

Howard County: Officials refining budget

Faced with shrinking taxable values, budget cuts are an unavoidable fact of life for Howard County officials. The challenge, they say, is finding the right balance between trimming fat



and cutting bone. Since April, county leaders have been faced with the certainty that there will be an extreme drop in mineral valuations in this area. Preliminary appraisals released earlier this year estimate a \$700 million drop in county valuations from the previous

fiscal year.

Lower mineral values mean a lower tax base, which in turn has left countv officials faced with two unattractive options — raise taxes, or cut the budget.

The county has gone with option B. "We have to cut the budget," County Judge Kathryn Wiseman said. "We don't have a choice."

To that end, Wiseman and commissioners have directed department heads within the county to cut their operating expenses by at least 10 percent. That effort, Wiseman said, has borne fruit.

## **Clinton looks to** steal Trump thunder with VP selection

CLEVELAND — Hillary Clinton moved closer to introducing her running mate, snatching attention from newly crowned Republican nominee Donald Trump just hours after he closed out his convention with a fiery and foreboding turn at the podium.

Crews were still sweeping confetti from the GOP convention hall floor, as the Clinton campaign signaled an announcement was coming soon. In a tweet Friday morning, her campaign urged supporters to text the campaign to get first word. Virginia Sen. Tim Kaine had emerged as the leading contender, according to Democrats familiar with Clinton's search.

The news could quickly steal Trump's thunder. In a 75-minute speech Thursday night, Trump made forceful promises to be the champion of disaffected Americans, capping his convention on a high note for the party, not a moment too soon after shows of disharmony and assorted flubs before the four-day clos-

Speaking to "the forgotten men and women of our country," the people who "work hard but no longer have a voice," he declared: "Iam your voice." With that, he summed up both the paradox and the power of his campaign — a billionaire who made com-

Those cuts have come in the area of operating expenses. Wiseman was quick to stress that staffing will not face the budget axe.

"We will not cut personnel and we will not cut payroll," the judge said. "In fact, a great regret of mine is that we're not able to give our employees raises this year ... What we have done is take a close look at each department's operating budget. If there were some line items in there that haven't been used for a few years, we've cut them out."

The work is far from finished, however. As they have for the past few months, commissioners will hold a budget workshop prior to their regular Monday meeting. Wiseman predicted it will be an "interesting" meeting, because officials will take a close look at streamlining policies in the employee manual, particularly in the area of sick leave.

The county's budget and tax rate is expected to be finalized later this summer.

of connectivity issues but we don't have a lot of congestion and most of TxDOT's dollars are allocated on the basis of congestion relief and population," said State Rep. Drew Darby, (R-District 72) to the crowd gathered at a grand opening ceremony held on the southern portion of the route. "So how did we do it? Well we worked together. It's what West Texas does and for the first time ever we got districts throughout this corridor to contribute money for this project. We budget for the Abilene district to be focused on this roadway. It's never happened folks."

The Relief Route removes a large hurdle and is expected to increase connectivity along the Ports-to-Plains corridor according to promoters of Ports-to-Plains. Big Spring is located along the Portsto-Plains route, a designated trade corridor for the transportation of goods between Mexico and Canada.

According to Stan Swiatek, TxDOT Abilene Engineer, the bidding processes for the northern project is expected to begin in September with construction be-

got the entire district's ginning as early as Janbudget for the Abilene uary 2017.

Construction of the northern Truck Relief Route will most likely begin by Interstate 20 and head north to reconnect to Highway 87, according to Glenn Allbritton, TxDOT Director of Construction for the Abilene District. However, those plans may change depending on what imput of the winning contractor has, Allbritton said.

Daily commuters to the Midland-Odessa area will still contend with construction zones for the next few years as plans call for a new bridge across Interstate 20, but Allbrittion said the work on I-20 "will not have the near impact for this particular job."

"There will be one phase of construction where we will have to get in the medium of I-20," he said. "There will be a bridge going over I-20, so we will have to get in the medium to build some of the drill shafts and columns. We will have lane closures on I-20 on the inside lanes for both directions while they are putting that in."

That part of the construction should last about a month, Allbrittion said.

"Anytime you have road construction, especially something this big, you run the risk of for everyone," said Mary Belle Turner, TxDOT Abilene District public information officer. "We try to avoid that as much as possible and make it where it doesn't inconveniently impact people. Anytime it does inconvenience people we are going to make it as quick and easy as possible. The end result is a new nice road that will have a wonderful impact for the community and the county and the area."

