Gunman ambushes 6 **Baton Rouge officers**

BATON ROUGE, La. — A former Marine dressed in black and carrying extra ammunition ambushed police in Baton Rouge, shooting and killing three law enforcement officers less than two weeks after a black man was fatally shot by police there in a confrontation that sparked nightly protests that reverberated nationwide.

Three other officers were wounded Sunday, one critically. Police said the gunman was killed at the scene.

"His movements, his direction, his attention was on police officers," state police Col. Mike Edmonson said Mon-

day morning. He would not elaborate but said the gunman "certainly was seeking out police officers," and he used the word "ambush" to describe the attack.

Edmonson also confirmed that investigators have interviewed people with whom the shooter had contact in-Baton Rouge. But Edmonson wouldn't say how many or give details. He stressed that the interviews don't mean that those people were involved in the shooting and urged any others who might have had contact with or information about shooter Gavin Long to come forward.

The shooting less than a mile from police headquarters added to the tensions across the country between the black community and police. Last week, a gunman targeted police during a march in Dallas, killing five officers. And just days before the Baton Rouge attack, one of the slain officers had posted an emotional Facebook message about the challenges of police work in the current environ-

ment. President Barack Obama urged Americans to tamp down inflammatory words and actions.

"We don't need careless accusations thrown around to score political points or to advance an agenda. We need to temper our words and open

City seeks funding for roads

The City of Big Spring is looking for all the monetary help it can get to build roads from the local airpark to the U.S. Highway 87 reliever route. City officials have long planned to connect

the airpark to the reliever route to give the facility a trifecta of transportation options air, rail, and road — to attract businesses. The city's airport has just about all the air capacity a business would

> want, while an ever-expanding railroad line has that option covered as well.

That leaves roads. Officials currently have plans

on the board for two roads one extending south and the other west — that would connect the airpark to the south-Womack ern leg of the reliever route, which is expected to open within the next

two weeks. Total length of those roads is just under six miles. As might be expected, building almost six miles of roads capable of handling all

sorts of private and commercial traffic will be pricey. Public Works Director Johnny Womack said preliminary estimates place the price tag at \$2.7 million, and Womack cautioned those estimates were just a starting point; the final cost is likely to be more. The good news for city taxpayers is they

won't be expected to shell out any additional money for the roads. Some, if not a majority, of the funds will come from already





Slain Baton Rouge officer wrote emotional Facebook post

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) — Just days before he was shot and killed, a Baton Rouge police officer posted an emotional Facebook message saying he was "physically and emotionally" tired and expressing how difficult it was to be both a police officer and a black man, a friend said Sunday.

"I swear to God I love this city but I wonder if this city loves me," Montrell Jackson wrote.

Friends and family of Jackson, 32, were mourning the 10-year veteran of the police force that relatives described as a "gentle giant" and a "protector" after he and another two law enforcement officers were shot and killed Sunday morning by a gunman. Sgt. Don Coppola Jr. of the Baton Rouge Police Depart-

ment identified the other slain Baton Rouge police officer as 41-year-old Matthew Gerald, who had been with the department less than a year. The third officer killed was 45-year-old sheriff's deputy

Brad Garafola, a 24-year veteran, spokeswoman Casey Rayborn Hicks for the East Baton Rouge Parish Sheriff's Office said.

In the Facebook posting Jackson said while in uniform he gets nasty looks and out of uniform some consider him a threat.

