UK Treasury chief appeals for calm

LONDON (AP) — Britain's Treasury chief sought Monday to ease concerns about the vote to leave the European Union, saying the economy is as strong as it could be to face the uncertainty — even as a survey showed many companies are looking to move business out of the country.

In his first public appearance since Thursday's referendum, George Osborne stressed that Britain's economy is in a far better position than it was at the start of the

"It will not be plain sailing in the days ahead," he said. "But let me be clear. You should not underestimate our resolve. We were prepared for the unexpected."

The leaders of Germany, Italy and France will be huddling in Berlin to discuss the vote, trying to hone a common message that negotiations need to get underway quickly on the exit so as not to continue the uncertainty.

Questions remain about exactly how the exit would happen. German Chancellor Angela Merkel said she understands Britain may need "a certain amount of time to analyze things" before invoking Article 50 of the EU treaty, which will trigger the process for leaving. Prime Minister David Cameron has said he will resign and his successor, to be chosen by the fall, should be the one to navigate that

Merkel wouldn't comment on whether it's acceptable for London to wait until October, but said that a "long-term suspension" of the

Roof repair will be among the items on a routine agenda to be considered by the Big Spring City Council when it meets at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday in council chambers, located at 307 E. Fourth St.

Council will consider awarding bids for roof repair work on the municipal auditorium at the Polly Mays Municipal Building during the meeting.

Repair work at the municipal auditorium is one of several steps the city has taken in the past few years to renovate the structure, while repair work is needed at the Mays Building roof because of damage from a recent fire, officials said.

City staff contacted 10 ven-



dors to bid on the work, and three responded. Officials will recommend the bids be awarded to GKS Commercial, Inc. of Lubbock, which submitted a bid of \$52,000 to cover work on both buildings. The other two bids totaled \$82,930 and \$98,300, respectively. No local firms bid on the project.

Roof repair tops | Gas prices edge up in Texas

Average retail gasoline prices in Texas have risen 0.3 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$2.11/g yesterday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 gas outlets in Texas. This compares with the national average that has fallen 2.4 cents per gallon in the last week to \$2.31/g,

according to gasoline price website GasBuddy.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Texas during the past week, prices yesterday were 46.5 cents per gallon lower than the same day one year ago and are 3.4 cents per gallon higher than a month ago. The national average has decreased 1.3 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 47.2 cents per gallon lower than this day one year

ago. According to GasBuddy historical data, gasoline prices on June 27 in Texas have ranged widely over theww last five years: \$2.58/g in 2015, \$3.51/g in 2014, \$3.37/g in 2013, \$3.20/g in 2012 and



WASHINGTON (AP) - In December, 13 of the 14 Democratic women serving in the U.S. Senate hosted a fundraiser for their favorite primary candidate: Hillary Clinton. The one who didn't show? Massachusetts Sen. Elizabeth Warren.

Six months later, there's little distance between two of the most powerful women in the Democratic Party.

With the primary sea-

Sen. Bernie Sanders fading from the spotlight, Warren is stepping up to reclaim her role as leader of the party's progressives. She's mobilizing behind Clinton, lending her presidential bid a powerful boost of liberal credibility.

In recent weeks, the two women have formed a tight electoral alliance — one that could grow even closer should Clinton pick Warren as her

son over and Vermont running mate. On Monday, Warren will join Clinton for their first joint event at a rally in Cincinnati.

> For Clinton, the visit offers an important opportunity to win back some of the liberal and younger voters she lost to Sanders in the primary. Though Sanders said on Friday that he'd vote for Clinton, he's shied away from offering a full-throated endorsement or urging his supporters to back her.

LONDON (AP) — European stocks and the pound fell further on Monday as concern grew over the potential economic costs of Britain's vote to bring its country, the world's fifthlargest economy, out of the European

The British pound, which last week plunged to its lowest level since 1985, dropped another 2.4 percent to \$1.3352, despite the British Treasury's reassurances that the economy was strong enough to withstand the uncertainty. European stock markets added

to their painful losses from Friday, when concern over the vote outcome wiped out \$2.1 trillion of stock value from Hong Kong to London to New

Britain's FTSE 100 was down 1.3 percent at 6,056 while Germany's DAX shed 1.3 percent to 9,434 and France's CAC 40 dropped 1.3 percent as well to

Wall Street was set to drift lower on the open, too, with futures for the Dow Jones industrial average and the Standard and Poor's 500 index down 0.3 percent each. Earlier, some Asian markets had bounced back somewhat after news reports said Japanese Prime Minister Shintaro Abe instructed financial officials to take steps to stabilize financial and currency markets.