Once complete, Tx-DOT expects the route will relieve truck congestion along Gregg St. An estimated 30 percent of the traffic along Gregg is from trucks,

The northern portion is a 7.5 mile, 4-lane project of mostly newly constructed roadway with some existing road connecting Interstate 20 to north FM 700, according to TxDOT information. It will include four interchanges at the following roadways: I-20, State Highway 176, Country Road 21 and FM 700.

Completion of the northern by-pass route is expected sometime in 2020.

The speech was strikingly dark for a celebratory event and almost entirely lacking in policy details. Trump pledged as president to restore a sense of public safety, strictly curb immigration and save the nation from Clinton's record of "death, destruction, terrorism and weakness."

"I have joined the political arena so that the powerful can no longer beat up on people that cannot defend themselves," Trump said. He shouted throughout as he read off a teleprompter, showing few flashes of humor or even smiles.

Democrats offered a different assessment, with Clinton campaign chairman John Podesta arguing that Trump "offered no real solutions to help working families get ahead or to keep our country safe, just more is expected to introduce her running mate either at a Friday afternoon rally at the state fairgrounds in Tampa or on Saturday at Florida International University in Miami.

Kaine, 58, appeared to be the favorite for her choice, according to two Democrats, who both cautioned that Clinton has not made a decision and could change direction.

In Cleveland, Trump's acceptance of the Republican nomination capped his improbable takeover of the GOP, a party that plunges into the general election united in opposition to Clinton but still torn over Trump. Underscoring his unorthodox candidacy, Trump reasserted the hard-line immigration policies that fired up conservatives in the primary but broke with many in his party by expressing support for gays and lesbians.

smoother — and more scripted — chapter in a footloose convention shocked a night earlier by Ted Cruz's primetime speech, a pointed non-endorsement of the nominee by the Texas senator who finished second in the race and came to Cleveland harboring grievances and future presidential ambitions.

During their convention, Republicans were relentless and often raw in demonizing Clinton. As fired-up supporters at Trump's acceptance speech broke out in their oft-used refrain of "Lock her up," the nominee waved them off, and instead declared, "Let's defeat her in November." Yet he also accused her of "terrible, terrible crimes."

"This is the legacy of Hillary Clinton: death, destruction, terrorism and weakness," he said. "But Hillary Clinton's legacy does not have to January, "safety will be restored."

He also said young people in predominantly black cities "have as much of a right to live out their dreams as any other child in America." And he vowed to protect gays and lesbians from violence and oppression, a pledge that was greeted with applause from the crowd.

"As a Republican, it is so nice to hear you cheering for what I just said," he responded.

The Democratic convention in Philadelphia, which starts Monday, is expected to be a more orderly affair. Clinton is, if anything, disciplined.



## Did You Ever Wonder? Marching Order of God's people

he Book of Numbers deals with the census. It gives the number of men between the ages of 20 and 60 ... the men of fighting age. The total number is 603,550. This

is the same total given when the census was first mentioned. In this account, the

Bible takes time to give totals for each tribe.

This may need explanation. Many times, the Bible mentions things in the chronological order to put things in the proper sequence. Then later, at a more convenient time, it gives the event in more detail.

This time, the purpose of the census seems to be the layout of the Israelite camp. Each time the Pillar of Cloud which led them settled in one spot, Moses had the Levites set

up the Tabernacle in that exact place. It always faced east. The Levites were to camp around it, making a buffer zone to protect the rest of the people.

God designated the marching formation and camping location.

The tribe of Judah was designated the leader of tribes; in case of war, this tribe was the vanguard. Each tribe carried a banner; Judah's insignia was a lion. The tribes of Issachar and Zebulun marched next. And when they encamped, these three tribes camped in front of the Tabernacle... on the east side.

Reuben led the next section of the tribes. Following Reuben were the tribes of Gad and Simeon. These three tribes camped on the south side of the Tabernacle.

As they traveled, the Levites and the Tabernacle occupied the central position for protection. Did you notice that the Levites were not numbered in this census? They served the Lord and would not be required to fight in case of war.

Ephraim led the third section of the Israelites. The tribes of Manasseh and Benjamin were

assigned to Ephraim's camp. These three tribes followed the Tabernacle in marching order, and they camped on the west side of the Tabernacle.

The tribe of Dan led the rear guard. Asher and Naphtali completed this section, and these three tribes camped on the north side of the Tabernacle.