GOP convention kicks off as nation reels from more violence

CLEVELAND (AP) — The Republican National Convention is set to kick off as the nation reels from another deadly shooting and dissident delegates stage a longshot, lastgasp effort to deny Donald Trump the GOP nomination for Amid the tumult, it was undeniably Trump's moment —

a week at the pinnacle of American politics that few could have imagined when the New York billionaire entered the race a vear ago. "We want America to understand who Donald Trump the

man is, not just Donald Trump the candidate," said campaign chairman Paul Manafort. Yet the first act Monday was likely to underline how di-

visive Trump has been. Delegates were voting on the rules that will govern the convention week, and insurgent delegates said they would try to force a state-by-state vote — a move that could disrupt floor proceedings. Trump's opponents want to change a rule that requires

delegates to vote for the candidate to whom they were committed after state primaries and caucuses. Trump's nomination is essentially automatic under the current rules, because he has far more than the 1,237 delegates required to win.

existing money in the city's airpark fund. The bad news is that the city still has a lot of fundraising to do.

To that end, the city plans to apply for a

FASTLANE grant, money available through a U.S. Department of Transportation gram aimed at helping fund critical freight and highway projects across the country. These grants will not cover the entire cost of the program — the city will

still have to shell out anywhere from 20 percent to half of expenses - but Womack said the monetary help would be critical in securing the new roads.

"The minimum we'll apply for is the \$2.7 million figure in the preliminary estimates,"

he said. "We have until November to submit a letter of intent for the grants, and it will probably be next summer before we know if we'll receive the grant."

In the meantime, the city will spend about \$150,000 to fund surveying work necessary in cost of the new roads. That money also will come from the airpark fund, Womack said. Contact Staff Writer

our hearts ... all of us," Obama said. The gunman was iden-

tified as Gavin Long of Kansas City, who turned 29 Sunday.

Long, who was black, served in the Marines from 2005 to 2010, reaching the rank of sergeant. He deployed to Iraq from June 2008 to January 2009, according to military records.

Although he was believed to be the only person who fired at officers, authorities were investigating whether he had some kind of help.

"We are not ready to say he acted alone," state police spokesman Major Doug Cain said. Two "persons of interest" were detained for questioning in the nearby town of Addis. They were later released without any charges being filed.

While in the military, Long was awarded several medals, including one for good conduct, and received an honorable discharge. His occupational expertise was listed as "data network specialist."

The University of Alabama issued a statement saying Long attended classes for one semester in the spring of 2012. A school spokesman said university police had no interactions with him.

In Kansas City, police officers, some with guns drawn, converged on a house listed as Long's.

It was the fourth highprofile deadly encounter in the United States involving police over the past two weeks. In all, the violence has

cost the lives of eight officers, including those in Baton Rouge, and two civilians and sparked a national debate over race and policing. Authorities initially

believed that additional assailants might be at large, but hours later said there were no other active shooters. They did not discuss the gunman's motive or any relationship to the wider police conflicts.

The shooting began at a gas station on Airline Highway. According to radio traffic, Baton Rouge police answered a report of a man with an assault rifle and were met by gunfire. For several long minutes, they did not know where it was coming irom.

The radio exchanges were made public Sunday by the website Broadcastify.

Nearly 2½ minutes after the first report of an officer getting shot, an officer on the scene is heard saying police do not know the shooter's location.

Almost 6 minutes pass after the first shots are reported before police say they have determined the shooter's location. About 30 seconds later, someone says shots are still being fired.

The recording lasts about 17 minutes and includes urgent calls for an armored personnel carrier called a BearCat.

"There simply is no place for more violence," Louisiana Gov. John Bel Edwards said. "It doesn't further the conversation. It doesn't address any injustice perceived or real. It is just an injustice in and

of itself."

From his window, Joshua Godwin said he saw the suspect, who was dressed in black with a ski mask, combat boots and extra bullets. He appeared to be running "from an altercation.' Mike Spring awoke

at a nearby house to a sound that he thought was from firecrackers. The noise went on for 5 to 10 minutes, getting louder. Of the two officers who

survived the shooting. one was hospitalized in critical condition, and the other was in fair condition. Another officer was being treated for non-life-threatening injuries, hospital officials said.

Two of the slain officers were from the Baton Rouge Police De-32-vear-old partment: Montrell Jackson, who had been on the force for a decade, and 41-yearold Matthew Gerald, who had been there for less than a year.

