Gilmore said.

The Chanticleers (51-17) now move to the Bracket 2

final on Friday night against

Light-hitting David Parrett played a huge role in getting them there, driving in three runs in his first CWS start.

"The mindset for today was that it's a one-game season. That's what it came down to," Parrett said. "This group of guys, we don't want to say goodbye to each other yet. Tomorrow's another one-game season, so we're excited about that."

Coastal Carolina converted three Texas Tech errors into six unearned runs. The Red Raiders (47-20) committed seven errors in three CWS games, and seven of the 12 runs against them were unearned.

"Kind of shocked over some of that stuff," Tech coach Tim Tadlock said. "We hadn't done that in a long time. It was uncharacteristic of our team. Throughout the year, we played pretty good defense and pitched it pretty well, and we really probably just gave them too many of what you call unearned runs."

Mike Morrison (8-1) pitched a season-high 4 1/3 innings of relief for the win, and Bobby Holmes earned his fourth save. Erikson Lanning (3-4) took the loss.

Morrison, who relieved freshman Jason Bilous with one out in the third inning, is usually the Chanticleers closer. He didn't give up a run until Hunter Hargrove's sacrifice fly and Michael Davis' RBI single pulled the Raiders to 7-5 in the seventh.

Holmes struck out pinch hitter Ryan Long to end the seventh and got out of the eighth when, with two men on, he knocked down Tyler Neslony's hard comebacker and got the ball to first just in time. He pitched a perfect

Morrison said he and Holmes were willing to pitch as

76ers take Simmons with No. 1 pick

NEW YORK (AP) — Ben Simmons went from Down Under to the top of the NBA draft, and a record number of international players followed.

The Philadelphia 76ers took the Australian with the No. 1 pick on Thursday night, making him the first of a record 14 international plavers chosen in the first round.

Nearly half the selections in the 30-pick round were international players, topping the 12 international players chosen in the first round in 2013.

Simmons climbed on stage to the sound of cheers from a Philly-filled crowd hoping he could turn around the 76ers.

Not long after the same crowd was largely quiet as the draft filled with unfamiliar names.

The picks included the first Austrian (Utah center Jakob Poeltl, No. 9 to Toronto), the highest Greek player ever drafted (Georgios Papagiannis, No. 13, Phoenix, rights dealt to Sacramento), two Croatians (Dragan Bend-

er, No. 4 to Phoenix and Ante Zizic, No. 23, Boston), and two players from the Caribbean (Buddy Hield, Bahamas, No. 6 to New Orleans; and Skal Labissiere, Haiti, No. 28, picked by Phoenix but dealt to Sacramento).

The NBA said there were 26 international players selected, surpassing the record of 21 set in 2003.

Some of the international players won't come to the NBA next season, and perhaps never will.

Simmons might be ready to star

Philadelphia grabbed the versatile 6-foot-10 forward from LSU who averaged 19.2 points, 11.8 rebounds and 4.8 assists to become the only player in Southeastern Conference history to finish in the top five in all three categories.

He comes with some questions he made only one 3-pointer — but too much potential for the 76ers to pass up with their first No. 1 pick since taking Allen Iverson 20 years ago in

NHL coming to Las Vegas; new team to start *play in 2017* By GREG BEACHAM

LAS VEGAS — The NHL is making a big bet on Las Vegas. The league will expand to Las

Vegas for the 2017-18 season after awarding its 31st franchise to billionaire businessman Bill Foley on Wednesday. Commissioner Gary Bettman announced the decision after the league's board of governors met on a 109-degree day and unanimously voted to put an ice hockey team in the Mojave Desert's gambling mecca.

"We think this is a tremendously exciting opportunity, not just for Las Vegas, but for the league as well," Bettman said, calling Las Vegas "a vibrant, growing, global destination city."

Foley will pay \$500 million to the NHL's other owners as an expansion fee. The new team will play in T-Mobile Arena, the \$375 million building that opened just off the Las Vegas Strip in April.