This was not a 'camp wherever you like' situation. Picture this as a military encampment. Positions were assigned according to rank within the tribe.

Take a minute to envision the size of this marching column. Over 600,000 men of family age with their wives, children and livestock. There is no way to estimate the number of men over 60 years and their families; at this time men lived to around 120 years of age.

The news of the Hebrews leaving Egypt quickly spread to all the other nations in the Mid-East. Archeologists have uncovered scrolls from several ancient kings that mention this mighty nation that had left Egypt. These nations were afraid that the Hebrews would attack them and take their land. Spies sat on top of mountains watching the Hebrews traveling in the valleys.

News of the Tabernacle and the grand, gold furniture inside it also spread like wildfire. These same kings who feared the Hebrews would like to have the gold furniture and vessels for their own treasury. In their secret chambers they considered attacking the Hebrews.

But they had no reason to fear that the Hebrews might attack. God had promised them the land of the Canaanites. This was the land where God had led Abraham long ago. Abraham, Isaac and Jacob had each bought sections of land in this small country.

God was now taking them back to "The Promised Land."



## What's the plan to balance the physical and spiritual?

re you a planner? You probably are when it comes to certain things. I remember, when I was younger, hearing the catch-phrase, "If you fail to plan,

then you plan to fail." Planning is important — it helps you focus on a particular goal. So, what are your goals? Is your focus mainly on physical things or on spiritual things, and are these polar opposites of one another or can they work together in a person's life?

Scripture tells us as Christians that we are citizens of heaven (Philippians 3:20), and our focus must be on spiritual things and not physical things (Colossians 3:1-3). As Chris-

tians, do we forsake all that is physical and go out into the forest – or wilderness here in West Texas – and meditate, with no concern for food or water (Yes, I had to read "Siddhartha" by Hermann Hesse in high school)? Do we turn to a life of monasticism (that means living like a monk)?

Scripture also teaches us to use the physical things we have in this life. Read Proverbs 6:6-11. If we fail to prepare for our physical needs, then we will find ourselves lacking even the basic necessities of life. Paul mentions many times the importance of providing for yourself and your family, and using the extra to help others when they are in need (see Ephesians 4:28; 1Thessalonians 4:11-12; 2Thessalonians 3:7-8,11-12; Romans 12:13; 1Timothy 6:18).

But remember what a plan does: it helps you focus on a particular goal. What is your primary focus? What should be our ultimate goal? It should be everyone's desire to be in heaven with our Lord when this life is over. God has given us the principles by which we can plan for our physical lives, as long as we remember that He is ultimately in contro,l and we should strive to do everything according to His will (James 4:13ff).

It is the spiritual goal, however, that ought to be the number one focus in our lives. And when it comes to our salvation, God has provided the plan. Only by following His plan can we hope to attain eternal life. 1 Timothy 2:5 - "[God] who desires all people to be saved and come to a knowledge of the truth" (ESV). 

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

## Potential expansion candidates for the Big 12

Commissioner Bob Bowlsby has referred to what the Big 12 is about to step into as it moves toward expansion as a seller's market.

The conference is selling salvation for two to four schools that are clamoring for a spot in the Power Five and all the amenities (mostly lots of money) that goes with moving up in the world.

Through open records requests to Big 12 schools, the reporting of other news organizations and statements released Wednesday by several obvious suits, here are the candidates (alphabetical order):

BYU - The Cougars have a huge national following, a history of competing at a high level and an affiliation with the Church of Latter Day Saints that prohibits the Provo, Utah-school's teams from competing on Sundays. This is not a small inconvenience. Nor will it keep BYU from possibly getting strong consideration. And as a football independent with its other sports in the West Coast Conference, BYU doesn't need to be coy and maybe could

"BYU is known for its aca-

we have an exceptional athletic program," athletic director Tom Holmoe said in a statement. "As I have stated before, I would like to see our student-athletes compete at the highest level."

Boise State - The Broncos bring a top-notch football program, and an improving athletic program in general.

Central Florida — It has enormous enrollment (60,767) and is located in a recruiting hot bed, with a growing population in Orlando. The football was awesome a few years ago (BCS win against Baylor) and terrible last year (0-12).

Cincinnati — The school has just expanded and upgraded old Nippert Stadium, which now seats about 40,000. The football team has become a steady winner and moving into Ohio would not only give the Big 12 an eastern bridge to West Virginia but maybe open up some solid recruiting territory. The Big 12 is very Texas dependent when it comes to recruiting.