The third fatality was Brad Garafola, 45 and a 24-year veteran of the East Baton Rouge Sheriff's Office.

Jackson, who was black, posted his message on Facebook on July 8, just three days after the death of 37-yearold Alton Sterling, a black man killed by white Baton Rouge officers after a scuffle at a convenience store.

In the message, Jackson said he was physically and emotionally tired and complained that while in uniform, he gets nasty looks. When he's out of uniform, he said, some people consider him a threat.

A friend of Jackson's family, Erika Green,

confirmed the posting, which is no longer on Facebook. A screenshot of the image was circulating widely on the internet. Police-communi-

ty relations in Baton Rouge have been especially tense since Sterling's death. The killing was captured on cellphone video. It was followed a day later by the shooting

death of another black man in Minnesota, whose girlfriend livestreamed the aftermath of his death on Facebook. The next day, a black gunman in Dallas opened fire on police at a protest about the police shootings, killing five officers and heightening tensions even further.

Thousands OI people protested Sterling's death, and Ba-Rouge police arrested more than 200 demonstrators.

Sterling's nephew condemned the killing of the three Baton Rouge officers. Terrance Carter spoke Sunday to The Associated Press by telephone, saying the family just wants peace.

"My uncle wouldn't want this," Carter said. "He wasn't this type of man."

A few yards from a police roadblock on Airline Highway, Keimani Gardner was in the parking lot of a warehouse store that would ordinarily be bustling on a Sunday afternoon. He and his girlfriend both work there. But the store was closed because of the shooting. "It's crazy. ... I under-

stand some people feel like enough is enough with, you know, the black community being shot," said Gardner, an African-American. "But honestly, you can't solve violence with violence."

Michelle Rogers and her husband drove near the shooting scene, but were blocked at an intersection closed by po-

"I can't explain what brought us here," she said. "We just said a prayer in the car for the iamilies.

Also Sunday, a domestic violence suspect opened fire on a Milwaukee police officer who was sitting in his squad car. The officer was seriously wounded, and the suspect fled and apparently killed himself, authorities said.

might never have an opportunity to make in a lifetime of bridge. Most such plays would not be difficult to execute if someone rang a bell at the critical moment to warn a player that his chance to rise and shine had Unfortunately, these moments occur so rarely and unexpectedly that for ordinary mortals the opportunity for brilliance goes unnoticed and quietly passes by But here is a case where the player in the saddle rose to the occa-

sion. The deal occurred in a team-offour championship, and the hero was Billy Eisenberg, well-known Los Angeles star. He got to three notrump, and West led the seven of spades Eisenberg won with dummy's ace

and made the obvious lead of a low club from dummy. When East produced the king, Eisenberg followed with the five! Declarer was wellrewarded for his unusual play, since East could now do no better than cash his K-Q of spades and ace of diamonds to hold Eisenberg to three

Now let's suppose declarer had won East's king of clubs with the ace, which almost anyone else in his shoes would have done. In that case, the contract would have failed. When South continued with another club to the queen, East would signal with the nine of diamonds, asking partner to return a diamond if he got the lead.

Declarer could not now prevail, whatever he did next. If he continued with a club, West would win and shift to a diamond, and East would cash two diamonds and two spades to put the contract down one. And if declarer abandoned clubs, he would not be able to come to nine tricks.



Be a Friend Dear Annie: My husband was recently transferred at work to New York City from Chicago. That meant having to start all over again. Three years ago, we had a beautiful baby girl, Sophia. As a stayat-home mom, I had worked hard at building a strong support network in Chicago with friends and family. When we first arrived at Sophia's new school, we found people to be a little standoffish. It was not the Midwestern friendliness we were

used to. A month passed by and still no friends or community. My husband and I just thought this would be the new nor-

mal. Then I met Chloe at Central Park. She has a little girl, named Madeline, who is just Sophia's age. She's originally from Cleveland. Her husband had been transferred to New York the previous year. She had the same Midwestern friendliness and warmth that were so familiar. Needless to say, we instantly became great friends. She introduced me to some of the other neighborhood moms. Within weeks, I felt a sense of community and was beginning to love my new city.