A look at Iraq's war against IS after Fallujah

BAGHDAD (AP) Iraqi forces say they have completely liberated the city of Fallujah from the Islamic State group after a monthlong operation, marking one of their biggest victories since the extremists swept across large parts of the country in 2014.

But the IS group still

controls parts of northern and western Iraq, including the country's second largest city, Mosul. And the militants have shown they can still launch large-scale suicide bombings and other attacks. Here's a look at what lies ahead for Iraq and the U.S.led military coalition battling the extremists.

HOLDING FALLUJAH

Fallujah was the first Iraqi city to fall to IS, in January 2014, and the group's last major stronghold in the sprawling Anbar province, a largely tribal Sunni region where distrust of the post-2003 Shiite-led government runs deep. A key task will be to prevent militants from returning to the city, as they did after two major U.S.led assaults on Fallujah in 2004, when American soldiers saw their deadliest urban combat since Vietnam.

Iraqi authorities will also need to ensure that residents can return to their homes and rebuild, and that powerful Sunni tribes in the area stay on the government's side. Those efforts could be complicated by the ballooning humanitarian crisis in Anbar and the presence of government-allied Shiite militias. The Iran-backed forces kept to the outskirts of Fallujah during the military operation, but could assert their power as the army moves on to other fronts.

Supreme Court set to close out current term with 3 big cases

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court is set to close out its current term with opinions Monday in three remaining cases after a flurry of decisions last week.

It's expected to be the justices' final meeting before they disperse on their summer breaks.

The last three cases concern regulation of Texas abortion clinics, the public corruption conviction of former Gov. Bob McDonnell of Virginia and a federal law that seeks to keep guns out of the hands of people convicted of domestic violence.

Just eight justices are taking part in the cases following the death of Justice Antonin Scalia in February. President Barack Obama has nominated federal appeals court Judge Merrick Garland to take Scalia's place, but Garland has not received a hearing or a vote in the Republican-controlled

Late June often is when a retirement is announced, but voluntary departures from the court almost never happen in election years.

This time, Hudson was a vocal powerhouse, delivering screeching vocals while Wonder played piano and Tori Kelly was on guitar while a photo montage of Prince appeared on the purple-lit stage.

Perez, Rangers take another series with 6-2 win over Red Sox

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Martin Perez won his sixth straight decision and helped the surging Texas Rangers to yet another series victory.

The left-hander kept rolling despite a bout with control issues that had his manager questioning his body language on the mound.

Perez pitched six solid innings while working behind a number of hitters, the first six Texas batters reached for an early lead and the Rangers beat the Boston Red Sox 6-2 on Sunday.

"The thing that I like is that he continues to search and find ways to get himself out of the inning," manager Jeff Banister said. "He seemed to throw just enough strikes to get them into swing mode. There's still a learning process, but it's getting better."

Prince Fielder hit a two-run homer for the Rangers, who are 11-0-1 in series since getting swept at Oakland in mid-May. Texas improved to 8-1 in deciding games this season.

Perez (7-4) was working on a shutout before Bryce Brentz hit a solo drive with two out in the sixth for his first major league homer. Perez matched the longest winning streak of his career, from 2013, despite throwing more balls than strikes into the fifth

"Sometimes with the first pitch, trying to throw a strike and sometimes to

push the ball there," said Perez, who improved to 6-1 in Arlington. "And I can't do that anymore. Sometimes you're trying to push the ball and you miss. You miss close, but you miss."

Shin-Soo Choo, Ian Desmond, Nomar Mazara and Adrian Beltre opened Texas' three-run first with four straight singles. The last two drove in a run apiece, to go along with Rougned Odor's blooper to left against Clay Buchholz (3-8).

Choo had three hits and scored twice, the second time on another RBI single from Beltre.