South Florida — Kind of like American Athletic Conference rival UCF, but not as big (48,973 enrollment) and not as much recent football success. However,

demic excellence and I believe right now, USF football is trending up. Wednesday was probably not the best day to announce the NCAA was investigating the athletic program.

Connecticut – Perhaps no school suffered more from conference realignment than UConn, a longtime Big East member that was shoved from college sports' main stage. Sure the football was always so-so, but UConn basketball was a power and a powerful brand. With the Big 12 no longer talking about a conference network, that foot in the New York and Boston television markets might not be as appealing.

Colorado State — The school has been doing what you do when you want to get noticed. Expanding stadiums, investing in facilities and coaches. Big 12 schools have lots of alumni in Colorado, especially the Denver area. Fort Collins is about 65 miles straight north, pretty and growing. Maybe the Rams can replace what the Big 12 lost in Colorado?

Memphis — The Tigers have a notable sponsor in FedEx CEO Fred Smith, an alum who has promised his company's sponsorship to the Big 12. The football

## Brazil nabs 10 IS backers in Olympics anti-terror swoop

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) -Ten Brazilians who pledged allegiance to the Islamic State militant group were arrested Thursday, authorities announced, describing them as "amateurs" who discussed on social media the possibility of staging attacks during next month's Olympics.

Justice Minister Alexandre de Moraes said in the capital, Brasilia, that the 10 were being held on two terrorism-related charges and that two more people were being sought.

Authorities said any attack plan would have had little chance of coming to fruition, citing the group's lack of resources and skills.

But officials and security experts argued that police were justified in being aggressive in light of "lone wolf" attacks staged in the U.S. and Europe by men with little or no training.

Moraes said police acted because the group discussed using weapons and guerrilla tactics to potentially launch an attack during the Olympics, which begin in Rio de Janeiro on Aug. 5. They will remain in police custody for

#### at least 30 days.

"They were complete amateurs and ill-prepared" to actually launch an attack, Moraes said. "A few days ago they said they should start practicing martial arts, for example.'

He said that there were no specific targets for an attack,

but that even disorganized groups have to be taken seriously.

The possibility of an attack is not so "far-fetched" even though Brazil has never been a target for terrorism, said Alex Kassirer, a counterterrorism analyst at Flashpoint, a New Yorkbased intelligence group.

"The Olympics is a really unique opportunity to be able to target a concentration of all of the enemies in one area," she said.

Kassirer pointed out the Islamic State group launched a channel in May on the messaging app Telegram to disseminate jihadi propaganda specifically in Portuguese. On Sunday, another channel vowed allegiance to IS, although its authenticity has not been determined, she said.


The arrests were made in 10 different states, including Sao Paulo and Parana in the southern part of the country, and it was not clear whether the suspects knew each other beyond their online contacts.

Moraes said authorities seized computers, cellphones and other equipment, but no weapons.

Authorities said the investigation that began in April showed the suspects had all been "baptized" as Islamic State sympathizers online but none had actually traveled to Syria or Iraq, the



#### An Out-of-Control Diet

Dear Annie: One day a few months ago, my 15-year-old daughter got into the car after school with bloodshot eyes and red cheeks. I could tell she had been crying. I asked her what was wrong. At first, she said nothing. Then, with some gentle prying, she burst into tears and said, "Jason came up to me at lunch and said, 'Nancy, you would be really pretty if you lost some weight." As she relived the story, tears welled up in her eyes again. "Mom, I really want to lose weight. I am so tired of being picked last at gym because I can't run as fast as the other kids. Please help me."

My sister had just lost 30 pounds at a local diet center. I quickly went online and signed Nancy and myself up. Although I only had a few pounds to lose, I wanted to do the program with her so that we could make the necessary eating habit changes together. Our first meeting was at the same type of center. Nancy weighed in 25 pounds overweight. We learned tips for healthy eating and the importance of daily exercise. We heard women's success stories of losing over 100 pounds. When we got in the car, we were both excited to start losing weight.

We began writing down ovorything wo ato in a food diary and would make all sorts of delicious veggie dishes we could snack on all day. Every evening, we would take our dog out for long walks for exercise. It was a great bonding experience.