One sunny spring day while Chloe and I were pushing our daughters on the swings at Central Park, she said, "I'm pregnant. We're expecting in September." I was so







This Date In History

Today is Monday, July 18, the 200th day of 2016. There are 166 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight History:

On July 18, 1976, 14-year-old Romanian gymnast Nadia Comaneci (koh-muh-NEECH'), competing at the Montreal Olympics, received the firstever perfect score of 10 with her routine on uneven parallel bars. (Comaneci would go on to receive six more 10s in Montreal.)

On this date:

In A.D. 64, the Great Fire of Rome began, consuming most of the city for about a week. (Some blamed the fire on Emperor Nero, who in turn blamed Christians.)

In 1792, American naval hero John Paul Jones died in Paris at age 45.

In 1872, Britain enacted voting by secret ballot.

In 1994, a bomb hidden in a van destroyed a Jewish cultural center in Buenos Aires, Argentina, killing 85. Tutsi rebels declared an end to Rwanda's 14-week-old civil war.

Ten years ago: The Senate voted after two days of emotional debate to expand federal funding of embryonic stem cell research, sending the measure to President George W. Bush for a promised veto. A doctor and two nurses who'd labored at a flooded-out New Orleans hospital in Hurricane Katrina's chaotic aftermath were arrested and accused of killing four trapped and desperately ill patients with injections of morphine and sedatives. Ian Desmond homered and Robinson Chirinos drove in two runs as Texas avoided a three-game sweep. The Cubs had won three in a row.

John Lackey (7-6) allowed four runs and six hits in eight innings as his winless streak reached seven starts on a warm afternoon with the wind blowing out. He is 14-16 in 41 starts against Texas, the team he's faced most often in his career.

"The story really today was Cole. He pitched really well,"

Lackey said. "We weren't able to do anything against him. I was honestly pretty happy about the way I threw the ball. Threw eight innings and definitely not a good day to pitch."

Hamels fanned the side in the first two innings.

The streak ended when Matt Szczur popped out and Albert Almora Jr. reached on third baseman Adrian Beltre's error in the third. Javier Baez doubled home a run.

Elvis Andrus' RBI single and Chirinos' sacrifice fly put the Rangers ahead in the second. Almora made a leaping catch in center field to rob Chirinos of extra bases.

Chirinos hit an RBI double after Lackey walked the first two batters in the fourth.

Desmond led off the eighth with his 16th home run.

The Cubs got back-to-back singles to start the bottom of the seventh before a double play and groundout ended the rally.

2 games in 1: Pirates win marathon 18-inning affair

WASHINGTON (AP) — After more than five hours of baseball between his Pittsburgh Pirates and the Washington Nationals, Starling Marte had all he could take.

"Too many innings," Marte said. "We were tired. It was time for a home run."

Marte's solo home run off Oliver Perez in the 18th inning on Sunday gave the Pirates a 2-1 victory in a marathon

game that was the longest for both teams this season. The only longer game in the majors this season came July 1 when Cleveland beat Toronto in 19 innings.

It took 17 pitchers combining for 540 pitches in a bullpen- and stadium-emptying affair that lasted 5 hours, 48 minutes. It was close to ending a lot earlier — the Nationals were down to their last strike in the ninth inning when pinch hitter Daniel Murphy hit a tying home

By the time the 1:35 p.m. start ended at 7:23 p.m., stellar outings by Pittsburgh's Chad Kuhl and Washington's Max Scherzer felt like a distant memory.

Kuhl allowed one hit and two runners and struck out five in six shutout innings.