"In the first inning, it wasn't really a whole lot of balls that were hit hard, they were just hit where we weren't,"

Buchholz said. "That was basically the difference."

The Rangers, who have the best record in the American League at 49-27, won a three-game series for the seventh time after dropping the opener.

Perez gave up six hits, walked two and struck out two.

Buchholz issued two of his seasonhigh five walks in the first inning of his second start since coming back from a brief demotion to the bullpen. He gave up seven hits and five runs four earned — in $5 \frac{1}{3}$ innings, falling to 1-6 against Texas.

"There was a stretch where we've seen in a number of his starts where he was very good, but there's an inning inside of it that's the one you can point to," manager John Farrell said.

ONE MORE TIME

magnate and former president of the Far East Bridge Federation, got to six hearts doubled on the sequence shown. West's opening club bid was artificial, showing at least 17 highcard points, and North's fivenotrump bid asked South to bid either six hearts or six diamonds. West led the king of clubs against

six hearts and shifted to the ace of spades. Chow ruffed and quickly concluded that West, having bid for 11 tricks all by himself, very likely had at most two red-suit cards.

So, acting on the high probability that East had both missing red jacks, Chow ruffed a club in dummy at trick three, led a heart at trick four and finessed the ten!

When the ten held, Chow ruffed another club in dummy, returned a low diamond and again finessed the ten! When this likewise succeeded, Chow was home free. He cashed the A-K-Q of trumps, then the Q-K-A of diamonds, and scored his 12th trick with dummy's nine of diamonds.

West's magnificent hand thus wound up costing him the princely sum of 1,210 points. It also taught him that you don't take movie moguls or presidents of bridge federations too lightly.





This Date In History

Today is Monday, June 27, the 179th day of 2016. There are 187 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight History:

On June 27, 1966, the Gothic soap opera "Dark Shadows," having to do with mysterious and supernatural goings-on in Collinsport, Maine, premiered on ABC-TV.

On this date:

In 1787, English historian Edward Gibbon completed work on his six-volume work, "The History of the Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire." In 1844, Mormon leader

Joseph Smith and his brother, Hyrum, were killed by a mob in Carthage, Illinois. In 1864, Confederate forces repelled a frontal assault by

Union troops in the Civil War Battle of Kennesaw Mountain in Georgia. In 1905, the Industrial Workers of the World was

founded in Chicago. In 1999 the first Medal, recognizing excellence in children's literature, was awarded to "The Story of Mankind" by Hendrik Willem van Loon.

In 1944, during World War II, American forces liberated the French port of Cherbourg from the Germans. In 1957, more than 500 people

were killed when Hurricane Audrey slammed through coastal Louisiana and Texas. In 1963, President John F.

Kennedy spent the first full day of a visit to Ireland, the land of his ancestors, stopping by the County Wexford home of his great-grandfather, Patrick Kennedy, who'd emigrated to America in 1848.

In 1974, President Richard Nixon opened an official visit to the Soviet Union. In 1986, the International

Court of Justice at The Hague ruled the United States had broken international law and violated the sovereignty of Nicaragua by aiding the contras. (The U.S. had already said it would not consider itself bound by the World Court decision.)

In 1990, NASA announced that a flaw in the orbiting Hubble Space Telescope was preventing the instrument from achieving optimum focus. (The problem was traced to a mirror that had not been ground to exact specifications; corrective optics were later installed to fix the problem.)

In 1991, Supreme Court Justice Thurgood Marshall, the first black jurist to sit on the highest nation's announced his retirement. (His departure led to the contentious nomination of Clarence Thomas to succeed him.)

Ten years ago: A constitutional amendment to ban desecration of the American flag died in a Senate cliffhanger, falling one vote short of the 67 needed to send it to states for ratification. "Railroad Killer" Maturino Resendiz, linked to 15 murders, was executed in Texas for the slaying of physician Claudia Benton in 1998.

Five years ago: Former Illinois Gov. Rod Blagojevich (blah-GOY'-uh-vich) was convicted by a federal jury in Chicago of a wide range of corruption charges, including the allegation that he'd tried to sell or trade President Barack Obama's U.S. Senate seat. (Blagojevich was later sentenced to 14 years in prison.)