You are South and have the folowing hand: **♦** ĂQ953 ♥ 10 **♦** K6 **♣** AQJ72 1. The bidding has gone: West North East South ٠ Pass Pass NT Pass 3 🕈 Pass 3 NT Pass What would you bid now? 2. The bidding has gone: West North East South 1 NT Pass Pass 3 NT 4 🕈 Pass Pass 4 🕈 Pass What would you bid now? 3. The bidding has gone: North South West East 1 ♠ 3 ♣ ٠ Pass Pass Pass . Pass . Pass

What would you bid now?

1. Pass. Partner has a minimum opening bid (his one-notrump rebid indicated 12-14 points), and he does not appear to be enamored with either of your suits. Since a slam is unlikely under these circumstances, and because there is no good reason to insist on playing the hand in one of your suits, the best bet is to pass. Partner's hand may look something like: ♠ K6 ♥ AK7 ♦ Q9752 ♣ 964, in which case three notrump would be relatively safe, while a slam would be well against the odds.

2. Six clubs. You can't very well settle for less than either six clubs or six spades opposite an opening 15- to 17-point notrump bid even though partner does not seem enthusiastic about a slam. However, since he may easily have better clubs than spades in this sequence, you should offer him a choice of suits by jumping to six clubs. Partner may have as little as ♠ K8 ♥ K972 ♦ AQ94 ♣ K103, in which case six clubs would be an excellent contract.

3. Six spades. Partner's two-spade bid indicated a minimum opening bid with three- or four-card spade support. However, his jump to four spades shows that his two-spade bid was on the upper end of the range, and that he also has four spades which is about all you need to know to undertake a slam.

You could use Blackwood first, if vou were so minded, but you'd surely bid a slam whether partner showed one or two aces in response. Partner's hand might look something like: ♠ KJ64 ♥ 72 ♦ AQ853 ♣ K10, in which case slam is a virtual laydown.

Today is Friday, July 22, the 204th day of 2016. There are 162 days left in the year

Today's Highlight in History:

On July 22, 1916, 10 people were killed when a suitcase bomb went off during San Francisco's Preparedness Day parade, an event sponsored by the local Chamber of Commerce in anticipation of America's entry into World War I. Two anti-war labor radicals, Thomas Mooney and Warren K. Billings, were accused of the bombing and imprisoned; they were released in 1939 amid doubts about their guilt.

On this date:

In 1587, an English colony fated to vanish under mysterious circumstances was established on Roanoke Island off North Carolina.

In 1796, Cleveland, Ohio, was founded by General Moses Cleaveland (correct). In 1862, President Abraham

incoln presented to his

In 1943, American forces led by Gen. George S. Patton captured Palermo, Sicily, during World War II.

In 1946, the militant Zionist group Irgun blew up a wing of the King David Hotel in Jerusalem, killing 91 people.

In 1957, Walter "Fred" Morrison applied for a patent for a "flying toy" which became known as the Frisbee.

In 1963, Sonny Liston knocked out Floyd Patterson in the first round of their rematch in Las Vegas to retain the world heavyweight title.

In 1975, the U.S. House of Representatives joined the Senate in voting to restore the American citizenship of Confederate Gen. Robert E. Lee. (President Gerald R. Ford signed the measure on August 5.)

In 1986, for the first time in a half-century, the House of Representatives impeached a federal official; Judge Harry E. Claiborne was later convicted by the Senate of tax evasion and bringing disrepute on the federal courts.

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



ponent of Dallas going from first to last in the NFC East following a 12-4 run in 2014 was Bryant breaking his right foot in the opener and never getting to full speed coming off an All-Pro season.

While Bryant was mostly held out of offseason workouts coming off two surgeries on the foot, all signs point to him being ready when training camp opens July 30 in Oxnard, California.

And that has Romo and his top receiver getting questions about how good the offense

can be after adding Ohio State star running back Ezekiel Elliott with the fourth overall pick in the draft, which has produced three first-round picks in the offensive line for Dallas since 2011.

"We're not ready to talk about the season," Romo said during offseason practices. "We are trying to figure out how to get better right now. For us, we have a long way to go. Just got to get to work and put your head down right now and work your butt off."

The defense had trouble rushing the quarterback last season and will be without young projected starters De-Marcus Lawrence and Randy Gregory the first four games on substance-abuse suspensions

Rolando McClain will miss the first 10 games for the same reason, and might even get released before camp because the mercurial linebacker will be out more than half the season anyway.

"Right now on paper I don't think we've got anybody who's ever had 10 sacks in a season on the roster," Jones said. "That one sticks out like a sore thumb."