Hurdle said it was the outing Kuhl expected out of himself after some struggles, and the right-hander rewarded the organization for giving him the nod when Jonathon Niese was demoted to the bullpen. Scherzer wasn't too bad

himself, giving up one run and six hits and struck out seven. The homer by an injured Murphy took Scherzer off the hook for what would've been his second loss in a 1-0 game in three starts.

"We were in the middle of a pitchers' duel and when it is like that, every little thing is amplified," Scherzer said.

Murphy, who was out of the lineup for the third consecutive day with a sore left hamstring, took All-Star closer Mark Melancon deep on a 2-2 cutter with two outs in the

epic battle between two 40-somethings at Royal Troon.

Mickelson was a runner-up for the 11th time in a major, but never like this. He can't look back at a mistake because he really didn't make any. He opened with a 63, closed with a careerbest 65, shot the secondbest score in Open history and was 11 shots better than everyone in the field.

Except one.

"It's probably the best I've played and not won," Mickelson said. "I think that's probably why it's disappointing in that I don't have a point where I can look back and say, 'I should have done that or had I only done this.' I played a bogey-free round of 65 on the final round of a major. Usually, that's good enough to do it, and I got beat. I got beat by 10 birdies."

He got beat by arguably the best final round in 156 years of major championships.

Miller also made 10 birdies in his final round

of the 1973 U.S. Open, and then waited to see if anyone could catch him. Stenson started the final round with a oneshot lead over Mickelson, and knew it would be a two-man race from the opening hole when Mickelson nearly holed out from the fairway.

He answered great shot with one of his own, finally pulling away with birdies on the 14th and 15th holes, and then a third in a row after Mickelson drilled a 3-wood onto the green at the par-5 16th and came within a fraction of an inch of making an

The last birdie was for the record book.

Stenson finished at 264, breaking by one shot the 72-hole scoring record in the majors that David Toms set in

the 2001 PGA Championship at Atlanta Athletic Club. His 20-under par matched Jason Day's record for lowest under par at last year's PGA Championship.

His biggest challenge was 46-year-old Mickelson, who has won five

"I knew he wasn't going to back down at any point, and in a way that makes it easier for myself," Stenson said. "I knew I had to keep on pushing, keep on giving myself birdie chances. He wasn't going to give it to me, so I had to pull away. I'm just delighted I managed to do that with a couple of birdies at the right time."

This was heavyweight material, reminiscent of the "Duel in the Sun" just down the Ayrshire coastline at Turnberry in 1977, when Tom Watson and Jack Nicklaus battled to the final hole, and no one else was closer than 10 shots.

Stenson and Mickelson were never separated by more than two shots over 40 straight holes until the Swede's final birdie. In the final round, they combined to make 14 birdies and an eagle. If this was a better-ball match, they would have shot 59.

"I've always thought that he is one of the best ball-strikers in the game and that major championships are perfectly suited for him," Mickelson said. "I knew that he would ultimately come through and win.

I'm happy that he did. I'm disappointed that it was at my expense." J.B. Holmes won the

B-Flight. He finished third, 14 shots behind.

The Swede won his first major in his 42nd attempt, becoming only the ninth player to capture his first major after turning 40. Beyond the score, the measure of his performance was that he putted for a birdie on every hole Sunday in a mild wind off the Irish Sea. Stenson threeputted for bogey from just off the first green, and he three-putted on No. 11 to fall back into a tie for the lead.

They matched pars on only six of the 18 holes.

Stenson became only the fourth player to win the British Open with all four rounds in the 60s, joining Tiger Woods, Nick Price and Greg Norman. He also ended a streak of six American winners at Royal Troon that dated to 1950.

He gave Sweden a longawaited major in men's golf, 19 years after Jesper Parnevik lost a 54hole lead at Royal Troon. Stenson said Parnevik send him a message that said, "Go out and finish what I didn't manage to finish."

"I'm really proud to have done that, and it's going to be massive for golf in Sweden with this win," Stenson said.