Bettman also announced that an expansion bid from Quebec City was "deferred" indefinitely, allowing Las Vegas to enter the league alone in the Pacific Division. The league's alignment and playoff format won't

With nearly 2.2 million people in the last census, Las Vegas is the largest population center in the U.S. without a team in the major professional sports. Vegas was an economic boomtown in the previous decade, and Foley is betting that its slowed growth hasn't curbed the city's appetite for sports and spectacles.

"We want everyone to be a fan," said Foley, who fell in love with pond hockey while growing up in Canada. "We're dedicated to it. We'll leave no stone unturned in our dedication, in our pursuit of hockey for Las Vegas, not just for our team, but for the community."

The NHL is expanding for the first time since 2000, when Minnesota and Columbus each paid \$80 million to join the league.

Bettman said the league made the move largely due to the persistence and strength of the ownership group led by Foley, a financial services tycoon, who has been working on the idea for three years. Foley is joined by minority partners Joe and Gavin Maloof, the former owners of the NBA's Sacramento Kings.

Foley's also bid had the enormous advantage of an NHLready arena built with private funding and eager for a flagship tenant. Foley has already accepted more than 14,000 season ticket deposits and sold out all 44 suites in the 17,500-seat rink built by MGM Resorts International and Anschutz Entertainment Group, which owns the Los Angeles Kings.

"We won't sell out every game with season-ticket holders, but I believe it's going to be 85 percent, 90 percent (filled by season ticket holders)," Fo-Along with a top-six pick in

next year's draft, the Vegas franchise will be stocked by a June 2017 expansion draft that will be more favorable than previous drafts, theoretically allowing Foley's team to become competitive more quickly. Las Vegas will have four nearby rivals — at least by West Coast standards: the league's three California teams and the Arizona Coyotes. Although ice doesn't last

long in the desert, Las Vegas has had an appetite for hockey since the Kings and New York Rangers played a memorable outdoor exhibition game here

Dear Annie: My wife and I are in our 60s and recently celebrated our 15th anniversary. I know she loves me, but the physical side of our marriage has gone completely down the toilet.

It started about six years ago when my wife suffered a massive stroke, causing her to lose the ability to speak, as well as some coordination on one side. She also becomes easily confused. Less than a year later, we were in an auto accident where she suffered two compressed vertebrae in her neck, requiring surgery. She also developed severe osteoarthritis (it's mostly genetic, but the accident triggered the onset), which affects nearly every joint in her

Now the problem: My wife has lost all interest in any form of physical contact, including sex, saying the pain is excruciating when I touch her. I barely get a half-hearted hug with no contact other than her head on my chest. We still kiss and hold hands, but no

other body parts touch. We have been to multiple doctors and socalled specialists, and all they want to do is throw prescription pain meds at her, only one of which her body could tolerate. Physical therapy has not helped.

I love my wife, but sorely miss being able to touch, cuddle or make love to her. I find myself drinking a lot at night just to kill the urge. I'm going absolutely nuts over this. 1. Four spades. The value of a

hand goes up and down as the bidding progresses. Here, when you open the bidding, your hand is considerably better than a minimum opening bid. Although you have only 14 high-card points, the 4-6-2-1 distribution increases the value of the hand by two or three points, pending subsequent developments in the bid-

When partner responds two clubs, your hand certainly does not improve and actually shrinks somewhat in value. The club response doesn't help your hand one bit, and about all you can count on at this stage is your 14 high-card points.

But when partner next bids spades, the situation changes again. Your hand becomes worth an additional three or four points in distributional values, and you show this by jumping to four spades to inform partner about the improved nature of your hand 2. Three hearts. This time, you

have no choice but to stick to your story that you opened with minimum values, since neither of partner's responses has helped you at all. Partner might go on, depending upon his hand, but you've done your duty by hoisting a red flag. 3. Three notrump. Your two-heart

bid on the preceding round was a slight underbid, and you now make up for it by jumping to three notrump. A two-notrump bid at this point would make it appear that you started with a bedrock minimum, which is simply not the case. 4. Three clubs. All you can do

here is to indicate a preference for partner's first suit. You started with a relatively weak hand, and you have to bid weakly to try to slow partner down. If partner proceeds in the face of two signoffs, he does so at his own

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