Things to consider with the Cowboys coming off a twoyear run of .500 (12-4 and 4-12 for 16-16) after three straight 8-8 seasons that ended with losses to division rivals with a playoff berth at stake:

FORGET THE PAST: Bryant said it's not about regaining the form that led him to an NFL-high 16 touchdowns receiving two years ago. "I'm going to be better than that," said Bryant, who had career lows in catches, yards and TDs last season. "The way we've been working, the way the coaches have been on us, the way we've been holding each other accountable, I think that alone is going to make us all be better than what we were in these past years."

ON THE RUN: Darren Mc-Fadden, the team's rushing leader last year, will likely be sidelined into camp with a broken elbow sustained in an

accident at home. That could open the door for Elliott to be the lead back as a rookie, although Alfred Morris is in the mix as well. A two-time Pro Bowler in Washington, Morris signed as a free agent before the Cowboys drafted Elliott.

BANGED UP D-LINE: Rookie third-round pick Maliek Collins should return during camp after the defensive tackle missed most of the offseason with a broken right foot sustained in practice. End Benson Mayowa, signed away from Oakland on an offer sheet, had arthroscopic surgery on his left knee but should be available most of camp.

"It's frustrating. It feels like you're letting the team down when you're not out there," Clowney said. "Injuries happen, vou've just got to be mentally tough to come back and show the guys you are ready to play.'

POTEN-MILLER'S The Texans TIAL: snagged an intriguing player when they drafted Braxton Miller in the third round. Miller was the two-time Big Ten offensive player of the year in 2012 and 2013 after throwing from more than 2,000 yards and rushing for more than 1,000 in both of those seasons. He sat out for a season with a shoulder injury, but finished with 26 receptions for 341 yards last year.

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

## Reflections: Faith and hope in a hurting world

significant event of faith and hope was little noticed last weekend. While we grieved over the horrific event in France, the attempted coup in Turkey, the ambush of police in Dallas and Baton Rouge, thousands of people, mostly in their

20s and 30s, gathered Saturday in Washington D.C. They did not gather to protest anything or to promote a political candidate. They gathered to prav.

Braving sweltering heat, young adults came from all over the nation to pray for reconciliation, healing and redemption in the name of Jesus Christ. Both those who attended and those who led the program were Black, Hispanic, Asian, Indian, and White, male and female.

Pope Francis welcomed the crowd

via video. They represented Christian young people who are seeking to proclaim God's forgiveness and compassion across all racial and cultural barriers.

Every generation must choose their faith. Some are choosing radical Islam. But many youth and young adults are choosing Christ. The question is whether they can stem the tide of violence, hatred, and suspicion with a message of repentance, love, forgiveness, and faith.

When I was mid-fifties, I wrote down my goal for the remainder of my life: to encourage the younger generation to do greater things than I ever dreamed or imagined.

Three years ago we began hosting a Bible study in our home for international grad students. We welcomed students from China, Indonesia, Zambia, South Africa, South Korea, the Czech Republic. Vietnam, and Ghana. The students led the study. Some were already passionate followers of Christ. Some came to faith. A few are still seeking. Most will soon complete their degrees and return home.

One has already returned to Zambia to start a church and a school.

Another has returned to Indonesia and is teaching in a Christian College.

Another Indonesian student hopes to serve Christ in orphanages in West Africa. A 25-yearold will complete her Ph.D. in statistics and plans to return to South Africa, where she will serve Christ and help find solutions to deadly diseases. A student from China married an American, and they are expecting their first child. Her husband is learning Chinese. When he completes his Ph.D. in computer science, they will move to China to

continue her work strengthening and multiplying house churches.

Five years ago I started coaching young church planters. One started a biker church made up of biker enthusiasts. Another started a cowboy church, and another, who is African American, is starting a multi-ethnic church. Our oldest son and daughter-in-law started a Bible study for high school students in Sundance, Wyo. Sixty percent of the local high school students attend. Our daughter and son-in-law are helping start a new church in Fort Collins, Colo.

These are but a few, and their stories are anecdotal. But there are thousands of young believers who are committed to following Christ and changing the world with the gospel.

We will continue to hear reports of terrorist attacks and global unrest. But there is a worldwide movement among young adults to live devoted lives to Jesus Christ and proclaim God's good news of compassion and grace. They are the "yeast" of the Kingdom that Jesus talked about in Matthew 13:33.
